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COVID-19 cases confirmed in Tillamook County Officials expect numbers to increase

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Three cases of COVID-19 coronavirus were confirmed in Tillamook County in the past week. County officials expect the number to go up.

The Tillamook County Public Health Department reported Sunday, March 29, there was a third positive case of coronavirus in the county. The person who was diagnosed is a south-county resident over the age of 65-years-old who is reportedly hospitalized in the Portland area and is being monitored.

On Saturday, Public Health announced the second coronavirus case in the county, a north-county resident who was reportedly convalescing at home under quarantine. The second person with COVID-19 in Tillamook County was not reported to be a contact of the county's first positive case.

The county's first case of coronavirus was reported

Thursday. That person is a health care provider between 35 and 54 years old who works at Tillamook County Community Health Centers and is said to be convalescing at home under quarantine.

"Like all health care staff, this provider and other health center staff have been using recommended precautions and personal protective equipment to limit exposure and transmission," said Lisa Steffey, Community Health Centers. "Consequently, we expect to have limited the transmission to other staff or patients."

The Community Health Centers clinic in Tillamook was closed immediately for a deep cleaning after the first case was confirmed and staff were sent home. The clinic was reopened Monday, March 30, following a Public Health investigation. Tillamook County Public Health is a department of the Tillamook County Community Health Centers.

Local Facebook group makes masks for community

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The Tillamook County Face Mask Project is working to make face masks for medical personnel, retail workers, and anyone else in the community who is wanting protection. This project began as a Facebook group about two weeks ago.

Nicole Bringuel is running dispatch and making sure the masks get delivered to where they need to go. She said Linda Machuta is spearheading the project. It started because Machuta's roommate works for urgent care and discussed the lack of face masks available. Muchuta saw this as a need. She put a post out in the county asking people to help make face masks for medical personnel, non-essential businesses, and anyone will immune-compromised or underlying medical issues. Ideally, the organization would like to get all of Tillamook covered.

Bringuel said there are two groups going right now. One in Rockaway, titled Sewing, and The Tillamook County Face Mask Project, based out of Bay City, which is trying to cover Rockaway, Nehalem, Tillamook, all the way down to Pleasant Valley and Cloverdale. Local churches are also making masks.

"We've had requests from one of the churches for 100 masks for the homeless, so we're trying to get that worked out and over to that church," Bringuel said.

They have made deliveries to Chevron, Tillamook Co-op and more. A lot of people in the community are participating.

"I'm getting ready to put a post up asking for more people to volunteer for sewing or if they can get some good quality thread and bias tape that has been sold out in the area," Bringuel said.

Bringuel said the masks are of cotton material, heavy duty material, that has been coming from Latimer Quilt and Textile Center, who is donating fabric. They are making both children and adult masks. Some are making pockets to

put extra Kleenex. Some people can sew the masks in its entirety, while others do individual steps. There are pre-cutters, people who make ties, etc.

People in the community are stepping up and using whatever material they have to make these cloth masks, Bringuel said, while following Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines of how to make masks.

"Just your basic residents in the community that can sew that say 'hey I can help,'" Bringuel said.

"We've arranged for two drivers; one on the south end, one on the north end and what they do is they go by and get the masks off the porch in a plastic bag and people are washing them ahead of time to sterilize, so they're just ready to go."

At the same time, drivers are dropping off materials to make more masks.

"If people want to make donations, they are accepted," Bringuel said. "We need good quality thread. The kind of thread that can hold up to being washed."

Bringuel said donations of bias



tape and fabric are also needed.

400 masks are needed in the community, Bringuel said.

"I went to the oncology group at Adventist Health, we've had masks go to Urgent Care, we are getting ready to send more out to the community for people who are compromised," Bringuel said. "We have maybe about 100 masks now."

The project has a list going and people can go to the Facebook group and post what they need, tagging Nicole Bringuel in the post.

Bringuel said they are prioritizing seniors and anyone with underlying medical conditions. A child with leukemia has requested a mask. Fred Meyer would like all staff to have masks, but the project is prioritizing the pharmacy so people can feel comfortable getting their medication.

"Everybody is working as fast as possible," Bringuel said.

Cities declare emergency status, curtail operations

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Cities on the north coast are following state and county examples by announcing a state of emergency as the coronavirus pandemic escalates.

On March 8, Gov. Kate Brown declared Oregon to be under a state of emergency. On March 11, the World Health Organization categorized COVID-19 as a pandemic threat, causing respiratory distress, potentially serious illness and loss of life. Tillamook County announced a state of emergency on March 14. April 28 was set by most as a date to reevaluate the situation.

Manzanita

Mayor Mike Scott declared an official state of emergency Wednesday, March 18, for the City of Manzanita. The state of emergency declaration provides City Manager Cynthia Alamillo with the latitude to coordinate an effective response by redirecting funding for emergency use as needed to combat the COVID-19 pandemic.

The city manager is authorized to initiate emergency request for aid from Tillamook County, State of Oregon, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency as necessary.

The city council and city staff continue to monitor the COVID-19 outbreak and want residents, second homeowners and visitors to know that they are proactively taking steps

to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the community.

The mayor has been providing frequent local video updates regarding the coronavirus pandemic via social media.

