COVID-19 vaccine walk-ins available at health center, event held June 19

Tillamook County will remain in Lower Risk, effective Friday, June 11, to Thursday, June 17. Tillamook County Health Department reported during a community update Tuesday, June 8, the county had nine new positive and presumptive COVID-19 cases from Sunday, May 23, through Saturday, June 5.

“From the beginning of the pandemic – now remember this is from March 2020 – Tillamook County has had 672 cases, four deaths and 30 hospitalizations,” Administrator Marlene Putman said.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson reported 206 hospitalizations with COVID-19 across Oregon, as of June 8. There

are 767 available ventilators in the state of Oregon. The Tillamook hospital has more than adequate personal protective equipment.

When Oregon reaches a first dose 70 percent statewide vaccination rate for residents 18 and older, Oregon will lift all risk level health and safety restrictions. This includes mandates such as wearing masks and social distancing, as well as the lifting of vaccination verification in businesses.

The statewide vaccination rate is at 66.8 percent, as of Tuesday, June 8, Putman said. The county’s goal of 65 percent is currently at 62.8 percent. Around 480 first dose vaccinations are needed to reach the 65 percent goal.

“Our health center and public health, for the month

of June, will be doing new appointments at the community health center, which is just right next door to our clinic,” Putman said. “We will be offering Pfizer and Johnson & Johnson on Tuesdays. Moderna and Johnson & Johnson clinics will be held on Thursdays.”

These vaccines are by walk-in, but if you need or want to schedule an appointment, you can call the health center at 503-842-3914.

“Boosters will still be held at Tillamook County Fairgrounds,” Putman said of those who have received their first dose at the fairgrounds and are awaiting their second shot.

Tillamook County Creamery hosted a drive-in vaccine clinic with free ice cream Wednesday, June 9. The health center is hosting a vaccine clinic Saturday, June 19, for walk-ins.

“All three vaccines will be available,” Putman said of the June 19 event.

People can also receive a vaccine through their health care provider or local pharmacy.

Those Tillamook County residents who went out of the county to get vaccinated are counted in the county’s vaccination rate, Putman said. The second doses are allocated mainly where the first dose was received. Those who received their first dose outside of the county and are struggling to receive a second dose should give the health department a call to schedule an appointment in the county.

Former Rockaway volunteer arrested for alleged sex abuse, additional victims sought

also has ties to the Rockaway Beach community, as well.

Detectives strongly believe that Bauer has other victims that have not made reports to law enforcement. Bauer has known connections to the following organizations:

- Boy Scouts of America Troops 1 and 150 (1970s-1993)
- Alpenrose Dairyville
- Neah-Kah-Nie High School (2009-2012)
- Portland Revels (2013-2021)
- Rockaway Beach Police Department (volunteer until 2017)
- Tillamook Association for the Performing Arts (TAPA)

Neah-Kah-Nie School District Superintendent Paul Erlebach stated in a letter to the community Monday, June 7, all volunteers in the school district must pass a criminal history check with Oregon Department of Education. Bauer passed the background check when he began volunteering in 2009.

“We are cooperating with investigators and encourage anyone with information to contact law enforcement,” Erlebach stated. “The school district’s sexual conduct policy prohibits this type of conduct, and all district employees are required to immediately report any suspected abuse to a designated

licensed administrator, as well as to law enforcement and/or DHS.”

All district employees undergo annual sexual misconduct training, and all volunteers are provided with information on prevention and identification of abuse, sexual conduct and reporting obligations, Erlebach added. The school district has resources available to students who may be victims, including counseling. 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Oregon moves closer to lifting COVID restrictions

Oregon is closing in on reopening the economy. On Friday, Gov. Kate Brown announced that more than 67% of Oregon residents have taken at least one dose of the COVID vaccine, leaving fewer than 100,000 more vaccines needed to reach the 70% threshold Brown set to fully reopen the economy. “Thanks to the vaccine, our case rate and hospitalizations continue to decline,” Brown said. “As of today, at least 2.3 million Oregonians have received at least one dose of the vaccine. We are so close to reopening our economy.” State Epidemiologist Dr. Dead Sidelinger said that cases in the state are directly in line with the increase in vaccinations. “Daily cases, COVID-19 related hospitalizations and the percentage of people testing positive continue to decline,” Sidelinger said. Over the last week, 1,725 new COVID cases were announced in the state, the lowest number since September. Hospitalizations were down 24 percent and only 20 new deaths linked to the virus were reported. “The landscape of the virus has shifted dramatically,” Sidelinger said. “The virus is overwhelmingly impacting those who are not vaccinated when those who are vaccinated are safe. Virtually every person infected right now is not fully vaccinated.”

