Tillamook’s Chief Wright retires after long career

Terry Wright, Tillamook’s Chief of Police since 1998 retired earlier this month after over 40 years in law enforcement. Wright came to Tillamook as the chief in 1998. Lutenient Erica Bomar will act as interim chief according to Wright and will be able to apply for the position when the posting is up.

Chief Wright began his career with a Pebble Beach Company in California working security for the Pebble Beach Pro Am golf tournament, a gig he’s kept over the years and will continue through retirement.

He then went to work for the Monterey County Sheriff’s Office in California. He was hired by the Tillamook Police Department in January of 1998.

Chief Wright has been instrumen-

tal in ensuring the Tillamook Police Department has the best equipment and technology. He has built relationships throughout the years benefiting employees, community members and visitors. Wright had a keen interest in serving children through a variety of youth programs like his Cadet Program and Shop with a Cop.

“The Tillamook County Sheriff’s office wishes to thank retiring Tillamook Police Chief for his 23 years of service to the people of Tillamook, and for his support for all of the local public safety agencies,” reads a statement from Tillamook County Sheriff Josh Brown. “It’s difficult to fully relate the level of gratitude we have for someone who has committed so much of his life to public service. We sincerely thank Terry for all he has done and wish him nothing but happiness in this next chapter of his life”

Accomplishments

Chief Wright has had many accomplishments through his long career. He is a member of the Oregon Association of Chiefs of Police where in 2009 he earned a Special Service Award, for chairing the auction committee for many years and for serving on the Board of Directors for many yards. Through his capacity with the OACP, he was a driving force behind the Law Enforcement Torch Run/Oregon Special Olympics.

He earned the Max Patterson Award in recognition of his efforts and dedication to an extremely successful and popular Police Cadet Program in Tillamook.

Wright was cited in 2003, 2006 and 2015 with the Presidents Award for his service to the OACP. He also was recognized as Deputy of the month, twice, Deputy of the Year, Monterey County Employee of the Year, received a Red Cross Lifesaving award for an infant, Outstanding Youth Public Safety Officer.

He’s served on the state board for the Special Olympics, Marie Mills board, a member of Kiwanis, Make a Wish program, 20 years a volunteer assistant director for communications for SCRAMP, a nonprofit that ran the Laguna Seca Raceway in Monterey. served on the Oregon Medical Examiner Advisory board, the Tillamook County Emergency Communications 911 board, the Oregon Fallen Badge Foundation, Terry responded and assisted with several Oregon law enforcement funerals.

Tillamook Cadet Program

“I started this program when I came to Tillamook,” Wright said. “It is fashioned after programs I had in Myrtle Point and before that, Monterey County.”

The Cadet program is a unique

Boy Scout Program in that most law enforcement programs start at age 14. “Our program takes youth ages 8 to 20,” he said. “We usually have about 35-40 youth in the program.”

The program provides life experience and education through law enforcement related topics and training. The cadets participate in regular training and participate in community support functions, like

parking at events.

“I’m proud to say two of your youth have received recognition from the Commission on Children and Families and several of our cadets have moved on to college,” Wright said. “The Cadet’s hours are tracked and in some years have

One new death in Tillamook County, 17 positive COVID-19 cases last week

Tillamook County Health Department reports 67 cases of COVID-19 from Sunday, March 28, through Saturday, April 10. Tillamook County is projected to remain in ‘High Risk’ for the next movement period beginning Friday, April 23.

Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Ed Colson reported during a community update Friday, April 16, that from Sunday, April 4, through Thursday, April 15, there were 44 cases of COVID-19 in the county. Oregon Health Authority (OHA) will use data from April 16 and 17 and will make a determination Tuesday, April 20.

OHA reported Wednesday, April 14, of the third COVID-19 related death of a Tillamook County resident. The 66-year-old woman tested positive March 17 and died April 13 at Oregon Health & Science University Hospital. She had no underlying health conditions.

“Our thoughts and prayers are with the family,” Colson said. “This shows us that the risk posed by the virus is real.”

