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Former Tillamook Cheese CEO dies at 83

Harold Schild, former CEO/ President of Tillamook Cheese passed away on September 10, 2020 after a short illness at the age of 83.

Schild served as CEO/president of Tillamook County Creamery Association for 9-years, retiring in 2002 after 44 years with the Creamery. He was instrumental in moving Tillamook Cheese from being a Northwest product to a brand that is now nationally recognized. Although he directed numerous major shifts in the company over the years, the most impactful was the decision and ultimate construction of a second cheese factory in Boardman. This development enabled Tillamook Cheese to grow exponentially over the years.

Schild was also the driving force behind the creation and construction of the first large visitors facility at Tillamook Cheese. Although he had no idea at the time just how big of tourist attraction the visitor's facility would turn into, it is now part of the Tillamook Cheese brand and lore.

Schild was a self-made leader who attended only one year of college before going to work at Tillamook as a cheesemaker,

beginning his climb through different levels of responsibility and management with the company. In the early 1970's he became the manager of the "Grade A" department, which was designed to get local dairy products such as milk, ice cream and butter into local stores. This department had always operated at a loss, but had been created as a service to give local farmers access to products made from their own milk. He quickly turned the sale of these products into a significant piece of the Tillamook Cheese legacy and brand name.

Although Schild spent much of his career in management, emplovees continued to regard him as a friend and co-worker who had come up through the ranks with many of them. He was also regarded as a person who had a deep commitment to the community of Tillamook, and felt that the community and TCCA were one in the same.

His leadership style was built on developing positive, meaningful relationships with the employees and farmers he worked with. It wasn't unusual to see him walking through the plant greeting individual employees by name,

knowing and caring about them and their families.

Having grown up on their Swiss-family farm in Tillamook, Schild understood the challenges, as well as the advantages, of being on a dairy. He earned the respect of local farmers, as well as state and national dairy leaders, due to his extensive industry knowledge and passion.

Outside of his work at Tillamook Cheese, was actively involved in the community. He was a long-time Tillamook School District board member, the owner of two local restaurants (Swiss Chalet, Hadley House), the playby-play voice of the Tillamook Cheesemakers on KTIL and a lifelong, active member of the Tillamook Church of the Nazarene.

Schild is survived by his wife of 63 years, Betty, daughters Cindy Lewis (Tillamook), and Jody Sherbondy (Denver, CO) and son Randy Schild (Tillamook), as well as 10 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held on Sunday, Sept. 20, 2020 at 3 in the afternoon at the Tillamook High School football field grandstands where social distancing practices can be followed.

Community effort saves homes from devastation

The Tillamook County Sheriff's Office reported Sunday, Sept. 13, the Pike Road Fire was at 25 percent containment at 5 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 12, and was mapped at 220 acres burned. Most of the heavy equipment used to construct the fire line has been released from the fire and are now available to assist with other fires if needed.

The sheriff's office said mop up and addressing hotspots is ongoing. As of Saturday afternoon, Sept. 12, seven crews, two dozers,

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one logging shovel, seven engines, and two tenders remained assigned to

Much work remains to be done and Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) is requesting the public not to travel into the fire area or the homes in the area. The sheriff's office has maintained constant patrol in the area, and as of Sept. 12, there were no reports of looting or burglaries in the Pike Fire

As a reminder, ODF has temporarily closed the Tillamook State Forest to all recreational activities through Monday, Sept. 14. On Monday morning, the temporary closure will be reevaluated and to see if the closure restriction can be lifted based on weather conditions and fire risk.

There are some safety issues that must be addressed. ODF wants to let landowners and residents know that burned trees can fall without warning and burned stumps holding tremendous heat appear benign but can seriously burn someone who steps into these ash pits. There will continue to be small fires burning on the landscape and you can help ensure this fire does not escape the fire line by utilizing these tips about how to keep an eye on the fire:

•Fire well within the perimeter (i.e.,

more than 500 feet in) is not a threat. The Oregon Department of Forestry will periodically patrol the burn area so as to monitor fire activity and take action as needed.