Sidelinger said the vaccines are all proven safe and effective, and the best way to beat COVID is to get the vaccine. “In order to decisively defeat the virus and avoid a future outbreak, we must get more people vaccinated,” he said. “There’s no substitute for the vaccine.” Sidelinger said modeling in Oregon continues to show decreasing cases, hospitalizations and deaths. On the current trend, cases will fall to around 100 a day with only five new hospitalizations. Brown echoed that sentiment, saying those who have taken the vaccine deserve praise. “We still have more work to do to ensure all Oregonians are safe from COVID-19,” Brown said. “Thank you to everyone who’s gotten the vaccine. Thank you to all Oregonians who are making it easier for their employees to get vaccinated. Thank you to everyone who’s taken the time to drive a family member or friend to an appointment or had a conversation with a friend who’s had a question about vaccines. All these efforts contribute to our success as a state.” Brown also reminded Oregon residents that getting the vaccine is free, and every Oregonian who gets at least one dose will be eligible to win \$1 million. On June 25, the state will announce winners of the vaccine awards, with one person winning \$1 million and one person from every county winning \$10,000.

Brown said one of her big worries right now is coming changes to the eviction moratorium in the state. A new state law does not allow Brown to extend the moratorium, which ends June 30. “This means renters must pay their July rent or the landlord can evict them for nonpayment,” Brown said. “To the thousands of Oregonians who lost jobs or fell behind on their rent during the pandemic, please apply today for rental assistance to pay your July rent. Under current law, you cannot be evicted until next year for rent owed from April 2020 to June 2021. Rental assistance programs can help you with past rent.” Brown encouraged those struggling with rent to apply at oregonrentalassistance.org to get a share of the federal money sent to the state to help just those people. Brown also called on landlords in the state to give renters time to pay, especially if they have applied for rental assistance. “We have made it through the pandemic by watching out for one another,” Brown said. “We have seen Oregon’s spirit time and again.” Sidelinger closed the meeting by again encouraging residents to get vaccinated. He emphasized the vaccine is safe and effective. The key to defeating COVID is simple, the vaccines. “We are finally gaining the upper hand against the virus,” Sidelinger said.

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above sea level. The Mexican revolution started there in 1810. A statue of La Pipila, a hero of the revolution, stands high above the town. La Pipila strapped a slab of rock on his back to protect himself from projectiles as he ran to



Hunting and Sports Groups Call for More Accuracy in IP 13 Ballot Title

Several pro-hunting conservation organizations have challenged the draft language of the ballot title and summary for Initiative Petition 13, which they contend do not adequately convey the initiative’s devastating impact to legal hunting, fishing and trapping. The groups have submitted comments to the Oregon Attorney General’s office requesting clarification to the initiative’s draft ballot language.

The organizations, which include the Oregon Hunters Association, Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Wild Sheep Foundation, Oregon Chapter of Backcountry Hunters and Anglers, Oregon Trappers Association, Sportsmen’s Alliance, and the Congressional Sportsmen’s Foundation, also assert that the draft ballot title inappropriately uses the term “prohibits” rather than “criminalizes,” which they believe is more accurate.

IP 13 would criminalize killing an animal for any reason other than an immediate act of

self-defense. It would criminalize good animal husbandry practices, animal breeding of both livestock and pets, training techniques, and even pest control. In keeping with the “no kill” directive, it would also criminalize any livestock slaughter practices, with the proponents stating that meat consumption would still be allowed from animals that have died of old age.

IP 13 effectively would outlaw a self-sufficient lifestyle, according to Oregon Hunters Association outreach coordinator Amy Patrick.

