Courthouse closed due to unknown odor

The Tillamook County Courthouse at 201 Laurel Ave. in Tillamook is closed due to an unknown odor, according to a press release from Tillamook County Sheriff's Office. Courthouse operations are set up temporarily in the Officers Mess Hall at the Port of Tillamook Bay.

The Sheriff's Office said out of an abundance of caution for the health and welfare of the employees and visitors, the courthouse is closed until the odor can be identified and deemed safe.

All departments outside the courthouse are unaffected and will operate as normal.

The press release said county officials understand and apologizes for the significant inconvenience. And investigation is ongoing and details are limited at this time.

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Veterans honored in ceremony

Among the veterans who were recognized during the celebration at the Tillamook Air Museum were four particularly noteworthy patriots.

Ruby June Smith appeared full of vigor as she flexed her arm in the iconic "we can do it" pose of WWII's women workers. When Smith was 19, she moved Portland from Minnesota. She wanted to pitch-in for the war effort, so she applied to work in at a shipyard where they were assembling the tail ends of flying boats.

Of the four women hired that day, two quit under the pressure. Being the stronger of the two remaining, Smith was assigned to the rivet gun. Her partner Frieda was the rivet bucker. The two worked together and remained friends for a lifetime. Smith spent nearly three years as a "Rosie Riveter," and met her husband of more than 50 years while working at the shipyard. Jerry Tichenor was honored with a Quilt of Valor. The Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 with the dream of a woman whose son was serving in Iraq. She pictured a man alone in emotional despair who was healed after being wrapped in a quilt. More than 230,000 quilts have been given to veterans since the foundation began.

Tichenor comes from Van Nuys, California, and enlisted in the Navy in San Diego the day he turned 18. After training he was stationed in Hawaii. As a boatswain's mate third class, Tichenor drove landing crafts full of American troops at the Battle of Saipan and at other islands in the Pacific campaign.

The crowd gave a thunderous round of applause for Jesse Embum, who worked at the cantina inside the air hangar while it was active during WWII. There was also tremendous applause for Pat Patterson, a WWII Coast Guard veteran.

Manzanita city hall bond fails

Manzanita voters appear to have shot down a tax increase to fund a new city hall project. The vote was 31.5-percent in favor, with 131 'yes' to 284 'no' and nearly 78-percent turnout, according to updated unofficial election results.

The \$6.5 million bond measure was approved by the Manzanita City Council for the November ballot with support from all five members and the mayor. It was the talk of the town, sparking an opinionated back-and-forth over cost-cutting options and a series of public hearings.

"We believe this is a feasible number, but it could be less if needed," City Manager Cynthia Alamillo said during an August council meeting.

The proposed bond's funding mechanism was a 50-cent tax increase per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The project includes construction of a city emergency hub, police office, administrative and workspaces, multi-purpose room and a kitchenette with storage spaces. The funds were expected to pay for demolition and construction.

Alamillo said the tax would be for a term of up to 31 years for the citizens of Manzanita. Outside grants to lessen the burden on taxpayers were discussed, but nothing has been secured at this time. There was public speculation regarding unseen additional project costs, with some citizens saying the potential added expenses would be significant.

The new facility was expected to be built at 11,776 square feet and designed to meet long-term needs for multiple purposes. The site selected for the project was the Underhill property, featuring a former school building that sits out of the tsunami inundation zone, unlike the current city hall. Much of the public debate centered around remodeling or tearing down the buildings at the site. This past August, Manzanita Mayor Mike Scott penned an opinion column in which he said estimates put the construction cost for a new facility at \$500 per square foot. He said additional funds would be required for asbestos abatement, demolition of the existing structure

Suspect arrested in multiple storage unit burglaries

Engloyees at the Port Storage in Tillamook noticed a suspicious person on their property and called the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office at around 10:56 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 6. The person had left the area prior to the deputies' arrival.

Deputies circulated the area and located the occupied vehicle at the Safeway in Tillamook and contacted the occupant, Joshua McMinn, 38, from Portland. Through the course of the contact, deputies were able to allegedly connect McMinn to multiple storage unit burglaries in Tillamook County and several other areas.

