

Tillamook County survives another flood

The combination of high tides and plenty of rainfall on Tuesday and Wednesday caused flooding in Tillamook on HWY 6 heading east out of town and on HWY 101 in the heart of Tillamook.

Emergency crews from the Tillamook Sheriff's office marine division, Tillamook Fire Department and Tillamook Police responded to a person trapped in their car on Hwy 101 in Tillamook who tried to drive through the flooded highway heading north through town early Wednesday morning. The driver made it about 200 yards when their car stalled. Sheriff office marine crews rescued the person without incident. HWY 6 headed east out of Tillamook also flooded under the train viaduct just east of the Adventist Church, drivers were detoured to Third Street for those headed east on HWY 6 out of town. Flooding on 101 in Tillamook was from the bridge over Hoquarton Slough near Rosenberg's Building Supply to the intersection of HWY 101 and Wilson River Loop Road near Fred Meyer.

Aangels Traffic Control on the scene when we need them

Joe Rogers owner of Aangels Traffic Control in Tillamook, says his favorite thing to do is help save lives. Preventing accidents is just one way he accomplishes this. If you've ever traveled the busy highways, state roads or even local streets in Tillamook County, you have probably seen his crews out directing traffic for a multitude of reasons.

He started the local flagging business with a regional reach 13 years ago, but has over 30 years experience in traffic control. He also teaches first aid and CPR classes, is a certified traffic control instructor and is a Oregon OSHA certified

compliance officer to boot.

"I like teaching people how to save lives," he said. "You have a one-third better chance of saving a life if you are certified in first aid and CPR."

He also owns Smoking' Joe's and Sons Beef Bones a new business he started that has also grown to a regional reach.

> Last week, when Tillamook flooded on HWY 6 heading east out of the city, and HWY 101 in the heart of town, his crews were out there directing traffic. He had a crew

working on HWY 101 and another working on Wilson River Loop Road. Both supplying different traffic control duties.

"We use his (Aangels Traffic Control) services, both in our public works department and our police department," said Tillamook Police Chief Terry Wright. "Whenever we need them they are there, with flaggers, equipment, they are very dependable and professional."

Wright said Aangels service is turnkey, when he calls them for traffic control, they show up and know what to do and supply all the necessary equipment.

"We budget money in the police budget for this every year because we don't have the staff in either department to do what they can do for us," Wright said. "He's a great asset to the community, I've never received any complaints, when we call they are there for us."

Tillamook County Health Department provided a COVID-19 and vaccine update during a Tillamook County Leadership meeting Friday, Jan. 15. The health department reports 362 total confirmed and presumptive cases.

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) reports Tillamook County is at 321 positive tests, as of Thursday, Jan. 14. Administrator Marlene Putman said there can be a delay between the numbers the county reports and what OHA's.

"We have over 70 people right now we're monitoring," Putman said. "We've had over the course of this pandemic 15 people hospitalized."

There are 25 new confirmed positive cases this week. Putman said there are no COVID-19 related hospitalizations right now and no new deaths. There have been two deaths in the county to date.

Tillamook County remains in Extreme Risk through Jan. 29.

Tillamook County Community Health Center's website is the best place for the community to stay up to date on COVID-19 vaccine information, Putman added. You can also check out the health center's Facebook page. The website is https://tillamookchc. org/coronavirus/vaccines/

Ed Colson, representative for Tillamook County Community Health Centers, said 564 people in Phase 1A have been vaccinated for COVID-19 so far. Over 72 percent of people surveyed in these groups are accepting the vaccine. The health center also met with the school districts for planning processes for when the vaccines go to them, which is expected to arrive Jan. 23 or later.

Colson said the health department is dedicated not to waste any vaccine doses. Currently, right now the health department is slowed down by the low number of vaccines they are receiving. There is no time frame at this time when people can go to the pharmacy or their doctor to get the vaccine. The health department will let the public no when they can receive the

Elected local officials sworn-in during livestream ceremony

Sheriff-elect Josh Brown joined other winning candidates of Tillamook County's May 2020 primary and November 2020 general elections in being sworn-in to their respective positions Monday, Jan. 4, by Circuit Court Judge, Mari Trevino. Trevino, who won her own reelection bid to the bench in the May 2020 primary election. The proceedings took place in Courtroom 102 following recommended COVID-19 precautions. For some of the participants, it was not a new experience. First to be sworn in was County Assessor Denise Vandecoevering. Vandecoevering has been a county employee for nearly 21 years, and this represents her fourth time being swornin as county assessor. Vandecoevering was appointed assessor in 2011 and was then elected three times.