“Under this initiative, it would be illegal to put a deer in the freezer, catch fish, or raise animals to offset a family’s grocery bill,” Patrick said. “While it prevents Oregonians from securing their own naturally raised or harvested food, it does not prohibit grocery stores from carrying animal proteins, meaning those items would be imported from states that do not have such outrageous regulations, effectively creating even more distance between Oregon families and their food.”

Patrick said IP 13 would impact Oregonians who want to ensure natural, local food sources for their families

through hunting, fishing, trapping, or raising their own livestock.

“I have cattle in my pasture, chickens in my coop, my husband hunts, and I like to fly fish,” she said. “IP 13 would make us criminals for our attempts to control our food sources and be less reliant on the mainstream food network.”

If the initiative language is certified by the AG’s office, the proponents will have until June 2022 to collect the more than 112,000 signatures required to place it on the November 2022 general election ballot.

The groups challenging the draft ballot language have stated that they will not rule out legal action if the current language is upheld.

“We will use all available avenues and resources to defeat this initiative,” Patrick said. “Too many Oregonians have too much at stake.”

OHA (www.oregonhunters.org) is the state’s largest Oregon-based pro-hunting organization, with 10,000 members and 26 chapters statewide. Its mission is “protecting Oregon’s wildlife, habitat and heritage.”

Let me take a moment to brag about how beautiful Downtown Tillamook looks right now.

Just last week, more than 50 large planters burst to life with flowers and foliage. The Chamber contracts local plant experts to run our Downtown Planter Program, which places large flower planters throughout the downtown district. The Chamber began this program in 2013, and the planters add a decorative element to the city.

We maintain the planters year-round with appropriate plants for the season, including hardy winter plants in the colder months. The arrangements are revamped semi-annually, and I love to see what new and unique designs is planted in them. But it seems the planters always look so amazing in the summer. It must be something about seeing those bright florals after a long winter of gray skies...

Of course, we couldn’t run the program without the help of our contracted expert green thumbs Cindy and Melissa, who plant and care for the flowers all season



long. We also contract with the City of Tillamook crew, which waters the plants through the summer, and from the business owners who sponsor the program financially. You’ll know who those sponsors are because they have a planter right outside of their storefront.

And the Downtown Planter Program is just one of the many city beautification efforts happening in Tillamook right now. Maybe you noticed that city crews have recently ramped up efforts to clean out and weed the bioswales along Main and Pacific avenues.

For whatever reason, those bioswales seem to be the perfect habitat for weeds to flourish, and we get a lot of comments about how we can make them more appealing

and less overgrown. So we are very encouraged to see the city tackling that task. They are listening to our community and problem solving right alongside us.

City crews also hung flower baskets throughout town. I think they pair perfectly with our larger planters on the ground. Having hanging baskets and sidewalk planters really ties together the walkways.

And don’t forget that all this work comes just about a month after our Downtown Tillamook Cleanup. More than a dozen volunteers lent a hand in May to clean between brick pavers, blow away old leaves, pick up garbage and wash off signs. We are so grateful to our cleanup volunteers – and to all of the community members who find little ways to make a big difference for our city.

It can be as simple as picking up a piece of trash you see where it shouldn’t be or applying a fresh coat of paint to the exterior of your home or business. We see these beautification acts happening every day in Tillamook, and altogether it amplifies the beauty of the place where we live, work and play.

Beware what you read on the internet

There was an item in the news this morning (June 9th) about a person calling themselves a doctor who testified before the Ohio legislature that people who are vaccinated against the Covid-19 virus become magnetized so that their car keys, for example, stick to their foreheads. Also that the vaccine was somehow “activated” by signals from 5G cell towers. My first reaction was to note that she forgot to mention that space lasers cause vaccinated people to glow in the dark. My second reaction was to be appalled: apparently no legislator laughed at the nonsense she was spouting. And this brings up a serious issue. People find things on the internet and believe them, especially if what they are reading agrees with what they already believe or want to believe.

The internet is a wonderful tool for learning things.

