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# Tillamook County at 94 confirmed positive cases Active cases jumped to 33 in county

**▼**n a Tillamook County Lead-Lership meeting Friday, Nov. 20, county leadership discussed COVID-19 cases and hospital capacity. Tillamook County Community Health Centers reported on Friday, Nov. 20, 11 new confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 during the week of Nov. 13-19, bringing the county

to a total of 94 positive tests completed. There are 33 active cases in the county.

Tillamook County Health Centers Administrator Marlene Putman said there is one person who is currently hospitalized in the county. There are 109 positive and presumptive cases. There are three new presumptive cases and 15 presumptive cases total.

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has reported higher case count totals for Tillamook County throughout the week, the health center stated. The current total is lower as several of the positive cases were residents of other counties, and therefore, the case count has been adjusted to only include positive and presumptive cases for residents of Tillamook County. There can be discrepancies as the data is collected at particular points in time.

OHA reports 4,179 total tests

completed for Tillamook County. Fifty cases are being monitored: 33 active cases and 17 close contacts. There have been no COVID-19 related deaths in the

Putman said public health locally is not sharing the area of the county or zip code of cases to keep privacy and in smaller towns. According to Oregon Health Authority, the city of Tillamook has 58 positive and

presumptive cases, with 1-9 cases each in Bay City, Rockaway Beach, Cloverdale and Wheeler.

"For those who do receive a call about a contact to a positive case, please respond to the calls from public health nurses," Putman said. "I know there's some concern about attributing cases incorrectly or scams calls. If you receive a call, call your local pub-

# NEW PRESCHOOL OFFERS TIMELY OPTION FOR PARENTS

The Imagination Station, a new preschool in Tillamook opened its doors this month as a new option in town for parents with children ages three to five years-old.

Monique McEachern, who is a mother of three herself, opened the preschool in the former Blue Moon

Cafe spot on the corner of Pacific and Second Street in Tillamook.

McEachern has experience working both in day cares and though after school programs.

"I've mostly done in home childcare and worked in dare care and after school programs for the YMCA," she said. "I love working with children."

McEachern is a 2010 graduate of Tillamook High School and has children, five, seven and 11 years-old.



So far, McEachern says, she has five students in the afternoon class, but her license allows up to 15 students, and when full she can open a morning class

up.
"I plan to not go over 12-students
per class," she said. "Each class is three-and-a-half hours per day."

Currently class is Tuesday through Friday from noon to 3:30 p.m. But when more parents register, she plans

on opening a class on the same days

"I focus on kindergarten prepared-

ness," she said. "We learn colors,

shapes, numbers, letters and we also work on how to interact or play to-

gether along with task transitioning."

She says they also do arts and crafts,

painting, work with Play Dough and work with bead activities.

"Today we are making turkeys with feathers and tracing our hands," she

She said, she sanitizes everything twice per day, and follows all guidelines issued in terms of the pandemic. "Any child five or under is not

required to wear a face mask, but if any parent wants their child to wear a mask I will enforce it,"

she said. The three plus hours are full of activities. She said when the children get there, she gives them time to play for a while, then they jump right into learning activities. They do the date, talk about the weather, work on writing their names, then it's onto story time where the chil-

dren can relax and listen.

"We learn here," she added. "I like structure, I've done day care and this is much better, because of the structured learning."

# Rulemaking process opens for vehicle beach restrictions in south county

The Oregon State Parks and Recreation Committee agreed Wednesday, Nov. 18, to open rulemaking on vehicle restrictions on beaches in south Tillamook County near Pacific City and north of Tierra Del Mar. The committee hosted open public discussion during the Nov. 18 meeting, during which there was unanimous support to open the rulemaking process.

Katie Gauthier, government relations and policy manager at Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD), read through the proposed rule change, based on Tillamook County's request to open the rulemaking process. The proposed rule change would create a year-round closure of beach parking in the area.

Working with the county, OPRD had limited venicle beach parking from Cape Kiwanda south to the Nestucca River since July 1, Gauthier stated in her report. Vehicles involved in launching or retrieving commercial or recreational boats are still allowed to park on the beach.

