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COVID-19 vaccine update: 65 and older to use eligibility form

Tillamook County is at 352 confirmed positive COVID-19 cases, as of Thursday, Feb. 11, according to the Oregon Health Authority. Tillamook County had 13 new confirmed positive and presumptive cases of COVID-19, from Jan. 24 to Feb. 6, the Tillamook County Health Department reported. The county will remain in Lower

Risk for the next two weeks, effective Friday, Feb. 12. If cases increase by 30 or more cases in the next two weeks, the county would be at risk of moving up in risk level effective Feb. 26. Staff in the three public school districts have been vaccinated, Emergency Coordinator Ed Colson said during a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, Feb. 10. “A total of 2,310 Tillamook

County residents have been vaccinated so far,” Colson said. Because of high call volumes, all residents 65 years and older are asked to use the eligibility form on the health center’s website at <https://tillamookchc.org/coronavirus/vaccines/> or access the form directly at <https://bit.ly/2LEZucy>. The health department is no longer able to schedule vaccine appointments by phone or email. If you need assistance filling out the form,

call 503-842-3914 or email tcchc@co.tillamook.or.us. Colson said once you submit the form, you should receive confirmation that it was received. Every resident on the form will be contacted and can receive a vaccine. It may take several weeks to receive a vaccine. “We have heard from Oregon Health Authority that the allocation we receive is supposed to be consistent throughout the week,” Colson

said. Colson said pharmacies in Tillamook County will soon be able to administer vaccines. More information will be coming when available. Colson said the department is working with vaccine partners on messaging about the second vaccine dose to put information out about expected symptoms. OHA says ‘breakthrough’ cases are no surprise Some pharmacies begin receiving doses

Oregon health officials are now reporting four cases of COVID-19 in individuals who have been fully vaccinated against the virus. The cases, called “breakthrough cases,” come as no surprise, as no vaccine for any disease is completely effective, according to Dr. Dean Sidelinger, the state epidemiologist who spoke to reporters in a briefing Friday. “These breakthrough cases are not unexpected,” Sidelinger said. “No vaccine provides 100% protection, and clinical trials of both vaccines presently in use included breakthrough cases. In those cases, even though the participants got COVID, the vaccines reduced the severity of illness.” Those clinical trials have shown that around 95% of people who get vaccinated don’t end up catching COVID-19 — and that those who do catch it have significantly milder symptoms than if they hadn’t, Sidelinger said. Officials from the Oregon Health Authority say two of the cases were reported in Yamhill County, and two were reported in Lane County. That’s just four breakthrough cases of over 177,000 people the state’s reporting are fully vaccinated against the virus. Oregon is one of the first states in the nation to report breakthrough cases, since most states have only just begun to have people who fall into the “fully vaccinated” category, which comes two weeks after their second dose of the vaccine. Still, Sidelinger said the vaccine is still going to be the state’s most important tool in fighting the COVID-19 pandemic.

“More Oregonians are getting vaccinated by the day, and the existing vaccines offer unprecedented levels of effectiveness,” Sidelinger said. “The quickest and most direct route out of this pandemic is to get vaccinated while you’re eligible.” Vaccinations will need to ramp up to about 25,000 per day statewide in order to achieve community immunity by Autumn, according to OHA Director Patrick Allen. While some days the state has already hit that target, vaccine dose supply is still far below the state’s capacity, Allen said. He added that the state is slightly behind its expected timeline for vaccinating teachers and educators across the state. Three weeks ago, OHA projected it would have allocated 59% of the vaccine doses needed for educators by this point, but it’s only reached about 50%, Allen said. In positive news, Sidelinger reported Friday the state has returned to levels of daily virus transmission not seen since the fall, allowing some counties across the state to reopen some businesses for the first time in months. “These decreases are a testament to the actions all Oregonians have taken to slow the spread of COVID-19,” Sidelinger said.

