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Amazon hosts ribbon cutting, tour at port facility

Local elected officials and government staff gathered at the Port of Tillamook Bay on May 28, for a ribbon cutting ceremony and tour of Amazon's delivery station.

Opened eight months ago, the 47,000-square-foot warehouse serves as a sorting center for packages destined for coastal destinations between Lincoln City and Cannon Beach, and has cut down on delivery times for coastal residents.

"This means going from being several days to get their packages to receiving them the next day, which is a real difference in peoples' daily lives," said Amazon Senior Regional Manager Nitish Bhagia, "and we don't take that lightly. It's not just about everyday conveniences, it's about medication, it's baby supplies."

The new delivery station, which Amazon refers to internally as WOR4, is the company's first facility on the Oregon coast, and was the second constructed in rural Oregon, after one in Medford, as part of a \$4 billion push by the company to expand its footprint in rural America.

Orders bound for the 90-mile stretch of coast between Lincoln City and Cannon Beach arrive at the delivery station early each morning already packaged for delivery, and warehouse employees sort them into groups optimized for delivery routes by an algorithm for a fleet of delivery drivers who pick them up from the delivery station. Before the center opened, Amazon relied on the United States Postal Service, UPS and FedEx for deliveries in the area.

Alec Cruz, the Tillamook station manager, said that the facility was sorting around 3,200 packages a day, though it can handle up to 25,000 packages a day and Cruz said he expects package volumes to tick up during the summer.

Overall, the center supports around 100 jobs, with 40 mostly

part-time warehouse staff working directly for Amazon and 55 drivers working for B There Logistics out of Salem. Workers from B There also monitor drivers from the delivery center, helping with any routing or other issues.

At the event, Bhagia spoke, as did B There Logistics CEO Brandon Bates and Amazon Public Policy Senior Manager Ellie Booth, who announced a \$10,000 donation by the company to the Tillamook County Food Bank, before a ribbon cutting with elected officials and tour showing packages' path through the facility.

Election results update

With the deadline for mailed ballots to arrive come and gone, Tillamook County Clerk Christy Nyseth released updated results for the May 19 primary election on May 27, with no local race results changing.

Incumbent Commissioner Mary Faith Bell remained ahead in her bid for reelection against businessman Jeff Spink, while the two questions related to the formation of a new fire district in Tillamook and Bay City were still on track for success. The secretary of state's office had not updated its results in races for state representative or senator by press time.

In the race for Tillamook County commissioner position three, Bell had received 50.7% of the total ballots cast, while Spink, in his second race for county commissioner, received 40.8% of the vote, with 8.4% of Tillamook County voters either not selecting a candidate in the race, overvoting or writing in a different name.

The ballot question seeking dissolution of the Tillamook Fire District to pave the way for the new Tillamook Bay Fire & Rescue Rural Fire Protection District was still on pace to pass, with 48.7% of votes cast in favor and 46.3% cast against, while 5.1% of voters did not mark an answer.

A second question, asking voters in Tillamook and Bay City to approve the formation of the new district was also on the path to success, with 50.8% of voters in favor and 44.9% opposed. Leonard Ingles, Kathy Baker, Casey Burden, Tim Hamburger and Geoff Hoffert were the leading vote winners in the race for the new district's five-member board of directors.

Olson removes self from subpoena proceedings

In court filings responding to two motions to quash subpoenas she obtained for personnel records of those who participated in an investigation into her office, Tillamook County District Attorney Aubrey Olson removed herself from the proceedings while maintaining the subpoenas' validity.

Responding to those filings for the county, Ashley Cadotte renewed her argument that Olson's subpoenas did not meet the legal standards to compel disclosure of the documents, as they failed to show how those documents were relevant to the cases being referenced.

"The State has not made sufficient explanation on how the records sought are material and favorable to the case at hand," Cadotte wrote, "which is indicative of the DA's (district attorney) use of the subpoena duces tecum as a discovery device to search for speculative information in the hopes of unearthing additional information on the complaints made against her and her office."

The filings were the latest action in a legal battle that has been playing out against the backdrop of an investigation into complaints about Olson's office initiated by county commissioners in November and completed in February. That investigation found that Olson's deputy district attorneys had acted with a lack of competency in failing to prepare witnesses for trial and that Olson's office had shown a lack of care for the safety of victims of crimes.

