COVID-19 cases stay at six

No new positive cases of COVID-19 have been reported in Tillamook County as of Monday, April 27. Cases in the county remain at six.

In a County Leadership Team Teleconference on Monday, April 27, president of Adventist Health, Eric Swanson, said the hospital saw 18 vehicles Sunday, April 26, and one person was screened for COVID-19. Adventist Health received guidance from the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) on Friday, April 24, for non-urgent procedures. Restrictions for visitors will remain in effect.

"We're seeing less and less people being screened," Swanson said. Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administrator Marlen Putman said the center has seen a decrease in people being screened as well. According to data released by OHA on Friday, April 24, Oregon has prevented as many as 1,500 hospitalizations and 70,000 positive COVID-19 cases.

"We're monitoring, the hospital is monitoring, the state is monitoring daily and weekly to see what those numbers are looking like, including working with our dental providers," Putman said.

The center is looking at the American Dental Association for guidance with reopening. They will also look for additional guidance in the next two weeks for what restrictions will be loosened.

"We'll have some additional testing to do over this next week to address those populations that have been identified for expanded testing," Putman said.

Tillamook Family Counseling Center is continuing to provide telehealth services. They are anticipating forming some support groups.

As of April 27, there have been 2,311 positive cases in Oregon, with 91 deaths and 48,964 people tested. There have been zero deaths in Tillamook County and 254 negative cases.

According to the OHA, as of Friday, April 24, Oregon's cumulative positive testing rate has remained consistent at about five percent tests performed. The national average is 18.4 percent. Oregon's low test positivity rate reflects decreasing numbers of individuals with COVID-19 symptoms due to Gov. Kate Brown's stay-at-home order and increasing testing statewide.

State eyes lifting order on non-urgent procedures

Gov. Kate Brown announced Thursday, April 23, that she will be lifting her order delaying non-urgent procedures for health care providers, as long as they can demonstrate they have met new requirements for COVID-19 safety and preparedness. Hospitals, surgical centers, medical offices, and dental offices that meet those requirements will be able to resume non-urgent procedures on May 1.

In a press teleconference held April 23, Brown said Oregon is in a position where she can lift the executive order on non-urgent procedures. Brown had halted non-elective procedures that required person protective equipment (PPE) on March 23. People can now start to think about much-needed medical or dental work.

Medical providers will need to demonstrate they have the ability to minimize the risk of coronavirus transmis-

County leadership discusses governor's framework for reopening Oregon

The Tillamook County Leadership Team teleconference discussed in their call Wednesday, April 23, Gov. Kate Brown's

framework for reopening Oregon: a plan Brown introduced on April 14 to restart public life and business while maintaining healthy Oregon communities. Oregon must first slow the growth of COVID-19, as well as acquire adequate personal protective equipment (PPE) to protect health care workers and first responders. Once that is done, Oregon can begin to reopen by ramping up COVID-19 testing capacity in every region of Oregon, developing a robust contact tracing system to track and contain cases, and establishing a quarantine and isolation program for new cases.

Eric Swanson, president of Adventist Health Tillamook, said the hospital has a good supply of PPE and they are ready to begin reopening steps. The hospital has 25 beds normally but can expand to 50 beds. The hospital is ready to open back up for normal business.

Marlene Putman, administrator of Tillamook County Community Health Centers, said revised COVID-19 testing has expanded to provide for medical, frontline workers, and grocery workers. The new revised guidelines state to increase testing of these groups.

"By expanding that testing, they'll have a better idea of who really is impacted, even including some that are asymptomatic," Putman said.

The center is continuing to do testing and follow up investigation. The emergency preparedness coordinator is continuing to order and distribute PPE. Commissioner Bill Baertlein asked if restaurants will have to be inspected before opening back up or if that will happen on a normal basis.

"We are still doing inspections for those restaurants that are providing take out," Putman said.

Putman said there may still be things that need to be checked before reopening.

Oregon State Rep. David Gombert said Oregon is under increasing pressure to reopen but needs to do so cautiously. Chairman David Yamamoto said the county has been in contact with Lincoln, Clatsop and Columbia counties to coordinate together on reopening. Reopening on a slow and consistent basis will be a challenge.

The state parks department said they are coordinating with cities where state parks are located and are considering a limited day use.

