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Tillamook County remains in Lower Risk Vaccines continue for those 75 plus

Tillamook County Health Department reported 12 new COVID-19 cases this week, with 11 confirmed positive and one presumptive. The health department is

monitoring 50 cases.

Administrator Marlene Putman reported during a Tillamook County Leadership update Friday, Feb. 26, one person is currently hospitalized.

“Over the course of the pandemic, we’ve had 23 hospitalizations,” Putman said.

Putman asks the public to take COVID-19 precautions and remember to wear your mask indoors when with people not in your immediate household. Keep social gatherings to 10 people at the most.

“With 20 new confirmed positive and presumptive cases, measured

from Feb. 7 through the 20th, Tillamook County will remain in the Lower Risk status through March 11,” Putman said. “If cases increase above 30 in the next two weeks, then we’d be in risk of going to a different risk level effective March 12.”

Emergency Coordinator Ed Colson said 237 Moderna vaccines were administered this week. Large vaccine events were canceled due to the winter weather in the east, but small

Beekeepers get cheesy with raffle

The Tillamook Beekeepers Association’s main buzz is to practice and educate the public about sustaining honey bees. Everyone loves sweet local honey and honey bees are the most important part of the pollination process.

“We do this by improving our own beekeeping practices and we seek to help others do the same,” said Brad York, the associations president. “We exist to promote the study, science, and art of keeping honey bees and to provide education, encouragement and mentoring to beekeepers in the Tillamook region of Oregon. Introducing the importance and gentleness of honey bees to children and adults, who are not beekeepers, is just one of our many important goals.”

For the last four years the association has built

and raffled off a special bee hive so the lucky winner could start producing the sweet nectar in their own backyards.

“This year, in concert with the Creamery, we created two hives with boxes replicating loaves of cheese,” York said.

“Sharp Cheddar, Medium Cheddar, and Medium White Cheddar. Keeping the look of Tillamook and Cheese, the boxes are topped off with a hand-crafted cover



designed to resemble a barn.”

(Rick Stelzig designed and built the bard top and the other parts of the hive). “Of course, it’s all about saving the bee. The funds go towards our ongoing efforts to work with the Tillamook community,” York added.

Both hives will be raffled off at the Tillamook County

Fair, but you may buy tickets now. Each primary winner of this raffle will receive one of the beautifully

handcrafted 10 frame beehives, including a unique one-of-a-kind barn top, two-deep boxes with 20 deep frames and foundations, tow medium supers with 20 medium frames and foundations, a vented Vivaldi board, screened bottom with drawer style white board, and hive stand. The value of each hive is estimated at \$750.

Each primary winner will also receive a one-year membership in the Tillamook Beekeeper Association valued at \$20.

Secondary prizes of two gift certificates for the Tillamook Creamery (\$100 each) and two gift certificates for (\$50 each) are also to be raffled.

Coast Guard announces investigation into Coastal Reign capsizing

The Coast Guard announced Wednesday, Feb. 24, a formal marine casualty investigation has been convened into the marine casualty of the commercial fishing vessel Coastal Reign which capsized Feb. 20, resulting in the loss of two lives.

Rear Adm. Anthony Vogt, Coast Guard Thirteenth District commander, authorized the investigation.

The crew of the 38-foot fishing vessel, Coastal Reign, was attempting to cross the Tillamook Bay Bar inbound when the vessel capsized with four crewmembers on board.

The Coast Guard has established an email address for the public and interested parties to provide information, ask questions and make comments related to the ongoing investigation and scheduled hearing. This email will be checked regularly and all correspondence will be acknowledged. The email address is: D13WebManagers@uscg.mil. Upon completion of the investigation, the Coast Guard will issue a report of the collected evidence, established facts and conclusions and recommendations regarding the marine casualty.

COVID-19 vaccine update: Scheduling for 75 and older, beware of scam

A COVID-19 vaccine update was provided during the Tillamook County Board of Commissioners meeting Wednesday, Feb. 24. Commissioner Erin Skaar gave the vaccine report, as Marlene Putman and Ed Colson, of the health department, were both at a vaccine event.

Skaar said Tillamook County has 413 total cases of COVID-19 and 11,005 negative tests, as of Feb. 24.

“We’re running at a 2.1 percent average positivity rate, which is a nice low rate, which is allowing us to stay at Lower Risk level,” Skaar said. “We had 20 new confirmed positive and presumptive cases in the last two-week period.”

Should the county have more than 30 cases in the upcoming week, this would cause the risk level to move upward.

The larger vaccine clinics had to be postponed this week due to the bad weather back east, but some small clinics happened for booster shots, Skaar said.

“Tillamook County vaccine providers are actively working currently to schedule those people in the 75 and older category,” Skaar said. “There are about one thousand people in that category.”

Currently, Tillamook County has over 5,000 people on the 65 and older list. As of Feb. 19, 3,369 primary vaccines have been administered since December.

“We encourage everyone who has not yet enrolled to please do so,” Skaar said of those in the 65 and older category. “You can go on online to the website, you can also, if you’re unable to access the website, you can call the health department and someone will assist you with getting enrolled on the website.”

Completed enrollments are put on a list to be contacted when a vaccine dose is available. The exact vaccine site will depend on vaccine supply.