Olson initially sent a letter threatening to file suit against county commissioners in February, before changing tactics and serving the county with two subpoenas related to criminal cases being investigated by Sheriff Josh Brown and the whistleblower whose complaints had led to the investigation into her office in late April. With the subpoenas, Olson sought any complaints made against the DA's office by Brown and the whistleblower, their disciplinary records, copies of investigator's notes and recordings of interviews with them,

Commissioners accept \$1 million in state funds for horse track upgrades

Tillamook County's board of commissioners voted unanimously to accept \$1 million in state funding for upgrades to the county fairground's horse racing track, including a paddock remodeling, track regrading and the replacement or upgrading of the track's inner rail at their meeting on May 27.

Commissioners also approved a contract for a new search and rescue trailer for the sheriff's office, announced their intent to award a contract for upgrades to the Pacific City transfer station and held a first public hearing on an ordinance updating dog licensing fees.

The funds for the fairground's horse track were included in a bill passed this legislative session that directed funding to each of the five racetracks that operate at county fairgrounds around the state. Tillamook County Fair Director Camy Von

Seggern appeared at the meeting and discussed the projects that the \$1 million in funding would support.

One of the bigger projects that will be funded is either an upgrade or replacement of the track's inner rail, which Von Seggern said would cost up to \$200,000. Von Seggern said that if a new rail was purchased, it would be removable and that there were breakaway options for the railing made of PVC piping.

Another major project that will be supported by the funding is a remodeling of the track's paddock area, which currently has horse stalls in a back-to-back configuration that Von Seggern said is dangerous for the horses using it. Racetrack staff have created a plan to reconfigure the paddock to remove the danger, while maintaining the existing structure.

Von Seggern said that racetrack staff are also looking at ways to expand the fair's available 200 stalls and stables at the racetrack after more than

250 horses came to last year's fair, requiring portable stalls be brought in. Von Seggern said that staff were either looking to continue renting portable stalls using the funds or to add a building with 20-40 stalls under a roof and no additional features.

The funding will also be used to purchase and install a \$15,000 track-warning system to alert the public to loose horses, undertake a regrading of the track that is needed every three years, extend fiber optic cable to the track's parimutuel room and eventually to the paddocks and barn, support the racing purse for next year's event and potentially purchase a new tractor.

The new rescue trailer will cost the county \$155,000 and replace one that had been cobbled together through the years by sheriff's office staff and volunteers. Commissioners also approved a notice of intent to award a \$2.1-million contract to Knottworks Construction for improvements to the Pacific City transfer station.

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Tillamook choir wins state championship

Building on two top five finishes in the last two years, the Tillamook High School Choir won its first ever state championship on May 8, at Oregon State University.

The victory came as the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) prepares to move away from the championship model for choirs next year, in favor of a ratings-based system at the state competition. Terence Madlangbayan, Tillamook High School's first-year choir director, said that he was proud of this year's accomplishment and looking forward to building the program into a perennial top-level performer.

"If you want to build a great program, you have to start from the ground up," Madlangbayan said, "you have to build foundational skills and you have to build structures in place. That way, excellence isn't something that you just kind of strive for but it's a habit that you are continuously building because you have that structure and you have that routine."

Madlangbayan arrived in Tillamook this year after several years serving as a substitute teacher around the Willamette Valley, following a stint in Orlando, Florida, at the 4,000-student Freedom High School, where he spent three years as an associate director and one year as director after graduating from Oregon State University.

When he took over, Madlangbayan said that he expected this year to be a rebuilding one for the choir, after a strong group of seniors graduated last year, leaving him to recruit new singers to fill more than half the spots in the concert choir, which

competes in OSAA competitions, this year.

Over the course of the year, the choir cohered, performing 23 times in public concerts throughout the school year and in four OSAA competitions after winter break.

In competition, the choir performed five songs selected by Madlangbayan related to the theme of "If Music be the Food of Love." "I thought that putting a program together like this, exploring all of these different facets of love, made for kind of an engaging program, and it was fun for the kids and fun for us to perform," Madlangbayan said.

The set began with "Kua Rongo Mai Koe," a Maori welcome haka, arranged by Eddie Quaid, followed by "O Große Lieb" by Johann Sebastian Bach, "If Music be the Food of Love" by David Dickau, "Sehati" a traditional Malaysian song, and "The

Ballad of the One-Armed Man" composed by Timothy Michael Powell.

