## Seventh COVID-19 case is confirmed in county

As Tillamook County adjusts to Phase 2, a seventh confirmed COVID-19 case has been reported as of Monday, June 22, by Tillamook County Community Health Centers. The individual is between the ages of 30-39 and is a resident of Tillamook County.

Public health department staff is working with the individual who remains under self-isolation at home. Contact investigation is currently ongoing.

This is the first COVID-19 case reported in Tillamook County since April 14.

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners discussed at their weekly community meeting Friday, June 19, Gov. Brown requiring various counties to wear face coverings in public indoor spaces, COVID-19 testing and updates in the county.

Effective Wednesday, June 24, Lincoln, Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Hood River, Marion and Polk Counties will have a face covering requirement for indoor public spaces, such as grocery stores, gyms and fitness studios, pharmacies, public transit agencies, personal service providers and more. Businesses must require employees, contractors, volunteers and customers to wear a mask, face covering or shield unless an accommodation or exemption applies. Children under 12 years of age, as well as people with a disability or medical condition that prevent them from wearing a face covering, are not required to wear one.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said, their PPE supply is adequate. Patients are coming back to get their care.

"The health department is going through the 40 some plus pages of guidance the state has put out about education so we can help the schools," Gordon McCraw said. "We have a meeting planned with them to get their plans going and then make sure they're in compliance with what the guidance says."

McCraw also said he accepted 300 donated face shields a man in Washington had made. The man had supplied all first responders in Washington.

Rep. David Gomberg said when people are not feeling sick, it is harder to encourage them to stay home and we need to get a better sense of how many people are walking around asymptomatic.

Sen. Betsy Johnson said the fact that

## Food Roots partners with Adventist Health to increase access to locally grown fresh food

continues to accept SNAP (food stamps), and has increased its Double Up Food Bucks program to provide \$20 for every \$10 spent using SNAP/EBT benefits. Food Roots is currently conducting weekly sales of large quantities of fresh produce from local farms to Oregon Food Bank, Tillamook County Services for distribution to pantries and meal sites, providing sales to local farmers and healthy food to pantry clients. This partnership was made possible by state funding to the statewide Oregon Food Bank network, and is sustained through a grant from the Columbia Pacific CCO. This Food Roots FarmTable and OFB partnership has resulted in 1,050 meals of locally produced food distributed through the Tillamook food bank network during the months of May and June. In addition, Food Roots has teamed up with NorthWest Senior Disabilities Services to provide a Bounty Box (\$40 worth of produce and local food items) for all Meals on Wheels recipients in

Tillamook County; many of these individuals are SNAP recipients, and will be able to purchase future Bounty Boxes for only \$20 EBT through Double Up Food Bucks. These partnerships increase visibility for Food Roots programs that increase the affordability of local food for low-income members of our community.

"We are incredibly grateful for partners like Adventist Health who understand the critical need to provide operations funding that makes these community programs and new partnerships possible. Without this support, we would not be able to implement, expand and continue to develop these services for our community.

## LUBA listens to Facebook cable testimony

Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA) listened to oral arguments in ORCA v. Tillamook County on Tuesday, June 16. Arguments focused on the land use decision reached by Tillamook County that approved the installation of Facebook's Jupiter Cable System in Tierra Del Mar.

The fiber optic cable system and landing site would be on a property zoned rural residential two-acre, located within the Tierra Del Mar area north of the Pacific City/Woods unincorporated community and designated as Tax Lot 3200.

Preconstruction began Jan. 29 and HDD drilling activity began March 9. All construction activities stopped on April 30 and will begin again on Jan. 1, 2021 during the allowed construction period specified in the conditions of approval.

Sean T. Malone, attorney for ORCA, said statements by the neighbors of the site are in the record. This is critical infrastructure, he said. Malone said the site seems like an odd place for this.