McMinn was arrested on mul-

tiple counts of burglary, possession of burglary tools, theft, and possession of methamphetamine. He was lodged at the Tillamook County Jail.

Sheriff Jim Horton said that it was through the alert storage unit employees and the thorough investigation by the patrol deputies that they were able to take McMinn into custody and prevent him from committing additional crimes.

The incident remains under further investigation and associated areas have been contacted. Tillamook County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Tillamook Police Department.

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
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The Schooner, Upstairs Bar & Grill host 10th annual Thanksgiving Benefit Dinner

Warming center needs your help

Bitterly cold and dangerous outdoor weather conditions are a fact of wintertime in Oregon. When temperatures are expected to drop below 32 degrees Fahrenheit overnight, when warnings of winter storms, high winds or flooding are issued, the local warming center springs into action.

Tillamook CARE (Community Action Resource Enterprises) has maintained warming centers during cold weather events for some

years now. This past year, the warming canter was open 15 nights. In the past eight years, the number of open nights has ranged from 9 to 34 every winter, serving from 5 to 15 people each open night.

The warming center opens from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Everyone is welcome to stay. There are warm beverages and snacks as well as a warm place to sleep with bedding provided.

A pool of volunteers manages the warming center, and more are always welcome – particularly during extended cold snaps when a larger pool helps volunteers to rotate shifts. The only pay for this work is the gratitude of the warming center visitors

who need shelter from the cold.

Opening the warming center requires a staff of six volunteers. To be prepared at all times, the warming center needs around 40-50 volunteers at the ready who have completed background screening.

and furnishing the new facility.

"These are estimates; when we issue the bonds next year rates may differ and the total dollar amount could be less," Scott wrote. "But right now interest rates are at historic lows. With luck, rates will stay low and the economy will cool off by next summer, allowing us to build at a lower cost."

Scott also noted that Manzanita currently enjoys one of the lowest property tax rates in Oregon – 42 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. A house assessed at \$400,000 would have paid around \$200 more a year under the failed bond.

Randy Kugler, a former Manzanita city manager, called publicly for scrutiny of the approach to the bond measure and the city hall project. Kugler served on an advisory committee that explored and recommended options for the project. He supported more consideration for a remodel option at the Underhill property.

After the unofficial vote results were announced, Kugler said he believes the citizens of Manzanita came to the conclusion that city officials failed to present a viable financing strategy and that other building options were dismissed without allowing for public review and comment.

"I repeatedly said during my time as a member of the Public Facilities Advisory Committee that the project had both practical and political problems that the council needed to address before they unveiled it to the public," Kugler said. "I simply took that message directly to the community once it became apparent that issued a statement following the defeat of the bond measure. The mayor thanked everyone who voted but said a lack of funding would stop the project from proceeding.

"As the City continues to address the needs for new

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
Chan's talk is titled "Science in a Changing Ocean:

CoastWatch will be hosting their King Tide Kick-Off at 5-8 p.m. Friday, Nov. 15, at the North County Recreation District (NCRD) headquarters.

The first round of "king tides", the highest tides of the year, is coming up, beginning on Monday, Nov. 25, kicking off the start up for the 2019-2020 season of the King Tide Project. Volunteer photographers are invited to assist in the Oregon King Tides Photo Project, a citizen science activity, by taking photos that document the highest reach of the year's highest tides.

With CoastWatch's partners in the project, the Coastal Management Program of Oregon's Depart-

epicenter of the global challenges of ocean acidification and oxygen declines.

Chan is an associate professor senior researcher in the department of integrative biology at Oregon State University. He received his PhD in ecology from Cornell University. Chan's research is focused on understanding the causes and consequences of low-oxygen zones along the U.S. West Coast. CoastWatch Volunteer

Coordinator Jesse Jones will talk about the King Tides Photo Project at this event. Margaret Minnick, the Friends of Cape Falcon Marine Reserve coordinator, will talk about marine reserves.