“Our staff will always identify ourselves and our organization and will never ask for payment or credit card information,” Skaar said on behalf of the health

Salmonberry Foundation looks to ODOT funding as they embark on construction phase

Progress is being made for the Salmonberry Trail, with plans for the river and canyon segments in the process of completion. The River Segment extends from the community of Mohler to the confluence of the Nehalem and Salmonberry Riv-

ers. The Canyon Segment extends from the confluence of the Nehalem and Salmonberry Rivers through the Salmonberry Canyon to a Washington County/Tillamook County boundary four miles west of the community of Timber. The river and canyon segments total 34 miles.

“Once we do that, it’s kind of a landmark moment because we get into the construction phase,” Executive Director Jon-Paul Bowles said of the plans for the river and canyon segments.

There are four segments on the trail: The Coast, a 26 mile section from the city of Wheeler on the north to Tillamook on the south;

Nehalem River, which spans 17 miles, from the confluence of the Salmonberry and Nehalem Rivers to the city of Wheeler; Salmonberry River, a 16 mile section through the Salmonberry River canyon; and The Valley, a 25-mile segment that starts in Banks and rises 1,600 feet in elevation to its summit at Cochran, west of Timber. The Valley planning began in 2019.

Executive Director Jon-Paul Bowles said it would take funding to build the trail, especially along Hwy 101 on the coast. The Salmonberry Trail is putting together project

Nestucca Valley schools hope to begin hybrid model March 30

The Nestucca Valley School District Board of Directors approved hybrid learning to begin in schools beginning Tuesday, March 30. This is a result of achieving both variables the board of directors established to transition to the hybrid model: the county's risk level has lowered from Extreme Risk to Lower Risk and by March 30, 90 percent of staff will have received both doses of the vaccine.

The school district held a virtual town hall meeting Wednesday, Feb. 17, to provide more information to students and parents about transitioning to the hybrid model and how distance learning will change.

Superintendent Misty Wharton said the school district is required to publicly post what the district's hybrid model will look like to the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) through ODE's Operational Blueprint. The blueprint is broken up into different categories the district must address, such as public health protocols, facilities and school operations, and the district's response to an outbreak. The blueprint is a one-stop place for parents to go for questions.

"We'll be reviewing this and switching it from LIPI [limited in-person instruction] to hybrid," Wharton said of the blueprint. "When that occurs, that will go to the health

department, and once the health department approves it, we will then push it out to parents and post it on the website."

The blueprint will then go to ODE and the board of directors.

"Early on, I think we were all on a bit of a manic mode because we knew so little about this," Wharton said of the beginning of the pandemic. "When we broke March 13, 2020 for spring break early, we did that with the intent of thinking in two weeks we'd be back in the building."

As of Feb. 5, 90 percent of school district staff have received the first dose of the Moderna vaccine. The district had been hopeful to receive the first dose back in January but limited supply of the vaccine slowed allocations. Staff will receive the second dose March 5.

March 30 will be the first day of hybrid instruction. The hybrid model means part in-person instruction and part distance learning. Class cohorts will be set up. Cameras will be set up in the classrooms that will livestream for students when they are distance learning.

"We want to ensure the health of our community," Wharton said. "We currently have three families who are experiencing COVID cases in their households."

The hybrid model will be offered at Nestucca Valley Early Learning for preschool age, Nestucca Valley Elemen-

tary and Nestucca Junior Senior High School. K-6 will be at the existing elementary school and grades 7-12 will be at the high school.

"All three of our facilities meet the ventilation requirements or exceed," Wharton said.

ODE states students who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering for a values-based reason, should be provided access to distance learning. Wharton said everyone on school property, parents included, are asked to wear face masks, unless in their vehicle.

Options for the remainder of the school year at the preschool level at Nestucca Valley Early Learning Center are continued distance learning with Zoom options and packets or a hybrid model. Early Learning Program Director Diane Wilkinson said this is for students ages 3-5 only.

"Child care will be evaluated by our board of directors at a later date," Wilkinson said. "Once the rosters are created for the preschool classrooms, then we'll assign staff and determine what that hybrid model and daily schedule looks like."

Wilkinson said the center will have a stable cohort model with students utilizing outside doors. Models considered with be Monday/Tuesday and Wednesday/Thursday cohorts or a.m. class, and distance learning p.m. Fridays will always be a no class day

for staff and sanitization.

There will be daily health screenings at drop off and throughout the day, Wilkinson added. Drop off and pickup times will be established and will be inflexible. Orientation will be provided prior to reopening for every in-person family to ensure an understanding of protocols.

Nestucca Valley Elementary School Principal Chad Holloway said the distance learning/hybrid model would take place four days a week Monday through Thursday. Buses will arrive in a staggered manner beginning at 7:45 a.m. Buses will leave in a similar manner beginning at 2:45 p.m.

Desks will be spaced 6 feet apart, Holloway said. They will also be sanitized on a regular basis.

Grades K-2 will be staggered by grade level during recess. This will make it so there are not as many kids at the playground at one time. Grades 3-6 will be staggered by teachers.

Holloway said students will eat their lunch at their desks in their classrooms.

"We're going to be using the same desk and the same equipment," Holloway said.

Distance learning will mirror the hybrid schedule and instruction will be livestreamed from the classroom. Meetings will continue to be virtual.

"Our students are going to

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for maintenance.

"There's a really beautiful stretch at the confluence of the Nehalem and Salmonberry Rivers," Bowles said. "We could start doing soft surface trail there when we have funding and an agreement there for maintenance."

There will need to be plans in place for maintenance, such as volunteers picking up any litter on the trails.

The risk of flooding influenced the design concept of the trail dramatically, Bowles said. The challenging canyon area will be a narrower trail. It will not be ADA accessible. If a trail is washed out, it will be rehabbed in early spring or summer.

