Semi thief slips away Addresse

Police and deputies caught up with the passenger of a suspected truck thief after a multiagency search Thursday, Aug. 22. At around 3:40 p.m., Tillamook 911 received a report from a caller who was following a white semi with Gothard Farms markings headed north on Highway 101 towards Garibaldi.

A press release from Tillamook County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) said the caller reported the truck matched one described in a post on Facebook's #TIMBERUNITY page regarding a vehicle theft around 17 hours earlier in Coburg, Oregon. The caller continued to provide updates on the truck's location until it was observed by law enforcement in Garibaldi.

TCSO said a deputy kept the truck in sight while waiting for backup units to arrive. The truck was confirmed as stolen out of Coburg, but before backup arrived, the man who was driving stopped on First Street in Garibaldi and fled, heading east on foot. A woman passenger exited the truck and remained at the scene.

Additional officers arrived, and TCSO said a thorough search of the area was conducted but the driver was not found. The suspected truck thief, later identified by authorities as Mark Kloppel, remains at large. Rockaway Beach and Manzanita Police Department assisted in the search, which was terminated around 6 p.m. The semi-truck was towed for safekeeping until it could be returned to the owner.

The passenger, Rhonda Hawkins, was initially arrested for unauthorized entry of a motor vehicle and taken to the Tillamook County Correctional Facility. That charge was later dropped, but she now faces a felony identity theft charge in Tillamook County. She was released on bail. Hawkins had two dogs that were taken to the Tillamook K9 Rescue.

Kloppel was described as a white male with blue eyes and dark hair who was last seen wearing dark sweatpants and a fluorescent vest. He has ongoing criminal court cases in Lane County for charges of first-degree aggravated theft, identity theft, and first-degree forgery. Charges of unauthorized use of a vehicle and possession of a stolen vehicle await Kloppel in Tillamook County, according to court documents.

A Comco Carpet Cleaning van was reported stolen in the Garibaldi area the following morning. Unconfirmed reports said the van was recovered in the Eugene area. No suspects have been identified in that alleged theft.



Port addresses water system, manure spill

A nearly four-hour regular meeting of the Port of Tillamook Bay (POTB) Board of Commissioners on Aug. 20 covered a wide variety of topics, including airport improvement plans and a manure spill update.

A major topic that was discussed at the meeting was the port water system. Currently, the Port purchases water through the City of Tillamook and distributes it to tenants and users. This adds cost to the Port, as they have their own certifications and testing to comply and maintain.

The City distribution lines traverse the Port property from the back of the industrial park under the airport runways and out at the intersection of Highway 101 and Long Prairie Road. There have been discussions in the past on a possible re-route of the City lines to a safer location.

The Port also has available water rights to five wells that have not been fully developed. One well, located in the main industrial park was established but not yet developed, and the other available wells are in a different location within the Port's almost 1,600 acres.

"We have been exploring the idea of self-supplying water recently due to the City's major increase in water rates, specifically because we pay, as well as other districts – Long Prairie Water, South Prairie, etc. - an outside rate which is much higher than in-city rates," Michelle Bradley, POTB general manager, said. Port project coordinator Aaron Palter met with the Tillamook city officials at the end of June to discuss the January letter the Port had written. Palter said Tillamook City Manager Paul Wyntergreen was going to propose to the city council a small change in the water structure rate to classify outside water districts as commercial users. Palter requested more of a rate reduction during that public meeting. "I didn't get a sense that it was well received," Palter said. "But at the very least, I believe, or hope that we are able to get this commercial rate." Wyntergreen reportedly plans to approach the finance committee at the end of August or September to discuss the letter and the request for the reduced rate. The Port's rate and other outside rates could be cut in half by the reduction. Salmonberry Trail Intergovernmental Agency has the main line. GSI Water Solutions, Inc. did a water system analysis for the Port, which is planning to have its own water system at some point in the future. The Port pays \$160,000 per year for water from Tillamook. The board then discussed a manure spill that occurred July 22. Jack Mulder, commission president, said that the response from the Port staff was excellent. Bradley reportedly spoke daily with the board and Port staff about what was going on. The manure spill water was used for fields near the Port. 320,000 gallons of clean water were put back in the system. Bradley confirmed that the Department of Environmental Quality did additional testing at the outfall a couple of weeks ago but there are no results yet. The digester is updating its logistical plan and should now have internet to help monitor. Bradley said that the staff did a good job of jumping on the incident. There will be additional nighttime training for board members in late September or October for those who couldn't attend the recent trainings that were held during the day. Creamery sued for misleading marketing

is facing accusations of misleading its customers with deceptive marketing campaigns.