This is the tenth year that Oregon has participated in this international citizen science effort. The project is sponsored by the CoastWatch

Program of the Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition and the Oregon Coastal Management Program of the Department of Land Conservation and Development, along with local partners.

The international project began in Australia, where the highest tides of the year are known as "king tides." These tides arrive when the sun, moon, and earth are in alignment, causing a stronger than usual gravitational pull.

Anyone with a camera can participate. At high tide on any of the three project days (the timing of which varies, depending on location), find a safe spot to observe the tide in relation to the land, snap photos, and post them online. More information on the project, a link to tide tables, and instructions for posting photos, can be found



King tide photos can be taken anywhere affected by tides, whether on the outer shoreline, in estuaries, or along lower river floodplains. Photos showing high water in relation to infrastructure (roads, bridges, seawalls, and the like) can be particularly striking, and reveal where flooding problems threaten. But shots of marshes or other habitats being inundated, or coastal shorelines subject to flooding and erosion, are also useful. The goal of this long-term citizen science project is to document the highest reach of the tides on an ongoing basis, for comparative study over a period of many years. (Photographers who participated in past years are urged to return to the locations

> from which they took earlier King Tide photos so as to track the tides in that location over time. Photographers are also urged to return to the same locations to take comparison shots at ordinary high tide.)

> While the King Tides Photo Project can help to identify areas that are currently threatened by flooding, the more important purpose is to gain a preview of sea level rise. The king tides, while extreme today, will become the "new normal" as sea level continues to rise, and storm surges increase, due to global warming. Gaining a glimpse of tidal inundation likely to become common decades into the future will benefit planners, resource agencies, conservationists, and coastal citizens in preparing for these changes.



Facebook Faceoff

For those of you following the saga of Tierra Del Mar v. Facebook, you know that this endeavor has been a long process and is probably far from over. At the September Planning Commission Meeting we heard from the people representing Facebook that the Industrial HDD Submarine Fiber Optic Cable drilling and installation would be a good thing for the community and residents of Tierra Del Mar. We were told that the process

of the drilling and installation would be less bothersome than a house being constructed, that afterward the lot would be restored to original if not better condition, that the noise would be nominal and that, when finished there would only be a few trucks a few times a year to come for maintenance. Facebook would be the sole owner and user of the cable and that somehow this translates into a benefit for the health, safety, and welfare for Tierra Del Mar as a public utility facility.

We, the residents of Tierra Del Mar beg to differ. Au contraire.

First and foremost, Facebook is not a public utility in any sense of the word. They are a private industry and this cable is being done to further

Veterans stories a crucial part of nation's history

I love to study our nation's history through the lens of our military veterans.

Who could fail to be inspired by the brash courage of the United States Marines during the Battle of Belleau Wood in World War I? Or by the words of Marine Captain Lloyd W. Williams, who, after being repeatedly urged to turn back by retreating French forces, famously said, "Retreat? Hell, we just got here."

Legend has it that it was at this battle that Marines earned the German nickname "Teufelshunde": "Devil Dogs."

What about the story of Pfc. Dirk J. Vlug, serving in the Philippines during World War II, who refused to back down despite being outnumbered 5-to-1. No, it wasn't one against five enemy soldiers. It was one soldier against five, heavily armed Japanese tanks.

Reacting on instinct, Pfc. Vlug grabbed a bazooka and six rounds of ammunition, and managed to destroy all five tanks singlehandedly.

I still get goosebumps when I read the words of Lt. Gen. Lewis "Chesty" Puller, the most decorated Marine in American history, when he and his men were surrounded by enemy forces at the Battle of Chosin Reservoir: "They're on our left, they're on our right, they're in front of us, they're behind us...we got them right where we want them. They can't get away this time."

Or the story of Master Sgt. Roy Benavidez, who jumped from a helicopter armed only with a knife, determined to help a Special Forces patrol

trapped in North Vietnam. Over the course of a six-hour ordeal, Benavidez was wounded by bullets, bayonets and shrapnel a total of 37 times.