Colson said there were 19 new COVID-19 cases over the last seven days, with 17 positive and two presumptive. There are 35 individuals being monitored and one person is hospitalized outside of the area.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said there are 195 COVID-19 hospitalizations across Oregon. In Region 1 – which includes Tillamook, Clatsop, Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah and Washington counties – there are 61 adult ICU beds available. Hospitalizations were down five on Friday, April 16, from the previous day, Thursday, April 15.

“733 primary first doses and 917 booster doses have been done this week,” Colson said. “As of April 15, 9,893 people have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.”

At this time, 37 percent of Tillamook County residents have received at least one dose of the vaccine and 22 percent are considered fully vaccinated.

The Johnson & Johnson vaccine is on pause, while six cases are being reviewed of a rare and severe blood clot in individuals who received the vaccine. The vaccine will not be offered at vaccine clinics and the Moderna vaccine will be used in its place.

On Monday, April 19, all those 16 and older will be eligible for a vaccine. The health department and vaccine partners are working to make the Pfizer vaccine available in the county, as it is the only vaccine authorized for those under 18.

Tillamook County’s ‘Warning Week’ data from Oregon Health

Authority (OHA) indicates the county had 67 cases from March 28 to April 10 and a test positivity rate of 7.8 percent.

“There are new disease metrics,” Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administrator Marlene Putman announced during a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, April 14. “Normally, that would put us in ‘Extreme Risk’, with the new disease metrics we are in ‘High Risk’.”

The county is projected to remain in ‘High Risk’, effective Friday, April 23,

through Thursday, May 6. The statewide metrics counties must meet to move to ‘Extreme Risk’ include COVID-19 patients occupying at least 300 hospital beds statewide and a 15 percent increase in the seven-day average over the past week. These metrics were not met. Final data and risk level changes will be made Tuesday, April 20.

“As of April 13, 9,530 people have received at least one dose of COVID-19

Why are you running for Port of Tillamook Commissioner, position 4?

Occupation: I have been the Information Technology Manager at Tillamook People’s Utility District since 2003. I currently have responsibility for all information technology, facilities, warehouse operations, hazardous waste, and capital construction projects. In addition, I am currently the business manager and budget officer for Tillamook Lightwave, which provides fiber optic internet access to businesses within Tillamook County.

Education: Originally from Astoria, Oregon, after graduation from Astoria High School I joined the U.S. Army and served for 4 years as a Patriot Missile System Mechanic. After my honorable discharge, I earned a degree in Electronics Engineering whereas I then pursued a career in the high-tech field, which eventually led me to my current employment at Tillamook People’s Utility District.

Family: I have been married for over 20 years to my wife Heidi, and we have two children that attend school in the Neahkahnie School District.

Why are you running for Port of Garibaldi Commissioner, position 2?

I am running for reelection because I continue to believe a strong Port and the infrastructure it supports is a driver of our local economy. Key to this is support of the fisheries and seafood industry and recreational fishing activities by maintaining the jetties, harbor, and Port owned properties. Serving in the community and being a part of the positive work happening within the Port District is important to me. I am proud of the work that has been accomplished during the past decade. Some of this work includes new restaurants, repairs to Commercial Avenue and the RV park, the addition of an event tent that supports community events like the Night Market, Crave the Coast, and live events. What experience/skills do you have that makes you the best candidate?

An example was providing initial technical recommendations into the

What is the port’s biggest challenge and how will you overcome it?

One of the Port’s challenges is how to deal with growth and remain an authentic fishing port at the same time. As businesses seek to expand, and additional activities are held, it is critical that both the Port and City of Garibaldi work together along with state officials to deal with issues such as traffic and parking. Critical Port infrastructure needs to be held as the highest priority. Jetty repair and dredging are needed to keep the Port an active player on the West Coast when it comes to the crabbing and fishing fleet. Without the fleet, Garibaldi would become just another coastal town that people drive through. Tillamook County residents and tourist driving by need to know that some of the freshest local caught seafood can be purchased by just turning onto Port property and stopping at one of the many seafood retailers.

is the eroding South Jetty. And the sediment load within the navigation channels and lack of room to grow. To secure federal funding for the South Jetty we need to be able to show strong commerce. The best way to compete for jetty maintenance dollars is to be able to demonstrate import and export of goods and ser-

vice across the Tillamook Bay Bar. For that we need to have the infrastructure to accommodate marine transportation.

