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Health dept. reports two new COVID-19 cases, brings Tillamook County total to nine

A s Tillamook enters into its third week of Phase 2 of reopening and restrictions related to the novel cronavirus, two more cases of COVID-19 are reported.

The Tillamook County Public Health Department announced Sunday, June 28, that it has been informed of the eighth and ninth positive cases of COVID-19 coronavirus in the county. The individuals are between the ages of 60-69 and 30-39

respectively. Public health department staff is working with both individuals who remain under self-isolation at home. Contact investigation is currently ongoing. Community members with health concerns can contact the Health Center's COVID-19 nurse line at 503-842-3940.

COVID-19 is a highly infectious illness. Local and state health officials continue to urge all Oregonians to take steps to protect those who are most vulnerable to complications from CO-VID-19. Those considered "high risk" include adults 60 and older, or anyone with a serious health condition, including lung or heart problems, kidney disease, or diabetes, or anyone who has a suppressed immune system.

To help control the spread of the illness the public is urged to follow Oregon Gov. Kate Brown's March 23 executive order to stay home to the maximum extent

possible.

Every resident should take these basic steps to protect those most at risk: • Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or

sneeze.
Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

Avoid touching your

eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands. • Stay home if you feel ill.

COVID-19 testing in Tillamook County

What you need to know

Have COVID-19 symptoms? Think you came in contact with a positive case? Need to be tested to return to work or travel?

These questions have left many people wondering, who's really eligible to be tested in Tillamook County?

COVID-19 testing at both Adventist Health locations and the Tillamook County Health Department follow the criteria outlined by Oregon Health Authority and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The criteria includes first consulting with a medical professional to determine if testing is necessary.

"We encourage patients who think they need testing for COVID-19 symptoms or exposure, to call our offices and make an appointment for an inperson or virtual evaluation," said Cherie Plaisted, Marketing and Communication Manager for Adventist Health. "During the call, tell the provider about your symptoms and how you think you may have been exposed to the virus.' While a healthcare provider must order the test, Adventist Health is conducting tests for patients who are required to have them by employers to return to work and when required for travel purposes. 'To keep everyone safe, anyone with COVID-19 symptoms should call their healthcare provider in advance of any visit to discuss their illness and allow the provider to prepare for your arrival," Plaisted said.

INSIDE OUT JUNE DAIRY PARADE: 'HERD' IT WAS ALL FUN

The 63rd annual June Dairy Parade was unlike any other in the longstanding history of the event.

Due to some outside-of-the-box planning by the Tillamook Chamber board and staff this year's event took on a new look, dubbed an inside out parade.

Instead of miles of floats parading through downtown Tillamook, the floats stayed in place and the spectators drove through the route, where they could enjoy the festivities from the safety of their car.

When COVID-19 restrictions began

shutting down events left and right, the Tillamook Chamber of Commerce knew they would have to get innovative to keep the parade alive.

"We could have easily just folded up and said 'no parade this year' but I think it was important for the community to honor June Dairy Month and continue as much of a tradition as we could," said the Chamber's Executive Director Justin Aufdemauer.

Aufdermauer said, they had just over 400 cars drive through the parade route on June 27, which consisted of approximately 50 entries staged for three-quarters of a mile. As cars drove through in groups of 30, parade entries passed out candy, cheese, jerky and more goodies from a safe distance.

"I feel like this event was really all for the community," Aufdermauer said. "Just seeing how happy everyone was and how the entries were having a great time was really all we need to measure that it was a success."

Aufdermauer said there was a steady stream of cars all day long. "I don't think we could have had any better turn out and

Gov. Brown extends face coverings requirement to statewide beginning July 1

Gov. Kate Brown announced Monday, June 29, that Oregonians statewide will be required to wear face coverings in indoor public spaces, beginning this Wednesday, July 1. The guidance applies to

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businesses and members of the public visiting indoor public spaces. Face covering requirements are already mandated in eight counties.