When he was awarded the Medal of Honor, President Reagan said that if his story were a movie script, audiences wouldn't believe it. His heroic actions saved the lives of eight men.

In Iraq, Sgt. Leigh Ann Hester became the first woman awarded the Silver Star since World War II. A retail store manager from Kentucky, Hester led the counter-assault against 50 insurgents who attacked her convoy, braving heavy mortar and machine gun fire to engage the enemy on foot.

These stories of courage, selflessness and sacrifice are so much more than just stories to tell on Veterans Day. They are a crucial part of our nation's history, and the foundation upon which its legacy has been built.

Countless millions of American lives — with more to come — have been lived in the freedoms secured by the blood and service of our veterans.

Despite this rich history of military service that continues to this day, our country has not drafted a single soldier in over 45 years.

Since the draft ended in 1973, no person has been compelled to serve their country. And yet, each year, an estimated 180,000 young Americans voluntarily enlist in the United States Armed Forces.

One of the many things that makes this country so great is that its people have the will to serve. They have the will to lay down their own freedoms, and even their own lives, to defend those of others. Our veterans didn't have to be told to serve or to sacrifice. It was already there, in our DNA.

This is why I believe it is so important to honor, remember and celebrate our veterans, not just on Veterans Day, but every day. And it's not only because they have earned it though they have.

But it's also because in honoring and remembering our veterans, we reveal the values that matter to us as a nation: Courage. Sacrifice. Selflessness. Dedication. The willingness to give up one's own life so that others might live and be free, which we call "heroism."

We reveal ourselves and our values in what we remember, and in what we give our time to. This Veterans Day, I encourage you to spend your time in a meaningful way.

Say, "Thank you," to a veteran, yes, but also take some time to hear their story. I guarantee you: It's a story you won't hear anywhere else.

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


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

their own corporate interests and profit. There is no direct benefit to the residents of TDM or for the residents of Tillamook County. There is no example of Similar Use. At the first meeting I attended in February at the Kiwanda Center the gentleman from SubCom who had just finished the Hermosa Beach project in California, admitted that they had never done a cable landing in a residential neighborhood and that they had never used noise barriers before. What does that tell us? I think if they need noise

barriers they're too close to neighboring homes or buildings.

SubCom has never done a project like the one they are proposing for Facebook on Lot 3200. As Mr. Affolter said in his letter, "RR-2 is a misnomer with respect to the density of the development within that community," meaning Tierra Del Mar. When you look at the pictures online and on YouTube that show these types of projects the equipment is always depicted in wide open spaces with no development on either side. After you figure in the dimensions of the equipment involved it adds up to 4500 square feet. That's just for the equip-

ment without any trucks

or space to maneuver fork lifts. It means that Lot 3200 is too small and given that with all of the equipment on site, at best . at BEST, there will be 25' of clearance from neighboring homes.

Now, as it turns out, there are cables that come ashore on residentially zoned property in Coos County. One of the FB representatives calls the Coos County project "the Poster Child" for submarine fiber optic cables on residential property. For once, I agree with them. The Coos County projects are on adjacent 5 acre parcels owned by Google, AT&T, and an outfit called Level 3 Communications LLC. You read that right - 5 ACRE PARCELS. All the lots down in Coos are

zoned RR5 - 5 acres. So the closest private residence is at least .25 miles away. A little more than the 25 feet from the houses in Tierra Del Mar. If you do a Google Map search of the Coos Co. areas, you see that the property is mostly forested and not many houses nearby.

Quite the difference from the planned TDM project on 2/3 of an acre and houses all around. So, yes to the Poster Child concept. If submarine cables are to make landfall on residential property (and I am still against it) then a 5 acre property should be the minimum size!

The real issue here, in addition to what I have mentioned above is that permitting the application and use for an industrial cable

landing sets a precedent in zoning manipulation that will change our beautiful coast forever. If Facebook can construct a cable landing in a residential neighborhood zoned RR2 (and none of the lots in TDM come close to 2 acres) they can construct one on any other residentially zoned lot that is less than 2 acres. It would make sense that they do it on another vacant homesite two doors to the south of Lot 3200. It's close and it would be convenient if not for Facebook then for any other cable company who want to hook up to the Microsoft Landing site up the hill on Sandlake Road.

