

Governor expands block on evictions

Gov. Kate Brown on Wednesday, April 1, issued an executive order placing a 90-day moratorium on commercial evictions for nonpayment, in light of the impacts on business owners caused by the COVID-19 crisis.

The order also strengthens Brown's previous ban on residential evictions, and prohibits landlords from charging tenants late fees for nonpayment of rent during the moratorium.

"During this unprecedented public health crisis, too many Oregonians have found themselves with no way to pay the monthly rent for their homes and businesses," Brown said. "These are difficult times. This order will help Oregon small businesses stay in their locations without the threat of eviction."

The previous executive order put a temporary moratorium on residential evictions for nonpayment in light of the public health emergency

caused by the spread of coronavirus in Oregon. The order is effective for 90 days as of March 22.

"Through no fault of their own, many Oregonians have lost jobs, closed businesses, and found themselves without a source of income to pay rent and other housing costs during this coronavirus outbreak," Brown said. "The last thing we need to do during this crisis is turn out more Oregonians struggling to make ends meet from their homes

and onto the streets. This is both a moral and a public health imperative. Keeping people in their homes is the right thing for Oregon families, and for preventing the further spread of COVID-19."

Under the Governor's emergency powers, the order places a temporary hold throughout Oregon on law enforcement actions relating to residential evictions for not paying rent.

Recognizing that landlords and property owners face

their own costs if tenants are not able to pay rent, the governor and her Coronavirus Economic Advisory Council are engaging lenders to find potential solutions and are exploring various state and federal policy options that might be available to borrowers or other options for relief. Oregon Housing and Community Services and the Department of Consumer and Business Services are also pursuing relief options.

The order is part of the governor's coronavirus housing and homelessness strategy, which includes expanding shelter capacity with social distancing measures in place, identifying emergency COVID-19 shelter options for people experiencing homelessness who must be isolated or quarantined, exploring options for rent assistance, seeking expansion of federal eviction moratoriums, and homeowner foreclosure avoidance.

County receives second delivery of protective equipment

Lt. Gordon McCraw, the Tillamook County director of emergency management and incident commander for the Tillamook County COVID-19 Incident Command Team, accepted a shipment of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) from the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) on Saturday, April 4. This was the second delivery that week.

"This was not as much as I was hoping for but was more than we had so I am still grateful," McCraw said in a press release.

The PPE is to be distributed within the county in accordance with a directive outline to the county by OHA.

OHA developed its PPE distribution process in partnership with the COVID-19 Medical Advisory Group (MAG). Through Monday, March 23, PPE Allocation from OHA was based on population and distributed through resource requests from each county. This process was not optimal in that counties that had COVID-19 positive patients were running out of PPE allocation and the request process was too lengthy.

Upon approval by the MAG, OHA changed to regular PPE bulk shipments of received, purchased and donated items to all counties and tribes. This new process does not require counties and tribes to submit requests for individual locations. The shipments are made to one location in each county or tribe.

If allotment is too small to ship, it may be delayed to the next shipment. The state will retain 30 percent for state agencies, life safety (urgent hospital or EMS requests over and above the distribution a county is able to provide) requests and OHA Operations missions (such as responding to a specific outbreak). If counties identify an urgent need, those are handled separately.

The MAG plans to meet as needed to update the allocation. A reallocation could account for any additional supplies received from federal or other sources, or for greater impact of COVID-19 in some communities compared to others.

McCraw said he hope to have additional deliveries but is uncertain as to when or how much will be received.

Coronavirus Tillamook jobless claims skyrocket

Tillamook is among the hardest hit in the state for unemployment numbers in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic.

During the week starting March 22, the Oregon Employment Department received 92,700 initial claims for Unemployment Insurance Benefits. That represented a 21 percent increase from the previous record during the week starting March 15.

By comparison, the agency received 4,900 initial claim filings during the week starting March 8. The Employment Department continues to take proactive steps to meet the unprecedented need for unemployment benefits, which is largely due to reduced hours and layoffs related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Sen. Jeff Merkley spoke out after national unemployment claims shot up to a record-shattering 6.6 million, showing the economic devastation of the coronavirus crisis. He said Oregon workers and small business owners are terrified about what the crisis means for their families and their futures.