What we need currently are State and Federal representatives who are willing to make funding the repair of the Tillamook Bay North Jetty a priority. Federal funding was secured for jetty maintenance in Oregon recently but it looks like that money will be spent on the Central coast South. Meanwhile our jetty continues to erode and endanger mariners. I will aggressively

pursue getting funding for Tillamook Bay jetty repair.

Tillamook County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) and Manzanita Police executed a search warrant Tuesday, April 13, at a residence in Manzanita. Ared Dakota Reinke, of Manzanita, was arrested and transported to the Tillamook County Jail.

"We received a tip from the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force that the upload and transmission of child pornography was occurring at a Manzanita residence," said TCSO Detective Andy Christopherson.

"Manzanita Police assisted the investigation by performing surveillance and serving the warrant with us and transporting the arrestee to jail," said TCSO Det. Sgt. Michelle Brewer.

According to detectives, additional child pornography has been located and their investigation is ongoing.

Ared Dakota Reinke was booked into Tillamook County Jail on charges of encouraging child sex abuse in the first degree and encouraging child sex abuse in the second degree.

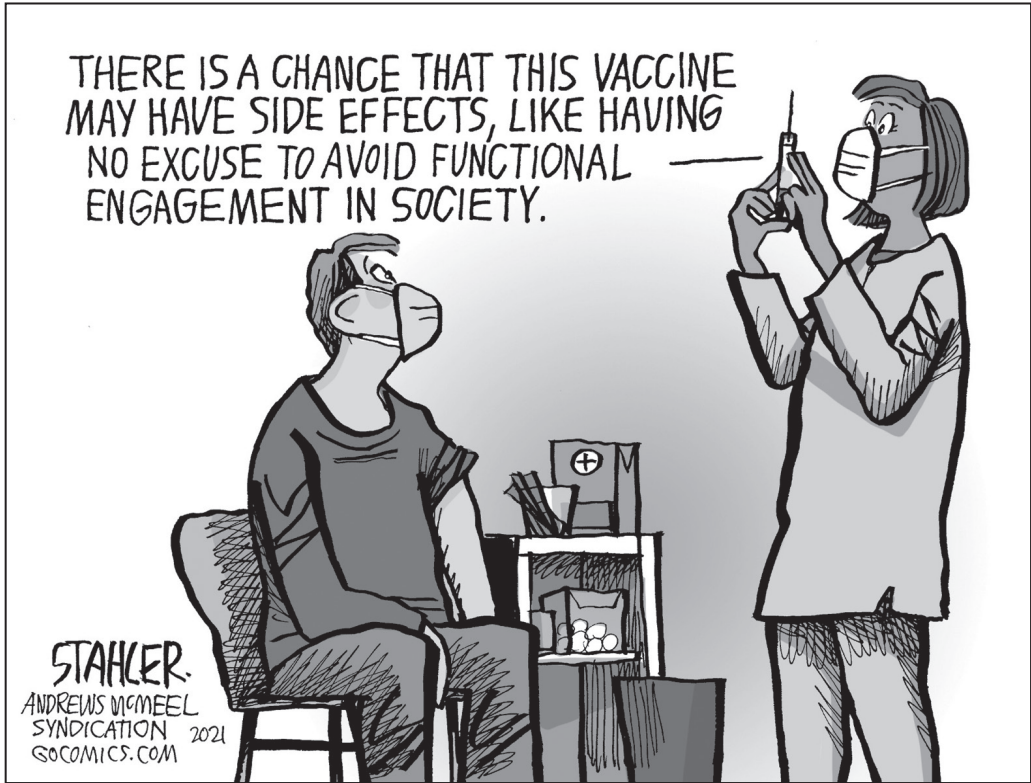

In 2002, the college moved from Bay City to its First Street campus in Tillamook, becoming one of the few community colleges in the nation to be located in a mortuary! 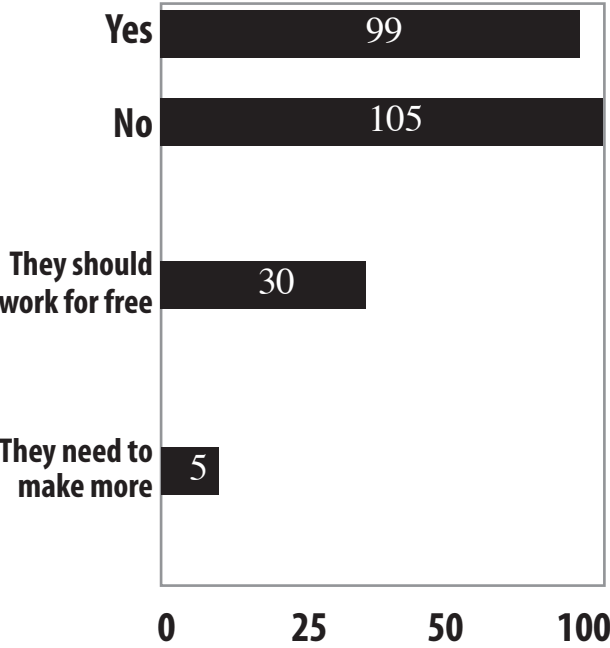

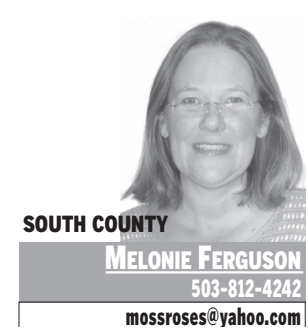

blood clot in individuals after the vaccine. Until updated guidance is received, vaccine partners will use the Moderna vaccine for vaccination events, including a frontline worker vaccine event held Saturday, April 17, which was previously planned to use the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. The health department urges everyone to keep their appointments when possible.

Planning for vaccinating 16 and 17 years olds is underway with the anticipation of those under 16 as well, as everyone 16 and older be-

come eligible for the vaccine Monday, April 19. The Pfizer vaccine, not currently available in Tillamook County, is the vaccine authorized for those under 18 years of age.