Commissioner Bill Baertlein said the county will be trying to reopen for residents in the near future. Discussion in the teleconference was aimed at doing this in a slow and safe manner with the health and safety of residents a top priority.

Tillamook County voters. By running I believe I am giving the choice back to the voters and providing them with a passionate and competent choice.

What experience do you have that makes you the better candidate? Due to the

limited length of this response I will highlight a few of the important things. I have spent my entire career with Tillamook County Sheriff's Office, earning the respect and trust of my coworkers and my community. I am a member of the Tillamook

County Fair Board and enjoy being involved in the community and being part of this team. I am a certified instructor in multiple areas and have a passion for being a part of recruit development and this allows me the opportunity to be a part time instructor with DPSST. I am in the middle of my career which gives me the experience to be Sheriff as well as the time to see things through.

What is the biggest issue you want to fix in the department?

Fair and equal treatment of all staff members will be a huge part of what I would

address. When I started at the Sheriff's Office there was a very strong bond between coworkers which gave us a family atmosphere. This positive environment promoted healthy working conditions which increases productivity and creates a high level of service to the public. The corrections division would be another strong focus as staff hiring and employee retention continue to be an issue. Inconsistencies seem to be prevalent as well, and all this creates low morale.

I have many goals and ideas, far more than I am able to list here. Some highlighted ideas would be my hope to reestablish the Reserve Program, the Tactical Team, the Traffic Enforcement position, and the Civil Deputy position. All of these once existed and were valuable tools but unfortunately are no longer a part of the Sheriff's Office. Another is to strengthen the relationship with the public we serve through face to face contacts, press releases, social media posts, and town hall style meetings. I have always believed in positive, proactive policing and this will be another focus of mine.

Ocean policy is important to a coastal county and my work over the past decade+ has provided new direction to the State concerning ocean energy and will be equally important as we maneuver through offshore wind.

Tourism is becoming the 4th leg of our economic stool, and I was an early proponent of pivoting from a heads-in-beds approach to destination management which will help to alleviate undue pressures on our residents.

What experience do you have that makes you the better candidate?

I have 23 years experi-

ence in forest products, 20+ years as long-term care specialist as well as being a real estate broker having spent most of this time as business owner.

Past and current experience includes Chair, Futures Council; Chair, Pacific City Citizens Advisory Committee; Commission on Transportation; TC4 and STCEVC Emergency Preparedness; Governor appointee to Ocean Policy Advisory Council and Oregon Broadband Advisory Council; Chair, Council of Forest Trust Land Counties; Tillamook Working Lands and Waters Cooperative; Marie Mills Board; Salmon SuperHWY Executive Team; Oregon Business Council Water Policy Team; Small Business Development Center Board; Association of Oregon Counties – Executive Board – Gover-

What is the biggest issue you want to fix in Tillamook County?

The biggest issue we face today is economic recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic. Our plan to use TLT revenue to support our small businesses has been blocked by the State and ORLA. Revenue forecasts for the County, State and Feds are in shambles. The difficult decisions made over the last 2 months were to protect the life/health/safety of our residents.

We must now get our

economy back on track without increasing the risk of infection. I will capitalize on existing relationships with Federal and State legislators and agencies to help maintain our county services. They must also understand that business as usual must change with a new focus on efficiencies, not paperwork and permitting. Our near term future will require a steady, fiscally responsible hand as we maneuver the new economic and medical realities.

What are your goals for Tillamook County over the next 4 years – what do

you want to accomplish if elected?

Being the Governor appointed Commissioner to Oregon Broadband Advisory Council, providing high speed fiber internet to the home is a top priority. For the past several months, I have planned a pilot project in Tillamook County and last February proved this to be feasible and affordable. The Covid-19 pandemic has delayed this rollout, but I will continue to champion this project.

Affordable workforce housing is something I have been intimately involved with these past few years

and working with local business interests, we have identified an opportunity to provide 200+ homes, but have hit a roadblock at the State level. This idea will not go quietly into the night.

Emergency preparedness is something we cannot avoid. While it seems we are confronted with windstorms, floods, tornados and now pandemics, we must prepare for the inevitable Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake. This will create a disaster of unfathomable magnitude and we must all be prepared to fend for ourselves for many weeks in not months.

As a not-for-profit professional I have dedicated my life to the service of others. Through each agency I have worked for, I have served a specialized sub-population. For example, through CARE I support those in need. What experience do you have that makes you the better candidate?