"Behind these historically bad numbers are millions of real people whose lives have been thrown into chaos through no fault of their own," Merkley said. "We need to throw lifelines out to struggling families, and we need to get those lifelines out now."

Merkley said as the federal government works to implement its first relief package and Congress works to write the next one, there should be a priority on people and small business rather than the wealthy and powerful.

"We need to make sure that help gets to every state and territory across this great nation—not just red states or blue states," Merkley said. "And we need to do much more to help the working families who are the backbone of America, and who are facing a crisis the likes of which most of us have never seen."

Sen. Ron Wyden said he advocated for helping workers replace lost wages. He urged modernizing the unemployment system to include the self-employed and gig economy workers.

"My provision in the COVID19 relief bill supercharges unemployment to provide workers with an additional \$600 a week," Wyden said. "This will be a lifeline for the millions of workers who have been hit by this economic wrecking ball."

Initial Claims

The Employment Department has detailed information for 45,800 of the claims processed during the week starting March 22. The leisure and hospitality sector, which includes hotels and restaurants, saw the greatest number of initial claims for unemployment benefits (15,500).

This reflects impacts of additional public health and safety measures related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Many initial claims also came from workers in health care and social

Nighttime theft increases in Tillamook

The Tillamook Police Department (TPD) reports it is starting to see a higher than normal level of thefts occurring at night in the community.

Even though the vast majority of the community are properly sheltering at home when not doing essential travel, there is still activity at

night by persons who have a selfish purpose. Police Chief Terry Wright said. Tillamook is having thefts from vehicles, thefts of vehicles and thefts from private property.

"We are all focusing on diligence in protecting our families and ourselves from the current emergency," Wright said. "We need to also be diligent in protecting property."

Even with past releases and posting about guns left in vehicles, yet another gun theft from vehicle has been reported. Police say the vast majority of these guns are traded immediately for a very small amount of drugs. The guns are then sold cheaply to other persons who

otherwise could not legally have a gun.

There is no reason to leave a gun in your vehicle, especially left in plain view or left in an unlocked vehicle. Do not leave anything in your vehicle if you do not need to. Even if you lock your vehicle, if there is an indication of something in your vehicle that can be traded for drugs, it will be taken. You will then be missing property and have to replace a broken window.

Did you know you can show vehicle insurance on your phone in Oregon? When you leave identification in your vehicle and it is taken or possibly photographed,

Tillamook suggests you check your credit report every few months in case they used your information to open credit cards and other fraud. This action could take you months to years to fix.

"It is amazing, especially in cold weather, how many people leave their vehicle running to warm it up or to run in to a store. I see it all the time," Wright said. "If someone takes your vehicle and then you report it stolen, the vehicle could end up in a crash, pursuit or other criminal activity where persons could be

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False report of child shot, hostage situation

A woman was taken into custody after making a false report that a child was shot in the Tillamook area.

At around 7:45 a.m. Wednesday, April 1, Tillamook County Communications District 911 received a call from a woman who said a 5-year-old child had been shot in the chest, and a man was being held at gun

point in the 3000 block of Latimer Road.

Tillamook County Sheriff's Office, Oregon State Police, and Tillamook Police Department responded to the call. When units arrived, two adults were contacted at the scene. After speaking with them the property was checked, and an additional adult and three

children were confirmed to be OK, according to a press release from the Sheriff's Office.

The woman who made the report was found by authorities, taken into custody and held for a mental health evaluation. Law enforcement and 911 were assisted on the call by Tillamook Fire and Adventist Ambulance.

Rollover crash driver cited for recklessness, false report

A Bay City man was cited for reckless driving and making a false report after police said he rolled his car on State Route 6.

At around 6:22 p.m. Monday, March 30, an Oregon State Police (OSP) trooper was dispatched to a rollover crash at around milepost 30 of the highway that runs between Tillamook and the Portland area. An occupied gray Dodge was found at the scene. Washington County deputies assisted by trying to reach the car's registered owner.

The OSP trooper was

advised that the car was recently sold to a person in Bay City. While the trooper was waiting for a tow truck to arrive, the new owner called to report the car was stolen.

Transportation Department employees remained at the crash scene to await the tow truck while the trooper went to follow up with the new owner, who police identified as 49-year-old Bay City resident George Christopher Norris.