“The planning is being done in collaboration with our vaccine partners, the school districts, Oregon Health Authority and Adventist Health Tillamook, who has a super cold storage unit,” Colson said. “With that, we’re working on having Pfizer to become available.”

The health department is working on having the Pfizer

vaccine, which is used for those under 18, available in the county. As of now, those 16 and 17 years old can call 211 to find a vaccine site that offers the Pfizer vaccine.

put in about 3,000 volunteer hours total.”

Wright was also instrumental in overall improvements to the entire police department. When Wright started his career in Tillamook he says, there were nine officers including the chief, a secre-

tary and a parking enforcement officer. The department was located in part of the basement, working in horrible conditions. The radio equipment was very poor, the equipment in the vehicles was the same and their were other employee issues. There were no programs in the schools and no other special functions other then patrol.

Through various grants, overtime Wright was able to replace the old outdated

equipment. He successfully moved the Police Department into an above ground modern building that is functional for most of the police department staff. He revised the downtown parking plan. “The plan allows for changes, either by street, block or one side of the block, depending on dynamics and needs of the businesses involved,” Wright said. “I’ve totally revised the traffic ordinance to include most traffic, parking and street use

issues in Tillamook.”

Chief Wright will undoubtedly be missed, he plans to move to Prineville Oregon and stay involved in running security every year in Pebble Beach for the ATT Pebble Beach Pro Am.

“I will miss this community and the people I’ve worked with over the years,” Wright said. “This is a great community with great people who really care about the positive progress of Tillamook.”

Mooks baseball gets slow start to season in Banks

It seems hard to believe, but it has been nearly two years since the Tillamook High Cheesemakers baseball team has played a game. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 season was canceled and the Cheesemakers last played in May of 2019.