As the Executive Director of CARE, I lead a \$3.6 million organization with 60+ employees. I am responsible for both daily operations and outside relationships. I create and manage our budget to ensure we have adequate

revenue to pay our staff and our bills, I ensure that we are providing efficient and effective services, and that we are meeting all local, state and federal laws. I am responsible for advocating at the state and federal level, and creating and leading community coalitions. These are the skills that are needed in your next county commissioner.

Additionally, I currently serve on the Tillamook County Budget Committee and the Housing Commission providing me with direct county government experience and knowledge that will allow me hit the ground running.

What is the biggest issue you want to fix in Tillamook County?

I believe the greatest issue in front of us is finding a shared path through the changing face of Tillamook County's population and economy. Whether you are used to our quiet little towns and are now feeling overrun by tourists, or if you are a resident that is concerned that our traditional industries are damaging to the environment, the feelings are strong and communication can be challenging. Tillamook County is growing and changing and we must work together to very intentionally create

a future that we all want. To accomplish this, I believe it is time to engage in a comprehensive and inclusive process with our residents to create a vision, and to create a plan to achieve that vision.

What are your goals for Tillamook County over the next 4 years – what do you want to accomplish if elected?

Let's share some good news: The Tillamook Farmers Market is returning in 2020, with a new opening date of June 13. Per Gov. Brown's Executive Order, farmers markets are considered an "essential business."

Why? Because they offer communities the opportunity to purchase fresh, locally-grown foods that they wouldn't have access to otherwise and support farmers who are making a living by feeding their communities. Sounds pretty essential to me.

However, it won't be the Market that you've come to expect from us the last two years. And that's OK. We are all making adaptation to normal life, and the Market will be no different. Here is what you can expect to find at the Market this year:

Many of your favorite vendors selling produce, plant starts, craft, baked goods, hand-made soaps and lotions, flowers and more. They will

just be spaced out more to allow each vendor enough space to keep them safe.

New signs welcoming you to the Market and reminding you to utilize the hand sanitizer and hand washing stations, maintain social distancing with other customers and vendors, and only touch what you're going to buy.

SNAP customers will still be able to spend those dollars on food, and receive a match for fruits, vegetables, herbs, mushrooms and nuts via the Double Up Food Bucks program.

You won't find live music, kids games and activities, or tables and chairs to hang out with friends at. This isn't the time to be hanging out, lingering, or meeting up with friends. We all want to be there again someday (maybe even before the season end) but in order to do that we have to make some sacrifices now in the interim.

My hope is that the community will continue to come out and support these farmers and small business owners who rely on the Market to help sustain their businesses.

We know traditionally our Market attracts a lot of out-of-town visitors who won't be able to patronize our vendors this year, so we need our local community to be intentional about buying their produce, berries, bread, and other goodies from our vendors. Now is the time to shop small and shop local as often as possible to ensure that all of our businesses – including farmers market vendors – make it to the other side of this pandemic. It is these small businesses that make our community vibrant, fun, and full of soul and losing them would be devastating. So many of them give back to the community in abundance year after year and now it's our turn to give back to them.

So shop small, shop local, and come June shop the Tillamook Farmers Market.

If you're interested in being a vendor this year, you can find a link to the application at tillamookchamber.org. Our season opens June 13, and we are still accepting new vendors up until the season starts.

These are unprecedented times. Each one of us is impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Restaurants have shifted to take-out and delivery, our K-12 educators are teaching online, many in our community are suffering hardship. These are uncharted waters. 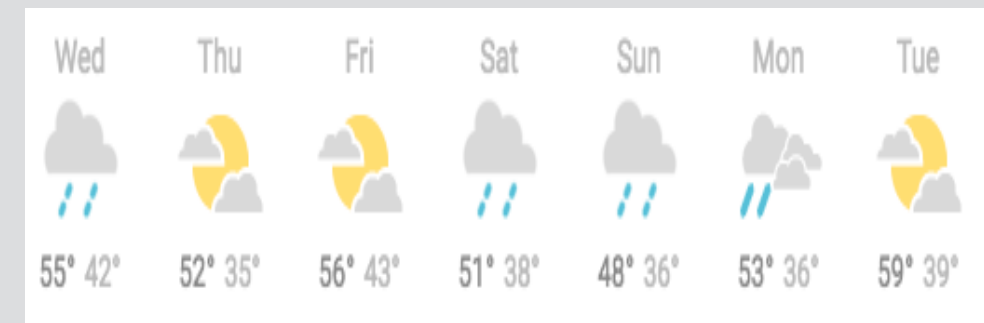