Norris allegedly began by telling the trooper he had parked at the Shell station in North Plains and left his key in the car, returned to find it gone, and got a ride

home from his son and a friend. The trooper reportedly pressed the young men for the truth, initially getting a similar story but later learning they were allegedly instructed by Norris to go along with his version of events.

OSP said both the son and friend admitted Norris drove the car from the gas station and crashed on the highway before calling them for a ride back to Bay City and making the false report.

Norris was issued a citation for initiating a false report and another for reckless driving. He was cited and released in lieu of custody.



Tillamook Bay Community College begins spring term online

Classes at Tillamook Bay Community College (TBCC) began Monday, April 6. All courses will be taught online to comply with an executive order established by Gov. Kate Brown to not offer face-to-face instruction on college campuses until April 28.

Registration runs through Sunday, April 5, at midnight. Spring Term starts a week later than normal.

"We had an extended spring break and all of the colleges in Oregon did that," Tomlin said. "Mainly, that was to give our staff time to get all of their classes online."

This spring term, all of the credit classes will be online. Tomlin said the school typically has a fair number of classes online. TBCC has been offering online classes for nearly a decade with some degree options available completely online. A lot of the classes

offered Spring Term are not normally online.

"Students will not be able to interact directly face-to-face with our staff," Tomlin said. "They can come in and get on the phone in the lobby and talk to our staff or they can do that from home."

The building will be open mainly for students who do not have internet access at home. Students can check out laptops and the library will be open with internet connectivity during the term with social distancing in place.

"If they are in need of a computer to help them with their online classes, that we will be able to check out computers for them starting on Monday," Tomlin said.

Tomlin said they will likely have a table set up in the lobby for checking out the laptops. The college is also expanding its WI-FI into the parking lot to be ready on April 6.

"We also have a really strong food pantry," Tomlin said. "We get food from the Oregon Food Bank and provide food and other items of need to our students through the food pantry and that is normally located in the library, and will probably be moved down to the lobby for the foreseeable future."

Tomlin said the school had originally thought it would have classes online through April 28 but classes may remain online throughout the term. A formal announcement on this will be made by the college sometime early this week.

Some classes cannot be taught effectively online. Students who are enrolled in courses that cannot be taught online were contacted by a career academic advisor to revise their spring term schedule.

Non-credit community education classes, all adult basic skills and GED preparation courses have been

cancelled for spring term, as well as career-technical classes that involve hands-on learning, such as welding and manufacturing. Tomlin said these classes will be offered in the summer. All students registered for these classes were contacted and switched to online classes, such as general education.

"Our plan, because we're allowed to by the executive order, is to allow face-to-face labs," Tomlin said of the biology classes. "Our plan still is to do the online portion of biology classes the first three weeks of the spring term and offer face-to-face labs starting May 1 just for the biology classes."

Tomlin said there will be face shields for the students and small class sizes. The plan could change during the month of April, but as of now, that is the only class that would have face-to-face classes.

"Our Small Business Development Center, which is run through the college even though the offices are closed, service is open right now," Tomlin said. "Our Small Business Development Director Arlene Soto is putting out a lot of hours right now working with many, many small businesses here in Tillamook County and helping them apply for Small Business Administration loans and helping them in other ways to hang on until we get through this crisis."

The services are available online for how to connect with Soto.

Tomlin said the college is working with local high schools in Tillamook County and helping their students get into online classes through the college. They are offering high school students free credit classes this term.

"We're feeling pretty fortunate here in Tillamook County and we've got such an amazing community that all pulls together," Tomlin said. "We're just wanting everyone to know the college is here to help the community any way we can and we're going to be available to do anything that is within our power to try to help us get through all this."

All community events held on campus, facility rentals and group gatherings are cancelled or postponed. North Coast Throwdown on April 25 was also cancelled.

"That was a fundraiser for our foundation, mainly for our career students," Tomlin said.

Tomlin said the foundation offers a career to career scholarship program. Stu-

equipped against COVID-19.

A Vacasa spokeswoman, public relations manager Anni Murphy said in an email that during this period of uncertainty the company is strongly encouraging everyone to follow health and safety guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Murphy said Vacasa is complying with orders and travel restrictions issued by federal, state and local governments.

"Specifically, we are adhering to the recent order issued by Tillamook County, and we are cancelling reservations in the region as required," Murphy said. Murphy said to the company's knowledge, no Vacasa employees have tested positive for COVID-19 as of this past week. She said Vacasa is offering comprehensive health benefits including flexible time off and the ability to work remotely.