The Tillamook choir qualified for the state choir festival when it won the Cowapa League championship in April and competed at Oregon State University on May 8. Tillamook scored a 291 out of 360 possible points, edging out second-place Estacada by four points.

Moving forward, the OSAA will be moving to a new competition format, matching every other state across the nation. While retaining the same scoring rubric, with 300 points awarded for the rehearsed performance and 60 points available in a sight-singing demonstration, a champion will no longer be named for each division, with trophies rather awarded to choirs that meet certain points thresholds.

Madlangbayan said that he was excited for the switch, as

his goal in preparing choirs was to have them sound good, not better than other choirs. He also noted that only one team across all divisions in the state competition would have qualified for the highest award under the new system.

Madlangbayan also said that he is working on starting a booster club to support performing arts in the school district, after hearing that there were many community members who wanted to support students' artistic pursuits. Madlangbayan said that the group would likely lead fundraising efforts and volunteer to help with performances or other events, and invited anybody interested in participating to reach out to him.

"I heard that there's a lot of people who are really, really wanting to support the kids in some way, but they just don't know how to do it," Madlangbayan said. "And so now, that's what I'm trying to figure out."

Salmonberry Trail Executive Council adopts charter

At their meeting on May 21, the members of the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department's Salmonberry Trail Executive Council approved a charter for their group and discussed their roles and responsibilities.

The council replaces the Salmonberry Trail Intergovernmental Agency (STIA), which oversaw the trail for a decade before sunseting at the end of last year, and will work with the Salmonberry Trail Foundation and local governments to get the trail built.

Jessica Horning from the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) started the meeting, the group's second, by telling the council members that the group's name was still up for discussion after their initial meeting in February. Horning said that four of the council's members have already contributed their share of the money needed to hire a staffer to support the council, with the last payment in process.

Since the group's initial meeting, Horning said that Oregon's Surface Transportation Board had issued an order naming OPRD the trail manager for the Salmonberry Trail. Oregon's Department of Justice had reviewed the lease reassignment

agreement with the Port of Tillamook Bay for the rail corridor as well, Horning said, and she was hopeful that it would be completed by the end May, at which point STIA officially dissolves. When the agreement is complete, the trail will also be covered by OPRD's insurance.

Horning then moved into a discussion of the group's charter, saying that after feedback from the group, its name had been changed from Salmonberry Trail Council to Salmonberry Trail Executive Council to better reflect the executive-level representation from different partners.

Under the charter, the executive council will consist of representatives from the Port of Tillamook Bay, the rails' owner, the Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad, which leases portions of the rails, OPRD, the Oregon Department of Forestry, Tillamook and Washington Counties and the Salmonberry Trail Foundation, as well as ex-officio members from the Confederated Tribes of the Grande Ronde and Explore Tualatin Valley.

It will be the port's responsibility to approve leases

for the rails and give final approval for trail work. OPRD will serve as the trail's manager, approving new segments and encroachments, signing segment-operating agreements with local entities and providing staff to the council for technical support. The railroad will be asked to approve agreements relating to and entry for trail building in the sections of the line where it operates.

The rest of the executive council's non-ex-officio members are being referred to as sponsors for the trail and are expected to provide leadership on the council and technical aid and operations staff for working groups under the council, identify champions who will build the trail itself, and lead the land use reviews needed to construct the trail.

Trail champions, such as the cities of Rockaway Beach and Wheeler, will be tasked with the actual construction, operation and maintenance of trail segments. So far, OPRD has one signed operating agreement with Wheeler for an in-development section of trail, though Horning said that number will grow.

The Salmonberry Trail Foundation will retain an important role, Horning said, working to form public-private partnerships in support of the trail, procure funding to support construction, operations and maintenance, and lead public engagement with the trail.

Executive council members unanimously adopted the proposed charter.

Council members then briefly discussed the need for a technical advisory group to address more specific questions about the trail's construction, but left decisions on the matter for a future meeting.

Salmonberry Trail Foundation Board Member Michael Neunzert then discussed ongoing work on trail sections, saying that the new three-and-a-half foot wide, gravel trail that began construction in Wheeler last summer is making good progress, though no opening date has been set. The Catalyst Loop section of the trail in Washington County near L.L. Stub Stewart State Park is nearing the end of a nearly three-year permitting process, Neunzert said.