Nehalem

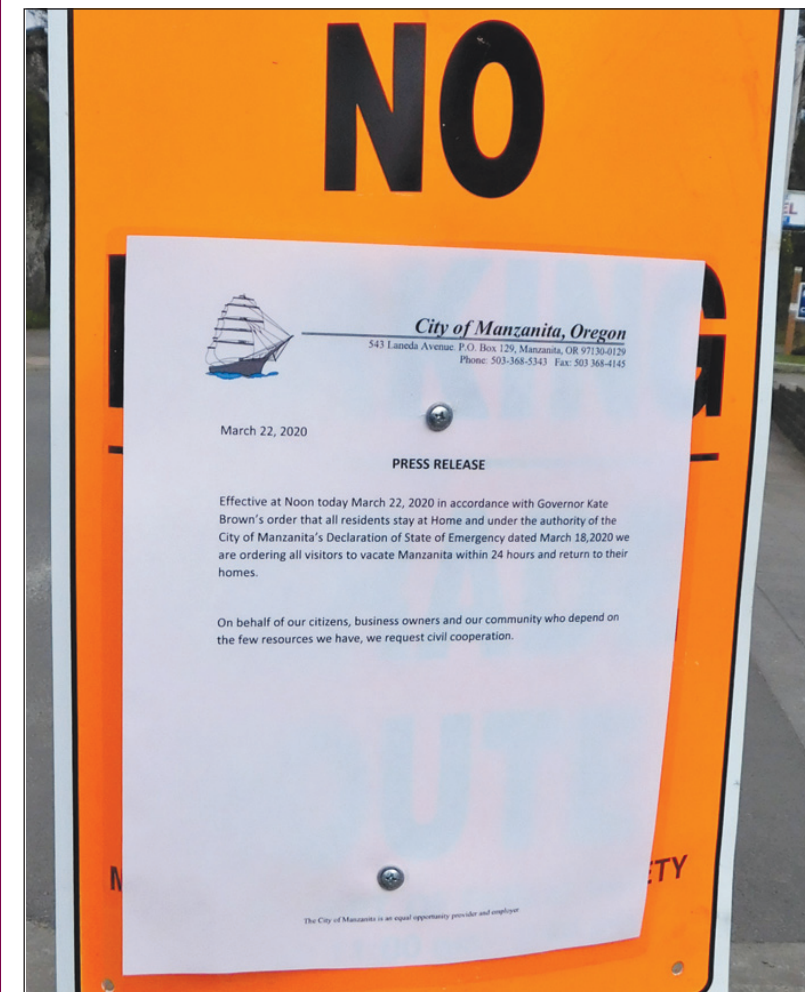
Following the local state of emergency declared for Tillamook County due to COVID-19 and social distancing measures ordered by the governor, the City of Nehalem City Hall followed the same measures effective until April 14. City Hall will be closed to walk-in traffic, and open only by appointment or for urgent business.

City staff is in contact with state and local public health authorities and will make any necessary changes to these measures as this situation continues to develop. Staff will continue to work and will be available by phone or email.

During the state of emergency, Wheeler will not perform any shut offs for basic services such as water. Payment relief will be offered and late payments will not be reported or garner late fees.

"We know how hard it will be to keep up with financial responsibilities and will try our best not to increase the stress of worrying about losing something as important as your water," Mayor Stevie Burden said on social media.

Tides of Change serves domestic violence survivors during stay at home order

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Tides of Change is adjusting their services during the current pandemic to continue to help those in need.

During times of crisis, such as COVID-19, survivors are going to tend to stay in place in their relationships largely because of lack of options and being told to shelter in place, said Valerie Bundy, executive director of Tides of Change. Isolation and financial distress are two factors that contribute to the escalation of domestic violence and can increase lethality.

"It is important to know that these factors are not causes of domestic violence and typically some level of violence already exists in the

relationship/home," Bundy said. "We know through experience that once the crisis begins to stabilize is when survivors will start seeking services."

Bundy said Tides of Change has had a decrease in survivors accessing the office this week and are expecting that will be inundated with requests for help after the stay in place orders become lifted. Not knowing how long this crisis will last is the most concerning for the staff regarding survivors and their safety.

Bundy said Tides of Change is no longer having walk-in services for the safety of the staff. The staff, including the advocate and counselor, are working remotely.

"The advocates will deter-

mine through the phone if a crisis requires an in-person response depending on the scenario," Bundy said. "Thankfully we have the use of technology for our staff to work remotely."

Tides of Change has a close relationship with all law enforcement in Tillamook County through a protocol called Advocacy Initiated Response (AIR).

"Our law enforcement activates the AIR protocol any time they respond to a domestic violence call, which connects the victim to an advocate immediately," Bundy said.

Tides of Change will continue to have limited crisis and counseling services available to survivors in the community, Bundy said. The counselor continues to provide on-

going sessions to her current clients through phone and video options. For children, she provided play therapy. She is scheduling check-in phone calls for those that want to stay in contact.

"Our advocates are scheduling appointments with survivors over the phone and they are answering our helpline as normal," Bundy said. "Advocates will be able to provide support, safety planning and resources."

Assistance with obtaining protective orders will be discussed on a case by case basis between the advocate and survivor. Bundy said they are taking this crisis week by week and adjusting their services as they see fit.

