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

County enters burn ban July 15

The Tillamook County Fire Defense Board, in conjunction with the Oregon Department of Forestry, will enter into a countywide total burn ban of all burning, including burn barrels and all open debris pile burning, on July 15. Residents are encouraged to plan ahead and complete all burning prior to the ban.

In Tillamook County, for the general public, burning permits are required for residents that live within a city fire department district or rural fire protection district; they will need to contact their local fire department for burn permit requirements.

In the remainder of Tillamook County, the Oregon Department of Forestry issues burning permits once fire season has been declared.

There is no fee for the burn permit, but an onsite inspection with the landowner is performed prior to issuing a permit. Information about burning permits and how to obtain a permit for Tillamook District is available by calling the Oregon Department of Forestry at 503-815-7056 (24 hour line), or you may contact your local fire department.

Hyams had served as city manager for the City of Wheeler. Prior to that, she worked for the City of Portland as a budget outreach consultant, marketing coordinator for Harsch Investment Properties, research assistant for DHM Research, and contract feature writer for The Oregonian.

She has shown community leadership as a current board member of the Tillamook Coast Visitors Association and Columbia-Pacific Economic Development District, and as a member of the League of Oregon Cities and NW Oregon Area Commission on Transportation.

Hyams previously served as a volunteer vice president of the Neighbors West/NW Coalition of Neighborhoods, president of the 42nd Avenue Business Association and Northwest District Association, all in Portland.

Hyams earned an Executive Master of Public Administration degree from Portland State University and a B.A. degree in Journalism from the University of Oregon.

Mayor Hall added that Hyams' experience working with the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) will be most beneficial, as Garibaldi, after more than 20 years of city delays, will move forward in phases with a \$10.6 million renovation of Hwy 101/Garibaldi Avenue funded largely by federal and state dollars. ODOT officials say it will be transformative to the city once completed.

"Juliet's ability to analyze projects like transportation was extremely helpful to the development review process on several ODOT north coast projects," said Ken Shonkwiler, ODOT senior regional planner. "She's a rockstar."

Garibaldi City Council on Thursday, July 1, voted to deny a land use decision that was remanded by the Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA). The case was a conditional use request by Coastal Housing Solutions, LLC, for construction of a 66unit apartment complex.

Following LUBA's remand in Kopacek v. City of Garibaldi, on April 9, Coastal Housing Solutions requested the city proceed with remand proceedings. The council held a public hearing on the remand on June 16. The remand directed the city to adopt a decision that sets out and addresses the criteria and explains the justification for the decision based on the criteria.

Each councilor was given the opportunity to make a statement at the July 1 meeting.

"I believe the comprehensive plan is the soul of the Garibaldi municipal code," Councilor Laurie Wandell said. "It's intent speaks to the quality of life of our community."

"Under the Garibaldi comprehensive plan policies, encourage development of housing and locations that are easily accessible through walking and bicycling to municipal and commercial services and facilities," Councilor Katie Findling said. "Neither, there's no multimodal access to the area in the application through the city or through ODOT that I could find in any of the minutes."

Findling said because of the lack of multimodal access, it does not fit the comprehensive plan in this aspect.

Councilor Judy Riggs said she is aware there is a problem with housing in the community and the town is turning into a second home community. The town has lost schoolteachers and there are children who are homeless, she said.

"I know most of you sitting in this room do not want the apartments," Riggs said. "I understand part of the reason why but we have people in this community that don't have a place to live."

Hall said for him as a resident of Garibaldi, it is important for the city to be able to accommodate the populations. He spoke about the importance of affordable housing.

"I don't want to see the city of Garibaldi, the residents of Garibaldi, to have to fund a major expansion of our water and wastewater systems to accommodate 66 new units," Hall said.

Ron Halter, a partner with Paul Daniels on the application, said he would propose 18 one-bedroom units in a subdivision. The city would have to fast track it through the approval process so building can begin in a timely manner.

"There is no question this city needs apartments for people," Halter said. "There's no question it needs single family homes. We'll try to do both."

