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Tllamook County now open under Phase II

The Illiamook Commission-The Tillamook County ers approved at their board meeting on Wednesday, June 3, the COVID-19 reopening framework Phase II applica-

tion to send to the governor's

office. The documentation, submitted to the governor's office on June 3, demonstrates the county's readiness to move into Phase II, effective Monday, June 8.

Gov. Kate Brown announced Thursday, June 4, approval of Tillamook County to move into Phase 2 reopening on Monday, June 8.

"I can't believe how few requirements there are for us to apply for Phase 2 opening," Commission Chair David Yamamoto said.

Yamamoto said the effective date of June 8, rather than June 5, gives the county better opportunity to get everything in order.

Tillamook County was ap-

proved to move into Phase I on May 15 and has continued to work with community partners to expand testing efforts and to promote physical distancing and hygiene. As of June 3, the county has no active cases of COVID-19 and no hospitalizations related to the virus. The county continues to work with local first responders and attest

that they have a 30-day supply of personal protective equipment (PPE) on hand.

"Clatsop County to our north is in much worse shape," Yamamoto said. "We're still at six cases; Lincoln County I believe is at 11 or 12 cases. Clatsop County is well over 20

Tillamook County continues

to train contact tracers, with 28 individuals available if needed, and more individuals having expressed interest in the training process. The county continues to maintain contracts with area lodging and health agencies for isolation or quarantine in order to meet a 20 percent increase in suspected or confirmed cases.

ILLAMOOK COUNTY RALLY SHOWS SUPPORT FOR BLACK LIVES MATTER

"Racism isn't an option." "Black Lives Matter." "Silence is compliance." "I can't breathe."

These were just some of the many signs that more than 200 people displayed in support of the Black Lives Matter movement in Tillamook on June 6.

Attendees gathered at Sue H. Elmore Park in Tillamook and then dispersed to each side of Highway 101 for the hourlong rally deemed a gathering for "justice and equality in tribute to George Floyd."

South County residents Fred Bassett and Sonya Kazen helped organized the

"It's not a problem that is just in big cities," Bassett said. "The racism and

bigotry in this country has gone on for too long. It's simply an attitude that simply has not been dealt with. And it won't be dealt with until we really look in ourselves and examine that.

Bassett is a co-founder of Progressive Action Tillamook that aims to create a safe community for all people to thrive.

"The reason we we're doing this is because we haven't [fully changed attitudes]," Bassett said.

"Education is a great tool, but we also have to educate ourselves and look deep in our own souls. Us in rural Tillamook County...we're not exposed to a lot of diversity, but it is there and it is there in our world and we need to look at it and start questioning it. Maybe now we can finally start treating the symptoms and not just putting a band-aid on it.'

Kazen estimated that over half of those in attendance were young families.

"I was so impressed...with how many people with young kids were there... which was very encouraging to me," Kazen said. "People want to see a change."

To ensure safety of attendees, Tillamook Police Chief Terry Wright and an additional Tillamook Police officer were

Salutatorian Olivia Leslie thanked the teachers at Nestucca High School for preparing the class for what's to come. She said the class missed having those last few months in class with students and teachers and that the class is composed of some of the best individuals she could have grown

Then your average person thinks of the word "surfman" they picture a guy hitting the beach with a board.

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But for Boatswain Mate 1st Class Jimmy Thrall, he plows through the surf behind the wheel of a boat to save people or vessels in distress. Specifically, a 47-foot boat owned by the U.S. Coast

Guard. His title: 'Surfboat Driver' or 'Surfman.'

Thrall, a resident of Bay City, began his career with the Coast Guard in 2005 and has been at Station Til-

lamook Bay for the past five years. "I entered boot camp at Cape May, New Jersey in February of 2005," Thrall said. "That was for eight weeks, which was followed by cutter duty. "I was on the buoy tender cutter 'Anthony

Petit' from 2005 through 2006 and then on the cutter 'Active' from 2006 through 2008."

Thrall sailed on the 'Active' from Port Angeles, Washington down the Pacific Coast all the way to the waters off Colombia and Ecuador on a drug interdiction mission. "We

Lewis Rice attorneys win victory for five Oregon landowners

Attorneys from Lewis Rice's Federal Takings & Rails to Trails Practice won a significant victory on May 8 for five Oregon landowners who brought takings claims against the federal government. The claim resulted from the conversion of the abandoned Port of Tillamook Bay Railroad into the Salmonberry Trail, a public recreation hiking and biking trail, which crossed the landowners' property. The landowners sued the

federal government when it authorized the conversion of the Port of Tillamook Bay Railroad into the Salmonberry Trail in 2016. They alleged the land underlying the railroad easement belonged to them, and the conversion of the railroad into a public

recreational trail was not authorized under Oregon law.