Their emergency shelter is at

capacity and they expect that the current residents will need to reside in the program longer, due to this crisis and lack of options to move out of the shelter at this time. Their shelter houses up to six households at a time. A household can be between one to six people depending on the number of children with the survivor. All six rooms are occupied at this time.

Social distancing a must to protect health care system

The fight against the coronavirus depends on Oregon hospitals having enough beds to treat the coming surge in patients who will become seriously ill with the virus.

Oregon health officials and hospitals have announced a joint statewide action plan to dramatically bolster the state's ability to treat people with COVID-19 illness who need hospital care.

The plan was developed by the "Governor's Joint Task Force for Health Care Systems Response to COVID-19," convened by the Oregon Health Authority (OHA). It includes a broad range of health systems, health care providers, human services organizations, public health and public safety agencies, insurers and other organizations needed in the battle.

The plan addresses four urgent actions necessary to expand the health care system's capacity and maintain its capability as Oregon braces for a projected spike in new coronavirus cases:

Procure and distribute critical medical supplies, including personal protective equipment (PPE) for health care workers and ventilators.

Optimize hospital capacity to be able to treat COVID-19 cases.

Mobilize the health care workforce to respond to COVID-19.

Maintain a unified, coordinated and transparent emergency response to COVID-19.

New projections of COVID-19 cases in Oregon show the state is at a critical moment in the fight against the disease. Social distancing measures could alter the

trajectory of new infections, which gives Oregon's health care system the chance to ramp up to meet the coming surge.

But the state has little margin for error. A return to "business as usual" or slight differences in actual infection rates (compared to projected ones) could swamp hospitals with more coronavirus cases than they could treat.

"Hospital leaders and health officials are doing their part to find beds, secure supplies and protect health care workers. Oregonians can make a difference too: stay home and save lives," Gov. Kate Brown said. "We all have a role to play in an unprecedented, unified effort across Oregon to stop the coronavirus from taking the tragic toll we've seen it claim elsewhere."

State agencies, hospitals

and health care providers have already begun to implement the plan. The state is collecting PPE for re-distribution to facilities in need. Regional hospitals have signed mutual aid agreements to shift equipment, workforce and patients from overburdened facilities to others with adequate capacity.

The state is working with providers to stand-up alternate care locations (such as the Oregon Medical Station), identify and develop new alternate care sites, enable ambulatory care centers to house patients and re-purpose long-term care facilities.

The state and hospitals are sharing hospital bed utilization data so hospitals can manage the use of beds and equipment across their region. The state is developing childcare options for health care workers, so their work isn't interrupted by school closings and family responsibilities.

"Oregon's health care system began preparing for a pandemic years ago, which gave us a head start on this plan," OHA Director Patrick Allen said. "From expanding testing to securing more

ventilators for Oregon hospitals, we are united by a set of common strategies to save lives in every corner of the state."

The latest models state health officials released today forecast the following outcomes for three different scenarios:

Return to business as usual: If Oregon lifted all the social distancing measures state leaders have instituted in recent weeks, there will be an estimated 15,000 cumulative infections by May 8 (within a range of 5,900-26,000). Approximately 1,100 people would need inpatient beds (850 AAC/250 ICU) across Oregon.

Maintain bans on large gatherings and indefinite school closures: There would be an estimated 6,100 cumulative infections by May 8 (within a range of 2,000-12,000) and 340 people will need inpatient beds (260 AAC/80 ICU).

Maintain aggressive interventions with high public adherence: There will be an estimated 1,000 (within a possible range of 700-3,800) cumulative infections by May 8. Under this scenario, hospitals would have to boost capacity by a smaller

number of beds.

The models show that only aggressive interventions such as the 'Stay Home, Save Lives' executive order the governor issued on Monday, March 23, are predicted to decrease the number of active infections.

The models state health officials released today were prepared by the Institute for Disease Modeling (IDM). While similar to projections completed earlier by researchers at Oregon Health and Sciences University (OHSU), these newer models from IDM take into account the impact of community-level social distancing interventions, which were not incorporated into the OHSU study.

Researchers from OHSU and other hospitals are collaborating with OHA to forecast the COVID-19 burden for their specific hospitals based on this information.

Dr. Dean Sidelinger, state health officer at OHA, said: "These projections tell us the sacrifices Oregonians are making right now can save lives. At the same time, they paint a dark picture of what could happen. We can't afford to drop our guard."

Driver charged with manslaughter in fatal wreck

A Tillamook man was killed in a crash on Tillamook River Road Sunday, March 29.

At around 4:46 p.m., Tillamook County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) and other emergency personnel responded to Tillamook River Road near Burton Road for a single-vehicle crash.

TCSO said an investigation indicated a 2008 Chevy four-door sedan driven by 30-year-old Christian Chavez of Tillamook was northbound on Tillamook River Road, reportedly at a high rate of speed prior to the wreck.

TCSO said Chavez lost control on a sharp corner and crashed. Inside the vehicle

was a passenger, 25-year-old Pedro Garcia of Tillamook. Chavez left the vehicle and made his way to a nearby residence where he asked for help.

Garcia was pronounced dead at the scene by emergency personnel.

