Commissioners vote no confidence in Olson

In the latest salvo in the ongoing conflict between the Tillamook County board of commissioners and District Attorney Aubrey Olson, commissioners voted unanimously for a resolution of no confidence in Olson’s performance at their meeting on June 17.

The resolution came after an outside investigation completed in February that substantiated 35 complaints against Olson and her staff, the most serious related to incompetence and a lack of care for the victims of crimes, especially those involving accusations of sexual assault and domestic violence. The board was joined in their vote by the board of directors of Tides of Change, the local agency that serves the survivors of gender-based violence in the county, several of whose members appeared at the meeting.

Commissioners also approved a \$950,000 settlement that will go into a fund for the former property owners of parcels sold by the county who did not receive repayment after the sales of those properties, a \$2.2 million contract for upgrades at the Pacific City Transfer Station, a \$414,000 contract for electrical improvements at the fairgrounds, the \$109,000 purchase of a tractor for the parks department and the \$155,000 purchase of a search and rescue incident command trailer for the sheriff’s office.

The meeting began with several representatives from Tides of Change speaking in support of the resolution of no confidence, which commissioners had discussed at their board briefing the previous week.

Tides of Change Executive Director Valerie Bundy thanked commissioners for their words in support of survivors the previous week and speaking out on their behalf to call attention to the issues in the district attorney’s (DA) office. Bundy said that survivors deserve respect and dignity and that she hoped the board bringing the problem to the public’s attention would lead to an improvement for them.

Tides of Change Board Vice Chair Sarah Ermer then read a letter signed by the entire board, which said that survivors’ fears of not being believed led to domestic violence and sexual assault being among the most underreported violent crimes. The letter said there appeared to be a lack of accountability by the DA’s office in response to the investigation and that the board supported the commissioners in voting no confidence in Olson.

Board Member Cristel Scott thanked commissioners for supporting survivors with the vote and Board Member John Prather said that the current situation in the office was emboldening offenders.

After two members of the public also voiced their support for the vote of no confidence, County Counsel Bryan Libel introduced the resolution, saying that he had based it on the investigation findings, Olson’s subsequent attempts to use subpoenas to retaliate against Sheriff Joshua Brown and the whistleblower who initiated the investigation into her

County leaders discuss annex plans

Tillamook County commissioners and department heads met with consultants on June 15, to begin discussions on how the county will use the ex-Bureau of Land Management building on Third Street that it acquired earlier this year.

Discussions revolved around priorities for the new building, with commissioners agreeing on four principles to guide the renovation and relocation of staff processes. Those principles are ensuring that the circuit court’s space needs are met, securing outside funding to pay for as much of the work to renovate the ex-Bureau of Land Management (BLM) building as possible and ensuring that the new space is efficient for staff and customers.

Tillamook County Chief Administrative Officer Rachel Hagerty began the meeting, saying that it marked the beginning of a five-phase project to upgrade and move county staff into the property purchased in late March for \$2.475 million. Hagerty said that after going through the planning process to determine which departments should be in the new space, engineering work would need to be done to prepare for construction and renovation, before employees were able to relocate. At that point, county leaders will need to evaluate how to use the vacated spaces in the courthouse.

Two consultants from DLR

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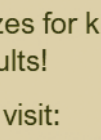

Shively discussed the planning commission's decision to approve the proposed 24-room hotel and restaurant between Marine Drive and the Nehalem River, part of a larger envisioned multiphase development that would also include a cottage cluster, at their March meeting. Shively said that two primary questions had been debated by the commission.

The letter argued that the proposal did not satisfy the condition that a need for the conditional use be demonstrated at the proposed location. It argued that forecast economic benefits were speculative and that they would not materialize as any gains by the new hotel would be matched by drops in the business of current hotels, leading to a net-zero impact. ORCA also argued that market trends with inflation and the cost of gas presaged headwinds to the project's success and suggested the city should look to develop its short-term rental market further instead.

Councilor Kate Cloran started the council's discussion, saying that her biggest concern

Councilors voted unanimously to tentatively deny the appeal, upholding the planning commission's conditional use approval, with the additional conditions proposed by Cloran. That decision will be formalized at a meeting on June 25, once the city's attorney adds the additional conditions and council's findings to the approval.