Unfortunately, it is also a much better tool for spreading mis-information, dis-information and downright lies. When I was teaching electrical engineering I carefully and frequently advised my students to believe nothing that they found on the internet unless they could independently verify that information or they could be sure that the source could be trusted. For example, I told them that they could be pretty confident about what they found in the Transactions of the IEEE or in the Physical Review, since these only published papers that had been reviewed for scientific accuracy and truthfulness by several people independently of each other and of the editors. I urge anyone who is seeking information on the internet to try to verify what they find independently before believing it. And verifying something doesn’t mean that if

Mooks softball athletes, coach recognized by Cowapa League

Building a legacy

December of 2019 we saw the hiring of a new head softball coach at Tillamook High School. She was set to coach the 2020 season in normal fashion as they had happened year after year.

One of the first orders of business, Richardson decided, was to provide a softball hitting and pitching facility that any program would be proud of. The complex itself was built and used for the high school program and named for its longtime coach and supporter Jack Colleknon. Colleknon took so much pride in the program and the grounds so it is only fitting that we continue on the tradition of improvement and forward progress for our female athletes here in Tillamook County.

Richardson, a THS alumnus, played softball on varsity all four years of high school and then went on to play after she graduated. She developed her love of sports into coaching at a young age and finally found her way back to Tillamook County to give back to the community that had raised her. After months of legwork and meetings with the school district, Coach Richardson was granted the opportunity to show the administration that with some strong community support these girls could and would raise enough money to see this dream a reality.

With the onset of COVID-19 in early 2020, there were more setbacks and disappointments than anyone could have imagined. High school students everywhere were having things stripped from them on a daily basis and we didn't know when

things would look normal again.

“We were already suffering the loss of the softball season, but now we were unsure of when we would all be together again,” Richardson said.

That is when the decision was made to pursue the fundraiser for the facility.

“We have so many supportive families inside our organization and once they all discussed our options it became clear that we could make this happen for our girls,” Richardson said.

Tillamook County Creamery Association and their Community Enrichment program had put out an application for a grant earlier that year and it seemed as though it would be a long shot. The final submission was done during the two-month quarantine but with the economy at a stand still it almost seemed as if it would never happen. Richardson decided that at this pivotal

time the youth needed something to look forward to more than ever.

With all of the setbacks and hurdles of virtual meetings and working remotely, TCCA and Stewardship Committee finally met in June of 2020 and came to a decision. It was with great joy that they awarded the Tillamook High School softball program an initial grant of \$5,000 as well as a matching grant for up to \$25,000. The terms of the grant were that the program would be given six months time to match those funds. It seemed like a lofty challenge but as the girls were told what needed to be done they immediately stepped into action raising \$5,000 before the meeting had even adjourned.

Within a week, letters were sent to community partners, calls were made and just like that, it started to seem realistic. As the deadline approached, the project had collected over

30 donations from several private donors and businesses in the local area, most recently from Tillamook High School's own Charity Drive Grant Project.

One last push was made in the final month and as of March 2021, the letter arrived from the association that the grant had been fully matched and funded. Richardson and her team met with representatives from the enrichment committee on May 18 for a check presentation and some words at the building's new site at Tillamook Junior High in the west parking lot.

“I couldn't be more grateful for the help that we received along the way from the amazing administrators and staff at TCCA as well as our team at the Tillamook School district,” Richardson said.

This summer, once the final bell rings on this school year, the hope is to start construction. Tillamook High School Softball Association will finally begin a 50' x 72' build-

ing at the softball complex for generations of budding ball players. This building would include dual hitting and pitching lanes, weight training and conditioning equipment, and ample storage space.

The building will be erected on the west side of the Tillamook Jr. High located next to the softball and baseball fields. With this addition to the program, Tillamook is sure to see a vast increase in participation and results. Providing a space for off-season training out of the weather and with the proper equipment, the future sure looks bright.

The second round loss placed the Bobcats in the bracket competing for fourth place with Lakeview, North Douglas, and Toledo at Redmond High School in central Oregon.

The Bobcats faced Special District 3 champion North Douglas next on Saturday morning, May 22. In the first inning, Nestucca stranded three runners with no score and committed 2 errors which led to the Warriors taking an early lead. And in the third, North Douglas scored again to extend their lead.