On Monday, Aug. 19, the Animal Legal Defense Fund (ALDF), a national legal advocacy organization for animals, filed a lawsuit in Multnomah County Circuit Court alleging that TCCA misrepresents milk sources and the conditions under which dairy cows live.

The lawsuit seeks to stop TCCA's allegedly deceptive advertising, which the ALDF claims misleads consumers and violates multiple Oregon consumer protection laws. The Oregonian reported the advocacy group plans to amend the lawsuit, adding \$200 in compensation for every Oregonian who

was allegedly misled by Creamery Association advertising, adding if the class-action lawsuit is successful, it could cost many tens of millions of dollars.

The lawsuit says alleged victims paid more for Creamery Association products because they support small, pasture-based dairies and they hadn't realized "the truth – that the vast majority of the milk sourced for Tillamook products comes from a massive factory farm in Eastern Oregon where cows are never allowed to graze on grass."

TCCA's advertising campaigns tell a story of products sourced from small scale family farms where animal care standards exceed those of other dairy companies. The ALDF said in a statement that the heavily advertised co-op of small family farms in Tillamook County represents just a tiny proportion of the company's production.

The ALDF claims the Creamery Association sources up to 80 percent of its milk from a massive dairy operation located in far-off Boardman, Oregon. The ALDF

> said the majority of the Creamery Association's milk comes from 32,000 cows kept in allegedly inhumane, industrialized conditions.

While some TCCA

ads encouraged consumers to "Say Goodbye to Big Food," Tillamook is the epitome of "Big Food," the ALDF statement claims. The advocacy group alleges that rather than living freely on rolling green hills depicted in advertising, the cows are artificially impregnated, have their calves taken from them shortly after birth to stimulate milk production, and are continuously confined and milked by robotic carousels at this cement-floored factory farm.

"Consumers care about animals," ALDF Executive Director Stephen Wells said in the statement. "Tillamook is exploiting consumers' desire to treat animals better by misleading people about how cows are kept. This violates the public's trust and violates the law."



According to the lawsuit, Tillamook earned around \$800 million in 2017 and could reach more than \$1 billion in sales in the near future.

The Creamery Association released a statement in response to the lawsuit, saying it "adamantly disagrees with the allegations made in the lawsuit and we will aggressively defend ourselves."

"The ALDF is "anti-dairy and actively advocates for people to cut dairy products from their diets," the TCCA statement said. "We are proud of our nearly 20-year relationship with Columbia River Dairy in eastern Oregon and have highlighted their leadership in environmental stewardship and

Tierra Del Mar residents met with public officials and Facebook representatives earlier this month to discuss a proposed landing for a submarine cable. At issue was an application for a conditional use permit to land submarine fiber optic cable on an oceanfront residential lot at 28560 Sandlake Road.

The three-hour meeting, held at the Kiawanda Community Center on Aug. 11, was attended by State Sen. Arnie Roblan, D-Coos Bay, and State Rep. David Gomberg, D- Otis as well as six representatives of Facebook and its subsidiary Edge Cable Holdings.

The proposed SubCom Jupiter cable would connect to a high-capacity transpacific system with international reach, reportedly owned by Facebook, Amazon, Microsoft and others. Facebook representatives said the proposed project in Tierra Del Mar would support services used around the globe, including Indonesia, India, Japan, Hong Kong and other surrounding areas.

It's the social media company's position that despite its residential development classification, lot 3200 is more desirable than others that were scouted and found lacking due to clearance, erosion or wetlands concerns. Facebook bought the property in October of this past year.

Four existing submarine cables in Pacific City came up during the discussion. Facebook representatives said that landing is fully occupied and cannot fit a fifth cable because of congestion and fewer options for cable burial, making it a high-risk proposition

"The big part of the reason to come to Pacific City is that there are highly available and high-quality fiber optic routes that connect on the land side from this area that go back to Hillsboro, Portland, and once you hit Portland, you can go south to Seattle," said Jon Hudson, network investment manager of Facebook/Edge Cable. "You can go east to Boise and Salt Lake City. You can go south to Eugene to San Francisco, Los Angeles. You can get up to a larger internet

pipes from a beach manhole at lot 3200, running a little more than a half-mile offshore in water depths of 30 feet. The bore pipe would initially facilitate the direct landing of the Jupiter cable from a cable ship to the manhole without trenching the beach, burying the cable through surf zone, using articulated pipe or pinning of the cable to the seabed.

