## COVID-19 update: cases, county risk level, vaccines

County expected to remain in the Low Risk category

As of Thursday, Feb. 4, Tillamook County has a total of 346 confirmed positive COVID-19 cases, according to Oregon Health Authority. The Tillamook County Health Department is monitoring 12 individuals currently, the health department reported during a community update Friday, Feb. 5.

Administrator Marlene Putman said Oregon Health Authority's Warning Week data indicates Tillamook County will remain in the Low Risk category for an additional two weeks.

"If cases arise above 30 over the next two weeks, we would be at risk of moving to a higher risk category, which would be effective on Feb. 12, but we're keeping the numbers down," Putman said.

Final risk status and data will be announced Tuesday, Feb. 9.

"Our first dose distribution for vaccines for Group 1A – that includes a defined list of Groups 1-4 – total first doses for that group are 1,744 doses," Putman said.

This includes first responders, long-term and group living facilities, daytime/outpatient care, all other health care providers and public health settings, and more. Some who had been hesitant in

these groups before have now decided to get the vaccine.

The health department hopes to complete doses for public and private schools by the end of the week of Feb. 1. They will work on child care providers and early learning afterwards. The county receives doses in separate allocations for the first and second doses.

Putman said vaccine partners will start with Phase 1B, Group 2, the week of Feb. 8. Eligibility for those 80 years old and older begins Feb. 8. The first vaccine event will take place during the week for those in this group.

The health center has launched an online eligibility form for the

COVID-19 vaccine for those 65 and older to gather information of those interested in being vaccinated. You can fill out the form or, if you cannot access the form, call 503-842-3914. The form is available at <https://bit.ly/3tspnxo>

Putman said the county will keep getting vaccinations but it will be in small amounts. By filling out the form, the health department will call you when a vaccination site is available. If you have questions, call the health center's vaccine information line at 503-842-3914.

The health department is still waiting for more information from the state about vaccinations for the

general population.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said 261 people are currently hospitalized in Oregon with COVID-19 and 764 ventilators are available. Adventist Health Tillamook Hospital has given a total of 989 vaccines, to date. Over 75 percent of the hospital's medical staff have been vaccinated.

"Eighty percent have actually received their second shot," Swanson said. "We're continuing to get people vaccinated."

### Indoor visits take place at long-term facilities

Tillamook County, being in the Low Risk category as of Jan. 29, is now able to offer indoor visitation for long-term care facilities. The county had previously been in Extreme Risk, which allowed only outdoor visitation.

Tillamook County had been in Extreme Risk since Dec. 18.

Kilchis House will be receiving their second dose of the COVID-19 vaccine Feb. 12 and Feb. 15. Residents and staff will be split in half in case of side effects, said Tracy DeLano, regional program director of CARE, Inc.

DeLano said they had purchased a table to enforce physical distancing. There is no sharing of food of any kind. Visitors can bring a beverage for themselves.

"Visitations by Zoom or outdoor visits are still offered," DeLano said.

DeLano said they were surprised to not see a high number of people wanting indoor visitations at this time. Many people are still being very cautious.

DeLano said Compassionate Care came out during Extreme Risk when facilities could not allow indoor visitations. Compassionate Care visited with those residents who were highly affected by the no indoor visitations rule, such as those on hospice care with a short time left.

A table is outside for outdoor visits with signage of physical distancing. Outdoor

visitations remain active. The facility is also screening visitors as they walk in. Visitors get their temperatures taken and are asked a series of questions.

"We're so proud of our team and staff," DeLano said.

DeLano said there have been no positive COVID-19 cases in their building. Staff has been cautious when outside of work to keep the residents safe.

Prestige Senior Living Five Rivers has implemented a visitor policy, which included all visitations scheduled in advance. Scheduled appointments will be limited to one hour. One scheduled visit per resident per week is allowed, to allow all residents to have time for a visitor.

All visitors are screened before their appointment and are required to wear face masks and maintain six feet of distance.

"Inside visitations are subject to change as we continue to monitor the situation and prepare to protect the health and well-



being of our residents and staff, which remains our top priority," Prestige Care stated in their policy. "If any staff members test positive as part of our routine weekly testing, or if a resident has pending test results or tests positive, visitation restrictions will be put back in place until all staff and residents test negative for two consecutive weeks."

## State to speed up vaccination timeline

Oregon seniors may receive doses of the COVID-19 vaccine faster than previously expected.