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# Tillamook High School earns awards at Oregon Envirothon

Tillamook High School earned several awards at this year's Oregon Envirothon, including winning the Future Natural Resources Leaders CDE awards. Over 100 students across the state competed in this year's event.

Now in its twenty-third year, the annual natural resources knowledge competition, organized by the Oregon Forest Resources Institute (OFRI), was held virtually for the first time on May 1. The Oregon Envirothon organizers and students did not let COVID-19 get in the way of their hard work and preparation for the 2020 event and

found new ways to compete while social distancing at home.

Lori Loeffler, natural resources CTE teacher at Tillamook High School and Future Natural Resource Leaders (FNRL) advisor, said the competition usually involves rotating through stations. This year, the test was sent out to the team captains the morning of the competition. The students had six hours to complete and turn in the test.

Loeffler teaches a dual credit class with Tillamook Bay Community College. Part of the final is creating the video portion and participating in Envirothon. This year's group included 10 students

from the class. Loeffler said having the test virtual created a lot of challenges for other teams. Loeffler's students were together already in Google Classroom. She said this worked out well for the competition.

Loeffler said students do not have to participate in Envirothon and have the option to do a traditional research final instead, although many students choose to participate.

"The competition itself is fun," Loeffler said.

The Oregon Envirothon, typically held at The Oregon Garden in Silverton, is a problem-solving education program and competition that teaches high school

students across the state about environmental sciences. Participating students competed remotely in teams to train and test in five categories: aquatic ecology, wildlife ecology, soils and land use, and a revolving current issue.

This year, the current issue portion of the competition focused on water resources management and asked students to determine what local stakeholders can do to address integrated water management challenges.

Amity High School, located in Yamhill County, received the highest score, making them the outright winner for the first time in school history.

In addition to an overall

winner, the National FFA Organization and the Oregon FNRL with Career Development Event (CDE) awards recognize teams. Amity High School received the Oregon FFA Environmental and Natural Resources CDE award. Tillamook High School was selected for the FNRL-Oregon Envirothon CDE award.

Loeffler said she was happy to see the students do so well but never puts that kind of pressure on them. The students went into the competition 100 percent with grit and resilience.

"I'm so proud of them," Loeffler said.

The students tied for first place overall on the wildlife

portion of the test. Each team had a different spin.

Tillamook High School was also first in state for the FNRL division, second in FNRL for Team Forces of Nature.

Loeffler said FNRL is the natural resources equivalent of FFA. Envirothon is one of FNRL's career development events.

The Tillamook High School students went above and beyond what they were required to do and this speaks a lot about the kids, Loeffler said.

## Over \$900,000 to fund slide project repairs for Tillamook County

Several areas of state highways in Tillamook County will be receiving repairs this summer after years of being impacted by landslides. Over \$900,000 is being spent, including \$600,000 that was made available from Oregon Department of Transportation maintenance contingency funds that weren't spent as a result of the mild winter.

The contingency funds will be used to repair slide damage on U.S. 101 just south of Wheeler (MP Z45.5) and

two areas of OR 131 near Netarts (MP 1.7 and 4.5). The slide repairs include installing soil nails into the hillsides. Installing these long steel bars have been successful in helping to reinforce and stabilize hillsides at numerous other highway locations in the Northwest.

In addition to those slide repairs, ODOT will be spending over \$300,000 of other maintenance funds to restore the pavement in a slide prone area of OR 6 (Wilson River Highway) located around

milepost 35. This area is being impacted by a very large and deep slide that would be very costly and difficult to permanently repair. This project is designed to smooth a very rough area of roadway and will not stop the land movement caused by the deep slide.

The projects have not been scheduled yet but will likely take place during July and August. Travelers can expect some lane closures and delays during construction.

## Wheeler to receive grant from Oregon Small Business Relief Fund

Business Oregon announced Tuesday, June 2, the recipients of \$2.5 million in matching grant funding through the Emergency Business Assistance Grant Fund, which was created by Gov. Kate Brown and the Oregon Legislature to assist small businesses suffering in the wake of the CO-

VID-19 pandemic. A total of \$10 million of funding is being allocated through three Requests for Proposals (RFP) for different types of applicants. This is the first round of funding, consisting of \$2.5 million and closed for proposals May 18.