"We employ local team members in every destination where we operate, which allows us the ability to ensure our homes are cleaned thoroughly in line with standards set by the World Health Organization and Health and

Safety Executive," Murphy said. "We provide our valuable employees with the proper cleaning supplies per the CDC and Environmental Protection Agency for COVID-19, and we're ensuring they're able to work autonomously to adhere to social distancing recommendations."

Responding to the question of protective masks for cleaning staff, Murphy cited the short supply of masks and respirators and guidance that they should be reserved for people who are exhibiting symptoms or healthcare professionals working directly with sick patients. Vacasa employees have been instructed to stay home if they are feeling ill to minimize the risk of spreading illness.

Facing the potential spread of coronavirus, county officials took significant action to stop the flow of tourists during spring break. Much of Tillamook County was already closed for business after the state banned large gatherings and limited service from restaurants and bars.

Tillamook County is under a state of emergency until at

least April 28. County, state and federal parks are closed as well as county parking lots, county beach access and certain roadside parking areas, public boat launches except for commercial fishing, and all transient lodging

facilities – hotels, motels, short-term vacation rentals, bed and breakfasts, RV parks and campgrounds, all closed expect to guests registered longer than 30 days, essential personnel and emergency responders.

Gov. Kate Brown has urged Oregonians to stay home. She said people should "stay home, stay healthy," and she has banned large gathering and closed schools because of the coronavirus.

those who suspect they have COVID-19. He reminded the public there is an urgent care/emergency room checkpoint in the former ambulance garage at the hospital to reduce potential viral exposure for patients. Virtual appointments are being rolled out as well. Swanson thanked those who have donated masks to hospital staff.

With a state of emergency in place and orders to stay home when possible, Tillamook County Commissioner David Yamamoto said he is noticing local residents are starting to get restless. People are still getting outside and down to the beaches for recreation, but parks and day-use areas are closed. Some have suggested letting locals roam free but keep outsiders away, however, Yamamoto said that would not be tenable.

"Please just work with us. Things will get better," Yamamoto said. "Hopefully soon,

but we just don't know."

The Tillamook County Public Health Department reported March 29 there was a third positive case of coronavirus in the county. The person who was diagnosed is a south-county resident over the age of 65-years-old who was reportedly hospitalized in the Portland area.

On March 28, Public Health announced the second coronavirus case in the county, a north-county resident who was recovering at home under quarantine. The second person with COVID-19 in Tillamook County was not reported to be a contact of the county's first positive case.

The county's first case of coronavirus was reported March 26. That person is a health care provider between 35 and 54 years old who works at Tillamook County Community Health Centers and recovering at home.

The Centers for Disease

Control is recommending simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain. Masks help prevent those who may have COVID-19 and not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth masks fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

A significant portion of individuals with coronavirus lack symptoms (asymptomatic) and that even those who eventually develop symptoms (pre-symptomatic) can transmit the virus to others

before showing symptoms. This means that the virus can spread between people interacting in close proximity even if those people are not exhibiting symptoms.

The cloth face coverings

recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare and medical workers.

dents that have been out of school for five years or more can apply for this scholarship and get free tuition. About 40 students went through it its first two years. This is the third year.

"It's been a very popular program, very successful," Tomlin said. "We're reaching a segment of the population who is taking advantage of this opportunity and getting their degree or certificate after being out of school for a while."

TBCC is the only college in the state with a program like this, Tomlin said. He

said the event will likely take place this fall.

TBCC is figuring out what to do about graduation, which is June 14. It is likely they will have to postpone it but have not made that decision yet. Tomlin said if they do postpone, it would be to the earliest possible date, but they are exploring all options.

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

In response to David McCall's letter Democracy and Public Service ...

