## Courthouse reopens after closure for odor, particulates

County officials said Friday that the final stage of office space cleaning was underway at the Tillamook County Courthouse. The HVAC systems cleaning was concluded Wednesday.

A statement from the Tillamook County Board of Commissioners said the need for the cleaning was precipitated by air testing results that documented levels of particulates in top floor courthouse office

spaces that are above the Environmental Protection Agency’s recommended levels.

The statement said in collaboration with the Tillamook Fire District, Tillamook County Sheriff’s Office, and Alpha Environmental, the County is taking all necessary precautions and following the recommended steps to ensure the courthouse is safe before reopening.

The courthouse reopened at 8 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 18.

“We look forward to resuming full operations and serving the community,” the commissioners’

statement said, following with apologies for any inconvenience the closure of the courthouse this week may have caused.

“The safety of the individuals who work at or have business at the courthouse is our main concern,” the statement said.

Air testing results were released Wednesday, Nov. 13, after the courthouse was suddenly closed Nov. 8. The testing was done by Alpha Environmental Services, Inc. of Beaverton.

The results showed levels of particulates in office spaces

located in the top floor of the courthouse that are above the Environmental Protection Agency’s recommended levels, according to a statement from the commissioners. Particulates can induce eye, nose and throat irritation and respiratory infections.

The results do not show the origin, but county officials have reason to believe in the presence of the odor originated from recent roofing repairs. Fumes presumably entered the office spaces through an HVAC system on the roof that services those

spaces. The odor dissipated but the particulates remained, according to a previous statement from the commissioners.

Property tax payments are due Nov. 15. Citizens are encouraged to mail payments, but for every business day the County courthouse is closed, the County will extend the payment deadline by one business day.

The Tillamook County Assessor/Tax Collector issued a statement offering apologies for

## Driver injured after lumber truck flips

A crashed lumber truck caused several hours of traffic delays near the county border on Hwy. 6 and reportedly resulted in serious injuries for the driver.

On the afternoon of Tuesday, Nov. 12, emergency crews and law enforcement responded to the crash at milepost 33 of Highway 6. The crashed semi and its scattered load were blocking traffic. The road was opened thanks to efforts of the Oregon Department of Forestry South Fork Forest Camp, composed of Oregon Department of Corrections inmates.

“Without them, it would have delayed the opening of the highway by at least an hour,” Forest Grove Fire & Rescue posted on social media. The inmate crew quickly moved all of the large dimensional lumber out of the road by hand.

Oregon State Police (OSP) said the truck was eastbound when for an unknown reason the driver left roadway to the right shoulder, overcorrecting back into the lane and causing the cab and trailer to overturn.

OSP identified the driver as 56-year-old Satnam Singh Johal of Ferndale, Washington. Bystanders at the scene assisted Johal with getting out of the cab.

After complaining of pain, he became unresponsive and was taken to an area hospital.

The highway was closed, then partially closed for several hours. Hillsboro Towing removed the vehicle. Oregon Department of Transportation, Banks Fire, and Washington County Sheriff’s Office assisted at the scene.

## Nestucca High School wins Pumpkin Chunkin Contest for seventh year in a row

American Society of Mechanical Engineers at Oregon State University (OSU) hosted their annual Pumpkin Chunkin contest on Nov. 2. The club invites high schools around the state to design and build pumpkin launching machines (such as a catapults, trebuchets and slingshots) to compete in this competition. The goal is to hit a target at a distance of 35 yards. This is an accuracy competition, not a distance competition.

Nestucca High School has handily taken first place in the contest for seven consecutive years. Ron Smith, who teaches Engineering, AutoCAD and Ag Mechanics at the high school, has been taking his students to compete for nine years. Smith believes OSU has held the contest for 10 years.

“It is really difficult to hit the target,” Smith said.

Variations in a pumpkin’s symmetry, for example, play a big role in how well a pumpkin will fly through the air toward the target.

If the pumpkin hits the target, 50 points is awarded. If your pumpkin lands within five feet, 35 points are awarded. 10 feet earns you 20 points, and 15 feet is worth 10 points. The capability of larger points come into play when tossing larger pumpkins; For example, a pumpkin weighing 2 lbs. or less is a 1 point multiplier, while a 10 lb. pumpkin brings a 2 point multiplier. Nestucca Bobcats do things in a big way, making a statement by throwing the larger more difficult pumpkins of 10

pounds or more and racking up the points.

You can use any mechanical device to throw the pumpkins. Pneumatics, explosives or hydraulics may not be used. Many teams use sling-shots. All the pumpkin chunkin machines must be no taller than six feet high, no wider than six feet wide, and no longer than six feet long.

“The contest is always very competitive,” Smith said.

Smith’s students need to be consistently accurate with their throws. Practice takes place before each annual contest on the Bobcat’s practice football field, after calculations are made in the classroom. Sophomores through seniors participated.

This is Smith’s 27th year teaching students at Nestucca High School, and it is his last year. Smith will be retiring in June.

## PSU study finds microplastics in oysters, clams on Oregon Coast

Tiny threads of plastics are showing up in Pacific oysters and razor clams along the Oregon Coast — and the yoga pants, fleece jackets and sweat-wicking clothing that Pacific Northwest-ers love to wear are a source of that pollution, according to a new Portland State University study.

Briitta Baechler, a Ph.D. student in PSU’s Earth, Environment and Society program, and Elise Granek, a professor of environmental science and management, looked at what variables predict microplastic concentrations in Pacific oysters and razor clams — organisms that have commercial, recreational and cultural importance in Oregon.