•Expect to see smoke and fire within the fire perimeter –smoke shows up better during early mornings

and embers better at night. •Learn to recognize the perimeter of the burn area –especially get to know features recognizable at night. This will help you determine where you are seeing fire.

•Become familiar where you have unburned fuels in and around the perimeter of the fire. Make sure you have at least 30' of defendable space around your home, driveway and other buildings by removing brush. Keep your roof and gutters clean of leaves and needles.

•If you see fire activity outside the perimeter, or significantly more fire activity than previous patterns, call 911 to report a fire.

The Sheriff's Office' wants to thank all the agencies, businesses, and individuals who gave of their time, materials and finances to assisted with the fire suppression and support of our fire fighters and to the displaced residents, both of our county, and of other counties that fled to our community.

Oregon begins road to recovery in aftermath of wildfires

fter a week of fire fighting efforts across the state A of Oregon, Governor Kate Brown said Orego-

nians have been pushed to their limits. "It's really hard for all of us to wrap our heads around the devastation that these fires have caused and the pain and the suffering that so many Oregonians endured over the past few days," Gov. Brown said during a Sept. 14 press conference.

So far, the Oregon State Medical Examiner has reported 10 fire related fatalities and 22 missing persons.

Those statistics will continue to be updated daily. But on a positive note, Gov. Brown said fire crews are feeling optimistic with the current forecasted weather, which should provide help to their efforts as temperatures drop and winds subside. Additionally, calls for assistance are being answered and resource crews from all over the country and Canada have been coming

to help. "We expect structural fire fighting teams from North Dakota and Michigan to join our response this week," Gov. Brown noted. "Michigan, California and Washington are providing resources to our emergency coordination center. Vermont and Nevada have reached out

asking how they can help." Also, FEMA, is also on the grounds of Oregon assisting with response. Gov. Brown said she recently sent a letter to President Donald Trump asking to declare a State of Disaster in Oregon, which will free up even more resources for state officials.

Oregon is also working with the National Guard to distribute 250,000 N95 masks to agricultural workers and impacted tribes statewide as soon as possible. The masks will provide a certain level of protection to outdoor workers across the state.

"The smoke blanketing the state is a reminder that this tragedy has not yet come to an end," Gov. Brown

Gov. Brown is encouraging everyone to donate to Red Cross and the Oregon Food Bank for victims of these wildfires. To assist recovery efforts, the state is asking three foundations: Ford Family, Meyer Memorial Trust, and the Oregon Community Foundation, to help in the recovery efforts by kickstarting the 2020 Community Rebuilding Fund. Other organizations will also be encouraged to donate.

"We will have a long road ahead, but I'm so heartened by these foundations and all Oregonians that are coming together right now," Gov. Brown said. "The only way out of this crisis is through it and we'll only get through it together."

Fire Update

Oregon Department of Forestry Fire Protection Director, Doug Grafe, once again gave an update on progress at the Monday press conference. Grafe said the state has passed the east wind event that rapidly moved fires across Oregon and they have had four days of good fire fighting conditions and continue making progress.

Although ODF was looking forward to forecasted rains early this week, Grafe said they're now slated to fall sometime on Wednesday into Thursday. Unfortu-

Tillamook County Clerk addresses Vote-By-Mail System

"I feel we have a great system to get the ballots to people, and to get them back!" That was the fundamental message Tillamook County Clerk Tassi O'Neil shared with the Tillamook County Democratic Central Committee (TCDCC) as the guest speaker at their monthly meeting, Thursday, August 27. The meeting was held via Zoom chat.

