State owes \$1 billion to rural counties for timber lawsuit

The state of Oregon was in breach of contract with more than a dozen counties including Tillamook and 151 tax districts for not maximizing timber harvests and related payments in the past two decades, according to a Linn County jury.

A trial regarding the matter lasted nearly a month and was concluded on Wednesday, Nov. 20. A jury found the state must pay \$1 billion dollars in damages for lost revenue after the state failed to cut down enough trees since 2001. The payout includes future damages under the assumption that state forest management will continue status quo. The state reportedly plans to appeal the verdict.

If the appeal fails, Tillamook, Washington and Linn would reap large portions of the judgment out of 15 forest trust counties. Despite being a major timber producer, Clatsop County opted out of the lawsuit. Klamath County was removed from the case by the judge because its forests operate under a pre-2001 forest management plan. No funding mechanism for paying the judgement has been put in place at this time and state budgets are nearly universally challenged by gaps.

Noting the jury's short deliberation time of just a few hours, Tillamook County Commissioner David Yamamoto issued a statement following the decision that a nearly 80-year-old contract was breached by the State of Oregon.

The trial, which was held in the Circuit Court of Linn County and



presided over by Judge Thomas McHill, began with jury selection on Oct. 24, 2019. The lawsuit was origi-

nally filed in March 2016. Yamamoto said during the trial the jury heard more than hundreds of hours of testimony and reviewed hundreds of exhibits, some going back to the early 1900s.

"It is expected that the State will likely appeal the verdict, but while this continues to drag through the appeal p

to drag through the appeal process, 9-percent interest will accrue which is over \$90M per year," Yamamoto said in the statement. "After attorney's costs, Tillamook County's share of the verdict could be roughly

\$332 million. However, we have 20 taxing districts that receive almost 75 percent of our timber receipts from state forest harvests. Yamamoto said Tillamook

County's taxing districts receiving timber receipts include three school districts, Tillamook Transportation, Tillamook Bay Community College, NW Regional Education Service District, three Port districts, North County Recreation District, 4-H Extension and many others. "Since 1998, when

the State Legislature changed the rules of the 1941 Forest Acquisition Act, rural forest trust counties were expected to shoulder the financial burden of these changes," Yamamoto said. "The rapidity of the verdict after a month-long trial and awarding of full damages by the jury shows the strength of the trust counties case."

Responding to news of the judgement, Tillamook School District Superintendent Curt Shelley said in past years the district has made some difficult decisions which resulted in cutting positions. Shelley said additional funds would be well received and would be a great investment for students.

Neah-Kah-Nie School District Superintendent Paul Erlebach presented a letter to the Oregon State Board of Forestry in March of this year and has been following the timber lawsuit closely since the beginning. He has testified to the forest board twice to stress the importance of sustainable forest harvest and to support maximizing timber harvest on Trust Lands.

Erlebach firmly believes that excess volume is added to the growing standing inventory at the expense of counties, communities, special districts and school districts that are reliant on an equitable harvest rate and corresponding timber sales to fund critical services.

Erlebach also thinks state and county officials in 1941 interpreted greatest permanent value to mean the state would manage forest lands to maximize timber production and to transfer these revenues to the counties, taxing districts, and school districts. He said this is not the first time

of turkeys were donated by Safeway for The Schooner's Thanksgiving Benefit, which donates 100 percent of their proceeds to the Oregon Food Bank – Tillamook County Services.

This is the largest fundraiser for the Oregon Food Bank Tillamook Services and was created by Tommy Flood Jr., who passed away this past January.

"Tommy Flood Jr., who passed away suddenly at the beginning of this year, started this fundraiser over 10 years ago. The event started by raising a couple of hundred dollars and has grown to over \$26,000 last year. Tommy greatly attributed this level of growth to the commitment that Patrick Criteser, Tillamook County Creamery Association (TCCA) president and CEO, made several years ago, for the Creamery to provide funds to inspire others to give," Melissa Carlson-Swanson, branch services manager, Oregon Food Bank Tillamook County Services.

"The Schooner team is determined to continue this event to honor Tommy's memory, as fighting hunger in Tillamook County was a very personal and important cause for him.



These funds allow our [Oregon Food Bank] team to be responsive and nimble in improving our programs to better meet the needs of our community. For every \$1 raised, 10 meals are provided for the community," Calrson-Swanson said.