The long wait to return to the ballpark is over for the Cheesemakers, who played their 2021 season opener April 13 against the defending Cowapa League and (2019) OSAA Class 4A state champion Banks Braves. It marked Tillamook's first contest of the short 13-game spring season, which concludes May 15.

The highly regarded Braves appeared to be playing as well as they did two years ago too as they led from start-to-finish in a 19-5 victory over the Mooks last Tuesday at Banks High School.

Tillamook played the Astoria Fishermen Saturday, which was followed by its opening home game Monday versus the Seaside Seagulls (results unavailable because of Headlight Herald press deadline). The Cheesemak-

ers play the Valley Catholic Valiants in their next contest today (Wednesday, April 21) at 5 p.m. at Valley Catholic High School in Beaverton, followed by a 5 p.m. home game Friday versus Banks and an April 27 5 p.m. home matchup again versus Banks.

A very young Mooks squad, guided by first-year coach Matt Strang, has seven sophomores on the 13-player roster and they were simply no match for a more experienced Braves team (four seniors, four juniors) that displayed an explosive offense.

"It's our first league game in two years, so it's nice to be out here playing baseball and we have beautiful weather, but we have a really young team," said Strang. "We'll get better every day and that's our goal. They were excited to be out here playing, they're all happy and they have smiling faces because they're ready to get better tomorrow."

The sophomores include Garrison Gunder, Bryce Hamerl, Trask Petersen, Parker Mckibbin, Tyler Mocrief, Cade Ross and Trevor Leonnig. Since the seven sophomores didn't play during their freshman season a year ago, last Tuesday's contest marked

their first ever Tillamook High School baseball game.

Banks scored 19 runs in the first three innings to build an insurmountable lead over Tillamook. After a scoreless fourth inning, Tillamook came back and avoided a shutout by scoring five runs in the fifth.

"They (Banks) are always near the top of our league, so we knew that we kind of had to face a tough opponent, but I didn't know that they were as good as they are," said Strang. "We made a little rally at the end of the game, so I'm proud of the guys for knocking some runs in. The guys who drove in our runs were sophomores and they're kind of the core group of our team. This was their first game that they've played since they were in eighth grade. Basically, we jumped into the game against a tough Banks team with a bunch of guys who had never played high school baseball."

The Mooks loaded the bases when Leonnig and Mckibbin drew back-to-back walks and Mocrief was hit by a pitch.

Junior pitcher Junior Gonzales (RBI), the Mooks starting pitcher, then drew a



bases loaded walk as Leonnig scored to erase the goose egg on the scoreboard, making it 19-1. Petersen then hit a two RBI double on a fly to center-field, making it 19-3.

"I was expecting us to be a little more competitive, but I just didn't realize how good

of a hitting team that they (Banks) were," said Strang, a 2014 Tillamook High graduate. "We have a lot of work to do, but I'm excited about the season."

Catcher Colton Harmon followed when he smacked a line drive to right field for

a two RBI double, making it 19-5. Harmon is one of four Tillamook seniors along with Damian Lopes, Isaac Hornbeak and Dylan Bergin. The lopsided contest concluded after five innings via the 10-run Mercy Rule.

Mook softball gets going for the season against the Braves

In their first game in nearly two years, the Tillamook High Lady Cheesemakers softball team opened their 2021 Cowapa

League season April 13 on the road against the defending league (2019) champion Banks Braves. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 season was canceled and the last Mooks softball game was in May

of 2019.

Tillamook, guided by second-year coach Joy Richardson, faced a Banks squad that appears to be right where they left off two years ago. The more experienced Braves (five seniors) showed that they're undoubtedly the cream of the crop in the Cowapa League as they cruised to a 17-2 victory over a young, inexperienced Mooks squad (five freshmen, two sophomores) last Tuesday at Banks High School.

"We've played against Banks before, but it's been obviously two years since we last played them," said Richardson. "We knew coming into the game that they would be a tough opponent and it turned out to

be a rough game for us in our season opener. I had higher hopes for us, but they (Banks) a good team with some fantastic hitters too and they put on a show."