"Here in Oregon we have an excellent vote-by-mail system," O'Neil said. She shared the fact that her experience in the Tillamook County Clerk's office spans more than 30 years, which means she has seen and worked on both types of voting practices - casting ballots in a defined polling booth location or voting by mail. She noted that Oregon's Vote-By-Mail system became law in 1998, which means that this year marks the 20th year Oregon voters have received and cast their votes by mail.

To make voting by mail even easier, or, at least less expensive, O'Neil told TCDCC that return

mailing envelopes are now postage paid. This practice started with the Primary Election in May of this year.

To address concerns expressed by members of the TCDCC over news announcements about possible voter fraud, and over announced changes to the United States Postal Service brought on by the current federal administration, O'Neil said her office, together with county clerks across the state, the Secretary of State and representatives of Oregon's central post office in Portland have and are continuing to meet to make certain all ballots are delivered and returned in the orderly fashion that has made Oregon's Vote-By-Mail system a model for other states.

In a brief interview with O'Neil held prior to the Aug. 27 meeting, she said that claims that Oregon's Vote-By-Mail system is "subject to fraud" is "absolutely absurd. Every signature is checked," O'Neil said.

She suggested that new voters and/or people who don't understand how Oregon's Vote-By-Mail system works, check the educational question and answer section of the Oregon Voters' Pamphlet, which will be in mailboxes prior to the mailing

of ballots.

Not only does Oregon's Vote-By-Mail offer clear advantages for voters - convenience of voting in the comfort of their home, no standing in line at polling booths, ease of casting ballot by mail or in conveniently located ballot drop boxes around the county. These advantages are amplified by the restrictions on public gatherings brought on by the current pandemic, she said.

Additionally, as governmental budgets are squeezed by the effects of the current pandemic, O'Neil noted that there is a very clear cost advantage for her office in handling elections by mail. She noted that prior to 2000, she was required to staff approximately 40 polling places in Tillamook County with three to four staff members in each. In addition to the actual poling date, all of these staff members also had to be paid for a training period prior to the election. Although she has an expanded dedicated election staff during election cycles, it doesn't compare to the additional staff she was required to hire prior to 2000.

She shared some critical dates with TCDCC members:

- Oct. 14; • Ballot mailing date - Oct. 14;

- Ballot Return date and time 8

· Recommended final date for mailing ballot - at least one week prior to Election Day*

If there is any question whether a ballot will arrive by mail in time to be counted, O'Neil recommends using one of the county's nine ballot drop boxes. This year, this number includes two new drop boxes in the City of Tillamook. One is at the Tillamook County Public Library and the other is just outside O'Neil's office at the Tillamook County Court House (adjacent to the stairs at the northwest entrance to the building. 



nately, these rains could bring thunder storms on east side of state, which could cause new fire starts.

"It's kind of a mixed bag relative to the weather, but overall, compared to what we dealt with, with the east winds, this gives us a lot of opportunity to make good progress," Grafe said.

Grafe said winds in south central Oregon could provide some challenges this week as well, but they are predicted to be relatively consistent.

Across the Oregon landscape, Grafe said they have made tremendous progress on establishing control lines on most fires throughout the state. On the coast, fire crews have held lines off the North Bank Lane Fire in Coos county for 4-5 days, which has Grafe "feeling very comfortable on containment there." At the Echo Mountain Complex, they are holding lines thanks to excellent work from crews. Positive work has also been happening at the Pike Fire in Tillamook

"We're holding lines on all those fires on the coast, I'm very proud of the work," Grafe said. "Absolutely immense amount of work, in four days, accomplished. That sets the stage relative to what we can accomplish in another five days.'

Wildfires Grafe credits their progress on the coordinated effort across all districts and communities. Lastly, Grafe made note of saying that as they begin to fly aviation crews for examination, the public must refrain from flying their own personal

drones.

Major General Mike Stencel said Monday that by the end of today (Sept. 14) the National Guard should have over 700 members mobilized for response efforts. Additionally by the end of the week, Stencel expects to have well over 1,000 guardsmen on duty.