Meghan Largent, attorney from Lewis Rice's Federal Takings & Rails to Trails Practice, said she reached out to the landowners affected and represented several of them in the lawsuit. The case was filed in 2016.

In May 2020, Judge Nancy B. Firestone of the United States Court of Federal Claims ruled in the landowners' favor, holding that the easements over their property that were originally granted to the Pacific Navigation & Railway Company were limited to railroad purposes only and could not be used for public recreation. Largent pointed out the

case was not against the trail. Many of the landowners in the case are excited about the

In Firestone's opinion, it states "the cases involve a

nearly 80-mile railroad right of way established in 1907 by the railroad and later obtained by Port of Tillamook Bay (POTB). On July 26, 2016, the Surface Transportation Board (STB), an agency of the United States, authorized railbanking and allowing a trail operator, the Salmonberry Trail Intergovernmental Agency, to establish the Salmonberry Trail along the railway. A railbanking and trail use agreement between POTB and the Salmonberry Trail Intergovernmental Agency regarding the railway corridor was entered Oct. 27, 2017."

As a result of Firestone's decision, the federal government is liable for taking the Oregon landowners' property for public use. The landowners will now proceed before Firestone to determine the amount of compensation they are owed for the taking of their land. Largent said she is

glad that they are at a point where the landowners can be compensated.



An evaluation of the land will also take place in the next month or so, Largent said. The court's order said Firestone would reach out by the end of the month about the landowners coming before her about the compensation but in light of the pandemic, Largent has not received a message about this yet. When a date is made, they will put in the schedule time to allow appraisers to evaluate the land.

Largent said sometimes these cases end up as a trial. The trial would take place at the federal courthouse in Portland.

Largent said no matter the outcome, nothing would affect the trail itself.

'The Salmonberry Trail will go forward," Largent

crossed the equator on that trip", he said. "I think El Salvador was the sketchiest place I saw.'

His cutter service completed, Thrall then aimed his sights at surfman certification. He attended

Basic Coxswain School for two weeks, followed by Heavy Weather Coxswain School for three weeks, and Surfman School for four weeks, all in Ilwaco, Washington. During this time he was assigned to Station Quillayute River in La Push where he remained until

In May of 2015 he was assigned to Station Tillamook

Of the 40 Coast Guard personnel currently at the station,

only five are surfmen. Thrall said the Tillamook Bar is unquestionably the most dangerous bar on

the Oregon coast. "It is so shallow spots that are caused by the jetties. Conditions can change in a matter of minutes.

When asked if saving lives has been his biggest challenge as a surfman, he candidly said "I really don't think of saving lives as a challenge. It's just my job."

But he recalled one time when things were "a bit dicey" in October of 2015.

"There was a commercial fishing boat called the 'Willapa' that had become disabled about two miles or so out at sea off Manzanita. We were towing her back toward Tillamook Bay. It was close to midnight. We knew the bar was going to be picking up and we wanted to hurry and get them in. The bar was going to be deteriorating quickly. When we started getting close to the bar, the other lifeboat came out to see what would be the best area to come in. We decided the north side of the bar was the best because the south side had already started to break.

When we started coming in operation." came through and picked up the boat, causing it to surf up the towline. There was only one guy on the boat."

Thrall instinctively applied more power to keep the towline taught.

"We got her in just seconds before the north side started to break," he said. "Had it started to break before we got there, we would have been forced to wait out there until the tide changed, or all night.'

While he said three boats have capsized on the bar during his five years at the station, there has only been one casualty: a man who died from a heart attack. "But I know there have been many deaths on the bar before I came here.'

But the biggest emotional challenge for the surfman occurred on July 7, 2010.

We had a Coast Guard helicopter crash in La Push," he said. "They had hit a power pole and sheared off the tail rotor. I was called up as part of the search and recovery team and later as part of the salvage

co-pilot, Thrall said. "Two of the crew members were killed but we couldn't locate the pilot. We had to assume at that point that he might have still

been alive. Debris from the wreckage was everywhere. They finally found the pilot's body in the front part of the fuselage underwater. He was still strapped

in his seat." Station Tillamook Bay confirmed that "As one of the Senior Duty Officers at the

station, he (Thrall) has coordinated or responded to 105 search and rescue missions, preserved 6.9 million dollars of property and

has saved 11 people. In addition to his job as a surfman for the Coast Guard, Thrall has also been a volunteer firefighter for the Bay City Fire Department for the past two-and-a-half years, as have

five other members of Station Tillamook Bay. Thrall lives with his wife, Rachele, three sons, and one daughter in Bay City.