Tillamook County Creamery Association will continue its support of the Thanksgiving Fundraiser Dinner with a donation of \$5,000 to encourage community support. They have sponsored the fundraising dinner for several years. They are once again donating turkeys and hams to the Oregon Food Bank Tillamook County Services for their Thanksgiving and Christmas food boxes. This year, TCCA will donate 300 turkeys and 100 hams.

"Last year we received all of our turkey from Zweifel Farms, however, due to the circumstances of the beginning of our year with Tommy's passing, I missed the deadline to or-

on flavored vaping products

Gov. Kate Brown's six month ban on flavored nicotine and cannabis vaping products is on hold with new rulings Nov. 14 by the Oregon Court of Appeals.

Last month, the Court temporarily halted the ban on only flavored nicotine vaping products. It has now extended the stay and granted a stay covering the ban on flavored cannabis vaping products as well. While a judicial review is conducted, enforcement of this rule will be discontinued.

Until the judicial review is complete, licensees are not prohibited from processing, transferring and selling products previously banned.

The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) had filed temporary rules Oct. 11, that put into effect Brown's Oct. 4 executive order banning all flavored vaping product sales in the state.

"The court's decision to enter stays last week is unfortunate in light of the ongoing public health threat posed by vaping-related illness and the alarming growth in the use of vaping products by Oregon youth," said Charles Boyle, govenor's office press secretary.

"What is clear is that it is far past time for the Trump Administration and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to follow through on their promises to ban flavored vaping products so that we can protect children across the country from vaping-related illness and lifetime of nicotine addiction."

Boyle said in the meantime, Brown will continue to work with stakeholders and the Legislature to find long-term solutions to protect the public health from vaping-related illness. Brown continues to urge Oregonians to heed the public health warning of the OHA and to stop vaping immediately.

Oregon Sen. Jeff Merkley, the top Democrat on the Appropriations subcommittee overseeing the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), released on Nov. 18 a statement regarding reports that

Habitat selects families for Eighth Street townhouses

What does 'home' mean to you? Rest. Peace. Memories. Safety. And the ability to nail something into the wall.

The question circulated around the table as three Tillamook Habitat for Humanity families met at the Tillamook Restore for a time of fellowship. LeeAnne and Julius Mitchell moved into their Habitat house on Miller Avenue in Tillamook a little less than a year ago and will get to enjoy their first Christmas as homeowners.

"I'm feeling like this is the best part of my life right now," LeeAnne said. "It's the first time in my entire life having a consistent, safe, house."

Her husband Julius agreed, adding

that it's a place that their two kids will create happy memories in.

"It's the first time in my life I have a feeling of security," Julius said. "There's not another person like a landlord that causes anxiety."

This year, Tillamook Habitat for Humanity has broken ground on their newest build: two attached townhouses on Eighth Street in central Tillamook.

And the Mitchell's are ready to mentor the newest Habitat families on their journey to home ownership.

"Who better than someone who's been through the process," Executive Director Cami Aufdermauer said. "Families that are connecting and supporting each other."

Josh Gingerich, Habitat's Construction Manager, is overseeing the project and expects to be completed sometime this summer.

Amanda Swift and her daughters Kimber and Kali are one of the selected families. As a single parent, Amanda struggled to find safe, affordable housing, even while being employed with the State of Oregon.

"I applied to Habitat two years ago," Amanda said. "I needed to do more work on my finances. They reached out to me this year and I asked if I wanted to reapply. I had worked on my finances...and we were selected."

Amanda is looking forward to building memories with her girls, and expanding their family.

"We get to have a dog," she said. "It seems small, but it's another member of a family, and a way to teach my girls responsibility and independence....I am grateful to the community. It's not just funded by Habitat, but the community."

Their neighbors will be Misty and David Wickersham along with their three kids.

David admits that he thought he'd never own a home.

Gainfully employed with Precision Timber the Wickersham have also struggled to find housing for their growing family and have lived in the same apartment for the past 10 years. "We get to raise our kids in a good environment: in their home, not an apartment," Misty said.

Both families have taken financial education courses, and will need to complete 500 hours of sweat equity on

The Bay City Council met Nov. 11 for their workshop. The council talked about the opening of the city planner

position. Mayor Christopher Kruebbe asked if the city planner and the city recorder positions be advertised. Attorney Monson said the City of Bay City's policy said they are going to advertise but they can promote from within.

Councilor David McCall said he supports making this transition to making a city manager. Chance Steffey, currently the public works director, is someone the council is thinking of promoting within. As city manager, he would still be doing the duties of public works director, temporarily, which the council worried may be an overwhelming load.