143 guardsmen have been at Traffic Control Points throughout Oregon, including in Lincoln County. Also, 11 aircrafts

are in Oregon and available as they wait for the smoke

to clear for examination. "As you can imagine, our pilots are pretty frustrated waiting for this weather to lift," Stencel said. "But we're anxious and hopeful that we are going to be able to fly, most likely in South East Oregon in the next 24

hours." Director of the Office of Emergency Management, Andrew Phelps, spoke briefly about the fatality statistics, and addressing rumors and rumor control surrounding the fires.

"Rumors can cost lives," Phelps said. "We're relying on government entities, official government sources and our media partners to make sure accurate information is being conveyed responsibly."

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ODF thanks Tillamook County citizens for help in fighting fires

Now that the smoke is clearing from Pike Road Fire, the Oregon Department of Forestry would like to thank the community for their support to the firefighting efforts. The fire began late Monday, September 7th. After the initial attack efforts and knowing there would be an extended attack at Pike Road, our office reached out for assistance for meals, heavy equipment and logistics and the community responded on all fronts immediately.

Over 150 firefighters had to be fed for day and night shifts and 10 restaurants and stores provided meals that met calorie requirements, prepackaged, and ready to go to the line. Many of those vendors donated the meals which we know was a huge sacrifice in the current economic environment.

When our office called on fire crews, fallers, loggers and road builders for equipment to assist, our phone rang off the hook. At one point there was over 30 pieces of equipment working on the fire from 13 companies building line and cutting trees for fire breaks. Due to the extreme weather conditions, the woods were closed to operations which allowed equipment operators to work on fires. We are now committed to getting everyone back to work as soon weather allows for

safe work in the forest. It is less known that while Pike Road Fire was growing, there were two other fires ODF responded to behind the Blimp Base and MP 7 on Highway 6. The same operators and

Campaign to restore access to the Doris **Davis Trail**

The group has made numerous efforts over the past months to reach out to property owners who built a fence earlier this summer across Doris Davis Trail. The response from the owners has been more fortification of the fencing and unfriendly communication with various residents of the

Classic Ridge community. The group details their plans to ask the court for

relief in their latest blog post. Their first step is to file a quiet title action in Tillamook County Court seeking a declaration that the public has a right to continue using the trail. According to the Oregon Supreme Court, if the public openly uses a trail for more than 10 years, without permission of the owners, then the public can acquire a prescriptive easement across private land. The trail has been used for well over 40 years by hundreds if not thousands of people, well before the present owners acquired the land. The goal of the action is to ensure the public has access to the trail they have utilized for over four decades and provide safe passage in the occurrence of a tsunami.

The group is also seeking to raise \$15,000 from community members to support the legal effort. A

long-time trail user passionate about securing the right for everyone to continue to use the trail is initiating this fundraising effort. Any funds not used for the litigation will be applied to other efforts to improve beach access from the neighborhood or donated to Trailkeepers of Oregon's work on the coast. Commissioners: please close all **County beaches** to vehicle access

On Aug 26, the Board of Commissioners unanimously decided to reopen the Tierra Del Mar beach to vehicle access. Without adequate planning or resources for enforcement support, the reopening has resulted in unsafe conditions day and night for residents and visitors alike. This decision needs to be reversed.

In reaching their decision, the Commissioners acknowledged that enfor ment support from the Sheriff's office and OPRD rangers would be limited due to staffing shortages. As we have experienced since the reopening August 28, and especially throughout the holiday weekend, the only deterrent to prohibited vehicle use north of the beach access point, is stationing a patrol officer at the boundary. We have had that resource only sporadically; while effective when

in place, this is a poor use of limited patrol resources. Once gone, drivers continue to ignore the only sign, see all the other vehicle tracks and cruise north. Some get stuck in the sand; some move when approached by Beach Patrol volunteers; others park, unload their dogs and kids and put out the lawn chairs.