Hall said if Halter or Daniels submit a new application, he will work to fast track it. It will be a conditional use and will have to go through the planning process.

The council voted to deny the 66-unit apartment application.

Tillamook County Health Department relayed during a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, July 7, 11 new COVID-19 cases from June 27 through July 3.

The health department reported Friday, July 9, from June 20 through July 3, the county has seen 20 recorded COVID-19 cases. All but one case of these 20 was unvaccinated.

"Most recently, according to the Oregon Health Authority, we're seeing more cases of the delta variant and we are cautioned to expect rapid increases among unvaccinated groups with the delta variant," Administrator Marlene Putman said.

To date, Oregon Health Authority has tracked 14 cases of the delta variant in Oregon, with seven located in region 1, which includes Tillamook, Clatsop, Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties. County level data is not available for variant tracking at this time.

Putman said in general, primarily those unvaccinated populations are the ones contracting the virus. With the lifting of restrictions, there is an uptick in other respiratory illnesses, such as influenza.

"If you're feeling ill, stay home," Putman said. "If you are experiencing COVID-like symptoms, and you just don't know for sure, call your health care provider, and give us a call."

You can call the health center for same day COVID-19 testing, Putman added. Call 503-842-3900 to schedule. For more information about the vaccine or COVID-19 in general, call the nurse information line at 503-842-3914. Testing is also available at Rine-





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Agencies recap Fourth of July weekend

Tillamook County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) and the public safety community at large in Tillamook County are breathing a collective sigh of relief following a very busy Independence Day weekend, which saw tens of thousands of visitors descending on our small coastal communities.

"The number of calls for service were larger than Memorial Day, but we actually saw less real emergencies and significant incidents during the July 4 weekend than occurred the weekend after Memorial Day. We were very lucky," said Sheriff Joshua Brown.

Law enforcement partners in the northern part of Tillamook County were also relieved that their small department was not overburdened with emergency calls.

"It was probably the quietest Fourth of July weekend I have seen in my 19 years with Manzanita Police," said Police Chief Erik Harth.

Harth attributed the relative calm in his town to the fact that the city chose not to host a parade or fireworks display this year.


"We really had no activities to draw that many people here, and with Rockaway having an official fireworks show, I think most people went there instead," Harth said.

Another community that hosted fireworks was Pacific City. While they were fortunate to avoid most of the usual mayhem that occurs on Independence Day, the Cape Kiwanda area still probably witnessed the worst behavior that celebrants brought to Tillamook County, the sheriff's office said.

"We had one person severely injured and was a trauma system entry after an illegal firework went off in his hand. He had severe injuries to his arm," said Nestucca Fire Chief Jim Oeder. "He was transported to Tillamook Hospital, but I have no information on his condition or were he might have been transported after that."

Oeder also watched as people were unsafe lighting off their own fireworks, but was grateful for the three TCSO deputies that were working the area and were able to respond when needed.

"People just weren't using common sense," Oeder said. "I saw people firing roman



there in minutes, the fire engines arrived, and two other deputies were en route when the crowd dispersed," said Oeder. "I'm very grateful for that kind of police assistance when it's needed."

Deputies Billy Cloud and Evan Wallace were assigned to the Cape Kiwanda area, and Deputies Tom Mayne and Dennis Greiner patrolled Sand Lake Recreation Area on July 4.

Twenty miles to the north, the communities of Netarts and Oceanside are typically the site of some spectacular, if not illegal, unsanctioned fireworks displays on the Fourth of July. These tiny villages historically attract large crowds who often leave large numbers of smoldering beach fires and tons of firework debris for local first responders and volunteers to take care of the next day. This year was a bit different. "We only had to put a few small campfires out on the beach on the morning of the 5th, and maybe picked up three trash bags of debris,' said Netarts-Oceanside Fire Chief Tim Carpenter. "This is not much more than a normal summer Sunday, so we do appreciate that at least in Netarts-Oceanside, people were careful." The Tillamook County community that received the most Independence Day visitors had to be the city of Rockaway Beach, the sheriff's office said. This was most likely due to the promise of a huge official fireworks display - it was rumored that the fireworks stash that was allotted for the 2020 show

(which was canceled due to COVID-19) were combined with this year's cache. This meant spectators would be treated to the largest display ever put on by the city.