"From the beginning of the reopening process, I have said that reopening comes with the risk of seeing an increase in COVID-19 cases beyond our health systems' capacity to test, trace, and isolate them," Brown said. "Over the last month, we have seen the disease spread at an alarming rate in both urban and rural counties. The upcoming July 4 holiday weekend is a critical point for Oregon in this pandemic, and we can all make a difference."

"Modeling from the Oregon Health Authority shows that if we don't take further action to reduce the spread of the disease, our hospitals could be overwhelmed by new COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations within weeks," Brown said. ""The choices every single one of us make in the coming days matter."

Brown said face coverings that cover your nose and mouth play a critical role in reducing the spread of this disease because droplets from our breath can carry the virus to others without us realizing it. If we all wear face coverings, practice six feet of physical distancing in public, wash our hands regularly, and stay home when we are sick, then we can avoid the worstcase scenarios that are now playing out in other states.

"I do not want to have to close down businesses again like other states are now doing," Brown said. "If you want your local shops and restaurants to stay open, then wear a face covering when out in public."

Please keep your Fourth of

July celebrations small and local, Brown said. There had been a lot of new COVD-19 cases following the Memorial Day holiday. Another spike in cases after the upcoming holiday weekend could put Oregon in a dangerous position.

"Oregonians have all made incredible sacrifices over the last several months that have saved thousands of lives," Brown said. "The actions we take now can protect our friends, neighbors, loved ones, and fellow Oregonians from this disease, and prevent the need for another statewide shutdown. We are truly all in this together."

Oregon Occupational Safety and Health (OSHA) will take the lead, along with other state and local agencies, in enforcing face covering requirements for all covered Oregon businesses. Results from the tests vary in wait time depending on availability of supplies and capacity.

"For patients with symptoms, we provide rapid point-of-care testing, also known as PCR testing," Plaisted said. "Adventist Health Tillamook uses the Abbott Rapid ID PCR test units at our clinics in Manzanita, Lincoln City, Vernonia and Estacada, as well as at our medical center here in Tillamook. Rapid ID test results are available within 20 to 40 minutes of testing. For clinics without PCR, the tests are sent to the hospital for analysis and are available within 24 hours. Test results from outside labs take an average of five days to return, depending on the lab's capacity, staffing, and other factors."

Those who need testing for non-medical reasons (travel or return to work) should plan ahead to allow for time for test results to be returned.

"Each week, we receive a specific number of tests and swabs for each rapid point-of-care testing site based on our needs," Plaisted said. "One of the benefits of being a part of a system of hospitals is that if our demand grows, we can access additional supplies, beds and expertise should we need it. However, the number of available tests and swabs are limited, so we must test based upon CDC and OHA guidelines. We work hard to manage the testing resources to balance an individual's desired to be tested with their need to be tested. By managing our testing resources carefully, we can ensure that we have testing supplies available to meet all of the needs for medically necessary testing."

Early on in the pandemic, testing availability was extremely limited based upon strict criteria from the CDC.

"As supplies and equipment have become available, we have increased testing based on guidelines, directives and needs," said Plaisted.

For those receiving tests at the Tillamook County Health Department, patients can expect to wait three to five days for results as they are all sent to the State lab.

According to Tillamook County Director of Emergency Management Gordon McCraw, currently, the Health Department receives 10 tests a week from the State.

"If we had a spike, they would ship many more," McCraw said.

Tillamook County Leadership discusses governor's opt-in face mask guidance

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Tillamook County Leadership discussed at their community meeting Friday, June 26, Gov. Kate Brown's opt-in guidance for wearing face masks, as well as other county updates related to COVID-19. "I've been very involved the last couple of days working

with trying to provide some liability waivers for businesses, schools districts and local governments, so that if they are following recommended

guidelines and responsible procedures, that they could not be sued if an employee or customer believes they contracted COVID from that business, in that school or in that government office," Rep. David Gomberg said. "I actually worked to create a letter, signed by 10 other Democrats, asking the Democratic leadership to move forward with an amendment that would provide that liability waiver."

Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administration Marlene Putman said

a seventh confirmed case was reported in the county on June 22, the first new case since April. On Sunday, June 28, the Tillamook County Public Health Department announced that it has been informed of the eighth and ninth positive cases of COVID-19 in the county.

The center has received guidance from Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and the governor's office on face coverings. For the public in general, individuals are to wear masks, face shields or face coverings in all indoor spaces where

physical distancing cannot be maintained. New guidance states that children between the ages of two and 12 are to wear masks as well.

Putman added there are 28 individuals who are prepared to conduct contact tracing and they can still provide an online testing to train people to be a contact tracer if needed.

Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said a lot of people had contacted the commissioners, asking them to opt in to Gov. Kate Brown's requirement for face masks. As of June 26,

they were scheduled to discuss this at their board meeting at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 1.

Commissioner Bill Baertlein said so far, he had only heard comments from people who wanted to opt in to the rules.

The City of Manzanita also asked the governor's office if the city could opt in to the face mask rules. They are currently following local guidance they issued for their city.

"People are really getting on board with this mask thing,' Manzanita Mayor Mike Scott.

Other cities were planning to make resolutions for local mask wearing, including Nehalem and Rockaway Beach. On Monday, June 29,

Brown announced that Oregonians statewide will be required to wear face coverings in indoor public spaces, beginning Wednesday, July 1. The guidance applies to businesses and members of the public visiting indoor public spaces.

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City manager, public works director resigns from Bay City

Bay City Council held a special meeting Wednesday, June 24, to discuss Chance Steffey's resignation from the city manager and public works director positions. The city also extended the state of emergency declaration through Aug. 11.

Steffey resigned from both positions Monday, June 22.

"When I took the public works position, I thought it was a wonderful opportunity for a local boy to come back home and help give back to the community that I have always called home," Steffey wrote in a letter. "I really tried to make improvements that I thought were necessary to develop

more effective services through more efficient processes."

"I took the city manager position because someone needed to facilitate the processes to keep the city going, but again I have failed not only myself, you, the staff but also this community.'

At the meeting, the council decided to task the administrative committee with preparing the request and search for both a public works director and an interim city manager. The interim city manager would be a city manager that also guides the city through the transition from their former system of council acting as city manager to a fully documented procedure for a city manager, including updating ordinances.

Mayor David McCall said he and

the afternoon after Steffey's resignation and her recommendation was to separate functions Steffey had and assign them to different individuals. The city council as a whole is not flexible enough.

Baker spoke with the city attorney

Until the city has an interim manager, they have divided the city manager's duties among different individuals. The mayor will perform the administrative duties and Council President Kathy Baker will perform the personnel and human resources-related duties. Current staff will oversee public works operations with Baker taking on the public works liaison position.

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Emergency Medical students practice skills through simulation scenarios

"You are called out to an ATV accident at Sand Lake for a young female who was the un-helmeted rider on an ATV that crashed into another ATV. Patient is complaining of left thigh pain and is a little confused.

What do you do? This scenario is just one example of what the Emergency Medical Services students at Tillamook Bay Community College (TBCC) faced at their simulation trainings on June 11.

In partnership with Adventist Health Tillamook, Nehalem Bay Fire & Rescue, Rockaway Beach Fire Rescue, and Nestucca Rural Fire Protection District, TBCC created scenarios with live actors for a hands-on-experience for their students.

"Under normal circumstances our EMS 106 class would participate in clinical and field rotations throughout the term," said Brooke Bennett, TBCC Program Coordinator. "The requirements are one, eight hour shift in the ER for a clinical rotation;

and two, 12 hour shifts on the ambulance for field rotations. COVID has prevented students from the opportunity to participate in these rotations."

COVID impacted healthcare programs throughout the country with delays in testing, labs, and clinical placements. The TBCC students were in jeopardy of not receiving hands-on experience before the term ended. TBCC worked with local partners to devise live simulations and alternate clinical experience, ultimately allowing students to complete the program.

At the training there were four stations, three with live patient scenarios and one in a moving ambulance. Jesse Walsh with Nehalem Bay Fire & Rescue provided a thorough demonstration of a high-fidelity mannequin.