Nehalem Bay Fire and Rescue respond to van fire at Shell

Nehalem Bay Fire and Rescue (NBFR) responded to a van on fire around 11:35 a.m. Wednesday, June 3, at the Shell Station in Nehalem.

Fire Chief Chris Beswick said a van was in the process of having an onboard propane tank filled when a fire erupted in the interior of the van. One occupant was able to exit the van without injury.

NBFR's command unit arrived on scene and emptied a fire extinguisher on the vehicle. One engine arrived on scene and finished suppressing the fire in the vehicle.

A protection line was deployed for the propane delivery system.

Beswick confirmed there was extensive damage to the interior of the van, minimal to no damage to the station's propane system and no reported injuries.

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
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County leadership talks Phase 2 guidance allowed to reopen in Phase

The Tillamook County Leadership Teleconference discussed at their meeting Friday, June 5, entering Phase 2 of reopening on Monday, June 8, and county updates related to the reopen-The Tillamook County

Board of Commissioners passed on Wednesday, June 3, permission to go into Phase 2. Gov. Kate Brown announced Thursday, June 4, that the county will be able to reopen for Phase 2 on June 8. Adventist Health Tilla-

mook President Eric Swanson said the hospital had six elective surgeries on June 5. They still have capacity for patients who need to get screenings done.

"I want to thank the board of commissioners for entrusting us once again with ambulance services," Swanson said. "You approved on Wednesday an extension of our agreement to provide ambulance services for another five years."

Rinehart Clinic is continuing to ramp up seeing

being conducted.

Gordon McCraw, incident command, said there is now guidance for indoor and outdoor venues, zoos, museums and more.

'We'll be reviewing all the guidelines and hopefully have answers to questions, McCraw said. "We look forward to slowly, but surely, to get back to whatever that new normal is." Jennifer Purcell, North

Coast region coordinator for the governor's office, said there is now information for indoor and outdoor entertainment facilities. There is strong disinfection and cleaning requirements. Purcell said museums in Tillamook County are approved as part of the baseline guidance and can open immediately in Phase 2. There is also guidance for bowling alleys and arcades, the scenic railroad, kayak tours, swimming pools and sports courts.

'Swimming pools are

2 with very specific guidelines," Purcell said. "We also have guidance for venues and events facilities to reopen, and this would include things like the fairgrounds, fraternal organizations, faith-based organizations, and meeting facilities."

There is also limited return to work guidance. There is also guidance for loosening of restrictions for restaurants

"Most of the guidance encourages parties of no more than 10 and no intermingling between those cohorts or congregate groups, encouraging to wear face coverings. and good hygiene," Purcell

As we live in Phase 2, the governor's office will be watching whether or not there can be relaxation or need for reinstating of restric-

Purcell said one of the top priorities is to get students back to school in the fall.

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

Next topic: WHEN WILL THE LIBRARY REOPEN TO THE PUBLIC? Oh boy, we sure wish we knew. But rest assured, we are working hard and making plans so it can happen as soon as possible. This week, a study was released by the American Library Association that revealed only 1% of 3,850 libraries that responded are fully open to the public. There are 11% of the libraries that are offering a limited inside-the-library experience like we are planning for our next phase. Curbside service (like we are now offering) is now taking place at 26% of

libraries across the country. But the sobering statistic is 62% of libraries are not offering any service right now and are totally closed. We can only hope these statistics improve soon.

At least we have a robust Curbside Pickup Service going at all six of our Tillamook County Libraries. If you have not tried it yet, you should check us out. How does it work? You can place holds and requests on our website (www.tillabook.org) or by calling the library for help. When your books are available for pickup, call the library to schedule a pickup time. You must provide your library card number and name. Currently, pickup and return of books is available from 2:00 - 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday, at all our library locations.