On average, the researchers found 11 microplastic pieces per oyster and nine per clam in the samples, and nearly all were microfibers, which can come from clothing made from synthetic or natural materials as well as

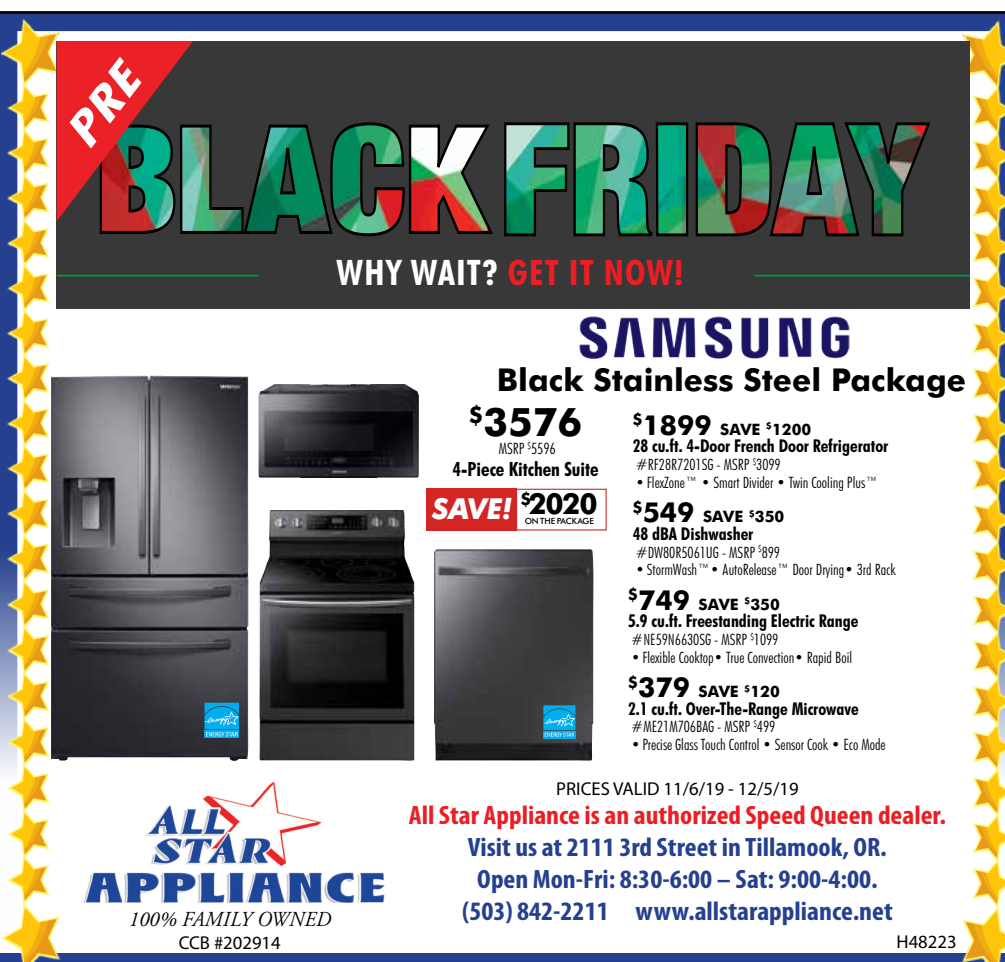

Tillamook County Circuit Court has set up limited operations at the Officer's Mess Hall at the Port of Tillamook

Bay. Michele Bradley, general manager for Port of Tillamook Bay, said her organization was happy to be able to provide space to the Tillamook County Circuit Court during the courthouse closure.

"The transition process has been collaborative by both Tillamook County staff and Port staff to make sure all of the needs are met," Bradley said. "An event such as this highlights the need for continued discussions for emergency planning with businesses, cities, Tillamook County, smaller unincorporated communities, and other agencies, including local special districts."

Tillamook Circuit Court reported that it was open for operations all week at the Port of Tillamook Bay's Officer Mess Hall. The court has limited its normal docket to essential hearings in a single courtroom. Court officials released a statement expressing gratitude to the Port of Tillamook Bay and its director Michelle Bradley for all of the assistance this week.





# Oregon's unemployment rate has stayed near 4 percent for three years

Oregon's unemployment rate was 4.1 percent in September and October. The rate has been between 4.0 and 4.4 percent for an unprecedented 36 consecutive months dating back to November 2016. The U.S. unemployment rate ticked up from 3.5 percent in September to 3.6 percent in October.

Other measures of Oregon's labor force also indicated a tight labor market in recent months. Fewer individuals are remaining unemployed for extended periods. The number of individuals unemployed for 52 weeks or more dropped to 6,000 in October, which was the lowest level in a dozen years and well below the peak of 70,000 in 2010.

The number of unemployed who lost their job has remained close to 32,000 for the past three years, which was less than one-quarter of those unemployed due to a job loss in 2009. Meanwhile, the number of people who were unemployed due to leaving their job voluntarily has recently risen above 16,000, up from an average of 12,000 during the prior six calendar years. The increase in the number of people leaving their jobs voluntarily could indicate increasing confidence among workers of being able to easily find another job if they quit their current job.

Oregon's nonfarm payroll employment rose by 4,400 jobs in October, following an upwardly revised gain of 3,300 jobs in September. Gains in October were concentrated in leisure and hospitality (+2,400 jobs), government (+2,300), and wholesale trade (+1,000). These monthly gains were partially offset by job losses of 700 each in construction and health care and social assistance, and a loss of 900 jobs in retail trade.

