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Confirmed COVID-19 cases remain at six in county

As of Monday, May 4, there have been no more confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 in Tillamook County. COVID-19 cases have remained at six for three weeks.

In a County Leadership

Team Teleconference on Monday, May 4, Adventist Health President Eric Swanson said they are continuing to do tent screening for the emergency department. They are working as quickly as possible to get non-urgent procedures scheduled.

Tillamook County has had no new novel coronavirus cases reported in the past

three weeks.

“We’ve had a really good run the last few weeks,” Commissioner Bill Baertlein said.

Betsy Johnson said the unemployment situation has not improved. She is talking to people who have gone five weeks without a check.

Johnson said she is continuing to hunt for personal protective equipment (PPE).

Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said the commissioners are working on a plan to open up fishing.

Chairman David Yamamoto said the county is on the cusp of meeting Gov. Kate Brown’s guidelines for phase one opening. Testing is starting to resolve itself.

The commissioners are hoping to open fishing begin-

ning Wednesday, May 6, for a couple days a week and slowly expanding on the number of people fishing at a time.

As of May 4, there have been 2,745 positive confirmed cases in Oregon, with 109 deaths and 63,443 people tested. There have been zero deaths in Tillamook County and 337 negative cases.

According to Oregon

Health Authority, in recent weeks COVID-19 testing has increased to more than 9,000 tests per week in Oregon, with a cumulative total of more than 56,000 tests performed, as of April 28. The percentage of positive tests has declined from nine percent early on in the pandemic to 4.8 percent, which is lower than most states.

HeboLane Library gives gift of reading during school closures

Nancy and Gordon Whitehead built their Little Library, the HeboLane Library, last June. They have always loved giving books to kids, love to read, and see the value of getting books into the hands of people who might read them.

“Lots of people don’t have books in their homes,” Nancy said. “Books are expensive, they’re not something you always take with you if you have to move often.”

Nancy said they follow the Little Library guidelines, which asks people to take a book and donate a book. They have a sign on their Little Library that asks people to take a book, then donate one if they have one, bring the book back, or just take a book if they do not have one to share.

“Our mission is to get books to people, especially kids, especially during the pandemic,” Nancy said. “So we don’t mind if families who need books don’t donate books.”

In the HeboLane Library, there is a notebook where people can write comments, Nancy said. She said they like to hear what kind of books people would like.

“Thank you to whoever put this Little Library in our town,” a comment wrote. “My daughter, who is almost one, loves books and it’s so amazing just walking down the road and picking one out. A great memory for her to grow up with.”

Another person who moved to Hebo from Bend wrote that he loves reading non-fiction, classic literature, and writing poetry. He donated many books. Another comment said they loved the Greek mythology book and the Lord of the Rings book as well. People said they would like to see rock books and learning books for kids.

“I had a lot of books on hand when schools were closed and we started staying home, because I run a program called the South County Celebration of Language and Literacy,” Nancy said. “I had a stockpile of books for putting in the backpacks the Nes-tucca Valley Backpack Food Program fills

each week for food insecure students.”

Nancy said putting books into food backpacks gave each student about 40 books last school year. She said it felt good to help families on their way to owning 80 books and is sad not to be able to do that this year.

Nancy also had books slated for the Pacific City Food Pantry, Wilson River School, Kindergarten Round-Up, and other programs she tries to supplement with books for kids. She and Gordon also like to give puzzles, games, activity books, calendars, magazines, art supplies, journals, notebooks and more.

“We have books to last a while longer, but we will need book donations soon,” Nancy said. “We offer books and magazines for adults, as well as kids.”

Nancy said she is fascinated by research that puts numbers into ideas – research that gives a goal to aim for. According to Whitehead, recent studies have shown that children in a family that owns at least 80

Local inmate population decreased due to COVID-19

Jails across Oregon have drastically reduced their populations, according to a survey conducted by Disability Rights Oregon. On average, jails have nearly 50 percent fewer people in custody as compared to their pre-pandemic population.