Tillamook played Saturday at home versus the Astoria Fishermen and the Mooks were on the road Monday at Seaside (results unavailable because of Headlight Herald press deadline). Tillamook plays its next contest today (Wednesday, April 21) at home at 5 p.m. against the Valley Catholic Valiants, followed by a home game Friday versus Banks and an April 27 road game again versus Banks. The short 13-game spring season concludes May 15.

"Losing some up-

per classmen hurt our team a little, but we have two seniors and we have a really strong group of young players too," said Richardson. "I was happy with the fact we were able to make contact with the ball. Any reps are good reps. I'm proud of my pitcher (Torrin Richardson) because she located all of her pitches in the strike zone and she was throwing with good velocity of 55 miles per hour and she's been working pretty hard."

Banks jumped out to an early 6-0 first inning lead before Tillamook responded with a two-run second to trim the margin. Tillamook junior Emma Lommen's RBI single and Nessa Hurliman's two RBI double, narrowed

the margin to 7-2 after two innings.

"Obviously, you want to come out with a win, but ultimately it's just a heart-breaker with the new Mercy Rule of 15 runs after three innings and we were hoping to play seven innings," said Richardson.

Torrin Richardson had a single and she had one strikeout in the pitching circle. Lommen, Hurliman and Richardson had the only hits for the Mooks, who had a total of just three hits. Hurliman and Daisy Valencia are the only seniors on the 13-player Tillamook roster.

Banks utilized an explosive offensive attack (14 total hits) and scored 10 runs in the third for a 17-2 lead.

Whether that means utilizing more sustainable practices when digging clams in Netarts Bay, picking up trash along the beaches while visiting, or spending time in the woods learning how the various ecosystems work together, Explore Nature Series events all share this common theme of showcasing the Tillamook Coast in a way that encourages people to enjoy it respectfully.

When the pandemic hit in 2020, the Explore Nature

Series partners had to pivot and start offering more virtual opportunities as a way to keep participants and the community safe. However, being outside is a large part of the Explore Nature Series, and this year you can find many virtual, educational events being offered with an outdoor element that can be done on your own time.

In April, Explore Nature Series partners Friends of Cape Falcon Marine Reserve hosted virtual Snowy Plover Patrol Training with Portland Audubon. The goal of these trainings is to give people the tools and information necessary to go out and monitor for Snowy Plovers on local beaches. Interested volunteers can sign up to monitor for Snowy Plovers twice a month, for 2-4 hours a time, from April through the end of the summer. Depending on the beach, this can require a good amount of walking to where birds might be nesting, and spending time outdoors watching - and waiting. These are activities that can be done on your own time, and lend themselves well to social distancing. Monitoring volunteers have been vital in keeping tabs on how well this endangered shore bird is thriving and surviving.

If you are interested in bird monitoring, the Friends of Cape Falcon Marine Reserve are hosting several more virtual trainings this

spring and summer to coach volunteers to survey for additional coastal birds on their own time, including Brown Pelicans on April 29th, and Black Oystercatchers on May 5th and 8th. The goal of these surveys is to help define the distribution and abundance of Brown Pelicans and Black Oystercatchers and track shifts in population structure.

Then, on June 5th is another Explore Nature Series Event: Seabird Monitor Colony Training.

Portland Audubon and partners are monitoring seabird nesting colonies adjacent to the Cape Falcon Marine Reserve in order to better understand how seabirds may respond to the new protections. Monitoring is done weekly starting in June through August, and a typical monitoring session is about

two hours in the morning.

Another Explore Nature Series partner, The Friends of Netarts Bay WEBS, is hosting Beach Cleanup Bingo during the months of April and May. The goal is to encourage individuals and people living in the same household to go outside and help clean up the beaches around Netarts - and win prizes! You can download a bingo card at netartsbay-webs.org. Each square represents something you might find on the beach. If you get five in a row - that’s a bingo! Every bingo is eligible to win a prize, and winners will be announced at the end of each month. Beach Cleanup Bingo is a great way to get people outside safely, and help take care of the beaches.

You can also join WEBS on May 6 for a virtual presentation: ‘Sharks of the Oregon

Coast.’ Shift your perspective from fear to inspiration as you get to know and understand these creatures better.