Vaccine availability expands

The state is also getting more help in its race to distribute the COVID-19 vaccine. Allen said Friday the state’s weekly dose allocation would be increasing to about 82,000 doses, up from the previously announced 75,000 a week. Select pharmacies across the state have begun receiving and administering doses of

the vaccine. According to Stephen Certo, who directs pharmacy operations for Safeway and Albertsons stores in Oregon, that set of pharmacies includes over 100 Safeway and Albertsons locations across the state. “We as a company, we’re thrilled to be a part of it, and be able to provide vaccines to the communities we serve. So we are really excited,” Certo said Friday. Residents can see available locations and sign up for vaccination appointments at www.albertsons.com/pharmacy/covid-19.html or www.safeway.com/pharmacy/covid-19.html. Some Costco stores and Health Mart Pharmacies have also received doses of the vaccine and will begin scheduling appointments. OHA’s Allen confirmed that, starting Feb. 15, individuals over 75 will become eligible to receive the vaccine. While the state’s projected increase in weekly doses is a good sign, the effects won’t be immediate. “That’s good news, but we know those doses are still months away,” Allen said. What’s more, even the very small number of breakthrough cases signals Oregonians must continue to keep their guard up against the virus, even if they’ve been fully vaccinated against the virus. He pointed to the spike in cases the state saw during the spring and summer, as some activities began reopening after the pandemic’s initial lockdown. “I think we all need to remember that period, and remind ourselves we’re still not going back to the way things were the way before,” Allen said. “We’re going to need to continue to wear masks, to socially distance.”

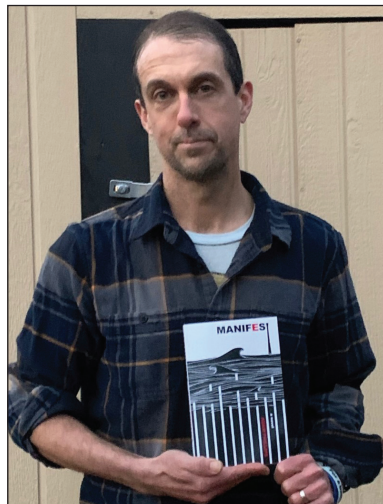

Rockaway author draws on early baseball in recent novel

Rockaway Beach resident Adam Phillips recently had a novel published. The book, “Manifest,” takes place largely in Tillamook and Rockaway Beach.

“Manifest” was published by Montag Press out of the Bay Area. It is available on Amazon and Phillips hopes it will soon be on the shelves of local bookstores such as The Little Crow and Cloud & Leaf Bookstore.

Phillips has lived in Rockaway off an on for six years, along with his wife Stephanie and sons Ezra and Harlan. “As soon as we arrived, I became interested in the local history, and you see a lot of that represented in the book, with the majority of the action taking place in Rockaway, Tillamook and Portland,” Phillips said. Phillips said the initial idea of “Manifest” centered around a true story that took place in Wyoming in the early 20th century. A warden ended up housing several former pro and semi-pro baseball players on death row in the prison. After actively recruiting several more former players from other institutions, the warden began taking his squad out on barnstorming tours, betting on their success. After a while, the underperforming players found their names moved up along the schedule of executions. “I’ve always been a huge baseball fan, with a particular affinity for its earliest existence,” Phillips said. “The pastime used to be so much seedier, a decidedly counter-culture way to make a living, and the players seemed so much more colorful and interesting. Nowadays, as with so many things, the MLB has become so specialized and beholden to money that the game is less spectacle and more business, with the bottom line of each win representing a certain dollar amount in ticket sales and merchandise.” Phillips added that he believes baseball games are now more efficient, but less entertaining, as with the players. “With so much of them getting into fulltime training at a young age, at the expense of other interests, and so much team control over their personal lives, so much care given to their media presence... you just don’t get the wonderful weirdos and larger-than-life characters that defined the first several decades of the game.” The novel could not have been written anywhere other than Rockaway Beach, Phillips said. His family’s house is in the woods. “With the pounding waves and the mist coming up through the trees, and that feeling of the epic, vast darkness at the westernmost edge of the world runs through every sentence,” Phillips said. “I look forward to hosting some readings/signing when the world gets back to a place where that’s allowed,” Phillips said. “I’d be more than happy to mail signed copies to anyone wanting to purchase from me directly.” You can purchase the novel directly from Phillips by emailing adam.mendax@gmail.com

Oregon MESA continues program virtually

Oregon-based STEM-focused nonprofit, Oregon MESA (Mathematics Science Engineering Achievement) has created a student-friendly Invention Tool Kit and a mentor-based coaching program for students, educators and classroom to build their own microprocessor-powered invention right at home.