Some Tierra Del Mar residents have said that they do not support the project and have accused the social media company of being less than forthcoming about its intentions, some even claiming the project has been carried forward secretly.

Facebook representatives said the permit application was just completed in June or July. Prior public meetings were held in February and March at the state level. The company also said it would be notifying whoever pays property taxes for homes adjacent to the lot. Hudson said he takes the blame for not notifying the public earlier.

Residents have also expressed concerns regarding the installation of additional cables if the proposed Tierra Del Mar project is approved. Hudson said the company has no intention of doing so, noting that Facebook's goal is connecting people around the world.

One person questioned dealings between the OFCC and Facebook, and another person noted that Hudson is an OFCC member. Hudson said the OFCC could outvote cable optic voters, adding that Facebook pays dues to the OFCC and runs a hotline f

the adjacent lot owners for home and asset inspection to understand the layout of any underground assets and the condition of the property.

Asked if there is any legislation to block the installation of cables on private land, Gomberg said no. The lawmaker said he learned about the proposal late in the legislative session. Gomberg also said it would be an uphill battle to pass state legislation on the matter.

"Facebook has followed the letter of the law, but hasn't been a good neighbor," Gomberg said.

Phil Grillo, local land use counsel at law firm Davis Wright Tremaine, asked whom at Facebook the citizens could call if they have questions or concerns. Stephen Uy gave his phone number, mentioning programs and services that could give back to the community that similar areas have implemented.

'We don't want the business in our neighborhood," a citizen responded.

Uy asked the audience if they wanted better phone service in the area. He spoke about provisions for universal service. Only a few people raised their hands. One person said many, if not all, in the area don't have cell service or a landline. Another person said they had investigated a possible cell tower for the town and found that the tower would be outside of Tierra Del Mar

Responding to community concerns about a lack of notice regarding the project, Uy conceded that Facebook could have notified the community earlier, but said it is not uncommon for citizens to learn of a proposal just a few weeks before it goes into effect. He said that the company could send information earlier next time, claiming that complications slowed notification of

Facebook worked with the Oregon Fishermen's Cable Committee (OFCC) on finding the right location. At lot 3200, they found less risk of having nets get stuck on cables. Telecommunications also have less risk of interruption. It was noted that fish habitats are restricted from cables installation as federally protected areas

"When we looked at putting the cable with the existing four cables, there were concerns offshore," Hudson said, adding that the cables are in squiggly lines, avoiding areas such as exposed rock. "You can't bury the cable because you don't have anywhere to do so,' Hudson said. "If your cable is laying against this hard rock, you're at a risk of a shift, causing the cable to snap.'

OFCC said it didn't find many routes, and what it did find crossed with other existing cables. When route options near the existing cable sites failed to emerge, alternative routes became the next best bet. OFCC looked south at a state park that crossed other existing cables and a fish habitat.

Looking north at a public beach, Facebook found that because of equipment weights, having to restrict beach access, and the logistics of getting trucks onto the beach, there was too much of a conflict, so it was ruled it out. An eastside Sand Lake property also was considered but was too steep and too close to the water.

"That's really how we ended up in Tierra Del Mar," Hudson said.

The cable would lay three feet into the ground. Facebook used a survey vessel to map the seabed, aiming to avoid ridges where possible and possibly using a plow if necessary during the construction process

A horizontal directional drill would be used to install bore

it, equivalent to a 911 number. He said the OFCC helps Facebook determine cable installation sites. Facebook shares information with the OFCC and relieves them of liability. Before construction, Sub-Com said it wants to engage

No. 3, a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Grant for environmental/planning at Tillamook Municipal Airport, was approved. The Port had received notice from the FAA regarding a \$100,000 grant for its next slated airport improvement project, which will be the first phase of its main apron improvement. Subsequently, the FAA modified the amount to \$150,000, which the amended resolution reflects.

The first phase of the main apron improvement project will cover the mandated environmental and engineering phase of future expansion near the Tillamook Municipal Airport's main apron. During the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) project days, one project was replacing the airport's aging office (about 500 square feet) with a new office – about 3,100 square feet with a conference room, large lobby, kitchenette, pilot room, overnight room, and observation/staff radio room. That reduced the number of apron tie-downs and reconfigured the traffic pattern on the apron.