Gauthier said the public comment period would be open from Dec. 1 through Feb. 12. OPRD will have a website that has the maps and information and will accept public comments via email, mail and

'We would plan a virtual public hearing and an in-person opportunity for folks to comment, whether it's an open house or hearing, we'll work with the county on that piece," Gauthier said. "We'll also work with the Pacific City Chamber on a specific business hearing to talk about the impacts to busi-

Associate Director Chris Havel said OPRD's plans for an in-person hearing are subject to health guidance and executive orders.

We are recommending to this commission to close one area to beach driving and parking," Tillamook County Commissioner David Yamamoto said. "That would be the Cape Kiwanda area."

Yamamoto added that this is a huge life safety issue, especially with families and children. When COVID-19 hit, the county closed vehicle beach access at Cape Kiwanda.

Regarding the recommendation to restrict vehicle beach access, the county received about 1,000 comments, Yamamoto added. Groups that had concerns included paragliders, elderly and the disabled. The commissioners recommend keeping access open for the dory fleet.

Yamamoto said there are plans in place for alternative parking. There is a Cape Kiwanda Advisory

"Our parks department owns what we call Web Park," Yamamoto said. "It's a small camping facility and the county owns property behind and above Web Park, so we would trade our own parks department with property for them to continue their camping facility and we would turn Web Park into a parking facility to take some of the overflow parking.'

The county is also in negotiations for the Jensen property in Pacific City. The Jensen property consists of several parcels totaling nearly six acres located in Pacific City along Cape Kiwanda Drive, bordered to the north by the Kiawanda Center and to the south by the county-owned Pacific City Turn-



Nehalem, Tillamook, and Nestucca's lands stretched from the Tillamook Head in the north to Siletz Bay in the south. Their scattered villages included Nehalem Bay, Tillamook Bay, Netarts Bay, Sandlake, Nestucca Bay, Salmon River, and Siletz Bay. The Tillamook spoke a Coast Salish language, which the Nehalem and Nestucca used in differentiated dialects. Many local names of rivers and places were derived from their language. The Tillamook library has an extensive collection of books about these early tribes, and the Tillamook Pioneer Museum has a room devoted to examples of baskets, arrowheads, and other artifacts.

### Increase in day use fees for county

Problem statement:

Tillamook County has experienced an increase in tourists of epic portions since the Pandemic started in March of 2020. Since many campground areas were closed or semi-closed, as they still are, it caused a concentration of people in the open outdoor spaces. This also could be influenced by the media blitz the last 3 years by Visit the Tillamook Coast. Due to this influx county services, infrastructure and law enforcement has been overwhelmed and funding is considered inadequate to deal with the issue. Although the county has acknowledged that this is a poor time to add more fees on the Oct 14th audio of the workshop. I will add it is the wrong time because of the struggles people are experiencing financially due to the pandemic, jobs reduced/lost, children home more, lack of federal government response, stress of unusual weather events, fires in our county. political climate, and civil unrest. 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
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

# **Guest Column**

In the following attempt to deal simply with great matters, I acknowledge in advance the numerous exceptions and counter-arguments to my observations about political brands, tribal membership, and conspiracy theories.

From supposedly high positions of moral rectitude, many of us toss around the labels "progressivism," "conservatism," "capitalism" and "socialism." We sing the praises of our favorite, but sputter saliva bits onto our device screens and onto social media platforms about the evils of other labels which seem to oppose our favorite.

Most progressives think humans are, if not perfectible then vastly improvable (no doubt there), and that people or groups (we know who they are) which are pushed aside by the dominant society need to be helped to acquire a legitimate place at the table. We want them to enjoy a good life: freedom to grow and achieve their own potential, receive respect from others, earn enough resources to live a decent life without want. However, conservatives observe that progressives remain silent about making people more dependent on government support, and do not tally the costs to human growth of excessive reliance on

that support. Also, progressives never seem to express fear about the exploding national debt (don't worry; be happy!).

Most conservatives look at history and find human nature to be unchanging, a mix of many good and bad qualities, including: selfless generosity and a capacity to love others; a yen for savage violence and lust for power; plus inevitable complacency, corruption and untrustworthiness when we occupy seats of power for too long. Progressives see conservatives as those folks whose lives and incomes are both stable and adequate, so they prefer the current social and economic conditions of society that work pretty well for them (please, no fast changes that could injure my

Many disciples of "capitalism" or "socialism" do not look below the surface of those labels to acknowledge that each, taken in its purest form, has a tremendous downside. Capitalism, left to its own devices with little or no regulation, results in huge inequalities of opportunity, income, education and power. Numerous such conditions are now firmly implanted in these United States: many workers needing two or three jobs to survive; an exploding homeless population; widespread descent into chemical addictions; inadequate access to lower cost health care

and education; a constant search for pleasure and freedom from obligations (a search that yields only pain).