Oregon is well known for welcoming and wanting submarine cables for a variety of economic reasons.

But there should not be a cart blanche invitation to open our shores to locations that adversely affect ocean communities. The locations should be as regulated as the rest of the cable industry. So this is not just a case of "not in our back

yard" - it should be a case of not in anyone's back yard. That is certainly the case in

Coos County, where the "Poster Child" submarine cable made landfall. If there are no restrictions on type of lot or size of lot, it will literally mean, "There Goes The Neighborhood."

Please join the residents of Tierra Del Mar in opposing the Facebook/Edge Cable LLC permit.



Columbia Pacific CCO works with CODA to open opioid treatment center in Seaside

Columbia Pacific CCO is proud to be working with CODA to open an opioid treatment program (OTP) in Seaside later this year. Portland-based drug treatment provider, CODA, will be able to prescribe and administer medication-assisted treatment for those with opioid use disorders.

The new center, located in South Seaside on Roosevelt Road, will be licensed to dispense any medication needed to treat substance use disorders, including suboxone, buprenorphine, naltrexone and methadone, as appropriate to the patient's needs.

"The goal of an OTP is to be as minimally-invasive as possible," said Alison Noice, executive director of CODA. "Treating patients with addictions has been one of the most interesting, rewarding experience of my career. It's a life-changing event when you see patients become successful through medicationassisted treatment. We are fortunate to be able to develop long-term relationships with our patients in a welcoming, flexible treatment environment that helps them to become successful."

"We have found a location

that is allowing us the ability to design the clinic." Noice continued. "With this location, we are able to intentionally design the layout to create the optimal patient experience. Construction is likely to be done by the end of October and then we go through a series of credentialing and licensing certifications, including Oregon Health Authority, the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Joint Commission, before we can open."

The new clinic will be staffed by a physician or nurse practitioner who can assess each patient and develop a multifaceted plan

of treatment. The center also includes a full counseling team of case managers, individual counselors and group sessions. The clinic will also provide observed collection of samples for toxicology testing.

Initially, patients often visit the clinic daily and may eventually taper to visits once a week or month. The clinic will be open six days a week, typically at 5:30 a.m. to see patients before they need to go to the rest of their day. Most days, the clinic will be closed by noon.

"Treating opioid use disorders with medications allows patients to ease withdrawal symptoms, so we can work on changing behavior." Noice said.

"There's a lot of people spending a lot of time and money to go to Portland for something they should be getting here," said Leslie Ford, behavioral health clinical integration coordinator for Columbia Pacific CCO. "Our region has some of the highest rates of emergency overdoses and deaths in the state. Having a local option for treatment will reduce the cost of treatment -- it only makes sense to treat people closer to home."



Merkley, Wyden announce key USDA investment in electric infrastructure improvement

Oregon's Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden announced Monday, Nov. 4, a nearly \$8.5 million electric infrastructure investment in West Oregon Electric Cooperative, Inc., a Vernonia-based co-op which serves communities throughout Columbia, Yamhill, Tillamook, Washington and Clatsop counties.

Merkley serves as the top Democrat on the Senate Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee, which oversees funding for the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) program that funded Monday's grant.

"As I travel around our state to meet with community leadership and hold annual town halls in each of Oregon's 36 counties, I hear from families and local leaders about important efforts, big and small, to make our communities more energy efficient," Merkley said in a press release. "For Oregon's rural communities, electric co-ops play a critical role in achieving that goal. This USDA investment will help West Oregon Electric Cooperative modernize its energy infrastructure—meaning savings for Oregonians, and reduced energy use for our environment."

"Electric co-ops are a crucial part of our country's urgent need to improve energy efficiency, both to keep utility bills affordable for rural consumers and to lower energy use overall," Wyden said in the release. "This federal investment in West Oregon Electric Cooperative achieves those goals for Oregonians living in our state's northwest corner."