Tillamook County Sheriff Jim Horton said due to the COVID-19 threat and for protection of the inmate population and the Corrections Division staff, an administrative decision was made to release lower level, lower risk inmates from custody at Tillamook County Corrections.

“This is in accordance with what other sheriff’s offices around the state have done and are doing to protect the overall inmate population, as well as law enforcement staff,” Horton said. “There have been several meetings with the Oregon State Sheriff’s Association regarding this issue and we have formulated a best practice as it relates to inmate management during this crisis.”

Prior to COVID-19, Tillamook County’s jail population was averaging around 70 inmates and are currently housing approximately 30 inmates, Horton said.

Reducing the jail population has made jail conditions safer for those left in custody and the employees who work at jails, allowing for improved social distancing in a high-intensity setting. To date, there have been no confirmed cases of COVID-19 among the inmate population in Oregon county jails.

“There have been no reported issues with this course of action at this time,” Horton said. “The majority of the inmates released from our custody were at the latter half of their imposed sentence or serving duration probation/parole violation custody sanctions.”

Horton said high public safety risk inmates have not been released from the county’s custody and there are no plans to do so. If there is a public safety risk and it is best managed by taking an individual into custody, the inmate will be accepted into the facility.

“Public safety is our primary mission,” Horton said.

The dramatic drop in jail populations in response to the pandemic was achieved through a variety of locally-driven solutions. Most jails worked with courts and law enforcement to curtail their admissions criteria, turning away arrestees who are charged with minor and/or non-person crimes, or who show signs of illness.

Supply stockpiles for sanitary items such as soap and/or hand sanitizer have not been an issue at this time for the facility, Horton said. The reduction in the inmate population has assisted with this issue.

“Our agency does receive additional PPE supplies through Oregon Emergency Management, but this supply chain is directed toward our patrol staff and other first responders in the field,” Horton said.

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Kayaker dies after caught in current in Netarts

Tillamook County Communications District 911 received a call regarding a kayaker in distress at 1:24 p.m. Sunday, May 3. A report came in that a female kayaker of Tillamook had fallen out of her kayak and had become caught up in the current and swept out over the bar.

Tillamook County Sheriff’s Office, the US Coast Guard (USCG), and Netarts Oceanside Fire were dispatched to assist. A search begun with a

USCG helicopter, two USCG rescue boats, two Netarts Oceanside Fire jet skis, and many units on surrounding beaches and accesses. The Near Space Corporation was in the process of responding with two UAV’s (drones) to assist in the search.

The sheriff’s office said at 2:20 p.m., the victim’s kayak and life vest were located on the spit shoreline. At 3:12

Commissioners discuss curbside service at library

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners met Wednesday, April 29, to discuss and consider the Tillamook County Library offering curbside service. This meeting was live streamed, due to Oregon's current restrictions on public gatherings.

Library Director Sara Charlton said there are a number of people in the county who do not have internet access or computers at home and this curbside service would help keep people entertained while they are home during the stay at home

order.

The curbside service would be Monday-Friday from 2-5 p.m. Patrons would pull up to the back door. Other libraries in the state are doing curbside service now, Charlton said. She plans to be on the curb helping.

Chairman David Yamamoto asked about employees coming back into the library after the curbside service and how books would be handled. Charlton said she would ask people not to return their books at this time, but if books were returned, they would be isolated in a separate room of the library for three days. Yamamoto said this

could be an extended period of time and asking people not to return books could be an issue.

Charlton said staff will wear facemasks and people will stay in their cars.

"The person would call in the morning with their list, or their request, runners would go get the items and check them out, the librarians would talk with the patrons and see what they wanted," Charlton said. "We have enough garbage bags, we've ordered masks, we've ordered gloves, we've even ordered those face masks and we think we have everything ready to go."

The library ordered 20 masks and

1,000 more gloves. The staff can box up returned books in garbage bags and isolate them in a separate room for three days.