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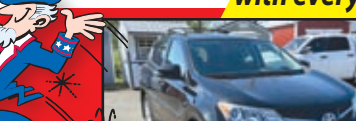

office and instructions given to a subordinate to impugn the credibility of the whistleblower to a defense attorney. Commissioner Paul Fournier then began the discussion on the resolution, saying that he had continued to receive calls, texts and emails about the situation from concerned constituents. Fournier said that the situation was unprecedented in his 22 years with law enforcement in the county and that he felt Olson's requirement that cases be provable beyond a reasonable doubt within two days of an investigation starting to pursue charges was unethical. Fournier said that he knew people who had retired or changed jobs because of Olson's charging decisions. All commissioners, sheriff's office staff, advocates at partner organizations and the public want, Fournier said, is for Olson to do her job and prosecute offenders, but she has refused to do so and repeatedly rejected help when offered. Fournier also noted that Olson had just that week sought a court order to force the county to pay for a criminal defense attorney to represent her office in hearings seeking subpoenas for information about Brown and the whistleblower, but was denied by the judge in the case, who said she needed to find personnel from another DA's office to represent the state in the matter. Fournier concluded by saying that the vote of no confidence was all the commissioners could do and that the matter was now in the public's hands. Commissioner Erin Skaar then chimed in, saying that the decision was not made lightly or motivated by politics and that while she was not trying to pick a fight with an elected official, given the findings of the report, the vote was an action the board needed to take. Skaar said that with Olson's staff being county employees and Olson refusing to work with commissioners to respond to complaints about them, the investigation had been necessary. Skaar, who served as development director at Tides of Change and executive director at Community Action Resource Enterprises, Tillamook's homelessness services provider, before being elected commissioner, said that working in those jobs was not about earning a paycheck but upholding part of the social contract to protect society's most vulnerable. Skaar said that Olson had been elected by voters to defend those people

and hold offenders accountable but that it was clear from her interview with the independent investigator, in which she said she thought first about offenders' rights, that she did not understand that function. "She's in the wrong job if that's her approach," Skaar said. Skaar concluded that Olson's values do not align with what she wants to see in the DA's office and that she wanted to make that disapproval known, so she would be voting no confidence. Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said that she wanted the public to understand that everyone at the county had wanted Olson to succeed and been patient with her, but that over time it had become clear that she was not receptive to feedback or help. Like Skaar, Bell said that it was uncommon for the board to get involved in the business of another elected official but that this situation warranted it. Bell reviewed the additional steps the commissioners were taking to chastise Olson, which included removing a \$20,000 stipend for Olson from the county's budget, also passed at the meeting, and not paying for Olson's liability insurance against bar complaints as her behavior was too risky for the county to backstop. Bell concluded by saying the situation was awful for the entire community, but especially victims of crimes, and that she wanted Tillamook County to be a place where victims are believed and protected and offenders held accountable. Commissioners then unanimously voted in favor of the resolution, which after summarizing the issues with Olson concluded by saying that Olson possessing the morals and values for the position, pursuing justice fairly, successfully working with law enforcement or other community partners, or effectively leading the office. Later in the meeting, Libel detailed the proposed settle-

ment that will indemnify the county from liability related to the 2023 United States Supreme Court ruling in Tyler v. Hennepin County. In that case, the supreme court found that local governments' practice of auctioning foreclosed properties and keeping proceeds beyond the taxes owed and administrative costs related to the foreclosure and auction was unconstitutional. Prior to the ruling, Tillamook County had followed state statute, auctioning foreclosed properties and sending funds surplus to taxes owed and administrative costs to taxing districts in the county. Following the ruling, there were three lawsuits filed in Oregon against various counties seeking repayment of surplus funds, which were later consolidated into a single class action suit. In a bid to avoid litigation, lawyers representing the class offered Tillamook County an opportunity to settle the litigation and absolve the county of future liability related to the decision for a one-time payment, initially proposed at \$1.5 million but later reduced to \$950,000. Libel said that while some counties wanted to fight the litigation, he saw no way they would win given the court's decision and that he recommended agreeing to the settlement. All three commissioners bemoaned needing to pay the settlement given that prior leaders had been following state law but concurred that it was the right decision and voted in favor. The \$950,000 will be paid out of the county's general fund. Commissioners also unanimously adopted a budget of \$189 million for the county for the fiscal year set to begin on July 1, including the provisions discussed and approved by the budget committee, as well as the elimination of Olson's stipend. 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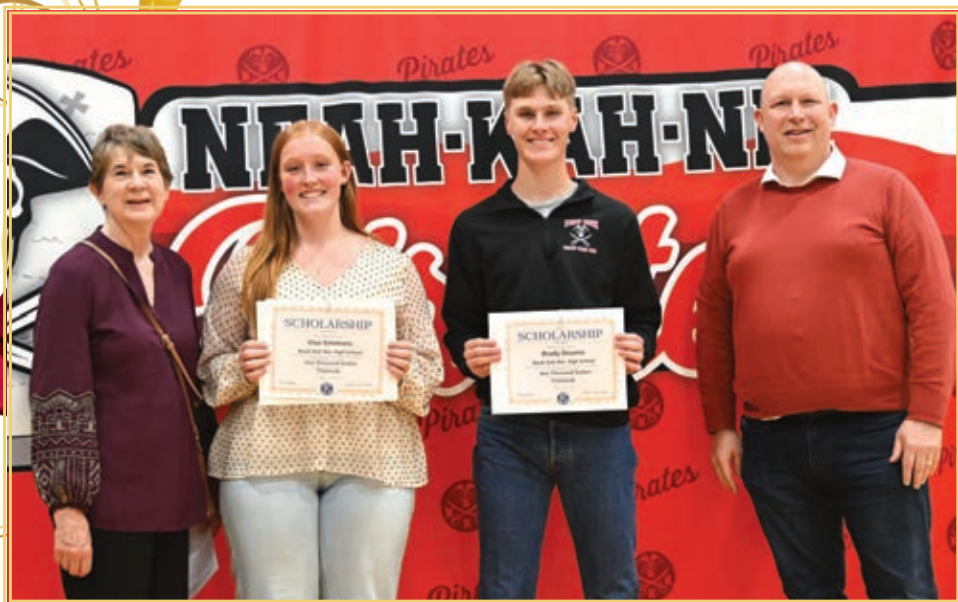