This investment, which is part of a \$1.2 billion USDA Rural Development program, will connect 79 new consumers, fund eight new miles and improve 41 miles of existing line, including four transmission miles.

Columbia Pacific CCO examines overdoses and responses in our community

Kerry Strickland lost her son, Jordan (24), to a drug overdose in 2015. Since then she has been working tirelessly in the community to promote awareness and harm reduction with the charity named after her son, Jordan's Hope. The charity's goal is to connect people to the resources they need. Jordan's Hope distributes clean syringes and naloxone to anyone who thinks they may need it and to date, the organization has prevented 78 overdose (OD) deaths.

Strickland has joined forces with Columbia Pacific CCO on a taskforce to understand more about ODs and improve coordination after an overdose, to ensure those affected get the most appropriate treatment and follow up.

"It's so important that everyone, regardless of their point of view, know what everyone else is doing to reduce ODs," said Strickland. "With our combined knowledge, skills and experience, we can work together to develop solutions that work more effectively."

The taskforce includes representatives from Clatsop, Columbia and Tillamook counties, emergency departments, emergency medical services, peer recovery support, mental health, opioid use disorder treatment, primary care, community organizations, harm reduction and public health. The new taskforce has met several times since March and has gathered in-depth information to analyze and share with the stakeholders and resources in the communities to coordinate this work.

"I lost a family member to the opioid epidemic," said Melissa Brew-

ster, pharmacy director for Columbia Pacific CCO, "so figuring out a solution to overdoses in our community is deeply important to me. We have gathered data on best practices from around the nation to understand what has worked in other areas. We also reviewed data from every OD event in our community (>100) in the last four years and examined follow-up responses by health care providers. We found that many are not receiving optimal follow-up care: not receiving naloxone after overdoses, many were still receiving prescription opioids, and most were not referred to treatment. This concern led us to creating this taskforce."

"We are now breaking up the task force to develop operational teams in each County," Brewster continued. "The goals of the teams are to take the taskforce recommendations (below) and adapt them as needed based on their current needs and workforce and put them into practice."

The Overdose Response Taskforce has made the following recommendations:

•Develop a peer-led OD response team (PORT) in each county to track and follow up on opioid ODs.

•Create a process for 911 dispatchers or emergency response services to notify PORT when naloxone is used in the field.

•Develop overdose protocols for hospital emergency departments that include SBIRT screenings as an evidence-based practice to identify, reduce and prevent problematic use, abuse and dependence on alcohol and illicit drugs, and prescribing naloxone.

•Develop processes to include referrals

The Tillamook Cheesemakers football team is headed to the round of eight in the 4A OSAA football state playoffs after beating number two ranked Manama Vikings last Saturday. This is the deepest the Mooks have gone in a playoff stretch since 1997.

The Cheesemakers will face The Dalles Riverhawks on Saturday at 1 p.m. at Wahtonka Campus filed.

The Riverhawks have had some success playing teams in the Cowapa League this year beating Valley Catholic in league play and again two weeks ago in a play-in game.

Playoff win against Mazama

The Mooks got down early 6-0 in the first quarter of play against the Vikings but settled down defensively after Mazama's opening drive. On the second play from scrimmage the Vikings took a 68 yard run to the house, but failed on the two point conversion and the Cheesemakers were down 6-0.

In the second quarter Tillamook started to get some offense going. With 5:46 left in the half, senior quarterback Chad Werner connected with Kaleb Boomer on 4th down from the 35 yard line and Boomer took it into the end zone. The PAT was good and the Mooks had their first lead 7-6 late in the second half.

On the Vikings next possession, Mazama scored their second and last touchdown of the game. The two point conversion was good and the

Vikings now led 14-7 with very little time left in the half.

Tillamook got the ball back with about a minute on the clock. Werner took the snap under center, threw a short pass to Quintin Metcalfe who then pitched it to Boomer coming around on the hook and Boomer's speed was too much for the Vikings secondary. Boomer scored his second touchdown on the half with 52 seconds left, the kick was blocked and the Mooks were down by one headed into the locker room for halftime 14-13.