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

n Wednesday, June 3, Weyerhaeuser groundsprayed pesticides on about 100 acres of their clearcut land within 1/4 mile of residential areas of Nehalem. Several weeks ago, Weyerhaeuser had agreed to give some residents of Nehalem 24 hours notice before doing the spraying, but then they reneged on this agreement, giving Nehalem residents no time to protect their health and property. Now, we just learned that Weyerhaeuser intends to spray pesticides on another section of their land that is also very near Nehalem. Unfortunately, we do not know, even generally, when that will take place. There are good reasons to be concerned about the health effects of these applications of pesticides.

Yesterday I talked with a professor who has advanced degrees in biology and environmental toxicology regarding the recent pesticide

spraying of land that borders Nehalem. He and I both did literature searches on the two chemicals that we understand were sprayed: Sulfometuron methyl and Clopyralid. He suggested everyone reading this also research those two chemicals so that they can see for themselves the potential side effects of their usage.

I asked the professor whether Nehalem residents had valid reasons to be concerned about these pesticides, even though they were not applied via aerial spraying, but, rather, through backpack, ground spraying. He said that, although aerial spraying would have been worse than ground spraying, there are definite reasons for the community to be concerned. Here are some of his comments: 1.This spray operation was very close to homes and gardens.....only about 1/4 mile away.....and it was on a ridge above the town. Spray droplets are volatile and can drift down from the clearcut, close to people, and into water sources. Also, pesticide spray can drift

site when it is breezy. (At noon in Nehalem on the day of the spraying (June 3), the recorded wind speed was 14.293 MPH). 2.The chemicals in these pesticides tend to be very persistent in the soil. Since this clearcut already has very little vegetation (and after the spraying, it will have less), the chemicals adhering to the soil can then wash downhill into streams and, eventually, into the Nehalem River. 3. These chemicals can remain volatile for as long as a year, and then revolatilize into the air in temperatures above 84 degrees. Also, on windy days this contaminated soil can blow around and end up in water sources and

plant reproduction, especially peas, potatoes, and tomatoes. Drift from roadside and noxious weed applications of Oust have resulted in widespread crop damage totaling millions of dollars. It can cause severe eye irritation and may cause some skin sensitization.

Those of us with North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection were also concerned about the fourteen workers who did the spraying. Did they have adequate eye, skin, and respiratory protection? Given that the area sprayed was quite breezy that day, this seems particularly important. Workers doing these types of contract jobs are often without health insurance. They could also have been at a high risk of contracting Covid-19 at the worksite, as well as if they were transported as a group in vans.

Most important, it is absolutely necessary for communities to have, at a minimum, a 24-hour notice before spraying begins in order that people may safeguard their

families, friends, gardens, and pets. Also, to do accurate testing of water for the presence of these pesticides or to do a long-term health survey of people who live nearby, it is essential to know in advance the spraying schedules. The more we learn about how these chemicals persist in the environment, destroy entire ecosystems, and risk both public health and the health of the environment, it becomes clear that their use needs to stop now. People are becoming more and more aware that forests play a critical role in our health and the health of the planet. Current forestry practices are risking our future and the future of Earth.

recently spoke with Jim Rice, stranding coordinator for Oregon State University, about the dead whale on Bayocean Spit to see what more we could find out. Jim was very helpful and provided the following information.

This particular whale, which stranded here May 15, is a juvenile gray whale about 32 feet in length. We don't know the cause of death, as the whale had significantly decomposed and Jim did not have the resources to take organs from the whale back to the lab for a full necropsy. However, it likely died of malnutrition.



Gray whales migrate down to Baja for the winter and return north, most headed to the Arctic, in the spring. They do not eat during their migration; this means that these gray whales have been fasting

since last summer. It is not unusual to see a few whales die during migration as their fat reserves are depleted. In fact, we generally get three dead whales along the Oregon coastline each year, most often in the spring. This spring, we've already

had three dead gray whales. Since April, one washed ashore between Heceta Head and the Sea Lion Caves; one came ashore at Sand Lake; and ours, of course, arrived on Bayocean Spit. Jim says this is a little, although not dramatically, higher frequency than usual. He adds, however, that we are in the

midst of an "unusual mortality event," initially declared last year, for gray whales. Google this term on the NOAA website if you are interested in more information about these unusual mortality events. Thanks, Jim, for helping educate us about "Odie," our odiferous dead whale. Looks as if he'll be with us for a while.

A couple of columns ago, I wrote about a dead gray whale that came ashore on Bayocean Spit in 1991. Dave Dittmer reminded me that there was another dead gray whale a few years after that. The second whale was

closer to Cape Meares; you could smell the decomposing body from our village, so the authorities dragged it up the beach and buried it. We'll have to see what effect the northerly summer winds have on the current fella...