The Invention Toolkit is an innovative curriculum framework for middle and high school educators designed to help female, low-income and students of color practice using invention to solve real-world problems. Executive Director Tong Zhang said Oregon MESA was an

after-school program that has now become virtual. Offered with full trainings and ongoing support for educators of all backgrounds, the toolkit facilitates the full invention process, from inception to product development, with an introduction to invention and human-centered stages and concepts, design activities, worksheets and lesson guides, and a pacing guide for implementation.

The students receive an ideation kit, which consists of craft materials to create prototypes, Zhang said. They also receive a micro:bit processor, which can power their devices. They will be able to create an invention based on their client's need in the community.

A past project was devel-

oping an invention for a client with visual impairments. The students created a class-seeking robot. Another client was senior citizens. The class created pill sorters of many different types. One was created for a senior citizen who was colorblind.

Zhang said this year, students are developing a device for their family, or "La Familia," as the project is also called. Also new this year, because of the experience of virtual learning, is the coaching program, which pairs STEM professionals and a college student to mentor those MESA students. They provide homework help and help them explore their career interest.

Oregon MESA alumna Yareli Torres Rincon started the program in 2013 at her school.

"It was a very hands-on experience," Rincon said. Rincon said through Oregon MESA, she got to learn things about engineering and problem-solving. The students received prompts and were asked to build things in groups. She is now able to assess problems from her experience.

Rincon moved to different schools after her freshman year of high school and said she did a lot of allocating to try to get the program at her new school. It was eventually established after she graduated.

Rincon said working with a group, she learned there are people who have different skills. This helped the group approach a project from different angles. One project she worked on was how to create a prosthetic arm.

"There were also miniature projects," Rincon said.

One of the clients the students had was a woman in Uganda who had to go outside at night to use the restroom, which could often be dangerous, Rincon said. The students created a source of light the woman could use outside. There were other miniature projects related to finding new things to create.

Rincon was in the Oregon MESA chapter for three years and has been working alongside them for seven. She is now a MESA mentor, guiding students through this year's project. She is also a family coordinator for Oregon MESA.

"It's my way to give back to this program that has helped me," Rincon said. "It's been a supporting part of my life."

Rincon is a freshman at Portland Community College and is interested in studying electrical engineering or project design. She is also enrolled at Portland State University, where she will finish her degree, and then move on to law school. She wants to be a patent attorney, securing and protecting an

inventor's property rights.

"I aspire to have my own firm and help other inventors," Rincon said.

Zhang said due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all curricula was pivoted to be delivered virtually. They have also worked to get the kits directly to students, rather than the schools. This year, Oregon MESA has delivered 500 kits directly to students.

Oregon MESA is also more engaged with families in the program, Zhang added. This includes helping them set up different access needs.

Students are recruited into chapters at the schools, Zhang said. Invention Clubs are also open to students. This is an open enrollment virtual program to support students during the COVID-19 pandemic who have limited access to a MESA School Program at their school. To be eligible for

the Invention Club, students must be qualified for free/reduced lunch. If a school does not have an Oregon MESA chapter, students can start one. All of Oregon MESA's programs are free to students.

According to Oregon MESA, its 35 years of equipping educators with curriculum for invention education and creating innovators has helped improve graduation rates, as well as college admissions among its program participants. There is no experience required to get started in MESA.

Rincon said as a person of color, she feels Oregon MESA has been beneficial to her.

"I'm very grateful for those experiences that put me on the path I'm on," Rincon said. "It gives you the tools you need to succeed in life."

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Rockaway Beach man arrested on alleged child pornography charges

On February 10, 2021, the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office Detective Division was assisted by the Rockaway Beach Police Department when they executed a search warrant at a residence in Rockaway Beach, according to a release from the Tillamook County Sheriff's office.

Jordan Richard Neahrng, 23, of Rockaway Beach, was arrested and lodged at the Tillamook County Jail on charges related to the alleged possession of child pornography.