Free Fishing Weekend June 6-7

Everyone can fish, clam and crab for free in Oregon on Saturday and Sunday, June 6-7, 2026.

No fishing/shellfish licenses or tags/validations are required on these days (meaning you do not need a Combined Angling Tag, Columbia River Basin Endorsement, Ocean Endorsement or two-rod validation where two rods are allowed). Both Oregon residents and nonresidents can fish for free. Oregon State Parks also offers free parking on Saturday, June 6.

All other fishing regulations apply including closures, gear restrictions, bag limits, and size restrictions. Visit the Online Regulations page before you head out and remember to check myodfw.com for any in season regulation

changes, especially for salmon and steelhead fishing.

Drought conditions make a difference this year. Some smaller lakes and ponds might already be warming up, so consider fishing early in the day or changing it up to warm water fish like bass, bluegill and crappie.

The Recreation Report is updated weekly and features the best bets for fishing for the upcoming week. Check out the weekly Recreation Report for zone reports and opportunities near you. Expect lots of rainbow trout to be stocked in Oregon's ponds and lakes for the weekend; check out the trout stocking schedule for more information and stocking locations.

Crabbing & clamming

Free Fishing Weekend is also a great weekend to

try clamming or crabbing. Visit ODFW.com for all the information you need to get started clamming or crabbing including maps of locations and how-tos.

The Oregon Department of Agriculture regularly tests shellfish and closes areas when naturally occurring biotoxins get to levels that make crabs and clams unsafe to eat. As of today, razor clamming is open from the WA border to Cape Blanco and closed from Cape Blanco to the CA border due to elevated levels of domoic acid. Crabbing is open coast-wide.

Closures can happen quickly and may change before Free Fishing Weekend. Remember to call the ODA Shellfish safety hotline at 1-800-448-2474 or check their shellfish ODA Food Safety page before you go.

Camp Tillamook offers youth new hope

Camp Tillamook Youth Transition Program sits south of town, just across from the Tillamook Air Museum. While residents may not know it's there, it has been actively partnering to make Tillamook better for roughly 20 years.

This year, for Public Service Recognition Week, the State of Oregon honored that sustained dedication by naming the facility's leadership — Director Jim Sapper and Assistant Director Dean Jones — as "Public Service Ambassadors." Yet both leaders are quick to note that their approach to public service requires robust partnerships with their staff, community organizations, and youth.

In Oregon's juvenile justice system, Camp Tillamook represents a distinct opportunity. Courts will commit youth with the greatest needs to a youth correctional facility. When youth are ready to leave that setting, they may not be completely ready to return to the community. Transition programs like Camp Tillamook serve these youth, providing greater freedom and flexibility to youth while keeping them in secure, supervised settings. Youth may go outside the fence to work, recreate and begin building the skills they need to live in the community.

At their core, these programs instill routine and structure. As Sapper explains, when youth arrive, staff get them doing "the stuff we have to do as adults": "get up every morning and make your bed, do your chores, and get working." Assistant Director Dean Jones notes this is a shift for youth coming from correctional facilities, where staff

give directions and youth must follow. At Camp, Jones says, they want youth to say, "I need to get some things in order before I go out in the community and [staff] can help me do that."

Jones observed that, when he and Sapper began at Camp nine years ago, "we prioritized work," youth needed to have jobs. Thankfully, they didn't need to look far for opportunities: OYA's property included a native plant nursery, run in partnership with the Tillamook Estuaries Partnership (TEP), with room to expand it. At the time, four or five youth were working two to three days a week, but Sapper met with TEP, committed to staffing the

nursery full-time, and encouraged them to, "just grow, grow, grow."

With youth working alongside TEP staff, the native plant nursery has grown significantly and now distributes over 75,000 plants each year — plants which leave both the environment and coastal communities stronger. TEP Nursery Crew Lead Steve Sprague views the nursery as the starting point for both the plants and youth: "we give them the best start we can" so plants and youth alike might "radiate out from this place and do good things everywhere."

"And if we let these kids fall through the cracks,"

Sprague reasons, "that's not good for anybody." "It's like this chain reaction," adds Claire Engelen, the nursery's partnership coordinator. But working together, TEP and Camp Tillamook produce a very different chain reaction — one where TEP-grown plants thrive along coastal estuaries while the youth who tended them as seedlings go on to live crimefree lives. These partnerships serve the public, Sprague notes, by leaving both environment and youth "better than how we found [them]."