Rockaway Fire Department staff and volunteers patrolled the beach all weekend, controlling fires and helping with water safety. Rockaway Fire Chief Todd Hesse had one word to describe the weekend - "Busy!"

"Our crews were running medical calls and patrolling the beach for fire safety and advising people about the dangerous riptides that exist here," said Hesse. Tillamook Ambulance

Tillamook Ambulance and Rockaway Fire's Quick Response Team (QRT) responded to several medical emergencies, but none were fireworks related.

"We were also lucky that we had no fire calls that were fireworks related," Hesse said. Tillamook County Sheriff's Office," said Sheriff Brown.

Sheriff Joshua Brown, Undersheriff Matt Kelly, Deputy Ben Berger and Detective Chase Ross all patrolled Rockaway during the Rockaway celebrations.

"We also had Deputies David Bartlett, Mike Reeves, Ethan Ault, Yonty Urrutia, Sam Cummings and Chris Rondeau patrolling the rest of the county and available to assist wherever needed. Although it's probably impossible to ever entirely stop the use of illegal fireworks, our deputies did confiscate a large number of illegal fireworks while patrolling a large area, with tens of thousands of people, while still having to respond to regular calls for service," said Brown.

"We had cars parked along 101 from the bus barn all the way to Nedonna Beach," said Undersheriff Matt Kelly. "We were patrolling the area anticipating problems, yet we had very few emergency calls or serious problems. It was the first time TCSO provided sole coverage for this celebration, and I'm happy to report that it was a relatively peaceful and fun family event." Fortunately, the same can be said for the entirety of Tillamook County. "I appreciate the fact an overwhelming majority of people that came to our community to celebrate the Fourth of July mostly did so with respect for our local residents, our landscape and our neighborhoods," said Brown.

The area also saw two dumpster fires complete with exploding fireworks. One was a three-yard dumpster at Tierra Del Mar on the morning of July 4. The second was a 10-yard dumpster fire at Cape Kiwanda late in the evening the same day.

When Oeder responded to the large dumpster fire, he faced a large aggressive crowd that was intent on him not extinguishing it, he reported.

"There were 20-30 people that wanted to sit there in the middle and watch it burn. I was on the radio asking for deputies to respond code three. Deputy Wallace was Garibaldi Fire Chief Jay Marugg was able to take advantage of the absence of issues in his city and helped light off some of the fireworks for Rockaway's official show.

"We made it through alright, other than just a lot of people on the beach also lighting fireworks," said Marugg.

Although he witnessed several cases of stupidity related to the public lighting fireworks and with fire in general, he was pleased the show went off without a hitch.

"It was a blast," Marugg said.

Annual razor clamming conservation closure on Clatsop beaches July 15 – Sept. 30

The annual summer conservation closure for razor clams begins Thursday, July 15, through Sept. 30 on Clatsop beaches (from Tillamook Head in Seaside to the mouth of the Columbia River).

The annual conservation closure allows newly

set young clams to establish themselves on the 18 miles of Clatsop beaches. Protecting the clams on these beaches is vital to their population and future clamming opportunities as more than 90 percent of the total razor clam harvest in Oregon occurs here. The an-

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nual closure was established in 1967.

When razor clamming reopened Oct. 1 last year, a good harvest season was expected as stock assessments showed high abundance with many clams over four inches. However, due to very high levels of domoic acid, razor clamming on Clatsop beaches closed Oct. 30 and remain closed due to continued toxin levels above the closure threshold.

ODFW staff assesses razor clam stocks during the conservation closure. The 2020 assessments showed the third highest abundance since 2004 when assessments began. Razor clam harvesting is open on other state beaches from Cape Lookout (just south of Netarts Bay) south to the California border. The best opportunities outside Clatsop beaches are in the Newport area, with the most consistent producers being Agate Beach, North Jetty, and South Beach. Other razor clam harvest areas include Winchester Bay, Bandon and Gold Beach, among others.