Next up, was County

Clerk Tassi O'Neil. This represents O'Neil's sixth term as Tillamook County Clerk. However, O'Neil has worked for the county for more than 30 years.

County Commissionerelect Erin Skaar raised her right hand to be sworn in for her first term as County Commissioner, Position No. 1. Skaar achieved a resounding election victory in the county's primary election in May 2020. County

Commissioner David Yamamoto was sworn-in by Trevino for his second term as County Commission Position No. 2 after winning his reelection in the November 2020 general election.

Sheriff-elect Josh Brown was sworn-in as the new duly elected sheriff of Tillamook County. Sheriff Brown swore his oath of office as the 37th sheriff of Tillamook County in the presence of a small



contingent of his immediate family and supporters. Brown has served Tillamook County for more than 15 years as a Deputy Sheriff before being elected as sheriff in the November 2020 Tillamook County general election.

"It was an honor to watch those before me take their oath of office and I am proud to begin my term as the Sheriff for Tillamook County. The Tillamook



County Sheriff's Office has proudly served the citizens of this county for one hundred and sixty-seven years, and it will be my mission to continue and expand that commitment to all of the residents of Tillamook County. I am also excited for our strong positive forward momentum that will benefit the incredible employees we have at the Sheriff's Office, and also the public," Brown added.

Nestucca Valley schools hold off on in-person learning amid Extreme Risk level

Nestucca Valley School District Board of Directors decided during a board meeting Monday, Jan. 11, to

wait to begin the in-person instructional model for schools until staff can be vaccinated for COVID-19 and the county moves out of Extreme Risk. The school district will continue with comprehensive

distance learning until this time.

Gov. Kate Brown on Dec. 23 directed the Oregon Department of Education and the Oregon Health Authority to implement new policy initiatives, with the goal of putting more school districts on track to return students to in-person instruction - especially elementary students by Feb. 15.

Nestucca Valley School District had committed to comprehensive distance

learning through the second quarter. The school district has worked with Tillamook County to develop better internet connectivity for students.

Superintendent Misty Wharton said the board had agreed previously to continue with distance learning until the third quarter. Tillamook County has been in Extreme Risk for over a month, which under the governor's previous metrics for schools, would recommend comprehensive

distance learning.

"Educators have been identified in Phase 1 for the vaccine," Wharton said. "They're Phase 1, Subgroup 5.'


Right now, groups 1-4 of Phase 1 are actively receiving the vaccine, Wharton added. This includes healthcare workers, frontline workers and long-term care facilities. Educators have been identified in Group 1B to receive the vaccine. They will be phased in next after Phase 1A. Tillamook School District

began a hybrid model for students K-6 in December and plans to phase in a hybrid model for grades 7-12 in mid-January. Limited in-person learning continues at the junior high and high schools until the hybrid model begins. Neah-Kah-Nie School

District will begin an onsite/ hybrid model on March 15.

COVID-19 vaccine distribution continues in Tillamook County

a COVID-19 vaccine update during a Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, Jan. 13. According to the health

department, 536 doses of the Moderna vaccine have been administered in the county, as of Jan. 13.

Health Department, provided

Colson said providers are distributing the vaccine to those in Phase 1A. Vaccination of those 65 years old and older, as well as those with underlying health conditions. are now included in Group 1B. This group also includes child care providers, early learning and K-12 educators and staff. These vaccinations are estimated to begin Jan. 23.

"As soon as this vaccine is more readily available, we will let everyone know," Colson said.

which groups are being provided the vaccine. The health center hopes to have scheduling information in the future. Jan. 23 is the target start date, but the health center does not know if this will be the start date for Tillamook County.

Vice Chair David Yamamoto said essential services are becoming first in line for the vaccine. He wondered if board of commissioners should be included in that list across the state based on the role they play. Colson said Phase 1B includes essentials workers and he will follow up and see if commissioners would be included.

"Please be patient," Commissioner Erin Skaar said. "This will take some time. This is very exciting that the groups we can vaccinate has expanded but it's still based

them out."

Gov. Kate Brown issued a statement Friday, Jan. 15, stating states will not be receiving increased shipments of vaccines from the national stockpile the week of Jan. 18 because there is no federal reserve of doses. Brown said she is demanding answers from the Trump administration.

"This is a deception on a national scale," Brown said in the statement. "Oregon's seniors, teachers, and all of us were depending on the promise of Oregon's share of the federal reserve of vaccines being released to us."