Also on the agenda was consideration of a memorandum of agreement between POTB and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, FEMA for POTB logistical support during a federally declared disaster, which was passed by the board. Agencies such as FEMA and other local agencies have been working on this for years. The Port is involved as a hub for disaster planning due to the airport location.

'We are one of the top four airports listed in the Oregon Resilience Plan, falling behind Central Oregon locations," Bradley said. "We are one of the few coastal airports that isn't right on the water. We also have the benefit of co-location with the Near Space Corporation, who could instantly launch an unmanned aerial system/ balloon to assist with com-

munication if the cell towers and phones are out."

Bradley said that the POTB isn't paid for this; it's a survival instinct. The Tillamook County Fairgrounds doesn't have a staging area like this, so the POTB is vital.

During the meeting, new Port commissioner Gerry Opdahl said he wants research to be done regarding what could be recorded in executive session notes. He did not approve the minutes of the previous session.

Manzanita Town Hall Mayor backs \$6.5M bond

Manzanita voters have questions about what it will cost to build an 11,776 square foot facility that will meet our long term needs for city facilities, council chambers, and emergency hub

After much work, with engineers and architects working on numbers over the past two years, we estimate it might cost up to five hundred dollars per square foot to build.

We will need additional funds for asbestos abatement and demo of the existing structure. And furniture will also be required.

Figures in the finance chart include a 20-percent contingency. With careful planning, it will not need

and the total dollar amount could be less. But right now interest rates are at historic lows. With luck, rates will stay low and the economy will cool off by next summer, allowing us to build at a lower cost.

We currently enjoy one of the lowest property tax rates in Oregon at 42 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. This bond issue could add up to 50 cents more.

Total planning needs

Public hearing announced for issues facing Tierra Del Mar, Facebook drilling project

There will be a public hearing by the Tillamook County Planning Commission to discuss issues facing Tierra Del Mar with the Facebook Industrial Drilling Project. The community is encouraged to attend and speak up at the public hearing on September 5 at the Courthouse at 7 p.m.

Facebook, under a holding company Edge Cable Holdings USA LLC, purchased the oceanfront residential lot for the sole purpose of doing Horizontal Directional Drilling for a submarine fiber optic cable project – the Jupiter System, owned by Facebook, Amazon, and others.

The lot is on Sandlake Road in Tierra Del Mar. The graphic does not include the many trucks and power generators that will be needed and the increased traffic on Sandlake Road. It does not depict the expected noise and vibration of the project or show the access areas and the clearning of trees, shrubs, and grasses that will be required. The slated "need "was

for the growth of the global internet cable business. There are alternative sites available using public land and existing cable landing capacity. There is no identified need or benefit to Tierra Del Mar and the citizens of Tillamook County. To do this project, Face-

book needs to obtain a Tillamook County Conditional Use Permit. They are claiming "public utility" and "similar use" status.

Coast Guard realigns Tillamook Bay entrance

Coast Guard members established missing aids to navigation and realigned the entrance to Tillamook Bay this week during an ongoing mission along the Pacific Northwest coast, according to a Coast Guard report.

Coast Guard Cutter Aspen, a 225-foot seagoing buoy tender home-ported in San Francisco, transited the Oregon Coast this past week correcting several buoy discrepancies. One such error was correcting the radio transmitter beacon for the buoy marking the entrance to the Columbia River.

The Aspen is currently the only heavy-lift capable buoy tender along the western coast of the United States. Coast Guard Cutter Elm normally handles buoy work in the Pacific Northwest; however, due to routine scheduled maintenance, they were unable to attend to any of the aids.

"We're glad to ensure mariners in the Pacific Northwest have properly operating navigation aids to safely transit these notoriously rough waters," said Lt. Cmdr. Jeffrey West, com-

manding officer of the Aspen. "The Oregon and Washington coasts are beautiful, but they present unique dangers, and the crew is proud to keep boaters safe. It has been a rewarding trip."

Managing fixed and floating aids to navigation are one of the 11 statutory missions of the Coast Guard. The Aspens' main area of responsibility is the San Francisco Bay Area and the California coast. The crew also performs various law enforcement and environmental missions, including oil spill response.

Tillamook State Forest road restrictions this fall





The Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) will resume road restrictions this fall in the western part of the Tillamook State Forest to improve deer and elk escapement during hunting season.

