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New life for Tillamook's Kilchis House: A community asset of Supportive Housing

Last week, the CARE Board of Directors entered into an agreement with Tillamook Family Counseling Center's (TFCC) Board of Directors for the sale of the former Kilchis House property in Tillamook, OR. TFCC plans to provide affordable, permanent supportive housing for individuals who struggle with significant behavioral health challenges. This will provide a stable housing option with mental health support services accessible on-site for residents. This program is made possible through an allocation by the Oregon Legislature (House Bill 5202) to the Oregon Health Authority. Using this allocation of state General Funds, OHA's grant awards to Oregon counties specifically targets and supports the development of local behavioral health housing options. After the sale's closing and Oregon Housing and Community Services approval the launch of the new program is expected to begin following some minor renovations to the building.

"Right now, many people with severe and persistent mental illness struggle to find housing and to stay housed because of their illness," states Frank Hanna-Williams, Executive Director of TFCC, "This new project means that many more people will not face homelessness and will have a place where they can get the support they need." The new TFCC program at the former Kilchis

House will include up to 30 units of affordable rental housing for those with significant behavioral health challenges. "We are so excited to be working with TFCC on this project" comments Peter Starkey, CARE's Executive Director, "CARE and TFCC have a strong partnership and collaboration between our programs, and we are excited to continue working with TFCC on this new endeavor."

After a long and rigorous process of reviewing the financial performance of CARE's assisted living facilities during the CO-

VID-19 pandemic, the CARE Board of Directors made the difficult decision to close the Kilchis House and the Nehalem Bay House earlier this year. "While we have been working to find a new owner for Kilchis House, we have focused on identifying a buyer whose mission and use aligns with CARE's mission to create more healthy and resilient communities in Tillamook County," comments Dusti Linnell, Chair of the CARE Board, "TFCC's plan aligns perfectly with that mission."

CARE continues to explore the

future of the former Nehalem Bay House property. Both properties are restricted to seniors and those with disabilities under the terms of Elderly Bond that originally funded the development of these properties in the mid-1990s. Linnell assures "we will continue our process of maximizing the potential of Nehalem Bay House for the community." Extreme wildfire danger triggers power shutoffs

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Electrical power has been restored to the Lincoln County and other areas affected by the Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) within the Pacific Power district.

On Thursday, PSPS announced shutoffs could affect some customers in South Tillamook County, near Neskowin, but Tillamook PUD assured customers that planned shutoffs scheduled by PSPS would not affect those customers. PUD did respond to an outage in that part of the county, but it was reported as high winds knocking branches off trees and downing power lines as the issue.

Pacific Power estimates that 1,700 customers north of Lincoln City in Otis and the Rose Lodge area were impacted by the (PSPS) Friday, Sept. 9 and Saturday, Sept. 10

Pacific Power's weather team had been tracking the wind event for several days, providing updates daily that indicated where the most need would be for crews to be staging, given the combination of low humidity, high winds and dry conditions, Pacific Power Public Relations Representative Drew Hanson said.

Before the event, Pacific Power worked closely with local emergency management planners at cities and counties in the utility's districts with table-top exercises for best preparation. The utility also planned to bring in additional crews and equipment to Lincoln City late Friday as a proactive effort to be ready to respond to any weather-related event.

"It's the normal equipment, such as polls, wires, trucks and professional line persons that we have readily available," Hanson said. "They will be out there inspecting, so it will be an active time as the crews work to make a quick and safe restoration of service."

He added that such events are another reminder for local residents to be prepared for power disruptions, no matter what the season.

After the winds decreased Decreased wildfire weather conditions early Saturday allowed the utility's personnel to begin patrolling lines to perform safety checks.

Vegetation debris was cleared in some spots and minor wind damage repair was required in other areas. Step restorations, such as turning on power section by section, then took place with customers re-energized by Saturday afternoon, according to Pacific Power Vice President of Operations Allen Berreth.

"Community safety and reducing wildfire risk are top priorities for us," Berreth said. "We thank our customers for their patience and understanding through this event. I also acknowledge the all-hands-on-deck approach from Pacific Power personnel. Our team emphasized safety for our customers, communities and co-workers. We thank the crews patrolling and repairing lines, the staff monitoring conditions and volunteers at the community resource centers."