Bay clam harvesting is currently open coast-wide.

Second prescribed fire planned for NNWR

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is planning a second prescribed fire on grasslands at Nestucca Bay National Wildlife Refug planned for July 21-23. There are multiple factors to consider prior to burning, including public safety, the temperature, moisture content of the vegetation, and wind direction and speed. The prescribed fire will only be ignited when these factors are ideal for burning. During the burn days, the Refuge will be closed to the public. Call 541-867-4550 for up to date information on the burn schedule.

The Refuge is burning to restore healthy habitat for wildlife. One of the special habitats the Refuge is restoring at Nestucca Bay is coastal prairie. The coastal prairie restoration is designed to meet the habitat requirements of the Oregon Silverspot butterfly, a species listed as threatened

under the Endangered Species Act, which has declined significantly. The primary need at this stage of prairie restoration is the removal of dense fescue grass

from the largest of the restoration units to allow the fall planting of a diversity of native grasses and wildflowers required by the butterfly for nectar. The Refuge uses a variety of tools for this restoration, including having, mowing, herbicide treatment, planting and seeding, and prescribed fire. At this stage, prescribed fire is the most

effective tool for preparing the ground for the next stage of prairie restoration.

Prescribed fires are beneficial, carefully planned, and strategically located. They are carefully monitored and manipulated by trained fire professionals. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is consulting with local fire management

agencies to ensure all safety measures are taken to reduce risk to people and wildlife. Safety risks of any prescribed fire include potential smoke impacts, undesired fire effects, and the unlikely but possible

escape of fire outside of the planned area. Extensive planning has occurred to ensure that all safety measures are taken to reduce these risks, including the approval of a Prescribed Fire Plan. The Prescribed Fire Plan addresses everything needed to plan for and implement the fire. A prescribed fire is only conducted under very specific

conditions set out in the plan and depending upon available resources, time of year, weather and desired results.

Since the prescribed fire is scheduled during a period of heightened wildfire awareness, extra risk reduction measures have been enacted.

It is also a good reminder that fire can be a hazard at any time of year if steps are not taken to use fire safely. Whenever you use fire, whether for debris burning or enjoying a campfire, use these steps to prevent your fire from turning into the next wildfire.

Never leave your fire unattended.

When burning debris, always have a hose and shovel at the fire to prevent the fire

from spreading. Check with your local fire protection agency prior to burning. (Most rural fire protection districts require a burn permit year round.)

If camping, ensure your campfire is in a designated area.

Always make sure your campfire is out cold before leaving.

On the beach, keep your campfire far from beach grass and drift wood piles.

Forest users may obtain information about state forestlands and industrial fire restrictions in our area and public fire restrictions by calling the Tillamook District public information line at 503-842-2548. For other information call the Oregon Department of Forestry at 503-842-2545, 8 a.m. to 5

p.m., Monday through Friday. The ban does not include permitted campfires and campfires in designated sites. Campfires on the beach must be at least 50 feet away from vegetation, and any driftwood concentrations.

For further information please contact your local fire district or the Oregon Department of Forestry.

t was a great July 4th here in Cape Meares. Our unofficial, unsponsored, spontaneous parade took place right on time at 11 a.m. Parade marshals stepped out smartly, holding a "Get Vaccinated" sign with two participants holding long needles. Children on gaily decorated bikes and red or blue toy cars rode down the street, taking a hand away from steering long enough to give a parade wave. The Walzes drove their white Miata with an honored guest, Karen's sister Diane, in the passenger seat and an oh-sotrue "Living a Dream, Cape Meares, OR" sign taped on its side. Two fire vehicles from our Station 73 participated, with our gung-ho volunteer firefighters throwing candy to the crowd. Parade-watchers sported red-white-and-blue ties, patriotic hats and big smiles. About 60 individuals participated in the parade while close to 150 cheered



from the sidelines. The mostly overcast skies kept the temperature just right and a good time was had by all. Next year, we hope the community potluck will return.