Some roads will be closed to motorized use during the general archery and rifle hunting seasons in September, October and November. Selected roads in the Trask, Wilson and Nehalem River areas will be gated and signed. Controlled access during the three-month period is designed to reduce hunting pressure in these areas.

Hunters and other recreational users are welcome to access the gated areas by foot, mountain bike, horse or other non-motorized means.

ODF is partnering with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and Tillamook Chapter of the Oregon Hunters Association in this program. The partnership has been in place 15 years now and gate locations change year to year based on access needs, stand conditions and operations.

Motorized access by ODF staff or contractors working in those areas may occur on occasion. Maps of the road management areas are available at the Tillamook ODF office located at 5005 Third St., Tillamook and at the Tillamook District's website at: https://www.oregon.gov/ ODF/Recreation/Pages/ RoadClosure.aspx. Once at this link go to "Tillamook State Forest Road Report" to find the maps.

The Nehalem Bay Health District and the North County Food Bank have jointly agreed to begin negotiations leading to a long-term ground lease agreement for a new Food Bank building on the District's campus in Wheeler, Oregon.

For twenty-five years the Food Bank has occupied space in the old hospital building in Wheeler, where they served more than 600 adults and more than 250 children in 2018. The Food Bank operates entirely with volunteers and depends upon

monetary and food donations. The Food Bank also distributes free clothing and offers free use of sewing machines and sewing instruction.

In its recently completed Strategic Plan the Health District reaffirmed its commitment to continuing collaboration with the Food Bank and the District's board has indicated that food security for our community is a vital public health and wellness issue.

The District's planning and facility review conducted over the past year has also determined that the old hospital building has reached the end of its useful life. At the same time, the board of the District has committed to no action that will disrupt the ongoing operations of the Food Bank. To that end the two organizations developed a Memorandum of Understanding to guide the development of a new Food Bank building that would be located on the District's campus in Wheeler. Negotiations leading to a long-term ground lease will be the next step in that process.

Food Bank leaders believe that new building design, permitting and additional fundraising will take about a year with construction requiring an additional year.

The District and the Food Bank have committed to developing an environmentally sustainable building. The new building will include a commercial kitchen. It will also be designed to provide emergency shelter and food supply and to serve as a community gathering location in the event of a natural disaster.

A major concern for Tierra Del Mar residents is the noise from the proposed construction project. Mark Bastasch, principal acoustical engineer at Jacobs Engineering, said the noise curtain would be around 10-15 feet tall and could go up to 20 feet. He said the noise level would be 68 decibels at a distance of 28 feet. There could be a 10 decibel decrease by using sound proofing materials. Bastasch deployed a machine to monitor the room's decibel levels during a break. Conversation in the room was around 70 decibels, a little louder than the construction is speculated to be. A citizen pointed out that Sydney Sheridan, permitting manager of SubCom, originally said the noise curtain would be around 87 decibels. Bastasch said his numbers are approximate and not exact. noting that modern machines produce around 89 decibels at the source, but at a distance of 20 feet the noise level would be around 68 decibels, which is equivalent to the noise level of a domestic vacuum cleaner.

Sound barriers and curtains would be added to the fencing surrounding the work-site, further reducing the noise during drilling operations.

Responding to concerns about damage to infrastructure such as septic systems potentially caused by construction vibrations, an engineer said there was no indication that such an issue would arise. It was noted that roads would not be blocked for the construction, though an excavator would be delivered and

Tillamook Junior High School (TJHS) recently had some of their football players take place in the Oregon All State Game at Albany High School on June 29. This game helps to raise awareness for kids in foster care puts the best players in the middle school group against each other.

"Last year, we had over 1,000 backpacks donated with over \$1,000 in school supplies, and that was just from donation at the gate," Luchi said.

Athletes were nominated by coaches of the group and put together two teams at each level. The teams consisted of players from the Portland area (Team Metro) versus players from the rest of the state (Team Oregon).

"Last year, we had zero players from Tillamook in the event and this year we had five players make the squads: two at the seventh grade level and three at the eighth grade level," Luchi said. For the seventh grade Team Oregon, Jaydn Taksdal was selected as a wide receiver and Tyson Harpole played safety. For the eighth grade Team Oregon, Toby Green was selected as a running back, Sam Diaz was selected to play on the line, and Garrison Gunder was selected as a safety. Both Taksdal and Harpole will be returing to the junior high program this school year as eighth graders and look to help lead the junior high program to another successful season. Green, Diaz, and Gunder are all moving up the high school this school

year and are looking to contribute in any way that they can. Gunder recently came to the junior high practice and spoke with the younger players about his experience at the junior high and the importance of building the family environment within the program.

