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Junior Livestock Auction goes virtual

Organizers hope for good turnout at modified sale

This year's Junior Livestock Auction (JLAC) will be a virtual presentation due to the novel coronavirus and the state's restrictions for Tillamook County dealing with COVID-19 regulations in terms of gatherings.

According to Mike Trout, president of the JLAC committee. even though the fair will be different this year, he hopes the

community will support the sale for the kids as in the past.

Just logon to: tillamookjlac. fairwire.com to register as a buyer. At the site, after you are registered, you can look over entries, review orders, confirm orders and pay for them.

This year's auction will see swine, goats, sheep, beef, rabbits, chickens and turkeys. "These kids work so hard we wanted to be able to host the auction for them this year," said Mike Trout president of the local JLAC said. "For many of these kids, it is their college money."

Like a live auction, this auction will move quickly starting with the Grand Champion animals, Reserve Champion next and so on. Sales according to Trout will be about every 10 minutes. You can view all sale information on

the site after you are registered.

Work to accommodate a sale of this magnitude and importance has been planned since the virus broke out. "I talked to the committee first thing I said, we will hold an auction some how," Trout said. "So we had the kids move forward with their projects, we're providing a place to market their

> animals, like we do every year."


A lot of hard work goes into these auctions. Trout says 110 kids are entered

this year showing animals. "Tuesday all animals will be weighed in, they have to make weight," Trout said. "The kids work so hard on these projects, we really get good participation from the kids and the buyers."

NOAA AWARDS THE SALMON **SUPERHWY \$1.24 MILLION**

On the heels of six years of proven success, the Salmon Super-Hwy has received the second year of funding of a \$1.24 million total award from NOAA's Communitybased Restoration Program. The funds will allow the project to continue with momentum through

Launched in 2014, the Salmon

SuperHwy (SSH) project replaces old and failing culverts that pose a migration barrier to threatened salmonid populations. To date, more than 80 miles of critical spawning habitat for chinook, coho and chum salmon, steelhead, cutthroat trout and lamprey in the Tillamook Bay and Nestucca River watersheds have been reconnected. SSH has also been praised for increasing public safety by reducing the possibility of road washouts and

'Often, the effects of barrier removal are immediate," said Dave Harris of the Tillamook Estuaries Partnership. "We observed salmon spawning in Mapes Creek upstream of the former barrier culvert just weeks after the habitat was reconnected.'

The key to the Salmon SuperHwy's success is strategy and collaboration. "Working as a team, we're able to maximize efficiency and accomplish more," said Sarah Zwissler with Trout Unlimited who serves as the SSH Coordinator, "Each partner brings skills and resources to the table, and together

we're making a difference for fish

and our communities." The benefits of SSH don't end at restoring fish passage and improving infrastructure, it also boosts the local economy. A University of Oregon study shows roughly 80% of restoration project dollars stays in-county, with 90% remaining in-state.

The Salmon SuperHwy is a collaborative partnership of federal, state, and local agencies and organizations, and private stakeholders, working together to reconnect aquatic habitat in the Tillamook, Nestucca, and Sand Lake watersheds. Based on inventories of undersized and failing culverts that were barriers to fish, the partnership developed a strategic, scaled approach to reconnect migrating salmon with critical spawning and rearing habitat that will maximize benefits and minimize costs. At its completion, the Salmon SuperHwy will reconnect salmonid populations with more than 180 miles of previously blocked spawning habitat across six major watersheds.

Gov. Brown releases school health metrics

ov. Kate Brown released Tuesday, July 28, new metrics to Uguide school district decisions about when it is safe to resume in-person instruction, and when a transition to comprehensive distance learning is necessary.

Brown said closing schools in the spring was one of the most difficult decisions she made during the pandemic. She uses science and data as her guide. There is clear evidence that students receiving education in the classroom is better for students.

"It fosters our students' social and mental wellbeing, their overall health and often their physical safety," Brown said. "I know that most parents agree."

This is a highly contagious virus, Brown said. American Academy of Pediatrics is clear that only with safeguards in place and low cases, can schools open for in-person instruction.