Youth are also, hopefully, better connected to the public through their work for the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Camp Tillamook's crew maintains trails, clear brush, and keeps National Wildlife lands accessible, healthy, and safe. Visitor Services Manager Dawn Harris feels honored to help Americans access their public lands, and "I want [youth] to feel that sense of pride," she says, and for them to "feel some ownership." "Their hands, their time, their work made that change," and they can, "bring their family out here in five or ten years and say, 'I planted these trees.'" Harris hopes youth can turn inward and say to themselves, "I have made a connection with nature and now I care."

Caring is a hallmark of all Camp Tillamook's partnerships, which is one of the many reasons they are ambassadors of public service. Ultimately, though, their service is measured in healthier salmon, cleaner water, better access to public lands and in every crimefree life that unfolds after the person leaves.

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Busy construction season ahead for Highway 6

With Memorial Day past, contractors have begun or are in progress on several large maintenance projects on Oregon Highway 6 that will impact travel throughout the summer months.

Repaving is taking place just outside of Tillamook, guard rails are being replaced along the entire corridor and the bridge over the Devil's Lake Fork of the Wilson River is undergoing a reconditioning.

The repaving project between mileposts four and nine has a \$9.2-million budget and expected timeline of six to eight

weeks, depending on the weather. Work began last week, with crews removing the existing driving surface ahead of repaving, and began work on bridges in the section. After the first several weeks, work will move from the daytime to night, allowing both lanes of traffic to remain open during the day, with intermittent lane closures during work.

The guard rail replacement project has a \$10.3-million budget and will see all guardrails between mileposts 0 and 51 replaced with upgraded barriers. Crews began work in Tillamook and have already completed work on bridges and through mile-

post 10, with the project scheduled for completion at some point in 2027. Single-lane closures will occur around work.

The final project taking place in the corridor is the \$6.5-million rehabilitation of the bridge over the Devil's Lake Fork of the Wilson River. An Oregon Department of Transportation spokeswoman said that the project is around 50% complete, as crews work to remove rust and worn-out bolts and rivets from the structure, before replacing the latter and repainting the bridge. The work is expected to be completed during the summer with some intermittent single-lane closures possible.

and materials used to prepare for those interviews.

The county responded with motions to quash the subpoenas, arguing that they represented a fishing expedition by Olson as she attempted to retaliate against Brown and the whistleblower, and calling on Olson to remove herself from the case due to her conflict of interest in the case.

In response, Olson filed objections to the motions to quash, in which she renewed her assertion that Brown and the whistleblower had provided "exaggerated, inaccurate, or otherwise false statements to the investigator."

Olson also argued that the whistleblower's complaints could be considered evidence of a bias that would require disclosure to opposing counsel in cases he investigated, and that Brown "may have exculpatory evidence within his personnel record, as I have learned of an incident in which he may have lied or attempted to conceal evidence in a personnel investigation." Olson acknowledged in the filing that she did not know the date of the alleged incident involving Brown.

Olson concluded the objections by writing that she was not opposed to finding

a special deputy district attorney to represent the state in the court proceedings related to the subpoenas and asked for a 30-day delay to allow her time to find a person to fill that role.

In a pleading filed in response to Olson's objections, Cadotte renewed the county's opposition to the subpoenas, arguing that Olson had still failed to meet the legal requirements for obtaining the documents, as her arguments were based on opinions rather than facts.

"DA Olson bases her request for the list of materials laid out in the subpoena duces tecum on a general basis that in her personal opinion the complaints made against her were exagger-

ated and therefore potentially Brady material, without providing any facts or reasons to support a belief that the information sought is exculpatory," Cadotte wrote. "The request has limited limitations, is unreasonable, oppressive, and overbroad."

Cadotte also reiterated that Oregon law does not permit discovery to test whether information helps or hurts a defendant's case and noted that Olson did not even respond to that argument or the others laid out by the county in the motions to quash.

There is no date set for a hearing in the matter currently as Olson continues to seek a special deputy to represent the state in the matter.