"We stood this program up very quickly, and communities throughout Oregon in turn put together excellent proposals on a short timeframe for how they will get

the funding into the hands of their local small businesses," said Business Oregon Director Chris Cummings in a press release.

This round solicited proposals from cities, counties, and Economic Development Districts that have existing small business COVID-relief programs or will stand up new programs to issue grants to local small businesses with fewer than 25 employees. The program

also encourages efforts to provide access to sole proprietors and historically disadvantaged businesses.

Business Oregon received 46 applications requesting \$7.5 million, but only \$2.5 million is available in this round. Final amounts to each will be announced shortly as contracts are finalized with each recipient, but the median award will be approximately \$45,000.



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# Commissioners open Cape Kiwanda parking

## Hungry Harbor Drive boat launch also now open

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners voted earlier this month to open the Cape Kiwanda parking lot and Hungry Harbor Drive boat launch.

Commission Chair David Yamamoto said closing Tillamook County was the easy part; reopening in Phase

1 and 2 is the hard part. As time goes on, the county is opening more and more.

"We knew we needed to get the recreational dory fleet back on the ocean and so a couple of weeks ago, I think it was, we allowed recreational dory fleet to launch five days a week Monday through Friday," Yamamoto said. "But under OPRD's direction, they did not want them parking on the beach;

they were instead required to park in the Cape Kiwanda parking lot which created its own set of life health safety issues."

Effective immediately, Hungry Harbor boat launch is open seven days a week. All dory launching is open seven days a week. The Cape Kiwanda parking lot will also be open to the public seven days a week.

"We're not closing any-

thing with this order," Yamamoto said. "We're opening the beach to the dory fleets seven days a week and we're opening the Cape Kiwanda parking lot seven days a week, which I think is a great thing."

All other vehicles other than dories are prohibited from parking on the beach. Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said she received several emails about people who

thought the county was closing parking on the beach permanently. The county is simply affirming that Oregon Parks and Recreation Department has closed parking on the beach in their emergency order.

"Even moving forward for the rest of this year, if we open up parking on the beach, we don't have any way of enforcing it," said Commissioner Bill Baertlein.

"Parks had three staff people; they're not there anymore."

Baertlein said the sheriff's department is also spread thin. The county cannot afford to spend the time it has in Pacific City and has to take into consideration the entire county. He said its time Pacific City becomes an incorporated city.

# Manzanita discusses proposed public walking trail

Manzanita City Council met Wednesday, June 3, and discussed a proposal to permit use of a new public walking trail ('South Cherry Trail') where existing road right-of-way exists from Cherry Street west to Ocean Road. Volunteers would construct this trail for walking purposes only and it would provide beach access and evacuation route for numerous residents of the Classic Ridge area of Manzanita.

The request would involve allowing volunteers managed by a newly formed group called Classic Ridge Trail Access Campaign to create a trail from the top of Cherry Street down to Ocean Road where the bottom quarter of the trail would include either climbing turns or timber steps into the hillside due to steepness of the area. The campaign wishes to include a plaque at the trailhead mark trail to pay tribute to supporters

who donate funds, labor and materials to the project.

Stanton Myers, member of the campaign and property owner, said in the request that the fencing and blockage of all access to and from Classic Ridge to the beach on April 26 has caused "extreme concern and hardship for those in the Classic Ridge and an urgent solution is essential."

Myers said about 75 people have signed up in support of the trail. He is asking the city to allow volunteers to clear a walking trail, which requires some clearing of brush.

"The city would need to survey the site to make sure that we have the right location when we build this trail," Myers said. "We're trying to take the burden off the city by using volunteer efforts, unless there were funds available or possibly a grant comes up."