Manzanita officials discuss next steps in city hall project

City officials discussed stepping back from the new city hall project during a special workshop meeting of the Manzanita City Council in early November. The meeting followed the news that the bond measure to fund the \$6.5 million project was voted down by the community.

"I remain committed to the goal," Councilor Hans Tonjes said. "The need we have to get staff into safer facilities and be prepared for some growth – but clearly, there's a reboot."

Mayor Mike Scott suggested resuming talks on the project after the first of the year. Councilor Steve Nuttall, reflecting on the wide margin of the vote, said the council needs to take some time exploring why so many were against the bond measure. He said the coming year should be spent trying to better understand the desires of the community, noting a series of other projects requiring attention. "There are wounds that need to be

healed, and there are friendships that have been damaged," Nuttall said. Nuttall also said the council and the

community have been hamstrung by the low tax rate in Manzanita – one of the state's lowest – that provides very little revenue to fund city operations or growth, making revenue streams from grants, new taxes or bonds essentially the only method to fund large projects.

Councilor Thomas Aschenbrener echoed the commitment to safer workspace for city staff. He said it's been well documented that the current facility is not safe. He agreed with taking a pause until January and trying to get a better read on what the people want in a new city hall and emergency services hub. Nuttall said immediate action is still needed regarding front desk security issues and the lack of adequate restrooms at city hall. He said the money for those upgrades should be found as quickly as possible. However, Tonjes said a previous attempt to find contractors willing to do the smaller projects had fallen flat. City Manager Cynthia Alamillo confirmed a lack of contractors and later rising costs had halted previous project attempts.

"We still have those plans and I think it's important for council to revisit that improvement," Alamillo said.

The vote on Bond Measure 29-159 was just 31.5-percent in favor, 131 'yes' to 284 'no' with nearly 78-percent turnout, according to updated unofficial election results. The \$6.5 million bond measure was unanimously approved by the council with support from the mayor, but public opposition led to a lengthy debate about cost-cutting options and a series of public hearings.

The proposed bond's funding mechanism was a 50-cent tax increase per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The project includes construction of a city emergency hub, police office, administrative and workspaces, multi-purpose room and a kitchenette with storage spaces. The funds were expected to pay for demolition and construction.

The new facility was expected to be built at 11,776 square feet and designed to meet long-term needs for multiple purposes. The site selected for the project was the Underhill property, featuring a former school

building that sits out of the tsunami inundation zone, unlike the current city hall. Much of the public debate centered around remodeling or tearing down the buildings at the site.

City officials issued a statement following the defeat of the bond measure that said compromise with the community would be sought in order to solve the issue of needing a new facility to house city operations.

the 1941 Forest Acquisition Act has been interpreted by the courts as a contract between the state and the counties.

The Oregon Department of Forestry issued a statement saying the agency believes balanced, science-based public forest management produces the best long-term outcomes for all Oregonians, including the counties and taxing districts that receive revenue from state forests. The forestry department said it was disappointed by the jury decision and would be reviewing options with attorneys from the Oregon Department of Justice.

Witt also said he did not know where the money would come from for the massive judgement against the state. He said it would be a serious challenge for the government and suggested a settlement could be worked out before the taxpayers bear the full brunt of the award.

State Senate Republican Leader Herman Baertschiger Jr. (R-Grants Pass) issued statement after the judgment and said the "extra money" had better not be spent because the state will have to pay for decades due to forest mismanagement. "This morning, the economic forecast said we had an additional billion dollars," Baertschiger said in the statement. "This afternoon, a jury said they want it back."

Public officials talk winter preparedness

Officials from numerous local, county and federal agencies met in late October in Tillamook to discuss annual preparations and expectations for the coming winter season.

The meeting began with a winter forecast from senior service hydrologist Andy Bryant of the National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration (NOAA). Bryant said those who are local to Tillamook County already know it's not going to be dry and sunny all winter long. Before March, it's possible there will be high winds, floods, snow, and other difficult wintry weather.

"Will we get maybe a little bit of low-elevation snow," Bryant said. "There's probably a little bit better odds than usual."

Predictions for this past year were overall slightly above-average temperatures and slightly below-average precipitation due to the weak El Nino situation. For the most part the predictions were realized except for a cold snap in February that saw more rain as well as a wet April. Rockaway Beach saw some damage from high surf, and high tides caused problems for low-lying roads in Nehalem, but for the most part it was a quiet year.