Thanks to additional planned doses of the vaccine to come from the federal government, Oregon has plans to speed up its statewide vaccination timeline, state health officials announced during a conference Feb 5.

The state's now projecting three quarters of health care workers educational staff and seniors to become eligible within the next four weeks will have received a first dose of the vaccine by early April, about a month ahead of the state's previous projection.

"This is really good news. However, we still have a long way to go," said Oregon Governor Kate Brown.

A quicker timeline for vaccinating seniors means the state will be able to reach other groups sooner too, according to Oregon Health Authority Director Patrick Allen.

"That's good news for seniors. It's also good news for frontline workers, people with underlying health conditions, and others who are next in line," Allen said.

The new projection comes after federal health officials promised the state an increase in vaccine doses in the coming weeks, Allen said. He laid out the three factors which impact how quickly the state can distribute vaccine: The number of available doses, the size of the eligible population and the rate at which vaccination sites across the state could be distributing vaccine.

That third factor isn't an issue, as Allen said the state could be vaccinating twice as many people as it currently is.

"That leaves supply and demand as the limiting factors," Allen said.

According to Allen, new dose allocations announced by the federal government mean the state will see more than 75,000 doses of the vaccine a week. The increase includes 11,600 more doses a week in the state's standard allocation, and 12,000 new doses a week through a federal pharmacy partnership program.

Starting the week of Feb. 8, Allen said the state will begin using 5,000 doses a week to vaccinate adults in custody in state prisons and county jails, as well as eligible youth in custody of the Oregon Youth Authority, in line with a federal court order issued Feb. 3 mandating the state vaccinate prisoners.

There could be more improvements on the horizon, too, as Allen said the state's timeline doesn't take into account the possibility of a third vaccine, produced by Johnson & Johnson, which could enter the supply chain by early March pending federal approvals.

Still, despite the accelerated distribution projection, Friday's press conference wasn't all good news. The announcement came the same day the state announced its 2,000th virus-related death.

"Each life lost to this horrible virus is one too many. I know each number here is someone's mother or father, child, best friend or colleague," Brown said. "It's difficult, and it's heartbreaking, and my thoughts are with each of these families."

What's more, the health officials are preparing for difficulties over the next several weeks, when hundreds of thousands more Oregonians are in

## Health department provides COVID-19 vaccine update

As of Wednesday, Feb. 3, Tillamook County is at 381 positive COVID-19 cases, Tillamook County Community Health Centers reported during a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting. The health center is currently monitoring 18 people.

Emergency Coordinator Ed Colson said Oregon Health Authority's (OHA) "Warning Week" data indicates Tillamook County will remain in Low Risk for an additional two weeks beginning Friday, Feb. 12. Final numbers for the two-week period will be available Tues-

day, Feb. 9.

The current vaccine total for Tillamook County is 1,179, as of Jan. 28. Vaccine partners expect to vaccinate 390 more people in Phase 1A this week, Colson said. Groups 1 and 2 are complete. This includes first responders, hospitals, long-term and group living facilities and foster care, among others.

Colson said OHA plans to notify the health department of vaccine allocations for a three-week period. They were previously notified four days before vaccines were delivered. This will help them plan to vaccinate more members of the public.

Vice-Chair David Yamamoto said he

sees some angst in the community about side effects of the second vaccine dose. Colson said with some side effects from the booster shot may come up, such as elevated temperature or fever. The health department will have more information on side effects as people receive their booster shots and are working on their messaging.

## Pandemic: Tillamook, Columbia, Clatsop, to share \$250,000 in relief

## Fatal crash on Hwy 6

Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to a two-vehicle collision at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 3, on Hwy 6 near milepost 37.

Preliminary investigation revealed a Ford F150, operated by Jerry Jefferies of Tillamook, was west-bound when it lost control on icy roads, crossed into the eastbound lane, and collided with a Peterbuilt log truck operated by Jacob Douglas, of Tillamook.

Jefferies sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased.

Douglas was not injured. OSP was assisted by the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Banks Fire Department, TVF&R, and ODOT

## FENCEPOSTS

We had a couple of storms last month that did minor property damage. Fortunately, Ciel Downing has repaired the section of fence in her front yard that was knocked down. Dave and Ruth Freitas are in the process of rebuilding their eight-by-twelve-foot greenhouse. That greenhouse took a hit from big winds that tore loose its anchor bolts and landed the structure in the blueberry bushes! Good job, neighbors, for keeping up with weather-related repairs.