Mid-June brought the lowest tides of the year to Cape Meares beach, including two days in a row of minus 2.2 feet. There must have been 20 people ranging along the base of the headland, all headed toward the caves. On the lowest tide of the year, you can get through the second-to-last cave if the water isn't too high. It is a whole different landscape on the other side, rockier and with a black sand beach. If you try this, be sure to wear a hard hat to protect against rocks falling off the cliff, and plan to stay on the other side only 20 minutes

at the lowest point of the tide. You don't want to be caught on the other side when the tide turns, and the cave starts filling up with water again. The next lowest series of minus tides is July 14-15, at -1.9 feet. Local birder Kevin Scaldeferri spotted two hummingbirds in Cape Meares that could not retract their tongues. He says this condition is caused by a fungal infection from contaminated food and is, unfortunately, fatal, as the bird can no longer feed. He implores those who put up hummingbird feeders to clean them regularly and

replace the nectar (plain white granulated sugar and water at a 1:4 ratio). He notes that in warm weather, food can spoil in just a couple of days. He advises people to put out only what the birds will consume in two days and clean everything well before refilling the feeders. Thanks, Kevin, for this advice to help protect our feathered friends. The Bay City Arts Center (BCAC) has chosen the Cape Meares Artists Collective as its featured artists for the July "Artist of the Month" exhibition. The collective's artists who are exhibiting in this show are Bev Stein, Stacy



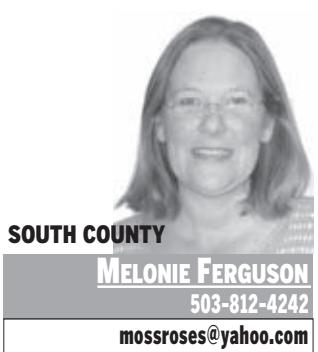
Mason, Marg Hirsch, Ciel Downing, Kirsten Blair and Raj Paonaskar. These artists work in different mediums to produce beautiful artwork in graphite sketches, oil paintings, photography, pottery, stitch art, kelp and driftwood

basketry and collaborative fiber arts. Their artwork is inspired by and showcases our coastal environment: the ocean, surrounding forests and wildlife. A special feature of the July BCAC exhibit will be "Sewing Dissent: Against Erasure," a collaborative quilt created by 40 women in Oregon. The quilt includes squares contributed by Cape Meares quilters Bev Stein, Jenny Frances and Kirsten Blair. The project was inspired by a March 2025 New York Times article identifying more than 200 words reportedly flagged or removed from federal web-

sites and communications. Each participating quilter was assigned three of those words to use in stitching a uniquely designed quilt block. The BCAC exhibition will be the first time the quilt has been displayed in public. There will be an opening reception for the Cape Meares Artists Collective at the BCAC on Friday, July 3, from 5-7 p.m., and a second gallery showing on Saturday, July 18, from 1-4 p.m. Admission is free. BCAC is located at 5680 A Street in Bay City. Please join the community in celebrating our artists and their work.

It's farmer's market season in south Tillamook County. A market sets up on Saturday mornings across U.S. Highway 101 from Neskowin way-side in Neskowin. It's open from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturdays, weekly well into September. Pacific City's version sets up in the parking lot of South Tillamook County Library (off of Brooten Road on Camp Street). It's open from 10 a.m. through 2

p.m. weekly, also beyond Labor Day, into September. Open rain or shine, the markets have come a long, long way since their beginnings. They not only offer fresh local produce and handcrafted local treasures, but also frequently feature live music, and other entertainments, give aways and a place to meet and get to better know our neighbors. Thinking outside the basket

I had never heard the words “gabion basket” until my sister in Pennsylvania told me she had made one.