Garibaldi households get 'smart' water meters

Household residents of Garibaldi have begun receiving new "smart" water meters.

Blue flags and utility paint now identify the locations.

Crews from the Portland-based company, Correct Equipment, will replace the existing meters and install Kamstrup units as part of the City's

new Advance Metering Infrastructure system. The smart meters - based on the newest ultrasonic technology - will significantly reduce the time and manpower the City has used to perform this utility data collection.

City Administrative staff will now receive accurate water use data from each individual house and building directly from a Public Works employee who drives by the meters whereby the data is automatically uploaded into a handheld device and relayed to an office computer for billing. The meters can also detect water leaks. Mayor Tim Hall and former City

Manager Juliet Hyams worked directly with State Representative Suzanne Weber and her staff to present two non-construction projects that were eligible for funding.

During the Oregon Legislature's short session, Weber called for the funding of the smart meters and a Wastewater Facilities Master Plan for a total grant of \$361,000.

"Representative Weber's dedication to ensure that Garibaldi was not the only city in Oregon to fail to receive grants was truly outstanding," said Hall. "This was a big help to move our city another step

forward."

Garibaldi was not eligible for an earlier anticipated \$300,000 grant as, despite claims, it had no "shovel-ready" projects with engineered plans. The past unreported \$800,000 of backlogged water system repairs remains an issue.

Mayor Hall said that once the City's finances are put in good order, he expects more grant opportunities will open up for Garibaldi. He added he does not want residents to shoulder the financial burden when there are State and federal funds available if you qualify.

I must say that the more of these dairies that I visit and share with you, the more great people

I meet and the more incredible family histories I learn about; every one of them is an adventure for me! And such was the case with my visit to Jenck Farms, located at 745 3rd Street in Tillamook.

Owned by Joe and Lonnie Jenck (pronounced "Yank"), his son Brian and daughter-in-law Kayla, Joe's brother Donnie and sister-in-law Michelle, and mother Andrea, the history of Jenck Farms began in 1892, when Peter Jenck (Joe's great grandfather) first homesteaded a dairy in Cloverdale. That farm was passed on to Peter's son, Martin, who became one of the early board members of the TCCA (Tillamook County Creamery Association).

"Martin moved north from Cloverdale to the Tillamook area in the mid-30's," Joe said. "My father, Don, also very well known as "Hooker", first leased a farm in 1947 at the age of 17, while still in high school, until he bought this dairy in 1953."

But a natural disaster – the Columbus Day storm in

November of 1962 – took a heavy toll on the farm. "My husband and I had gotten married and just returned from our honeymoon and the storm has already started," said Andrea. "Later that day the high winds collapsed the barn and killed forty of our cows. We lost half of our herd."

It would have been easy to give up following the disaster, but the Jencks persevered.

"It was a blessing in disguise," said Joe. "My dad found a farmer in Scappoose who offered to sell him five cows. He had heard about our loss. When my dad went to leave with the cows, he noticed there were two extra cows in the truck. The man, by the last name of Knutzel, told my dad to take them, too. My dad told him he couldn't afford to pay for the two extra cows, and he told my dad he could just pay him for them when he was able to. Knutzel's son, who had planned to take over his dad's farm, was killed during a trip to Switzerland. That was when Mr. Knutzel decided to sell off all his stock. My dad ended up buying a total of forty cows from him."

"I think just being able to operate the dairy every day, and to have expanded from one-hundred acres to the

three-hundred acres we have today is one of our biggest successes," said Brian. "This is the accumulation of four original dairies."

Today, Jenck Farms' herd, all Holsteins, includes 330 milking cows and a total herd of 550 including young stock. They produce 3,000 gallons of milk daily, 21,000 gallons weekly, 90,000 gallons monthly, and 1.1 million gallons annually.

"We are one of the top producing dairies in the county today," said Joe. "We added the value of our product as a producer. Were it not for that, there would be no dairies in Tillamook County."

The brand – Tillamook Cheese – creates that value." Joe has been on the board of directors of TCCA for the past nine years.

"We have been one of the top five producers in Tillamook County for the past eight years," Brian added.

"Another big part of our dairy has been in the trucking business," said Joe. "We haul a lot of hay to dairies in Tillamook County as well as other areas of the state."