Charlton said there will not be courier service between the Tillamook County Library and the library in Lincoln City.

"I think the commissioners would need to look at your plan," Yamamoto said. "We would need to see that before I can make a decision."

Charlton said staff can space themselves six feet away from each other and some staff, who are ill, will not be returning to the library any time soon. She said the items

would be isolated for three days and that should be enough time to kill anything contamination. Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said she would feel better if the books were held in a separate room for a week, rather than three days.

Yamamoto said if people return books in the plastic bag, they would have to be handled separately. Charlton said the library has been planning and having online meeting about this service.

Charlton will bring her plan to the board of commissions at the next meeting, Wednesday, May 13.

books grow up with large vocabularies and big achievements.

"Children who are read to from infancy on tend to have heard millions of more words by the time they get to school than kids who haven't been read to," Nancy said.

According to an article by Scholastic, findings published in the journal Social Science Research show that raising a child in a home filled with books positively impacts their future academic growth and job attainment. The study shows literacy levels surge at owning 80 books.

Nancy and Gordon are retired teachers. As teachers, they saw that reading ability and the inclination to read are keys to everything students learn.

"We are concerned about children during the school closure time of the pandemic," Nancy said. "They are missing a lot, and regular reading can help."

Nancy said their most frequent book customer is a four-year-old who lives in the trailer park across the street. She always asks politely for a book, loves to choose her own, likes big-kid books, and loves the crayons, coloring books and puzzles.

Walter Amacher, who owns the Little Library at the post office in Pacific City, said he first saw Little Librar-

ies in Multnomah Village and in Bellingham, Washington and thought it was a good idea.

"The closest one to Pacific City was in Woods, so I decided Pacific City should have one as well," Amacher said. "I was worried about where to put it. If it was outside, it would have to be weatherproof, and in this climate, that is tough."

Amacher asked the U.S. Post Office in Pacific City if he could put the Little Library there and they said yes. Since then, even with the pandemic, it has been popular.

"I liked the idea of it being in the post office, since nearly everyone in town goes there, and there are a lot of readers in this town," Amacher said. "It was nice to be able to

do something that makes so many people happy."

Other Little Libraries in the county include: Little Free Library at 395 Nehalem Blvd in Wheeler, Auntie Mar's Library on 902 N Third in Rockaway Beach, Kid's Library on 703 N. Third Ave in Rockaway Beach, Tilly the Lighthouse at Garibaldi Maritime Museum, Gary Albright's Little Library at Kilchis Point Reserve, Walter Amacher's Little Library at the post office in Pacific City, one on Ocean Road in Manzanita, and more.

The HeboLane Library is located at 16435 South Hebo Lane, one block off Highway 101 in Hebo. Anyone is welcome; you do not have to live in Hebo.

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Eighth Grade Lake Oswego student delivers hope to CARE, Inc. assisted living services

The search for essential personal protective equipment (PPE) to help combat the Coronavirus for Kilchis House and Nehalem Bay House has been challenging at best, as every healthcare provider vies for the same pool of limited supply. Face Shields in particular have been difficult to source.

create4pdx, comprised of Lake Oswego High School students ranging from eighth to 12th grade to the rescue. create4PDX is part of the FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) team 8610 ToborTech, a six-year veteran robotics team based in Lake Oswego High School.

The create4pdx campaign's mission is to help frontline healthcare professionals in the fight against the novel Coronavirus. They are proud to announce that they have already delivered 70+ shields (at the time of writing).

Initially, create4pdx was not a campaign, it was a single effort made by Mark Williams, an eighth grader on team ToborTech. With the support of his robotics coach Wan-Shu Lu, he was able to get his hands on a 3D printer. He started printing the Pursa RC3 face shield, and they were able to donate 15 to Salem Hospital.