Unrestrained capitalism exploits its human population (workers and consumers), and without any forces to oppose it (strong unions, governmental regulation), over time it leaves in its wake a population mired in ignorance, poverty and servitude. Although capitalism praises free markets and competition, given a chance it will eagerly seek government subsidies for its own industry and plead for tougher regulatory control over its competitors (hypocrisy flourishes like kudzu vines in our human psyches).

Unbridled socialism always appeals to the idealism of the young, and to some others who have not lived in countries where it dominates. While it promises an equitable life to people, by its nature it allows little human initiative toward growth, achievement, personal responsibility. Unmixed with capitalism as a countervailing force, it leads to social stagnation and totalitarian rule, for in all human societies there are many who seek and acquire and cling to positions of power, all at other people's expense (see: Soviet Union, Cuba, Venezuela, etc.).

Humanity would be wiser to realize that the best political, economic and social arrangements

are a mix of capitalism (private enterprise), socialism and a democratically elected government (get rid of the Electoral College!) that is unafraid to mediate, regulate and help.

Also, regardless of current rants against socialism, significant elements of it now exist in the USA and are largely beneficial: Medicaid and other government programs to help the poor; government subsidies for farmers that allow their exports to be competitive and provide lower prices to consumers; government support for industries that experience ups and downs but are vital to our long-term national interests. Of course, the rub comes in when we face the political inability to cut off subsidies that are no longer needed, because lobbyists from

Thank you, social media, for sorting us all into rival tribes, within each of which we rarely disagree for fear of being shunned. Not having to think on my own anymore truly is a gift of the digital age. Thanks to the

many social media platforms

at my fingertips, I feel comfy,

righteous and safely anonymous

every special interest group al-

ways invade legislative hallways

when spewing my outrage. Social media are the original digital pandemic, and have helped SO MUCH to elevate our world's camaraderie and conversations (yes, choking sounds).

Those who transmit hateful rhetoric on social media (even with: "Yeah, me too!") only contribute to trouble and seek tribal praise. Also, those in the throes of anarchic fervor who spray graffiti, start garbage can fires and destroy other people's livelihoods should be punished. And those adorned in "Q" shirts who believe in weird conspiracy theories should reinforce their tinfoil hats to more effectively deflect those "deep state" delta waves that invisibly coil in our brains.

And to you MAGA hatters: the election was quite fair. Trump lost. Regardless that he won't admit it and continues to manipulate you, there will be a peaceful presidential transition on January 20, 2021. Most reassuringly, the US government still knows how to remove a trespasser from federal property.

There are many opportunities to serve the world's better purposes, ignore simple labels, become free of social media addictions and find ways to get along just fine together. Those of you whom I may have offended, please come and join the rest of us, but do come unarmed.

# Local expertise is critical to wildfire preparedness, response and recovery

What makes a community resilient in times of hardship? Whether it's a global health crisis or the threat of wildfire, our resilience as a community comes down to capacity-the strengths, attributes and resources that allow us to respond to crises and recover.

The Labor Day fires demonstrated that special weather conditions, human activity, and climate change can create dangerous wildfire conditions, even on the coast. When it comes to disaster preparedness and response, the

natural resources industries that support our economy also create capacity to help protect our resources and our communities. We have local people with particular knowledge of the landscape—our forests, farmlands, and watersand we have equipment that can be marshalled quickly. It is not surprising that when fire threatened our region, individuals who make their living in the woods volunteered to help alongside emergency managers to protect their forests and their communities, even as their own families were evacuating. Loggers and foresters formed

firefighting crews that more

than doubled the Oregon



Department of Forestry's capacity. Landowners and farmers sent water tankers and bulldozing equipment. For those of us that work in the woods, the Labor Day fires were a reminder that these forests are our privilege and responsibility to manage and protect.