Like all other dairies in the county, Jenck Farms has had to deal with challenges of ever-increasing regulations such as animal welfare, how

pastures are fertilized, and agricultural overtime laws.

"It has also been very difficult to find employees that are willing to do the kind of work that we have to do," Joe said.

"There is no comparison today from what the farm was back then," said Andrea. "It is amazing how technology has made it so much easier."

Like many dairies in the county, the Jencks use DeLaval milking machines, but no robotics. And

Also like many dairies, all their cows are fitted with collars that track their move-

ment, activity, and monitor their health, not unlike a Fitbit.

"We give about twenty tours a year," said Joe. "We have had visitors from India, China, and Switzerland, just to name a few. "And most of them come away with a much better understanding of what a dairy really is, in contrast to all the misconceptions about the industry."

Joe also explained about how the public's image of the dairy farmer has changed over time.

"Back in the 30's, my dad

told me that dairy farming was looked upon as a very well-respected profession. But he saw that change over the years. My hope is that my son will see it transition back in his lifetime. I doubt that I will see it in mine."

It is quite obvious that Jenck Farms is a time-tested, honorable, and dedicated family way of life.

"My father loved the farm," said Joe. "But he told me to never feel obligated to continue this legacy if my heart wasn't in it."

New data to track monkeypox cases

The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) is now publishing monthly reports of monkeypox (hMPXV) case data by sexual orientation or gender identity, and by expanded categories of race and ethnicity.

The OHA said publication of the data, in consultation with OHA's Equity and Inclusion Division (OEI), will help the agency better understand the diversity of the people living in Oregon, which will help it identify and address health disparities and support data justice in communities most affected by health disparities.

The monkeypox outbreak is the first communicable disease outbreak for which OHA is publicly reporting sexual orientation or gender identity (SOGI) data, and data from expanded race and ethnicity categories found in REALD,

or race and ethnicity, language or disability. The data will be reported each month on OHA's monkeypox (hMPXV) website.

"OHA has established a strategic goal to achieve health equity by 2030," OHA State Epidemiologist Dean Sidelinger said. "A critical component to meeting this goal is ensuring meaningful access to services for everyone in Oregon, regardless of their race, ethnicity, language, disability, or sexual orientation and gender identity. The REALD and SOGI data will help guide OHA and its partners in an equitable response to the monkeypox outbreak."

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed House Bill 3159, which charged OHA with drafting and adding SOGI questions to the current data collection standards in OHA Oregon Administrative Rules; building

a data collection system for both REALD and SOGI; and developing and implementing reporting requirements.

In 2018, OHA's Equity and Inclusion Division convened a Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Data Collection Committee. The group consists of internal and external stakeholders who interact with the LGBTQ+ community and health systems, many of whom identify as LGBTQ+ themselves.

The Oregon Legislature passed House Bill 3159 in 2021, charging OHA with drafting and adding SOGI questions to the current data collection standards in OHA Oregon Administrative Rules, building a data collection system for both REALD and SOGI and developing and implementing reporting requirements. The SOGI Data Collection Committee

draft data collection standards have been implemented in Oregon's public health communicable disease data collection system known as Orpheus.

OHA and local public health partners have been collecting SOGI information from people diagnosed with monkeypox since the start of the outbreak in Oregon.

While the narrative of monkeypox in the United States has centered on cisgender gay men as the population most affected by the virus, this narrative does not reflect the full spectrum of people who have been affected by monkeypox, according to the OHA.

The SOGI will help illuminate the experiences of people with other gender identities and sexual orientations in the Oregon outbreak of monkeypox, Sidelinger said.

Oregon records 1 case of swine flu

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One case of human infec-

tion with an influenza variant that usually spreads only in pigs has been reported in Oregon and five cases have been reported nationally in August, according to a release from Lincoln County Health and Human Services.

Most cases report pig exposure or fair attendance.

Symptoms of this variant influenza virus infection are like those of seasonal influenza infections and have included fever, cough, sore throat, muscle aches and pains, and headache.

No hospitalizations or deaths have occurred among these five cases, and all patients are recovering or have recovered from their illnesses.

To date, no person-to-person spread associated with the five recent variant influenza virus infections has been identified.

The identity of the person who has been infected and the person's location had not been publicly released by Lincoln County Health and Human Services as of this report.