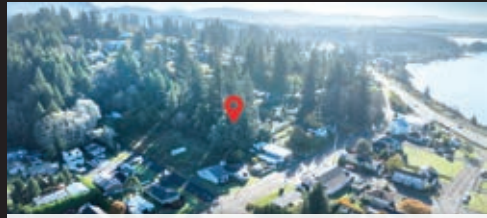

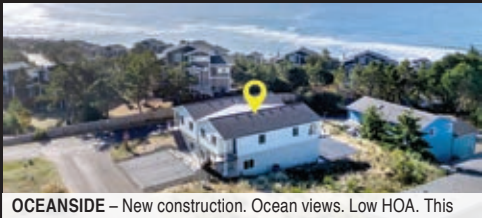

not hear much from television on anyone planning anything special. It feels like a forgotten event. Garibaldi has not directly celebrated July 4th for a long time – I remember when the city had fireworks for both July 4th and for Garibaldi Days. It is a bit late to think of fireworks or a parade. Does anyone have any ideas?

The Garibaldi Emergency Volunteers focus this month is on protecting your home from wildfire. Defensible space is the buffer you create around your home to protect it from wildfire. The flyer that is out now provides you with ten tips to consider in creating and maintaining that buffer of protection. These tips include landscaping choices for the five feet closest to your home; removing debris or other combustible materials from the roof, gutter, and decks; keeping combustible items like furniture, trash cans, outdoor rugs at least five feet away from your home; moving burnable material like firewood piles at least 30 feet away from your home. Keeping your lawn green is another way to provide defensible space – green grass is harder to burn. The flyer is up at the Post Office, and you can scan the code and request a free defensible space assessment. Or go to defensiblespace.oregon.gov for additional information.

Speaking of defensible space, if you want to burn some of that excess debris, you do need a burn permit from the city. “Open burning” is regulated by the Garibaldi Fire Department and subject to city code and state laws. Burn barrels are also covered by these regulations. Generally burning is allowed until June 30th or earlier, depending on fire conditions in our area. Burn Permits are provided at no cost to city residents. You can stop by the Fire Department, or the Fire Chief's office at City Hall, to obtain a permit.

And for my last two hundred words I ventured into the Garibaldi Branch Library and spoke to everyone's favorite librarian, June Eckborg. It is almost summer, so I thought I would get the branch library's schedule of events. Here they are. Every Tuesday there is Tuesday Tea. Enjoy a cup of tea while you browse the shelves for the perfect book to read on your patio. Every Friday there is Storytime for the kids – a fun way to wrap up the week. On the second Tuesday of the month, the library holds the adult craft and chat for those who have a creative interest. And on the third Tuesday the book club meets for fun conversations about books; the book this month is *The Snow Child* by Eowyn Ivey. The summer reading program begins Monday June 15th – this is a program for all ages and includes activities, programs, and prizes, so come out and see what adventures you can find.

All branch libraries will be closed on June 4th for staff training and again on June 19th in observation of the Juneteenth holiday. Summer is almost upon us.

tightened slightly, 41.8% of voters selecting Lyon and 37.3% choosing Hamalian, while 20.3% made no selection.

As of the update, 49.4% of registered voters in Tillamook County had returned ballots in the elec-

tion and the results were expected to change minimally as voters with challenged or absent signature have until June 9, to cure their ballots, ahead of a final certification deadline of June 15.