In the third quarter of play, Tillamook offense took over and was able keep possession converting on a couple of first downs after receiving the kick. Tillamook ate up six minutes on the opening drive of the third quarter. Quarterback Werner ended the 72 yard six minute drive with a running score taking it weak side, breaking a couple of tackles and a final stiff-arm and into the house. The PAT was blocked again and the Cheesemakers led 19-14.

On Manama's next possession they seemed to be able to move the ball some, taking it deep into Mook territory but Tillamook's defense again stepped up and made a stop. Tillamook took over on down and ran out time in the third quarter.

With one quarter of play left, the Mooks were up 19-14.

The fourth quarter was all defense for the Mooks. Manama could not get any offense going and really did a poor job of managing the clock. The Mook offense went to the run game to eat up precious time.

With 4:22 left in the game, the score still 19-14 in favor of the Cheesemakers, it looked like Tillamook may give up the ball on downs, but Metcalfe hit the hole hard and picked up the necessary yardage on fourth down and two.

Time was running out for the Vikings and with Tillamook offense eating up the clock, Head Coach Kye Johnson went into time management mode.

With 1:49 left in the game, Mazama took their final time out. Tillamook held on their next play but were able to get the clock down to 1:14 left to play.

Johnson took a timeout to talk to his senior quarterback. The Cheesemakers punted away to the Vikings and with 1:04 left to play, their season would be left up to the defense. The Vikings had 85 yards to go with just over a minute on the clock.

Mazama ran a couple of plays and were able to get it over mid-field. Tillamook's defense was willing to give up short yardage, going into the prevent defense. With 20 ticks on the clock and Manama moving the ball up the field, they had a firs down on their 35 yard line when Tillamook intercepted a Viking pass to all but end the game. All the Tillamook offense had to do at this point was go into victory formation.

The upset win puts Tillamook into the round of eight in the State Playoffs.

On the road with wellness

It's been a busy Fall for the Tillamook County Wellness leadership team. Invited to present at three state-wide forums during the first two weeks of October, it's safe to say that Tillamook and its Wellness initiative are "on the map" in Oregon.

On October 4th our team led a panel discussion at the 36th annual Oregon Rural Health Association (ORHA) conference in Bend on the topic, "Building Health from the Ground Up." Team members, Commissioner Bill Baertlein; Marlene Putman, Public Health Administrator and Director of the Tillamook County Community Health Centers; Eric Swanson, President of Adventist Health; Dusti Linnell, OSU Ext; Steven Blakesley, OHSU; and Michelle Jenck, contracted coordinator, shared the history of Tillamook County Wellness with public health, hospital, clinical and community health professionals from across the state. In addition, healthcare payors and policy makers were in attendance.

Key takeaways from the session included the fact that changing community culture around health and well-being starts with the people. The ideas and inspiration for change must be authentic to the local population rather than being imposed from above or outside. Additionally, it was noted that "Change happens at the speed of trust." Without trusting relationships, working collectively doesn't work. The fact that competing healthcare providers are working together to improve population health is just one example of this. The team's presentation also featured the recently produced "Trails Day" video showcasing the innovative collaboration between

multiple community partners which brought students from Nestucca Valley Jr./Sr. High School to Camp Meriwether for a fun day of outdoor education. Volunteers from the U.S. Forest Service, a local mountain biking group, TORTA, Trailkeepers of Oregon and many others worked together to share their love of the outdoors with nearly 200 students and staff.

Feedback from the audience was overwhelmingly positive, with one respondent stating, "Thank you for your motivation! It has inspired me to go back to our small, rural community to work for better collective impact. We have been stuck too long pursuing familiar options."

Within hours of the ORHA Conference presentation, two members of the team, Steven Blakesley and Michelle Jenck, headed off to Roseburg to speak at the Oregon Trails Summit, presented by Oregon State Parks and the Oregon Office of Outdoor Recreation. Topics there included how a partnership between a private timber company and trails advocates led to the development of new mountain biking trails in Clatsop County, as well as how private landowner and land use issues must be considered when developing community trails.