Protection recommendations People who are at higher risk for influenza complications should avoid exposure to pigs and swine barns at fairs this year. If you cannot avoid exposure to pigs, you should wear a

well-fitting mask that covers the nose and mouth and you should perform hand hygiene frequently.

All persons should take precautions when engaging in activities that may involve swine contact. Precautions include hand hygiene before and after exposure to animals, avoiding eating or drinking in animal areas, and avoiding close contact with animals that look or act ill.

Patients who experience influenza-like symptoms following direct or close contact with pigs and who seek medical care should inform their health care provider about the exposure. Those at high risk for complications should seek healthcare as soon as possible after symptom onset.

Oregon public health departments have enhanced surveillance for respiratory symptoms illness during the agricultural fair and investigation of variant influenza virus infections are important to determine whether the virus is spreading efficiently among people.

Clinicians are encouraged to consider variant influenza virus infection as a possible diagnosis when evaluating patients with acute respiratory illnesses and

exposure to pigs or agricultural fairs prior to illness.

Medical Information Most commonly, human infections with swine influenza virus, now called variant virus infections, occur in people with exposure to infected pigs. For example, children near pigs at a fair or workers in the swine industry, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

The infections are thought to happen mainly when an infected pig coughs or sneezes and droplets with influenza virus in them spread through the air. If these droplets land in your nose or mouth, or are inhaled, you can be infected.

There also is some evidence that you might get infected by touching something that has virus on it and then touching your own mouth or nose. A third way to possibly get infected is to inhale particles containing influenza virus. Scientists aren't really sure which of these ways of spread is the most common.

Swine influenza has not been shown to be transmissible to people through eating properly handled and prepared pork (pig meat) or other products derived from pigs.

The National Weather Service (NWS) in Portland issued a Red Flag Warning Sept. 8 for much of Oregon and Washington, which means that critical fire weather conditions are either occurring or will shortly. A combination of high winds, low humidity and drought can contribute to extreme fire behavior, the NWS said.

Late Thursday afternoon, Sept. 8, Gov. Kate Brown conducted a media briefing about the approaching windstorm and the extreme wildfire conditions. Brown was joined by state fire and emergency management officials and leaders of the state's two large electrical utilities.

"168,000 acres are burning across out state right now," Brown said. "And in many parts of the state people are impacted by the smoke of these fires."

"We are a critical point, any additional fires would be problematic," Oregon Chief Deputy Fire Marshal Travis Medema said.

"The combination of dry conditions, high winds and low humidity can lead to explosive fire growth," Oregon Department of Forestry Fire Chief Mike Shaw said. "We are very concerned about the next 72 hours and what that means both in terms of what new fires will start and the larger fires on the landscape."

Shaw said the current wildfires are threatening hundreds of homes in Oregon.

Be prepared

Brown urged all Oregonians to be prepared for evacuations.

"Go to bed tonight with a plan in the event your family needs to evacuate, or you wake up without power," she said.

Brown encouraged anyone who hasn't, to sign up for emergency notification alerts at ORALERT.gov.

"Now is the time to charge your devices, make sure you have batteries, have nonperishable food and water available and extra medications in case you have to go without power for a couple of days, or if you need to evacuate from your home because of fire," Oregon Emergency Management Director Andrew Phelps said.

He also urging everyone to have an evacuation plan in

place and to be ready to go if wildfires are threatening their community. Phelps said in the case of evacuations, everyone needs to be ready.

"Leave you home quickly," he said. "Have your go-bag ready to go."

Phelps also encouraged community members to reach out to their neighbors, friends and co-workers to offer assistance and to make sure they are safe.

"This is really about doing what you can, where you are, with what you have," he said.

Phelps added that being prepared will allow first responders to help others who may need help the most.

Public Safety Power Shutoffs

On Sept. 7 Pacific Power and Portland General Electric (PGE) alerted thousands of customers that Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) would be possible due to the increas-

ing wildfire conditions.

"Turning off power is the last resort," PGE CEO Maria Pope said. "It is only done to protect customers, property and the communities that we serve from fire."

Brown said the state's work over the past few years has helped to better prepare communities for wildfires, that there are more resources available, and healthier landscapes have been created during the off season.

"This has made a huge difference," Brown said.

At the end of the briefing, Brown again stressed the urgency of the current wildfire danger.