A bit of background: Lynn has been as addicted to gardening as I am for as long as I can remember. She used to focus on vegetables and still grows a few but not as many as she used to do when her family was still at home. Lynn is very creative in her gardening and when she used an old dog run to successfully shelter her tomatoes and peppers from the deer, I was not surprised. But gabion? I was intrigued.

And then she sent me a photo of her latest project. Turns out I do know what a gabion basket is. I had just never heard the word. You will recognize them, too, when I explain they are the heavy mesh wire baskets filled with rocks that act as

retaining walls to protect against erosion. You will see them along the highway north of Manzanita at the lookout. They are also used elsewhere in the country along the highways. But there are also gabions that are smaller and can be used as retaining walls in yards and gardens.

The word stems from the Italian gabbione and means “big cage.” They have been around for centuries with Leonardo da Vinci even designing one to shore up the foundation at Milan’s San Marco Castle. That one was called Corbeille Leonard, or Leonardo’s basket. Very early gabions were made of willow instead of metal and were filled with rocks to protect fortresses in Europe. A notable one was used in 1573 to protect gun emplacements around Edinburgh Castle in Scotland.

But why would Lynn want one for her garden when her property is relatively flat and not

subject to erosion? While they can act as walls, it is sort of overkill to use as a fence. Her reasoning came down to an old wire freezer basket that she was looking to repurpose. She found a planter that fit in the center of the basket leaving about five to six inches on all sides. Since it would be heavy, Lynn placed the basket with its planter where she knew it would live permanently. Of course, the planter had to have drainage holes.

Lynn then surrounded the planter with flattish rocks that she had collected from her yard and



garden over the years. She did admit that it took some time and a great deal of patience to place the rocks in the basket.

Once the basket was

done, Lynn went shopping for small, shade plants that would do well in the location. She found two coleus plants that looked perfect for the gabion, and voila. A new garden planter.

While the rocks that Lynn used were flat and about six inches in diameter, I can see a gabion filled with smaller rocks and maybe even shells from the beach. In that case, the wire portion of the gabion would have to be small enough to keep shells and smaller rocks contained. But it would be a great way to display a rock collection, too.

There is also the possibility of just stacking rocks around a planter instead of using the wire basket. That would give it a similar effect, although it wouldn’t be as stable.

The bottom line is with a little bit of creative thought and an occasional trip to thrift and recycling stores, we can all be thinking outside the basket.

Greetings from Rockaway Beach! I was excited to hear

that youth summer parks and recreation programming is coming back to

Rockaway Beach. In partnership with the North County Recreation District (NCRD) and the Neah-Kah-Nie School District (NKN), the City will take part in a pilot project providing youth 6-12 years of age with a summer camp opportunity.

At the June 10th Council workshop and meeting, the city approved the summer camp scheduled for July 6th through August 21st. The camp will be held primarily at the NKN Middle School, and will serve 20 participants per week at no cost to the youth or their families. The seven week program has the potential to serve 140 different children, but kids can participate more than a single week.

This summer day camp will be managed by NCRD,

whose priority is increasing recreational opportunities for the youth of north Tillamook County. The goal is to provide safe, active and engaging summer activities for youth in our community. NCRD recently received a donated bus, so as part of the program there will be swimming in the new aquatic center in Nehalem.

Bringing back a summer parks and recreation program been a goal of the city council, and due to the financial support from the city, priority will go to youth who live in Rockaway Beach, or those whose parents have a 2nd home and pay taxes in the city. City councilors expressed the desire to make sure

all the slots are filled, so if there are additional openings, youth who live in Garibaldi and Bay City who attend NKN schools will also be welcome.

Families interested in the program, can find more information and the application to participate on the City of Rockaway Beach’s website and Facebook page. This is a pilot project, and after the program’s conclusion, there will be an evaluation to gauge the participation from other cities and see if the partnerships can be extended in the future to include Garibaldi and Bay City.

Many people remember the first Rockaway Beach Parks and Recreation Program which was created by Phyllis Baker when she served on City Council. The program would begin July 5th, with a clean-up of all the July 4th beach de-

bris, and end that day with a bonfire to celebrate a fun day’s work. The former program included arts and crafts in the park, street dances and field trips to places like OMSI in Portland. This program was also free to participants, but the difference was that Phyllis Baker organized all the volunteers, and all the fundraising activities to support the program.