I appreciate the opportunity to set the record straight. The Tillamook Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) is bound by Oregon Public Meetings Law and there are rules we are required to follow in a declared emergency. In the past two weeks things have been happening so fast with the COVID-19 public health crisis that the BOCC has called emergency meetings in order to provide strong leadership in a timely way. For example, when we were inundated with visitors on Saturday, March 21, we called an emergency meeting for Sunday, March 22 to address the issue and make decisions to protect our community. Things were evolving so fast that some of our meetings were only known a couple of hours before we needed to act. In every case we followed both the letter

and spirit of the law. Our meetings were available to attend in person or by teleconference. Let me reiterate that we did not violate any Oregon Open Meetings Laws. Our 8 a.m. meetings occur on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and are live streamed on KTIL. We have followed and continue to follow the open meeting law requirements for notice. Currently, to comply with the Governor's order of social distancing and limits of 10 people in a group, we are not able to accommodate live attendance at our regular meetings. We allow the public to phone in and listen and to e-mail questions or testimony during the meeting. I want to take this opportunity to thank all those in the community that are working so hard to support each other. The decisions we made the

past two weeks were difficult. Closing the motels, short term rentals, parking lots and boat launches was one of the hardest I have had to make. There were sleepless nights in the decision, but it was correct for the protection of our residents. I am heartened by the fact that all seven cities in Tillamook County, our lodging providers, restaurants and residents understand the need to protect everyone in our community over the next couple of months. In this time of unprecedented crisis our communities have come together in the "Tillamook Way": we fight, we argue, we jump up and down then we come to together and do the right thing.


Visitors, stay home

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

Fight to keep our water safe

Concurrently with the coronavirus public health emergency that is going on, many people who live in rural communities near the Oregon Coast are also concerned about their ongoing exposure to smoke and pesticide spray. One concern is the smoke and pesticide spray caused by outdated industrial forestry practices that put the health of the public at risk. Smoke from prescribed burning of wood is a major source of dioxin and other toxic emissions, damaging both our health and our environment. Exposure to smoke and pesticides can have both short and long-term adverse health consequences. Those of us living on the Coast are concerned that with potential exposure to the novel coronavirus, which can result in serious respiratory infections, toxic chemicals in the air from smoke and pesticide spraying puts our health at even more risk. We are requesting that the Governor issue an executive order banning all prescribed burning and aerial pesticide spraying. As it is, people who live and work at the Coast are already adversely affected by existing

policies that allow burning and pesticide spraying..... policies that can endanger public health by sending harmful substances into the air we breathe and the water we drink.

As someone associated with North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection recently wrote, "At a time of sheltering at home, those who have sought spray notifications in the past [notification prior to the spraying of pesticides by timber companies so that nearby residents can evacuate the area] will not be able to go elsewhere without additional virus exposure. So, can we please ask that the State impose a spray ban when folks are supposed to stay at home?" There currently is no vaccine against this coronavirus; so, we have been told to "stay home and stay safe." At the same time, it would be possible to stop slash/prescribed burning and aerial pesticide spraying, both of which are not essential activities. Even during this State of Emergency, the application of pesticides both from the air and at ground level continues across rural Oregon. In many rural areas, aerial spraying is done near highly vulnerable populations, including near health care facilities, long-term convalescent homes, and communities with many people older than sixty.

Please inform your friends and neighbors. Share the message you send to Governor Brown with local news sources, other elected officials, and government agencies.

Call Governor Brown, it only take a minute, it's painless, and it will make you feel like you are doing something to help, because you are!

Manzanita city council should listen to voters

Just four months ago, Manzanita voters surprised City Council with a resounding NO to Council's plan for a new City Hall building with 30 year bond funding. In response, Council members pledged to listen to citizens' concerns and reformulate their plan to move City Hall with an expensive plan to the Underhill Property and to consider renovating the existing Underhill building as an alternative at lower costs.

Initially, Council members were surprised by the strong voter turnout and 68% negative vote. Voters were saying in a loud clear voice that they did not want to go into debt for a too large, too expensive new structure. Council pledged to listen to the voters and reconsider the plan including the remodel design and cost estimate circulated as an alternative.

Sounds good? Actually the City Council is tone deaf. Council paid lip service to the remodel

plan and have not completed a full cost estimate or even completed an inspection of the Underhill property. Now, they seem to be reformulating their own new build plan : adopt a smaller building , use different funding, maybe even complete their plan without a vote of the citizens for the new debt.

Justification? To keep the staff happy? Because a bank knows the credit from a City is always good because our taxes can be raised to pay the debt? Because it will be their legacy?

At a minimum this is bad faith with their citizens they represent . True leadership by City Council is to open their ears and listen to their constituents. Doing an end run around the voters is poor leadership.

