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

Sheriff reports bear sightings in south county

Tillamook County Sheriff's Office advised south Tillamook County residents on bear-proofing their yards and neighborhoods after an increase in bear sightings and contacts.

According to Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, bear-proofing your yard and neighborhood can help avoid potentially dangerous bear encounters and keep Oregon's bears safe and where they belong – in the wild.

Most problems are caused by people feeding bears, either actively or inadvertently. Once habituated to finding food near homes, bears can become a threat to human safety and must often be euthanized. Follow these guidelines to protect both humans and bears.

Keep pet food indoors. Feed pets in the house, garage or enclosed kennel. Hang bird feeders from a wire at least 10 feet off the ground and 6 to 10 feet from the trunk of tree. Remove fruit

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Tillamook welcome sign destroyed in vehicle crash

Police said speed was involved in a crash that leveled a City of Tillamook sign on the south side of town.

According to Tillamook Police Department, 18-year-old Emanuel Benito Maldonado was taken to a hospital after he allegedly drove his Ford Mustang off the road and hit the sign at around 5 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 7. Maldonado was the lone occupant in his vehicle and no other vehicles were involved in the crash.

A Tillamook Fire District spokesman said Maldonado was extricated from the crashed Mustang with serious injuries and was moved by backboard with C-spine precautions. Tillamook Fire sent three apparatus to the scene and provided an ambulance driver.

Tillamook Police Chief Terry Wright said Maldonado has not been charged with any crime at this time, but the case will be sent to the district attorney's office for review.

Tillamook Čity Manager Paul Wyntergreen said the sign would be replaced. He said no determination has been made regarding further legal actions other than to pursue Maldonado's insurance for the cost of the replacement.

A Tillamook Area Chamber of Commerce spokesman said the sign's cost was \$30,000.

The sign sat at the southern en-

trance to Tillamook on U.S. 101 and was one of four installed this past fall. The project was launched in the summer of 2017 and cost \$120,000. The brightly-colored orange and white landmarks herald a welcome to "The Dairylands." The other three

signs can be found where U.S. 6, U.S. 131, and U.S. 101 (on the north side) enter Tillamook.

A collaborative rebranding effort by Visit Tillamook Coast, Tillamook Area Chamber of Commerce and the City of Tillamook, the signs were paid for with Transient Lodging Tax funds overseen by Visit Tillamook Coast. The signs were the first step of a wayfinding program for the city, and the first installation of a countywide wayfinding program. They were constructed by a Portland firm.

Success stories shared at Main Street Conference

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Tillamook hosted the 2019 Oregon Main Street Conference Oct. 2-4, an event to inspire connections between people, places, and partners to get work done in Oregon's downtowns.

Conference participants left with strategies and tools to spur on revitalization efforts in the Main Street district. They also celebrated the accomplishments of Oregon Main Street communities at the Excellence in Downtown Revitalization Awards on Oct. 2.

"Tillamook has really grown and developed since I last spent time there; I enjoyed shopping, dining, and walking around town," said Susy Lacer, Grant Professional Certified. "I loved the refreshments during the session breaks – the scones/brownies from Sarasota's and coffee from

Five Rivers were delicious."

Lacer and her husband spent about \$389 at local businesses while in town. They arrived Wednesday, Oct. 2, and left Friday, Oct. 4, at noon.

The conference ended the events with a closing plenary that was held Oct. 4 at the Coliseum Theater in Tillamook. Representatives from Oregon Main Street Network Communities gave 5-minute success stories they had in their efforts to revitalize their downtowns.

"The theater was wonderful, especially with the assistance by Scott Casey to ensure lighting, sound, and projection worked in the space," said Sheri Stewart, Oregon Main Street Director.

One of the success stories was told by Sierra Lauder, formerly of the Tillamook Main Street program. Lauder talked about the highway being closed in 2016 on Pacific Avenue for construction. Fall 2017 was the tear up of Pacific Avenue. A

local storeowner, Natalie, who owned Sunflower Flats, was told to board up its windows.

Sunflower Flats was on one of the busiest corners of Tillamook.

Natalie got colorful paint and wrote the store's phone number on the boards and that they were open. People were able to call and order flowers. Along with Lauder, they made it a Facebook live event that showed 10 minutes of them putting up the boards. They got over 7,000 views of their video.