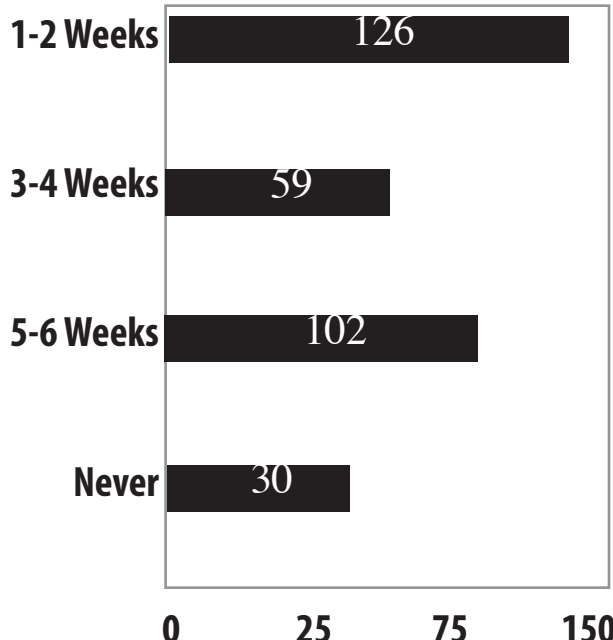

With the various orders in place and an obvious public safety emergency, why is it that the Board of County Commissioners has not directed the Sheriff's Office to pursue citations to individuals that continually, habitually, violate the standing orders? This would certainly get their attention and the story of actual enforcement would likely spread faster than the virus itself. Of course, the other option is to openly admit that, in point of fact, resident safety is simply one of the priorities on the same list as re-election. County Boards across the state need look no farther than the very data that they receive on a daily basis to see what happens when the Covid-19 virus is allowed to spread unchecked. TBCC students work full-time (or more than full-time with multiple jobs), have families to raise and support, and struggle to make ends meet each month even before the pandemic struck. Earlier this year, TBCC students participated in a national survey conducted by the Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice called #RealCollege. The survey was taken by approximately 30% of TBCC students. Results showed that 53% of the respondents experienced food insecurity in the prior 30 days. This is defined as the limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe food, or the ability to acquire such food in a socially acceptable manner. Sixty percent of respondents experienced housing insecurity in the previous year. This includes a broad set of challenges such as the inability

to pay rent or utilities, or the need to move frequently. Finally, 27% of respondents experienced homelessness in the previous year. This means that a person does not have a stable place to live. For all three of these categories, results for TBCC students were significantly higher than the rates of all survey respondents at two-year colleges nationwide. It was painful to learn.

TBCC is working incredibly hard to support our students and our community. We appreciate and value everyone who continues to contribute to scholarships and emergency funds to support students during these uncertain times. We are working diligently to understand student need and develop ways to get resources in their hands. And we will continue to listen to the needs of the community and adapt to meet new and evolving ways to deliver educational opportunities. We are in this together and we are here for you.

The following is a letter to the Tillamook County Commissioners

As a short-term rental owner I would like to advocate for some sort of grant/return out of the TLT fees and taxes I have dutifully collected over the years. I understand that both the City of Seaside and the City of Manzanita have managed to do this.

Having worked for non-profits in our community for 40+ years at low wages and no benefits, this income from my rental is the bulk of my retirement income. (I also have a long-term rental that I rent very affordably at under-market rates to "make up for" the rates I can charge short-term vacationers.)

You can imagine that the COVID 19 virus situation has hit me hard and I am leaking money. I have had to refund over \$8,000 so far, starting with folks afraid to travel even before the County's ban. There are more cancellations to come even if the ban gets lifted for the end of May (which I am not optimistic about). The situation for the summer months hardly bears thinking about!

I have been happy to collect these TLT taxes, especially when they support local infrastructure and facilities that serve us all. And I have just paid this year's \$250 licensing fee. However, at this time it seems a priority should be keeping us small owners afloat. Assuming the current grant requests are similar to last year, most, though worthy, seem like "icing on the cake" in the current pandemic situation. (As a side note I have always had questions about the amount of TLT funds that go to presumably non-local advertising firms to lure more people to come to Tillamook County, threatening the quality of the natural areas we have the privilege of sharing.)