Guess they knew a good man when they saw one.

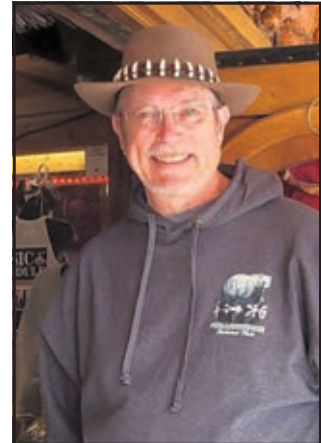

What a weekend. I knew it would be hot, but it got too hot to work, too early in the day. To top it off, one of my garden nozzles broke in the open position. Of course, I was not able to take the nozzle off or turn the valve to stop the water to the hose. As a result, the garden did not get watered until Monday when a pair of stronger hands than mine could replace the nozzle and tighten the connections. When I started looking around, I realized that my garden equipment was getting old. It may be time for some replacements. How does that happen?

Monday, the 15th, was the city council's business meeting at which the city's budget for the upcoming fiscal year was discussed and subsequently passed. State shared revenue is used in support of the general fund activities that include fire, planning and property. There were numerous comments from the public at this meeting, unlike at the budget meeting when there were no comments. Concerns were expressed about staff raises; the budget committee looked at those and did not make any changes. Citizens continue raising concerns regarding the current 32-hour work week. That is not something that can change through the budget process.

During that budget committee meeting, several questions came up about specifics in the budget that management will begin looking at in more detail for the council and the public. In the July workshop, for example, council will look at staff salaries. The budget shows staff salary by fund, but not in total. The budget committee requested that salary be laid out so committee members, and others, can see what individuals are being paid. The same holds for personnel benefits. There were members who wanted to know specifically what each employee is being paid. The city's interim manager is planning to conduct a salary survey to determine where in the spectrum of salary Garibaldi's employees are being paid. That should result in good data for the council to consider going forward.

The city is still looking for a second contractor to

assess the asbestos in the ceiling downstairs before any further mold remediation begins. Upgraded internet services will allow access to the internet anywhere in the building. Public Works talked about the street sweeping schedule, which now is available for the city's website. Other new business included a discussion of holiday events, hiring summer firefighters, and a discussion about problems with roosters. The city will have to address this and other code enforcement issues. It does sound like roosters are living in city limits – I can hear them at the south end of town, and I am nowhere near anyone.

The council also discussed past audits. The FY 24 audit is expected to be completed and issued in July or August, although an exact date has not yet been set. This will be the fourth audit completed under the city's current finance director, Becca Harth, who has been steadily working to bring the city's audits up to date since joining the city in

March 2024. Ms. Harth asked the city's auditor to meet with the council after the next audit is issued. That discussion will give the council and the public an opportunity to hear about any patterns, problems, or concerns identified during the last four audits.

That leaves the FY 25 audit to be completed. The FY 26 audit is due December 30, 2026; this one is not yet due or overdue. Once again, the city is on the brink of getting caught up with the audits. My personal goal is to get these audits caught up. I started working toward this goal in October 2021. It has been a roller coaster ride, but we have persevered and the city will get these audits completed and brought up to date. See me shaking my head.

Garibaldi Emergency Volunteers are planning to hold a raffle in support of the storage container they obtained to house emergency supplies for the city. For the supplies to be properly housed, electricity needs to be provided to the container to maintain the environment. Think dehumidifier to reduce mold/mildew growth. The GEV is "gathering" prizes for the raffle and will have tickets available soon. This is for the city's residents in case of emergency – it is for all of us. Let us get out and support the work of the GEV to keep us all safe. If everyone buys one raffle ticket, that should provide the support they need.

group then took over, saying that their company had been hired last year to help the county space plan for the courthouse, during which process it was determined that an additional 13,000 square feet would be needed to appropriately accommodate all departments and the circuit court. That led county commissioners, who are required by statute to provide adequate space for the circuit court, to purchase the 13,000-square-foot ex-BLM building to meet those needs and keep DLR under contract to help with design for a remodel of the building.

The purpose of the initial meeting, the consultants said, was to develop a set of goals that would help them develop three general options for ways to use the space and will be used by commissioners to evaluate those options and select one to develop into a final design.

Tillamook County Circuit Court Administrator Chris Hamilton kicked off the discussion by detailing the plans he and Judge Jonathan Hill have developed to meet the circuit court's space needs in the courthouse.