However, they soon realized they could do a lot more if they had more support. So Mark involved more members on ToborTech. He got several more members involved, like eighth graders Sophia Kamsha, Aidan Kwapisz, and Aaron Tsai, and sophomore Sasha Fefelova. They decided if they were going to make a large number of face shields, they would need more people and printers involved. So they



started work on reaching out to others, which has been a crucial part of making a difference.

They now have a successful website up and running, as well as an Instagram, Facebook, and Twitter (all @create4pdx.). Through their social media they have now recruited over 8 hardworking student printers like sophomore Nathan Griffin, and eighth grader Lukas Bennet. The students found that spreading awareness and getting their message out as far out as possible, through reposting, sharing, etc. has been a driving force in upping production.

They soon realized how little PPE is out there. Most people believe that only hospitals need PPE, but they found that that can be a powerful misconception. Clinics, retirement homes, grocery stores, and other essential businesses

have so little personal protective equipment, so they are thankful that they were able to respond.

It was through this web-enabled outreach that they received two requests through Facebook from Tracy DeLano, Assisted Living Services, Regional Program Director for Kilchis House and Nehalem Bay House. Within days the face shields were personally delivered meeting the houses essential need for this hard to come by PPE.

"I was overcome by the kindness," shared DeLano. "Not only did they fulfill the request, but Mark and his family personally delivered these shields to us. During our brief socially distanced masked visit, Mark told me that creating the shields makes

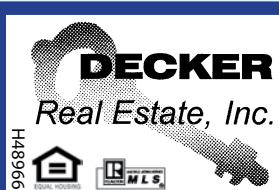
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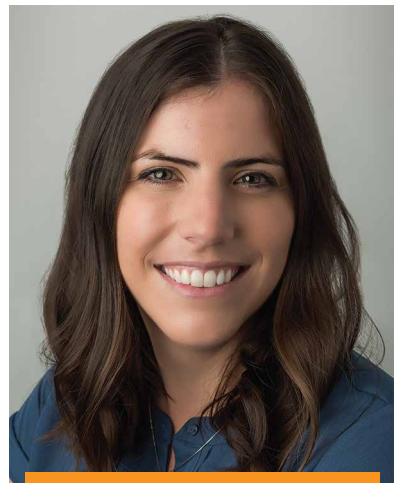

How the Covid-19 virus has affected the real estate market in Tillamook County

The current COVID-19 pandemic has changed the way we as realtors are conducting business.

For the safety of the community and our staff, we closed our offices to the public on Tuesday, March 24. We are working from home now and showing property by appointment only. Most of the other brokerages in the area have done the same.

Many people were concerned that the virus would bring the real estate market to a grinding halt. That's not proven to be the case. With the vacation rentals, hotels/motels, RV Parks and State and County Campgrounds now closed, traffic has slowed considerably but property is still being shown, offers are still being made and things

are still selling.

Our company has put over 20 new deals in escrow since the middle of March. And out of the 40 transactions we had in escrow before the epidemic began, all but one is on track to close, albeit not without a little more work than normal.

Most local brokerages have instituted policies where prospective buyers and their agents are required to complete a short health questionnaire prior to viewing a home. If anyone in the viewing party is displaying signs of being sick or has been in recent contact with anyone that has been sick, they will not be allowed to tour the property.

As company policy and for the well being of everybody, we've elected not to show homes occupied by renters at this time. Given proper notice, renters do not have a choice as to whether or not to let someone into their homes and we feel it's an unnecessary risk. There will plenty of time for prospective buyers to view those homes later.

When homes are shown, the majority of agents and their clients are now wearing face masks, gloves, remov-



ing their shoes or wearing "booties" and are instructing their clients to touch as little in the home as possible, if nothing at all. Agents are wiping down door-handles, light switches and keys on

their way out of the house... all while keeping their proper social distance.

The local real estate community has really rallied together and we're doing our part to continue to serve the needs of our clients in a safe and responsible fashion. For example, a local County Board of Realtors has been collecting and distributing face masks and even home made hand sanitizer graciously donated by Rogue Brewing in Newport. The community support has been tremendous.