It probably isn't feasible to target funds to owners like myself who live here and depend on this income as opposed to folks for whom this is an investment or a way of paying for their beach house.

But I pray that some reasonable solution can be found that recognizes us as small business owners who are vital to the local tourist economy and are greatly impacted by this pandemic.

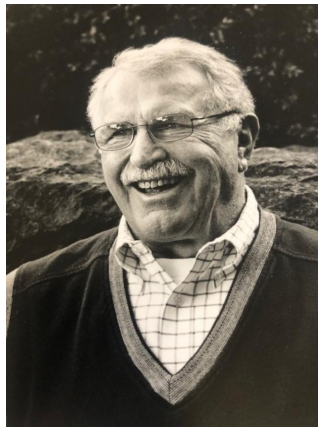
Virginia to live with Roger Sr.'s family during his years of service.

sion to patients and healthcare workers, maintain adequate hospital capacity in the event of a surge in COVID-19 cases, and support the health care workforce in safely resuming activities.

Brown said she is grateful to allow non-urgent procedures to continue and that Oregon is on the right path to fighting the virus. She said Oregon needs to proceed with this step cautiously and carefully.

Under the framework, medical providers must also demonstrate that they have an adequate amount of PPE available for health care workers, following CDC guidance for the extended use or reuse of PPE. Hospitals must continue to report PPE supply levels daily to the Oregon Health

Authority. Hospitals must also demonstrate adequate COVID-19 testing capacity when needed, including the ability to screen patients before non-urgent procedures, and follow strict infection control protocols.

Dr. Dana Hargunani of the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) said COVID-19 hospitalizations have been flat. One of the aggressive measures to cancel elective procedures was necessary, but prolonged procedures come at a cost to Oregonians. Hospitals must minimize transmission of the virus, to maintain adequate hospital bed capacity, to reduce financial impacts, and more.

"Health care facilities must start slowly," Hargunani said. "They must maintain hospital bed capacity at or above 20 percent in order to accommodate for the potential increase in hospitalizations ahead."

Criteria will be reassessed biweekly. Hargunani said the

state will continue to monitor and update as needed. The framework is a balanced and safe way to get health care workers back to work. The OHA asks that facilities postpone procedures that require critical resources.

"This is one small step towards reopening our state and its only possible because of all the work we've done together to contain COVID-19," Hargunani said.

Someone who called in to the teleconference addressed that some people feel the announcement has come too soon. Brown said Oregonians on the frontlines have conserved PPE and companies big and small are making PPE. Hargunani said the increase of PPE has been critical and adequate PPE is in place for health care workers.

On the question of testing, Hargunani said OHA has been targeting people most at risk of contracting COVID-19. OHA

has expanded guidelines to include those who are asymptomatic. Dr. Bruce Goldberg of the Governor's Medical Advisory Panel said as testing capacity grows, more people will be able to be tested.

"We need to have a robust public health system in place that can continue to do surveillance testing amongst our population," Brown said. "It's a little different than our flu surveillance network because it will have to be more rapid acting and more extensive but essentially it's the same concept."

Brown said it is critically important for Oregonians to get access to medical and dental care. Hargunani said procedures that will be allowed are elective or non-urgent such as joint procedures, biopsies, etc. Those types of procedures include those that need to be scheduled ahead. Other types of health care have been maintained.

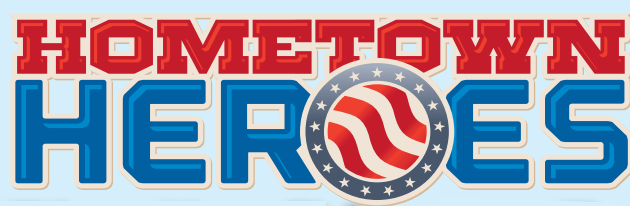

Have you started your victory garden yet? The Walzes are growing garlic, radishes and kale, and they have planted beans and broccoli in a cold frame. Steve and Karen are still eating off last year's Swiss chard and carrot crop. Steve has been prepping the remaining raised bed areas by spading in agricultural lime for tomatoes, cauliflower and a bonus veggie of some sort; he says they are still learning what grows well here. They also have an indoor lemon tree that is struggling to return to its once-thriving self. Arla Ayers employs an "early seed starting system" with heat mats and lights; she teaches this method to Master Gardener and Seed to Supper groups. Her "from seed, early