Hamilton said they believed almost all the circuit court's needs could be accommodated on the first floor of the courthouse,

by converting the board of county commissioners' meeting room back into a courtroom and turning the space occupied by the county clerk's office into a third courtroom. The re-converted courtroom would largely be used for justice court and would also have chambers for the presiding judge attached, while the new courtroom would be built to the same specifications as those in Multnomah County and suited to host large trials.

Hamilton concluded by saying that he and Hill had spoken with the Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ) about state funding opportunities and learned that they expected courthouse repair funding to be on the agenda in next year's legislative session (the state pays for a portion of courthouse capital expenses). Hamilton also said that the courts would still need to use the basement for jury assembly.

Discussion then moved to goal setting, with Commissioner Mary Faith Bell starting the conversation by saying that she hoped the state would pay for work at the courthouse while the county paid for work at the new annex.

Commissioner Paul Fournier agreed, saying that his top goals were making sure that the county used as little of its own money as possible for renovations at the annex and work to occupy it as soon as possible. Fournier

said that while he would like to do a big renovation to the building, the county did not have the money for it, so he would like to prioritize moving staff there as soon as possible to make renovations possible at the courthouse.

Commissioner Erin Skaar said that she agreed with Fournier in principle but that she wanted to make sure that employees' needs were met and they were not thrown in cubicles, and Fournier said that had not been his intent.

One of the DLR consultants noted that half of the ex-BLM building currently configured as a warehouse needed to undergo work and receive a change in its occupancy certificate before it could be used to house employees.

The group then brainstormed a list of goals for the project, including making the building easily accessible for the public, employee security, finding as much outside funding as possible, ensuring quality, efficient working spaces, future proofing the project as much as possible and seismic safety.

Bell wondered if it would be possible to move the community development department, tax and assessment, and clerk back together in the new building to increase efficiency for members of the public, triggering a conversation about whether efficiency for employees or the public should be prioritized.

Skaar then chimed in, saying that commissioners needed to ensure that adequately meeting the space needs of the circuit court remained their top goal in the process and not get lost in the shuffle.

Meeting attendees then placed stickers on notes with the various goals to indicate their prioritization, with securing outside money, efficiency for customers and efficiency for staff receiving the most support.

Commissioners quickly agreed that those three, along with meeting circuit court space needs, should be the top goals to guide DLR in crafting its options.

Conversation then moved into guidelines about which departments should stay and go, with Hagerty saying that the courts and related legal and law enforcement offices would need to stay.

Bell said that she preferred to look at the question from the perspective of who would move to the annex, rather than who would stay in the courthouse, and that she felt if made the most sense to try to move the three departments she had previously mentioned, as well as emergency management.

Fournier said that he thought that one of the options should focus on clearing out the courthouse's first floor to allow the circuit court's plans to be accomplished.

Hagerty chimed in that she did not believe state funding for courthouse renovations was time-sensitive and that it would also be available in subsequent legislative sessions. Bell responded that she had discussed the issue with Hill, and he felt that there were advantages specific to the 2027 legislative session as it related to securing funding for the courthouse, namely a wider push by DOJ to fund projects across the state and Skaar's presidency of the Association of Oregon Counties.

Skaar then said that the next step needed to be looking at the spatial dimensions of the first floor of the courthouse against the available space in the ex-BLM building to figure out if anything from the second floor of the courthouse would also need to move.

One of the consultants then said that they would record the goals and work on that process before having a follow-up discussion with commissioners to inform them in creating the three initial options for the new space.

OSP braces for summer traffic challenges

Driver behavior is key

Law enforcement agencies in Tillamook County and across the state are bracing for the summer travel season.

Country Media reached out to Oregon State Police (OSP) Lt. Logan Denney to find out what type of driver behavior troopers are seeing, and how the troopers are dealing with traffic challenges along Highway 101 in Tillamook County throughout Oregon.

Country Media: As we head into the summer travel season in Oregon, what is most concerning to you and OSP troopers about driver behavior?

Lt. Logan Denney: Summer marks the start of Oregon's annual travel season, when we welcome more visitors and see higher traffic volumes statewide. With increased travel and good weather, many people are eager to reach their destinations. Our greatest concerns relate to the Fatal Five SOLID behaviors, which are statistically linked to serious injury and fatal crashes: Speed, Occupant Safety, Lane Safety, Impaired Driving and Distracted Driving.

SPEED: Please drive the speed limit and give yourself plenty of time. Check Oregon Trip Check for travel distances, congestion and delays, especially in areas expecting heavy event or holiday traffic.

OCCUPANT SAFETY: Always wear your seatbelt and ensure children are secured in approved car seats or appropriate passenger safety devices.

LANE SAFETY: Two lane corridors see a high number of dangerous passing attempts, especially during heavy traffic. These preventable actions can contribute to fatal or serious injury crashes. Following too closely also reduces reaction time and increases crash risk.