Chavez was taken to Tillamook Adventist for evaluation. TCSO said he was found to be impaired at the time of the crash. Chavez was arrested for a warrant and second-degree manslaughter and taken to the Tillamook County Jail.

Tighter social distancing rules: 'Stay home, save lives'

Gov. Kate Brown Monday, March 23, issued Executive Order 20-12, directing everyone in Oregon to stay at home to the maximum extent possible and adding to the list of businesses that will be temporarily closed to stem the spread of COVID-19 in Oregon. The order is effective immediately and remains in effect until ended by the governor.

Brown's remarks follow:

"We are learning more about this virus and how people react to it every day. Not just from a medical standpoint, but from a social and behavioral standpoint.

"I started by asking Oregonians to stay home and practice social distancing. Then I urged the public to follow these recommendations. Instead, thousands crowded the beaches of our coastal communities, our trails, our parks, and our city streets, potentially spreading COVID-19 and endangering the lives of others across the state. Now, I'm

ordering it. To save lives and protect our community.

"Today, I am issuing a new executive order further requiring social distancing measures because we know this is the most effective way to flatten the curve and slow the spread of this virus. I hope everyone in Oregon abides by its core message: stay home unless absolutely necessary.

"Staying home both keeps you safe from infection and ensures you do not unknowingly infect others.

"We've already put a number of measures forward specifically aimed at increasing hospital capacity, such as cutting down on non-emergency care, so we conserve masks, gloves, and gowns to save the lives of the health care workers who are working so hard to save others. All of these things add up, and by slowing the infection rate, we preserve

Tillamook School District provides supplemental learning opportunities

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Tillamook School District is working to provide supplemental learning opportunities to its students. For Grades K-11, grade level appropriate packets will be mailed out by Friday, April 3.

Superintendent Curt Shelley said the packets were selected to include English Language Arts and Mathematics practice for each grade K-11. PreK packets are developmentally appropriate in their use of at home learning activities.

"Students in grades PreK-1 will also receive a story that guardians can read to

their students about why they are not going to school," Shelley said. "The packets include materials that are being utilized by other school districts, in Oregon and across the country."

In addition to the packets, the district has learning activities, eBooks, virtual lessons and videos available on their district COVID-19 website.

These packets are meant to last three weeks. If the student receives special education services, 504 services, and/or EL services, they may receive additional packets for different learning opportunities. The student's

hospital beds so that there will be one available if and when you need it.

"None of us have ever been through this before, and that means there is no way to know exactly what lies ahead. We don't know yet when this outbreak will end, or what changes this will bring for our state and for our country. But I want to make sure that we've done all we can to end it as quickly as possible."

About the order:

All non-essential social and recreational gatherings of individuals are prohibited immediately, regardless of size, if a distance of at least six feet between individuals cannot be maintained. Gatherings of members of the same residential household are permitted.

It closes and prohibits shopping at specific categories of retail businesses, for which close personal contact is difficult to avoid, such as arcades, barber shops, hair salons, gyms and fitness studios, skating rinks, theaters, and yoga studios.

It requires businesses not closed by the order to implement social distancing policies in order to remain open and requires workplaces to implement teleworking and work-at-home options when possible.

It directs Oregonians to stay home whenever possible, while permitting activities outside the home when social distance is maintained.

It closes playgrounds, sports courts, and skate parks, among other types of outdoor recreation facilities. Those that remain open are required to strictly adhere to social distancing guidelines.

It outlines new guidelines for child care facilities, setting limits and rules on amounts of children allowed in care, and outlining that child care groups may not change participants.

Failure to comply with the order will be considered an immediate danger to public health and subject to a Class C misdemeanor.

The governor's office said following the order would

save lives while still allowing businesses to function if they can protect employees and customers through social distancing.

While many businesses and organizations that are heavily dependent on foot traffic and in-person interactions have already closed or will close under the expanded order, other businesses that make robust plans to meet social distancing requirements—and enforce those requirements—may remain in operation, preserving jobs while ensuring health.

This distinction from closing all businesses except for those categorized as essential as mandated in other states, aims to minimize unintended consequences and add clarity for businesses who can adjust their business models to accommodate vital social distancing measures.

"This order is designed to flatten the curve over the coming weeks, preserving scarce hospital space and equipment. It will also ensure that any place of business that remains operational does its part to enforce social distancing rules," Brown said. "It is designed to be more sustainable over time, to allow Oregonians to keep their jobs when their work does not add to the growth of COVID-19 in Oregon."

Retail businesses closed by Executive Order 20-12 include:

Shopping: Outdoor and indoor malls and retail complexes, although individual types of businesses not subject to the measures may stay open.

Fitness: Gyms, sports and fitness centers, health clubs, and exercise studios

Grooming: Barbershops, beauty and nail salons, and non-medical wellness spas

Entertainment: Theaters, amusement parks, arcades, bowling alleys, and pool halls

Other retail businesses will not be able to continue to operate unless they can implement strict social distancing measures and designate an employee or officer charged with ensuring compliance. Retail businesses able to adapt to take-out style shopping experiences can also remain open.

If businesses can have employees work from home, then they must do so. Many

of the businesses outlined in the order have voluntarily closed their doors already, to do their part to protect Oregon's communities. In addition, non-retail businesses like manufacturers and the construction industry must ensure that their employees are maintaining social distancing measures.