indoor" crop includes tomatoes, broccoli, artichokes, dill, basil, and cucumbers. She has also planted raised beds with lettuce, spinach, peas, carrots, radishes, and onions. Arla is also growing strawberries from bare root in a vertical, stacking planter called "Mr. Stacky." The Klobases are eating chard that is coming up on its own, rhubarb and chives, plus they always have mint. They also have a tree that has produced limes. My husband, Pete, is the gardener in our family and has planted kale, lettuce, spinach, tomatoes, chives, onions, carrots, and potatoes, with basil yet to come. Spring has sprung and it's time to garden!

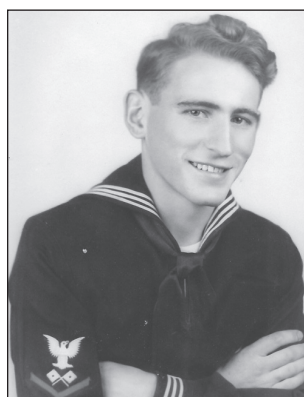

Each weekend Maggie (the Chihuahua) and I run local errands; we visited Monkey Business 101 last weekend. I needed to replace a rhubarb plant that didn't survive the winter. Barbara Brown, who owns the nursery (located just north of Brooten Road off of U.S. Highway 101), is open her regular hours with social distancing measures in place. She tells me that three quarters of what she's selling this season are edibles.

"Do you remember the idea of a Victory Garden?" she asked. I do. Victory gardens were planted during both World Wars, when food was rationed, to improve folks' self-sufficiency and to boost morale. According to Barbara, many locals are growing Victory Gardens in response to Covid 19. Often, according to Barbara, three generations are in on the act - with grandparents showing grandchildren how to garden. If this appeals, but you lack deer

proof space outdoors, you might consider growing a windowsill full of herbs, or a salad garden in hanging baskets.

Maggie kept her grooming appointment that morning at South Paws Groom Shop (also open with safety measures in place). I wandered the downtown Cloverdale neighborhood as I waited, spotting a new business in town. "Curious- Plants and Treasures" has a window full of plants for sale, and promises other delights. I had a nice chat with the owner, Linda, who is employed with Nestucca Valley Schools. She tells me that her little shop will open for business when Covid-19 restrictions are lifted. The enterprise is housed in the quirky purple house (where Illene Mazura lived) directly across from Rusty Cow Antiques on U.S. Highway 101 in Cloverdale.

Bear Creek Artichokes has joined other local eateries in offering a takeout menu. They're located in Hemlock (3 plus miles north of Beaver on U.S. Highway 101). The phone number is 503-398-5411 and they're open from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily.

tsp salt, dash of pepper, 1/3 c fine bread crumbs, 1/3 c milk; Mix well and set aside; Mix Bisquick dough to directions and add remaining cooked minced onions to dough; Roll dough into a 12X9 inch rectangle; Spread hamburger mixture and roll lengthwise as a jelly roll; Seal edges and cut into 12 slices; Place cut side up on greased baking sheet; Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) for 15-20 minutes, or until done; Serve hot with marinara or green pea sauce. (My note: I always cook the hamburger before I add any other ingredients to it and bake at 375 degrees for 15-20 minutes or until done). 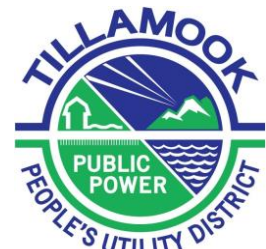

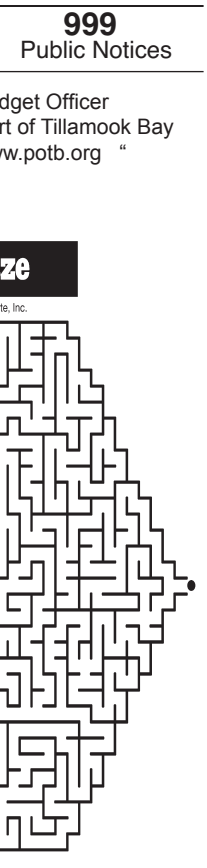