"The population of Tillamook is 5,000 people," Lauder said.

They also talked about where to park in every post. The construction went on for 15 months. The bulk of the work was during the slow times of the day to keep traffic as open as possible.

Monday Musical kicks off season with America's Sweethearts Sunday

Anyone who grew up listening to The Andrews Sisters is going to want to take note: America's Sweethearts is coming to Tillamook Oct. 20th.

This is the opening act for the Monday Musical Club of Tillamook's Cultural Events Series, which is celebrating 25 years of bringing high-quality musical talent to Tillamook.

"It's really exciting to see this tradition going strong for 25 years now, and to think of all the musical talent we have been able to bring to Tillamook over the last two and a half decades is really tremendous," noted Adam Schwend, the Cultural Events Director for the Monday Musical Club of Tillamook, which hosts the Cultural Event Series each year as a way for local music lovers to enjoy world-class performances right at home.

"These are performances that you would typically have to visit a much larger city to see, and we think that's really special to be able to enjoy these acts right here at home."

Acts like America's Sweethearts, which has been called a "slice of old-fashioned fun." This trio of women started their career in New York City performing the tunes of The Andrews Sisters.

Founder Carly Kincannon recalls their inspiration: "[The Andrews Sisters] were good looking, classy dames in the 1930s. Their music and their incredible, intricate harmonies were an inspiration in a time when there was much darkness."

"Our goal is to spread nostalgia, joy, and human connection through harmonies and music," she added. "I believe that this connection can span many decades, and our repertoire reflects that."

However the Sweethearts don't just perform beloved songs from the 1930s. Their musical homage repertoire spans the decades of 1910-2010, bringing audience members a "century of sweetness."

"In any act that we book for the Cultural Events Series, we try to ensure they will appeal to a broad audience and bring a lot of diversity to their act, and America's Sweethearts hit all the marks," said Schwend. "They are incredibly talented women who are just a joy to listen to."

Based out of New York City, America's Sweethearts features intricate vocal harmonies. Their performance comes alive through colorful period costuming, hairdos and makeup. Experienced in jazz, musical theater and opera,

Visit Tillamook Coast announces \$100,000 grant for marketing

Tillamook Coast Visitors Association (Visit Tillamook Coast), the destination marketing organization for Tillamook County, announced in Sept. the availability of \$100,000 in tourism marketing and promotions grant funding for 2020 calendar year.

Application forms can be downloaded at www. tillamookcoast.com/grants. The deadline for submission is December 2, 2019. Those organizations and businesses awarded grant funding will be notified in mid-January, 2020. Non-profit and not-for-prof-

it organizations, as well as forprofit businesses involved in tourism activities, are eligible for the grants. Up to \$10,000 can be awarded for a tourism marketing and promotion project or event. Applicants focusing on shoulder season activities (late September

through late May) are given priority in scoring of their application.

Non-profits and not-forprofits are awarded 50 percent after approval of the project and receive the remaining 50 percent after satisfactory completion of the project and fulfilling grant-reporting requirements. For-profits must first get approval of the project, and then are eligible for 50 percent reimbursement after satisfactory completion of the project and fulfilling grant reporting requirements. The tourism executive

director and tourism grants administrator first reviews the grant applications for completeness and eligibility. If eligibility is questionable, legal counsel is consulted. Eligible applications are then reviewed and scored according to the grant criteria (found in the grant application), and then ranked and approved by the Tillamook Coast Visitors Association 11-member board.

This is the fifth year in a row that \$100,000 in grant funding has been made available to community organizations and businesses involved in tourism. Visit Tillamook Coast has awarded a total of \$420,000 to date in grants. Projects range from digital marketing campaigns, rack cards, websites and videos to walking maps, event marketing, tradeshow needs, media campaigns and print advertis-

Visit Tillamook Coast staff now certified as Guest **Service Gold trainers**

The staff of Tillamook Coast Visitors Association (Visit Tillamook Coast), the destination marketing organization for Tillamook County, is now officially certified as trainers for the internationally recognized Guest Service Gold program.

The training program is developed by the American Hotel and Lodging Educational Institute and supported by Travel Oregon and the Oregon Restaurant and Lodging Association Education Foundation, and on the coast by Oregon Coast Visitors Association.