One interesting change I've noticed is that more and more clients are requesting to tour houses virtually now. And between "live chats" on our phones and virtual tours on-line we've been able to accommodate them. Fortunately, we're able to conduct most of our business on our computers.

Sales and listing contracts can be signed electronically, property research can be collected and shared with clients via e-mail and there's even talk from the National Association of Realtors that electronic notaries may soon be allowed.

This epidemic has forced our industry to put its foot on the gas pedal technologically speaking in order to serve our customers and to keep these properties and our locally economy moving, which has been a smooth transition for us thus far.

Looking forward, we think things are going to be OK. We feel property values will hold and based on supply and demand we might even get lucky and see a little

"bump" in values. Housing inventory is really slim and it's clear that there is pent up demand for properties here at the beach and throughout the County. The activity on our website (www.RobTrost.com) and on the larger real estate sites has been through the roof. There are a lot of people keeping an eye on our little market. When things finally get back to some kind of "normal" and we start welcoming visitors again to our community, we think demand for beach property will be as strong as ever.

Sounds of Silence

Some leaders of Tillamook County have been duped repeatedly by Facebook. Early this year, the Board of County Commissioners granted approval to Facebook to conduct an industrial level drilling project in Tierra Del Mar. But, even with their approval, the Commissioners recognized this project was a disruption to the people of this residential community. Facebook was ordered to complete its project by April 30. Yet, as of May 4, the project is not done ... and both Facebook and the County are eerily silent on what happens next.

In its Construction Management Plan, Facebook stated unequivocally that "... all project construction activities will take place between January 1 and ... April 30." Despite this explicit commitment to the Tierra Del Mar community ... despite the unambiguous wording in the January 15 Tillamook County Board Order ... despite the unambiguous wording crafted by Facebook in its own Construction Management Plan ... Facebook has failed to complete the project on time.

Why are the citizens of Tillamook County not being informed what comes next? Is the County considering an extension? If so, will there be public input? Or, will we have a continuing industrial eyesore littering our shoreline for the foreseeable future?

We should have been able to expect Facebook to honor its commitments. We should have been able to expect the County to hold Facebook

accountable through effective enforcement of the Board Order. This disputed land use project required diligent oversight by the County Commissioners who supported it. This has not happened. All we hear are the sounds of silence.

Tillamook County needs leaders who are astute, transparent, and responsive. 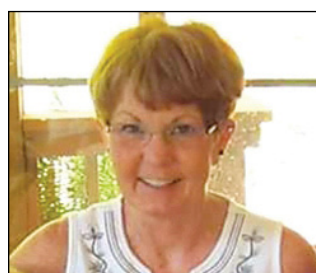

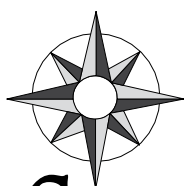

Gary Oldenkamp was born Aug. 22, 1946, in Tillamook, Oregon, and was raised on the family farm on 12th Street. He was the last of seven children of Herman and Jen Oldenkamp. He grew up in a warm, supportive family of Wynia grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, nephews, and nieces. He graduated from Tillamook High School in 1964 where a highlight was being honored as Home Coming King.

Gary aspired to be a top-notch Tillamook dairy farmer. He got to know farmers by bailing “custom” hay and hauling their milk. His farm on Hadley Road was designated a “Dairy of Honor.” Gary’s dream of being a farmer continued when his became one of the first computerized dairies in North America. He was always willing to work more when financial and political circumstances challenged him. He often drove hay truck to Eastern Oregon during winter months bringing back quality hay for himself and other Tillamook dairy farmers. These trips were the highlight of weekends for some of his kids, memories of pie at Chemult, Oregon, country music and endless tales shall remain with them forever. Some of the trips had the family singing Alabama’s “Roll on Highway,” until Dad showed up, usually just in the nick of time to start milking. Other adventures on the farm presented themselves to the kids, when Dad would wake them in the wee hours to watch the veterinarian in action with a sick or pregnant

cow. Gary enjoyed teaching his children how to work on the farm. They all gained his incredible work ethic, honesty and dedication to assisting those in need. Gary often started his story with “Now remember, do as I say, not as I do,” but the humorous lessons and morals live on in each one of us. We all fondly remember the rare solo times we got with Dad, when he would tuck us in and give us a hug, kiss and a prayer.