While some fire is inevitable, megafires pose a threat we cannot ignore. They endanger lives and infrastructure and compromise the state's environmental goals. The Labor Day fires emitted more carbon into the atmosphere than the state's energy and transportation sectors do in a year. While the effects of climate change will likely exacerbate the risk of megafires, we're not helpless. There are things we can do to reduce nearterm risk of catastrophic

We can manage the amount of fuel in our forests through logging, thinning and controlled burns. We can maintain logging roads, which provide important access for firefighting operations. We can sustain timber harvests on Tillamook State Forest to create revenue for the Department of Forestry, local fire departments and public health and safety. Those who recreate on public and private timberlands should respect warnings and closures when conditions are dry. When fires occur, we can replant and help forests recover.

With more people moving into forested areas, the need to manage these lands and protect all the benefits they provide will only increase. I'm comforted in the knowledge that the capacities our

natural resources industries have built over generations will help keep our forests and communities safe and healthy now and in the

for much of this cost. Tillamook County Parks was taken out of the general fund for tax revenue in 2009-10. They were told to become self-supporting. Therefore, the taxes we pay do not support Tillamook County Parks in this manner. We do pay in our property taxes for law enforcement, roads and the people in county government who make these decisions. South county voted down a slight increase in their property taxes to pay for the added need for safety and law enforcement a few years ago.

Tillamook County board of Commissioners did not put out a media notice advertising that their meetings were now open to the public in person or via tele-conference.

They did the minimum required by law, legal notice in the newspaper announcing a meeting and posted meeting notices on their web site.

Citizen input was not asked for to address this issue. There were articles in both Headlight Herald and Tillamook County Pioneer in August which discussed the epic influx of

visitors throughout the county and the problems it has created. Graphic pictures brought this message home. Each of these articles stated Bill Baertlin suggested a \$10.00/vehicle day use access fee for county owned properties but did not explain how he came up with this fee.

An order was signed on October 14th by Board of Commissioners to implement a \$10.00/vehicle day use access fee for 32 of 37 county properties. This is to start January 1,2021. In addition, annual pass fees are also raised. More county properties are added including access to Barview County Park day use access to the bar and beach, Happy Camp beach access and Bay Ocean Peninsula. The day use fee increase is a 150% increase from 2019 and a 400% increase from the inception in 2010. The annual fee is an 83.5% increase from the inception in 2010. It started at \$30.00 and will be increased to \$55.00 with discounts for various groups like senior citizens, disabled, and veterans. Presently the annual fee is \$45.00. These fees are to be paid if you want to walk, swim, throw sticks for your dog in the water, fish, kayak, sunbath whatever. For those people who kayak or drift boat down- stream you will pay day use

access fees at your launch point and take-out point.

This day use access fee is 100 % hugher and the annual fee is 83.5% higher then any county park department on the Oregon Coast and Columbia County' day use fee. The day use access fees in every other county on the coast is \$5.00/ vehicle, \$30.00 annual fee, except Douglas county who charges \$4.00/ vehicle. None of these counties plan to raise their fees in 2021. Oregon State Parks charge a day use fee for 25 of the 110 state parks in Oregon. It is \$5.00/vehicle. The annual fee is \$30, \$50 for 2 years. The Tillamook Board of Commissioners say they are not trying to affect the locals, yet they have raised the annual fee as well. They want the tourists to pay for the increase money and effort it is taking to control the epic number of visitors.

Tillamook county implemented a 10% Tillamook Transient Lodging tax in 2014. 30% of revenue is to be used for infrastructure, 70% for tourism related activities. Tillamook County has the 3rd largest lodging tax out of the 7 counties on the Oregon Coast.

In the 10 years the day use fee has been in effect, many primitive boat launch approaches and parking lots HAVE NOT been improved i.e. graded and or graveled. A portapotty and trash can have been placed at some sites, signage indicating day use fees and a collection box. Memaloose was improved by a grant previously but needs to be dredged and the boat ramps moved further into the bay. The estimated cost is \$400,000. Bay Ocean Spit which previously has no fees has been maintained by Fairchild Airforce Base in exchange for using the area for training. The road approached was graded and graveled in the last year. The port-a-potties at Bay Ocean Spit were paid this year with the TLT tax. The Tillamook County Parks department has 6 campground parks, 21 boat launches, 11- day use areas, that span 75 miles of coastline, 5 bays and 9 rivers. They along with Oregon State Parks and city parks provide the access to the natural waterways and scenic areas of the Oregon Coast which Oregonians know they have the right to use per Oregon water laws. Except for campground parks, and improved boat launches, paved parking areas the county parks provide primitive access to what nature has given us. When funds are used to improve the county facilities that generate the most income and for things like law

enforcement, the purchase of land, primitive launches' will never pay for itself.