"Our staff believes in building a welcoming hospitality culture throughout the county," said Nan Devlin, executive director of Visit Tillamook Coast (VTC), in a press release. "You can travel to the most beautiful country in the world, stay in the nicest hotel, or eat at a famous restaurant, but if treated as if no one cares you're there, you won't go back. It's happened to all of us. We want our customers and guests to have a memorable, local experience. It's the most effective way to encourage return visits, which is the best way to invest in our businesses.'

In January 2019, VTC led a training session funded by Oregon Coast Visitors Association for the Big Wave Café in Manzanita. The café is now a designated Certified Guest Service Gold Property. "As an owner and a chef,

I can tell you that usually we say we are too busy to train, or it is too expensive, but this training will pay for itself," said Brian Williams, Big Wave Café, in the release. "The feedback from the team was off the charts and everyone found it to be time well

In addition to the VTC staff

(Nan Devlin, Amy Blackburn and Julie Hurliman), two general managers of Pelican Brewing, Carly Dye and Miranda Bosely, also gained certification as trainers. Ken Henson, director of food and beverage for Pelican Brewing, has been a Guest Service Gold trainer for more than two years, and was recently honored by the Oregon Restaurant and Lodging Association for having trained more front-line staff than any other trainer in

Visit Tillamook Coast plans to offer the Guest Service Gold certification classes, which takes approximately three and a half to four hours to complete, beginning in January. For more information about the program, go to www.OregonGuestServicde.

that has fallen from trees. Add lime to compost piles to reduce odors, do not compost meat, bones, fruit, dairy products or grease. Secure garbage cans in a garage, shed or behind a chain link or electric fence. Put garbage cans out just before pick-up

time, not the night before. Purchase bear-proof

garbage cans if necessary. Take garbage with you when leaving your vacation home. Clean garbage containers regularly with bleach or moth balls to reduce odors.

Use electric fencing to keep bears from orchards, gardens, compost, beehives and berries. Store livestock food in a secure place. Don't leave scented candles, soap or suntan lotions outdoors or near open windows. Keep barbeques clean. Store them in a shed or garage.

Talk to neighbors to encourage everyone in the neighborhood to remove attractants. Stay indoors and allow a snooping bear to move on. Never, ever feed a bear. Teach children about bear safety.

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

Downtown Alliance (MFDA), presented on behalf of Mark Driver.

"This alliance creates the opportunity for citizens to invest in their community," Culjiak said.

Culjiak spoke about MF-DA's recent project, "\$10 For My Town", which asks each citizen to contribute \$10 to help complete their mission, which includes a public market in Freewater, creates

pop-up retail shops in the Business District, downtown music and concerts, and free movie nights. Culjiak has put brochures in her own store and has also handed them out at events. Since June of this year, \$5,000.25 has been raised.

The MFDA is currently looking for a permanent market place.

Susie, from Roseburg, spoke about the success of the Blue Zones Project. This project provided fresh produce, vegan, and vegetarian choices to Roseburg's Downtown Market and Deli. Susie said this healthier choice

didn't cost a lot of money. Eagles Park is across the street, driving more traffic to the store. The market is the largest convenience store in Roseburg, with 25 doors of refrigeration and the largest selection. Blue Zones Project worked with the owner, Jit Singh, to identify the range of healthy items the store already carries and to feature them more prominently at the store's entrance. The new signage and layout provided by Blue Zones Project prompts customers toward

healthy items. "Downtowns truly are the hearts of our communities," said Wyatt King, Marketing Director of Safeco Insurance in Lebanon, Oregon.

King said a strong downtown supports a strong community. If downtowns are thriving, our communities are thriving.

"It was well run, nice venue, great snacks, overall great logistics," said an attendee of the event, Steve Stayton.

Štewart, Oregon Main Street Director, is thankful to the Tillamook Chamber of Commerce board for being a local partner in this year's

conference. "One of the things we think you did was demonstrate that one of our smaller network communities can host an event of this type – you inspired others to approach us about hosting a future conference," Stewart

told the Chamber.

Tillamook United Way and YMCA form partnership

Tillamook County Family YMCA (The Y) and Tillamook County United Way (TCUW) have formed a partnership with the goal of strengthening financial support for nonprofit programs serving neighbors around Tillamook County. The new partnership was formed after an exhaustive communitywide outreach process to identify a new way forward that would strengthen and continue the non-profit support mission that TCUW has upheld for more than 40 years in Tillamook County.