According to TCSO Detective Andy Christopherson, the investigation began when he received a tip from the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force, and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC). The information received was that someone was accessing and downloading images of child pornography at a residence in

Rockaway Beach.

"During investigations like these, it is my belief that the victims are not only being victimized when the offense of the initial images are taken, but revictimized every time these images are used, shared, or traded by people," said Det. Christopherson.

Neahrng admitted to Detectives that he has been accessing images of child pornography for several years. Several electronic devices were seized from the residence and will be forensically examined. Detective Christopherson noted that there was no evidence to show that any other residents of this house were aware of Neahrng's criminal activity. Neahrng was initially charged with 5 counts of Encouraging Child Sex Abuse in the First Degree and five counts of Encouraging Child Sex Abuse in the Second Degree. The investigation is ongoing.



"I cannot stress the importance of monitoring children's access to social media, chat rooms, messaging apps, and other activity that occurs on their cell phone, laptops, tablets, and video game consoles. We live in a world where kids primary communication is by electronic means, this unfortunately allows offenders to gain easier access to our children," said Det. Christo-

pherson.

Detective Christopherson stressed that while sometimes daunting, and always disturbing, the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office "will continue to focus on conducting thorough investigations in hopes that these offenders are being held accountable for their despicable criminal actions, and to help ensure the safety of children."

threatening violence against lawmakers and staff who were, at times, hiding just feet away from the mob.

That evidence was "deeply troubling" to some Republican lawmakers, Merkley said.

"So, I think my Republican colleagues were really struggling with the fact that much of their base has been living inside of a Trump media bubble, in which these facts really have not been presented and they don't understand what a big role the president played," Merkley said. "They're strugg-

ling with that, the support of their base, versus what they now know to be the case for the president's role."

On Friday, the former president's legal team presented its defense against the charges, largely centered on the argument that the capitol break-in wasn't a result of Trump's claims, and that he encouraged protesters only to demonstrate peacefully.

To convict the former president on the incitement charge, and open the door to preventing him from running for public office in the future, Democrats will need 17 Republican senators to join their cause, an unlikely scenario.

A vote Tuesday on whether the impeachment trial of a former president is constitutional provided a litmus test for the effort as a whole. Only five Republican senators voted in favor of the trial's constitutionality.

Still, Merkley said the trial is worth holding.

"Failing to do our constitutional responsibility would not bring about unity," he said. "It would be a failure of what the constitution calls for,

and the senate rules call for, which is immediate consideration in a senate trial once the articles (of impeachment) are delivered."

While many Republicans have argued the trial creates a divisive start at the beginning of a new presidential administration and new session of congress, Merkley feels that's not the case.

"This is an opportunity for Democrats and Republicans to come together, to defend our constitution, to defend against the possibility of an imperial presidency," Merkley said. "Realize that the heart of this conversation is about the peaceful transfer of power, a tradition that has been honored by every president since we were founded."

And while the trial comes as millions of Americans are continuing to struggle economically as the COVID-19 pandemic approaches its one-year anniversary, Merkley said the multi-day process won't slow work provide much-needed economic relief.

"We are full steam ahead. We have been arguing since

the pandemic began (that) this is a moment we should all be together as Americans and quit playing politics and get the aid delivered," Merkley said of a proposed \$1.9 trillion aid package slowly working its way through congress.

"We are holding that trial, as the constitution expects, but it's not slowing down, (by) a single day, our response to the pandemic."

Sen. Ron Wyden, Oregon's other Democratic senator, has been fairly quiet publicly about the trial as it proceeds, but was a vocal supporter of efforts to remove the president just after the capitol riot.

After Trump's defense team presented its arguments to senators, managers pursuing the charges had the chance to ask senators to call witnesses to testify, though most lawmakers agree that process would unnecessarily prolong the trial, NPR has reported.

Following closing arguments from both sides, senators voted to acquit the President in the article of impeachment for the second time.

the large object was manroot (Marah oreganus), the root of a wild cucumber plant. The fruit has a very bitter flavor and is poisonous to eat. Native Americans used this plant for medicinal purposes, mashing the upper stalk in water to make a mixture for bathing sore hands. Manroot, also called bigroot, can grow a root up to two feet long, and its vine can grow up to 20 feet long. This isn't the first time we've seen man-in-the-ground on the beach, but it's certainly an uncommon sight.