Please read the full details on all businesses listed in the executive order here.

In addition to businesses, Executive Order 20-12 also orders state executive branch offices and buildings to close to the public and provide public services by phone to the extent possible. When public services require in-person interactions, the order requires social distancing measures to be implemented and enforced.

State agencies must also facilitate telework and work-at-home for state employees whenever possible. While the order does not apply to local, federal, or tribal governments, those governments are strongly encouraged to follow these directives.

The order also directs state agencies to close parks and other outdoor spaces where social distancing cannot be maintained—expanding on actions already taken by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department.

All coronavirus executive orders will be posted on the Oregon Coronavirus Information and Resources Page after they have been issued and signed.

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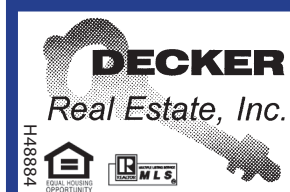

Facebook is full of memes about hoarding toilet paper, and the closure of restaurants, bars, and coffee shops has shown us just how vulnerable those businesses are. It will be interesting to see which cities come up with the most innovative ways to throw lifesavers to their local businesses in upcoming weeks.

The influx of tourists who chose not to stay home resulted in a Draconian order from our county government, in sync with cities and

neighboring coastal counties. Stories of hoarding TP were quickly replaced with stories of harassing out-of-state plated vehicles.

Why I'm Voting for Erin

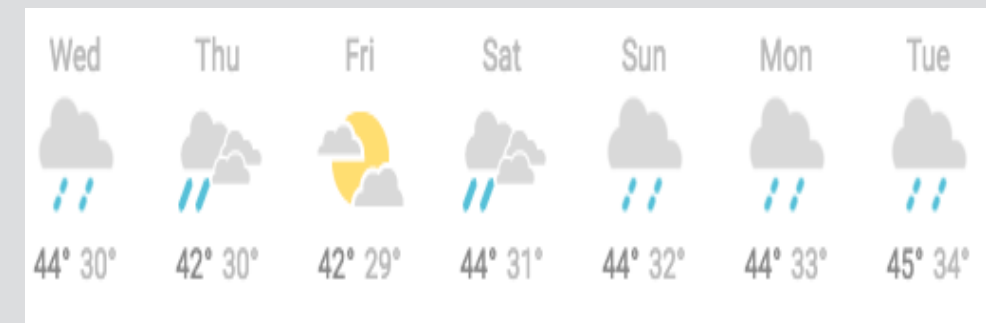

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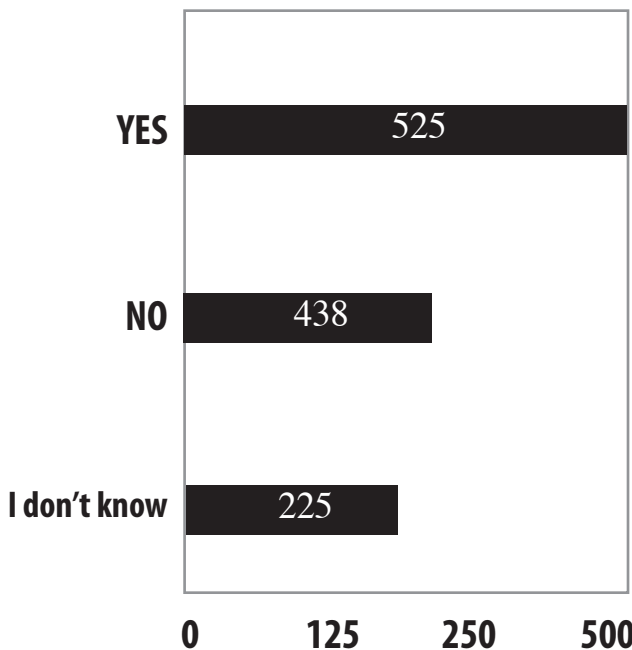

The kit came together a week at a time, at this time last year, as I recorded my progress on the project in this space. Among the hoard, I was happy I included a 4 pack of toilet tissue!

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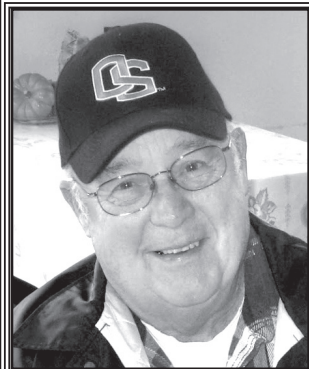

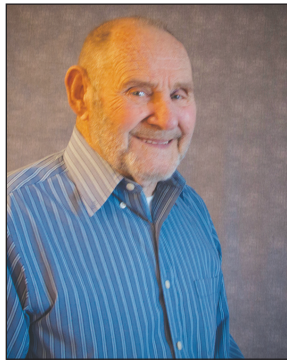

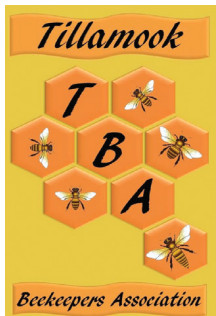

teacher will be reaching out via phone, Google Classroom, or another method of communication to touch base with parents and students weekly.