"Our goal today is to encourage Oregonians to be prepared and have a plan," Brown said. "Each one of us can make a difference in the next 24 to 72 hours. Our goal is to save lives and to save property."

I don't know about you, but I'd much rather see recyclable items made into something useful rather than end up in a landfill. The same goes for old paint. Luckily, we have Tillamook County Solid Waste and City Sanitary Services to help us out. Paper, cardboard, tin and aluminum cans, #1 and #2 plastics, and scrap metal can be dropped off at City Sanitary Services, 2303 11th St., Tillamook (9 AM-4 PM weekdays), or at Tillamook Transfer Station, 1315 Ekloff Rd. (8 AM-4 PM seven days a week). (Master Recycler tip: Collect nails, screws, small metal pieces, and lids in a tin can, and then squeeze the top of the can shut. This will prevent the smaller items from falling out when the can gets moved, dumped, crushed, or transported).

Hazardous wastes that are improperly disposed of are a risk to us and our environment. Paint, styrofoam, and a wide variety of hazardous wastes, including pool chemicals, pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, poisons, oil and

automotive fluids, batteries, and fluorescent light bulbs, may be dropped off at the Ekloff Rd. site on the first Saturday of the month (excluding holiday weekends) between 9 AM and 1 PM. The next one is on October 1st.

Disposal of yard debris is available at the Tillamook Transfer Site for a fee; But this month you can obtain a voucher for up to 9 yards from the Oregon Department of Forestry as part of their program to reduce backyard burning and the risk of wildfire. Thank you, Oregon State Forestry, for providing this service. And Smokey Bear thanks you too.

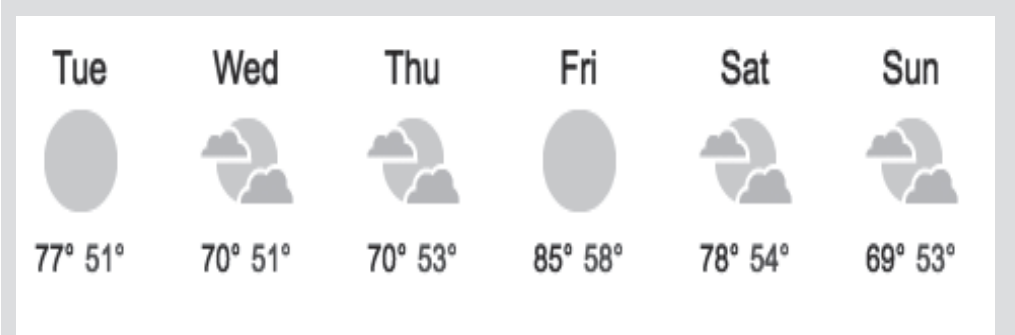
Golden Days

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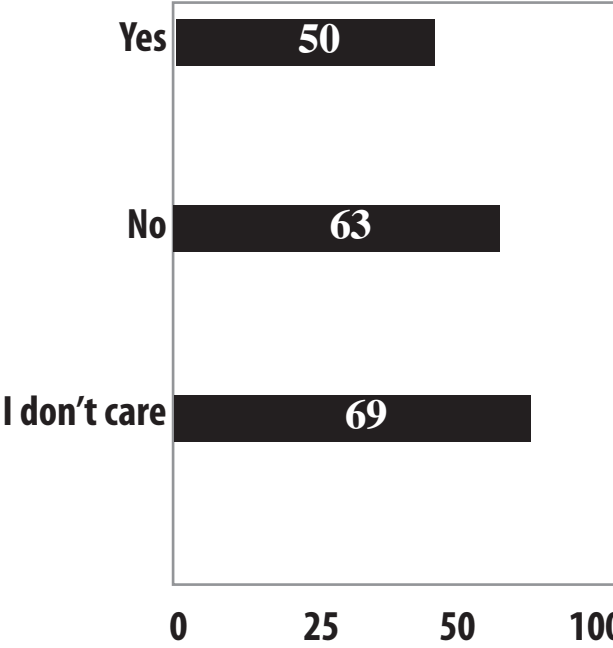

I recently visited the Artists' Reception in the North Coast Recreation District for the Rockaway Renaissance Artist's group. It's been so rewarding to watch the group grow, both in terms of members and in terms of events and art being created. "We had four people at our first meeting in March," said group founder Cindy Gregory. "We had four people for the first few weeks, and one by one they started joining." They're joining now more quickly. When I checked the Facebook group before heading to the reception, membership stood at 67. The following day, it showed 72. Clearly, Cindy's organization has struck a chord in our community.