In the fourth, Royster swung and landed a big hit off of the left field fence. She crossed the plate on put-outs

hit by Nia Chatelain and Sedenius. In the top of the fifth, Jr. SS Rachel Strober and Sr 3b K Samek landed singles and they both scored behind Royster's and N. Chatelain's additional singles. North Douglas did not respond and it was a tie game 3-3 in what would be one team's final game of the season.

Then the Bobcats' bats exploded in the sixth. Highlighted by Lyndie Hurliman's

2 RBI double, the cats batted through the lineup and scored 6 to take a 9-5 lead.

"We did that quite a bit this year – batting through the lineup. The other team may give us an error, the girls get super-confident and all hitters get on. We have done that in multiple games. It absolutely takes the other pitcher out of her game. This is the third time in two different games at state that we went through

the entire lineup. Coach Lane really prepares the girls well," added Schiewe.

That was it for the Bobcat offense and the defense allowed one more run to secure the 9-6 victory and to matchup against the Honkers from Lakeview, who won their game with Toledo.

In the final contest, Lakeview held the Bobcats scoreless and had good success on offense and won by a score of

11-0 in six innings.

"Just a great tournament. We may have ended kind of flat, but we saw two other district champions in Lakeview and North Douglas. We dominated a strong Echo/Stanfield team in the first round -- really, the girls just played well. We played two on Saturday and were one of the final eight teams playing," concluded Schiewe.

Bobcat basketball thumps Gaston on the road

In what was an absolutely amazing performance, the Nestucca High Bobcats boys basketball team played it's best game of the season in a 61-39 win over the Gaston Greyhounds June 9 at Gaston High School.

The Bobcats improved their Northwest League record to 3-1 and 5-3 overall. Nestucca is hoping to win it's final two games to keep alive its chance to qualify for the Class 2A Culminating Week state playoffs June 21-26.

In its second game of back-to-back contest's on June 10, Nestucca lost 52-30 to the Willamina Bulldogs (4-1 league, 5-2) in a nonleague road contest Thursday. The Bobcats faced the Knappa Loggers (3-0 NWL, 6-2) Monday (results unavailable because of Headlight Herald press deadline) and have two more contests remaining.

Nestucca, guided by second-year coach Justin Hartford, concludes its short 11-game spring season with a 6 p.m. road game Wednesday versus the Neah-

Kah-Nie Pirates (0-3 NWL, 1-4), followed by its season finale June 18 in a nonleague matchup on the road against the Sheridan Spartans (5-1). For seniors Ivan Palos, Tyler Hagerty and Ozuna, it will be the final game of their Nestucca High School career.

"After leading 21-20 at halftime, we just ran out of gas against Willamina," said Hartford. "It's tough with consecutive games and we played really tough at Gaston the day before and they're a decent team. They (Gaston) played a full court press for most of the game. Our energy level just wasn't as high as I expected (versus Willamina). The guys played good, but our shot just weren't falling. You could tell fatigue was starting to affect us in the third quarter."

Nestucca junior Skyler Wallace led Nestucca in scoring with 12 points against Willamina, the first place team of the Class 3A Coastal Range League. Last Wednesday versus Gaston, Wallace was again the leading scorer with 17 points and his Bobcats teammates had an outstanding overall performance

as well in a blowout win over the same team that they beat at home 48-44 on May 26.

"It was by far the best game this year and they finally put a full game together for us while moving the ball well on offense and just playing great team basketball," said Hartford. "On defense, they were moving as one group, they chased every loose ball and they were really playing very aggressively. We have everyone healthy now, we played with a high energy level and they all just played a great game. Skyler stepped up and played a big role offensively and defensively and as our floor leader, he really gets the job done well. He rebounds well, he shoots good and he's just the full package for a basketball player."

In a seesaw first quarter that included two lead changes and two ties, Nestucca sophomore guard Cody Hagerty (season-high 11 points), sank a jumper to help the Bobcats tie the game 15-15 at the end of the first quarter.

Gaston scored the first four points of the second to take its largest lead of the

game at 19-15. From that point on though it was all Bobcats as they simply took control of the contest and had the momentum going their way for the remainder of the game.