Then, on Oct. 15, Dusti Linnell, Oregon State University Assistant Professor, Family & Community Health and Steven Blakesley, OHSU North Coast Community Research Liaison, gave a presentation at the Oregon Public Health Association Conference on "Partnering with non-health organizations to reduce type 2 diabetes risk in rural Oregon." The presentation highlighted how the participation



of non-traditional partners in this health initiative has led to the development of innovative approaches to engage community members in risk-reducing behaviors. To illustrate this, they highlighted two Tillamook County Wellness partners and their perspective on why they are part of Tillamook County Wellness.

One example was Justin Aufdermauer, president of the Tillamook Area Chamber of Commerce who said, "Tillamook County Wellness is a cross sector of community organizations that the Chamber has had very little opportunity to engage with. We feel that this new opportunity to engage has strengthened relationships for the Chamber with both wellness team members and our Chamber members; ultimately furthering our mission to build a strong community where businesses can thrive.'

A second example was from Deborah Wilkins, District Ranger, U.S. Forest Service, Hebo Ranger District, who said, "The U.S. Forest Service's involvement in the Tillamook County Wellness Trails Day is part of being a leader in our community and a partner in our community. Helping kids understand why they want to have positive interactions with the forest service, positive

interactions with trails. And to let them know that this could be part of their lifestyle and their way of being healthy and fit and happy, and it is right out their back door." Through their presentation, they conveyed why it is critical that to support community health, everyone needs to be part of it. They shared with public health professionals how Tillamook County Wellness has been successful in creating space for organizations outside of the health sector to help our communities thrive. Tillamook County Well-

ness partners along with the residents who are joining this movement, are not only shaping the health of our local communities but they are inspiring others throughout the state to do the same. Together, we really do make a difference.

Time for preparation (including preparation and cooking): 25 minutes

Inaredients:

- 1 cup Greek yogurt
- 1 teaspoon dill weed
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

- 1 pound (2 cups) Brussels sprouts (trimmed and halved lengthwise)
- 2 teaspoons margarine or butter
- 1/4 cup water

1.In a small bowl, mix yogurt, dill weed, lemon juice and salt. Set aside.

2.In a large skillet over mediumhigh heat, sauté sprouts (cut side down) in margarine until they begin to brown.

Friends of NCRD holiday bulb sales


A fter a very successful sale of spring blooming bulbs, Friends of North County Recreation District have potted up all remaining bulbs and have them for sale. The bulb sales are one of the many projects Friends of NCRD has throughout the year in order to fulfill its Mission to raise and distribute funds which support (NCRD) North County Recreation District's program and projects.

Spring blooming bulbs include tulips, daffodils, and Fritillaria Meleagris-commonly known as snake's head. The earliest blooming of these bulbs would be the Dutch Master. This bulb is the most widely grown of the yellow trumpets. Like King Alfred before it, the Dutch Master has become the standard early yellow daffodil. Other tulips and daffodils will bloom anywhere from mid to late spring with the Fritillaria Meleagris blooming last. All bulbs are planted 10 to a container which will bring a stunning display of flowers this coming spring. The exception to this would be a few of our tulip containers which include 3 different colors of tulips - planted 8 to a container.

Friends has two other familiar planted bulbs. Paperwhites are fragrant white daffodils blooming indoors this winter. We have already put these paperwhites in vases and anticipate them blooming in 5-6 weeks. Also available will be potted amaryllis, a bulb bearing huge showy flowers. These amaryllis are expected to bloom in mid-January. Friends has only 12 of these bulbs available for sale. Half of them are white blooms brushed in red – with the other half being red blooms with narrow white flares. These bulbs are huge and will produce at least two stems, and most stems will yield four flowers.

All these potted bulbs will make great gifts for this upcoming holiday season. The spring blooming bulbs of course is the gift that keeps giving. The above bulbs come in a variety of prices from \$10 to \$35. Pictures of the bulbs will be displayed at the Welcome Center for the North County Recreation District located in Nehalem.