"We had two goals when I started the group," Cindy explained. "First, we wanted to create an opportunity to show and sell our art. But the main goal was to create a space where people could come and feel safe."

That feeling of safety, of acceptance, is part of every interaction I've had with the group or its members. Everyone is so supportive of fellow artists, taking a genu-

ine interest in their work and their progress—even when the media in question are as different as, say, photography and abstract painting.

"The wonderful thing is, they fit in our group," Cindy explained.

The Artists' Reception showed some of the creativity and diversity of media represented by members. Robin Bock's textile art includes both traditional quilt patterns and unique fabric illustrations; she showed a wall hanging of our iconic Twin Rocks, where she sewed a cutout of the "sea monster," using the soft-edge appliqué technique, onto a beautiful background of blue and white abstractions that suggest waves.

"I have the original pattern for the rocks as a digital file," Robin said, "which means I can scale it up or down to make a template for cutting it out." The same image sits atop the Rockaway Renaissance Artists combination background piece and declaration of principles, which was posted at the reception.

Rick Hampton, familiar from his "Rick's Pics" postings on social media, exhibited prints of many of his photographs of the unparalleled scenic beauty along the Oregon Coast. One print included two sunsets: one of the sun through the "sea monster's tail" at Twin Rocks, mounted above a glimpse of the sun through the crevice

Dahlia time!

September already! Another growing season coming to an end. I think my annuals are glad to see cooler weather since they have been blooming vigorously all spring and summer long. I had diligently fed and watered them but now they are starting to look a little sad. I think they need a rest. Little by little I have been pulling out petunias, bacopa, and nasturtiums and now the baskets are

looking a tad empty. I had also planted some small grasses and some heuchera so at least there is something there when I pull the annuals. I will probably tuck some pansies in the baskets as they like cooler weather.

But the gardens are by no means done for the year. My rudbeckia are still blooming and should continue to do so until a frost. The hardy fuchsia are still attracting hummingbirds and bees on a nice, warm fall day. And the dahlias, of course, are finally coming into their own. It has been a late year for mine, due partly to the rainy spring. But last fall was also the very first time I didn't dig up the dahlias to store. Instead, I left them in their raised bed. So I am not sure who is at fault, but I do know I will be digging them

this year.

Those of us who live in Tillamook County are very lucky to have a dahlia grower just south of the city of Tillamook. Old House Dahlias is located at 11600 Highway 101 South, just about 7 miles south of town near mile marker 72, on the west side of 101. They are now open weekends from 10 to 5 until we have a frost in October.

The owner, Mark Harvey, has been growing dahlias for over 16 years, starting with only a few in a Portland backyard. Now that Mark has relocated to Tillamook, he has over 200 new and heirloom varieties for sale. Even if you are not a dahlia lover – not that there are many who don't love this versatile flower – the scene of the dahlia fields in full bloom is worth a trip.

Old House Dahlias will be having their annual Dahlia Festival on September 17th and 18th from 10 AM to 5 PM. It is a chance for you to purchase cut flowers or potted dahlias as well as order tubers for pickup or mail delivery next April. The Dahlia Festival is the perfect time to see the plants in full bloom so you can more easily judge the size,



color, and shape of the plants. It's also fun to walk through the fields and enjoy the visual beauty of an entire meadow of colorful blooms. Mark is also growing sunflowers and they are for sale as cut flowers. Also a sight to see a field of sunflowers in bloom, all turning their heads toward the sun.

Why grow dahlias? First is that they make excellent cut flowers. When massed in a bouquet, they are second only to a bouquet of roses. There are colors and variations for every taste. Light pink to dark burgundy, lilac to dark purple, peach to bright orange – you will find a color to fit your garden. Some are

speckled or striped, too. And there are lots of flower sizes and shapes as well: the huge "dinner plate" dahlias to the smaller and more compact pompoms. Singles, doubles, spider shaped, formal decorative, informal decorative, and heirloom. The only problem I have is deciding what to try with so many choices.