As for fireworks, we watched dazzling aerial displays at Rockaway from our living room window, although fog occasionally obscured some of them. Cape Meares itself may or may not have had a few fireworks go off that may or may not have been spectacular as well (official warnings had gone out about not having fireworks on the beach). We could see a couple of bonfires blazing on the beach and in firepits in the neighborhood. Everyone was careful however, knowing fire danger is again high. All in all, a fun 4th of July—and certainly a big improvement over last year!

Cape Meares resident Dave Dittmer recently sent me an interesting newspaper clipping from March 1964. Does that year ring a bell? There was a 9.2 magnitude earthquake at 5:36 p.m. on March 27, 1964, striking Alaska's Prince William Sound (about 75 miles southeast of Anchorage). It was felt throughout Alaska, rippled south to shake the Space Needle in Seattle, sent tremors east to British Columbia, and generated a tsunami that killed four children camping on the Beverly Beach State Park near Newport, Oregon (a total of 139 individuals died as a result

of this quake and resulting landslides and tsunamis).

The Dittmer connection? Dave's maternal uncle, Bill Makela, was fishing out of Kodiak, Alaska, when that quake hit. He felt a bump on the bottom of his boat and looked around to see the entire fishing fleet of 100 boats canting left and right, and the harbor being shaken, cracking up and sinking. Makela managed to make his way out to sea to ride out the event; he did not get back to land for five days. When he did, he found the tides in the town of Kodiak were running eight feet higher than reported in the tide table. The seismic event had permanently dropped the land level, per a subsequent US Navy report. Thanks Dave, for sharing this personal connection to the Great Alaskan Earthquake, and for making sure we are alert for the next Big One.

Wasn't it fun to see our own Clover's Day parade make front page news in last week's edition of the Headlight Herald? Watching the parade on my sidewalk at home (I live along the route), I was happy to be joined by Jamie Chambers and her family. Jamie (formerly Wettstein) graduated from Nestucca with my yonger son, Joey, in Nestucca's class of 2009. The group included Jamie's hubby Chris, their boys Bram and Orion and Jamie's mom Lori Wettstein, with others. They shared corn dogs purchased for the parade from Cloverdale's Center Market, and passed me wrapped candy thrown from parade participants. It's good to be in community again.

Tillamook County had eleven new positive cases of Covid-19 from June 27 through July 3 and additional cases were reported over the recent holiday weekend. As is the case elsewhere in Oregon and in the United States, Covid-19 hospitalizations are primarily all nonvaccinated individuals. The Delta variant is reportedly surging; the vaccines do appear effective against this and other known variants.

It is not too late to get the vaccine. Free shots are available through your local pharmacy or primary health care provider. Tillamook County Health Department is continuing to hold clinics from 8:30- 11:30 a.m. each Tuesday and Thursday morning at their Annex Building, next to the main building at 8th Street and Pacific Avenue in Tillamook. 

Massive offshore wind farms could be coming to Oregon

A federal agency is planning some big things for offshore wind energy on the Oregon Coast.

In a June presentation to the Curry County Board of Commissioners, the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management outlined their process in identifying locations for some truly massive wind turbines - the largest of which are taller than the Statue of Liberty and the Washington Monument at more than 850 feet - not to mention the span of the whirling blades - which can be longer than a football field.

Although they are typically much larger, offshore turbines essentially work the same as onshore turbines. As wind causes the blades to spin, they produce kinetic energy, which is converted to electrical energy by a generator inside the turbine. The electricity is shuttled to an offshore substation through underwater cables, and then transported to an onshore substation, where it is finally distributed to homes and businesses.

Whitney Hauer, renewable energy specialist, said offshore wind turbines can produce more energy than landlocked turbines because the wind is stronger and more consistent.

In shallow water, turbines are secured

directly to the ocean floor, but floating foundations are used in deeper waters. Hauer said floating offshore wind technology will most likely be used on the West Coast due to steep drop-offs along the continental shelf. Offshore turbines could be built anywhere from three to 300 nautical miles offshore.

In June of 2020, the state of Oregon and the BOEM committed to offshore wind energy planning.