Going into this Fall's campaign for 2020, TCUW will look and feel much the same as prior years, and will now benefit from vital staff support for campaign outreach activities. The Y has dedicated Jon Pennington, YMCA director of special projects and community engagement, to be the staff liaison for TCUW. In prior years, the small and busy TCUW board was stretched to

manage both governance and the campaign with only a parttime contract bookkeeper.

In recognition of this staff support, a new fund allocation policy has been voted by the TCUW board. Of the undesignated funds received for 2020, fifty percent will be allocated to YMCA programs for direct service programming. The other 50% will be allocated by an allocation committee through an application process similar to years prior. Funds that are designated by donors to benefit specific organizations will continue to be directed to those organizations. Growing the impact of the Fall TCUW campaign and increasing future funding to community human service agencies is a top priority.

"We want to be transparent and make sure the public knows that part of the funds are going to the Y, but it is important to note that the funds will go to direct service costs, no overhead, administrative

costs or anything like that," according to Kaylan Sisco CEO and Executive Director of the Tillamook County YMCA. "The Y is in the business of helping people, and we want to help other non-profits who are doing great things for the people in our community as well. We have a robust infrastructure at the Y that can bolster the fundraising efforts for the community, so why not share our resources?" The Y is one of the largest

501(c)3 charity non-profits in our community and has been a cornerstone in Tillamook since 1948. TCUW has been actively raising funds for community non-profits since 1976. Moving forward with this new partnership, the two organizations will seek ways to create greater positive impact to the community through relationships, grant opportunities and existing col-

On being Homeless on the **Beautiful Northern Oregon Coast**

I wake as the cold, icy hand of fear, dread and anxiety grasp the very center of my heart, its long, sharp nails making deep reddish blue indents in my skin.

"Where am I? Where am I supposed to be? Who am I supposed to be today?' There's no alarm in the woods. The beautiful trees don't charge anything but

the air at times. If we don't charge our phones while driving to town to find a home, they die overnight, and we have no way of knowing the time. The date, or if anyone is calling to let us know we can come in from the cold woods and live in a real home.

I always thought homeless people were just plain lazy, drug addicted alcoholics with no drive or ambition. Maybe they were functioning at the top of their ancestor's lifestyles. Maybe its totally accepted where they're from, within their family dynamics. But not mine.

Being homeless was never a seriously considered option for us. We came close after

I began to recover from a 3-month long coma, but I put myself through college for 5 years so that my Children and their Children, and me, would never experience homeless-

And yet here we are.

No water, no electric. No rent but we're so far out in the woods, it takes nearly \$20 per day in gas for each of us; Mom going to work at her two jobs, GrandMa taking the Kids to school, or to get food, or to make phone calls in the hope of hearing those words, "Would you like to move into your home today?"

I, Grandma, was promised an apartment and the phone calls and documents went

flying back and forth for 2 or 3 weeks and then nothing. Nobody called me anymore. Nobody would talk to me even! On Tuesday of the week before I was to move, that following Friday, I called for directions and it took 20 minutes and being transferred a few times before someone would talk to me. I was told they had given the apartment to someone else. But nobody told me.

We were rained on, we were nearly robbed of our RV while several miles out of cell, yelling, hearing or walking to the police station range We realized how seriously vulnerable we were. We could have been seriously harmed and nobody would have even known we were missing for

quite some time. Nobody would have even known.

ack of available housing is Lone of the biggest challenges in our area. This includes housing of all kinds: emergency housing for the homeless, supported housing for those with special needs, senior housing, subsidized affordable housing where rent is based on income, workforce housing for people who make too much to qualify for subsidized housing but can't afford sky high rents and market rate housing for professionals. We need both rentals and family homes for people to buy. Across the board, we need

Fortunately, there is a lot of momentum in the area of housing and there are exciting projects in works in Tillamook County, including several that will serve the needs of the most vulnerable people in our community. We want to share the good news about a few of those projects, and ask for the community's support, and perhaps most importantly,

In North county, a dynamic project called Sammy's Place has begun that will provide semi-independent housing opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities. The Thompson Road parcel secured by Sammy's Place had been foreclosed upon for back taxes owed. It

Compassion for our neighbors

contained a mountain of blackberries, falling down buildings and extensive scrap metal. The parcel was included in a county land sales auction and there were no bidders. Thereafter, Sammy's Place applied, paid the back taxes and was deeded the property as a qualifying nonprofit through ORS 271.330 which allows the transfer of property for low income housing to non-profit organizations. Similar land donations have been made to Habitat for Humanity in the past.

The Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) are pleased and proud to support this visionary housing project with a land donation and we affirm our commitment to providing housing opportunities for all people in our community. Sammy's Place board of directors and volunteers are clearing a three-acre parcel on Thompson Road in Nehalem, under direction of the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) for reasons of asbestos abatement, etc., which will be a micro-community of mixed-use homes for individuals with developmental disabilities and workforce housing. One of the founding members of Sammy's Place, Kathy Jean Hrywnak, said, "Everyone deserves the opportunity to choose where they live, and those with disabilities in our community that want their own homes in a

nature-based setting will have that choice with Sammy's Place."

The BOCC fully supports Sammy's Place in their efforts to provide housing for those with disabilities. We ask for the forbearance and compassion of folks on Thompson Road who are understandably concerned about how the nature of their neighborhood may change. Change is difficult and it is also essential to vibrant, thriving, livable communities. We believe that Sammy's Place will be a model for creative housing solutions and a jewel that we can all be proud of. A project for affordable housing with 60 units will break ground in Tillamook in the spring of 2020. Northwest Oregon Housing Authority (NOHA) will develop the Holden Creek Village on 12th Street. These homes will be designed as a community with multiple units (as opposed to apartments) with paths and wetlands and the character of a neighborhood. This project will be subsidized housing and qualified renters will pay on a sliding scale according to their income.

This project meets housing needs for low income families with children, individuals and seniors, and there will be five units dedicated to the persistently and severely

and much needed resource in our community. Those five individuals will receive case management from Tillamook Family Counseling Center (TFCC) to provide the supports necessary for them to be successful in their homes and in the community. Tillamook County is fortunate to have this project in the pipeline for our vulnerable citizens. There is already a wait list of local people in need of affordable housing that far exceeds 60 units. We hope that the neighbors on 12th Street will recognize the need, celebrate the solution and welcome new residents to Holden Creek Village.

Homelessness is on the rise everywhere, not just Tillamook County, due to several factors including lack of available and affordable housing. We hear reports every day of folks living in their cars and working, sometimes with kids, living in "zombie" RVs, living in the woods, couch surfing and sleeping

Two projects that will help the homeless in our community are in the works. Helping Hands Reentry Outreach Center, the homeless shelter at the Port of Tillamook Bay, is in the process of remodeling the top floor of the former Naval Command Center, which will significantly increase the number of residents who can be served there. Helping Hands

provides a clean and sober, safe environment for homeless people including families with children to get back on their feet and supports to help them be successful. For more information or to volunteer or donate to Helping Hands go to helpinghandsreentry.org.

In Tillamook, Community Action Resources Enterprises, or CARE, Inc. is building tiny houses to temporarily house homeless people near the Herald Center at the Tillamook Seventh-day Adventist Church. The small pod of tiny houses will provide shelter and connect residents to services that will help them bridge the gap from homelessness to being productive members of society.

We should all remember that the fall from grace can be very short. Many Americans are a couple of paychecks away from financial ruin, perhaps due to no fault of their own, which could result in homelessness. However, the climb to get back from homelessness to being housed, employed and self-sufficient can be arduous and very long. It is in everyone's best interest to help our homeless neighbors and it's the right thing to do. It is a credit to the generosity of spirit and compassion of Tillamook County citizens that we recognize the need for housing of all kinds and are willing to help find solutions.

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Senator announces statewide effort for wild, scenic rivers

Nominate new Oregon rivers, streams for protection

Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) announced he is taking nominations from Oregonians through Jan. 20, 2020 for rivers in the state that deserve addition to the national Wild and Scenic Rivers list.
"Whether you are a whitewa-

ter rafter, an angler or simply an Oregonian who believes strongly in protecting the river or stream that provides safe drinking water to your community, I want to hear from you," Wyden wrote in an open letter to Oregonians seeking river nominations for new wild-and-scenic river legislation he plans to introduce.