Regarding the issue of homelessness, Bowles said he does not think it will be an issue along Hwy 101, as many people will be using the trail in this area, and will likely push out homelessness. Operations and maintenance will also be in place before the trail is open.

Bowles said Tillamook County is rich with outdoor recreational opportunities; however, there is not a lot of access to trails.

"It will attract a ton of visitors that will most benefit Tillamook County," Bowles said of the trail. "These are going to be people who are probably without a car, they're going to be purchasing their food, supplies and entertainment in the county."

The county has also has growing issues with crowding and the trail would help disperse that in different areas.

The Salmonberry Trail and the Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad (OCSR) have come

together to explore solutions for the trail, Bowles said. He said he is encouraged by those conversations and in order for the trail to be successful, it requires a joint effort.

Bowles' role in the Salmonberry Trail is tracking where and when state and federal funding is available.

There is not pressure on Tillamook County taxpayers to pay for the trail. The trail would act as an additional resource in the county.

The Salmonberry Trail recently submitted two proposals for the Oregon Department of Transportation's Community Paths Program. The program will fund grants for project development, construction, reconstruction, major resurfacing or other improvements of multiuse paths that improve access and safety for people walking and bicycling. OCSR was a partner at the table, offering knowledge of the infrastructure. ODOT will announce grant awards this summer.

"I hope we win the funding," Bowles said. "But if we don't, I think we're proven we can work together and take a bite of this thing at a time."

Bowles said the public's concerns have been heard and will continue to be heard through the process of building the trail. Sections of the trail will be prioritized based on funding available. Bowles' goal with the foundation is to be part of the community and serve the people of Tillamook County.

department. "If anyone does contact you and asks for payment or credit card information, that is a scam."

Safeway and Tillamook Pharmacy are now eligible to schedule vaccines online. You can go to the Safeway website or healthmart.com for more

information.

"You are able to contact them directly if you would like to see if they have a vaccine available for you," Skaar said.

Skaar said the advisory council is looking at eligibility for future groups to see who will be next in line after those 65 and older, but have not made a decision at this time.

Volunteers are now being used at the vaccine

sites. If interested, email the health department at tcchc@co.tillamook.or.us

events took place for booster shots. Vaccine partners are working to vaccinate those 75 and older.

"There's approximately one thousand people we're working on to schedule over this week and the next," Colson said. "We plan to start scheduling those 70 and older starting next week on March 1."

There are about five thousand people in the 65 and older category, Colson added. There are not enough vaccines to address all age groups in the 65 and older category in one week. As of Feb. 26, 14.4 percent of Tillamook County residents have received the vaccine.

"Everybody who is eligible for those Phase 1A and groups 1-5 of Phase 1B are encouraged to enroll on our website," Colson said. "That form is available in both English and Spanish."

Due to high call volumes, the health department cannot schedule appointments by phone or email, but by the eligibility form, Colson added. The health department and vaccine partners are hoping to schedule 300-350 primary doses per week. The health department is working with

Rinehart Clinic and Nehalem Bay Fire and Rescue to schedule appointments in north Tillamook County and with Adventist Health to schedule appointments for south of the county.

"Once the appointments begin to be scheduled, our vaccine partners are going to call," Colson said. "They will identify themselves, which agency they are with, the location and time of the appointment."

Safeway and Tillamook Pharmacy are also able to schedule vaccines online. This is independent of the health department. You can

find more information on their websites.

Colson said there have been recommendations from the statewide vaccine advisory committee to discuss the next eligibility group. It is not official yet but there are recommendations for adults with underlying health conditions, frontline workers, and multigenerational households.

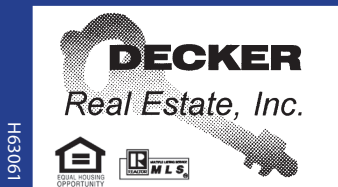
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FENCEPOSTS

We spotted an emergency situation unfolding about 5 p.m. on Feb. 20. A fire department vehicle, red lights flashing, drove over the berm at the end of Bayocean Road and onto the beach. We watched as the vehicle headed north to join three others already out near the south jetty. Soon a Coast Guard helicopter appeared overhead. We saw flashing lights at the jetty until night fell at approximately 6 p.m., after which we saw the headlights of the four vehicles as they came back along the beach to exit at the Bayocean Road beach access.

We found out later that the Coastal Reign, a 38-foot commercial crab boat out of Warrenton, had capsized about 4:40 p.m. in crossing the Tillamook Bay bar. The Coast Guard was monitoring the situation and saw the vessel get sideways to a swell and then capsize. Two rescue boats were immediately dispatched from Garibaldi. A Coast Guard boat crew pulled two individuals from the water around 5 p.m.; one was unresponsive. A Coast Guard helicopter from Astoria located and rescued a third individual, who had been able to climb onto jetty rocks.

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By 6 p.m., the last individual was spotted near floating debris and was rescued by the helicopter crew. All four victims were transported to Adventist Health Tillamook hospital. One was declared

dead, one was released after treatment, one was hospitalized in Tillamook, and the fourth was LifeFlighted to Portland in critical condition. The day after the accident, a second crewman succumbed to his injuries. The deceased were recently identified as Todd Chase and Zach Zapone, both of Warrenton; our hearts go out to their families and friends. At the time of this writing, the overturned boat is adrift and a navigational hazard; authorities are determining how best to recover it.