"The plan each public district adopts for the coming school year is, and remains, a local decision," Brown said. "And yet, in the time since then, the virus has continued to spread and we must follow clear public health metrics to know when and where it is safe for school to convene inside school buildings."

These requirements will give schools and communities the opportunity to make sound decisions, Brown added. Studies show younger students, kids under 10, have lower rates of illness than older children and adults.

"Overall, these requirements align with recommendations from both public health experts and educators," Brown said.

Doctor Dean Sidelinger of Oregon Health Authority said some places have reopened schools safely, such as in Denmark and Germany. There is no simple statewide answer for Oregon. School district may offer limited onsite learning for students with disabili-

"Oregon public health officials have developed transparent evidence-based metrics to help school boards and school districts make local decisions based on local conditions to determine how they can safely reopen school to in-person instruction," Sidelinger

The metrics for in-person instruction or hybrid instruction model for all grade levels states the statewide test positivity rate needs to be at or below 5 percent over seven days for three weeks in a row. In the county, there needs to be 10 or fewer cases per 100,000 people over seven days and a 5 percent or less test positivity rate. There needs to be a trend of three weeks of decreasing cases.

"Schools will provide in-person education for students in Kindergarten through third grade," Sidelinger said. "It's expected that these in-class options will be offered to the extent possible under the reopening plans."

The metrics for K-3 include fewer than 30 cases per 100,000 over seven days and test positivity of 5 percent or less over seven

Sidelinger said younger students get the virus at lower rates. "We know that opening schools to in-person instruction is not a one way journey," Sidelinger said. "If we see increasing cases in the community, it may be time for schools to consider moving back

Facebook leaves behind drilling equipment during cable project

The Oregon Department of State Lands (DSL) announced in late July that Edge Cable Holdings, Inc., a subcontractor for Facebook, has notified them of drilling equipment that was left behind during the undersea fiber optic cable project near Tierra Del Mar. Edge Cable had been working on laying the undersea cable with a landing at a residential lot in Tierra Del

Project representatives informed DSL that on April 28, the drill pipe snapped. The pipe was being replaced at a depth that ranged from 40-69 feet. Approximately 1,100 feet of drill pipe, a drill tip, two tools for drill steering and tracking, and approximately 6,500 gallons of drilling fluid were abandoned in the

DSL said Edge Cable Holdings, Inc. did not notify them of the abandoned equipment until June 17. This delay in notifying DSL eliminated any potential

options for recovery of the equipment.

"The accident represents negligence on behalf of the operator, as the equipment was pushed beyond its limits, putting lives and Oregon's natural resources at risk," Oregon Coast Alliance (ORCA) Executive Director Cameron La Follette and Charlie Plybon from the Surfrider Foundation wrote in a letter to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department



Tillamook County at 30 confirmed COVID-19 cases

Leadership discusses PPE supply, COVID-19 cases

Tillamook County Leadership discussed at a community meeting Friday, July 31, personal protective equipment supply (PPE), COVID-19 cases and other updates related to the pandemic.

As of Monday, Aug. 3, the county has 30 cases. Four cases came over the weekend, which Gordon McCraw, incident command, said was within a family. Two more cases were reported

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said Adventist Health is seeing about 48 patients per day across its urgent care facilities. Across Oregon, there are 150 patients hospitalized with COVID-19.

"PPE for our hospital, in particular, is more than adequate to continue caring for our patients," Swanson said.

Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administrator Marlene Putman said the county had been steady at 24 cases on July 29. Testing continues to

be those who are symptomatic. There is not a huge supply of tests for everyone to be tested.

On July 29, there were zero active cases in the county, Putman said.

We're encouraging people to stay on top of their preventative care," Putman said. "Please go ahead and schedule appointments if you feel comfortable doing

Putman said the center is scheduling dental appointments for a new dental clinic that is opening in the next couple of

Rinehart Clinic is scheduled to receive an Abbott machine. which tests for COVID-19 at a rapid rate, in September.