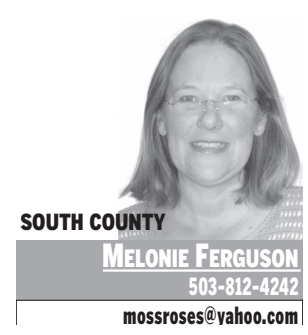
Good news now and

I've had numerous calls asking how to access a Covid-19 vaccine, especially for those without an internet connection. I do social work and am not a communicable disease worker, let alone an expert. To those who called, I advised calling the two



numbers I posted recently in this space. Tillamook County Health Department has a "Covid Line" nurse available at 503-842-3940. A "Vaccine Line" was also recently set up; the number is 503-842-3941.

If you aren't connected with what you need that way, I humbly suggest calling your primary care physician for a recommendation. Vaccination appointments were an option for those eighty and older on February 8, to those age 70 and older on February 15. We're advised to be patient; and to continue wearing a mask and practicing social distancing when we must leave our homes.

Thanks to Melanie Merryman for word that the Library Thrift store will reopen now that Tillamook County is back in the lower Covid-19 risk category. Hours are 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday starting February 17. Donations will be accepted during business hours, "subject to approval."

I hope to get some shopping in on Friday or Saturday there, myself. They're located across from the Grateful Bread Bakery in Pacific City. Succulents galore

In my last column, I shared some ideas for houseplants that will make the indoors a little more cheerful this winter. But one houseplant I wanted to feature this week is more of a category than a single plant. I am talking about the wonderful world of succulents.

The word "succulent" describes a wide range of plants from cacti and aloe vera to the popular hen-and-chicks. The term comes from the Latin word "sucus" which means juice or sap. A general definition is a plant that has fleshy, thickened leaves that retain water in dry conditions.

Of course, succulents are great outdoor plants in an Arizona-type dry climate as they need a limited amount of water and the sandy soil drains well. In Tillamook County, this is not the issue for succulents. We can certainly grow succulents outside in the summer. But in winter, we must assure our succulents don't drown in our rains. So winter is a perfect time to bring some of those succulents inside to enjoy.

As a rule, succulents prefer lots of sun, but they do burn easily so indirect or curtain-filtered sun is best. They like at least four hours of bright light each day. North or east windows will work if you can't filter the direct sunlight.

Some succulents prefer to only be inside in our cool, wet Pacific Northwest climate. These include most cacti like barrel, prickly pear or donkey's tail, and Christmas and Easter cacti. Others, like the popular sedum (stonecrop, for example) and sempervivum (aka hen-and-chicks) are fine indoors or out as long as they are not soaked with rain. If you are growing sedum outdoors – and most of us do – well drained, sandy soil is a must. These are the hardier

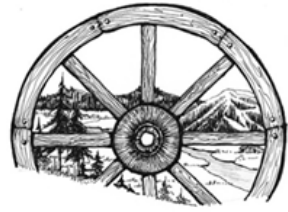
So I hope you will join us THIS Saturday at 6 p.m. at communityimpaction.com.

Sharing and helping our heritage through the Tillamook Coast History Alliance

Tillamook County is not only rich in farms, forests, coastal waters, and cheese and seafood, our human history is front and center in every town, too. From the Nehalem Valley Historical Society in Manzanita to the Dory Fleet in Pacific City, Tillamook County has kept history alive, thanks to the many professionals and volunteers who work diligently to preserve and share our stories. And the history is broad, covering at least 150 years of Tillamook County experiences: textile and quilt museum, historic railroad, maritime museum, air museum, forest center, lighthouse, quilt trail and much more.

However, the COVID pandemic has had a huge impact on these historical organizations. The majority had to remain closed for most of the year, volunteers were often in the at-risk

group, and fundraisers were cancelled. An economic impact report Visit Tillamook Coast did last spring revealed the struggle many were facing, and that was before we knew the pandemic would last as long as it has.

