

Tillamook County Pioneer Museum hosts 17th annual Festival of Trees

Next month, the Tillamook County Pioneer Museum will host its largest annual event. The 17th annual Festival of Trees gala will be held at the museum from 5:30-8 p.m. Dec. 10.

Hors d'oeuvres and beverages will be served and live music will set the holiday mood before the silent auction begins. Tickets are \$35 in advance, and all community members are invited to attend. This event will celebrate the holiday season, raise money for the pioneer museum's programs and spotlight Tillamook County's exceptional community partnerships.

The Festival of Trees will feature decorated trees, wreaths and centerpieces donated by local businesses, organizations and community members. Additionally, a wide array of gift baskets, gift cards, and other exciting items will be on display at the museum for one week starting Dec. 3 for people to bid. The silent auction will conclude the night of the gala with the winners being announced at the party. All proceeds raised from the auction will benefit the pioneer museum and will help fund some much-needed building maintenance and the 2022 temporary exhibit, which will be announced soon.

"This year's event is particularly special," said Jaykob Wood, executive director of the museum. "We were not able to host Festival of Trees in 2020, due to COVID-19, which understandably, was quite disappointing for people who attend every year. We hope that this year's event will make up for the one we lost and that lots of folks will join us for a warm evening."

Tickets for the Festival of Trees are now available at the pioneer museum's front desk or over the phone at 503-842-4553. Tickets are \$35 in advance or \$40 at the door.

"This is my first Festival of Trees," said

Founded in 1935 by Tillamook Oregon pioneers, the Tillamook County Pioneer Museum offers 19 display areas that focus on the history of the North Oregon Coast. The museum's mission is to preserve and interpret the Cultural Heritage of the North Oregon Coast and to foster appreciation and respect of the North Oregon Coast's environment. The current collection includes 55,000 items and 20,000 photographs ranging from prehistoric specimens to modern day.

COVID-19 update: Case counts, testing, vaccine information Hilary Dorsey

Tillamook County Health Department reported 43 COVID-19 cases over the last week, from Nov. 7 through Nov. 13.

"Our 14-day case count was 105," Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Ed Colson detailed during a community update Tuesday, Nov. 16. "That's from the end of October, the 31st, through Nov. 13."

The total cases this month from Nov. 1 through Nov. 14 are 124. There have been a total of 2,124 cases since March 2020.

"Our COVID-19 related deaths stand still at 42," Colson said. "That is 35 confirmed not vaccinated, one not having a vaccine record in the Alert database, and six were fully vaccinated."

Colson said there is one confirmed outbreak in the county and 12 pending investigation. Oregon Health Authority confirmed an outbreak as of Wednesday, Nov. 17, at Tillamook County Creamery Association with 22 cases.

COVID-19 testing is available at the health center's acute care clinic from 1-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Make an appointment by calling 503-842-3900. Rinehart Clinic and Adventist Health also have testing available. "For those fully vaccinated in the county, for the total population for Tillamook County who are considered vaccinated is 60.92 percent," Colson said. "We're almost to 61 percent, as of Nov. 14." Booster vaccines are available in Tillamook County, Colson added. Pfizer and Moderna are recommended six months after completing the two-dose series. Those eligible for Moderna and Pfizer boosters include individuals 65 years and older, people living in a long-term care facility, people 50-64 with underlying medical conditions, and people ages 18-64 with underlying medical conditions or who are at a higher risk of exposure due to where they live or work, such as grocery store employees and health care workers. The Johnson & Johnson boosters are recommended for those two months after receiving their single shot for people 18 and older. "Individuals eligible for a booster can receive the same or different COVID-19 vaccine as a booster dose depending on advice from a health care provider, individual preference, availability or convenience," Colson said The pediatric Pfizer vaccine is authorized for ages 5-11 in Oregon and available in Tillamook County. It is provided at the walk-in clinic, local pharmacies and through health care providers. "For the rest of the month of November, the health department will be at the fairgrounds at the 4-H dorms to have a walk-in clinic for vaccines," Colson said. "The flu vaccine, the pneumonia vaccine and all three COVID-19 vaccines are available. Vaccines are available from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and from 1-5 p.m. Wednesdays.