Power went out in Cape Meares about 2:30 p.m. on

Feb. 22. A tree took down about 600 feet of powerline on Bayocean Road at milepost 3.2, after 24 hours of significant rain. Fortunately, we were prepared with stand-alone charging units for our cell phones, lanterns and a fire in the fireplace. We didn't have to hold out too long. Our stellar PUD crew got the power back on by 5 p.m., just in time to cook dinner. Thank you, Tillamook PUD!

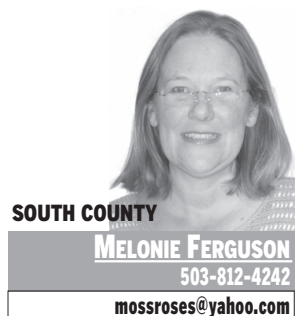
I mentioned last week that some local birds are getting sick. It turns out that there is an outbreak of salmonella affecting pine siskins and other birds from San Fran-

cisco to British Columbia. Please remove bird feeders and baths for at least the next two months. Not only is this outbreak worrisome for birds, but salmonella can spread to humans and pets; be sure to wear gloves and remove dead birds if you find them in your yard. Call ODFW at 866-968-2600 to report sick birds.

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
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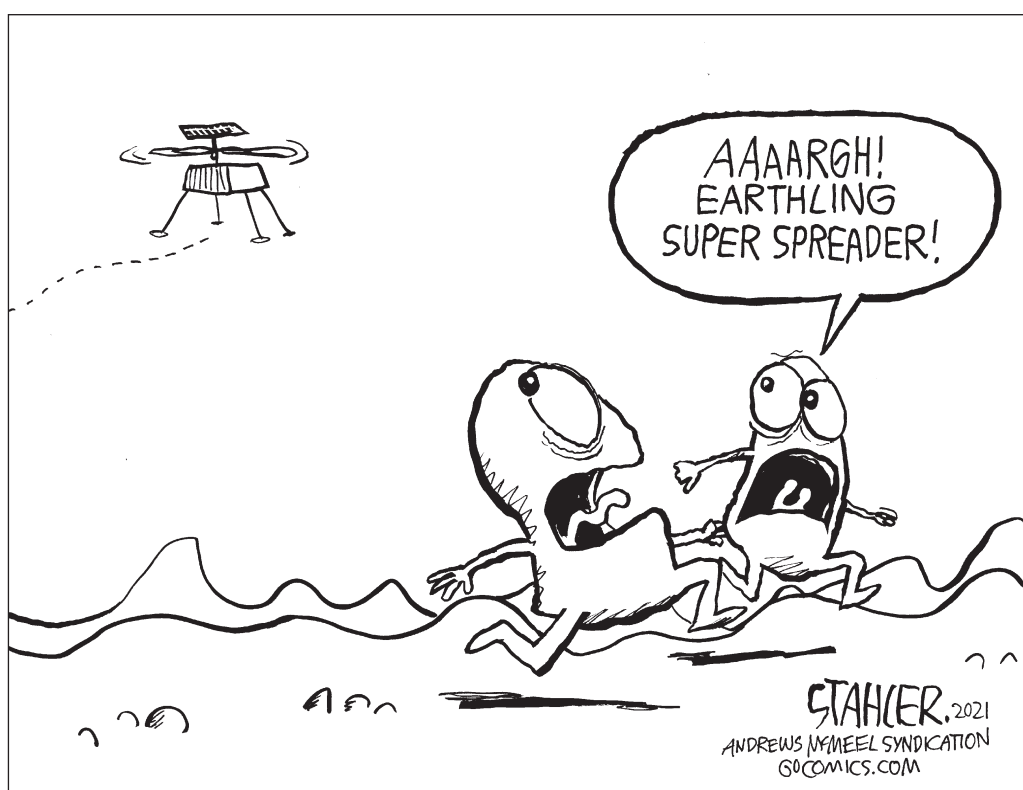

TALES FROM THE LIBRARY

"My kids are too old for children's picture books now."

This is one of the saddest things that my librarian ears hear. Why? Because I do not believe you are EVER too old for picture books. They are art forms unto themselves and they have lessons for us all, no matter our age.

In fact, I must tattle on myself for a minute. At least half of the books I check out from the library are picture books. My colleagues often see me stuffing my backpack with kids' books and they say, "Taking some books to the grandkids, huh?" And I nod affirmatively and let them think that...but really, these colorful beauties are for ME! Oh, I might share some of them with the grandkids if I think they will enjoy certain titles, but I usually have my own self-interest in mind when I check them out.

I always chuckle to myself when I hear an aspiring author say they want to write books, but they have decided to write a kids' picture book first to break into the business...as if that is the easiest kind of book to write. That is kind of like saying you want to drive a car, but you are going to drive the Space Shuttle first just to get



started. What is so hard about writing a standard 32-page picture book? First of all, the remarkable literary economy of putting a complete story together with as few of just the right words as possible, all while perfectly matching the style and details of the illustration, is one of the greatest writing challenges an author can tackle. You have so few words to build your characters and to help develop a beginning, middle and conclusion to your story, so each and every word must earn its place in the manuscript.

But therein lies the magic of a well-done book. When you put just the right picture book into the hands of just the right reader, regardless of age, it is like a party for the brain. Seeing the artwork blend with the minimal words, it allows the cerebral cortex to take over and interpret the message uniquely...inspiring and developing the way we each see the world. You can almost see the syn-

apsis firing in the brain when the magic of a picture book happens. If you have not seen the new children's books that are being published today, you really need to take a look. Stiff competition from video games and the internet have pushed publishing companies into new directions, often incorporating more visually stimulating ways to create stories.