I have heard from a couple of locals whose relatives have had the COVID-19 vaccine. Louise

Bogard’s sister-in-law had the Moderna vaccine and reported no reaction after the first shot, with some short-term side effects after the second shot (chills, fever of 100, feeling lousy). She took a painkiller at that point and felt normal in about three hours. The Pelsons’ daughter, Shelby Hunt, had two shots of the Pfizer vaccine. Her only symptoms were soreness at the injection site after the first shot and mild chills, headache and nausea after the second. She took a pain reliever after the second shot, slept and woke up fine the next day. Shelby is the Director of Emergency Services



at Northern Nevada Medical Center in Sparks, Nevada. She reports that only 1.2% of the employees receiving the vaccine there had symptoms, and most were mild (headache, body ache and/or mild fever). She points out that the body is going to respond

to the vaccine proteins so it can start building immunity, hence you may not feel good for a short time. Regardless of the side effects, medical professionals are recommending the vaccine. One caveat is not to take painkillers before the shots but rather after, if at all (check with your doctor for specific recommendations), thus enabling your body to mount the most effective antibody response. Well, now all we need in Tillamook is more vaccine doses!

Have you signed up for an account on the social media site Nextdoor? That’s where Cape Meares property

owners are sharing their thoughts about possible parking issues in our community. There is a robust exchange of ideas going on right now. The president of the Cape Meares Community Association, Deborah Neal, is working hard to determine if there is a problem and what may be the options for resolving that situation. She needs your help! Enterprises (CARE) any Monday morning. Assistance, dependent on recent donations, is provided on a first come, first served basis starting at 9 a.m. A line often forms much earlier. Help will cover 75% of the “must pay” amount. If that line shows \$200, for example, CARE will cover \$150.

If you have funds to spare for a good cause, include a donation on the “Customer Help Donation” line when you pay your P.U.D. bill. Tillamook P.U.D. matches

our donations- so, if you donate \$200, the assistance program will net \$400. It’s a great way to help our Tillamook County neighbors stay warm this winter.

line for a relatively short supply of vaccines.

“Next week, when seniors begin to become eligible, we will see some degree of chaos,” Allen said Friday. “Next week, many older adults will inevitably voice frustration. Next week, you will not have to look hard to see people experiencing confusion. We will fall short.”

The smooth rollout of vaccines to Oregon’s elderly will require patience and un-

derstanding, he emphasized. He noted that not everyone who becomes eligible will get a vaccine right away, but may have to wait several weeks to move to the front of the line.

“As we’ve said all along, our limitation isn’t capacity,” Allen said. “It’s supply.”

Some pharmacies across the state will soon have doses of the vaccine to administer to eligible individuals, Allen said. That’ll be one option for seniors to get vaccinated, alongside vaccine clinics, local public health authorities and long-term care facilities.

According to the state’s vaccination timeline, individuals 80 and older will be eligible for vaccines Feb. 8. Those 75 and older will be eligible on Feb. 15, and

those 70 and up will be eligible on Feb. 22. On March 1, anyone 65 or older will be eligible for a vaccine.

Health officials have developed several methods for getting information about getting a vaccine. The state’s [covidvaccine.oregon.gov](http://covidvaccine.oregon.gov) website contains general information about the vaccine and vaccination eligibility.

Starting Feb. 8, that website will be home to a “Get Vaccinated Oregon” tool developed to help individuals determine their eligibility for a vaccine, find vaccination events across the state and register for alerts about their eligibility.

The tool won’t guarantee a place in line, as vaccination appointments are made by vaccine providers.

People call also text

“ORCOVID” to 898211 to get text updates about nearby clinics in English and Spanish, or email [ORCOVID@211info.org](mailto:ORCOVID@211info.org) with questions.

As a last resort, statewide vaccine eligibility information is available by calling 211 or 866-698-6155, though officials caution that wait times may be very long given the high call volume, and Allen suggested seniors should wait until their age group is eligible before reaching out for more information.

“I’m asking older Oregonians for patience, in exchange for this promise: While it will take time, every senior who wants to get vaccinated will get a vaccine in the coming weeks,” Allen said.

lost about 25 percent of our membership,” Sisco shared. “But we came out of it OK due to the generosity of this community.” Sisco had to do the annual fund-raising gala virtual this past fall, but said they did well despite it not being a plated dinner event like the community is used to.