And this is where I will tell a tale on myself. Last spring, determined to stay away from grocery stores as much as I could, I bought a pack of zucchini seeds and started them inside. Had six very nice, healthy plants sprout in my mini-cold frame and was pretty pleased with myself. If you are a regular reader, you will know why: I generally don't have the patience to grow plants from seeds. I also planted some dill seeds and some sweet peas. And they all had great success and I had lovely plants to place outside after the last frost in May. In fact, by June I had so much success that I thought to myself, "I will never use all the zucchini these will produce. I think I will give one of these plants to my friend Beverly and see how it does for her."

Well, Beverly graciously accepted my gift and planted it in her seaside garden in Rockaway. And she reported to me that she had guite a harvest. My zucchini, however lovely the plants looked, did not produce. And I mean they did not produce at all. The plants kept growing, but by Halloween, I had harvested one zucchini! One! From five plants! And it was only about 5 inches long. Who can't grow zucchini? Me! The moral of this story is when you are choosing what vegetables to grow, be sure you have the sun requirements for them. This info can be found in the catalogs or on the seed packets.

Seed catalogs have all sorts of information and are a great reference even after you have planted the seeds. Days to harvest is one, but also how and when to plant the seeds, sun and water needs, height and width of the plant, and even the pests and insects you



will have to watch for. Each of the varieties will also have specific instructions for each plant. Most of this information is also on the seed packets themselves, but I usually keep the catalog as well for future reference as the season goes along.

When you are pricing out the seeds you want, take a look at how they are sold: by weight or by number. An ounce of tiny lettuce seeds is a lot compared to an ounce of pumpkin or butternut squash. And while seeds are packaged for a certain season, they will generally sprout a year or two after their package date. With less germination rate, perhaps, but only about 10 or 20% less each year. So if you don't have a large garden, you won't need 250 squash seeds.

Three grams will do.

And that brings me back to the cover of the 2021 Territorial Seed Company's catalog and "Share the Harvest." If you do have the space and can grow an extra row of beans or squash or onions, consider doing so and sharing with friends or neighbor or Tillamook's Oregon Food Bank. There are food bank programs all over the county (and the state). The Tillamook offices are located on Wilson River Loop, but you will need to call and find out their protocols for accepting fresh produce before you stop by. Phone them at 503-842-3154 and they will explain their process. With so many people needing extra help with food these days, it is a kind and generous thing to do.




TBCC CONNECTIONS Looking ahead to 2021!

across Third Street from the main campus this past fall. It will now be called the TBCC Center for Industrial Technology and contain our manufacturing, machining, welding, and agricultural technology programs. We will be making improvements to the building this year to prepare it to offer classes, either by summer or fall. TBCC will have its first reaccreditation visit from the Northwest Commission for Colleges and Universities on October 4-6 of this year. This means we are completing our first sevenyear accreditation cycle since becoming an independent college in 2013. Then we will be formally reaccredited a year from now in January for another seven years. Using some of the federal funds from the COVID CARES Act, TBCC has enhanced the technology in several classrooms to allow instructors to work with both remote and face to face students at the same time. This will allow students to choose whether to attend the class remotely or be there in person. We are also starting to offer tutoring in math and writing where students can access tutors remotely from home on Zoom or be there in person. The need for this advanced technology will grow even when the pandemic is over. Finally, TBCC will be celebrating its 40th anniversary in 2021. We are working to plan activities but much will rely on when the pandemic is more under control and we can meet in larger groups. We are very excited to be reaching this milestone in serving Tillamook County residents with quality higher education and are committed to continued growth and offering relevant programs and courses that help improve the lives of our students. 2021 is going to be a great year for TBCC!

gone and are very excited about the possibilities for 2021. As the new year gets started, I want to share some of the things that make us feel good about the upcoming year.

TBCC managed to keep enrollment losses down to a minimum in

> 2020, and we even grew a bit over the summer and fall terms compared to last year. We are hoping to see an enrollment surge once the pandemic is under control and we get back to some level of normalcy, hopefully by next fall term. Other community colleges in Oregon and across the country have experienced large enrollment declines throughout the pandemic, so TBCC has been fortunate in that respect.

> Part of the reason for our enrollment stability has been the continued growth of new programs, especially in the career-technical education (CTE) area. We have greatly expanded our healthcare programs and offerings, and will continue to do so over the coming year.

> Our Facilities Master Plan (FMP) that was completed in 2020 can help support this growth and we are continuing to evaluate if we can meet the anticipated needs with what we have planned. The request for capital construction funds from the Oregon State Legislature is under consideration in this upcoming session. If approved, this would provide \$8M toward the cost of the new building and renovations in our FMP. We would then start work through our TBCC Foundation to raise the rest of the money needed.







the July 4th activities, for traffic control and crowd control.

