64th June Dairy Parade saw crowd, heat and fun

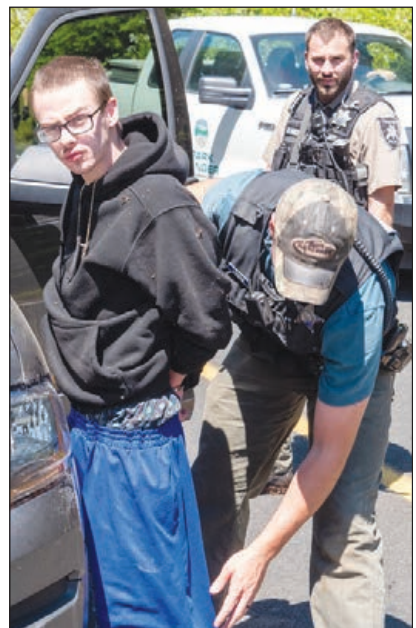
The 64th annual June Dairy Parade took place Saturday, June 26, in Tillamook. This year's theme was "As the World Churns." Spectators lined the route to view the procession. The parade was sponsored by the Tillamook County Creamery Association. The parade route followed its usual path down

Main Avenue, around Rodeo Steakhouse, down Pacific Avenue, and then along Pacific Avenue to end at Goodspeed Park. Children's dance groups performed in the summer heat, clowns drove by on their bikes, snacks and candy were tossed to the crowds of people who came to celebrate the town's dairy industry.



Although the parade mostly returned to normal this year, entries were not judged and there was no grand marshal this year. The Tillamook Area

Chamber of Commerce reorganized the parade in one month after mask mandates were removed by the state for outdoors.

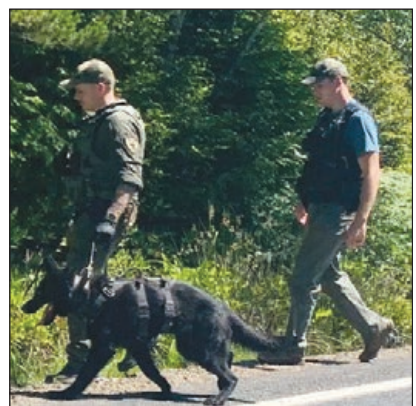
Sheriff deputies nab suspect in Sand Lake homicide

Tillamook County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) reported Saturday, June 26, a homicide suspect has been located. He was found within a few miles of Sand Lake Recreation Area by officers from TCSO, Oregon State Police and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office's K9 Unit. No injuries to officers or the suspect were reported.

According to the sheriff's office, a homicide occurred earlier in the morning at Sand Lake Recreation Area in south Tillamook County. The suspect, Brandon Jose Zavala-Satalich, of Clackamas, was at large and was considered armed and dangerous.

Sand Lake Recreation Area was closed and will remain closed for the duration of the investigation. People within the park are being allowed to leave if they choose, but re-entry is prohibited.

According to the sheriff's office, there are no other suspects and the public is no longer in danger in relation to this incident. TCSO wants to extend thanks to the public for their cooperation, and to the agencies that responded to assist with this major crimes investigation. This is an ongoing investigation.

Grocery outlet opens in Tillamook

Shoppers waited in line outside the new Grocery Outlet in Tillamook Thursday, June 24, enjoying live music and waiting for the long-awaited grand opening of the bargain market. The store is located at 2055 N. Main Ave.

The Tillamook City Planning Commission approved the proposed site plan for a Grocery Outlet location at a meeting in October 2018.

The proposed 18,000 square-foot store, located between Roby's on Hwy 101 and the Coastal Plaza, needed to pass permits, such as a water quality permit that was passed in March 2020 from the Oregon Department of Quality.

Cheers of the community followed a ribbon cutting by the Tillamook Area Chamber of Commerce, as citizens got ready to be the first shoppers to walk the aisles of the new store.