"Practice and repetition is so critical," said Todd Hesse, Rockaway Beach Fire Chief. "Hands-on is one of the three main ways of learning. It prepares them for the field. It's really important."

Students entered the live patient scenarios by being read the circumstances of the settings. Broken legs. Chest pain. Respiratory distress. All ailments portrayed by live

actors.

"Each of the (participating) partners brought staff members to serve as proctors and live patients," Bennett said. "I had been researching the best way to conduct scenarios and every positive outcome shows the use of EMS professionals or Standardize Patients (people that are paid actors to act out a patient role)...I learned of the advantage of having EMS professionals to be able to lead students as the scenarios play out."

Students were expected to verbalize and walk through how they would respond in each situation.

"You can get ready on some points on a mannequin, but to look and solve a problem by talking to your patient [makes a difference]," EMS student Casey Cannon said.

In the ambulance simulation, students were given an orientation of the equipment, medications, and expected to administer CPR in the back of a moving unit.

"They get a sense of the limitations by being in the back of the unit," said Dr. Mark Bowman, Prehospital Physician Advisor at Adventist Health Tillamook and Medical Director for the Healthcare

Programs at TBCC, who helped oversee the training.

Even in the midst of the COVID pandemic, students are still eager to join the emergency medicine field.

"These students are people who are driven and bootson-the-ground type people," Bennett said.

While the simulated event does not replace students' cognitive exam and psychomotor exam in order to get their National Certification and State Licensing, it is an opportunity for students to get hands-on-training while waiting to resume their field rotations.

The three fire districts involved in the training have agreed to sign an Affiliation Agreement with TBCC to allow students to complete field rotation time on fire calls. Clinical and field rotations will resume with Adventist Health in July for which Adventist Health will also be paying for all students' personal protective equipment during their time there.

"I am in awe of the way these community partners have stepped up in our time of need. We are so lucky to live in Tillamook County," Bennett said. "I believe this



will be an ongoing partnership between TBCC and our local fire districts and the opportu-



Garibaldi does not need more apartment complexes

We are advertised as Garibaldi "the authentic little fishing village" Garibaldi has been our home for 28 years.

In the last four years Paul Daniels has become an apartment developer and now we have two apartment complexes, each are two and three stories high. These 30+units are not affordable housing,

We have been concerned since last fall, so we wrote up a petition for all the residents to sign, if they felt that they too, didn't want anymore apartments. We got 85 signatures in our city. We presented the petition to the city council to ask staff to investigate how we could discourage this type of development. These complexes have no connection to our 'little fishing village.'

made it clear that they are NOT interested in pursuing our request.

Some councilors keep repeating that Tillamook County needs every apartment complex. We are saying it doesn't, all, have to be in our little town.

Paul Daniels has positioned himself politically by becoming a Tillamook Bay Port commissioner, joined several business boards, and has become a City of Garibaldi councilman.

In May Daniels applied for another conditional use in Garibaldi for another 66 unit apartment complex on one of the few large, buildable parcels that are on Hwy 101.

It was presented to the planning commission on May 23. Not everyone could participate. The hearing was continued on June 10, because the planning commission requested more information to consider the impact on our small community.

On June 10, the planning commission (after 5 hours of discussion) voted 3 to deny and 2 to approve the conditional use.

Paul Daniels is appealing their decision to the city council in July, hoping that the city council will reverse the planning decision.

At the city council meeting on June 15, the council voted not to allow any new evidence, so they will be reviewing the same evidence the Planning Commission was presented.

We love our town and are desperately trying to save it's identity and commercial

and know that these facts can be verified as true. The Mayor left out four key points in her commentary.

ONE: It's a fact that in June 2015, the Garibaldi City Council voted and approved Resolution 2015-06, that "Standardized SDC Installment Payment Application and Agreement Terms" for Garibaldi. The Council established a set interest rate at "2 percent Over Prime." In 2017, that interest rate would have been 5.75 percent.