A 14-0 Bobcats run, capped by Hagerty's three-pointer from the top of the arc, included baskets by senior Juan Ozuna (15 pts.) and Wallace helped that put Nestucca up 29-19, forcing a Gaston timeout with 2:20 left in the quarter.

Following the timeout

Gaston narrowed the margin to 29-21. Wallace then sank a pair of free throws and Osuna hit an eight-foot baseline jumper to help Nestucca take a 33-21 halftime advantage.

The two teams traded baskets for most of the third, with Nestucca in front 43-33 after three quarters. The Bobcats utilized an aggressive two-three zone defense throughout the game and it payed off in the fourth. The Bobcats created turnovers and scored a number of fast break baskets, including a layup by

junior Jaysson Swirtz (eight pts.) that helped extend the margin to 49-36 lead midway through the fourth.

Back-to-back three-point field goals by Wallace and Ozuna made it 55-36, forcing a Gaston timeout with 3:07 left in the game. Senior wing Tyler Hagerty (four pts.) later sank an outside jumper, capping a 14-0 Bobcats run to make it 61-36 with less than one minute remaining in the game.

“I felt like I was at the bottom of a deep well with no way to get out.” This is how one patient described their depression symptoms to me. Another patient having panic attacks said, “All of a sudden I was terrified and thought I was going to die, but I didn’t know why.”

Our mental health is just as important as our physical health, and the two are closely connected. After all, our brain is part of our body. Over 20 years ago I experienced an episode of depression that required medical treatment. I, too, felt like I was at the bottom of a well. I couldn’t understand why people around me were enjoying life when I could not find any enjoyment in my own life.


I sought medical help and I successfully made my way through and came out the other side. I learned from that episode that self-care is vitally important to both our physical and mental health.

Many of the lifestyle choices that improve our physical health can also improve our mental health. Mental health problems can sometimes be just as serious as physical health problems, so don’t hesitate to contact your health care provider if you have any concerns.

The National Institute of Mental Health says it well, “Mental health is more than the absence of a mental illness—it’s essential to your overall health and quality of life.”

What steps can we take to be mentally healthy?

Move! – No, I don’t mean pack your bags and re-



cate. I mean move your body! Walking 30 minutes a day can work wonders. It can even be broken up into 10-minute walks, 3 times a day. If you can only walk 20 minutes or 10 minutes at a time, go for it. Join a walking group for group support and fun interaction. Or, watch for the TBCC catalogue

in your mailbox each quarter for the latest group fitness programming from partners like the Tillamook YMCA and NCRD.

Spend time outdoors – science tells us that we get extra benefit from being outside. Being outside can be a chance to take a break and enjoy some peace.

Make Healthy Food Choices – including lots of fruits and vegetables and whole grains in your diet helps reduce inflammation, helps with digestive health and helps you feel better overall. The Mediterranean Diet is a good place to start.

Sleep – try to get a minimum of 7 to 8 hours of sleep as often as you can. Avoid using your cell phone, computer or TV close to bedtime because blue screens can make it harder to sleep well.

Stay connected to positive people - Spend time with supportive friends and family. Healthy relationships help us feel better.

Relax – try to set aside time daily for yourself to sit and relax without using your computer, TV or cell phone (unless you are using a relaxation app). Try meditation, prayer, yoga, Tai Chi, Qi Gong or other calming activities. This is time for YOU. Check the schedule at the Tillamook YMCA for free community classes such as Tai Chi and Qi Gong.

Practice Gratitude – make a list of things you are grateful for, and before you go to sleep at night think of 3 positive things that happened during the day.

If you are already feeling stressed or overwhelmed, this list might be too long to tackle

all at once. Choose one activity from the list to focus on and give it a try. I have been working on getting consistent sleep and it has made a big difference in how I feel.

What can we do to help a friend or loved one struggling with mental health issues? The best thing to do is to be present. Be with them. Listen. You don’t have to give advice or try to solve their problems. As someone who has been in that situation, I can tell you that just having someone there by your side can make all the difference in the world.

And if you feel you might need professional help, please know you have options. Talk to your health care provider. Many primary care offices have mental health professionals as part of their patient care team to make it easy for you to get the care you need.