But another good reason to grow dahlias is that the bees love them. When we visited Old House Dahlias a couple of weeks ago, there were so many bees on the flowers that it was hard to see the true shape of the bloom. Since I haven't seen many bees in my garden this year, it was nice

to see so many in the fields. And the dahlias that have more open centers were being feasted on by butterflies as well. So consider dahlias an excellent plant for all sorts of pollinators.

If you don't get the chance to visit during the Dahlia Festival, the display gardens are open weekends as I mentioned before. Or you can visit their website at www.oldhouse-dahlias.com and order from there. The site has lots of photos of the current dahlias that are on offer as well as tips for growing, a section to ask your questions and leave your contact info to be added to their email list.

at the north edge of Pacific City's Haystack Rock.

"People ask me how I can have more than a thousand sunset photos when there are only 365 days in a year," Rick said. "Well, there are 22 spots along the highway from Cannon Beach: pull outs, scenic overlooks, and more. Every spot is different."

Nathan Searls showed several of his captivating acrylic abstract paintings. I was fascinated by two that he brought to the meeting I attended in May, when my wife had just begun watching

YouTube videos about how paintings like his are made. The artist pours different colors and types of paint onto a canvas, then tilts and otherwise manipulates the canvas. The effect is to create imagery that, while calling to mind musician John Cage's word "aleatory" for art created as if by the rolling of dice, looks vibrant and organic in form: sometimes resembling a wave, sometimes ripples on a pond, sometimes sea life.

Jill Collar's paintings have a completely different feeling, whimsical and fun, yet still convey the fascination of life at the coast. From aquatic scenes on oyster shells to larger canvases with mermaids, jellyfish, and more, she focuses on bright colors

and clearly outlined shapes that catch the eye.

All in all, 70 individual works of art were displayed (and, of course, for sale). I wish I could have credited everyone's work here, because it can take such courage to display something you've labored over and put it before the public eye. And this reception was a way to connect artists with viewers.

"I had an artists' reception at the end of our Garibaldi show," Cindy said, "but I wanted to do one at the beginning." The show at NCRD runs Monday-Friday through the end of September, in the room next to the kitchen (adjacent to the upstairs parking lot).

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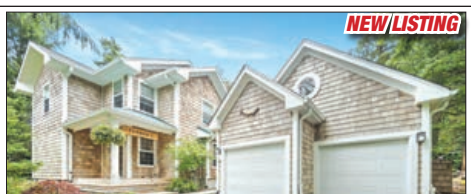

Response to Sept. 6 letter from Oceanside True Friends Pac

Oceanside faces a historic decision: whether to continue under County governance as it has for 100 years, or to form a new city and manage its own affairs. We are the community leaders who initiated the incorporation petition. To earn a place on the ballot, the law required us to obtain signatures by at least 20% of Oceanside's voters. We exceeded that. Then we had to compile an extensive "Economic Feasibility Statement" (EFS) for the County Commissioners to approve. Our EFS demonstrated that by 2024, the City of Oceanside will enjoy over \$1 million a year in revenues, including \$600,000 in TLT funds that now goes to the county. It also showed that this would amply cover the city's anticipated service costs.

At the county hearings, Oceanside True Friends PAC furiously tried and failed to discredit our EFS. Instead, after six months of intense scrutiny, the Commissioners unanimously approved our economic projections.

Having lost that argument, the "True Friends" wants to change the subject from Oceanside's overall fiscal health to focus on a single side-issue they've raised as a scare tactic: Who will pay to upgrade Oceanside's storm drains 20-30 years from now? Most Oceansiders are far more concerned about the three hotels that might be built in the next few years than what could happen in 2050, but

we do need to clear this up.

Oceanside, like many coastal communities, has aging storm drains that will need updating two or three decades from now at a cost of \$200-\$300 million. This will happen regardless of whether Oceanside incorporates. True Friends, however, is telling Oceanside voters that we can avoid that cost if they vote against incorporation because the county would pay for it. This is a recklessly false red herring. They know that the County has flatly said it will never have the general funds to pay for such a project, in Oceanside or elsewhere.