City Council should conduct a true study of a new building plan versus a remodeling plan with competitive designs, cost estimates and options to fund. After publicizing the results, let voters weigh in on the results.

GARDENING MATTERS

Absolutely no Foolin' around

If there was ever a time we need to be in the garden, its now. And if you have never considered trying to plant seeds and growing some of your own veggies, that time has come as well.

As I write my column for this week, I am – with the rest of the world – on a voluntary self-quarantine for the Covid 19 virus. I admit to actually enjoying time at home that I hadn't planned on to get some spring cleaning started and since the weather has been so nice, some gardening in as well.

Gardening is the perfect pastime in these circumstances. It can be done outside. It can be done alone or at least away from others. It is exercise in the fresh air. It can be a way to improve mood as well physical well-being. Now all we need is a project to work on.

Regular readers of my column may remember that starting seeds is not one of my preferred ways to propagate plants. I don't have the patience and I don't seem to have the knack. But – before the coronavirus took over all our waking hours - I was able to attend a Master Gardener class on Propagation and one of the segments was starting plants from seed. So I can relate the best practices info and you can decide for yourself if it is something you would like to try.

First, you need to explore your yard and see if there is a place that gets a lot of sun – light is the single most important part of growing seeds - and is sheltered from the wind. The winds will be shifting to coming from the north soon, so protection from the north wind is important. Also important is the type of soil in your chosen spot. And if the soil isn't great and you don't have access to compost to amend it, you might consider raised beds.

There are so many forms of raised beds from the very



simple mounding of the soil to the construction of waist-height trugs like the ones in the Master Gardener Learning Garden that need the expertise of a carpenter or handy-person. Getting good soil into those raised beds may take purchasing bags of topsoil from a nursery or landscape supplier. But while those beds are being raised or built, you can make a start on planting seeds.

Something that most people don't take into consideration when choosing seeds is what vegetables will you and your family be willing to eat. No sense planting kale or kohlrabi if no one likes it, but if you love kale and kohlrabi, go for it. Once you

have made a list of preferred veggies, the easiest way to find the ones you want is to go online to a site like Nichols Seeds (nicholsgardennursery.com) or Territorial Seed Company (territorialseed.com) as they both are located in the Pacific Northwest so their seeds are adapted for our area.

Their on-line catalogs aren't as fun to leaf through as the ones they mail, but in either case, they are filled with important information. Each entry will tell you how many days there are from direct sowing - or in some cases, germination - to harvest. Look for varieties with the lowest number of days as we have already lost a couple of weeks by starting so late in the season. I would advise against planting crops like melons because we just don't get enough heat for them to ripen. But certainly zucchini, summer squash, cucumbers, beans, peas and lettuces are easy to grow and will give you a great feeling of success.

Peas like cooler weather as do most lettuces, so they can be sown outside now.

Be careful when choosing your seeds as many don't like to be transplanted and will need to be direct sown into the ground. Others will want to be sown a few weeks in advance and you can use easy things like egg cartons to start those. Seeds generally need a lighter soil to start in and this type of soil is called "germination mix." It is disease-free and weed-free

but low in nutrition. Generally, it is also fine soil and includes vermiculite. Keep the soil moist but not soggy. Good drainage is a must to prevent disease and damping-off. Keeping foliage dry and allowing for good circulation will also help.

In Tillamook, our last frost day is usually mid- to late-May so tender veggies like tomatoes and can't be planted out until then. It is a little late to be starting tomatoes from seed, and my best advice is to get transplants of those from nurseries. Keep them inside for now in as much sun as you can give them - a window sill is best - and give them a 1/4

turn every day so they grow straight.

Each type of vegetable will have a required soil temperature into which they can be planted, so if you are planting directly into the outside soil, be sure the soil is warm enough for the seeds to be happy. A soil thermometer is a valuable tool for testing temps.

There is a lot of science involved in growing seeds but it can be very rewarding. Reading and following instructions on the seed packets will give you a better chance at success. And, my dear readers, please "Keep Calm and Carry On!" And be safe.

assistance (7,600) and retail trade (4,600).

Multnomah (10,900), Washington (5,300), and Lane (4,200) were the counties with the largest number of claims. The largest percentage increases in initial claims over the week occurred in Harney and Tillamook counties.

More initial claims data by industry and area can be found on the QualityInfo.org COVID-19 page.