"We ended up having to coach against our kids from Tillamook," Luchi said.

This year, Team Metro swept the games with victories at the sixth, seventh, and eighth grade levels. The eighth grade game was the closest of the day with a final score of 12-9 in favor of Team Metro.

"It was a bittersweet moment because we want our kids from Tillamook to win, but we had jobs to do help make our program better. Your hard work does not go unnoticed."

Why I'm In: An interview with Kaylan Sisco, CEO [&] executive director, Tillamook County Family YMCA

The Tillamook County Wellness "Why I'm In" interview series highlights our community partners and what has inspired and motivated them to work toward the common goal of improving community health.

What drew you/ your organization into the Year of Wellness, now Tillamook County Wellness? Sisco: The fact

Sisco: The fact that this effort is community-wide and shares the same mission as the Tillamook YMCA is what attracted me to the effort. The impacts we seek in improving community health are the same for the Y as they are for Tillamook County Wellness. It just seemed like a very symbiotic relationship.

What, if any, changes have you seen come about as a result of this work?

Sisco: As it relates to the Y, I hope that people have a better understanding of how



deeply involved and interwoven the Y is in this community. Not just within the walls of our facility but outside of it as well. Tillamook County Wellness is just one of many partnerships we are engaged in. I hope that people see how supportive the Y is of many valuable efforts. We are really trying to be a true community center and support for what matters to people.

What are your hopes for this work as it relates to changing population health in Tillamook County.

Sisco: I want people to be happy! I truly believe that when someone finds something that makes them happy, they will work harder to duplicate that behavior. If we can make being healthy something that makes people happy, they are more likely to adopt it into their lifestyle. If we, as a movement, as friends, families, co-workers, and fellow community members can make what we do easy, accessible, and fun, then that will determine what our health looks like going forward.

If you're happy and you're social and you move, you'll live a longer, happier life. Even with an extreme health diagnosis, if you engage in those three things, you are likely to live a longer, higherquality life. If we can get to that point, I think we could see a huge shift in healthcare.

Is there anything else you'd like to add about the Y's involvement in Tillamook County Wellness? Sisco: I am pleased and honored that the Y was asked to be part of Tillamook County Wellness and I appreciate that people view the Y as an asset and a driver for community health and livability. Something a lot of people don't realize is the fact that we sacrifice a lot of our budget to offer free programs for populations that need it. I am especially grateful for the partners and advocates we have out in the community who help us tell our story and connect people to us as a resource.

ment (DLCD). Through two federal grants totaling \$530,000, DLCD has been working with eleven coastal communities in preparing for a local Cascadia tsunami. The project, which began in August 2017, has resulted in in more detailed tsunami pedestrian evacuation maps, comprehensive evacuation planning, and innovative land use strategies tailored to each participating community's tsunami risk.

The tsunami hazard overlay zones focus on two main approaches: prohibiting critical and essential facilities from being built within the riskiest of tsunami zones; and incorporating evacuation improvements as a requirement of new land divisions being sited within the tsunami zone. The provisions do not apply to existing development or to single family dwellings on existing lots or parcels.

In Rockaway Beach, local leaders and citizens have been working together with DLCD staff to learn about their community evacuation vulnerabilities and to identify land use factics to minimize



the loss of life and property from a catastrophic tsunami.

This effort led to the eventual adoption of new tsunami hazard overlay zone provisions in July. The city also completed and adopted a Tsunami Evacuation Facilities Improvement Plan (TEFIP) to identify both existing and needed evacuation facilities, such as wayfinding signage, pedestrian paths, and bridge retrofits.

"The adoption of the TEFIP and tsunami hazard overlay zone is an important first step towards creating a more resilient Rockaway Beach. As we spoke with members of the public during the planning process, we found that there is very strong support for the City to increase tsunami preparedness and resilience in our community," says Terri Michel, City Manager for Rockaway Beach.