IMPAIRED DRIVING: For festivities and holidays, plan ahead for a sober ride home. There is no excuse to drive while impaired. Remember: If you feel different, you drive different. Fatigue or drowsiness also reduces focus. Take breaks or switch drivers if needed.

DISTRACTED DRIVING: Never drive distracted, especially with a cell phone (ORS 811.507). Hand your phone to a passenger and keep your attention on the road. Watching entertainment on in car screens or other devices while driving is also illegal (ORS 815.240).

Country Media: Are speeds along our state highways increasing and if so, why is that, and what are the higher speed ranges?

Denney: Speed limits remain the same as covered in ORS 811.111 and ORS 811.100. For speed related crash trends, we refer you to ODOT's statewide crash data. Speeding increases crash severity by reducing reaction time, increasing the likelihood of losing control and high impact momentum, all of which can be deadly or cause significant property damage.

Country Media: As a driver, I have noted that often, other drivers tailgate and, in some cases, drive quite close to other vehicles at high rates of speed. Are your troopers also noticing that type of driver behavior?

Denney: Yes. Following

Too Closely (ORS 811.485) is a common violation, especially among drivers who are rushing or speeding. The statute reads: Drives a motor vehicle so as to follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for the speed of the vehicles and the traffic upon, and condition of, the highway.

This is a Class B violation with a presumptive fine of \$265.

Country Media: Are you also seeing more road rage incidents? If so, why is that?

Denney: Aggressive driving is more common during periods of high traffic and congestion. We encourage drivers to be patient, plan ahead and understand that slower traffic is often unavoidable.

If you have a vehicle hazard, move over or out of the lane of travel to avoid blocking traffic lanes and providing safe passage in the active travel lanes.

Country Media: Are there any specific locations that troopers are finding the higher speeds, and what is OSP doing to enforce the speed limits in those areas?

Denney: We encourage all motorists to obey posted speeds on interstates, highways, secondary roads and city streets across Oregon. When traveling through a new or unfamiliar area, always check posted speed limits and drive with care.

Country Media: What is the recommendation to drivers about avoiding confrontations that could lead to road rage?

Denney: For non-emergency driving complaints, call *OSP (*677). For crimes in progress, call 911 to reach the

appropriate dispatch center.

Drive with patience and awareness. Every driver is headed somewhere, and following speed limits and traffic flows accordingly helps safeguard our roadways.

If an aggressive driver is following or tailgating you, move to the far right lane, pull over, or take the next exit. If you feel unsafe, contact law enforcement.

Country Media: What are the presumptive fines for road rage, for speeding, for tailgating, and for reckless driving?

Denney: Fines can range from \$100 to more than \$1,000, depending on the violation and circumstances. Relevant laws include:

- ORS 811.135 – Careless Driving
- ORS 811.100 – Violation of Basic Rule (Speed)
- ORS 811.111 – Exceeding Speed Limit
- ORS 811.485 – Following Too Closely

- ORS 811.370 – Failure to Drive Within Lane

Reckless Driving (ORS 811.140) is a crime and may result in arrest, a vehicle tow and a required court appearance.

Country Media: Would you say that a key driving defense is the need to anticipate other motorists' actions to stay safe?

Denney: We will refer you to ODOT DMV's Driver Handbook on safe and responsible driving.

Safe & Responsible Driving

The key to being a safe and responsible driver is to be aware of your surround-

ings at all times and to be alert for potentially dangerous situations.

Defensive Driving

Know how to adjust your driving to allow for problems with your vehicle, the type of road surface, poor weather, heavy traffic, poor lighting, and your own physical, mental, and emotional condition.

You must be able to see what is to the front, sides, and rear of your vehicle. Do not load or equip your vehicle in any way that blocks what you can see. Placing stickers or other objects on your vehicle's windows can limit your view of the road.

You will constantly make decisions every mile that you drive. A defensive driver is always aware of their surroundings and possible escape routes.

Tillamook Medical Minute:

Foot Pain Isn’t Just Aging — Here’s When to Seek Care

It’s common to hear people say, “My feet just hurt because I’m getting older.” While aging can bring changes to the body, including joints and muscles, persistent or worsening foot pain should never be dismissed as inevitable. In many cases, pain is a signal — not of age, but of a treatable condition that deserves attention.

Feet are complex structures made up of bones, ligaments, tendons and nerves, all working together to support movement and balance. Over time, wear and tear can contribute to issues like arthritis or reduced flexibility. However, these changes should not automatically lead to chronic pain. Conditions such as plantar fasciitis, tendon injuries, nerve compression or even subtle fractures are often misattributed to aging when, in fact, they can be diagnosed and managed effectively.