In addition to the strong monthly gains in September and October, quarterly revisions boosted the level of reported employment by 6,400 jobs for June and subsequent months.

Oregon's payroll employment grew by 27,800 jobs, or 1.4 percent, over the past 12 months. This growth rate was slightly slower than the 1.7 percent average annual rate Oregon's economy experienced over the past 19 months. During the five years prior to that, employment grew much faster – at an average of 2.8 percent per year. Oregon has added jobs at the same pace as the U.S. over the past year.

# ODOT recommends Third Street traffic change

Eastbound traffic on Third Street between Ivy and Main will soon return to a single lane.

During Oregon Department of Transportation's (ODOT) downtown project, this section of Oregon Route 131 and Third Street was reconfigured to give eastbound traffic two lanes.

Post-project, ODOT is reportedly considering returning it to its original traffic flow pattern.

The Tillamook Public Works Committee met on Nov. 12 and made a motion to recommend to the City Council that they support ODOT's plan.

The committee also recommended discussing lane widths, parking spaces, 'no right turn on red' from U.S. Route 101 south to Third Street west and other geometric considerations.

Tillamook Police Chief Terry Wright and Tillamook Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Justin Aufdermauer have offered support to the lane number change but recommend that the last two parking spots on this block be removed. They do not support the concept of 'no right turn on red.'

The Tillamook City Council accepted the committee's recommendation and will pass it along to ODOT.

# Commercial Dungeness crab season delayed

The opening of the commercial Dungeness crab season will be delayed from Dec. 1 until at least Dec. 16 along the entire Oregon Coast as testing shows crabs are too low in meat yield, according to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Commercial Dungeness crab is Oregon's most valuable fishery. Last year's delayed season opening reportedly still brought in the second highest ex-vessel value ever (\$66.7 million) with 18.7 million pounds landed, just above the 10-year average.

The target opening of the ocean commercial Dungeness crab season in Oregon is Dec. 1 but can be delayed, ensuring a high-quality product to consumers and avoid wastage of the resource. Crab quality testing in early November showed that none of the test areas met the meat yield criteria for a Dec. 1 opening. The delayed opening will allow crabs to fill with more meat.

A second round of crab quality testing will occur in late November or early December, and the results will be used to determine if the season should open Dec. 16, be further delayed, or be split into areas with different opening dates.

Crab were also tested for domoic acid along the entire coast, and all samples were found to be safe for human consumption. However, due to elevated levels of domoic acid detected in razor clams in some areas, testing in Dungeness crab will continue regularly south of Heceta Head.

In conjunction with the delayed ocean commercial season, commercial harvest of Dungeness crab in Oregon bays that are currently open will close at 12:01 a.m. Dec. 1 but may reopen if the ocean commercial fishery opens in December.

Recreational harvest of Dungeness crab in the ocean off Oregon will open Dec. 1 as scheduled in all areas. Recreational crab harvesting is currently open coastwide in bays and estuaries, and on beaches, docks, piers, and jetties. Recreational crabbers should always call the Shellfish Hotline (800-448-2474) or visit ODA's Recreational Shellfish page for closures before crabbing.

# Bay City crash injures two

Police said two people were hurt in a crash on U.S. 101 in Bay City Friday night, Nov. 15.

According to Oregon State Police, at around 5:30 p.m. a black 2006 Subaru Baja was traveling northbound on the highway near McCoy Avenue when the driver tried to turn around at the intersection. The Subaru was hit a 2014 Nissan SUV traveling southbound.

The Subaru came to an uncontrolled stop in the northbound lane. The Nissan came to a controlled stop in the southbound lane. Both vehicles were damaged in the crash.

The Subaru driver, identified by police as 36-year-old Melissa McCarty of Rockway Beach, was cited for careless driving. OSP said McCarty complained of rib pain and was taken by ambulance to Tillamook Regional Medical Center to be evaluated.

The Nissan driver, a 41-year-old Bay City woman, was also reportedly injured in the crash, but no details were provided regarding the extent of the injury.

Burdens Towing and South County Towing cleared the crash scene.

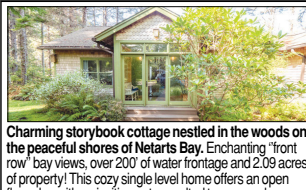

## Coastal Oregonians support protecting forest waters

We live at the Oregon coast and have been directly affected by the influence of money in Oregon politics. For 25 years, the Oregon Legislature has failed to significantly update protections from clearcutting for rivers and streams, or to protect us and water from aerial spraying of toxic pesticides. Out of frustration, we have joined with people from across Oregon to advance protections for forest waters. Recently, The Oregonian/OregonLive's Rob Davis wrote an article on Secretary of State Bev Clarno's rejection of ballot initiatives seeking greater protections for forest waters. The initiatives sought to put an important question before voters: Should Oregon update its protections for rivers and streams and require larger buffers for aerial spraying of toxic chemicals? Clarno's denial appears to be another example of corporate influence hurting rural Oregonians. And considering the donations that she and her deputy have taken in the past, it also seems to be another example of the overreach of corporate influence in Oregon as Davis revealed earlier this year in the series "Polluted by Money."

For too long, we have watched Wall Street and closely-held corporations clearcut near Oswald West State Park, Cannon Beach, Yachats, Rockaway Beach, Arch Cape and other communities. Experts from Oregon State University have found that short-rotation clearcutting reduces water supplies by half. We have witnessed streams running dry in the summer months. While we all use wood products, we cannot make more water. According to state figures, timber is around

2% of Oregon's gross domestic product and less than 2% of jobs. Welcoming visitors to our communities and providing water for them and local residents is worth more. We also know how hard people work and that every job in our rural economy matters. We feel that things are out of balance, and that Oregonians from diverse backgrounds will agree.