"The TEFIP and overlay zone will help guide the City as we move forward with evacuation route improvements, new wayfinding signage, education and training programs, and relocating our critical facilities. We are appreciative of the funding and guidance we received from DLCD throughout the process. The City would never have been able to accomplish this very important project had it not been for its Planners, Fregonese Associates. Their talent and professionalism helped the City navigate the process from securing grant funding to adoption of the plan and ordinance, and everything in between," Michel said.

The resources provided by these project grants are supporting community planning efforts specific to the tsunami hazard, such as identifying evacuation route improvements and thoughtful development siting and design.

few years ago, I Afound a plant growing in my garden that I was very happy to have. Its leaves were arrowshaped and were variegated with dark green and white stripes. When it fruited, it was with orange-red tall spikes. It was very pretty and although I didn't know what it was, I was willing to let it live in my garden. I didn't bother to do any research into its growing properties or cultivation needs. I was just happy it was a perennial and I loved seeing it come up every summer and bloom.

And then, as I was walking through the Tillamook County Fair earlier this

month, I stopped at the Tillamook County Soil and Water Conservation District booth, I noticed a fact sheet with my orange-spiked plant. Only it wasn't in the "good plants to have section," it was one of the SWCD flyers on noxious weeds. Yikes! I took the fact sheet, found a bench, and sat down immediately to read it.

The plant is called Italian Arum (Arum italicum) but has

also been commonly called "orange candle flower" or "Italian lords and ladies." The flowers appear in the spring and look a little like the Jack-in-the-pulpit flowers: long, finger-like and a light yellow. They do have a rather nasty scent. The fruits are the orange-red color and are clustered in tight clumps. Alum was introduced as an ornamental plant and is now naturalizing and becoming a problem as it happily spreads

throughout the county. This is a woodland species that likes the moist and well-shaded environment that we have on the Oregon coast. Once it establishes itself, it spreads from our gardens into the woodlands, becoming more difficult to eradicate once

dling of the plant or any of its parts can cause severe skin irritation. Ingestion can cause swelling of the mouth and throat that may be followed by breathing difficulties, burning pain and upset stomach. Death may follow. All of this information comes directly from the SWCD fact sheet.

After reading the fact sheet, I went home to do more research and found out that some nurseries are still selling this plant through the mail. Other websites list it as a preferred plant or a plant-ofthe month. Don't be fooled. This is not a plant for a

it is in the forest or riparian areas.

A pretty plant that spreads easily from cultivated gardens? Hum. Does that sound familiar? Think Scotch Broom! Arum, too, forms a dense cover in open sites and competes with native plants for the open spaces. Successfully, too. But it has a more sinister property that makes it worth removing from our gardens: it is highly toxic to humans and animals. garden that is frequented by children or curious animals!

Controlling this plant is tough but can be done by preventing its spread. Wearing gloves and long sleeves, eliminate the seeds by cutting the seed heads and bagging them for removal in the garbage. Then wash the clothes and gloves in very hot water. Composting does not work! It just gives them a new place to spread. Small patches in home gardens can be carefully dug out, taking care not to break the corms (bulb-like roots) apart as they will divide and spread under the ground. Bag all parts of the plant and dispose of in the trash. Chemicals are less effective because they kill the leaves but not the corms.

Don't move soil from that area into another part of the garden or into the compost as there is a chance you might have missed a corm or two. Mowing or burning doesn't do it either, so if you have a large patch, it is best to contact Tillamook County SWCD at 503.842.2848, ext. 103 to ask their advice. As the patches of Arum

As the patches of Arum are identified, the SWCD will offer technical assistance to landowners with infestations. They evaluate each case on an individual basis.

Also, the SWCD acts as the agent for the Tillamook County Weed Control District and they look for help from residents in identifying Italian arum populations in the county. Same phone number and extension if you spot a patch you think needs to be addressed. Thank you to the West Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District for the use of their photo.

Which brings me to a conclusion that those of us with small children or grandchildren that visit or with cats or dogs, we need to be aware of the plants in our gardens that are toxic. Most of us know about monkshood (Acontium), oleander and castor beans but there are others that we need to know about, too. Watch this column for more information on keeping toxic plants from becoming problematic. But first, I will add Italian arum to that list.

Shibori is a Japanese fabric dyeing process that dates back to the 8th century. Natural fiber fabrics are folded prior to dyeing with indigo dye. Patterns are created by folding the fabric in a variety of ways and compressing areas with rubber bands, string, blocks of wood, etc. to keep the dye from penetrating in those places.

While it won't save your life, it may just keep your heart pumping long enough that