Jaykob Wood recently took the helm at the Tillamook County Pioneer Museum, and Serena Fanning is the new leader of the Garibaldi Maritime Museum. And when the

International Police Museum lost their building lease in Rockaway Beach, community members invited them to a new home in Wheeler.

Last summer, the Tillamook Coast History Alliance asked Visit Tillamook Coast to help them coordinate their marketing and messaging efforts. As part of that plan, we are working toward developing a Tillamook County Cultural Heritage Trail to include video storytelling, enhanced website, brochure and map, and additional events.

We hope these efforts not only inspire visitors to learn more about our area, but also provide locals with a sense of their own history, and support the efforts of our local historical organizations.

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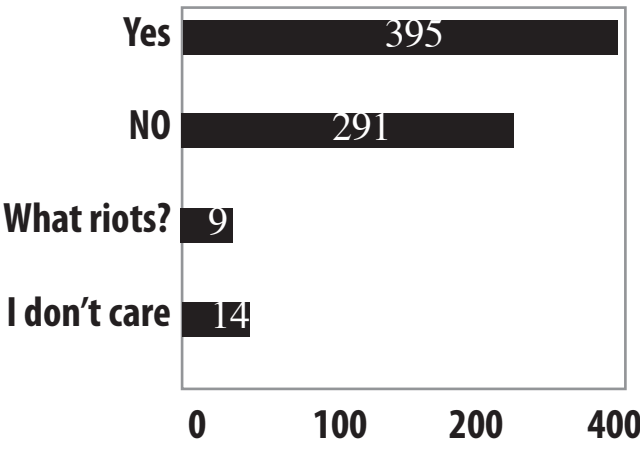

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Getting through tough times

Everyone in the museum business over the past year has had unprecedented struggles in keeping their doors open and their visitors safe. Fundraising events and activities were cancelled. Speakers and lectures, art shows and special exhibits were all put on hold for at least a year. Many museums throughout the county and, indeed, the world have had to close their doors permanently because of the restrictions placed upon them due to Covid 19. Some museums in high-risk areas are still closed.

Add to that the fact that a vast majority of people are not ready to participate in indoor activities and you have what we called "the perfect storm" of no visitors and no income. And in the case of the Garibaldi Museum, our staff was reduced to two, making things even harder.

But we persevered and opened the Museum on week-ends during the summer when we were permitted to do so, and spent a great deal of time sanitizing the common areas of the museum after each group of people left. We held our admissions to only ten people at a time, required masks, took temperatures, and established contact tracing protocols. Yes, we had a dramatic reduction in admissions, but we worked hard to make sure our guests

felt safe and enjoyed their visit.

Most importantly, our Board of Directors spent a great deal of time hiring two new staff members: a new Executive Director and a Gift Shop Manager. Candidates from all over the country were interviewed via Zoom and in December, Serena Fanning came on board as Director and Duncan Maher as Gift Shop Manager.

The Garibaldi Museum is starting a new chapter in our story with new ideas from both Serena and Duncan, as well as the ability to be open five days a week instead of only week-ends. We also will be open year-round going forward.

The Museum currently has a new exhibit by local artist Diane Colcord called "Crocheted Reef, the Oregon Way." This very colorful and creative interpretation of a coral reef will delight and amuse visitors of all ages. Diane explains her work as being "at once figurative, fantastical, worldly and dispersed, the Crochet Coral Reef offers a beautiful impassioned response to dual calamities devastating marine life: climate change and plastic trash."

The Garibaldi Museum will welcome visitors as long as we are able to do so under the regulations imposed by the state. And we are still maintaining Covid masking, distancing, contact tracing and sanitizing. Stop by between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Thursdays through Mondays and meet Serena and Duncan.