The fact is that investment firms and Wall Street corporations control huge amounts of land in northwest Oregon. One Wall Street corporation now owns about 40% of the land in Clatsop County. Another closely-held company controls over half a million acres of forestland. Some of these large corporations are multi-nationals. These companies flood our Legislature with money and resist even modest updates to protect the public's water supplies that flow from Oregon's forests.

Secretary of State Clarno demonstrated she is ill-informed when she confused the Oregon Board of Forestry, charged with protecting the greatest permanent value for all Oregonians, with the Oregon Forest & Industries Council, a timber lobbying group that works to protect its ability to clearcut across streams, spray toxic chemicals, and denude steep slopes. While we agree the timber industry should have a voice in decisions affecting its industry, we do not agree that they should get to set all the rules in their favor.

Those of us on the coast are being adversely affected, and we're not going to take it anymore. In Rockaway Beach, we watched as more than 80% of the forestland from which our water flows was clearcut. Cannon Beach, Yachats, Newport, Arch Cape, Wheeler, and other communities have watched in alarm as their forested water-

sheds have been clearcut and sprayed with toxic chemicals. Slopes designated by the state as having a high risk of landslides have been clearcut, endangering communities and the waters which sustain them. Our group, North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection, reflects our common goal to ensure the air we breathe and the water we drink are safe. 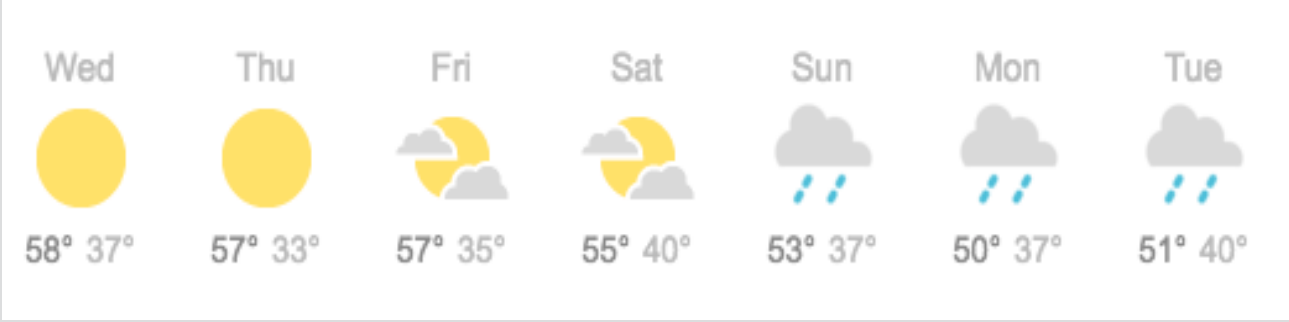
Idaho, Washington, and California have better protections for forest waters than "green" Oregon. The companies which are deforesting Oregon are able to profitably comply with these better protections in other states. Why not in Oregon? The proposed initiative is consistent with Oregon values. It would protect our forests and the waters that flow from them. It would live up to our reputation.

We have been talking to Oregonians of all stripes who tell us they will support increased protections for forest waters, because they know the value of clean and abundant water. They know we cannot afford to spend millions of dollars to treat dirty water caused by clearcutting on steep slopes and by streams. Clarno asserts that the initiative is confusing, but the voters we spoke with understood that it would protect forests and the water they provide.

We think that, given the chance, voters in Tillamook County and many other rural counties will vote for protecting forests and the water they provide. We are for logging, and we are for doing better — for our drinking water, the fish and our communities.

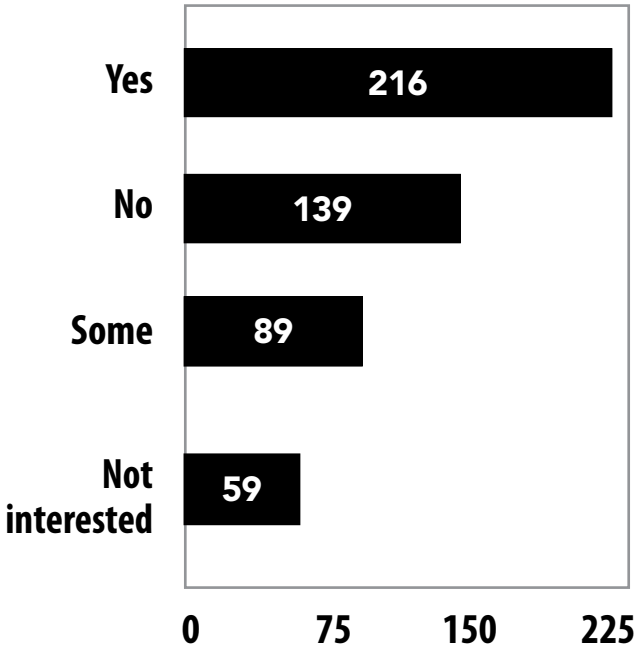

## Banquet recognizes four standouts in tourism efforts

Each autumn at our yearly tourism banquet, Visit Tillamook Coast recognizes the great work that businesses, nonprofits and individuals are doing to bring economic vitality to Tillamook County. The 2019 award winners, like the award winners before them, bring passion, creativity, skills, long hours and financial investment to their work. Here are their stories:

The Tourism Development Award was given to North County Recreation District (NCRD) for its community contributions and the work done over the last three years to establish north Tillamook County as a destination for high-quality musical performances. NCRD's performing arts center in Nehalem has presented world-renowned artists, Grammy award-winning performers, and musical genres ranging from rock and blues to opera and folk. The three-day Winterfest draws visitors from the Portland and Seattle areas, which brings additional off-season business to restaurants, lodging and stores. If you want to hear and see great

performances, go to Winterfest 2020 in early March.