Where should you start? I happen to have hundreds of suggestions for you, but I will just point out a few! Since we have so many gardeners in Tillamook County, I would recommend a new GIANT picture book called In the Garden by Emma Giuliani. It is a lavishly illustrated volume with lots of factual information and lift-a-flaps on every page. For something more poignant, I would suggest Now by Antoinette Portis, or You Matter by Christian Robinson. Anyone looking to go old-school would also appreciate the lessons and beauty from Shel Silverstein's The Giving Tree.

There is no shame in checking out books in a different age level. One fringe benefit of reading lots of thin kids' books is you can impress your friends by telling them you read over 500 books this year! No one has to know they were only 32 pages each!

March is problem gambling awareness month

Each year, the month of March is recognized as Problem Gambling Awareness Month. Problem gambling can be defined as any form of gambling that has a negative effect on your life. This concern affects the lives of many Oregonians and those who are close to them. According to the Oregon Health Authority, it is estimated that 84,000 Oregon adults meet the clinical diagnosis of a problem gambling disorder. Adults who experience problem gambling may have: relationship problems, strained finances, absenteeism from work, changes in mood, and co-occurring substance use disorder. Gambling can also affect the youth population. According to the Oregon Health Authority, it is estimated that 5,800 Oregon youth are at risk or are currently experiencing problem gambling. Sources of youth gambling



include: sports betting, games of skill, social gaming, dice games, lottery tickets, fantasy sports, scratch off cards, and video games. The Oregon Health Authority has found that 11th grade students who gamble had higher rates of: substance use, truancy, and physical fights.

The good news is that this concern can be prevented. Prevention resources can be accessed from the Oregon Problem Gambling Resource (OPGR) website at opgr.org. Examples of prevention resources that can be found on this website include: problem gambling warning signs, responsible guidelines, and conversation tips. Local prevention services are available at Tillamook Family Counseling Center. Prevention services include: presentations, information dissemination, and more. To learn more about local prevention services call (503)842-8201.

If gambling is a problem for you or someone you know, help is available. Oregon residents who experience problems with gambling and for those who are directly affected by problem gambling can access free and confidential treatment from a Certified Gambling Addiction Counselor. Tillamook Family Counseling Center is Tillamook County's problem gambling treatment site. To learn more about treatment call 503-842-8201. If you live outside of Tillamook County, you can contact the OPGR helpline to locate the nearest problem gambling treatment provider. The OPGR helpline can be reached 24/7 by calling 1-877-MY-LIMIT (695-4648).

Continue reading this column to get some ideas of ways you can observe this year's Problem Gambling Awareness Month:

- Examine your knowledge, beliefs, and behaviors on the topic of gambling.
- Learn about problem gambling. For national information visit the National Council on Problem Gambling's FAQ's. This information can be accessed at: ncpgambling.org. For state specific information visit oregon.gov and search for

problem gambling. Once you search this information you will get a brief overview of the Oregon Problem Gambling Services and access state problem gambling statistics.

- Learn common problem gambling warning signs. The warning signs can be found at opgr.org.

- Visit OPGR's website take a short self-evaluation. This evaluation can help you understand if you are at risk for problem gambling.

- If you choose to gamble, create responsible guidelines. Examples of responsible guidelines include: setting a time limit, not using substances when gambling, not gambling using credit, and/or not gambling to cope with stress.

- Visit opgr.org to learn when and how to talk to an adult about problem gambling.

- Visit opgr.org to learn when and how to talk to youth about problem gambling.

- Gift responsibly. Abstain from buying lottery tickets or scratch off cards for youth under the legal age to purchase gambling products.

- Like and/or share SOS Tillamook's problem gambling prevention Facebook post on your personal Facebook page.

- Program the OPGR helpline (1-877-MY LIMIT) into your phone. This helpline provides free and confidential help for those experiencing problem gambling and for those who are directly affected by problem gambling.

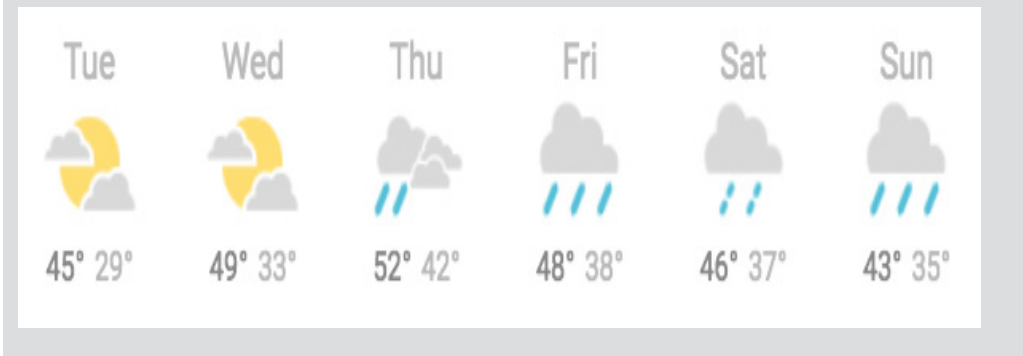
- Put a SOS Tillamook "Hope and Help" magnet on the filing cabinet at your place of employment or on your home refrigerator. The "HOPE and Help" magnet lists important numbers including the OPGR problem gambling helpline number.

- If you are in an administrative position at your place of employment, consider adding a problem gambling section in your personnel handbook. In the handbook you can include the OPGR helpline number and information about local treatment options.