We supply roped off areas, signage and staff for events," Rogers said. "From bomb threats to Halloween crowd control in Downtown Tillamook we have worked it all."

Rogers said, normally he employs about 38 people, he's down in staffing right now due to the pandemic.

He said that the course he teaches in traffic control, a requirement to become a flagger, takes four hours. The cost is \$120 but gets you a three year certification in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. He also teaches these courses through the Oregon Department of Transportation and Chemeketa Community College.

"I don't guarantee a job when you take the course, but there is an opportunity to work for me when certified,' he added.

To become a flagger, you have to be 18-years-old and have a valid drivers license and of course become certified.

"We start our flaggers at \$22 to \$43 dollars per hour

depending on the job and location. All this is worked into his bidding process."

Rogers listed just a few of the things his crews have worked locally to include, floods, landslides, community events, crowd, foot and traffic control as well as security.

"We're very professional and tactful, we have lots of signage and explanation to keep your event safe," he added.

So next time your are out driving around, see a flagger, slow down, follow the signs posted and give the flagger a friendly wave. They are there to keep you safe and help get you to your destination.



The health department is administering vaccines with the expectation there will not be a delay in receiving the second dose, Colson added. Adventist Health reported 326 doses have been delivered and 89.86 percent of staff have received the vaccine.

Staying well in the time of a pandemic

All our lives changed last year with the global pandemic. As members of the community and health care providers, we at the Rinehart Clinic are very concerned with keeping our healthy patients healthy - always, but especially during a pandemic. This includes the children and teens we care for. Unfortunately, the number of Well Child visits across the country have fallen due to concerns parents and caregivers have around the pandemic. These Well Child exams help health care providers monitor children's health. It is especially important to maintain regularly scheduled appointments and to stay up to date on immunizations despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

During the first two years of life, we give children much needed vaccines that help prevent diseases like measles, mumps, and polio, among others. Both the Centers for Disease Control and the Oregon Health Authority have found vaccine rates across all ages have dropped significantly this year. The World Health Organization has data showing a substantial drop in the number of children completing the vaccines against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis. For those who don't know, pertussis is whooping cough. This is the first time in 28 years that the world could see a reduction in this coverage, which puts children at increased risk for outbreaks of these preventable diseases. Whooping cough was already increasing in many communities before the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

Along with vaccines, Well Child visits are also a time when we screen for important growth and developmental milestones. Well Child visits are a good time to focus on the general wellness of the child, even if the child is healthy. The visits allow the provider to talk about ways to keep your child healthy and prevent future problems. Providers can give guidance on sleep, safety, childhood diseases, and what to expect as your child grows. Each visit includes a complete

physical exam that allows the provider to check the child's growth by measuring height and weight. Physical development is also assessed. Hearing, vision, and developmental screening tests are part of some visits. Parents are typically asked ahead of time to fill out paperwork that can help with the review of a young child's development. Immunizations are reviewed and updated as needed.

Infancy and early childhood are a time of rapid growth and change. Because of this, children need more frequent exams. Exams are every few months for infants and toddlers to try to catch any developmental issues quickly. After age three, exams are recommended once a year all the way through the teen years.

We know everyone is concerned about the COVID-19 pandemic. Health care centers, like the Rinehart Clinic, have made many changes to keep patients safe during this time.

• Paperwork is sent out ahead of time for parents to fill out in order to reduce time waiting at the clinic.

• Patients are checking in from the parking lot over the phone so they are not waiting in the clinic with other patients.

• The number of visitors who come in with each patient is limited.

• Sick patients are separated from healthy patients, and we encourage telehealth (video visits) for all visits that can be done virtually.

• Everyone who enters the clinic is required to wear a mask

• Staff are screened routinely for symptoms of COVID-19.

It is important to keep our healthy children and teens healthy while monitoring for any issues that arise. At the Rinehart Clinic, we encourage families to schedule over-due and upcoming visits right away. Well-child visits are very important for ALL kids, especially those 24 months and younger. Our best advice...keep those appointments.



Star has a refreshing business philosophy. "We're a mom and pa shop and proud of it," she says. "We run off of our reputation and treat everyone's equipment like it was our own. The best part about owning a family business is the freedom to take care of customers right." Ask the pros about L&L, who all seem to swear by the place, and they use words like "dependable", "reliable" and "loyal."

L&L stocks an enormous array of chainsaws, blowers, mowers, weed eaters, log splitters, generators, tools, parts, workwear and boots, representing lines including STIHL, Husqvarna, Honda, Briggs & Stratton, Carhartt, Georgia Boot, Danner, and Hoffman's Boots. 