Stephen and Tamara Tuttle, the store's independent owner-operators, have lived in Nehalem for 25 years. Four years ago, they left their careers in the grocery business after their kids graduated from high school and left for college.

"We found out about the store four years ago and we went through

the recruiting process and training process and spent the last two years in Federal Way and owned that store up there with the intent to get back home," Tamara said.

During the ribbon cutting, a \$1,000 check donation was presented from Stephen and Tamara to Habitat for Humanity. Tamara said through interviews for Grocery Outlet, a lot of people saw owning a home as out of reach. The Tuttle's love what Habitat for Humanity is doing, bringing people together to build homes.

Tamara said they are also looking to hold community days, partnering with Habitat for Humanity for employees to take four hours paid time off to volunteer in the community, such as park cleanups.

"A lot of them have already vol-

unteered at Habitat," Tamara said of the employees.

The employees are local residents and some have worked together before, Stephen added.

Tamara and Stephen hope to create a positive workplace and see the store as a family environment.

"They feel a connection with us," Tamara said of the employees. "We look at them as family."

Tamara and Stephen hope to give their employees the tools they need to do bigger and better things, whether they work their way up to own a Grocery Outlet store, or move on somewhere else.

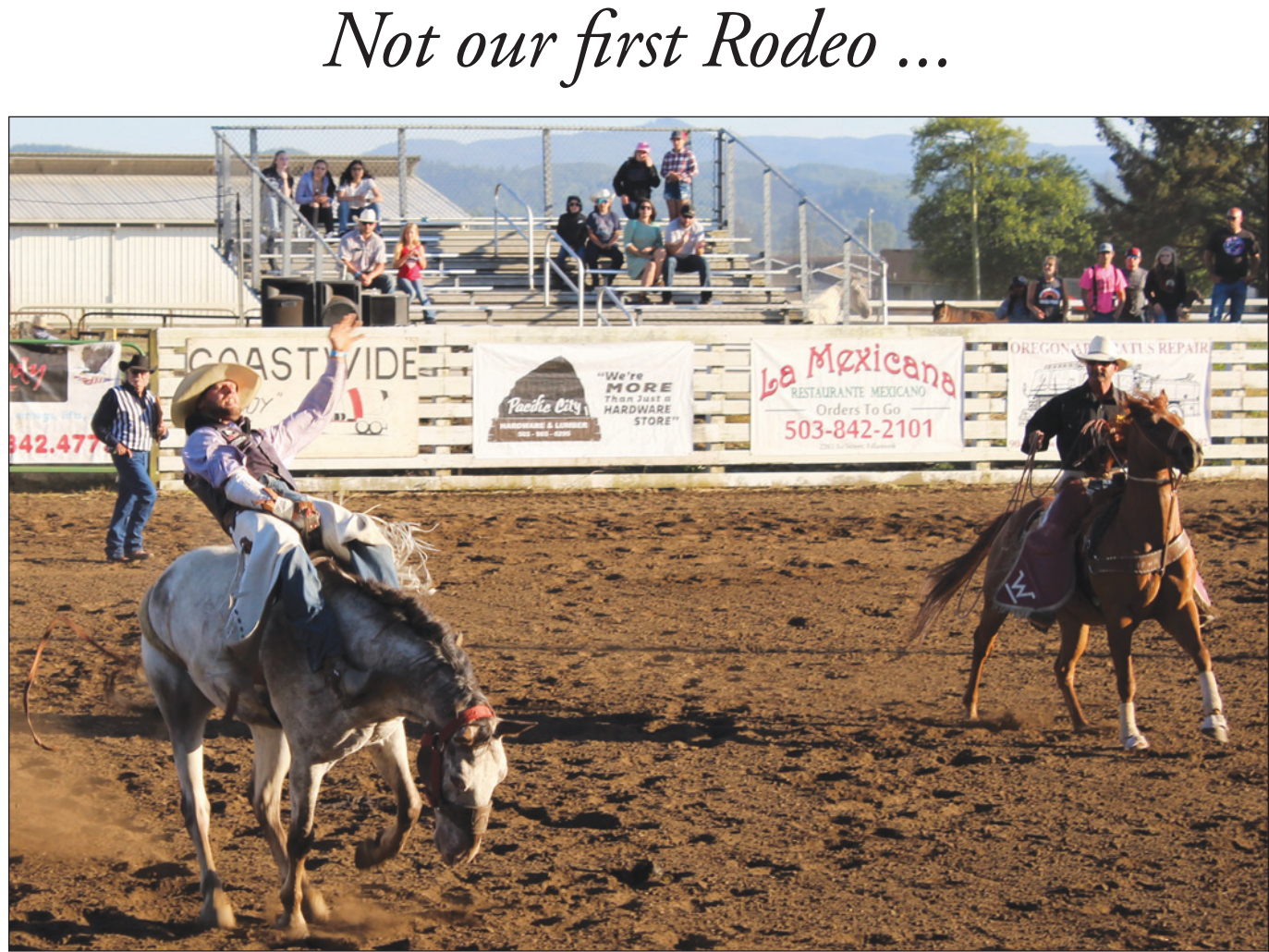

Netarts Oceanside Fire District responds to house fire, rescues resident, dogs inside

Netarts Oceanside Fire District was alerted by Tillamook 911 Dispatch Center at 7:29 a.m. Wednesday, June 23, a reported house on fire in the 4900 block of Netarts Hwy West. An off duty Netarts firefighter on his way to work was passing the residence as the alert was being sent out and stopped at the home to make an initial assessment.

According to the fire district, the firefighter found a single family dwelling with a moderate amount of smoke showing and saw movement inside. The firefighter entered

the home to find a woman trying to throw water on the fire. The firefighter started ushering the woman out, but she had numerous dogs still inside the home with her that needed to be found.