- Contact the prevention department at Tillamook Family Counseling Center to ask about problem gambling prevention services.

- Call Tillamook Family Counseling Center to ask about free and confidential problem gambling treatment services by calling (503)842-8201. The Tillamook Family Counseling Center staffs a Licensed Clinical Social Worker who is also a Certified Gambling Addiction Counselor (CGAC).

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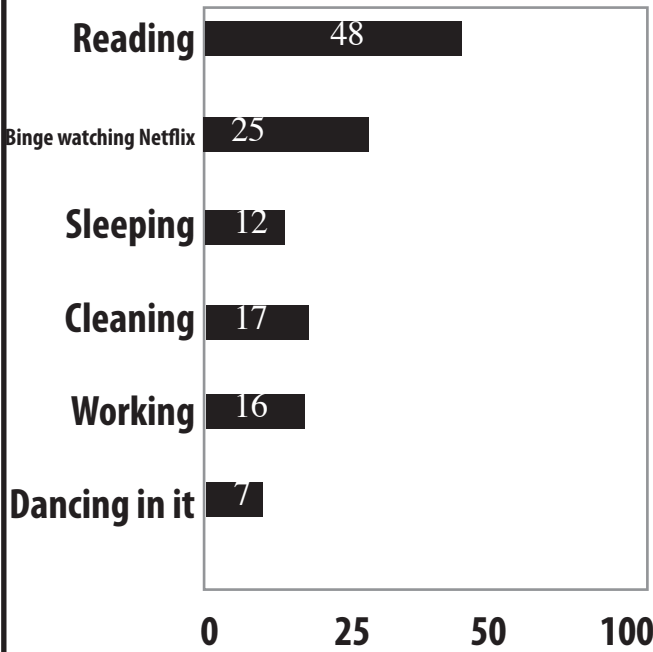

Lives of people on North Coast in jeopardy

"Water Is Life" says a sign in my neighbor's yard. Lives of people on the North Coast are in jeopardy, because our drinking water sources are in danger. Many previously-forested areas which provided our sources of drinking water are now bare acres of stumps, due to clearcutting. In addition, these areas have been sprayed with potentially harmful chemicals which run off into streams that feed our watersheds and are the sources of our drinking water.

This past year has had glaring incidents of clean water threats: first, the pesticide spraying of a huge Weyerhaeuser clearcut less than a half-mile from Nehalem Elementary School; next, pesticide spraying immediately above the town of Wheeler; then, the clearcuts on steep slopes above both East Foley Creek and the Trask River, salmon-spawning streams; finally, the Jetty Creek watershed lost a large area of older trees (in an area known as Olympic Line) due to clearcut logging.

ging. Jetty Creek provides water to Rockaway Beach, where a new multimillion dollar water filtration system had to be built at community expense due to damage to the watershed caused by clearcuts. In early December 2020, with only two weeks notice, Olympic Line was due to be clearcut. Since this short notice was given right before the

Thanksgiving Day weekend, those of us with North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection (NCCWP) asked for letters to be written to the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF), requesting more time for public comment and investigation before the operation was approved. Amazingly, 110 people wrote to ODF. Unfortunately, in spite of the large public outcry, no time extension was granted and Stimson was allowed to proceed with the clearcutting of Olympic Line, one

of the last vestiges of older trees that remained in the Jetty Creek watershed.

All of our coastal watersheds are potentially in danger from the timber companies that log aggressively while reaping benefits of tax cuts that have cost coastal counties at least

\$3,000,000,000. Many profits from logging are funneled to Wall Street real estate investment trusts that have profited at the expense of rural communities. In the past, for decades, private timber owners had been required to pay a severance tax on the value of the trees they logged, but starting in 1994, that tax was eliminated by the Oregon Legislature. So today, monies that the counties need for education, roads, and other infrastructure have evaporated.

North Coast Communities for Watershed Protection is working to shine a light on what is happening to drinking water for our coastal residents. Unlike Portland, that has its primary source of water in the protected Bull Run Reservoir, coastal residents do not have the assurance that our water sources will be protected. The laws governing forestry practices in Oregon are more lax than in Washington, Idaho, and

California, largely because of lobbyists for the forestry industry. Our legislators, the ODF and Tillamook Board of Commissioners need to work for the people of Oregon in demanding that our drinking water be safe!

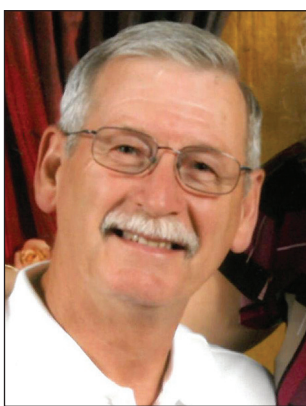

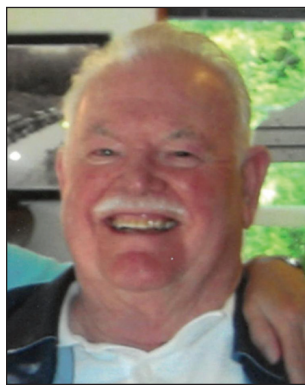

He then moved on to Tektronix as an assembly man. He spent time as a lineman for West Coast Telephone and eventually ended up working for G.T.E. as an engineer. Lawrence had many hobbies including fishing, golfing and bowling. He was also a very avid reader. He was a commercial pilot and was a member of the Oregon Pilots

Association. He was also a lifelong member of the Elks Lodge.