Todd loved travel, Duck football and his three German shorthair pointers. His travels took him to Africa, to the Big Island of Hawaii each year and then to Kodiak Island where he so enjoyed fishing. Another highlight was his time in Washington, DC and seeing a case argued before the US Supreme Court. After his retirement to Central Oregon, Todd became very involved with the 3Sisters Equine Refuge where he worked with abused and neglected horses. He had a true gift for instilling trust and connecting with these animals who had suffered so much. 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"WE'LL ALWAYS FIND A WAY"

We'll do this backwards. If you look on the right in the photo above, that's Jon Henry Thompson, part of the third generation. Although he's just 12, he's already done some logging. On his left is his dad, Scott Thompson. Scott and his father, Jon, better known as Mick, who stays as far away from cameras as possible, are partners with Jevon Montre (3rd from left in the photo) in Jon M. Thompson Excavation & Construction of Lincoln City. If you think that's confusing, read further and you'll be amazed at the variety of services the company provides.

When Mick got out of the army and returned from Vietnam, he went to work for Jepson Logging. If you're a movie buff, the logging equipment marked *Stamper* in the classic film *Sometimes a Great Notion* was actually Jepson gear. By 1975, Mick had started his own cutting business. In 1990, when environmental concerns were shutting logging down, Mick started Jon M. Thompson Construction.

Jon M. Thompson Construction builds spec homes, additions, and commercial buildings. It also does remodeling services. Known for outstanding finish work, the company also provides complete site preparation as Jon M. Thompson Excavation. Those services include demolition, road building, utilities, septic systems, bridges, brush cutting, trucking, environmental restoration and sea walls. 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The many forms of self-care

For those of you avoiding the frill and fancy of Valentine’s Day, here are some practical and indulgent recommendations this year from your friendly neighborhood therapist during this romance saturated holiday.

Key Concept: Choose yourself

Whether you’re single, coupled, or “it’s complicated” make sure you are prioritizing your own self-care. The following are ways we love ourselves including the fundamentals like staying well fed and hydrated. They also encourage focusing more on your goals and solo activities that promote wellness.

Physical Self-Care

The human body is performing just a few thousand automatic processes to keep you alive at any given mo-

ment. Even as you are reading this sentence, you’re using your eyes to read, brain to interpret, heart and lungs to breathe, all while presumably holding your bladder.

While keeping this machine running as an adult can sometimes seem like an Olympic sport, there are a few simple ways to maintain healthier living. Some of the basics are:

- Schedule and attend preventative medical appointments
- Be mindful of alcohol and substance use
- Get enough sleep (6-8 hours)
- Eat regularly
- Move your body as often as you can

Psychological Self-Care

Maintaining good mental and emotional health can often be deprioritized with the hustle and bustle of daily living. So much of our day consists of production-based

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Cheesy Potato Soup

Number of servings: 6 cups
Time for preparation (including preparation and cooking): 45 minutes

Ingredients

- 1 medium onion, chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1/4 cup celery, chopped
- 1 teaspoon oil
- 2 cups potatoes, peeled and diced bite size
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 3 Tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 1/2 cups nonfat or 1% milk, divided
- 3/4 cup (3 ounces) cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 Tablespoon bacon bits or 1 slice bacon, cooked and crumbled

Directions

1. In a large saucepan over medium-high heat, sauté onions and celery in oil until onions are clear.

2. Add the potatoes, broth, and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat;

cover and simmer until the potatoes are tender, 15 to 25 minutes.

3. In a small bowl, stir together cornstarch and 1/4 cup of milk until smooth. Add remaining milk. Stir into the potato mixture.

4. Cook and stir until thickened and heated through, about 5 minutes. Do not boil.

5. Remove from heat. Stir in cheese until melted. Top with bacon bits. Serve warm.

6. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

succulents and will survive outside in colder temps, not usually an issue in Tillamook.

Soil is crucial to succulents, especially ones to be grown in pots outside or inside. Regular potting soil holds too much moisture so you will need to mix 1 part perlite or pumice to 2 parts coarse sand and 2 parts potting soil. This gives a nice, easily worked soil that drains well and yet has some nutrients. Over-fertilizing potted succulents can be problematic, so go lightly with well-diluted worm tea or fish emulsion or a balanced fertilizer (15-15-15). Hardy succulents that stay in the ground are generally okay with getting their nutrients from the soil.