Opposed to Beaver School development

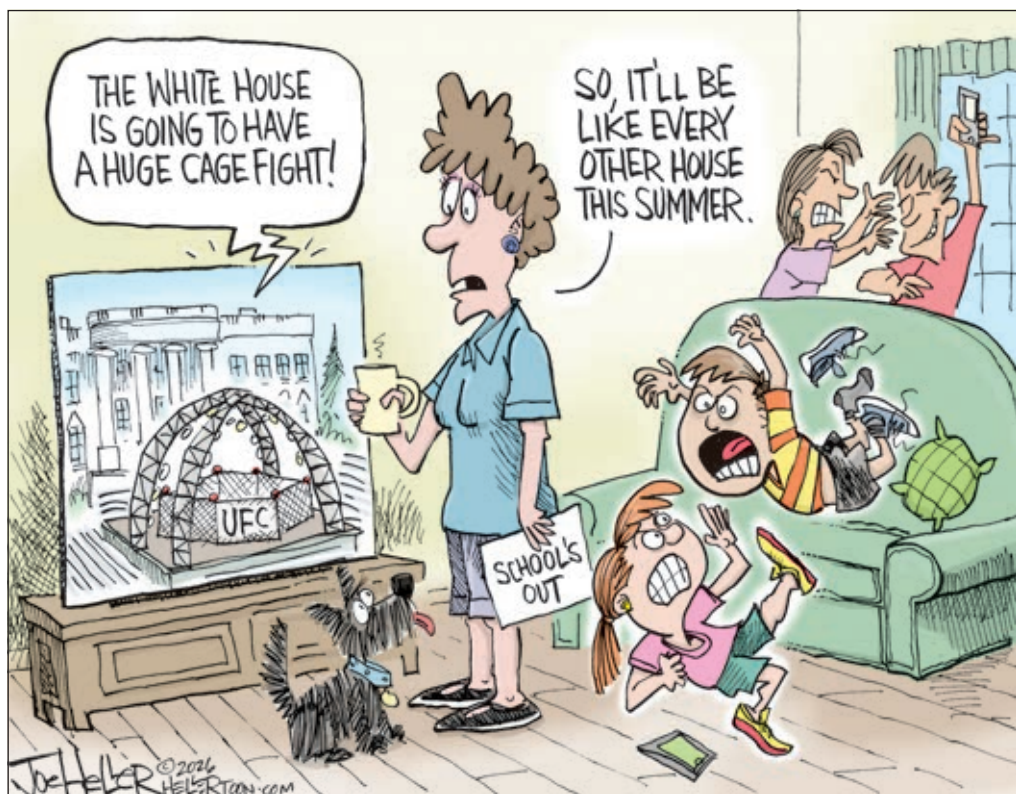

Cheesemaker baseball advances in tourney

The No. 12-ranked Tillamook High Cheesemakers have enjoyed tremendous success this year as they reached the OSAA/OnPoint Community Credit Union Class 4A baseball state tournament quarterfinals for the first time in 13 years.

The Mooks (7-5 Cowapa League, 16-10 overall) qualified for the 16-team state playoffs after concluding the regular season with five straight wins, including a 9-0 home

win May 21, over the St. Helens Lions (4-8 league, 8-17 overall). The Mooks took second place in the five-team league standings behind the No. 2-ranked league champion Scappoose High Indians (11-1 league, 21-6 overall).

Junior right-hander Kevin Hurliman pitched a no-hitter to help lead the Mooks to the win over Lions. The Mooks were led offensively by senior Jakoby Goss (3-for-3, three RBI) and Tristan Smith-Evans (2-for-3, two RBI).

Tillamook, guided by interim Coach Travis Mon-

crief and assistant Coach Taylor Fosbind, advanced to the playoffs for a second straight year and third time in the last five years. The Mooks faced the No. 5-ranked Hidden Valley High Mustangs (21-6) in a May 26 first-round road game at Grants Pass. In what was certainly considered as an upset, the Mooks recorded a 6-4 victory over the Mustangs to reach a May 29 home quarterfinal matchup versus the Estacada High Rangers (see separate story).

"It sure felt good to get a big road win in the

playoffs at Hidden Valley," said Moncrief, a 1990 Tillamook graduate. "Now we get to have a home game in the playoffs, which is very exciting."

Starting pitcher Goss tossed a five hitter and had six strikeouts in six innings to help lead the Mooks to their fifth consecutive win. Hurliman pitched in the seventh inning in relief to help the Mooks hold on for the victory.

The Mooks had nine hits and were led offensively by Hurliman (2-for-2, two walks) and Jefferson Percy (2-for-3, walk). The Mooks

built a 2-0 first inning advantage with a two-out rally on an RBI double by Hurliman and an RBI single by Percy and led from start to finish for the win.

"The kids deserved to win, and we knew we had the talent and we just kind of had to help point them in the right direction," said Moncrief. "I have to give them credit because they've bought into everything and we're playing really well and we'll see if we can continue to keep on winning."

After the Mustangs trimmed the margin to 2-1

in the third, the Mooks scored four runs in the fifth, extending their lead to 6-2 in the fifth, which was followed by scoreless sixth. The Mustangs then scored two in the seventh for the final margin.

"We set the tone early and we had baserunners in every inning," said Moncrief. "We continued to put pressure on them (Mustangs) throughout the entire contest. They came back and got a couple of runs in the seventh to kind of make it interesting, but we were able to finish out the game to get the win."