According to Sisco, the YMCA can currently operate at 50 percent of capacity, which is not a huge issue for them because the facility is quite large.

“We had 800 visits since last Friday,” he said. “This time last year we had just over 2,600 visits so we’re operating at about a third of last year since we reopened.”

During the shutdown, Sisco and his staff helped the local Food Bank and volunteered delivering meals or food to people who were shut in and could not leave their homes.

Sisco says his team is also glad to be back with people

showing up for classes, to exercise or swim, but he’s continuing their virtual classes for those who are home-bound like they did prior to the shut down.

“Our number one priority is safety for our members and staff,” Sisco said. “People have been great through this entire process, they follow the rules and are glad to be back in the gym and out of the rain.”

The YMCA is open from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday and closed on Sunday. The pool hours are Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and closed on Saturday and Sunday.

Joel Baker, owner of Kitty’s Food and Spirits is also happy to be open and back serving food, drinks and playing music every Tuesday and Saturday.

“We used the time off to spruce up the place,” he said. “We have new floors and redid the walls and lighting fixtures along with a deep cleaning - we fixed up the place.”

Baker hosts live music on Tuesday and Saturday nights and he plans on continuing

that now that he’s back open. Joel who plays drums for the Joel Baker Band, with Carl Wilson on guitar and Scott Neuman on keyboard and vocals, usually draws quite a crowd on Saturday nights. Baker suggests reservations every Saturday especially now that they have to operate at 50 percent capacity.

“Business has been good since we were able to reopen,” Baker said. “In a few weeks we are bringing in a traditional country music band, so that will be a treat for the community.”

Robert Henry Band out of Portland will be at Kitty’s on Saturday Feb. 20. “He’s big on the Fair Circuit,” Baker said. “They are big, they will be coming back from Nashville to get ready for their fair performances, so they will be ready to jam, it should be a very fun evening.”

Baker employs eight people and after the break, they are happy to be back at work.

“I have such a great crew of caring people,” Baker said. “We’re happy to be able to be back open doing with we do, I’m very grateful.”

## Happenings at Hanger B

Hello, my name is Carolyn Decker, I am one of six Board Members for Friends of Tillamook Air Museum. Our purpose is to raise money to make repairs and replacements to the Hangar. We will do that through donations, grants, fund-raising and etc.

It is really important that you know about this majestic, historic building. Watch for my articles. I will tell you about the building, the reason it was built, how it was built and it’s purpose. The story will come in bits and pieces. Today I will tell you about the physical part of this open span, all wood piece of art.

Work started in November 1942. The first thing that happened was, the land had a forest growing on it. My father was one of the timber men that cleared the land. This Hangar was built by the Navy. The Navy hired the workforce locally and also from as far as the Mid-West. The weather was horrible. Tillamook experienced 18 1/2 inches of rain in Novem-



ber, December brought 19 inches and January 1943 16 inches. It took 3 million board feet of lumber to build this giant. That is enough lumber to build 279 family size homes.

So, here are the numbers that tells you how BIG this giant is. Hangar ‘B’ is 1072 feet long (Note, (Noah’s ark was 440’ X 72’ X 43’). A City Block is 100’ lot. This building is over 10 blocks long. The width is 296 feet and 192 feet up to the top (crown). The floor’s footprint is 7 acres (enough to play 6 football games simultane-

ously. If the roof was flat, it would be 12 acres. At one time, a small plane flew through the Hangar. There is a picture of it. I’m told that the letters on the roof are 100’ long. I can only imagine how much it is going to cost to replace the roof or just repairing all the leaks could be huge.

Two major repairs necessary are the roof and the front doors do not open properly. I’ll tell you about that later.

To be honest with you, our job is overwhelming. We need your help! To get the big grants we need 13 board members and we need community help and donations. This building and its purpose is part of World War 11’s history. I will tell you about the job they did to save lives.

# Building a healthy relationship with food

What does pleasant hunger feel like to you? This can be a hard question to answer! Pleasure and hunger don’t always seem to belong in the same sentence. Unpleasant hunger makes more sense. “Hanger” and the negative emotions associated with a feeling of “starvation” come to mind right away. Luckily, hunger can be pleasant if it is realized early on and leads to intentional planning of when and what you eat.