This rate was determined to be fair and equitable to both the applicants seeking SDC financing and the city taking the financial risk of assuming a loan. This resolution supersedes Ordinance 288, which was passed in January 2006, which did not set any clear or fair interest rate.

TWO: Under Resolution 2017-05, the former City Manager John O'Leary ignored the applicable Resolution 2015-06 rate and proceeded to offer Paul Daniels and his partners a 2 percent interest rate. There is no known motive or persuasion for O'Leary to grant the low rate without officially notifying the City Council as was required. As a consequence, Daniels received preferential treatment from a City employee to pay less than half of the set amount.

THREE: Under the attachment cited by Mayor Riggs, under Condition A, it was intentionally misleading to include the 2 percent interest rate as if it was part of the Oregon law ORS 233.210 and the Garibaldi Municipal Code 13.25.808. There is no particular interest rate set in either of these legal rules. FOUR: Two other applicants also received the 2 percent interest rate to finance their SDC fees. In both cases, there were no Resolutions for the City Council to vote on approving the payment agreements. In fact, there are no records to show the Council was ever told about the agreements until recently. In

comparison, the SDC financing interest rate in neighboring Bay City is reportedly set at 14 percent.

The 2 percent rate was presented to one applicant/ business owner, who wished to remain anonymous, who said the low rate was offered to him as "a deal" by O'Leary to offset what the applicant said were high SDC fees. In both cases, the applicants acted in good faith and were unaware of the City's official higher rate.

Mayor Riggs dismissed that Garibaldi city managers have made such "deals" with out council approval. These deals represent a significant loss of revenue to the city.

The city could use the money. A few weeks after I was seated to the City Council. I learned that Garibaldi's finances had been mismanaged for seven years; that there was poor budget tracking and accounting. It was such a mess that a certified accountant had to be contracted at \$18,000 to sort out just one year.

During his term, former City Councilor Norm Shattuck went on record to voice his concerns about the city's financial problems. He was ignored. At the February 18, 2020 City Council meeting, Mayor Riggs revealed that, as a City Councilor, she too was aware of the problems, but said nothing more.

In mid-2018 and 2019, the City was having problems paying its bills. Former Fire Chief James Rhyce said he complained to current City Manager Geoff Wullschlager that his chief's cell phone





Thanks to use recent Nestucca-Sandlake Watersheds Council (NNSWSC) for writing to the Fencepost with several news items. First, the Council seeks to partner with local riverfront landowners. They're working with landowners to establish native riparian vegetation at the mouth of Three Rivers and on the banks of the Nestucca River off of Resort Drive. These sites were previously host to invasive blackberry species and extensive reedcanary grass monocultures. The new sites will contain a diverse group of native shrubs and trees; including such species as, twinberry, Pacific ninebark, red-flowering currant, red-osier dogwood, western red cedar and spruce.

As these planting sites



mature, they'll provide valuable ecosystem services in the form of stream-bank stabilization, improvement to water quality for aquatic species and recreation, increased shading and future inputs of large woody debris. More immediate benefits are increased forage for native birds and pollinator species. If you are a riverfront landowner in the area and would be interested

in having a native plant restoration project on your property, please reach out to them by calling 503-965-2200.

The Council also seeks individuals to serve as volunteers to collect water samples from local collection sites for periodic testing. No experience is necessary and training is provided. The posts require 3-5 hours once a month and a reliable vehicle to transport yourself to and from remote collection sites and to deliver water samples to the Watershed Council office in Pacific City. 

Outdoor Recreation - There's a Map for That!

Imagine if there was a map that included all the outdoor recreation amenities and trails in Tillamook County. How cool would it be to have a convenient way to find places to hike, ride, paddle, bike and bird watch within minutes from where vou live?

Thanks to a partnership between Tillamook County Wellness (TCW), Visit Tillamook Coast, Northwest Youth Corps and the U.S. Forest Service, having access to this exciting resource is closer than you might imagine. Beginning in January 2020, efforts have been underway to build a GIS database and map for all recreational opportunities throughout Tillamook County. GIS Intern, Samantha "Sam" Goodwin and TCW Access to Physical Activity

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(APAC) Co-Chair, Marty Wisehart, were recently interviewed on KTIL's Tillamook Today show to share more about the project.