Assistant City Manager Kristin Grasseth said the city wants to check on liability and she would want someone who does trails

for a living design the trail. She suggested starting with surveys.

Mayor Mike Scott said he had several emails from people who are opposed to the trail. Some of the reasons include worry it will bring visitors and fear of erosion.

Myers said he would also want Public Works Director Dan Weitzel to visit the site. They would construct the trail with as much erosion protection as possible.

"We do want to, in the steep areas, build some steps," Myers said.

Councilor Thomas Aschenbrener said he thinks the idea of the proposal gives them a chance to figure out what their next steps are. He said these issues had been anticipated.

"The way I envision this, the city does not have a workgroup to address this, like we did with short-term rentals," Aschenbrener said.

Aschenbrener said what they have is a group of homeowners asking to do something special that will benefit that group of people.

The city will need to do more research into this with surveys and consulting with an engineer. Councilor Steve Nuttall said this project was not on the city's radar budgetarily for this fiscal year, and he does not know what the costs would be, but Myers mentioned in his memo that the campaign would assume all costs. He asked what this would include.

Myers said they have chainsaws and pressure cutters and have anticipated costs. If they start getting into legal fees, they have a group they can gather funds from.

"I'm okay with moving forward but I would prefer to do as just guidance to the city staff to bring back a report next month that outlines issues as they see them in a more formal manner and the costs associated with whatever efforts we need to take to ensure whatever happens up there is done properly," Nuttall said.

There are several people in the area not supportive of building a trail in their back-

yard so there will have to be some sort of public process, Nuttall said.

"I do believe that once everything is understood of what it is that would have to be done, we would then need to have a public hearing on this," Aschenbrener said. "I think that is a process that is essential for this, as well as many other issues we deal with here."

Aschenbrener said he does not think they can say the 75 people who are not adjacent to the trail outweigh the concern of those on the trail. They are not asking for the trail to be ADA accessible. It would be a trail with steps that could be utilized to go down to the beach.

A citizen, Laurie Murphy, is on the trail committee and said there has been a geotech survey done of the area. The side of the dune where the trail would go is hard-packed and pooling was fixed last summer. The committee sees the trail as the most feasible way for people to get down to the beach from the Classic Ridge area.

Aschenbrener said there are legal infrastructure issues the city needs to address. It would not be a trail with a set of steps that everyone could use, but they want to make sure it is reasonably accessible. Myers said the trail would be safe.

"It seems like this is a city-owned right of way, so it would appear, basically a road, anybody buying property at any time knows they are not buying this part," Myers said. "Their property is not within this right of way and they've known it has existed."

Scott said they take public comment on projects like this to get the public's opinion.

Grasseth said city staff will come back to next month's meeting with costs involved and whether engineering will be needed.







# Get all the facts for yourself

I am proud to live in the United States of America where I am able to have the freedom to make choices. When election time comes around, my husband and I make time when we can sit at the dining room table uninterrupted to discuss the current candidates and issues before us. We do not always agree on the same issues, but, as adults, we agree to disagree, recognizing each individual is allowed to have their own opinion. We look at both sides of issues and make our decision after consulting the Voter's Guide and also check voting records of candidates (if available), websites and media coverage regarding a candidate's position or issue to be voted as law. Even if the issue does not pass or the candidate does not win or retain their position, I know that people have cast their ballots and the decision of the majority has won. It's over. There are state and county regulations in place for checks and balances.

In the coming weeks, the voters of Garibaldi will be tasked with voting on a recall issue regarding a member of the city council. There are always two sides to every story. I am asking to you to look at all the facts related to this recall.

Did you see the actual petition with the charges related to the issue? Were you shown the payment history before you signed the petition for recall, or did you take the persons word for it that all the information was accurate? I would suggest that you check all the facts before you vote.