"Now is your chance, once again, to speak up for your favorite rivers and highlight the outstanding values that make each river worthy of protection,"

With this week marking the 51st anniversary of the Wild & Scenic Rivers Act, Wyden noted the proposed new rivers that would be part of his upcoming Wild and Scenic Rivers legislation builds on legislation included in what Congress passed in February that added more than 250 miles of Wild and Scenic rivers in Oregon.

The senator said he is proud Oregon now has 2,173 miles designated in the Wild and Scenic Rivers system, but that the total remains a small fraction of Oregon's 110,994 miles of major rivers and streams. He added that the outdoor recreation industry statistics show that recreation supports 172,000 jobs in Oregon and generates \$16.4 billion in economic activity statewide.

Tillamook County features more than a dozen rivers and numerous streams.

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
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Oregonians participate in Great Oregon ShakeOut

Millions of people worldwide will practice how to drop, cover, and hold on at 10:17 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 17, during Great ShakeOut Earthquake Drills.

Oregonians can join by registering for the 2019 Great Oregon ShakeOut. Participating is a great way for your family or organization to be prepared to survive and recover from big earthquake. Oregon has over 660,000 participants so far.

The Great Oregon Shake-Out is an annual event and is held the third Thursday of October. Anyone can register at shakeout.org/Oregon. Most people will be participating at 10:17 a.m., but

people can always participate at different times.

Clatsop County has 5,363 participants, 1,191 of those being from K-12 schools and districts. These schools are Warrenton Grade School and The Cannon Beach Academy. Other participants include the United States Coast Guard Sector Columbia River in Warrenton, Providence Seaside Hospital, and Providence Rehabilitation Services in Gearhart, and others. Tillamook County has

3,930 participants, with 3,057 of those being K-12 schools and districts. Participating districts are Nestucca Valley School District and Tillamook School District, which includes: Liberty Elementary, South Prairie School, Tilamook High

School, and Tillamook Junior High School. Other participants include Adventist Health Tillamook, Rinehart Clinic in Wheeler, and US Renal Care, Tillamook Dialysis Center. Oregon lies at a conver-

gent continental boundary where two tectonic plates are colliding. The Cascadia Subduction Zone is a 600mile long earthquake fault stretching from offshore northern California to southern British Columbia. 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





Changing lifestyle to reduce Type 2 Diabetes risk

Are you at risk for type 2 diabetes or know someone who is? In Tillamook County, 11.3% of the population currently have type 2 diabetes, and approximately 30% more are at risk for prediabetes. The American College of Sports Medicine and the American Diabetes Association through their research "Exercise and Type 2 Diabetes," found that lifestyle modifications such as those taught by the Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP) reduced the number of people with type 2 diabetes by 58%. Fortunately, the YMCA in Tillamook offers DPP, which is a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention National Diabetes Prevention Program. The program is sponsored by Northwest Senior and Disability (NWSDS) at no cost for those who qualify. The DPP class is offered weekly for the first 16 weeks and takes place during the lunch hour, noon-1 p.m.,

on Tuesdays. After the first 4 months, the group meets every other week. Program instructor Kelly Benson praises the program, emphasizing the success of the group in being able to track their progress, and notes an overall successful effort in individual attitude and perception change.

Taking a closer look at the program, DPP participants will work with a knowledgeable lifestyle coach in a small group setting who will introduce topics on healthy eating, physical activity, behavior changes, as well as weight loss and how it can help reduce the risk of developing diabetes. Linda Langer is an active resident of Tillamook county who has had quite a success with YMCA's DPP. Linda reports a lifelong battle with weight management and started going to the Tillamook YMCA five years ago. After losing 12 lbs., she reports feeling "stuck" and was worried that she

might be at a permanent plateau in her weight loss. Through trainers at the YMCA, Linda was connected to the DPP program. Upon starting the yearlong program in April 2019, Linda has lost an additional 28 lbs. to date, and exercises 3x per week. She reports being motivated by having more energy, and adds her mental wellbeing is affected positively. She also notes that the group setting of the program helps to build community and accountability as participants can share and connect stories of success, struggles, and encouragement. The most significant takeaway from the program so far that Linda reports, is that it taught her how to be more mindful of food choices and the impact those choices will have on her health. She finds being extra-focused and mindful is especially important when attending events and celebrations.