The Tourism Excellence Award was given to Garibaldi-based Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad for its commitment to cultural heritage and the completion of a 14-year project to restore an abandoned locomotive, the "Skookum." Chief engineer Scott Wickert led a group of dedicated and skilled volunteers who transformed the locomotive from a pile of rusted parts to a beautiful, restored piece of railroad history. Hundreds of people came for several days from all over the world to see Skookum run again, and it was thrilling.

Twins Ranch Covered Wagon Campground near Idaville was given the Tourism Hospitality Award. This unique campground has hosted visitors from more than 20 countries and nearly all 50 states. Larry and Cindy Oswald have created a destination like no other in Oregon, and built the covered wagons themselves. They are having a lot of fun with this campground and returning campers are proof of it.

A new award was created this year to honor an exceptional cultural heritage effort. The Garibaldi Cultural Heritage Initiative was formed to help protect and restore the U.S. Coast Guard station — Pier's End Boathouse. The boathouse is developing as an art, interpretive and community center. It is also the most photographed building on the Oregon Coast. Saving this treasure is important to our local culture.

Of course, there are dozens of examples of great work being done in the county, so many that it was difficult to narrow it down to just four winners. I think of the chefs who choose locally sourced products and create delicious meals. The farmers, fishers and ranchers who tend the land, waters and livestock. The lodging owners who welcome guests every night of the week. Oyster shuckers, cheesemakers, retailers, brewers, winemakers, grocery checkers, bartenders and servers, plumbers, electricians, gas station attendants, and more — they all contribute to tourism's economic vitality.

Tourism is an exciting and growing industry, one of the many industries currently thriving in our county. I'm honored to be a part of it and able to recognize those doing such great work.

## It takes a village

There is a popular proverb that states: "It Takes a Village to Raise a Child". I would take that proverb a step further and say it takes a village to develop a successful community. We certainly have that here in Tillamook County. One of the things that attracted me to Tillamook three years ago was the way our residents work together and help each other to solve problems and improve our way of life.

TBCC aspires to be an integral part of this process every day. We have found that we can help more students be successful by partnering with many different organizations and people throughout Tillamook County, and because of this, we have grown some great partnerships.

This fall, working with close to a dozen healthcare partners throughout the county, TBCC developed a new Healthcare Pathway for students who wish to pursue careers in many different areas of the healthcare industry. The first program to be offered at TBCC will be Medical Assisting, which will start in the spring of 2020.

We are also now partnering with Oregon Coast Community College (OCCC) in Lincoln County to offer nursing courses to a Tillamook cohort of up to eight students each year. The best thing about this partnership is that the OCCC classes are live-streamed to TBCC so students do not have to travel to Newport for the classroom instruction. We also have our continued partnership with Adventist Health Tillamook, which offers the required clinical experiences and labs at the hospital for the students. They also graciously contribute to funding of the program through OCCC.

We have long-standing partnerships with Tillamook YMCA and the North County Recreation District (NCRD) in Nehalem which both offer many TBCC community education classes. These organizations gain funding from the fees for the classes, the college gets credit for the enrollments, and most importantly, our community members gain beneficial knowledge and experience outside of their day-to-day activities.

We continue to strengthen our partnerships with the other educational institutions in the county. We offer college classes in all three school districts through our dual credit program, and we articulate many courses from the high schools to different programs at TBCC. The college, along with OSU Extension, are co-owners of our Partners in Rural Innovation (PRI) Building across the street from our main campus. We

share a faculty member with OSU who coordinates the Forestry, Agriculture, and Natural Resources programs for TBCC, and she works to ensure TBCC students can transfer seamlessly to OSU, or any other Oregon university.

New community partnerships are in the works as well. We are exploring ways we can work together with the wonderful County Library system to offer unique learning opportunities to people throughout Tillamook County. These will be planned and offered over the coming year.

These partnerships just touch the surface of the organizations and people we work closely with to ensure we have a strong community college in Tillamook County. It truly does take a village to be a successful community and we have a very special village here in Tillamook.

### William Earl Smith

William Earl (Pastor Bill) Smith died peacefully at the age of 84 early Thursday morning, Nov. 14, 2019, following a heart attack at home. Bill was born third of five children, in Fort Peck, Montana on April 1, 1935 to Earl Lee and Helen Gladys (Schafer) Smith. Bill and Sue have lived in Tillamook since January 1987. After retirement he has been a licensed general contractor for many church related projects; most recently, the Seaside Adventist Church. Bill's formative years were spent in Spokane Valley and Alaska, first in a floating logging camp then in Ketchikan, as the son of a carpenter, instilling in him the lifelong passion of carpentry. Bill has built over 35 churches and schools during his 18 years of mission service in Malaya, Borneo, and Papua, Indonesia, as well as churches and schools in Colorado and Oregon. His love of flying began in college, and led to many years and many thousands of hours as a mission pilot and instructor. He graduated high school in 1953 from Upper Columbia Academy, and graduated Walla Walla College in 1957 with a BA in Religion. Then received his



Master's degree in Systematic Theology from Potomac University in Tacoma Park, Maryland in 1958 and his Master of Divinity degree from Andrews University in 1984

Bill met the love of his life, (Oleta) Sue McDaniel in Ketchikan, and they married in Bozeman, Montana in 1956. As overseas missionaries, Bill and his family served in Malacca, Penang, Sabah, Malaysia; and Papua, and Balikpapan, Indonesia. Bill was the first Adventist mission pilot, and subsequently developed and directed the Adventist Aviation Center for the Adventist Church worldwide. Bill retired from official church ministry in

1997 as pastor of Tillamook Adventist Church. He was an avid outdoorsman, and loved camping, canoeing, and hiking.