"The occupant was assisted out of the home to a safe area and the firefighter went back in three times to remove four dogs to safety," said James McCamman, division chief of operations & training. At this time, Chief Tim Carpenter arrived and took command and the firefighter then went to the fire station a quarter mile away to be sure of apparatus staffing. The engine arrived and directed hose lines into the



home to extinguish the fire and set up fans for ventilation, McCamman added. Tillamook Fire District arrived and provided manpower to assist with overhaul and investigation. Tillamook County Sheriff's Office assisted with traffic control while crews worked to extinguish the fire.

According to the investigation, an overloaded electrical outlet started the fire. Chief Carpenter wants to remind people that overloaded circuits are a leading cause of home fires and that homeowners should limit extension cord and gang plugs on residential outlets.

Sewer work in Tillamook begins Tuesday, July 6

Sewer work is scheduled in the city of Tillamook. The neighborhood's sewer pipes are being tested for leaks, cracks, misaligned joints and other sources that allow groundwater and surface water to enter the sewer system. This is called Inflow and Infiltration (I&I). Treating groundwater and surface water at the City's Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) is expensive and takes up capacity.

A technique to find these sources of I&I that the city will be using is closed caption TV inspection, where a camera is sent inside the pipes and takes video. This TV inspection requires crews

using manholes to access the sewer pipes. Many sewer manholes are located in the middle of streets and intersections.

This will impact traffic in the neighborhoods. The city appreciates residents driving slowly through these work zones, which will have traffic control.

Smoke testing of sewers is also a technique to identify I&I. A smoke candle is placed in the manholes and the smoke releases where there are voids, cracks, and dislodged joints in the pipes. Smoke has been observed in roof vents and coming out of the ground, and can be alarming for residents if they are

unaware of what is occurring. Crews will have "Smoke Testing in Progress" signs in the areas of the smoke testing.