We have watched scores of rowdy and impatient drivers (some alcohol-

emboldened) drive unsafely and recklessly. We have watched vehicles get stuck in the sand with a succession of Good Samaritans that get stuck trying to assist them. We have watched little children dart out as vehicles cruise by or back up unexpectedly. We have watched as birds are chased and drivers spin out, appar-

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

We need real COVID numbers

The PCR test was created to study viruses in a lab, and not as a diagnostic tool to detect viruses. Kary Mullis the biochemist who created the PCR test was adamant that it was not to be used for clinical diagnosis and he went head- to- head with Dr. Fauci regarding using it to diagnose HIV/AIDS in the

90's.
On page 38 of the CDC
2019-Novel Coronavirus
(2019-nCoV) Real-Time
RT-PCR Diagnostic Panel,
"Detection of viral RNA
may not indicate the presence of an infectious virus
or that 2019-nCoV is the
causative agent for clinical
symptoms." As a result, this
misapplication of the PCR
test means the entire Covid
event has been based on
invalid "testing results."

Dr. Sherri Tenpenny points out that the longer the time between symptom onset and test, the more likely that the test will be negative. Tests can go from negative, to positive, and back to negative as your immune systems clears the infection. No one knows exactly what a "positive" test means.

Due to a "flaw" in one of Connecticut's testing systems, 90 of 144 people who were tested for the virus between June 15 and June 17 received a false positive test. Testing "flaws" like this are being identified in every state. The testing is so unreliable that in Tanzania a pawpaw fruit, a bird, goat and an inanimate object tested positive for COVID after the President of Tanzania sent in these specimens because he didn't trust the validity of this test. Many of these test kits

were contaminated also invalidating the results and the invalid data continues to accumulate. In Florida they showed a 100% positivity which is statistically impossible. Then we have antibody tests and antigen tests lumped together skewing the testing results. Antibody tests don't have any demonstrated usefulness since they have not been evaluated by the FDA and independent evaluation showed a 50% false positive rate; also, they are intended to show evidence of a past infection, not a current one.

Now the CDC has

flipped again recommending that those that are asymptomatic don't need to be tested until they show symptoms. This has been the kind of response we've seen in the medical/healthcare establishment starting with the WHO, CDC, Task Force, FDA, and state healthcare systems. It has become so politically charged people are left confused who to trust and what to believe. This PCR test for many has been elevated to a religion where no one is allowed to question the reliability of the test or the results. There's a raging debate about whether or not the virus has really been purified and isolated. The FDA admitted it had not been done in a CDC report. A Chinese study found that the test vields false positives 80% of the time. That fact alone, if true, renders the results unreliable Finally, many doctors and microbiologists have come forward to say that the test cannot discriminate between SARS-CoV-2 and any other coronavirus. It cannot even tell if you have anything like an infectious event underway or if any of these coronaviruses have ever been infectious.

The moment of truth ."This week the CDC quietly updated the Covid number to admit that only 6% of all the 153,504 deaths recorded actually died from Covid. That's 9,210 deaths. The other 94% had 2-3 other serious illnesses and the overwhelming majority were of very advanced age". Look at cormobidities.

Our entire existence right now is based on the numbers that "test positive". Does that mean they actually have the infection? Does it mean anything at

If there is a sure way to cool

Salmon season has started! Remember basic etiquette when launching your boat: 1) use only your vehicle's parking lights if it's dark (don't blind those waiting to launch); 2) tie up your boat as far down the dock as possible before parking your vehicle; and 3) don't monopolize the boat ramp by rigging tackle at the dock (prepare tackle at home). As for taking out (hopefully weighted down with your limit of salmon), here are another three tips: 1) be familiar with the water depth at various times of the tide on each side of the dock to avoid running your motor into the mud; 2) don't stop your boat partway up the ramp to pull the plug and let water out (do that up in the parking lot); and 3) don't clean your fish on the dock. Oh, yes, do remember to put the plug back in before dropping your boat in the water, and don't lock your keys in the truck when out shoving the boat off the trailer (we've seen both of these happen). Thanks for keeping things moving along at the Memaloose boat launch and elsewhere!