Bryant said 2019 could be similar to 2018 in terms of winter weather, though not necessarily for the same reasons. The overall outlook is a bit on the dry side, and winter temperatures are expected to continue being above-average in the long-term. Winters in the Pacific Northwest have been trending warmer in recent years.

November and December are expected to be the wettest months, which is typical, but predictions are not strong regarding precipitation. January through March shows a continued likelihood for above-average temperatures locally. Precipitation may creep up above average in the spring.

In general terms of snow expectations, Bryant said historic patterns shows the possibility of snow occurs under conditions similar to what's expected for the coming winter. However, he noted that coastal communities are generally too close to the ocean to have a good chance of snow. The ocean is always above freezing, making it unlikely to achieve the cold air and moisture conditions needed for snow at the same time.

Flood potential is another story. Bryant pointed out that nearly every winter the Wilson River floods. Major flooding is not expected this year due to the forecast of neutral conditions for the year, but Oregon has seen an expanding flood season and local agencies are closely watching the weather conditions.

TCCA named 2019 Outstanding Philanthropy Corporation

Tax kicker percentage revised

The Oregon Office of Economic Analysis (OEA) adjusted the "kicker" for the 2018 tax year from more than \$1.5 billion to \$1.6 billion earlier this month. That means an increase in the amount returned to taxpayers.

The state hasn't issued kicker checks since 2007. The surplus will be returned to taxpayers through a credit on their 2019 state personal income tax returns filed in 2020.

To calculate the amount of your credit, multiply your 2018 tax liability before any credits-line 22 on the 2018 Form OR-40—by 17.171 percent. This percentage is determined and certified by OEA. Taxpayers who claimed a credit for tax paid to another state will need to subtract

your credit in the 2019 Oregon personal income tax return instructions: Form OR-40 for full-year Oregon residents, Form OR-40-P for part-year residents, and Form OR-40-N for nonresidents. Composite and fiduciaryincome tax return filers are also eligible.

Keep in mind, the state may use all or part of your refund, including the kicker, to pay any state debt, such as tax due for past years, child support, court fines, or school loans.

A What's My Kicker? calculator will be active on Revenue's website for personal income tax filers when filing season opens in January. To calculate your kicker, you'll enter your name, Social Security number, and filing status

You're eligible to claim the kicker if you filed a 2018 tax return and had tax due before credits. Even if you don't have a filing obligation for 2019, you still must file a 2019 tax return to claim your credit.

Free Fishing after Thanksgiving

It's easy to #OptOutside in Oregon on the Friday or Saturday after Thanksgiving—you can fish, crab or clam for free anywhere in the state.

Oregon Fish and Wildlife hosts annual Free Fishing Days the two days after Thanksgiving. That means on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 29-30, no fishing licenses or tags (including a Combined Angling Tag or Columbia River Basin Endorsement or Two-Rod Validation) are required to fish, crab or clam anywhere in Oregon.

Got relatives or friends visiting Oregon from out of state? They can come along, too-non-residents are also free on these two Free Fishing days. Although no licenses or tags are required, all other fishing regulations apply including closures, bag limits and size restrictions. See the Oregon Sport Fishing Regulations to find out more.

If you're planning to fish for salmon, steelhead or marine fish, make sure to check the zone where you are fishing in ODFW's Recreation Report for the latest on season and bag limits because regulations for these species

change in-season. The Recreation Report comes out weekly and also features the latest on fishing conditions and opportunities, so check it out before you make your Free Fishing Days plans. Beginning anglers can try fishing for holdover trout available where lakes and ponds have been stocked earlier in the year; trout are actively feeding in preparation for winter. Crabbing can be also be good during the winter months-remember ocean crabbing is closed through Nov. 30 but crabbing is open in bays and estuaries, and on beaches, docks, piers, and jetties.

If you are crabbing or clamming, don't forget to call the Shellfish safety hotline at 1-800-448-2474 or check ODA's Recreational Shellfish page to make sure an area is open before heading out. The Oregon Department of Agriculture regularly tests shellfish to make sure naturally occurring biotoxins are not at levels that make crabs and clams unsafe to eat.

Neah-Kah-Nie School District to provide swim lessons for all Nehalem Elementary students.

There have been many reports of how the pool helped people overcome their fear of water, recuperate from illnesses and accidents, and in a number of cases helped to save someone's life later on. Over the years, NCRD has added programs that benefit families, senior citizens and persons with disabilities. The new pool will be completely ADA accessible, and this will add yet another benefit to the community for decades into the future.