The Tillamook Family Counseling Center is offering a free weekly support group for those who have been impacted by the pandemic. The support group is being co-led by two licensed behavioral health clinicians. The support group takes place on Thursdays from 1-2 p.m.

Taskforce presents details regarding child care in Tillamook County

An Early Child Care and Education Tillamook County Taskforce presented and provided recommendations concerning child care in Tillamook County in a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, July 29.

North Coast Region Coordinator Jennifer Purcell said Tillamook County is a child care desert, which is a county with more than three children for each regulated child care spot. Counties across the state have been identified as child care deserts.

"In August 2019, Commissioner Baertlein and I convened the first group of individuals to explore the issue in Tillamook County," Purcell said.

Commissioner Bill Baertlein took on this work as a priority for Tillamook County. A lack of child care creates stress for communities. Purcell said the task force had a vision of increased access to quality child care.

"This was really a significant body of work," Purcell said. "The group was incredibly thoughtful and collaborative."

Emily Fanjoy, who cochaired the task force with Megan Dean McKenna,

said the task force's recommendation is for the board of commissioners to form a permanent commission for early child care. They compared six regional programs with three local programs in Tillamook County.

"We picked these programs because they were similar to the county of Tillamook," McKenna said. "We picked programs from Astoria, Bandon, Boardman, St. Helens, and others, and compared those to programs in Tillamook County."

In reviewing these programs, they found that those with multi-sector investments had higher salaries and offered com-

The task force distributed a survey in the beginning of March. The leading question asked how limited access to child care impacts employers in Tillamook County. 93 people responded to the survey. The survey found that 75

(OPRD). "Failure to notify the agency, and abandonment of equipment now apparently unrecoverable on and below the ocean floor, is not only a violation of Edge Cable's permit, but represents a continuing and permanent trespass of public lands."

The letter was also sent to DSL, Rep. David Gomberg, Sen. Arnie Roblan and Jason Miner from the

governor's office. The two organizations asked in the letter for OPRD to withdraw Edge Cable's state permits and easement.

Edge Cable hopes to continue the project in January 2021.

"Submarine cable projects must be held accountable, and be managed with strong policy tools that protect our natural resources and ocean habitats," the letter from ORCA and Surfrider read.

DSL is evaluating options for corrective action, as well as the viability of

Initial assessment determined there to be no immediate environmental, health or safety impacts due to the presence of the equipment. They are continuing to assess potential impacts.

The Land Use Board of Appeals is set to issue a final opinion and order in the appeal of ORCA v. Tillamook County on Friday, Aug. 14.

- Fewer than 30 cases per 100,000 over 7 days
- Test positivity of 5% or less over 7 days
- COVID-19 is not actively spreading in the school community
- School districts are in compliance with sections 1-3 of Ready Schools, Safe Learners Guidance

Transition Planning for Comprehensive Distance Learning

For school districts where in-person instruction is occurring during the school year, planning for a switch to comprehensive distance learning should take place, including training for staff and notification of the community, if one or

both conditions are met: • 20 cases or greater per 100.000 over 7 days

• Test positivity of 7.5% or greater over 7 days

Comprehensive Distance Learning All school districts must


implement comprehensive distance learning if the following conditions are met: • 30 or more cases per

100,000 over 7 days • Test positivity of 10% or greater over 7 days

Based on these metrics, many, if not most, school districts will begin school in the fall by focusing on online distance learning or will have a hybrid model that combines distance learning and in-person instruction.

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

To your remaining batter add ¾ cup of oil, 1-1/2 tsp cinnamon, 3 eggs, 1 cup brown sugar, 1-1/2 cups flour, 1-1/2 tsp baking soda, 1-1/2 tsp salt, 2 tsp vanilla; mix well and fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake at 350o for 20 minutes. You can experiment with adding your own ingredients, such as grapenuts cereal, nuts and raisins, or extra spices like nutmeg, for more of a spiced muffin. Makes approximately 22 muffins. If you need clarification about this recipe, call or email me.