In the Oregonian's Pearls before Swine (Sept. 6th



The Schooner Restaurant & Lounge management responds to recent confirmed COVI

The Schooner Restaurant & Lounge closed operations Friday, Sept. 4, to sanitize and deep clean after an employee tested positive for COVID-19. The restaurant reopened Saturday, Sept. 5.

After learning the positive result, the restaurant took all action required by the CDC, as well as the Tillamook County Health Department. The employee and those they were in direct contact with are under quarantine for 14 days, and all areas of the restaurant are currently being sanitized.

General Manager Lexie Fields said the restaurant responded to the news of the employee who tested positive for COVID-19 as quickly as possible. They notified those who had been in direct contact within 6 feet of each other for longer than a 15-minute period – immediately, and then provided a statement to all employees to inform

and educate them on the situation.

"After we took these measures and dealt with their concerns, we notified the public and were completely candid about what was happening at the restaurant," Fields said. "The response from our customers has been overwhelmingly positive."

The Schooner's online response on Facebook was nothing but supportive and caring, Fields said.

Those employees who had been in close contact with the affected employee are quarantining for a two-week period, including Fields. Other employees who were not in close contact with the affected employee chose to self-quarantine as well, however, most employees felt comfortable enough to return to work after the 24-hour shut down and cleaning, as well as after speaking with the health department.

"We have four employees, including the affected employee, in mandated

six others of their own volition," Fields said. "Results from those employees who chose to get tested have all been negative. At this time, we only have the one employee who has tested positive."

Fields said the restaurant has been following Gov. Kate Brown's state mandated guidelines from the beginning of COVID-19 by requiring employees, as well as customers, to wear face coverings, practice consistent hand washing and sanitizing of common areas, excusing employees from work when they are sick and practicing social distancing. They have also limited reservation seating to no more than ten people in a group, arranged tables to be 6 feet apart from one another, posted signage on COVID-19 prevention in restrooms, installed hand sanitizer stations at all entry ways, blocked off every other booth seating, removed bar seating, and staff a host controlling entry into the restaurant at all times.

"I felt we had to take the

position, as a restaurant, that this is not something 'dirty' that we are trying to hide in shame from – it's a virus that's affecting millions of people, and the chances of contracting it

were, and remain, high," Fields said. "I believe we handled the situation to the best of our ability with compassion and professionalism, and may possibly be a resource for

other restaurants that may face similar circumstances in the future."

Inmate crews on those responses. Both fires had potential for growth and they were controlled quickly and put into patrol and monitoring status.

There is still work to to extinguish the Pike Road Fire but an even larger effort is needed across Oregon. ODF has established a dedicated phone line and email address for members of the public that are reaching out to offer resources and assistance with Oregon's wildland fire fighting efforts statewide. ODF will monitor and respond to incoming calls and messages at regular intervals on a daily basis.

County talks Pike Fire, more evacuees expected from Lincoln County

The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners held an emergency press conference Thursday, Sept. 10, to discuss updates regarding the ongoing fire situation in Tillamook County.

Sheriff Jim Horton said he took a tour of the Pike Road area earlier in the morning. The Pike Fire has damaged one small garage.

"I would imagine there is significant smoke damage within the homes,"

Horton said. "All the homes up there are intact and fire crews did an excellent job protecting the properties.'

Local fire crews have been focusing on the structures. Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) is focusing on fire suppression. The fire is at 175 acres, Horton said. There is currently no estimate on containment.

"Just about every local fire agency was involved," Horton said.

Tillamook Fire District and ODF are still on scene; other agencies have left.

Two additional fires

took place Wednesday, Sept. 9. Horton said the Wilson River Fire was less than an acre in size. The Long Prairie Road Fire was extinguished quickly as well. Fire crews responded immediately to both fires.