Pleasant hunger is thinking to yourself “I think I’m ready for a meal/snack” and allowing yourself to consider what’s available, sounds satisfying and meets your health goals. You sit down to eat and find yourself savoring your food. This is a pleasurable feeling! On the other hand, let’s say you ignored that initial hunger cue. Time passes, you start to feel impatient and anxious, maybe you have a headache or feel shaky. You’ve reached a point where you don’t care what you eat, you just need to eat! You scarf down whatever is within reach, not paying attention to how it tastes, how much you eat or if it’s truly satisfying. While you might feel relieved afterwards, wouldn’t you rather have enjoyed the complete eating experience?

Enjoying your eating experience is a concept of intuitive eating, or mindful eating. It encourages listening to your body’s cues about hunger and food. It’s also sometimes called the “anti-diet approach” because it takes the rigidity out of eating we see with dieting. Mindful eating frees you from the “dos and don’ts” of eating that a culture of fad diets attempts to instill in us. Mindful eaters have more body appreciation, they enjoy eating, and they experience fewer disordered eating behaviors like intentionally skipping meals, yo-yo dieting, and feelings of guilt and shame



around food. Mindful eaters also tend to be more food budget conscious- something we can all appreciate!

Below are the 10 principles of intuitive eating, developed by Evelyn Tribole and Elyse Resch. (<https://www.intuitiveeating.org/>) Remember, these principles are guidelines, not rules. Food and rules are like oil and water; they just don’t blend.

1. Reject the Diet Mentality - Has living in a culture that promotes fad diets distorted your thoughts about yourself? Has it impacted your social life, opinions about food, or your personal relationships? Try redirecting your time and energy into something meaningful that brings you joy.
2. Honor Your Hunger - How do you handle your other bodily cues, like a full bladder? When you feel the need, you use the restroom without following “rules” or questioning if you “deserve” it. Try approaching hunger in the same, ordinary manner. Eat when you really are hungry or find an alternative activity (read, dance, listen to music, etc.) if you’re actually bored, emotional or looking for a distraction. Consistent and accurate honoring of hunger cues heals and rebuilds connection with your body.
3. Make Peace with Food - While traditional food fights

(the kind that involve messes) are fun, the battle between food “rules” and your needs or wants is anything but fun. Try taking a bite and then ask yourself: how does this food taste?

4. Challenge the Food Police - The food police enforce those unreasonable rules that diet culture has created. Remember, food and rules don’t belong together. Work with a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist who can help you find healthy eating style that works for you.

5. Discover the Satisfaction Factor Explore your food, especially taste, texture and aroma. Does it bring back any memories? How does it make you feel? Satisfaction in eating comes from within.

6. Feel Your Fullness We’ve explored pleasant hunger; how would you imagine or describe how pleasant fullness feels?

7. Cope with Your Emotions with Kindness While food is comforting, it can’t solve our problems. Consider writing down how you’re feeling, making a pros-and-cons list, or calling a friend. Explore actions that might offer you some clarity.

8. Respect Your Body How awesome is it that you have your very own, one-of-a-kind genetic blueprint? Nobody is like you! So, is it fair to

compare your body to another body, or judge your food preferences or cravings against those of others?

9. Movement- Feel the Difference Can you reflect on a time, perhaps as a child, when you looked forward to physical activity? What has changed, and how can you rebuild that positive relationship?

10. Honor Your Health- Gentle Nutrition Healthy eating looks different for everyone- there is not a perfect formula. Try making food choices that honor your health and preferences while also making you feel good.

After practicing intuitive eating ideas for a while, you might find yourself going for a walk because you want to, not because you “have to.” Maybe you’ll try your hand at art, pick up a fun book, or try a new yoga class. Practicing intuitive eating can help you honor your needs -social, emotional, cultural, physical, etc.- and find pleasure in truly nourishing yourself. Hopefully these ideas bring peace to your meals and snacks!

*Number of servings: 2 cups*

- 2 cups grated cauliflower (about half a medium head)
- 1 egg
- 3 Tablespoons flour
- 1/4 cup cheddar cheese, grated
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spray a baking sheet or line with parchment paper or foil.
2. Grate cauliflower on large holes of a grater.
3. In a medium bowl, combine cauliflower, egg, flour, cheese, and salt; mix well.
4. Press mixture together to make about 15 small balls or logs; Place on the baking sheet with space between each ball or log.
5. Bake for 20 minutes or until cooked through.