I personally heard the information presented to a citizen about why the person should be recalled. The petitioners going door to door claimed Paul Daniels either "is not paying his fair share" or "he has not paid his System Development (SDC) fees." I looked at his payment history against the terms of his contract with the city, resolution 2017-05. There is current debate over the merits of this resolution, but the council voted to accept it in April 2017. The council is a legislative

body that is entrusted with making those decisions for the city. The council was tasked with performing due diligence in the matter, and they had all the information available at that meeting as evidenced by the Council Meeting packet from April 2017 which is on the City website. The documents under debate are included in that packet. Make an appointment at City Hall and look at the information for yourself. The fees are being paid according to the contract, and while the payment is not due until October, it has been paid at the first of every year, so he's actually paying eight or nine months in advance. So why are people being told information to the contrary?

Another argument is that the SDC fees are not accurate. According to the resolution, they are clearly stated in the attachment and it was approved. Check the meeting minutes of the City Council in the council packet from May 2017. Councilor Bud Shattuck moved to adopt the resolution and it was voted in unanimously. Why is no one protesting that another contract regarding SDC fees is half of what Mr. Daniels is paying? Why the fixation on only one individual and contract? If there was a problem with the transaction, why did no one speak up sooner? There is an appeal process, but it is well past the 60-day window.

Then there is Paula Tucker's letter dated May 2, 2020 that was sent out to ev-

eryone in town. She alleges Blake Lettenmeier was not paid for his time spent last year on Mr. Daniels' first proposal. How would she have a clue about Blake's pay and what his job entails?

She finishes the letter accusing Mr. Daniels of receiving impartial treatment due to the City Manager's involvement with a Tillamook County Housing Task Force. The task force was formed in conjunction with CARE in 2015 and created a document entitled "Creating a Healthier Housing Market in Tillamook County." It was easy to find on Google and was published in March of 2017. With their research completed, the group dissolved. Where did Ms. Tucker find that information? I didn't even see his name listed among the participants.

All I am asking is for you to check the facts. Many people have a computer in their hands by way of their phones. Look up the information for yourselves. We are constantly being bombarded, during this pandemic, with so many different opinions and stories all claiming to be the only truth.

Have you asked Paul Daniels for his side of the story? Even in a court of law, an accused person is innocent until proven guilty.

Don't drink the Kool-Aid before you ask what's in it. Look at the documentation for yourself.



## TALES FROM THE LIBRARY

S ave the date! The Tillamook County Library Board has been hard at work finding our next library director. They've narrowed it down, and would like to offer a chance for you to meet the candidates, ask questions, and offer your feedback to the board. Stay tuned for details on how to participate, but for now, we have the dates and times for you to mark on your calendar. The first candidate's forum will be held on Monday, June 29 from 1 - 2 pm and the opportunity to meet the other candidate will occur on

Thursday, July 2 from 1 - 2 pm.

We've been receiving lots of questions about when you can start returning library items that you have previously checked out. As of this moment, you are able to return items to any of our library locations during Curbside Pickup hours which are Monday through Friday from 2:00 pm to 5:00 pm. We realize these hours are not convenient for everyone so we are working hard at coming up with an alternative plan with additional hours. The good news is we have lifted library fines so no need to worry about late fees.

The second most-asked question comes from people



who are confused about library curbside pickup and how they can take advantage of that service. It is really easy as pie and I am going to start out with the quickest way to shortcut the whole procedure. All you need to do is call the library at 503-842-

4792 and tell the librarian what books or DVDs you would like to check out. We will then secure those items for you and let you know when you can pick them up. It's that easy!

If you prefer, you can handle the reserving of items on our website, so let's detail the easy steps for you. First of all, you need to know your library card number and your pin number. Many people forget ever setting up a pin number but every card holder actually has one. The normal formula we use for library pin numbers starts with the first four letters of your last name (all small letters) followed by the last four digits of your phone number. So if

your last name is Anderson and your phone ends in 1234, your pin would be ande1234.