Tillamook County Parks properties provide most of the access to the natural areas' tourists come to visit. People who stay more than one day pay TLT tax if they are not staying on private property. In Nan Devlin's annual report in the Headlight Herald of October 28th, 2020 she wrote tourists are staying an average of 7 days. Those tourists are then visiting our natural areas, so they are also paying for access use unless they are staying at a county park campground. Those who come for the day are paying the \$4.00/vehicle fee. Boaters are also paying for boat registration fees and fishing license fees. The problem is although Tillamook County Parks fit into the criteria for TLT funding they get NO PERCENTAGE of the TLT tax revenues. They apply for grants like anyone else. TLT taxes cannot be used for law enforcement.

#### **Kiwanis Club of Tillamook History**

The Kiwanis Club of Tillamook was organized and sponsored in 1922 by the Kiwanis Club of Portland. The club charter was granted on December 15, 1922 but not presented until March 3, 1923. At that meeting a large gathering of Kiwanis members and friends (about 200) gathered to recognize the new club and receive its charter. The original charter is still on display in a frame attached to the Kiwanis lectern. The original purpose of the club was to promote the business and civic interests of the community and to promote better acquaintance among businessmen. The first officers of The Kiwanis Club of Tillamook were F. A. Betz, president; George Harness, vice president; 2nd vice president, B. C. Lamb: treasurer Rollie Watson. At the time it was a rule of the Kiwanis Club of Tillamook that only two men from any business classification could become

members. It was noted that Kiwanis clubs had been a success wherever organized and a number of the most prominent men of the day are members. The club was active in the community providing much needed support and providing college scholarships to students in Tillamook. In 1925 the club started a scholarship trophy to recognize students with an outstanding scholastic record. We have the trophy still today with many names engraved that we still recognize including Flora Schild (92.25%); Mildred Berkey (95.37%); Kathryn Lamb (96.0%); Doreen Gienger (96.7%) and Jack Shuster (96.6%). Mildred Berkey known as our beloved Mildred Davy graduated from THS in 1928. Doreen Gienger may be the sister of long time member Ron Gienger and Jack Schuster also known as "Smilin Jack" the last name on the trophy graduated from THS in 1942. The trophy was rediscovered around 2009 after being found in the archive room at THS The Club sponsored the Tillamook High School Key Club in 1957. Key Club was formed as a high school service club. It was also an all male organizations at first. The first president of the THS Key Club was Bob Creech, who continues today as a member of the Kiwanis Club of Tillamook. Key club has been active at THS ever since with a membership count usually over 40 students. In 1960 the club started a scholarship drive to provide college scholarships for graduating high school seniors in Tillamook County.

Lodging ranged in number anywhere from 300 to 700 per event, which included 1200 to 1300 people. Doug was elected the Booshway (head man) on several occasions to oversee the staging of these events. Smaller Rendezvous Events were also held each year, and in some years Doug attended them as well. Each attendee had a special Rendezvous nickname - Doug's nickname was "Snappin' Turtle", derived from an incident involving him and a very large snapping turtle on the roadways of Florida.

Doug is survived by his sons and daughters listed above.

Doug will be tremendously missed by his friends and customers who became his friends because of his exquisite, precise woodworking, his great sense of humor, and his friendly and caring personality

# Library to remain closed during Two-Week Freeze

The Tillamook County **Board of Commissioners** agreed during an emergency meeting Thursday, Nov. 19, to keep the Tillamook County Library closed to the public and remain open for curbside service only. The board of commissioners had passed a board order during an emergency meeting Tuesday, Nov. 17, closing certain Tillamook County offices to the public as part of Gov. Kate Brown's Two-Week

Brown had announced on Friday, Nov. 13, a statewide Two-Week Freeze that began Nov. 18 to halt the rapid spread of COVID-19. One of the measures requires all businesses to mandate work from home to the greatest extent possible and close offices to the public.

Joel Stevens, Tillamook County Counsel, said on Nov. 13, the county received the governor's press release about mandates that would be coming in an executive order. The executive order had not been released at the time of the county's emergency meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 17.

The board signed an order implementing the guidelines that were recommended by the health department and mentioned in the governor's press release," Stevens said. "Later that afternoon, an executive order was released by the governor's office.'