What can residents expect? You may observe smoke, which is non-toxic and non-staining, rise out of manholes and places where cracks in the pipes or dislocated joints may be. If you see smoke in your home, it may mean sewer gases are also entering your home. If you do observe smoke in your house, you should call a qualified plumber to investigate and provide recommendations to remedy.

If the city finds that your sewer lateral from your home to the city's main is in poor condition, you will be notified that your lateral will need to be fixed. If the city does not find any problems with your sewer lateral, no further action on your part is necessary.

Work is planned to start July 6 and is expected to be complete by the middle of August. The city thanks you for your patience during the field investigation of the sewer system. Reopening Oregon: No later than June 30

Oregon will reopen no later than June 30 and Governor Kate Brown said she will lift all mandated health and safety requirements, including face masks and social distancing.

Brown made the announcement Friday during a briefing with reporters. In an executive order, Brown said if the state reaches her previous goal of 70% vaccination rate before June 30, the pandemic restrictions will be lifted.

"As we near the end of June, more than 15 months since the first case of COVID-19 was detected in Oregon, we find ourselves entering a new chapter the pandemic," Brown said.

"More than 2.3 million Oregonians are now vaccinated. And we are quickly approaching the point where 70% of Oregon's adults have received a first dose."

During the press briefing,

Brown signed a new executive order—extending Oregon's emergency order and repealing the face mask and social distancing mandates. The order will come into effect once the state reaches the 70% mark or on June 30, whichever comes first, according to Brown.

"As I have detailed before, that means no more state-wide mask mandates in most settings, no required capacity limits, and no required physical distancing," Brown explained. "That means effectively, Oregon is 100% open for business."

Over the past couple of weeks, daily vaccination rates have slowed, pushing Brown's original deadline of June 21.

Over 2.3 million Oregonians have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, according to Director of the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) Pat Allen.

"We are on the doorstep of a 70 percent adult vaccination

rate," Allen said.

In the national ranking of states' vaccination rates, Oregon has the 18th highest percentage of adults with at least one dose of the COVID-10 vaccine, according

back to county commissioners and their public health agencies—though Brown said county's need to focus on vaccination drives in rural areas and within Black, Indigenous, Latino, and Asian American communities of color.

"We must also recognize that it has been exceptionally difficult for our Black, Indigenous, Latinx, Asian and Pacific Islanders, and tribal communities. Disparities that existed before are even wider now," Brown said.

When faced with concern that the mask mandate would

not be lifted before the extreme heat hits this weekend, Brown and Allen said that the state would be lifting capacity limits on public transportation and looking to doing the same will large public spaces, like grocery stores, to employ them as cooling centers.

Whether the state hits the 70% in the next few days or not, the state will reopen on June 30—though Brown said she still encourages vulnerable populations and those

Agencies search for reported canoe swept out to sea, no sign of distress found

Netarts Oceanside Rural Fire Protection District personnel, Tillamook County Sheriff's Office and the U.S. Coast Guard were dispatched at 10:59 a.m. Monday, June 21, to what the caller described as an occupied red canoe being swept out of the bay over the bar at Netarts Bay. The reporting party could barely see the indi-

vidual in distress, due to fog, and could not tell if he was wearing a personal flotation device.

According to the fire district, members responded to the beach at Happy Camp along with watercraft launching at the Schooner Boat Ramp and did an extremely thorough search. Approximately two hours after the

original call, the search on the water, in the air and by ground crews was called off with no sign of anyone in distress. Chief Tim Carpenter wants to remind anyone operating in or around the Netarts Bay and ocean, to always check the tide table and keep a personal flotation device readily available.

Man pulled from ocean dies at hospital

Nehalem Bay Fire & Rescue crews were dispatched to a report of a man found in the water at 1:22 p.m. Saturday, June 19, at Short Sand Beach at Oswald West State Park, unconscious and not breathing. Upon arrival of emergency medical personnel, bystanders were providing CPR.