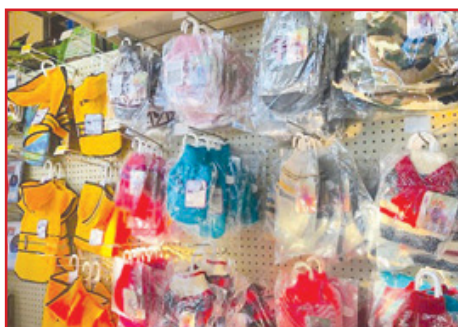

# School bus driver cited after crash

A school bus carrying 38 students was involved in a crash with another vehicle near Bethel Baptist Church in the Tillamook area Monday morning, Nov. 18.

Tillamook School District officials confirmed that the Route Seven school bus was involved in a crash as the bus was headed south near milepost 68 on U.S. 101 toward South Prairie Elementary School. The students were put on other buses and resumed travel. There were reports of some minor injuries at the scene, but no students required medical transportation.

Oregon State Police (OSP) said the school bus was following behind a red 2007 Ford Expedition driven by a 32-year-old Tillamook woman. The Ford driver was slowing down for a stopped vehicle ahead that did not have brake lights when the school bus rear-ended the Ford.

A witness who was behind the school bus told police its was traveling in traffic around two car lengths behind the Ford at around 45 mph. OSP said the bus driver did not brake until just before making impact. Both vehicles were damaged but neither driver was reported as injured.

The bus driver, who was identified by police as 60-year-old Donna Merida Garcia of Tillamook, was cited for careless driving.

School district officials said the careless driving citation was considered a personnel matter and declined to comment further — but noted that the driver has worked for Tillamook School District for more than 20 years and has served the district well.

# Civil Air Patrol open house Nov. 21


Did you know Civil Air Patrol (CAP) has a local squadron?

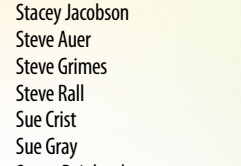

## Mooks drop heartbreaker to The Dalles in 4A quarterfinals

The Mooks ended their best football season since 1997 in a barn-burner playoff match against The Dalles Riverhawks on a sunny and warm Saturday in The Dalles in front of a huge crowd. This high-scoring match fueled by a ton of offense on both sides of the ball saw the Cheesemakers coming up short in the 58-51 loss to the Riverhawks in the semi-final matchup in the 4A state playoffs.

The Dalles opened the game with the first score, using just three plays from scrimmage to strike first. Tillamook immediately answered back with a nice drive using eight plays and just four minutes off the clock. The drive ended when Quintin Metcalfe busted through the line on first and goal from the Riverhawk three yardline. The PAT was blocked and the Cheesemakers were down early 7-6.

Another touchdown off a turnover had the Cheesemakers up 13-7 in the first quarter when Messiah Tuirolemotu punched it in on second down

and goal from the three yard line.

On The Dalles next possession, they used 13 plays to go 70 yards and took the lead 14-13.

Tillamook took over on their own 43-yard line looking to keep the offensive momentum going, but Werner threw a pic deep in Riverhawk territory with 8:09 left in the half.

The Dalles used 12 plays to go the distance and with 4:30 left in the first half The Dalles let 21-13.

With little time left in the second quarter, Tillamook looked to put one more score on the board before the half-

time break. Werner connected with Sam Connelly who stepped out of bounds for the first down.

Werner then connected with Kellen Shelley who ran it up the middle then took it to the sidelines and headed to the house. Shelley was stopped short on the two yard line with a little over two minutes left in the half. The Cheesemakers brought it in from the two and the PAT was good. With 2:17 left in the half the Cheesemakers down 21-20.

Tillamook kicked off and

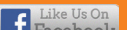

derelict fishing gear.

"These microfilaments can be shed from clothing, up to 700,000 per load of laundry," Baechler said. "Those particles then travel out through greywater into wastewater and to the coast."

Microplastics were found in both Pacific oysters and razor clams collected from all 15 sample sites along the Oregon Coast during spring and summer 2017. Microplastics were found in all but two of the roughly 300 organisms sampled.

The team also found that spring oysters contained more microplastics than the oysters sampled from the summer. Baechler said seasonal precipitation and the type of clothing typically worn in the spring compared to summer may have been factors.