With library card and pin number in hand, you would visit [www.tillabook.org](http://www.tillabook.org) and in the box in the top right corner that says "find anything in the library", type in the name of a book or movie you would like. For example, if you wanted to watch the movie, "Gone with the Wind", you would type in the movie title, click on the magnifying glass icon, and the catalog listing will pop up. For this particular title, you will see you have the choice of requesting the book version, the electronic book version or the DVD. When you click on the box by the

DVD version that says "place hold", it will pop up a box for you to enter your name, your library card number and your pin number. Then click "submit". The last step involves selecting WHERE you would like to pick the item up. You can choose any of our libraries. Finally, the website will tell you your request was successful and the library will call you when your item is ready for pickup.

It's that easy! But again, if you find the above procedure too much, or if you don't have computer access, the easiest way is to just give us a call at 503-842-4792 and we will be happy to find any library item for you.

## GARDENING MATTERS

A friend passed along a little book of gardening stories to me a few days ago and I started reading about a man who was getting frustrated because his azaleas had stopped growing. He had purchased about 15 of them, hoping for a nice big border of white in the spring.

To make a long – and pretty humorous – story short (and less funny), after asking everyone he knew for suggestions, he got some good advice from the mailman: "Feed them!" So the man fed them. And when that didn't seem to work, he fed them again. And again, and again. In between times, he watered and watered until the poor things just gave up and died.

Nothing the man had tried worked for him. In the end, he dug up the row of azaleas to put in the compost pile.

And that's when he noticed a tag left on one of them that said "Dwarf white azalea."

I use this story not to tell you not to over-feed or over-water, (which are other columns entirely) but to recommend that when you purchase a new plant, keep the tags in a safe place so you can refer to them when needed. There is a lot of valuable info on those little tags. Ideally, the tag should stay with the plant, but as I don't like the sight of little plant tags all through the garden, I instead keep them in clear plastic sleeves (the kind used for 8 x 10" photos) in a binder, taped onto paper with a note as to when they were planted, where they were purchased and their cost, and their location in the garden. If the plant gets moved, it is easy to note that on the page. Same if it doesn't make it. But I still keep the page in

the binder to remind me not to purchase that specific plant again.

This binder also acts as my garden journal. I generally keep my journal on the computer, but at the end of the season, I print it out and place it in the binder with the plant tags. All neat and tidy.

I have often talked of the importance of keeping a garden journal. Vegetables, flowers, shrubs, trees, it doesn't matter what type of gardening you prefer. A journal can act as a "history book" as to what has been done in the garden. My journals go back to 2002, when I first became a Tillamook County Master Gardener. To write this column, I took out the first volume (I now have three!) and was looking through to see what has changed and what I had forgotten about. It was quite eye-opening.

For instance, the coral bark maple called 'Sanko Kaku' was put into place in 2005. It cost \$14.95 then. It looms above me now and is beautiful in all seasons. Of course, none of the annuals that were planted that year remain, but I still have "daughter" plants from the mother plant of Heuchera 'Crimson Curls.' I also marked down when and where I placed slug bait and was so efficient back in those days that I recorded its success a few days later.

Going back further, I see I recorded a week of lovely,



warm weather in January of 2003. Apparently, I used the nice weather to cut back some fuchsia and move some tulip bulbs closer to the house. I also found labels from lots of daffodils I planted in the fall of 2003. Come to think of it, I only have a couple of the forty I planted left. Something else to add to this year's journal: "order daffodil bulbs to plant in the fall of 2020." So the journals don't have to be only history, but what to do in the future.

Looking back to 2004, I noticed I tried a lot of different Salvias and Agastache but

none of those survived more than a couple of seasons. I learned my lesson as I don't see notes about getting more of those plants anywhere since then. I do still enjoy the 'Mrs. P.B. Truax' clematis I planted that year, as well as the Heucheras 'Amber Waves' and 'Obsidian.' Again, I only have daughter plants of the Heucheras since the mother plants wore themselves out years ago. In fact, the ones I have now are most likely "granddaughter" plants.