"We encourage parents to help students of all ages take some time EVERY day for learning activities," Shelley said. "Keep reading!"

Shelley suggested taking a virtual tour of a museum, practice math, typing and spelling skills. He said all families need some type of routine to establish normalcy, a way to get things done and a sense of security, especially when normal life has been interrupted.

"These activities and links are not intended to replace classroom instruction or district adopted curriculum; however, they are options that allow students to practice skills and continue with their learning until school reopens," Shelley said.

If you are interested in additional online learning

opportunities, visit the district's website at <https://bit.ly/2UgQImE>. Here you will find a wide variety of sites organized by grade level and content area. Students are not required to participate in this remote learning but are encouraged to use these resources or other resources provided through their teachers.

Shelley said the Tillamook High School staff and leadership team will implement an online program utilizing Google Classroom to ensure seniors have the credit needed for graduation. Additional devices are available through a check out process at the high school.

As a leadership team in partnership with Northwest Regional ESD, Shelley said the district evaluated their current resources and reviewed guidance from the Oregon Department of Education (ODE). They have prioritized their seniors and are providing support to those families that need assistance with technology.

"We do not have the systems in place to roll out a one-on-one online learning platform for all students, at

this time, while maintaining compliance with the Oregon Department of Education guidance," Shelley said. "We are working to create a sustainable long-term plan if it is necessary."

Shelley cited ODE, stating "Districts receiving allocations from the SSF during the closure period must continue delivering supplemental education and learning supports to students to the extent practical through independent study and other appropriate options."

The ODE does not recommend schools consider a transition to online learning unless the district can ensure all considerations are met. Some of these considerations include all students in the school or district have full access to the learning, educators, and required materials, including technology; the online learning system effectively supports the district's different learning and teaching needs, including the ability to provide differentiated instruction as well as one-on-one support for students who need it; and online instructional materials are aligned to Oregon State Standards.

Wheeler

The City of Wheeler officials said the city is committed to the safety and wellbeing of its employees, residents and visitors. Considering the state of emergency in Tillamook County and increasing threat of coronavirus disease, adjustments have been made.

City Hall will be closed all week, but staff welcome your calls and emails. We will assess our options for next week on Friday, March 20. City Manager Juliet Hyams will take calls at 503-812-7105.

Rockaway Beach

Rockaway Beach joined the cities that declared a state of emergency on March 23. City officials are now allowed to redirect funds as needed for the coronavirus emergency.

In response to the public health emergency, the City of Rockaway Beach closed all parks and day-use areas except to those who live full-time in those locations. All beach access points and parking lots are closed, and the no parking zones in public rights of way are extended.

Transient lodging including hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts and short-term rentals including condominiums to all visitors not providing essential services or traveling for commercial purposes.

"The City cares deeply about the economic resilience of its lodging providers and businesses in the tourism sector and is grateful for their sacrifices for the protection of their employees, guests and the community at large," a City of Rockaway Beach press release said.

Garibaldi

Garibaldi City Council made an emergency declaration at a special city council meeting March 18 declaring a temporary state of emergency within the boundaries of the city and delegating authority to the city manager.

The city council finds that during this state of emergency, it is prudent to delegate certain powers and responsibilities to the city manager in order to more efficiently expedite city responses and services.

These emergency circumstances require focused and coordinated municipal and community responses beyond that which occur

routinely, and such coordinated responses cannot be achieved without temporarily amending some of the city's regular business, emergency, employment and intergovernmental practices.

Garibaldi closed its administrative and public works offices starting until April 1. This will be amended as needed. The City will be staffed by a reduced number of employees and any administrative needs, or land use applications can still be submitted. The City Planning Department is processing applications that do not require a public hearing at this time.

There was concern about City Manager Geoff Wulschlager having responsibility, rather than Mayor Judy Riggs.

"The reason there are so many people involved in this is because of flexibility," Riggs said. "If there was an earthquake, the city manager would be the first person who would probably be available."

Riggs said the responsibility first falls on the city manager, and in order to have flexibility, needs to have as many people available as possible.

"The reason we need to declare an emergency as soon as possible in order to get in line is if there is federal or state funding that we need to have in order to protect citizens," Riggs said. "That's our main concern."

During the state of emergency, the City of Garibaldi may take any legal action and necessary steps to respond and recover from the emergency, including: requesting assistance, funds, and reimbursement from the State of Oregon and federal agencies; adopting temporary rules and policies regarding city facilities, funds, resources and staff; entering into contracts for services or aid agreements with other governmental or private entities; and cancelling non-essential city meetings and events.

The city manager has the authority to take actions and issue orders necessary and reasonable to protect health, safety and welfare of the city and the public and to conduct activities that minimize the effect of the emergency. If he desires to issue an order limiting or banning public gatherings, issuing curfews, closing or limiting businesses or implementing other social distancing measures beyond what is ordered by the State of Oregon, he will first consult with the city council.

This state of emergency is effective immediately and will remain in effect until 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 28, unless extended. City offices are closed.

Bay City

The City of Bay City declared an official state of emergency Monday, March 23.

City Manager Chance Steffey said a plan needs to be activated and an emergency operation center needs to be initiated. All non-essential meetings and events are cancelled until further notice.