Lawrence is survived by his long time companion Joan Wells and her two children Jeremy Keidel and Jennifer Flores; four brothers: Carl Holsey (Betty), Don Holsey, Jack Holsey (Glenda) and Dennis Holsey (Judi) and one sister, Joan Holsey.

Lawrence was preceded in death by his parents Buck and Frances Holsey, his wife of 35 years Judi (Cantwell) Holsey and one brother Larry Holsey.

What's in you bucket?

I find that five-gallon buckets are the perfect way to stash my tools when I am ready to go out into the garden. For one thing, they generally have a nice handle with a plastic grip. They hold a lot of hand tools, and I have made a divider for the bucket that is shaped like an "X" out of two pieces of coated corrugated cardboard. By making a slit in the bottom of one to about half the height and the top of the other at the same depth, they can be slotted together. This gives me four sections in the bucket to divide between sharp tools (knives), digging tools (trowels), soft items (gloves and ties) and the fourth section for miscellaneous items that I will explain in a minute.

To start with, in the sharp section of my bucket, I have an old chef's knife with a wide blade. That has been invaluable to me for cutting apart clumps of lily or hosta roots when I am dividing them. I also use the chef's knife to weed between cracks around paving stones. There is something called a "hori-hori" knife that is made for these purposes but at \$34 and up, they are quite expensive. I purchased my chef's knife at a thrift store for about \$4. It is not serrated so I can sharpen it should it get dull.

Also in the sharp section is another thrift store find: an old steak knife. I use this serrated-bladed knife when I need a bit more oomph while cutting. But I find the chef's knife is better at most tasks and easier to maintain a sharp edge.

In my digging section, I have two favorite trowels. One has a wide blade and the other a narrow blade. They are both made of tough stainless steel and the blade and handle are of one piece. The handle is padded and red, so

it is easy to spot when I lay it down. I also have a third trowel that is very narrow and pointed at the tip and I can use that to get into tight spaces. I also have the ubiquitous snake-tongue weeder.

In the soft section of my bucket, I keep two pairs of garden gloves. One pair is the snugger-fit gloves with nitrile-coated palms that I wear 90% of the time because they allow me to pick up small pieces of whatever. I wouldn't think of not wearing gloves for the main reason that I refuse to touch a slug or snail with my bare hands, and sometimes I just pick them up and put them in a closed container for disposal. The other pair of gloves has a suede palm and fingers and a longer sleeve or gauntlet. These I use for working around roses or blackberries.

I also keep my plant ties in the soft section. I have a variety from small, thin strings to Velcro strips. I also have an old rag that I use to wipe dirt or mud off pots and garden art. I generally moisten the rag before use, but am careful to wring it out and hang it to dry in the sun at the end of the gardening session. This will avoid mildew and mold forming.

I would guess you wouldn't expect to see a large syringe in the miscellaneous section of my garden bucket. But I just got a 150 ml plastic syringe that I will use for watering my potted succulent gardens. It is

also good for watering in other tight spaces where you don't want to get water on the plant's leaves, especially African violets. Found mine on Amazon for about \$6. But there are lesser-priced ones that come in a three-pack for \$9. I find a single syringe will last me long enough that I won't need three. You could also use a well-washed out dish detergent bottle with a spout cap to get into those small spaces in pots.

I have an old wooden chopstick in the miscellaneous section, too. This is perfect for making small holes in soil or potting soil to plant seeds. I find the wooden ones hold up better than the plastic chopsticks that tend to break easily.

A piece of sandpaper lives in a plastic bag in the miscellaneous section makes it easy to sharpen knives or the edge of trowels and shovels. I also keep a canister of bleach or alcohol wipes to sanitize pruners when moving from plant to plant.

And the last thing I have in my miscellaneous section is a package of Benadryl. I learned a hard lesson when I tackled an area of a friend's garden and disturbed a nest of ground bees. They were angered enough that they followed me as I tried to get away from them. I had quite an itchy reaction to the stings and now I am a.) more careful in remote areas of gardens, and b.) ready to take Benadryl after being stung to prevent itching. Of course, if you know in advance you are severely allergic to bee stings, you may already have an injectable form of Epinephrine that you always carry with you.

Bottom line: customize your bucket any way you find helpful. I try to make it easy on myself and you should, too.

OHA announces next vaccine phases

General public to be eligible by summer

Oregon turned a corner in its efforts to vaccinate residents against the coronavirus Friday, setting a schedule for the eligibility for every adult in the state to receive a shot.

The announcement sets an ambitious timeline for vastly expanding the number of Oregonians who can get in line for a COVID-19 vaccine, with select populations becoming eligible by the end of March and the general public to become eligible by late July.

“Yes, you’re hearing me correctly,” said Oregon Governor Kate Brown at a news conference Friday. “Come summer, provided supplies from the federal government continue as planned, any Oregonian who wants the vaccine will be eligible to receive it.”

Under the plan, on March 29 the state will open eligibility to the next slate of individuals in group 1B. Officials said that includes:

Adults 45-64, with 1+ CDC-defined underlying health conditions with increased risk. (Conditions include cancer, chronic kidney disease, COPD, Down’s syndrome, heart conditions, immunocompromised state, obesity defined by a BMI of 30 or above, pregnancy, sickle-cell disease and Type II diabetes.)

A portion of frontline work-

ers who are highly vulnerable, including migrant and seasonal farm workers; seafood, agricultural and food processing workers; and woodland firefighters.

Families displaced by Sept. 2020 forest fires.

People living in low-income and congregate senior housing.

Individuals experiencing homelessness.