Like physical health, mental health is not just one condition. In the way that our physical health can be affected by a wide variety of issues such as asthma, diabetes or high blood pressure, our mental health can be affected by a variety of issues including anxiety, depression, PTSD, bipolar disorder and others. The National Institute of Mental Health web page has a list of Health Topics to help us learn about and understand our mental health.

Knowledge is power. Understanding mental health helps us be better able to manage it. And, self-care is the one thing we can do for ourselves, often at no extra cost.

Is now the time for a gap year?

Uncertainty has reigned over many students for the last year-plus. As the COVID-19 virus spread across the globe, schools were forced to transition to virtual learning. Some did so full-time, while others offered hybrid learning plans that combined virtual learning with in person instruction. Confronting that transition proved exhausting for parents and educators, but students also could not be blamed if they felt a little academic fatigue as they navigated learning during the pandemic.

Some students may have no choice but to carry on with their studies until schools return to more traditional, full-time classroom settings. But students about to graduate from high school or college may be wondering if now isn't an ideal time to take a gap year. Others may

be intrigued by gap years but not be entirely certain what they are. The following information can help students determine if a gap year is right for them.

What is a gap year?

The Gap Year Association defines a gap year as "a semester or year of experiential learning, typically taken after high school and prior to career or post-secondary education, in order to deepen one's practical, professional, and personal awareness." The GYA notes that no two gap years are alike, though the spirit of a gap year is to afford students a chance to expand their comfort zones and have a cross-cultural experience while ensuring they have the time to reflect on those experiences.



Do gap years derail students' academic careers?

Parents might be concerned that a gap year will derail students' academic careers by decreasing the likelihood that they will ultimately return to school. However, the GYA reports that 90 percent of students who take gap years enroll in a four-year institution within one year of completing their gap year. That can quell some of the concerns parents and even students may have about taking a year off from school at a time when many of their peers may be moving forward with their educations.

What do students do during their gap years?

Though the GYA notes that some space and time to explore the unknown is vital to a gap year, students who think a gap year may be right for them should know that such years are most effective when students engage themselves in activities designed to expand their horizons. Many students spend their gap years volunteering with a service organization while others may accept an internship to see what life in a given profession may be like.

Students have had to confront many challenges during the pandemic. Recent grads experiencing fatigue as a result of those challenges may find that now is the ideal time to take a gap year.

Boost chances of getting a new job

The recruiting strategist ERE Recruiting Intelligence estimates that 250 résumés are submitted for each corporate job opening, and the first submission occurs within 200 seconds after a position is posted. In such an environment, procrastination can be costly.

There also is stiff competition for those who think they will simply keep a résumé posted online and wait for the jobs to roll in. BeHiring says the popular job-hunting site Monster.com receives 427,000 résumé postings each and every week. Getting a better idea of how the hiring process works today can improve professionals' chances of getting a new job or even switching careers.

Understand there is a "hiring funnel"

Recruiters use a specific model for every job posting. Informally



dubbed the "hiring funnel," this is a reference to the number of total applications they need to generate in order to get a single hire. On average of the 1,000 who see an online job posting, 200 will begin the application process, 100 will actually follow

through and only 25 résumés will be screened out, according to Talent Function Group, LLC. Among that final 25, between four and six will ultimately be invited for an interview.

Be creative with a résumé

Hundreds of people are vying for the same job, and human resources personnel who review applicants may spend 10 seconds reading over each résumé. As a result, it is essential to make a résumé stand out. Areas most perused on a résumé include job titles, companies worked for, start/end dates, and education. Make sure these key areas are visible and impressive.

Also, many résumés are scanned electronically, meaning if you do not format a résumé the correct way or use the appli-

cable software mentioned (often PDF formatting is rejected), the résumé may never get flagged and seen.

Network responsibly

Always connect with people you think can bring career benefits in some way rather than blindly networking. Keep your social media image professional as well, as you never know where a good lead or networking opportunity may come from.

Dress the part

If you're one of the lucky ones who earns an interview, keep the good momentum going by dressing in a manner that is appropriate for the role in which you are interviewing. Tidy hair, clean fingernails, minimal jewelry, classic attire, and a pleasant attitude can make a difference.