"With the help of medically trained bystanders and state park personnel, treatment

continued while the patient was connected to our automatic chest compression device and moved from the beach to the ambulance via UTV," Fire Chief Chris Beswick said.

Beswick said the man was transported to Seaside Providence Hospital where he was pronounced dead.

As of press time, the victim's name has not been released.

Last week we pulled the last 10 winners of the #ShopTillamook Sweepstakes, wrapping up a multi-month campaign to support local retailers across Tillamook County. Congratulations to all the winners – and a huge thank you to everyone who participated!

Over the course of the 10-week campaign, the Chamber received several hundred entries, each of which represented a purchase made at a locally owned retailer. Not only does it show them how much their loyal customers love them, but also it attracts new shoppers to support the business!

The love doesn't have to stop now that #ShopTillamook is over. In fact, we hope the community will continue to shop locally, thank its local retailers and share their experiences with friends and family.

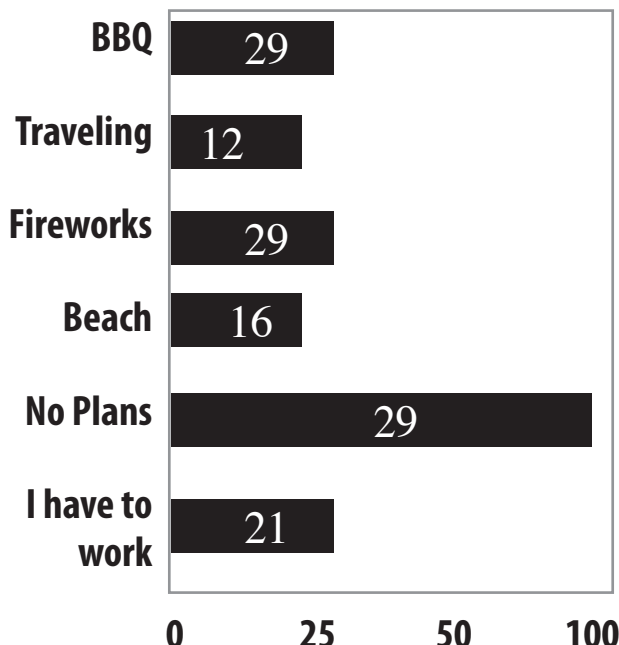

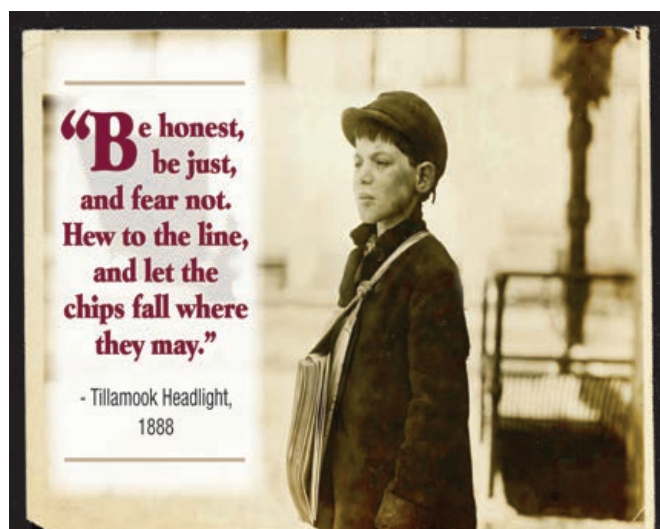

TBCC Graduation Day 2021!

Graduation day at Tillamook Bay Community College is a special time for our students, our staff, and our faculty. It's also an important day for the families of our students who have supported them during their educational journey and are excited for the opportunity to celebrate in their success.

Last year we had to cancel our in-person graduation ceremony due to COVID-19 restrictions, but we promised those students that when we could hold a formal gradu-

ation again they would get their opportunity to celebrate. That day was Friday, June 18, when we recognized both the 2020 and 2021 graduating students.