The executive order was discussed briefly in Wednesday's board meeting, Nov. 18. This board chose to mirror the requirements in the executive order.

"The library has a game plan that I believe is in compliance with the executive order," Stevens said.

The Tillamook County Library had a plan to follow the order to the greatest extent possible,

while remaining open to the public through their express service.
"They just have a trickle

of people come in for express service," Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said. "What that looks like is there are very few people coming in, they're fully masked, they're cleaning very regularly, people are only allowed to stay in the building for about 15 minutes to pick up a book and check it out themselves."

Extension Librarian Bill Landau said the express service allows people not to have to make an appointment to come in. People are in and out and have been respectful of the 15-minute time limit.

"The public comes in and they can scan their own library card either with our self-check kiosk or at the branches we have it set up, they can scan their own card, put their books on the pad, and pick them up," Landau said. "There is nothing that is touched between the staff and the public."

Library Director Sara Charlton said the library has been very slow. The staff is thanked every time people come in, she added.

"At the main library, we upped the air flow on our main furnace," Charlton added.

Commissioner David

Yamamoto said everyone should take a step back and understand why the governor carried out her executive order. When the county put the board order together for their emergency meeting on Nov. 17, they stated the library could remain open for curbside service.

Yamamoto said the options the county provided in the board order still gives people the opportunity to get their books without going into the building.

Commission Chair Bill Baertlein said other libraries in the state are closed and not offering curbside service. He was also concerned about putting employees at risk.

Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said she does not support the governor's onesize-fits-all approach and is hoping for updated metrics in two weeks. She added that some of the bigger libraries have not opened since the spring because they are not allowed to because of their county's high number of COVID-19 cases.

"I am hoping we are able to utilize metrics, not a one-size-fits-all," Yamamoto said.

# Representative-elect Suzanne Weber responds to Gov. Brown's freeze order

In a press conference on Friday, Nov. 13, Gov. Kate Brown ordered a statewide "freeze," to combat a recent surge in COVID-19 cases across Oregon. Restrictions include limiting restaurants to take-out and delivery food orders only, limiting Thanksgiving dinner and other private gatherings to six people or fewer from no more than two households, and closing some businesses entirely, such as gyms and recreational facilities.

'COVID-19 is a serious health threat and we all need to do our part, but once again all of Oregon, and especially small business owners, are being saddled with some of the most restrictive rules in

America," said Representative-elect Suzanne Weber. "I certainly understand that some hotspots in the state require additional measures, but to impose these restrictions statewide will destroy businesses, destroy families and ruin the lives of countless people in rural Northwest Oregon."

Weber stated that, because the number of active cases in rural Northwest Oregon is low, businesses there have been operating safely should be allowed to continue to do so.

"We can address this virus effectively by allowing counties with low infection rates to keep our businesses open and operating safely, while also immediately

taking up liability protections for business owners which were proposed by Democrats and Republicans in the last session," commented Weber. "If the governor insists that this 'Freeze' order is the only way to address the current COVID-19 surge, she also needs to provide a plan to compensate business owners she shuts down."

Representative-elect Weber is the mayor of Tillamook and a former elementary school teacher. She was elected on November 3, 2020 to represent the people of rural northwestern Oregon in the Oregon House of Representatives.

lic health office if you're concerned and ask for a confirmation of whether you have been identified as a close contact."

People who are concerned can call the health center at 503-842-3900.

"The number of contact tracers is limited when you have this increase in positive cases," Putman said. "Some counties are using alternative methods for

contacting, adding additional volunteers, sending messages, reminding people to self-isolate or quarantine because they've been a close contact. In Tillamook County, we can manage it right now."

Putman asks people to consider the travel advisory when planning for the holidays.

"The advisories urge against non-essential out of state travel," Putman said. "They ask people to selfquarantine for 14 days after arriving from another state and encourage residents to stay local."

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said the hospital has plenty of personal protective equipment in supply. There are 32 adult ICU beds in the region, which includes Tillamook, Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties. The ICU beds are significantly down. Adventist Health continues to watch the regional bed capacity.