Two Nestucca, two Nehalem and one Rockaway Beach unit are assisting in Lincoln County.

"We are hearing some reports that people are starting to return to their homes in the evacuation area," Horton said. "I want to remind the public that they need to remain out of those areas until they

get the all clear from the sheriff's office or local fire district."

Horton said there is a possibility of deploying a drone to assess the damage of the Pike Road Fire. Crews have saved every home on Pike Road. Local logging companies have offered volunteers to help with the fires.

Incident command continues to operate. If you have an emergency, call 911. If you are looking for information and have general questions, keep an eye on the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office Facebook

page. "We are set up at the fairgrounds," Commissioner David Yamamoto said. "As a backup, we have available the YMCA here in Tillamook, and as a backup to the backup, we've been in conversation with Misty Wharton of Nestucca Valley School District and she is willing to open up all her school buildings to house evacuees if that becomes necessary. We should be ready for more evacuees from Lincoln City.'

Yamamoto said Tillamook County has stepped

up to do what needs to be done. Food has been donated to the fairgrounds. Horton said they have received so many donations, but if people want to donate, nonperishable snacks and bottled water would be best.

"We're trying to feed our crews and law enforcement officers as much as we can and we couldn't have done it without the community," Horton said.

19 cases illamook Sounty at 40 confirmed

Tillamook County leadership discussed during a community update Friday, Sept. 11, updates regarding COVID-19 and the recent fires in the county and across Oregon.

Adventist Health Tillamook President Eric Swanson said the hospital's personal protective equipment (PPE) supply looks good. All of the staff is safe

and ready to provide care. Tillamook County Community Health Centers Administrator Marlene Putman said the county is at 45 COVID-19 cases, with 40 confirmed and five presumptive. One person has been hospitalized. As of Sept. 11, there have been 2,761 negative tests of COVID-19 tests and 2,801 total tests completed.

According to the health center, there are 14 active cases in isolation or quarantine, 31 closed cases and zero COVID-19 related deaths in the county.

"Our staff will continue to support and provide health care and human services for people who are currently out at the fairgrounds, as well as other folks who are out there,' Putman said. "We'll be assisting and having our mobile clinic on standby.'

The health center continues to test people who have symptoms of COVID-19. They expect to receive their Abbott rapid COVID-19 tests in the next couple of weeks and hope to test people who are asymptomatic at that time. Rapid testing can provide test results in as little as 15 minutes.

Putman said children are especially in need of vaccinations and immunizations. She recommends people wait until at least the end of September to get the flu shot in order for it to be most effective. Some insurance companies will only pay for the flu vaccine once a year.

Rinehart Clinic expects to receive their Rapid test soon as well. People can reach their COVID-19 line at 1-800-368-5812 for CO-VID-19 related questions.

Tillamook Family Counseling Center continues to provide behavioral health services and mainly virtual

"Our mobile crisis team responds 24-7 to crisis intervention and emergency concerns," Executive Director Frank Hanna-

Williams said. You can reach the counseling center at 503-842-8201 or 1-800-962-2851.

A number of the staff was impacted by the fires by having to be on alert and having to isolate at times.

Tillamook County Sheriff Jim Horton said the last few days had been tense with fires that started on Pike Road.

downed power line related to the high winds we were experiencing, which was a very odd weather pattern,' Horton said. "East winds are not uncommon, but to have winds that strong, it's very unusual."

The winds caused damage to power lines and trees. Incident Command was staffed at Tillamook 911.

A community shelter

was open at the 4-H dorm at the Tillamook County Fairgrounds. A large portion of Lincoln City had been evacuated and was at the fairgrounds.

Gordon McCraw, incident command, said there was a lot of first responder traffic going back and forth to Lincoln City. On the weather side of things, it was expected to be a couple

of days before the smoke cleared out.