Tillamook baseball advances to state semifinals

Tillamook High School's baseball team advanced to the semifinal of the state tournament with a dominant 10-4 win over the Estacada Rangers at East Elementary School on May 29.

Led by an outstanding performance on the mound from Kevin Hurliman and exceptional base running, the Mooks jumped out to an early 4-0 lead in the first inning, which they extended to 6-0 in the second. Estacada narrowed the margin to two in the top of the sixth, but the Cheesemakers responded with a four-run inning of their own before sealing the victory in the seventh behind a close from Jefferson Percy.

Tillamook will play at Henley in the semifinals today, with a trip to the championship game on the line.

The matchup at East Elementary School drew a crowd of hundreds to cheer on the Cheesemakers in their first home playoff game since 1991, following a 6-4 victory at Hidden Valley earlier in the week.

Hurliman started strong

in the first, retiring the first two batters before an error by a fielder allowed a Ranger to reach first, which Hurliman followed with a strikeout to end the inning.

After a groundout by lead-off man Tristan Smith-Evans, Aden Garcia drew a walk and immediately stole second base, before reaching third on a wild pitch. The Rangers' pitcher also walked Jakoby Goss, and when he tried to pick Goss off at first and the throw went wild, Garcia stole home and Goss was able to reach third.

Hurliman, the next batter up, also drew a walk and quickly stole second, putting two runners in scoring position for Percy, who came up big with a single that allowed both Goss and Hurliman to score, pushing the Mooks' lead to 3-0. After Percy stole second and Chance Fletcher struck out, Tyler Larson doubled to bring Percy home, extending the advantage to 4-0.

Larson also stole second and batter Joshua Manns made contact, but a strong throw from the outfield beat Larson to home plate where he was tagged out, bringing the ending to an end.

Estacada again failed to gain any traction in the top of the second, with their lead-off man lining out, second batter reaching first on a walk, third batter striking out and the inning concluding when the base runner was picked off at third following a hit.

Vincent Maciel led off the second for Tillamook and was hit by a pitch, drawing a substitution by Lakota Navarre for base-running duties. In his second at bat, Smith-Evans singled up the middle before Garcia loaded the bases with a single. Goss flew out, as did Hurliman on a pop up in foul territory, but Percy tacked on another two runs with a single, bumping his RBI total for the afternoon to four and the Mooks' lead to 6-0, before the inning ended with a Fletcher ground out.

Both offenses were quiet in the third inning, before Estacada loaded the bases but failed to score in the fourth, the Mooks failed to score in the bottom of the frame and both teams were scoreless in the fifth, with Tillamook leaving two men on base. Hurliman added four more strikeouts across the three innings, including

one to end the fourth after loading the bases.

In the top of the sixth, Estacada's offense finally stirred, with back-to-back singles to lead off the inning and a hit-by-pitch walk loading the bases and setting up a three-RBI double cutting the lead in half after a strikeout. A groundout followed and another walk, before a single drove in an additional run to trim the advantage to 6-4 before a strikeout ended the inning.

Estacada's pitching failed to match the rally, and in the bottom of the sixth, Tillamook leadoff man Garcia drew a walk and stole second, before Goss also drew

a walk. Hurliman flew out to deep center as did Percy, but after a wild pitch while Fletcher was at the plate allowed Garcia and Goss to advance, the Rangers walked Fletcher, loading the bases.

Larson drew a walk, advancing Garcia home, before Manns also drew a walk bringing Goss in to push the lead to 8-4.

A change of pitchers preceded Maciel's at bat, but the new arm fared little better with Maciel making contact for a single and driving two more runs home to stretch the lead to 10-4, before Smith-Evans grounded out to end the inning.

Taking over for Hurl-

man, Percy gave up a double to Estacada's leadoff man in the top off the seventh, and the baserunner advanced to third on a wild pitch. But Percy settled and struck out back-to-back batters with catcher Maciel picking off the runner at third after he left the bag on the final pitch of the second batter to end the game.

With the win, Tillamook improved to 17-10 overall on the season and extended a season-long win streak to six heading into the semifinal matchup with Henley. The winner of that game will go on to face the winner of a matchup between Marist Catholic and Scappoose.

Pirate baseball wraps season

The Pirates had three players who earned SD1 All League Awards following a vote by league coaches. Lorenz and Scovel earned second-team recognition and Douma received honorable mention.