"Some of the other functions we have been working on such as emergency preparedness, that needs to stop," Steffey said. "It needs to stop until we are done with this emergency because we can't be out doing the functions

to get people prepared at the same time we're following the guidelines of the governor and social distancing."

City offices have been closed to walk-in customers except by appointment and the city is asking utility customers to use the payment drop slot at City Hall. Parks are also closed including the campground and bathrooms. The mayor, city council and staff are continuing to monitor the situation and are taking steps to protect the health, safety and welfare of the community.

Bay City officials have recognized the potential economic hardship due to the coronavirus pandemic and have suspended water disconnections and late fees through April.

Mayor Chris Kruebbe said the Bay City Fire Department is fully functional; however, they are short of volunteers. If you would like to volunteer, contact the Fire Chief Darrell Griffith either by telephone at 503-377-0233 or email at firedept@ci.bay-city.or.us. Public access to the fire hall is restricted.

Tillamook

At the March 16 City of Tillamook Council Meeting, the council made an emergency declaration pertaining to the COVID-19 virus. Several measures will be put in effect immediately and remain in effect until March 30. These measures will be extended week by week as the emergency persists.

City of Tillamook officials said they are committed to making every effort to stop and prevent the spread of the virus to citizens. They encouraged everyone to limit contact with other individuals in the community in the days ahead and conduct as much business as possible online and by phone.

City Hall offices will be closed to walk-in traffic and the public during the emergency. City Hall staff will be limited but available to receive calls and questions. Utility customers should use the payment drop box on the corner of Third Street and Laurel Avenue or use the online payment services for any payments during the course of this emergency.

All other payments for dog licenses, business licenses, lease agreement payments, Transient Room Tax payments, liquor license fees and licenses, public works permit fees and any other payments can be submitted by mail or placed in the drop box. Vehicle impounds will be handled by appointment only by calling 503-374-1824.

Tillamook Police Department will be fully operational. Public works will have limited operations during this emergency. Mayor Suzanne Weber said limited operations for the public works means "mostly maintenance, and small jobs that don't require too many people."

"The water people are concentrating on water and the sewer folks on sewer," Weber said. "In other words, no big projects that require a larger workforce. Also, it is perfect pot hole patching weather."

Any changes to the above-mentioned measures pertaining to this emergency will be updated on the City's website at www.tillamookor.gov.

Averill was seeded 11th in prelims in the 200 IM and swam her way to 6th place to make it to finals. She also swam the 100 breaststroke where she was seeded 6th in prelims and ended up 5th in finals with a time of 1:09.99.

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Tillamook County Wellness: Walk well Tillamook County

April is Move More month and April 1st is National Walking Day – No foolin’! Being active and having positive social support are keys to life-long health and especially important during these times of the COVID-19 pandemic. Walking is a great way to be physically active and can be done while “social distancing” as recommended by health experts. If you are working from home, set a time each day for a short walk. Consider how you can spend some quality family time being active outdoors.

Keep these tips in mind when walking during the COVID-19 pandemic:

- Maintain social distance

ing (6 feet between individuals) until there is a change in safety guidelines

- Wash your hands often for at least 20 seconds
- Cough or sneeze into your elbow/shoulder

Walking is safer and puts less stress on the body than most other forms of aerobic exercise. Walking is an especially good choice for people who are older or less active (Altpeter, et al, 2009). Walking offers many benefits for your body and spirit. Besides being inexpensive, convenient and fun, walking can help to:

- Strengthen heart, lungs, joints & bones
- Fight osteoporosis
- Burn calories & control

weight

- Reduce stress, improve mood & boost energy

Current guidelines recommend at least 30 minutes of moderate intensity cardiovascular or aerobic exercise five times a week – that’s only 150 minutes (2½ hours) of moderate intensity physical activity during an entire week. The good news is the 2018 physical activity guidelines recommend no minimum effective bout duration – so even a few minutes at a time are beneficial and add up to reach your 2½ hours of weekly moderate physical activity (Gunter, K., 2018). So, if walking 30 minutes at a time is too much or you can’t find the time you could

walk 15 minutes twice a day, 10 minutes three times a day or even 5 minutes or less several times over the course of the day. Just remember the total should add up to at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity over the course of a week.

Research shows that setting goals and writing them down (making a contract) is helpful (Altpeter, et al, 2009). When setting goals be specific:

- State when you will walk. For example, will you walk before breakfast, during your lunch break or immediately after work?
- State how often you will walk. At first aim for

three times a week, if you do more that’s a bonus.

- Refer to the contract daily. Post it where you’ll see it, such as on the fridge or your bathroom mirror.

Your contract will help you stay focused and on track with your walking program. Keeping records of your daily activity will help you make and maintain changes in your overall physical activity.

Here are some resources to get you started or keep you walking:

- Join a walking group to provide support and encouragement (Kouvenen, A., et al, 2012). Social support helps us make lasting increases in being

physically active. Watch for information about Walk Well Tillamook County walking groups that will be relaunched later this spring/summer.

- Check out the “Walk with Ease Self-Directed Program” at <https://extension.oregonstate.edu/walk-ease>. All participants receive a free book in the mail and weekly coaching emails to guide them through the program.
- For those who choose to avoid groups completely and stay at home, check out Leslie Sansone’s Walk At Home Youtube channel. Her videos are great for exercising indoors, with limited space and equipment.