Gary joined the Tillamook County Creamery Association, along with many other farmers, in 1967. This membership insured the kids of weekly Sunday after church trips to the Creamery for a tour and an ice cream cone to satisfy them as Dad took the family on a Sunday drive around Tillamook County. After leaving the farm, he began to do excavation work and property development. He was skilled, respected and a visionary in this arena. He truly could put lipstick on a pig and sell it.

Gary will be remembered in many ways but mostly for his impeccable character, moral and ethical values carried out in his personal and business life. He also had a sense of adventure in his youth— he truly enjoyed his corvette and that enjoyment lives on in the memories of others. Gary never told tales the same way twice. He fully admitted to not letting the lack of a few facts interfere with a good story. He had strong opinions and didn’t mind expressing them. Loyal and devoted friends, there were a host of them. He loved children, especially babies. With a clap of his hands and a reach, he took colicky or crying babies into his arms and turned their tears into laughter. Gary was a man of faith, and throughout his life attended the Tillamook, Hemlock, and Harper Nazarene churches. He enjoyed listening to southern gospel music, especially the Gaithers. His heart was big, kind, and generous, particularly for

those in need.

Most of all, Gary was a family man. On February 14, 1975, he married Adelle Woodruff, bringing Eve and William into the family. They were later joined by Jennie and Sophia. He married Lucy Mallillin on July 16th, 2005, and they later welcomed their son, Gary Jr (JR). He was incredibly happy with Lucy and JR. He constantly talked of her as his treasure—a hard worker, a great friend and partner, someone he respected and adored. Their son was a consummation of all the love between them that was so palatable to all who met them. In recent years Gary faced his own youthful impishness by being a counselor at J.R.’s church camps. He also took particular enjoyment in attending other church activities and family reunions with his wife and son, along with anyone else who could tag along.

We are coming to the end of Gary’s story. It didn’t end as he would have scripted it. He would not have had an untreatable return of a 1990 cancer diagnosis. He would have been granted more time. But he was able to orchestrate his final hours, and he requested that his family surround him. He died on Saturday, April 18, in their loving care. He was 73. Perhaps it is fitting that he died at 5 pm, just in time for milking.

Gary was preceded in death by his father and mother, Herman and Jen Oldenkamp, his brother Herbert (Bert) and his sister Berdena (Bernie), and brothers-in-law John, Hubert, and Les, and his nephew, Mickey. He is survived by his beloved Lucy, daughters Eve, Jennie, and Sophia, sons William and JR, four grandchildren, four sisters, and many nieces and nephews.

Happy day after Cinco de Mayo! Margaritas and Mexican beer along with chips and salsa here at our house; hope you did something to celebrate.

Shelby Hunt, daughter of Cape Mearesians Rod and Mary Jane Pelson, has been a registered nurse for more than 25 years and is currently the Director of Emergency Services at Northern Nevada Medical Center in Sparks, Nevada. Shelby has been on the local news there frequently, speaking on behalf of the hospital about the COVID-19 pandemic. She most recently shared how the hospital has sectioned off places to sepa-

rate coronavirus patients from the general hospital population, even establishing an outdoor tent for those afflicted with COVID-19. The staff also has strict procedures to keep medical personnel from cross-contaminating patients. Individuals may still need to visit an emergency room for all sorts of injuries and illnesses; it's good to know that Shelby and other administrators at her hospital are making it safe for both regular and COVID-19 patients.