Since then, the BOEM initiated a multi-year planning process, beginning with a mass data collection phase. They are looking at a wide variety of information, including potential human and environmental impacts, natural disaster risk such as a tsunami — and wind speeds in particular locations, among many other data points. BOEM even tracks the unexploded weapons lingering in ocean waters along the West Coast; remnants of past wars, which either missed their target or were dumped.

If you are wondering, there are two relatively small "explosive dumping areas" about 100 miles West of Astoria, according to the West Coast Ocean Data Portal.

Hauer said BOEM is scouting the entire Oregon Coast for potential wind farm locations. On average, offshore wind speeds in Oregon are 15 miles per hour, according to the presentation. Although she said offshore wind in Southern Oregon is considered "world class," at 22-23 mph, on average.

America's first offshore wind farm is the Block Island Wind Farm off the coast of Rhode Island. There, five turbines create enough energy to power 17,000 homes in New England. Block Island finished construction in 2016 and came online shortly thereafter. There are more than 30 offshore wind projects across the U.S. in various stages of development, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

After data collection is finished, specific locations will be identified for wind farms, which is an array of turbines. Then, a plethora of environmental surveys will be conducted in those locations, and BOEM will purchase a lease from the state. After it assumes control, BOEM will issue more environmental surveys, including geological and biological surveys, and after extensive surveying, construction on a wind farm can finally begin.

Recently, Representative David Brock-Smith submitted a bill to the state legislature, which aims to establish three Gigawatts of commercial scale floating offshore wind energy projects within federal waters off the Oregon Coast by 2030.

Bub was a beloved husband, father, grandfather, and brother. He fought a good fight but lost the battle on July 4th, 2021, surrounded by family.


He graduated from Tillamook High School in 1948 and then in the fall of '48, he attended Oregon State University for a short time.



Garibaldi Charters celebrates 20 years with Tillamook Chamber

When it comes to office views, the captains and crew at Garibaldi Charters has most competitors beat.

The fishing charter company staff spends most days out on the water guiding customers in hooking bottom fish, salmon, halibut and lingcod. It is not uncommon for a bird to land on deck to rest for a bit, or for a dolphin to follow along in the charter boat's wake.

"Every day that you're out there on the water, you see things that people get to see once in a lifetime," said co-owner Tamara Mautner. "We get to see this stuff every day.

Garibaldi Charters celebrates its 20th anniversary as a Tillamook Chamber of Commerce member this year. The family-owned business has spent just as many years mingling with ocean wildlife and getting customers hooked on fishing.

"Personally, I really do like being out on the water. ... But I also really enjoy getting people out there for their first time and seeing them really light up. Maybe they'll become a lifelong fisherman," Mautner said.

Mautner has owned Garibaldi Charters with her husband for the last eight years. Before that, the company belonged to her parents.

The business operates three charter fishing boats and one guide boat. The charters primarily focus on bottom fishing, but Mautner and her staff also offer trips for halibut, tuna, salmon and occasionally crab.

"It's a great way to get out on the water if you don't own your own boat," Mautner said. "Maybe you want to just try it out, but you don't want to go through the hassle of buying the boat, maintaining the boat, paying for gas, taking the boat to the launch, launching the boat, paying to launch the boat and finding where the good spots are. We can do that for you."



Garibaldi Charters also offers whale-watching trips in the spring.

Most of Mautner's customers come from out of town, and during the summer the charter trips are "nonstop visitors," she said. Many of those visitors learn about the charter company through brochures at the chamber offices, or in the official Tillamook Coast Visitor Guide co-produced by the chamber.

"I feel like it's important to be a part of the chamber because they are really in tune with the community," Mautner said. "I really like getting their email updates, especially over the last year keeping up posted on what's going on with COVID and regulations and restrictions and what to expect and what's going forward."

The charter company happily caters to locals who don't own boats or have a large enough vessel for deep-water fishing. Offshore lingcod fishing trips tend to be a favorite in the Tillamook area.

"We have larger boats and can do some of the trips that maybe they can't do in their own 25-foot boat," Mautner said.