Besides having both classes in this ceremony, it was

even more special because it was the first TBCC graduation ever to be held outside and on the College campus! In addition, the ceremony was broadcast in both English and Spanish on KTLI and live-streamed on Facebook. We heard there were viewers from as far away as Mexico, who otherwise would not have been able to participate.

For the 2020 class, we had a record number of graduates: 72 total, with 14 that walked at the ceremony. For the 2021 class we had 69 graduating students, with 29 present. The weather was perfect, and the students, faculty and staff sat outside below the stage, which was a 40-foot covered trailer donated by the Blue Heron French Cheese Co.

Families and friends were in their cars in the parking lot and were able to get out to take pictures of their graduate as they walked across the stage.

Between the two classes, we conferred 237 degrees and certificates with many graduates earning multiple degrees/certificates. Twenty percent of our graduates earned a Career-Technical degree or certificate, 54% earned a Transfer degree, and 26% earned a non-credit training certificate, which includes Phlebotomy and Truck Driving. Our youngest graduate was 17 years old and our oldest was 68, with 34% being over the age of 30. Overall, 61% of our graduates this year were women!

We had 39 graduates between both classes that had previously taken college dual credit courses while in high school. That program is growing in Tillamook County at all three high schools. This year alone, TBCC awarded over 2,300 credits to dual credit high school students, saving those families more than \$266,000 in tuition and fees.

Our guest graduation speaker this year was Representative David Gomberg, who represents District 10 in the Oregon State Legislature, which includes Tillamook County up to Third St. in Tillamook. Rep. Gomberg shared his inspiring story of his journey that led to the state legislature. Our student speaker was Stephanie Verdin

who had an equally inspiring message for her fellow graduating students. Stephanie is a 2020 TBCC graduate who is already halfway toward her Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice at Western Oregon University.

We also had 14 graduates between the two classes that earned highest honors (Summa Cum Laude), with 41 graduates overall earning an honors credit.

It was a wonderful event as usual, being my favorite day of the year working at a community college. All of us at the college are very proud of our graduates and wish them the very best as they move on to the next life challenge. Congratulations to all our new TBCC Alumni!

HAPPENINGS AT HANGAR B

Hi, It's me again. I am going to share with you about the sailors of Navy Air Station Tillamook and their war time operations. All of this information comes to you from "The History of NAS Tillamook and It's role in World War II" This small booklet is available at the museum housed in Hangar 'B'.

Many of the sailors came to NAS Tillamook after serving at sea. It was navy Policy to give men shore duty after a period of service in combat. Almost every man was a Veteran of South Pacific and

mostly in Guadalcanal. The sailors enjoyed the peaceful activity of the serene pace of blimp life and the beauty of the open-sea and the Oregon Washington Coastline and Tillamook County was a special treat.

The local people in Tillamook County benefited from the Navy by improving the economy, building a small subdivision in the city of Tillamook and building the two huge hangars. The sailors were invited to all the social happenings and families would befriend the sailors that came into their lives. I would love to chat with one of those sailors. Call me!

Throughout World War II, nonrigid airships played a vital role in protecting thousands of lives and ships from the threat of enemy submarines. The war time operations from 1943 to 1945 with about 15 blimps stationed at NAS Tillamook and at least one blimp each summer was stationed at Quillayute, Washington. This blimps job was to intercept and destroy the balloon-delivered incendiary bombs that the Japanese launched from their mainland and the Kuril Islands. The Balloons were affectionately called "poopey bags"

It has been said that the 1945 forest fire in the middle of the Tillamook Forest was started by one of the Japanese Firebombs. The forester could not find another reason for a fire in that location. The airships shot down all the other firebombs.