Here in Tillamook, Adventist Health has taken similar precautions. There is a separate checkpoint for Urgent Care and Emergency Room

patients, as well as temperature screening for everyone entering the hospital or clinic. There is a no-visitor restriction in place except for pediatric, obstetrics and hospice. Adventist Health recently launched on-demand virtual

visits for routine visits, urgent care and specialist visits. The Adventist system is partnering with the Oregon Health Authority and local county health authorities to ensure the safety of all patients during this difficult time. If you or a loved one has any kind of medical emergency, please don't postpone a visit to Adventist ER; they stand ready to serve our community.

Last week we had a veggie report; this week it's flowers. The Ayeres have planted two varieties of geraniums, verbena bonariensis, black-eyed Susan vine, goderia, sweet peas, morning glories, cleome, and poppies. As for

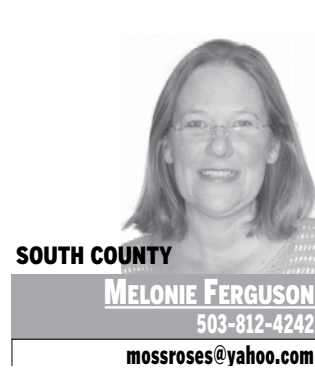
the Walzes, the daffodils are finished but lilies, daisies and poppies are in bloom, dahlias are returning with the sunshine, potted annuals (lobelia, marigolds and petunias) are doing well, and geraniums are revving up. Our yard has blue lithodora, orange crocosmia and red fuchsia blossoms.

What is that very loud cooing every morning? It's a Eurasian collared dove. This is the time of year these doves do their courting. In 1974, a few Eurasian collared doves escaped captivity in the Bahamas. They spread to Florida and then to nearly every state in the U.S. This bird—a pale tan, plump dove—loves roost-

ing near houses. The Eurasian collared dove population is highest in developed areas; almost all their nests are within a half of a mile of inhabited buildings (in contrast, mourning doves seem to like sparsely populated areas). We see these birds perched on wires and branches around Cape Meares all spring. They can be a pretty sight, but, boy, are they noisy! If they get to be too much for you... Oregon has an unlimited harvest of these doves, year-round. Eurasian collared doves are an invasive species and are increasing in number, thus are not protected from bird hunters.

Thanks to Nancy Whitehead for writing with word that HeboLane Little Library is open to all. It's located just a block off U.S. Highway 101 in Hebo, on South Hebo Lane. Coming from either direction, you turn onto South Hebo Lane, which is on the same side of the highway as the Hebo Post Office. We're each invited to take a book, and to leave a book (if we can). Weekend with golfers following all State restrictions in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic and all restrictions associated with the order.

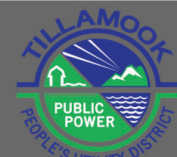

GARDENING MATTERS

Much to everyone's disappointment, the Tillamook County Master Gardener Plant Sale set for May 2, 2020 has been officially cancelled due to the coronavirus. Plants being nursed by MG members will stay in their care until next year. Also, sadly to say, the 2020 "Spade and Wade" Garden Tour has been postponed until 2021, too.

And now, onward...

As we are now spending more time in the garden than we have generally had before, we are given the unique opportunity to do some serious cleaning up in the flower and vegetable beds before we start planting for the 2020 summer season. And as I contemplated this – and I have had a lot of contemplation time this month – I thought there are basically two ways of tackling the cleanup.

The first way is to pick a task (I won't say "chore" because when gardening becomes a chore, it isn't fun anymore), whether it be cutting back

ferns, weeding the beds, or picking up sticks, do only that in the entire garden. You only need to carry around the tools needed for the specific job and sometimes that means less time spent doing it. You don't have to be looking in your bucket or apron for just the right tool because you only have one or two to deal with. And it can be very fulfilling to go through the garden and just get one thing done each day.