Helping Oregonians Over the past two weeks the Employment Department doubled the number of staff dedicated to taking claims and is in the process of tripling it. The agency employees processing claims are doing so at a record rate. They also continue adding secure phone lines to take more calls while also protecting the personal information of those filing claims.

Still, the truly unprecedented and sudden level of initial claims has caused delays and frustration for Oregonians who need help, especially by phone.

The Employment Department encourages anyone who

can file an online claim to do so. The agency's website includes a video with step-by-step instructions for filing online claims specific to COVID-19 situations. Filing an initial or weekly claim online helps those who must file their claim by phone.

Calls to follow up on the status of successfully filed claims also allows fewer new initial claims, which require the most time and work, to be received by phone. The Employment Department has started sending automatic confirmations for successfully filed claims with an e-mail address provided. Other automatic fixes and guidance have been implemented to address common online claim errors and reduce the need for follow-up.

To file an online claim for unemployment benefits, go to Oregon.gov/employ or call 1-877-FILE-4-UI. For help finding jobs and training resources, contact your local WorkSource Oregon center or go to WorkSourceOregon.org.

State agencies ask for refrain from outdoor burning

In response to the "Stay Home, Save Lives" Executive Order to reduce the effects of the COVID-19 virus, a coalition of Oregon state agencies are asking Oregonians to voluntarily refrain from conducting outdoor burning.

necessary tool to manage their lands, including industrial forest landowners, farmers, small woodland owners, and rural residents. However, it's important to weigh possible effects on the wider community before choosing to burn. Please be a good neighbor. Smoke from fires during the current pandemic may result in the following negative consequences for the public and first responders: Smoke inhalation can cause upper respiratory symptoms, which could be incorrectly attributed to CO-

VID-19, leading to unnecessary testing or self-isolation. Exposure to smoke and other forms of air pollution can increase the risk of contracting infectious respiratory disease such as COVID-19, increase the severity of existing respiratory infections, and worsen underlying chronic respiratory conditions. There is a severe shortage of personal protective equipment to reduce smoke exposure at this time. First responders and other emergency services are operating at a reduced capacity

and have limited resources to respond to out-of-control burns. COVID-19 affects the respiratory system. Fever, cough and difficulty breathing are the most common symptoms. While some people with COVID-19 are hospitalized, most patients recover at home, where smoke from a nearby outdoor burn could worsen their condition. To avoid additional health impacts, all people in Oregon are asked to voluntarily refrain from conducting outdoor burning activities until further

notice. **Burning that can be delayed includes:** • Debris burning around one's property • Burn barrels • Industrial burning • Slash and forest burning • Agricultural burning that would impact neighbors and can be delayed Local officials may already have prohibited outdoor burning in your area. If you must conduct outdoor burning, please first check with your

local fire agency to see if outdoor burning is still allowed. If it is, please follow best burn practices, which can be found on the website of the Office of the State Fire Marshall. DEQ, ODF, OSFM, and ODA encourage the public to use the following alternatives to burning when available: • Recycle paper products when possible • Compost or chip yard debris on site • Haul to a yard debris composting or recycling site • Reuse old lumber

Fred Meyer, Safeway pay bonuses during coronavirus outbreak

County discusses community reaction to tourists

These meetings are being held to discuss updates related to COVID-19. One of the topics discussed was

Local business owner seeks funds to build 10 ventilators for Adventist Health

Jeremy Saldate, a small business owner of Harmonium, LLC in Tillamook has started a GoFundMe account to raise enough capital to build 10 ventilators for local use. To try to combat an anticipated upcoming ventilator shortage, he hopes to create stopgap devices based on designs provided by the MIT Emergency Ventilator (E-Vent) Project to support Tillamook County Regional Medical Center.

Harmonium, LLC has been in Tillamook since 2015. Saldate provides comprehensive network penetration testing services, aiding clients in discovering vulnerabilities, repairing those vulnerabilities, conducting threat modeling, updating infrastructure to mount a proactive defense, and forming an incident response plan, including a disaster recovery plan.

"I focused on the health care sector," Saldate said. "My customers right now, none of them are primary care physicians. They all practice different specialties."

Most of Saldate's clients are in the Portland area, with some in Tillamook. Because of the Centers for Disease Control order sent out in March, they have all shut down. Some are open for emergency only. These clients

are worried about whether they will be in business after the crisis.