Do your research

Always conduct background research on the company you're interviewing with and the industry it's a part of. This way you'll be better apt to answer any questions that come your way. Don't be afraid to also prepare questions that you can ask the interviewer to show your interest.

Consider temp jobs

Rejections will certainly happen as you go along, but do not sit idly licking your wounds. A temporary position is better than being unemployed and can get your foot in the door. Work with a recruiter who may be able to place you in temp jobs, especially positions with an employer you have your eye on.

These tips and more can improve applicants' chances of getting a job.

universities dressed their scholars in gowns from the 1700s onward. In 1786, one school, Brown University, even mandated that degree candidates be clad in flowing robes and caps at commencement ceremonies. Though educators and students may no longer wear caps and gowns when attending class or around campus, the tradition of doing so at commencement ceremonies has endured.

Tassel turning

The tradition of turning the tassel does not have the lengthy history of the cap and gown, dating back only decades rather than centuries. Graduates typically turn the tassels after everyone has received their degrees during the ceremony. The turn is symbolic of their transition from student to graduate.



Tassels start on the right for high school students and college undergraduates and are then turned to the left, while recipients of master's degrees and doctorates keep their tassels on the left throughout the commencement ceremonies.

“Pomp and Circumstance”

This tradition marked by the playing of “Pomp and Circumstance” is rooted in the work of William Shakespeare, which makes it seem like a perfect fit for graduation ceremonies. Sir Edward Elgar composed “Pomp and Circumstance” in 1901 and the title for the song was inspired by a line in the bard’s “Othello.” Elgar received an honorary degree from Yale University in 1905, and during that ceremony “Pomp and Circumstance” was played. The song apparently made a strong impression, as it soon began to be played at various commencement ceremonies, a tradition that continues today.

Diploma display ideas

Many graduates are excited about the prospect of receiving their diplomas. Once in hand, the document can be put on display. The following are some unique ways to showcase diplomas at home or at work.

One of the classic ways to display a diploma is in a frame. Many businesses offer customized framing where the frame material and the matting can be chosen. Some grads may want to include a photograph of the school or a picture of the graduate above the diploma. Gradu-



Create a shadow box

Consider displaying the diploma with other mementos

from school. A shadow box is a large, deep display frame that can house items that are thicker than photographs or papers. Items such as a graduation tassel, medal or other award, a varsity jacket patch, or a program from a school performance or awards

ceremony can be placed in the shadow box.

Display the diploma among other framed photos from school activities. This can elicit a trip

down memory lane every time the wall is viewed. Some families may want to display their diplomas together, especially if multiple family members attended the same school.

Various online art vendors can turn the diploma into different works of art. For example, engravers can laser engrave the diploma onto a wooden plaque. Then the diploma can be displayed in one location and the wood plaque in another.

Display the diploma beneath the glass top of a coffee table. When entertaining guests, the diploma can make for a unique conversation piece.

A school diploma is worthy of recognition. There are various creative ways to display these documents that reflect the hard work and success of their recipients.

What's the difference between valedictorians and salutatorians?

may ask students to apply for review and then consider various factors, including grades, level of academic program, essay submission, and even contribution to school and community life.

Certain schools may have one salutatorian, while others may have two or more. The college guidance resource Transizion says the salutatorian is usually the individual ranked second in the graduating class. A salutatorian will deliver the salutation, otherwise known as the opening speech of the graduation ceremony. The valedictorian speaks later in the program.

In addition to valedictorian and salutatorian, students also may become familiar with other terminology, including class rank

and “cum laude” recognitions.

Class rank refers to a student's GPA in relation to other students in the same grade. Class rank may be an actual number, such as ranked 30 out of 900 students, or a percentage like the top 5 percent of the graduating class.

Cum laude is a Latin phrase that means “with praise/honor.” Educational institutions use one of three phrases to signify academic degrees that were awarded with honor. The phrases usually are utilized by colleges and universities. Schools have different criteria that must be met for these honors. Summa cum laude is the highest level of distinction, magna cum laude is next and that is followed by cum laude.

It is a great honor to be named valedictorian or salutatorian, and it is an honor worth celebrating at graduation and beyond.



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