A label is in the binder for a very pretty petunia called 'Celia' that was to be a

double, mauve English petunia. Now, I probably bought it because of my Anglophilic, but it was very pretty in the picture on the tag although I don't remember seeing it in nurseries since then.

And although I don't have tags from all the plants friends gave me as described in my last column, I did make note of them in the journals. Another nice reminder as I leaf through them today. My journals are my garden's "history." And to quote Winston Churchill, "History will be kind to me as I intend to write it."

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
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

Some folks ride their bikes instead, but please remember e-bikes are not allowed on our beach (except disabled persons may ride pedal-assisted bikes with a park ranger's permission). No bikes of any kind are allowed from the start of the marked snow plover area to the jetty.

Chris Spence and Narayan Lincoln have put in a hugelkultur raised garden

bed on the south side of their house. Rotting timber and wood chips line the bottom, acting like a sponge to absorb rainwater. The advantages of a hugel bed are many, including: 1) the gradual decay of wood is a consistent source of long-term nutrients for the plants; 2) the composting wood also generates heat, which should extend the growing season; 3) soil aeration increases as those branches and logs break down, meaning the bed will be "no till" for the long term; and 4) the sponge-like nature of the logs and branches allows rainwater to be stored and released during drier times, meaning you may never need to water your hugel bed after the first year. Narayan will plant lettuces, kale, shallots, herbs, zucchini, cucumber, leeks and some flowers in the new little garden. May they flourish!

# Walk more and live well

"Above all, do not lose your desire to walk: Every day I walk myself into a state of well-being and walk away from every illness; I have walked myself into my best thoughts, and I know of no thought so burdensome that one cannot walk away from it." - Soren Kierkegaard

**G**etting outdoors, being physically active and engaging in positive social interactions are just what the doctor would order for supporting health and preventing disease, especially in light of COVID-19. Walking, and being more active in general, boosts our immune system, builds stronger muscles and increases bone density. In addition to improving metabolism and supporting weight management, a daily walking routine can provide immense mental and social benefits. In short, carving out at least 20-30 minutes each day to

walk is good medicine! Even better, it's also free.

Melody Ayers, director of philanthropy and volunteer services at Adventist Health Tillamook, has been working from home since March 17 as part of the hospital's pandemic response plan. She shares, "While working from home, there are days that I have as many as five video calls with various work groups that are also working remotely. I've learned to make time throughout the day to walk on the country road where I live, even if only 5-10 minutes at a time in between meetings, to breath fresh air deep into my lungs, stretch my body, and get my creative thoughts pumping again. I've even found an inventive new use for my ever-present cotton face mask: filtering the gnats and small bugs in the air from flying up my nose!"

Walking groups were

launched in all three areas of Tillamook County—North, Central, and South—back in 2017, thanks to a grant from the OHSU Knight Cancer Institute's Community Partnership Program. The hospital, Tillamook YMCA, OSU Extension and Tillamook County Wellness came together through this project to promote walking as a vital health activity for Tillamook County. That year, five walking groups with 72 participants facilitated by seven leaders agreed that this was a fun way get physically active and enhance personal wellbeing. In a survey taken at the end of the grant project, walkers reported significant improvements to their health and said that increased social engagement was a great participation benefit.

Fast forward to 2020, and several groups are meeting and walking regularly throughout Tillamook

County. Groups are volunteer led and are open to anyone, including drop-ins. It's worth noting that State guidelines for curbing the spread of COVID-19 currently allow small groups to get together outdoors while following basic safety precautions such as maintaining appropriate distances and wearing a face covering or mask when you can't maintain a distance of "one cow length apart," as we've been known to say in Tillamook County. ## Commissioners award TLT grants

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners announced the Transient Lodging Tax Tourism-related facilities grants awarded at their meeting Wednesday, June 17.