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

### **Glazed Carrots** & Cranberries

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*Number of servings:* 

Time for preparation (including preparation and cooking): 25 minutes





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#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 pound carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally into 1/4 inch thick slices
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 Tablespoons sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1 Tablespoon but-
- 1/2 cup dried cran-
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice

#### **Directions:**

- 1. In a large skillet over medium-high heat, add carrots, salt, 1 Tablespoon sugar, and broth. Bring to a boil. Cover and reduce heat. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until carrots are almost tender, about 5 to 8 minutes.
- 2. Uncover; increase heat to high. Stir occasionally until liquid is reduced to about 2 Tablespoons, about 1 to 2 minutes.
- 3. Add butter and remaining sugar to skillet; stir carrots to coat. Add dried cranberries and cook, stirring frequently, until carrots are completely tender and glaze is light gold, about 3 minutes.
- 4. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice. Serve warm.
- 5. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

# Give thanks for composting

First, allow me to wish all my readers a most wonderful Thanksgiving. I do give thanks for all of you who have been following my column for more than 16 years. It will be a strange Thanksgiving this year for sure, but everything has been strange this year. The saddest part will be not being able to celebrate everything we are thankful for with family and friends. So reach out to them in different ways: Zoom or Skype, call them on the phone, send an e-card, or - wonder of wonders – send them a real, honest-to-goodness 'thank you" card!

Now, I promised a column on composting, so here we go.

You may ask "Why should I compost? What's in it for me?" That's easy. Composting can save you money. Your garbage bills can be reduced and you won't be purchasing bags of fertilizer or soil amendments. But there is so much more. It will save water by helping the soil hold moisture and generally improves the condition of your soil. Its good whether your soil is clay, sandy or in-between. Composting has been called "nature's way of recycling." Think of all the leaves that fall on the forest floor and decay, putting nutrients back in the soil. That's what we are doing when we compost but we have so much more material to work with than just leaves.

There are a couple of composting systems. You can buy heavy-duty plastic compost bins that are rodent-resistant. These have lids, floors and are without any ways for rodents to enter. (There should be some sort of way for air to enter to help the breakdown, but these shouldn't be larger than 1/4".) These bins work best with fruit and vegetable plus yard trimmings. But they can also be used just for yard debris.

If all you have are yard trimmings, you can go with an open-bin system. It can be a series of bins or just a large pile. This type of composting does need to be turned and kept moist for the best breakdown.

My favorite system for composting is a worm bin. I have a three-tiered one that I periodically rotate. The worm castings are great compost, nicely broken down. Plus there is the added benefit of the "worm tea" that I draw from the bottom of the tiers and dilute to feed my orchids and garden plants at a ratio of 1 part "tea" to 50 parts water. So you don't need much!

The most important mixture is to combine brown matter, green matter, air and water. Browns are the dried, woody materials like pruned and chopped branches, pine needles and fallen leaves. Most sawdust is good, too. Greens are moist, green materials like grass clippings (if you didn't use weed killer on your lawn), fruit and veggie cuttings, tea bags, citrus rinds, and





and turning the pile once a week or so, you will be aerating the pile. You can also set up three bins sideby-side and move a pile down the line, turning it as you go. Water is essential but not too much. In the end, the compost should have the consistency of a wrung-out sponge. A good watering once a week will do in the summer. No need to bother in the winter and you might even want to place a tarp over it so it doesn't get too soggy.

"Hot vs Cold? What does that mean?" Well, basically, hot composting will break the pile down faster. But the pile needs to be no more than about a cubic yard (3' x 3' x 3') in size. Heat will kill weed seeds and some plant diseases, but heat is not necessary to break down the pile. To get the pile "hot" you will need to turn it often and make sure it is watered and aerated. If you see steam rising from the pile, you will know it is composting properly. A hot compost pile takes about 3 to 8 months to break down.

It can be "Cold composted," which only means it takes longer. Either way is good. I usually wind up cold composting just because of time. Turning the pile often and keeping it watered properly will reduce the incidence of critters trying to nest in it. My compost


the garden, out of sight, so I am not as concerned about rodents. And I have a cat. That helps, too. A cold compost pile will take 12 to 18 months to break down.

There are some things that should never go into a compost pile, be it hot or cold. Meat of any kind, bones, salted items, dairy products, grease or oils, sawdust from treated lumber or plywood, human, dog, cat, pig or bird feces, anything with pesticides on it, and diseased plants (in cold piles).

After the pile has broken down, let it sit for another 4 to 8 weeks to allow it to "cure." Using uncured compost may harm plants and especially seeds. You will know when it is ready to use when you turn the pile and it no longer heats and looks dark and crumbly.