Tender succulents are the Echeveria, jade, and aloe plants and, while they are fine outside in the summer, they do need to be brought inside before the first frost. Water them one last time outside about 3 days before bringing them inside. This way they will soak up what they need and the excess water will have drained through the pot's bottom holes. They can also start to dry out. Remove any debris or cobwebs before bringing them inside,

too. Decaying materials can cause the succulents to rot or become infected. You can add a little top dressing – small decorative pebbles or even buttons – to make the pot look nicer while inside. Wipe any dirt off the sides of the pot and look closely at the plant to make sure you aren't bringing mealy bugs or spiders inside as hitchhikers in the pot.

Shedding of lower leaves is normal for most succulents, so no worries if you see this happening. Take a pair of tweezers or small pruning scissors and take off any dead or dying leaves. You may also be able to pinch off these leaves, too.

A lot of succulents – Echeveria, Sempervivum, and Aloe - go dormant in the winter and so need very little care or watering. Some, though, like the Peperomia, Sanseveira, Aeonium and Kalanchoe, are winter-growers and so will need more watering. This makes it important that you know what kind of succulents you have and what their specific needs are.

The main thing about succulents is not to water them too much. And if you pay attention, the plants will tell you what they need. If the leaves are limp and starting to wrinkle, time to water a little. If they are yellowing and look as if they are ready

to burst, cut back on watering for a week or so to let them dry a bit. If the leaves are firm and a nice green color, they are happy and keep up the routine you were using.

A fun thing about hen-and-chick varieties of succulents is that they put out lots and lots of “chicks” that can be gently removed and easily propagated. No need to even root them, just spray them a little with water, then take a pencil and make a hole in some sandy potting soil and drop the chicks in, firming the soil around them. Soon you will have another Hen who will be putting out chicks of her own.

A word of warning, though. When you are ready to take your succulents back outside after wintering in the house or greenhouse, please do so gradually. Leave them in the shade for a few days before putting them in direct sun. Here again, while they like bright light, filtered sunlight is best. At least keep them out of the hot afternoon sun in the summer.

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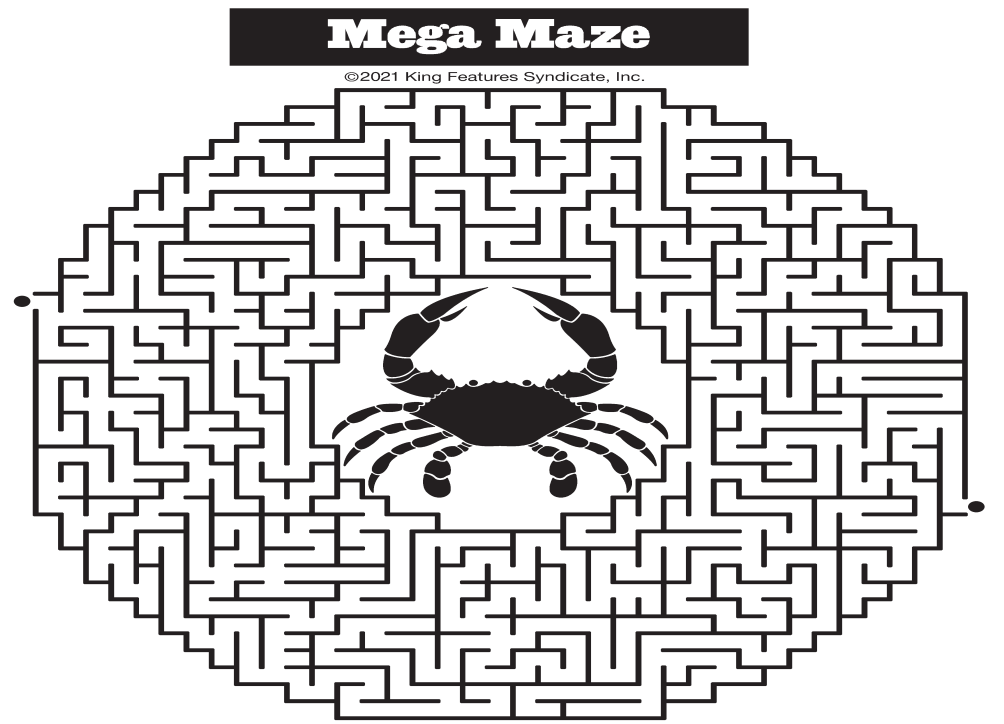