Response to Guest Column by Jacob Hilger

This letter is in response to the Guest Column by Jacob Hilger, Coast Reforestation Manager, Stimson Lumber Company. He cites the Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI) as evidence that Stimson is doing a good job in maintaining coastal forests into the future.

However, SFI is 80 percent funded by the industry (a bit like a Chamber of Commerce for industrial forest operators). Also, ODF regulation enforcement of Oregon's forest practices act is funded by the harvest

tax, most of which flows thru ODF and back to the industry's PR arm, the Oregon Forest Resource Institute (see oregonforests.org for its funding mechanism, governance,

etc.).
Truly independent,
third party verification of
sustainable forest practices is only available via
the international Forest
Stewardship Council,
which has as one of its

principles,
• PRINCIPLE #4:
COMMUNITY RELATIONS AND WORKER'S RIGHTS - Forest
management operations
shall maintain or enhance
the long-term social and
economic well being of
forest workers and local

communities.

This is an area of concern for people involved with North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection.

Here is the FSC info re pesticide use:

"A pesticide is any substance, or mixture of substances of chemical or biological ingredients which aims to repel, destroy or control any pest, or regulate plant growth.

If a pesticide is toxic, it can impact the soil, water, atmosphere, and landscape of a forest. In addition, toxic pesticides can also have an impact on the health of workers, local communities as well as food and water.

What does the Pesticide Policy aim to achieve? In the short-term, FSC aims to:

- Eliminate the use of the most hazardous chemical pesticides;
- Promote best practices to minimize associated risks to human health and the environment when using chemical pesticides; and
- Reduce the overall volume and number of chemical pesticides in use.

In the long-term, FSC aims to eliminate the use

of chemical pesticides in FSC-certified forests."

There is a massive liquidation going on in our coastal forest by Stimson, Weyerhaeuser and Greenwoods. This is not sustainable and bad for fish and our drinking water sources. If Stimson et al. want to convince us they are practicing sustainable stewardship of Coast Range forests, why don't they seek FSC certification?

percent of workers missed 1-5 days of work a month because of child care-related issues. Sixty percent of the people surveyed agreed this limited professional advancement. Seventy-four percent agree that it is difficult to find child care in Tillamook County.

Cost was the number one barrier preventing families from accessing child care. Fifty percent of those surveyed use more than one type of care. This results in

high levels of stress.

McKenna said in the future, they would like to hear from single family nouseholds. The taskforce spent a year on the project.

The recommendation to the commissioners was to establish a Tillamook County Early Child Care and Education Commis-

Commissioner Mary Faith Bell said it is a significant loss to the workforce when parents have to leave it to care for children because of lack of child care. Baertlein said there is some formalized action they will have to take to set up the commission.

The next step will be drafting language for the Tillamook County Early Unite Care and Education Commission. Purcell said as we move into the fall, they may want to look at child care a bit more broadly due to COVID-19. Commissioner David Yamamoto added that they should look at the older child population as well.

"We need to make sure we provide the proper environment for all children," Yamamoto said.

They can be large hoop houses like the one in the Master Gardener's Learning Garden at the County Fairgrounds. Or they can be small enough to tuck into a corner of the yard. They can also be custom designed and built to fit your needs.

I spoke recently to my friend Janet who has recently had a working greenhouse installed in her yard. She was very forthcoming when I asked her all sorts of questions and even made the suggestion that greenhouses would make a good "Gardening Matters" column. I agreed!

Janet is not new to greenhouses as she had one in a previous home. She admits to making a lot of mistakes with that one and really did her research before having a custom



one built at her new home. She not only did research, she visited greenhouses of several friends to see what tips she could use when designing her own.

First and foremost was location. Her old greenhouse had been up a long driveway, much too far from the house and garden. When I asked her if a sunny or shady location made the most sense, she quoted Goldilocks: Not too much sun, not too much shade, "It needs to be just right." Becoming familiar with the sun's path across the sky for an entire year can best help you decide where a greenhouse would be best located. They can be quite an investment so patience and research are a must.