Following the decision, staff will notify applicants and begin drafting 29 applications were reviewed.

"I will say every group that reviews these grants, they do it with such thoughtfulness and thoroughness and I'm impressed," said Nan Devlin, Visit Tillamook Coast.

Devlin said she went through the scores and averaged them, ranking them in order from highest to lowest. The highest was the Dorymen's Association Heritage Museum Phase 1 with \$75,000.

Ultimook Running Camp is now a nonprofit. They need \$70,000 to finish for a commercial kitchen.

"It's not only just for Ultimook," Devlin said. "It's going to be farm to table dinners there for the North Coast Food

Trail and we'll start planning that as soon as we can."

Port of Garibaldi asked for \$22,000. There was one member of the Tourism Advisory Committee (TAC) who disagreed with this application for safety reasons.

"This is part of their master plan and their team is going to do all the work themselves to make it happen," Devlin said of the application.

Pine Grove Community House's Phase I project would involve roof repair. Commissioner David Yamamoto said the community house is a great place for people to come together.

"I'm excited about this," Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said. "It's nice to, finally, after this long stretch of multiple emergencies, have something fun and positive."

going to look back on 'what if'."


Richwine wanted to rally the community together and make something special happen for them.

## Garibaldi Maritime Museum: Navigating Northwest maritime history

The ongoing unrest and mass protests over tragic deaths symbolic of long-standing patterns of social injustice, amid the backdrop of a still-raging COVID-19 pandemic, have raised questions about the symbolism of historic figures that may be associated with troubling periods of oppression and violence against minorities in our nation's history.

One such figure being scrutinized for his interactions with indigenous peoples during voyages of exploration and commerce is Captain Robert Gray, an American navigator closely tied to the historical exhibits and educational mission of the Garibaldi Maritime Museum. The symbolism of Captain Gray's statue has been called into question because of recent potentially negative historical interpretations. This is a matter that requires serious consideration and reflection.

The museum board of

directors takes the questions about Captain Gray that have been raised during the current national and regional social unrest seriously. We have begun our own research and inquiries into the matter, enlisting the aid of other Pacific Northwest cultural institutions, historians, social commentators and Native American tribes. Our intent is to accomplish a careful and fair evaluation of the available historical accounts in search of the facts about Captain Robert Gray's actions as a ship's captain and explorer in the late 18th and early 19th centuries.

It is wholly in keeping with the mission of the Garibaldi Maritime Museum to address this important and sensitive issue. Our mission statement clearly states that our role as a cultural non-profit institution includes,

Provide services to communities throughout the Pacific Northwest geographi-

cal region through community educational programs for all ages, in order to develop knowledge and understanding of the cultural and historical aspects of shipbuilding, sailing, navigation and other related activities.

The history of our nation and the men and women who contributed to its expansion and development – like all history – is constantly being informed and improved by new information, insights and knowledge as it becomes available. The museum is committed to pursuing careful scrutiny over the questions raised concerning Captain Robert Gray and sharing the results of our inquiries with the community we serve.

Based on the outcome of the research, the board will consider whether the museum's exhibits concerning Captain Gray, including the statue of him in the parking lot, need reconsideration.

## Bay City Arts Center begins reopening with weekend stone carving workshop

The Bay City Arts Center (BCAC) has announced the first stage of its gradual reopening with a "Discovery in Stone" workshop to be held the weekend of June 27-28. Stone carving is an activity that lends itself well to social distancing and participants are always encouraged to wear face masks and eye protection, even without the risk of viruses.

"Because this is a fairly safe type of event, we may do stone carving more often this summer," said Charlie Wooldridge of the BCAC in a press release. "We're thinking of holding workshops once a month through the early fall if we see enough interest from the community."

Most aspects of Discovery in Stone will stay the same: the art studio and grounds will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day for carving; tuition will be by donation; stone and tools will be supplied; and instruction will be avail-

## TBCC ranks sixth in the state for online degrees