New documentary explores cold-case murder from 1987

Anchor Pictures will soon be releasing "Old-Growth Murder," a cold-case murder investigation documentary from the Oregon coast.

Director Tom Olsen Jr. has been researching the project over the past decade and producing it since 2015. Olsen is planning for a free public screening in Tillamook County this coming winter, with online distribution in the coming months. On Thanksgiving Day, 1987, residents of Neskowin discovered the body of Alain Malessard, a French citizen, in the Neskowin Creek Campground. The U.S. Forest Service campground had been closed for the season. Malessard, who was bicycling across North America, had been murdered at the campsite. An investigation occurred and suspects

Garibaldi implements action plan to address financial weaknesses, deficiencies

Garibaldi has developed an action plan to address deficiencies in the city's finances related to the fiscal year 2018-2019 audit. An action plan was presented during a city council meeting Monday, Nov. 15. Problems include material weaknesses, deficiencies and internal controls.

Mayor Tim Hall said the city's wellbeing depends on its financial health. After some financial irregularities he saw in 2019, he had called for a financial report to be called to the city before he came on council.

"The information being presented tonight – I assure you – that there will be steps put in place working with the city council to ensure that such financial mismanagement and deception do not happen ever again," Hall said. Linda Bade, a volunteer city resident and former auditor, presented the financial review and action plan. Last month, Bade had presented a preview of the fiscal year 2018-2019 audit to the council. The audit arrived in May but council did not seem to receive it. Independent auditing firm Accuity Certified Public Accountants performed the audit.

"There's a new requirement from the Secretary of State's Office," Bade said. "They want a plan."

Bade said she drafted a plan that goes to the heart of the comments from the auditor. The plan includes having the council involved and having controls in place the right way.

The action plan required by the Oregon Secretary of State's Office requires an action plan in response to financial statement audit findings of either material weakness or significant deficiency. The action plan was drafted for the council's comments, review, approval and signature. The action plan states the city council will provide oversight by monitoring city manager and staff activities through staff reports, approving policies and procedures, and reviewing financial reports such as budgets and monthly financials.

Bade will assist City Manager Juliet Hyams in an assessment of all policies and procedures related to the financial affairs of the city and its accounting system. This review will include looking at staff descriptions to ensure all financial and accounting processes are accounted for, assigned and have been reviewed and updated as necessary.

Internal controls are an issue. Internal controls are policies and procedures designed to prevent and/or detect and correct errors, omissions or misstatements. A deficiency in internal controls exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees to prevent or detect and correct misstatements.

The audit for 2019 came out May 26 of this year, Bade added.

Bade said the auditor noted the council's monitoring and review of the city's financial processes were not effective. The action plan includes having an organized process and a monthly review of financial statements. The council will look at policies and procedures over financial processes

that are the starting point for all activities. As they are drafted, financial reports will be put before the council for review and approval.

The auditor also noted that obtaining a complete and accurate final general ledger was problematic, Bade said. The auditor noted the city lacks personnel in the accounting department. The action plan reports changes in staffing. At the time of the audit, the city did not have a city manager and the finance officer was the only lead, covering multiple duties. Since then, the city has hired Hyams, who began in July. The finance officer at the time left employment with the city in September. The city hired a new finance officer this month.

Work will begin in December to review, create or update policies and procedures and is expected to take six to 12 months to complete. City management plans to begin including financial reports or financial information for discussion in the city council meeting for December and moving forward.

sard's parents to meet with investigators and visit the now closed campground where their son was murdered.

Although the investigation remains open, Olsen said the audience will surely wonder why, with today's advanced forensics, digital investigative tools, DNA testing, and headlines of decades old unsolved homicide cases being closed, this murder is still unsolved in 2021.

Olsen has been making documentaries for the past two decades. He is a professor in the Digital Media Arts program at Clark College in Vancouver, Wash.