And regardless of how much sun a greenhouse gets, be aware it will get hot inside. Janet turned to some clever English design in an automated venting system. It involves cylinders of bees' wax! When the bees'

wax heats up in the sun, it triggers an automated opening of the vents. As the day cools and the bees' wax cools with it, the vents automatically close. After a few years, the bees' wax may lose its volume but the cylinders are easily replaced. Pretty clever in my book. And it saves Janet from having to visit the greenhouse twice or more in a day to open or close the

Janet also installed a clever system for her shade cloth which needs to be pulled over the ceiling on very sunny and hot days. (See photo) Due to the greenhouse having a tall shed roof, instead of putting it on the outside as most are done, Janet has rigged up a shade cloth with gromets onto two wires, one at the top and one at the bottom of the inside roof levels. Because they are grommeted, they slide easily, like opening a curtain.

An exhaust fan is also a necessity as the warm air will have to be moved out of those vents to keep plants from withering. Janet has her fan on a thermostat which trips the fan when the temperature rises above 85 degrees.

Of course, the winds along the coast will be an issue as well, so the greenhouse should be placed

affected with the summer north winds nor the winter south winds. This may be a harder spot to find than the sun/shade issue. Janet is lucky enough to have hers in a small courtyard which is protected year-round. Not all of us have that luxury, so any greenhouse will have to be well-anchored.

Janet chose a clear, ribbed, hard plastic for her windows instead of glass or plastic sheeting. She does feel that a smokey color might have kept the greenhouse cooler from the sun, but with her vent and fan system, that doesn't seem to be an issue.

Janet also had bespoke benches made for her plants to grow. (I love the word "bespoke" – so very British – and it basically means custom-built.) They are a comfortable size for her to work on and go around three sides of the greenhouse. The fourth side is the entrance and Janet has placed a dwarf Meyer lemon and a dwarf Satsuma orange tree on either side of the door. Janet's greenhouse has a shed-type roof in that it is 12' high at the entrance side and slopes down to a 6' height at the opposite side. Still plenty tall for tomatoes



and peppers to grown.

In fact, since the greenhouse was completed in March, Janet has had great success in growing tomatoes, peppers, and squash and will trying her hand at propagating shrubs this fall and winter when the veggies are done. Janet's greenhouse is not a large one – she kept it small so

it wouldn't need a permit but she sees it as already being one of her favorite spots in her yard.

"I may even move my easel in there this winter and try my hand at painting again," Janet tells me. Sounds like reason enough for us all to have a green-




often since she is off work.

~Salad in a jar~

Layer from there with bite sized yummies like celery, cucumber, nuts, cheese, cherry tomatoes, apple chunks tossed in lemon

Oregonians continue to receive increased food benefits in August

The Oregon Department of Human Services has received approval by the federal Food and Nutrition Service to continue in August to provide increased food benefits and waive the interview requirement for new applicants - making it faster and easier for Oregonians to access benefits.

This will result in an additional \$30 million to eligible Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients in August 2020.

"As the pandemic continues, access to food has worsened greatly," said Self-Sufficiency Programs Deputy Director Claire Seguin. "Providing another month of emergency assistance will help ease the threat of chronic hunger in

Oregon.' SNAP households will automatically receive the additional allotment in the same way they receive their current benefits. For most customers this is an EBT card. The additional benefit amount will be disbursed on the schedule below to all

eligible SNAP households. No additional action is needed from Oregonians already enrolled in SNAP. The increase brings all households to the maximum SNAP benefit. Households that already receive the maximum benefit will not receive any additional benefits.

This allotment will not permanently change a household's monthly benefit amount. It is a temporary supplement to help during the current health crisis. The Department of Human Services will not be sending individual notices to households about the emergency allotments.

In addition, Oregon received approval to continue to waive the requirement to complete an interview for new SNAP applicants. This change will allow the Department of Human Services to process applications faster and better serve those Oregonians hardest hit by the COVID-19 pandemic. Staff will still reach out to new applicants to offer additional resources, explain requirements and answer questions.