"As little as six weeks ago, I was looking at booking up my entire calendar for 2020," Saldate said. "A lot of that was referral work, a lot of that was through networking, and now all of that within the last few weeks has dried up."

A vast majority of the projects have been put on hold or cancelled.

"The Health and Human Services has issued a freedom from liability," Saldate said. "It's a liability waiver, for any kind of interventions, which is what makes this possible."

Saldate has first-hand experience with manufacturing devices. He also has 20 years of professional programming experience. He will be manufacturing the ventilators in this project.

"Because this is within my ability, I found this open source design that MIT has produced and I've talked to people at the local hospital about the project and they've got a lot of interest in seeing this come about," Saldate said.

Saldate said Adventist Health is worried about the supply chain having the number of ventilators they need.

The goal of this project is to minimize the loss of human life where possible, by supplying qualified clinicians with the tools they need during the COVID-19 crisis,


to free up ICU ventilators to support the most critical patients, or support patients in life or death situations when there is no other option.

"The timing on this is really critical," Saldate said. "In talking with Tillamook County Regional Medical Center, they expect a full force of the pandemic to hit Tillamook County within the next few weeks."

Saldate said it is difficult to know when that will happen and the severity. It depends on the community's willingness and ability to self-isolate. If resources become overwhelmed, everyone can be affected.

Saldate's goal is to raise \$25,000. He said it is difficult to know the exact cost; this is just an estimate of what he needs. He does not need the full amount to get started. The initial allocation of funds is intended to cover the cost of material to complete assembly of a prototype, and up to 10 emergency ventilators, to supplement existing ICU ventilators and combat the COVID-19 pandemic as it progresses through Tillamook County.

Providing additional ventilators would be supplementing the hospital's efforts, Saldate said. The way the development process is expected to unfold starts with the plans released by MIT. The ventilator will operate at a similar level as a traditional

ventilator.

Saldate said he will take the MIT design and improve upon it for safety and bring it to the respiratory team at Adventist Health to consult with them. The prototype will have multiple revisions. The process will continue until Adventist Health gives Saldate the green light. Then he can start making copies of the design.

Saldate is volunteering his time to this project. He is not in a financial position to cover the costs himself and need

funds from the crowdsourcing campaign in order to complete the project.

Saldate said he would like to have the prototype completed within one month. The projected peak of the pandemic in Oregon overall is May 5, he said. Tillamook is trending a little behind that.

"If we can meet that timeline, supplementing the existing resources that the hospital already has in place, we should be able to save additional lives," Saldate said.

Saldate has a consulting

engineer, some additional people helping circulate the campaign, is consulting with the respiratory team at Adventist Health, and is the primary hands-on person in Tillamook County, he said.

Saldate said there has been interest in the project as far away as Los Angeles.

thing everyone can get. She also asks people to share United Paws' Facebook page. Social media is their greatest publicity, she said.


Halvorsen said they cannot do foster training right now because of the pandemic. She pulled the cats from Petfinder, as she was receiving applications from out of county that she had to turn down. She hopes that in two to three weeks, she can open that up again.

One kitten will likely be adopted tomorrow, Halvorsen said.

"Stick with us," Halvorsen said.

If you have cats that have kittens, the sooner you notify United Paws, the easier it will be to get them adopted in a timely manner. If you have feral kittens, they can be tamed within six to eight weeks; United Paws just needs to be notified as soon as possible.

Oregon Department of Human Services notifies public of data breach

On March 6, the Oregon Department of Human Services (DHS) uncovered a phishing incident that affected on staff member's email.

DHS takes the privacy and confidentiality of employee and client information seriously. Established information technology security processes enabled the agency to detect and contain the incident quickly and stop the unauthorized access.

What happened?

A spear phishing email was sent to a DHS employee. The employee opened the phishing email and exposed their credentials to an outside entity. The agency cannot confirm that any client or employee's personal information was copied

or used inappropriately.

What DHS is doing about it

DHS is in the process of thoroughly reviewing the incident and the information involved. DHS plans to contract with an outside entity to clarify the number and identities of any individuals whose information was compromised, and the specific kinds of information involved. While there is no indication that any protected health information was copied or used inappropriately, DHS will notify any individuals whose information was compromised. DHS will provide identity theft protection services to potentially impacted employees and clients.