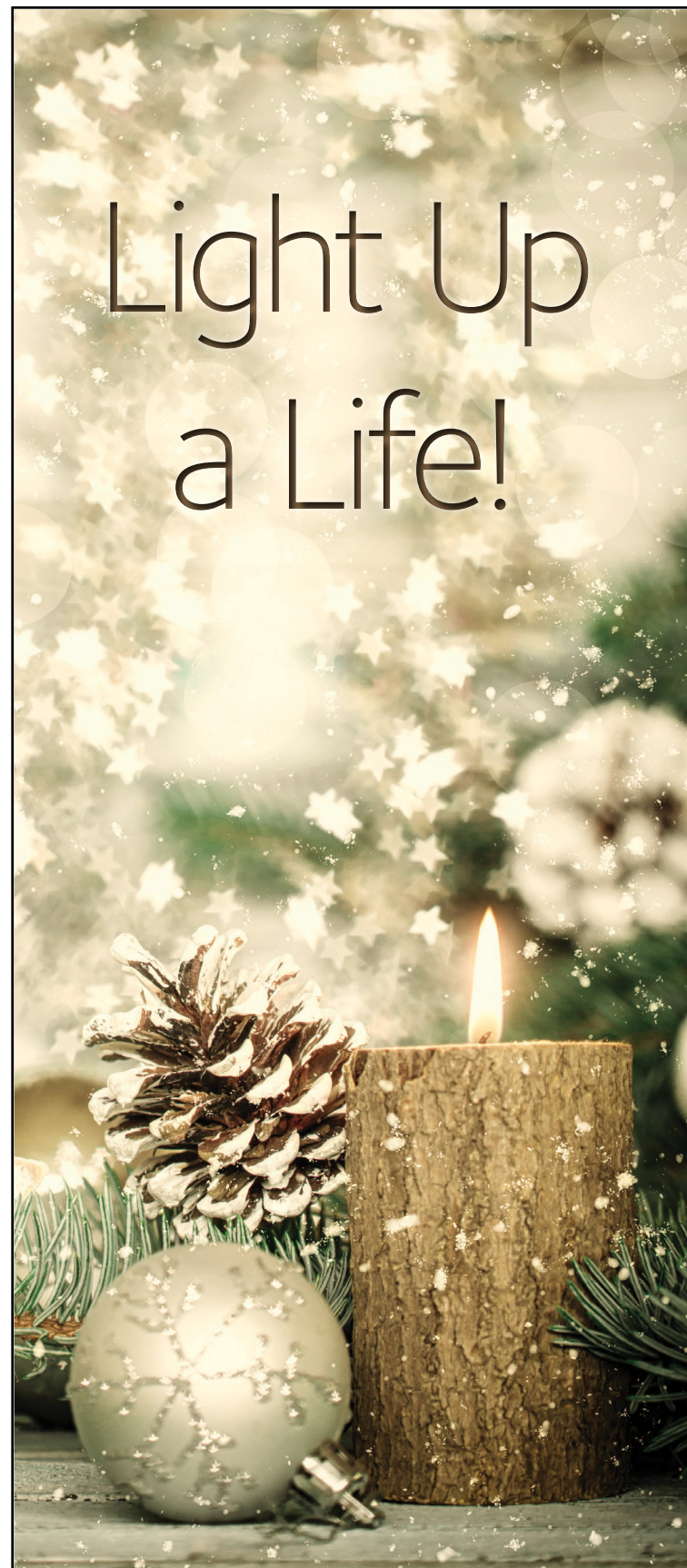
"Whether it was a fairly urban site or a rural site, estuary or open-coast beach, both species had microplastics," Granek said. "Although we think of the Oregon coast as a much more pristine coastline compared to California, Puget Sound or the Eastern Seaboard, when we are talking about microplastics, we're still seeing that human footprint on even our more pristine coastline."

Granek said that because fishing gear can be a source of microfibers, fisheries and oyster growers are often blamed for the problem of microplastics in seafood — but there is no scientific consensus that this is the case.

"It's not because people aren't managing our fisheries well or are being unclean in their practices," she said. "We're all using plastics on a daily basis. We are all the source of contamination in our seafood. And microplastics are not just in our seafood. We know that they are in our beer, in our salt, in our drinking water."

Baechler and Granek said more research still needs to be done to determine what effect the microplastics have on the organisms themselves and the humans who consume them. Studies have shown that microplastics can have negative physiological impacts such as reproductive and growth impairments on oysters and clams.

"If reproduction or growth is impaired, that could really affect not just individual clams or oysters, but possibly local populations of these organisms as well," Baechler said.

## GARDENING MATTERS

### Annual gift guide - part one

Although Thanksgiving seems late this year, it seems like most retailers are offering Black Friday deals in advance of the “real” Black Friday. Which means its not too early to be thinking about the gardeners on your Christmas list. When I am asked by family what I would like for Christmas, I can never come up with any real ideas. That is, until I start researching for my annual Gift Guide column. Then I always find fun and helpful things to put on my list. Here are a few I found this year.

First, I start with the Gardeners’ Supply catalog. If you don’t get one already, you can visit their website at [www.gardeners.com](http://www.gardeners.com) and request one. Or you can simply shop from that site. The Sunflower Butterfly Puddler is something that caught my eye this year. This is a shallow ceramic dish with a sunflower design that you fill with sand, a pinch of salt and enough water to make a puddle. This will draw lots of butterflies who will stop by to replenish minerals to their systems. At about \$22 plus shipping, this is a good gift for almost every gardener or butterfly watcher. And while we are helping butterflies, Gardeners’ Supply also has a pair of acorn-shaped birdfeeders with a copper patina that will each hold a cup of large seeds. This would qualify as yard art too, because it is so pretty. This one runs \$27.

A new gift idea is the “Mod Hod” – a Gardeners’ Supply exclusive – that are stackable totes in two sizes that can serve as a tote to gather and rinse veggies from the garden, all in the same container. They have nice sturdy handles and their legs can lay flat for storage or extend to stack or drain.

There are two sizes of these clever hods: 9.5-inches long or 17-inches long, and they come in grey/blue, grey/purple or grey/turquoise. Small ones are \$25 each or three or more for \$20 each. The larger size is \$30 each or three or more for \$25 each.