In further critter news, the Walzes recently saw a family of weasels in their yard. There was a mother and three babies; the mother was carrying one of the babies in her mouth. Karen says this is just like the National Parks on quarantine: More animals are out and exploring! But the Walzes didn't want this bunch of critters to get too

far in their adventures; Steve quickly closed the garage

And, in closing, a piscine report: Captain Pete brought home our first salmon of 2020. He caught a nice hen springer on the tide turn at Memaloose in Tillamook Bay. Spring Chinook have been few and far between this season, with only a couple caught most days. They are good eating; Pete calls them "butter with fins." Hope springs eternal; I'm still waiting for a fish to bite my hook!

Talking for an errand through Cloverdale last week, I noticed a new tiny house-shaped structure erected near the groom shop. On closer inspection, it turned out to be Cloverdale's own mini-library! It was well stocked with nice looking books in a range on genres, included a quadrant containing children's books. We each are invited to take a book, to leave book, or both. I was happy to recognize several titles from the late Illene Mazura, who called Cloverdale home from 2008 until her death in 2018. She would be pleased.

What drives health?

We have seen many news media reports in recent months referencing the topics of underlying health conditions and health disparities. Factors underlying these issues are varied, complex and heavily intertwined. Tillamook County Wellness uses data and best practices to influence those factors in ways that lead to improved health for all people, especially those with a higher risk of developing chronic health conditions, such as type 2 diabetes. As a program of Tillamook County Public Health, our partners work to improve health drivers at every level so that people can live happier, healthier lives. This involves strategies from multiple approaches and an understanding of what drives health at individual, population and public levels.

Population Health vs.
Individual health – They
are tied together. Individual choices, attitudes, and
behaviors impact both our
personal health and the health

of our community. Individual behaviors contribute to cultural norms and these can be "contagious." The more we see people doing something, the more likely we are to do the same thing.

Population Health vs.
Public Health - Both work
to improve the health of the
public itself and fall under the
umbrella of the field of health
systems work.

Population health is a broad focus on understanding the conditions and factors that influence the health of populations over lifetimes. Population health also measures patterns and implements policies for the overall health and wellbeing of society. Healthcare professionals work to improve the health of populations by preventing disease, promoting healthy lifestyles, and addressing health inequities. Some outcomes that population health responds to are improving the health of the people with limited resources, implementing cost-effective strategies to address health disparities, and developing practice guidelines for practitioners. Providers use population health solutions to identify risk factors and coordinate specific care needs for patients.

Public health - According to the American Public Health Association (APHA), Public Health promotes and protects the health of people and the communities where they live, learn, work and play. Public Health works on a more personal level than population health. It promotes wellness to the public by encouraging patients to live healthier lives. Public Health workers also educate people to help prevent unhealthy habits, like smoking and substance use, from getting out of control. For example, social workers, nurses and caseworkers work with the healthcare industry in providing government assistance and counseling to the public under the public health umbrella.

Our community Wellness work combines facets of population and public health when addressing the health of our community. We follow the CDC's research-based guidelines based on numerous factors that drive health.

Health Is More Than Health Care

Health is more than what happens at the doctor's office. A wide range of factors influence how long and how well we live from education and income, to what we eat and how we move, to the quality of our housing and

the safety of our neighborhoods. For some people, the essential elements for a healthy life are readily available; for others, the opportunities for healthy choices are significantly limited.

According to the CDC, health care provided in a clinic setting accounts for less than 20 percent of our health. Our community and environment and social determinants of health, like housing, access to healthy food, income, educational attainment, and social supports among other things, can account for more than 50% of our health outcomes. Even outpacing genetic predispositions.

Across the country there are significant differences in health outcomes, from one county to the next, from one state to the next, and among racial/ethnic groups. For example, Blacks, Native Americans and Hispanics have consistently faced barriers to opportunity and good health. Increasing opportunities for everyone can reduce gaps in health. For example, providing better access to high-quality education and enrichment opportunities boosts skills that are key to landing a good job and for upward economic mobility. Additionally, early childhood care and education, good nutrition, physical activity and socialemotional learning contribute to significantly better health later in life.



Health equity means that everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be as healthy as possible. This requires removing obstacles to health such as poverty and discrimination, and their consequences, including powerlessness and lack of access to good jobs with fair pay, quality education and housing, safe environments, and health care.

We are fortunate there are many dedicated.