One of the most common mistakes people make is waiting too long to seek care. Foot pain that lingers for weeks, worsens with activity, or begins to limit daily movement should be evaluated. Pain that changes walking patterns can lead to additional strain on the knees, hips and back, creating a broader impact on overall health. Early intervention, whether through proper footwear, physical therapy or targeted treatment, can prevent minor issues from becoming more serious.

Certain symptoms should prompt more immediate

attention. Swelling, redness, warmth or sudden pain without a clear cause may indicate an underlying injury or inflammation. Numbness, tingling or burning sensations can point to nerve involvement, which may require specific care. For individuals living with chronic conditions such as diabetes, even small foot concerns like cuts, blisters or changes in skin color should not be overlooked, as they can lead to more serious complications if untreated.

Lifestyle and environment also play a role. In communities where daily work involves standing for long hours, navigating uneven terrain or working in wet conditions, foot strain is common. Footwear that doesn’t provide proper support or protection can add to the problem, especially over

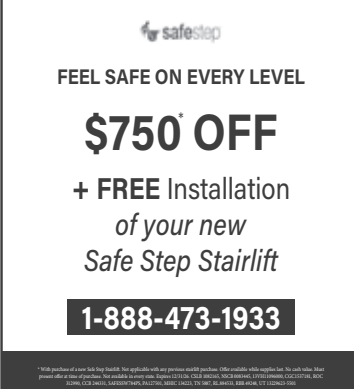

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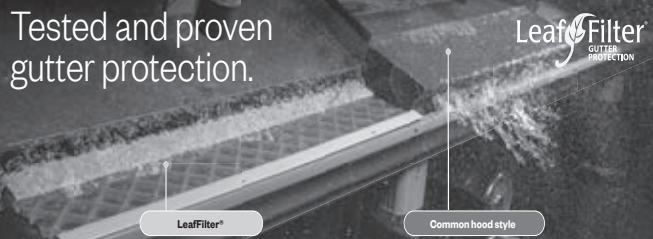

Tillamook Board of Commissioners adopts vote of no confidence in district

Attorney, removes supplemental compensation

At its June 17 meeting, the Tillamook County Board of Commissioners voted to adopt a resolution of no confidence in District Attorney (DA) Aubrey Olson. The board also approved to remove her supplemental compensation, which is an optional, county-provided, stipend that is dependent

on job performance. These actions reflect the board’s continued dissatisfaction with DA Olson after the county’s investigation into complaints filed with its Human Resources department by members of the public and county employees regarding the DA’s office. The investigation substantiated 35 complaints related to professionalism; deficient prosecution of crimes; treatment of victims, their families and criminal justice partners;

and concerns about interactions between county law enforcement and employees in the DA’s office. In total, 7 people submitted complaints, and several were related to the handling of serious crimes, including child sex abuse and domestic violence cases. Since the findings were shared with DA Olson and the public, the county has not received further communication from the DA’s office outlining plans to address these concerns.

In addition, DA Olson has served the county with criminal subpoenas demanding information that is unrelated to a criminal matter, to include who has complained about the DA’s office and how the county paid for its investigation. The county also was notified of retaliatory behavior in the DA’s office towards a legally protected whistleblower who provided information to the investigator. The Human Resources department has issued a formal

notice to the DA reaffirming whistleblower protections and directing that no retaliatory or adverse actions be taken towards the whistleblower. Based on the investigation findings, improper use of criminal subpoenas, and retaliatory behavior, the board voted to express no confidence in DA Olson and determined her job performance did not justify the additional compensation. While a district attorney’s base salary is paid by the state of Oregon, a

county supplemental stipend is meant to increase their overall compensation to a level that is commensurate with the character of service performed. (ORS 8.830) District attorneys are elected state officials accountable only to county voters and not subject to county oversight. Nonetheless, the Board of Commissioners remains committed to accountability, transparency, and effective criminal justice for all Tillamook County residents.

to one count of harassment, a class B misdemeanor, committed on or about July 27, 2025. Biegel was sentenced to three days in jail and two years’ probation.



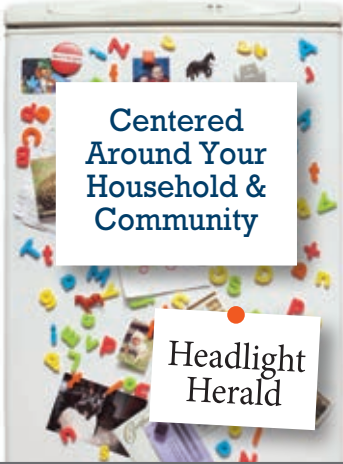