And for that special gardener, why not get a stunning amaryllis in beautiful

ful bronze or glass cachepots? There are six different varieties of flowers and each will bloom in six-twelve weeks. At \$50 each, this would be a lovely and long-lasting reminder of your kindness. Quantities are limited, though, so don’t wait to order.

Another catalog I enjoy is the one that comes from Kinsman Company. They used to have a store front on Third Street in Tillamook but they are now only on-line ([www.kinsmangarden.com](http://www.kinsmangarden.com)) or catalog sales unless you live in eastern Pennsylvania. New this year are handblown glass suncatcher/windchimes in the shape of jelly fish. Because they are glass, they need to be protected from really high winds and frost, but they would be lovely inside or outside in a protected area. The medium green one is 11-inches long and 5.5-inches wide and sells for \$40. The small blue one is 10-inches long by 3.5-inches wide and costs \$33. They are rather heavy so will need a strong breeze to chime.

Also from Kinsman are small (6-inches wide x 2.5-inches tall) ceramic Posey Pots that are perfect for small flower arrangements. There is a large hole in the center to use to fill with water or larger stems, and 12 smaller holes for smaller flower stems. At only \$20 each, this would make a great hostess gift or stocking stuffer for a special gardener.

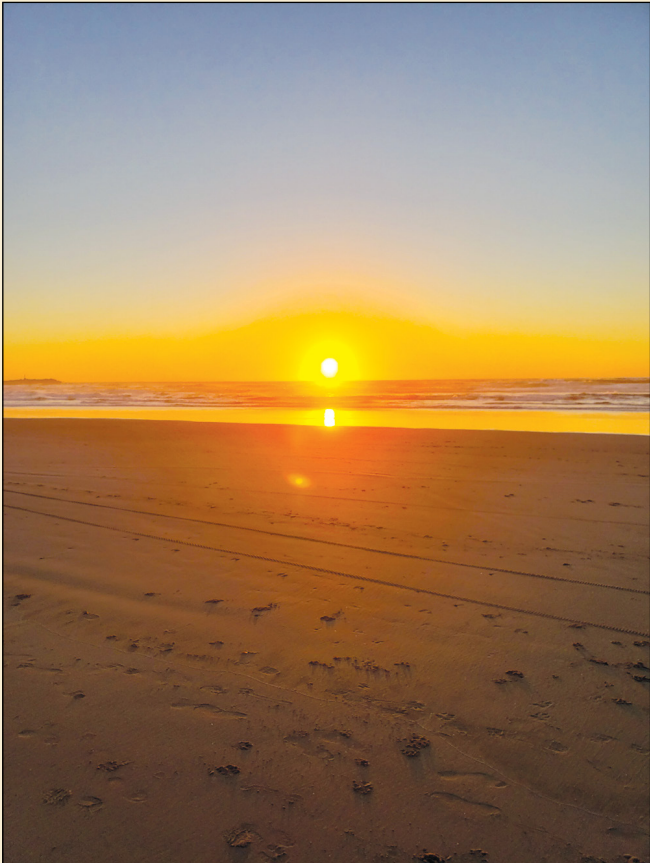


For the gardener who has everything, how about a Flower Press? A larger one (9 inches x 12 inches for \$35) or small one (7 inches x 7 inches for \$23) comes with blotter pages and either Velcro straps or nuts and bolts to tighten them. They also have a leaf and flower press for children that is 5 inches x 7 inches and runs \$18 each. This would be a great project for the budding young gardener in the family. (Pun intended!) Pressed leaves and flowers can then be used in wonderful and creative art projects. Kinsman also sells refill papers at 20 sheets for less than \$6.

Kinsman also carries lovely pots, hanging baskets of steel wires, trellises of all sizes and many types of specialty tools. There is something for everyone in this catalog and something for every budget as well.

There is, of course, a drawback from ordering online and that is paying for shipping and handling. Sometimes I find the shipping costs can be almost as much or more than the item ordered. So be sure to factor that in when you are ordering. If you have more time than money, it might be better to see if you can find some of these items locally. Not all of them will be available of course, but you might find an alternative your gardener would prefer.

The Center will officially return to full operations at 2 p.m on Saturday, Jan. 4, with a celebration marking completion of the improvements and the opening of the January “Green Piece” art show in the Hoffman Gallery.

AR Northwest LLC contractors of Tillamook will do the restroom project. The company installed the kitchenette project in the Center’s main room last March.

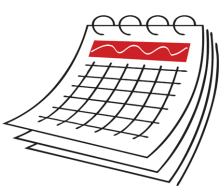

When times were tough, the family was still able to eat by gathering clams, catching fish and crab, and shooting ducks. Early on, before Bayocean

Road was built, people living on Bayocean Spit had to get to Tillamook by boat.

Now Claudia and one younger sister are the only ones living out of those dozen children. Although widowed a few years back, Claudia is still energetic and full of life, as attested to by her large collection of beautifully sewn items for sale at the bazaar. Thank you for letting me share this bit of history in the Fencepost column, Claudia Harrison.

Thanksgiving is fast upon us, and two individuals in our community are especially thankful. Both

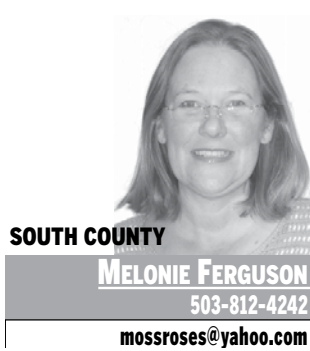