No later than May 1, the state will open eligibility to:

Adults 16-45 with 1+ CDC defined underlying health conditions with increased risk.

Other CDC-defined frontline workers, which the CDC defines as “necessary for the functioning of society,” and who are at higher risk for contracting the virus because they can’t work from home or often come in contact with others at work. Some examples include grocery store workers, members of the media, public transit operators and the U.S. Postal Service.

People who live in multi-generational households.

No later than June 1, the state will open eligibility to the general population 45 or older, and no later than July 1, the state will open eligibility to anyone 16 and older.

“For the first time since the pandemic started, we can provide a timeline that will tell every adult Oregonian a date before which he or she will be eligible to get vaccinated,” said Oregon Health Authority Director Patrick Allen Friday. “This will bring into clearer view a time when we will be freed from the grip of the pandemic, and we can see our loved ones, celebrate holidays and return to some of our normal life again.”

Friday’s announcement came on the heels of a chaotic week for scheduling vaccine appointments, particularly in the state’s high-population areas, which has pushed state officials to change how appointments are scheduled at major metro sites.

But according to Allen, the state is already ahead of its own timeline, giving health officials confidence in the ambitious next phases.

“We’re speeding up our timelines, not backing off,”

Allen said.

So far, just over 7% of Oregonians have been fully vaccinated against the virus, with about twice that having received at least a first dose.

That includes about 46% of those over 80, Allen said, and about a third of those over 65 (the age group which will become fully eligible for doses starting March 1). Allen projects about three quarters of the state’s seniors will be vaccinated by March 29, weeks ahead of the state’s previous timeline.

According to Allen, the state’s big plans are predicated on big promises: He projects the state will have received 1.4 million first doses by the week of March 21, more than the 1.3 million people who will be eligible by then.

But those figures are based on projections by the federal government and the

companies manufacturing the vaccines – expectations which haven’t always been met in previous phases of the pandemic.

“Again, these projections depend entirely on our supply,” Allen said. “Until we see these doses show up in the ordering system, we’re going to continue to take a conservative approach.”

What’s more, it’ll still take several weeks for the state to reach that level if the manufacturers can meet that demand.

“For the next week or two, we’ll still face shortages,” Allen said Friday. “For the next week or two, appointments will be hard to get. And for the next week or two, many seniors still won’t get a vaccine right away and many people will be frustrated and unhappy.”

According to Rachel

Banks, Oregon’s public health director, the state determined the next slate of residents to get vaccinated with the help of an advisory committee, as well as federal regulations and state data about where people in the state are getting infected.

Banks said the state will soon have to shift its focus from getting enough doses to encouraging people to get the vaccine.

“Soon, we’ll reach a point where we no longer have too few doses for too many people who want them. We’ll have enough doses for everyone, but the question will be, will enough people take them?” Banks said. “I hope every Oregonian will make an informed decision, and as your public health director, I know vaccines are a vital tool to protect the health of the public.”

March is National Nutrition Month and an easy way to focus on healthy eating is by choosing locally-sourced foods. Tillamook County residents have a variety of options when it comes to enjoying the bounty of local foods available literally from our own backyards. Gardening has seen a resurgence in popularity during the pandemic, and there are several sources for free seeds available at the main branch of the Tillamook Library. If growing your own isn't an option, consider signing up for a local CSA (Community-Support Agriculture) subscription box. This is a great deal and makes your veggie purchases easy throughout the growing season. Beginning in May or June depending on the farm, CSA subscribers receive a box (or set amount – half shares are often available) of seasonal produce. Generally, a full-share CSA provides enough, or usually more than enough, produce for a family of four, and often

half shares are available as well. The CSA boxes also often come with recipes and ideas for the veggies, and include heirloom varieties and provide an opportunity to experiment and try lots of vegetables.

According to Corvus Landing Farm, "Your CSA share is truly an investment in the farm. Your early season payments have allowed us to buy seed, supplies, and invest in improvements to the farm. Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups whole grain pasta (try shells, elbow, or bow tie)
- 1 Tablespoon margarine or butter
- 2 Tablespoons chopped onion
- 1 can (5 ounces) canned salmon, drained (about 1/2 cup cooked fresh salmon)
- 2 small tomatoes, chopped
- 3 Tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 Tablespoon chopped parsley or 1

teaspoon dried parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Directions:

1. Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain, then set aside.
2. While pasta is cooking, heat butter in a medium skillet over medium heat (300 degrees in an electric skillet). Add onion and cook until tender.
3. Add cooked pasta, salmon, tomato, lemon juice, parsley and salt. Cook until heated through.
4. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

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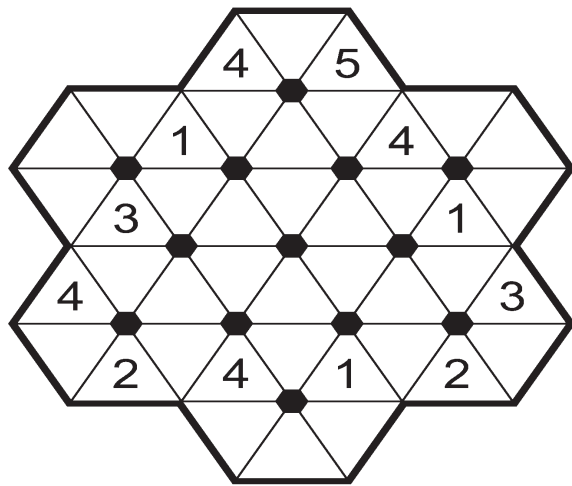