"There are hundreds of recreation activities in Tillamook County," Goodwin stated in her interview, "but right now people have to search all around from individual sites like State Parks or the Oregon Department of Forestry to find what there is to do here." Sam has worked with local, state and federal agencies to gather all that data and put it into one system. In the process, she has discovered many local waysides, waterfalls, parks and community pathways for which there is no official information. "We're building a one-stop place for recreation," says Sam. "This is really meant to help locals

get out and enjoy activities and the natural beauty we have here." Nan Devlin, Executive Director for Visit Tillamook Coast, states that "what is good for locals is also good for visitors and vice versa," noting that Transient Lodging Tax (TLT) revenue directed to her organization is being used to support this work.

In addition to his leadership role with TCW, Marty Wisehart is President of the Tillamook Off-Roads Trails Alliance (TORTA), which has secured funding to build more than 30 miles of mountain biking trails in the Siuslaw forest near Sandlake in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service. Trail building is slated to begin this Fall with access to trails anticipated by Summer 2021. TORTA has been actively involved in increasing community access to recreation, especially for kids and youth, by building trails and helping coordinate Trails Day events. According to Marty, "we have so many recreation assets here and a lot of it is just not known." He adds, "It's not enough to build opportunities for people to get active, we have to make sure people have the information they need to decide if an activity is right for them - if they need special gear, how easy or hard the trail is, and so on. The more information we can give to people, the more likely they will feel confident about trying something new and that's really what we want to see."

for all trail types, surfaces and difficulty levels, as well as access for people with disabilities. It will be sortable by different types of activities, including boat launches and water trails, making it easier for people to plan outings. And, for people worried about their secret destinations being discovered by the masses, county leaders acknowledge this is already happening. County Commissioner, Bill Baertlein emphasizes, "Visitors are already coming and will continue to travel here to enjoy our trails and outdoor recreation. This map and the processes supporting it will help us get out in front of the issue and be proactive rather than reactive." Leaders also state that having more places

on the map helps spread activity around, preventing heavily visited areas from being "loved to death."

Tourism leaders agree that increasing recreation within the local population instills a sense of pride and ownership, creating stewards who help protect these beautiful places. North Coast Tourism Management Network's volunteer beach and trailhead ambassador program is one example, as are volunteer opportunities through the local chapter of Trailkeepers of Oregon. For information on how to volunteer as an ambassador contact Arica Sears at icom@thepeoplescoast. com and to learn more about Trailkeepers visit https:// www.trailkeepersoforegon. org/get-involved/.

Thanks to an extension of funding and on-going support from the sponsoring agencies, the GIS mapping project will continue until all identified locations are completely mapped and approved by governing agencies. Next the group will determine how users can access the map platform on-line. Michelle Jenck, Tillamook County Wellness Coordinator indicates there is a plan to include a page or link from their new website scheduled to launch this summer.



Habitat for Humanity selected as the 2020 Halo Award winner

The Halo Awards are North America's highest honor for corporate social initiatives and cause marketing and showcase successful consumer engagement and employee engagement efforts. This prestigious CSR, cause marketing and corporate social impact award focuses on initiatives where brand purpose and social impact intersect to help build a better world and the bottom line. Such is the case for Habitat for Humanity.

There are two commonly held myths about Habitat for Humanity. First, that former President

Jimmy Carter founded the global housing nonprofit.

Second, that the organization gives homes away for free.

Neither, it turns out, are true. President and Mrs. Carter are indeed Habitat's most famous volunteers, but they didn't found the organization. And Habitat homes are not free. They are purchased by low-income homebuyers who help build them and then pay an affordable mortgage.

Habitat for Humanity began in 1976 as a grassroots effort on a community farm in southern Georgia. The Christian housing organization has since grown to become a leading global nonprofit working in local communities across all 50 states in the U.S., and in more than 70 countries. To date, Habitat has helped more than 29 million people gain access to new or improved housing.