Like any charter fishing company, Garibaldi Charters operates at the mercy of the weather and fish stocks. Mautner said the business works closely with Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife to make sure it stays within harvest guidelines for each species of fish. "We are not just out there raking in all of the fish. We want to make sure this continues to be sustainable," Mautner said. "I think some people have the perception that fishermen just want to go out there and catch all the fish, but this is our livelihood. We definitely want to make sure we are doing it in a way that we will still be able to do in 20, 30 or 50 years from now."

Central Oregon Coast opens for razor clamming

The Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) announce the opening of the central Oregon coast for recreational razor clam harvesting. Razor clamming is now open from Cape Lookout (just south of Netarts Bay) to the California border.

Recent shellfish samples taken from the area indicate

levels of the marine biotoxin domoic acid have fallen below the closure limit. Razor clam harvesting remains closed from the Columbia River to Cape Lookout because domoic acid toxin levels are above the closure limit.

Mussel, bay clam and crab harvesting remain open along the entire Oregon coast. Coastal scallops are not affected by biotoxin closures when only the adductor muscle is eaten. ODA does not recommend eating whole scallops. Commercial shellfish products sold in stores and restaurants remain safe for consumers.

Paralytic shellfish toxin and domoic acid toxin are produced by algae and originate in the ocean. ODA will continue to test for shellfish toxins twice per month, as tides and weather permit. Reopening is area closed for biotoxins requires two consecutive tests with results below the closure limit.

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


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Yardwork: A full body workout

We all know that physical activity is an important part of a healthy lifestyle, but who has time for workouts during the summer when there is so much work to do in the yard and garden? Well, you will be happy to hear that many of those tasks around the yard qualify as bona fide exercise. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), general gardening counts as moderate exercise, and activities like hoeing or digging count as vigorous exercise. If you are a gardener, you already know gardening is a good workout!

Not only do yardwork and gardening burn calories, these activities often involve stretching, bending, pulling, lifting, and digging, which can tone muscles, increase strength and flexibility, and build endurance. It can also help lower your blood pressure. The National Institutes of Health says common chores like gardening or raking leaves for 30+ minutes several times a week as activities that can help reduce your risk of heart disease.

Yardwork and gardening come with other benefits, too. Spending time outside in nature reduces stress, and the repetitive nature of yardwork can help focus the mind in a way similar to meditation. Exposure to sunlight is good for your bones as it boosts Vitamin D, which helps your body absorb calcium. (Don't forget to wear sunscreen, though, if you are going to spend more



than a few minutes in the sunshine.) Time spent outdoors and the physical exertion of gardening can also help you sleep better.

When working in the yard, it is a good idea to vary your activities so you use a variety of muscles but not overdo any particular set of muscles. For instance: prune for a while, weed-eat for a while, rake for a while, mow for a while, and so on. Listen to your body - it will tell you when it's time to take a break and switch to a new activity. It can also be helpful to switch sides every few minutes - dig, rake, or weed with your right arm, then your left, to work all the muscles. And of course, we probably don't need to tell you that manual tools offer a better workout than electric or

gas-powered. Using manual clippers, shears, and push mowers works more muscles and burns more calories than electric or gas-powered tools.

The CDC recommends (and so does Tillamook County Wellness) that you make sure to stay safe when gardening or working in the yard: drink plenty of water and take shade breaks as needed; make sure to apply sunscreen; wear gloves, goggles, long pants, and closed-toe shoes, especially when using sharp tools; make sure you have a current tetanus vaccination; and pay attention to your body – it's easy to overdo when you are digging or carrying heavy loads.

We hope you are inspired to count your gardening as a good workout – good for

your body, good for your mood, and good for your yard! Not to mention the sense of accomplishment you feel when you look at that freshly-mowed lawn, or that weed-free flower bed, or a section of your yard finally freed from the ever-encroaching blackberry brambles. But don't worry - your exercise routine can continue across the seasons because the grass will keep growing, as will the weeds and the blackberries; there is always something to do in the yard or garden!





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