In July 2021, "Old-Growth Murder" was the winner of two Impact DOCS Awards of Excellence in both "research" and for a "documentary feature." Impact DOCS recognizes film, television, videography and new media professionals who demonstrate achievement in craft and creativity, and those who produce standout entertainment or contribute to profound social change.

Olsen said he screened the documentary at the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office in the spring. He hopes the documentary will generate interest in reopening the case and drawing people forward who might have information.

GARDENING MATTERS 2021 Gift Guide part 1





Hard to believe that we are approaching the gift-giving season already this year. Which means it is also time for my gift suggestions for your gardening family or friends or maybe just for yourself. My late November gift column traditionally gives ideas for long range gifts, while my early December column will give ideas for local and last-minute gardening gifts. So let's get started.

As always, I have to have a few books on my list. This year, I have selected a book for novice gardeners called "Gardening Basics for Dummies, 2nd edition." Written by professional horticulturist Steven A. Frowine and approved by the National Gardening Association, this book is straightforward but also written in a friendly manner so it is easy to read and understand. Coming from the "For Dummies" series, you know this will become a staple in your library of howto books. It includes chapters on soil, tools, choosing the right plants, gardening with children and much more. List price is \$25.

Another book I want to put on my personal Christmas list is about - what else? - succulents. Actually, there are two in this category. The first is Misa Matsuyama's "The Gardeners' Guide to Succulents; A Handbook of Over 125 Exquisite Varieties of Succulents and Cacti" from 2020. This is one of those hardback books that is not only informative but lovely to look at. Runs about \$17. Another good succulent book is "Essential Succulents; A Beginner's Guide" by Ken Shelf. Although it was published in 2018, this book is Amazon's Number 1 Best Seller in Ornamental Plant Gardening. The author is the owner of a garden and lifestyle shop in San Francisco and has been teaching about succulents for over a decade. Since he also creates specialty centerpieces and arrangements, he brings his creativity to this book. If succulents are your gardener's new hobby like they are mine, this is a great book to get them started on the information they need to know. List price is \$19. Of course, not everyone is addicted to succulents the way I am. But honestly, any obscure type of gardening will have a myriad of books to show you how to do it.

For example, I am determined to learn more about mushrooms in 2022, and found several possibilities to help me. Timber Press has a field guide called "Mushrooms of the Pacific Northwest" by Steve Trudell and Joe Ammirati that was published in 2009. Lots of good photos and descriptions will make it easier to ID the 460 types of mushrooms found in the Pacific Northwest woods. List price on this one is \$28. A more recent publication from just last month is Darcy Field's "Foraging Guide for Pacific Northwest Mushrooms." This is a guide to PNW mushrooms - edible, inedible, and even poisonous - that will help you recognize and identify over 40 mushroom species. Darcy tells of the edibility, the season, and locations to forage for them, too. I am still not sure I will feel comfortable picking my own mushrooms, but I do want to learn more about them. Paperback version is \$22 but it is also available through Amazon Kindle, which would make it nice to be able to access from your

phone while hiking. Another older book (published in 2008) is Rodale Press's "Perennial Combinations; Stunning Combinations that Make Your Garden Look Fantastic Right from the Start" by C. Colston Burrell. This paperback offers page after page of beautiful perennial gardens combined with a numbered photo key and plant list. Even though this was published 13 years ago, the ideas and variety of combinations make this one of those timeless gardening books. Amazon has a paperback for a little over \$24.

And for the vegetable gardeners out there I can recommend Timber Press's "Guide to Vegetable Gardening in the Pacific Northwest" by Lorene Edwards Forkner. This is written in a format that goes month-by-month so you can easily follow what you should be doing and when. And you don't have to start in January...you can start in what-