But often times that gets me into trouble as my day goes something like this: "Today I will be pruning dead branches from the Japanese maple trees so I have my long-handled loppers. Oh my, there is a hosta that needs to be divided. I had better do that first. I will get my shovel from the shed. Oh yes, and a knife to cut through the roots. (Time spent getting the shovel, digging and dividing the hosta = 30 minutes.) Okay, now it is divided, where will I put the new clump? I can put it over there where that heuchera has died back. Oh, but

wait, I need my trowel to dig that out first so I can plant the hosta. (Time spent digging up heuchera = 10 minutes.) Opps, there are a bunch of bay laurel seedlings I need to pull. (Time spent pulling up seedlings = 30 minutes.) Now, what did I do with that hosta division? (Time spent looking for the hosta division = 10 minutes; planting hosta = 15 minutes)" And in the end, I have all my tools with me and forgot was I was supposed to be doing today which was pruning the maples.

So I would suggest a different way and one that I much prefer. And that is to focus on one area of the garden each

day. I am lucky enough to have several garden areas or "rooms." Some are shady, some are sunny, some have labor-intensive plants like roses and others have easy to grow plants. If the day is cool, I will work in the sunny part and if the day is warm, I work in the shade. I try to break up my week into a schedule where I do one large area or two or three small ones every nice day. When I have a nice day, I round up all the tools I will need to do that area and put them in a carrier that Gary made me last summer. I grab my bucket for weeds and clippings and a kneeling pad or stool. Then I go to work and get that area cleaned and tidied. I can take the time to really see what is growing or what should be growing in that particular area. At the end of my gardening day, I can figure out what needs to be adjusted for the coming days and if anything needs to be moved or divided and put that on the to-do list.

But, as in most things, there are exceptions to the "rules."

When I am putting out the garden art or the patio furniture for the season, I do that all at one time. I like to change where I put things just to have a fresh feel to the garden and patio. Also, if I am planting dahlias or flowering bedding plants, I will do all that at one time no matter where I want to put them.

It is easy to make up a

daily list for gardening in areas instead of tasks. I like to work from to-do lists so I am able to cross things off at the end of the day. This way, you get to cross that whole area off your to-do list. I find that to be almost as satisfying as working in the garden itself.

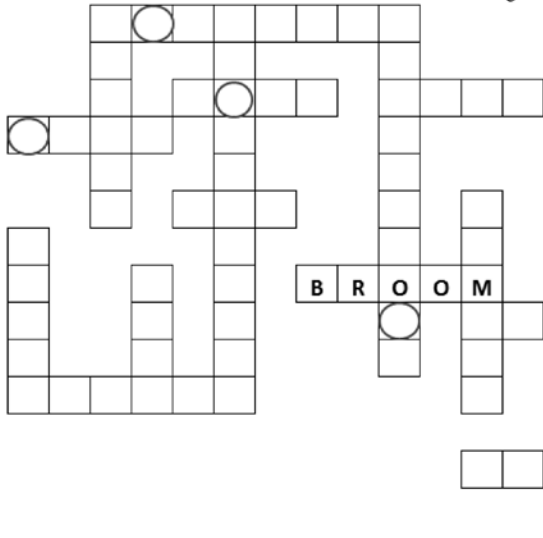

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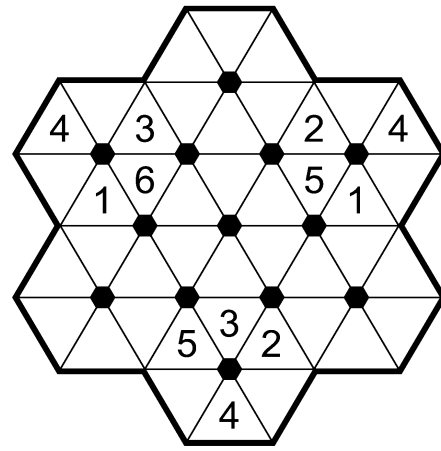