The blimp was perfect platform from which to keep watch on convoys as well as a superb visual and elec-

tronic ASW (antisubmarine warfare) platform. Hours of watching the sea below could become very tiring. Good lookouts had to train themselves to differentiate what was worth reporting from what was just normal waves and flotsam. The pilot would set the altitude best suited to meet the conditions they were experiencing to optimize the chance of spotting a sub. The crew would take their places and settle in for a patrol that could last eight to ten hours. During an average days operation, airships could cover 13,000 square miles of water. The blimp crews from NAST saw virtually everything on the surface of the Pacific Ocean for a distance of several hundred miles off the Oregon, Washington Coast.

The airships could operate in almost any kind of weather, stay on station much longer than a fixed-wing aircraft.

As the war continued, missions of fifteen to twenty hours were not uncommon. Some blimps were modified to carry enough fuel and provisions to support a 59 hour mission covering a range of 1400 miles. The primary mission of blimp crews from NAST was to keep on the lookout for enemy submarines in the Pacific Northwest.

So what about the Japanese subs? Was NAS Tillamook successful? I say YES. The Japanese knew airships were watching from the air and could see everything. The airships protected us and Thank God they were there. There was an incident, known as the "Battle of Cape Lookout" that took place on May

21-23rd 1942 off the Oregon Coast. It was claimed that one maybe two Japanese submarines were sunk in this incident that involved two blimps from NAS Tillamook and five surface ships, one of them a Navy ship commanded by L. Ron Hubbard. Thanks to NAS Tillamook airships, the Navy ship knew the location of the Japanese sub and it was sunk. Fort Stevens was another location that had some activity. Pat Patterson heard the large Boom when a depth charge exploded in 1944. Pat thinks the submarine was about 21 miles out to sea. Pat said "the submarine was killed"

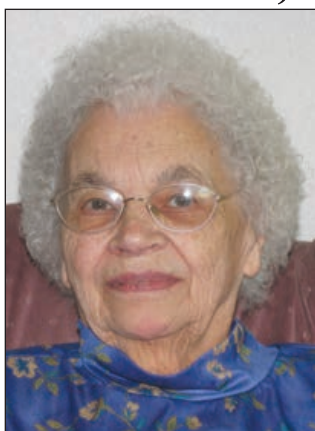

Learn about restoration efforts to return these historically-significant oysters to Bays along the Pacific Northwest on July 1 with the Friends of Netarts Bay WEBS

When we think of Netarts Bay it's hard not to also think about oysters. After all, Netarts Bay is famous for its Pacific oyster population. But did you know that in the 1800s Netarts Bay sustained a large population of native Olympia oysters? These native oysters even supported a commercial oyster harvest.

Native Olympia oysters have since been depleted, and now Netarts Bay sustains a robust oyster industry through the Pacific oyster species.

Over the years, a few attempts have been made to restore native Olympia oysters back to Netarts Bay, resulting in the survival of a small population.

On July 1, Hilary Hayford, Habitat Research Director for

the Puget Sound Restoration Fund, will share about these local bivalves and the organization's successful restoration program for native Olympia oysters during a virtual presentation. Hayford will discuss what worked, what didn't, and how they have managed to create a successful program to reestablish this historically-important oyster back to the Bay.

living in areas with low vaccination rates to consider continuing to wear masks

and limiting the kind of activities they engage in.

Should the state reach a "dire point" again, Allen said, the state would consider reinstating the restrictions again. But a resurgence is unlikely, as 7 in 10 Oregonians are vaccinated

(with the state pushing for an 8:10 ratio), and high vaccination rates (above 70%) will prevent the virus from spreading.

"This action will give

Oregon the flexibility and access to resources needed to aid in our recovery efforts. Brighter days are certainly ahead," Brown said. "And we are more determined than

ever to make sure that we ground our state in a strong recovery that reaches every single Oregonian as we turn a new page on this chapter of the pandemic. Our work

isn't done. But we can all take a moment to celebrate that by next week. We will all be moving forward together."

people are needed to reach that vaccine goal.