FROM THE AIR MUSEUM

Come see the changes at the Air Museum

Emblematic of the Fall season that upon us, here at the Tillamook Air Museum, things too are changing! We pride ourselves in near constant dynamism here at the Museum and as such, have several new developments and additions to share with YOU, our community. First, to our ever-expanding collection of historic aircraft! In September of this year, the Museum took possession of a B-52 Statofortress cockpit. The B-52 was a Cold War strategic Air Force bomber that is still in production by Boeing and has been flying for well over 60 years! On loan from Scroggins Aviation Mockup & Effects, the Museum's B-52 was built in Wichita, Kansas and delivered to the United States Air Force on September 23, 1960. Over the years, the airplane served the United States with pride in several wings of the Air Force's Strategic Air Command. In 1964, the airplane was Christened the "City of Bangor" (Maine) when stationed with the 397th Bombardment Wing at Dow Air Force Base in Bangor. In subsequent years, the airplane served at Air Force bases throughout the country including Louisiana, Guam, Texas, California, North Dakota, and Washington. Notable in the airplane's service is its history in

the first Gulf War. Here it flew 14 combat missions over enemy territory, based out of both Moron, Spain and Fairford, England. One such mission during the war on February 23, 1991 saw the B-52 perform a high altitude (38,000 ft) bombing run over Northern Kuwait and target Iraqi minefields in preparation of American troops on the ground. On this particular mission the airplane carried 52 Mk. 82 bombs (500lbs. each!) with which to destroy these minefields. Shortly after the Gulf War, in November of 1991, the airplane was retired to the Aircraft Storage & Disposition Center at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Arizona where it was cut into five pieces to satisfy terms of disarmament agreements that had been made between the United States and the Soviet Union. This battle-hardened veteran currently on display at the Museum and is under active restoration and revitalization by Museum staff. Be sure to stop by and see it soon and check out our progress on the piece!

With the holidays fast approaching, the Museum is looking ahead to Christmas time and to its annual appearance of Santa & the Grinch. This year's event will take place on Saturday, December 11th from 10am-2pm and is FREE with two non-perishable food items. There will be goodie bags to take home, and an opportunity to snap some wonderful holiday photos! In addition, the Tillamook County Health Center and its "mobile" clinic" will be on site offering Covid-19 vaccines for anyone 5 and older and booster shots. This fun-filled day only happens once a year, so don't miss this year's event!

The TBCC Foundation has honored Mildred Davy every fall since 2000 with a luncheon in her name to recognize all of the scholarship recipients at the college. And then COVID hit. For the past two fall terms, we have been unable to hold the special luncheon ceremony. This year, the Foundation board decided to do something different to recognize all the people who make scholarships possible, starting with Mildred.

This year to honor Mildred, the Foundation celebrated Mildred Davy Day on November 17. A special program aired during the college's regularly scheduled Tillamook Today segment on KTIL at 9:30 am. The program honored Mildred and shared stories from three scholarship recipients who each had a dif-

The program also shared stories of Mildred's impact as shared by Van Moe and Chris Weber who were two long-term friends of Mildred's. The program even included some of Mildred's previously recorded clips from her own radio show. Also on Mildred Davy Day, the TBCC Foundation Board distributed yellow roses to local businesses to recognize Mildred and thank donors. Mildred loved yellow roses and was well known for her rose garden. And finally, a video was shared on the TBCC website of three TBCC

students who are recipients of

Foundation scholarships. The Mildred Davy Day events and activities were made possible due to a generous donation from TLC, a Division of Fibre Federal Credit Union and Near Space Corporation.

Access to scholarships is vital for students to obtain a college education. The TBCC Foundation provides over 40 scholarship opportunities each year that total around \$90,000. In 2021-22, we helped 65 students and awarded just under \$95,000. Many of these students need these funds to be able to pursue and continue their education and the scholarships have had a large, positive impact on their lives. In addition to Foundation scholarships the College offers the Career-to-Career scholarship that has supported 102 students since 2017.

Trees2Sea Montessori opens in Tillamook

Trees2Sea Montessori opened Monday, Nov. 8, in Tillamook.

The Montessori school is a recorded preschool program in Tillamook for children ages 3-5 that aides children in discovering a joy and love for learning. The

Maria Montessori founded Montessori education in 1906. Montessori was an Italian physician who observed that children could learn and thrive by having a prepared environment that meets their specific developmental needs.