For many years, a third myth persisted—one that was particularly vexing for the nonprofit's fundraising and communications teams. Habitat for Humanity doesn't need money, the myth went, because all the supplies are donated and volunteers provide all the labor for free. Habitat is a great activity for a Saturday morning, but it isn't a cause that needs financial support.

Of course that's not the case. Habitat depends on financial support to acquire land, employ contractors, secure permits and pay staff. While grassroots in history and culture, the organization which helped serve more than 7 million people around the world in fiscal year 2019 and is the secondlargest private homebuilder in the U.S.—depends on financial support from a wide range of donors, including major corporate partners.

To combat this challenge, Habitat has increased its focus on cause marketing and consumer fundraising. Since concentrating its efforts in 2017 around the theme of home through the organization's signature "Home is the Key" campaign, Habitat has dramatically increased the scope of its corporate partnerships with business allies such as Nissan, At Home stores, Chico'sFAS, and Google Nest. These cause campaigns, together with the long-standing support from other industry leaders such as The Home Depot, Lowe's, Wayfair and Whirlpool, fuel Habitat's work in the U.S. and abroad.

Offering varied ways of engaging has increased Habitat's appeal to corporate partners. Companies can organize employee volunteer days on a Habitat site, donate products for sale in Habitat for Humanity ReStores, or leverage major event sponsorships that offer national media platforms. Increasingly, partners that join Habitat through one channel end up deepening and widening their work with the organization over time.

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State Fire Marshal asks you to keep firework use legal, safe

The Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM), the Oregon Fire Service, natural resource agencies, Oregon licensed fireworks wholesalers, and safety experts are asking Oregonians to "keep it legal and keep it safe" when using all fireworks.

The 2020 Oregon fireworks retail sales season opens June 23 and runs through July 6. The OSFM and its partners want everyone to know what fireworks are legal to use in Oregon without a permit, where they are allowed to be used, and how to use fireworks safely.

"In Oregon, consumer legal fireworks can only be purchased from permitted fireworks retailers and stands," said State Fire Marshal Jim Walker in a press release. "State regulations limit where those fireworks may be used. Starting in July, risks for wildfire in many parts of Oregon will be high. Fireworks can also start structural fires that threaten lives and property, as we have seen in past years."

Residents who plan to visit public lands and parks for the July Fourth holiday are asked to leave all fireworks at home. The use of fireworks is prohibited in national parks and forests, on Bureau of Land Management lands, on U.S. Fish and Wildlife properties, on state beaches, in state parks, and in state

campgrounds. For residents who purchase legal fireworks, the OSFM encourages everyone to practice the four B's of safe fireworks use:

• Be prepared before lighting fireworks: keep water available by using a garden hose or bucket.

• Be safe when lighting fireworks: keep children and pets away from fireworks.

• Be responsible after lighting fireworks: never relight a dud. Wait 15 to 20 minutes then soak it in a bucket of water before disposal.

• Be aware: use only legal fireworks and use them only in legal places.

Oregon law prohibits the possession, use, or sale of any

firework that flies into the air, explodes, or travels more than 12 feet horizontally on the ground, without a permit issued by the OSFM. Fireworks commonly called bottle rockets, Roman candles, and firecrackers are illegal in Oregon, without a permit.

For the last reported five years through 2019, there were 1,173 reported fireworks-related fires in Oregon, resulting in more than \$4.9 million in property loss and contents damage. During that same period, fires resulting from fireworks resulted in

one death and 36 injuries. The data from structural fire agencies do not include incidents that occurred on federal and other state lands.

Officials may seize illegal fireworks and charge offenders with a class B misdemeanor, which could result in a fine of up to \$2,500 per violation and a civil penalty of up to \$500. Those who misuse fireworks or allow fireworks to cause damage are liable and may be required to pay fire suppression costs or other damage. Parents are also liable for fireworks damage caused by their children.

"All of us share the responsibility to use only Oregon consumer legal fireworks and use them carefully," Walker said. "Please also consider your neighbors and their pets before deciding on when and where you choose to light legal fireworks."