"Once that 70 percent vaccine rate of the state is met, Oregon's risk level framework, including all of the county-based metrics and health and safety restrictions, will be lifted," Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administrator Marlene Putman reported during a community update Tuesday, June 22. "That includes masks, physical distancing, capacity limit requirements in almost all settings."

Places such as airports, public transit and public health settings will still require masks.

"There are still people becoming sick and being

hospitalized for COVID-19 and needing ventilators," Administrator Marlene Putman said. "If you're ill, check in with your provider, give us a call if you need support."

Commissioner David Yamamoto said of all the counties, Tillamook County is one of the few with a zero case count. Yamamoto said people should not lower their guard, as neighboring Clatsop County was eligible to move to High Risk but stayed at Lower Risk in a caution period.

Beach is accessible for those with limited mobility

Tillamook County offers beautiful, sandy beaches for all to enjoy. The Pacific Ocean, rocky bluffs and sandy dunes provide stunning views. But for wheelchair users or anyone with a mobility aid (cane, crutches, walkers and scooters), the shifting sands can be treacherous and often impossible to navigate. Fortunately, you can still enjoy a day at the beach with a specially designed beach wheelchair, available for loan at three popular towns on the Tillamook Coast: Manzanita, Pacific City and Rockaway Beach.

Unlike standard or motorized wheelchairs, beach wheelchairs feature oversized wheels that easily glide over sand and won't get stuck. Most of these wheelchairs do require someone who can push the chair for the occupant. For the wheelchair user's comfort and safety, consider bringing a cushion from home. Also, some wheelchair users may



find transferring from their personal chair to a low-slung beach chair difficult and should plan accordingly.

The beach wheelchairs are free to use, but we strongly recommend reserving a beach wheelchair in advance. In Tillamook County, you can borrow a beach wheelchair at the following locations:

Cherry Oat Crumble

Prep Time: 15 minutes
 Cook Time: 30 to 45 minutes

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 Tablespoon cornstarch
- 4 cups pitted tart cherries (fresh, frozen, or canned and drained)
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/3 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1/3 cup old fashioned rolled oats
- 2 Tablespoons packed brown sugar
- 2 Tablespoons margarine or butter, melted

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
2. In a large bowl, mix together the sugar and cornstarch. Add the cherries and vanilla and mix well.

3. Pour the fruit into an 8x8-inch baking dish.
4. In a medium bowl, mix together the flour, oats and brown sugar. Add the melted butter and stir until the texture is coarse with some clumps. Sprinkle the oat topping over the fruit.
5. Bake for 30 to 45 minutes, or until the juices are bubbling and the oat topping is golden brown.
6. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

Notes

- No tart cherries? Use sweet cherries (or another fruit such as blueberries or chopped apricots, peaches or plums) and reduce the sugar added to the fruit to 1 or 2 Tablespoons.

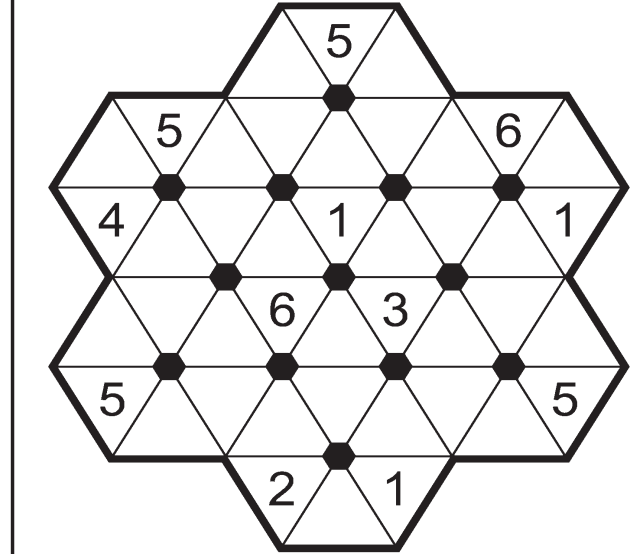