Following the report of the first case, Public Health said its staff moved immediately to contact the person to gather information on others they had come in contact with, and in turn to contact those people about self-quarantine guidelines. Public Health staff reportedly check twice daily with positive-case contacts to ensure they are properly self-isolating.

Nehalem Bay Fire & Rescue has confirmed one of its members tested positive for COVID-19. The person reportedly has “very mild symptoms” and is expected to return to work soon. Fire Chief Chris Beswick told county commissioners Monday that social distancing measures were put in place early on, making the threat of viral spread minimal, but staff and volunteers are still being monitored closely.

A total of 12,883 coronavirus tests have been

completed in Oregon, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), with 12,277 returned negative as of Monday. The CDC reports 16 people have died from the virus in the state and at least 140 have been hospitalized, with 39 patients on ventilators.

Oregon Health Authority reported 58 new cases of COVID-19 on Monday, bringing the state total to 606. No new deaths were reported. In Tillamook County, 66 negative test results have been received as of Monday.

County health officials and local hospital staff have declined to say how many test kits are available in the county. Marlene Putman, administrator at Tillamook County Community Health Centers, previously said the local turnaround time for COVID-19 tests is around 48 hours, but that timeline has been widely questioned by the public.

Testing delays are a growing concern nationwide. The Oregonian reports some people are waiting a week or more to

obtain their coronavirus test results. Some private labs that have become inundated and unable to handle a deluge of tests amid a global pandemic.

As of this past week, nearly 4,600 Oregonians and 345,000 Americans had received coronavirus results. Countless others cannot yet be screened. The United States lacks enough tests to go around, suppressing the real tally and making it easier for the virus to spread from people with mild symptoms who do not know they’re infected.

Delays in confirming lab results leave people with the virus at risk of exposing family members if they don’t take precautions in shared households as they await diagnosis. At the same time, those delays leave people who aren’t actually infected facing unnecessarily long quarantines, unable to shop for groceries, see family or go outside.

Adventist Health Tillamook declined to comment on specifics regarding coronavirus pandemic preparation for Tillamook County residents. Cherie Plaisted, marketing and communication manager, said Adventist Health Tillamook is working with the health department on testing, has enough supplies on

hand to care for COVID-19 patients, and is part of a hospital system with access to additional supplies, beds and expertise.

Plaisted would not say how many COVID-19 tests have been conducted at Adventist Health Tillamook or how many test kits are available. She also declined to answer regarding the number of intensive care beds that are available at the hospital and how many ventilators are in stock.

“We have highly trained infection prevention practitioners who closely follow the guidelines of the CDC and the local public health department. Our hospitals manage infectious diseases on a regular basis and maintain isolation rooms,” Plaisted said. “Ongoing training and drills are underway on the proper donning and doffing of personal protective equipment, as well as on the protocols for the identification, testing and treatment of a patient with COVID-19-like symptoms.”

Health industry experts at QuoteWiz recently analyzed Kaiser Family Foundation data on hospital beds in America. The study found Oregon has an average of 1.66 hospital beds and 2.88 certified physicians per 1,000 people,

ranking eighth-worst hospital capacity in the nation.

Oregon was also found to be the number-one worst-ranked for hospital beds. From 2014 to 2018, hospital beds in the state decreased by 5.88 percent, according to the study.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced Sunday that federal emergency aid has been made available for the state of Oregon to supplement the state, tribes and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the coronavirus pandemic beginning on Jan. 20 and continuing.

Federal funding is available to state, tribal, and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures, including direct federal assistance under public assistance, for all areas affected by COVID-19 at a federal cost share of 75 percent.

Gov. Kate Brown called the declaration an important first step, but far from everything Oregon needs from the federal government.

“We have a number of significant requests pending with the federal government, first and foremost Oregon’s request for more personal protective equipment from the national stockpile,” Brown said.

“A significant part of our disaster declaration request was for individual assistance for all Oregon counties and tribes—including child care assistance, crisis counseling, disaster case management, disaster legal services, and disaster unemployment assistance for Oregonians,” Brown said. “That request is still also pending, and would provide

significant relief to Oregon families if approved.”

Organizations eligible for recovery efforts on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures include, but are not limited to: management, control and reduction of immediate threats to public health and safety; emergency operation and coordination costs; disinfection of eligible public facilities; medical sheltering; and purchase and distribution of food, water, medicine and other consumable supplies, including personal protective equipment.

COVID-19 is a highly infectious illness. Local and state health officials continue to urge all Oregonians to take steps to protect those who are most vulnerable to complications from COVID-19.

Those considered “high risk” include adults 60 and older, or anyone with a serious health condition, including lung or heart problems, kidney disease, or diabetes, or anyone who has a suppressed immune system.

To help control the spread of the illness the public is urged to follow Oregon Gov. Kate Brown’s March 23 executive order to stay home to the maximum extent possible.

Everyone should take these basic steps to protect those most at risk:

- Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Stay home if you feel ill.

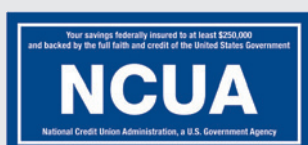