Amy Hansen, owner and teacher/guide, has been working in the field of early childhood education for 14 years. She has worked at many play-based preschools and several Montessori schools such as The Montessori Learning Center in Utah and Child's view and Chickadee Montessori in Oregon.

"I attended Portland State University where I completed by Bachelor of Science degree in 2017, majoring in child and family studies and minoring in psychology," Hansen said. "After completing my degree, I worked at a play-based preschool for a year as the lead toddler teacher but I felt like something was missing. That is when I decided that I wanted to go back to working at Montessori-based schools where children were allowed to have more independence and autonomy when it came to their learning.'

Learning areas for Montessori education include practical life, which helps to build skills used in everyday life; sensorial, which helps children to gather information and learn by using their writing and more.

Hansen said she decided to obtain her Montessori certification, and in May 2020, completed her AMI Montessori primary certification with the Southwest Institute of Montessori Studies.

Winter kayaking: The natural cure for cabin fever

Despite the recent tumultuous weather, fall and winter kayaking in the county is an excellent recreational prospect, with the right conditions. There are numerous mild days when Mother Nature calms down and takes a breather before returning to tumultuous storms. In between, think about grabbing a paddle and slipping into a kayak.

Julie Chick's life has revolved around kayaking: she's the former owner of Nehalem Bay Outdoor Company. She also previously worked as an Outdoor Education and Outreach Coordinator with Tillamook Estuaries Partnership (TEP) and is still an avid Nehalem paddler. While she encourages kayakers to explore our waterways during the winter months, she stresses that safety is paramount to any trip no matter what date is on the calendar. First order of business is wearing a Personal Flotation Device, or PFD. "Find a good one

and wear it," Chick says. "If vou don't want to wear it, then you don't have the right PFD, because you should love your PFD.³

Being safe also includes knowing what wind and tide can do on any given day, meaning paddlers should check local tide tables and weather conditions before setting out. "In our area, you need to pay attention to tide and wind," she says. "You can have a November day with extremely high tides and gale force winds, or a November day with relatively typical tides, sunny, clear and perfectly 'kayakable.'" She adds that checking wind and conditions and familiarizing yourself with how those affect the waterway you are paddling is key to a safe and fun experience.

When discussing the differences between summer and winter paddling, Chick notes that conditions for each season on the Oregon Coast can often be very similar. This is especially true when it comes to water temperatures. You may have picked a warm, sunny day to paddle, but the water is usually bone-chilling. In that regard, Chick stresses that

dressing with water temperature in mind is a top priority. Cotton shirts and denim jeans won't suffice.

"If you end up in the water and can't get back in your boat or back to shore, you better be dressed for forty-something degree water," she says. "Hypothermia happens fast." Chick adds that a good dry suit not only keeps kayakers warm and cozy, but gives them peace of mind knowing that it will buy them a lot of time if they end up in the water.

The November King Tides and flooding this year also highlight the need to be aware of debris and obstacles in the water after such storms have passed through. With safety in mind, kayakers have a multitude of reasons to enjoy winter paddling.

Aside from the recent rough weather, Chick says that most winter days offer fuller rivers with flat, glassy paddling surfaces. These conditions combine to give kayakers a sense of serenity and solitude that's hard to duplicate during the busy summer months. "It's a lot quieter and a lot less people," Chick says. She

adds that with salmon season over, there isn't the potential for kayaker versus fishing boat conflicts, which can be an issue in late summer and early fall. Photographers find plenty of reasons to pointand-shoot, and winter offers a chance for some excellent picture-taking.

"The light this time of year is at a lower angle, so you get crisper, cleaner pictures, especially if you get out there a little earlier," Chick says.

There are many places to paddle year-round that offer a bevy of options. Overall, there are five estuaries in Tillamook County: Nehalem, Tillamook Bay, Nestucca, Sand Lake, and Netarts. They boast distinct characteristics and TEP has published "water trail" guides for each. With so many options for paddlers to consider, winter kayaking is the perfect way to get outside, shake off the winter blahs, and see coastal waterways from a different perspective.