Instead, such large projects are usually financed in one of two ways: state/federal grants or voter-approved bond levies (loans). Voter-approved bonds are least likely, because they are the most difficult to get passed, but let's start there. If we incorporate and Oceanside voters approve a bond, then of course they would make the payments. But if the county orchestrates such a bond for the unincorporated community, Oceansiders would STILL pay for it because county-wide voters would rightfully reject any such ballot measure. Instead, Tillamook County Public Works Director Chris Laity predicts that the county would help organize a "special storm drain district" that would administer the bond and bill Oceanside property owners for the payments. In other words, Oceansiders would pay for any bonds regardless of whether we incorporate. The suggestion that the County would do so is beyond ridiculous.

For these reasons, it is far more likely that the either the County or an incorporated Oceanside would seek available state/federal grants. If an unincorporated Oceanside relies on the county to do so, however, it will have to compete with the other unincorporated communities for the staff time and money for the required matching funds (usually 10%). For this reason, Director Laity has stated that an incorporated Oceanside would actually have a better shot at obtaining such a grant than the County by gradually accruing the matching funds over several decades and applying for a grant on its own. (Our proposed budget allowed for that.) In reality, this is a

reason to support incorporation, not to oppose it.

We have memos from Director Laity corroborating each one of these points. More importantly, the entire storm drain argument is a cynical tactic designed to divert Oceansiders from weighing the true costs and benefits of incorporation. Getting Garibaldi's financials back on track

There have been a lot of questions about Garibaldi financials over the past few years. "Is the City broke?" "Did I hear that city checks were bouncing?" Those were ear-opening, but comments like "No one can see the financials," and "Internal controls aren't worth anything," caught my attention. If you know my career, you know I'm a big fan of financial internal controls.

First, the City of Garibaldi is not broke. The City has "accounting issues" - problems with how money was accounted for. There are no checks bouncing, although that may have occurred in the past. And currently, under Mayor Tim Hall, the City has been able to produce and review its financial information on a monthly basis. This had not been done since 2016.

Here is the lesson: When you convert your accounting from one system to another, and then to a third, be sure to get the job done. Garibaldi began a conversion in 2015, from Quick Books to commercial software, and subsequently to another software package. The end product was never "right." The then-manager did not seek out technical support and City Council apparently did not get involved. The situation still isn't resolved.

Over time, city managers reported to Council that financial information was not "lining up with budget categories" and they could not produce monthly financial reports. When I joined the Budget Committee to review the Fiscal Year 2021 budget, it was my understanding that some of the prior year's data was not reliable. That's when I became interested in the

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WHERE TO FIND LOCAL FOODS AFTER THE FARMERS MARKET SEASON ENDS

Oregon's north coast offers a bounty of local foods - produce, seafood, meats and value-added products, such as jams, jellies, sauces, cheeses and much more. The area is home to at least 250 small farms, 100 small fisheries, and a dozen or more craft beverage makers. Many of these small businesses sell their products at local farmers markets from May or June through September or October.

As the popular farmers markets - nine of them along Oregon's north coast, from Clatskanie to Neskowin - wind down, it's important to continue to support local producers.

Food has a big impact on Oregon's north coast economy. Residents and visitors spend \$380 million on food and beverage - whether in restaurants that offer locally sourced menus, in grocery stores working with local growers, at farmstands and local businesses, at pubs or wineries serving craft beverages, and at farmers markets.

When you buy local products, you're supporting an entire ecosystem of businesses and hundreds of employees. A restaurant that serves Dungeness crab can buy directly from a local crabber, bypassing a middle food broker. That crabber gets a better price for its catch than if sold to a processor, and the restaurant gets a better price from the crabber. Both businesses benefit by increasing their profit margins, and being able to pay their employees higher wages.

This fall, winter and spring, seasonal produce is still available, as are seafood and meats. Buy directly from the producers - many seafood retailers are owned by fishers, or join a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) farm. **Wild Manzanita** at 298 Laneda Ave., Manzanita. Check their website at wildmanzanita.com. Or contact **Food Roots**, a nonprofit supporting small farms. They offer an online marketplace. Reach them at foodrootsnw.org or call 503-815-2800.

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Cheesemaker volleyball off to good start

The No. 12 ranked Tillamook High Cheesemakers are off to a good start in their Class 4A Cowapa League schedule after winning their first two games.

The Cheesemakers (3-0 League, 3-2 overall), guided by Coach LaVonne Rawe, won 3-1 over the St. Helens High Lions (0-3 league, 1-4 overall) Sept. 6 at St. Helens Middle School.

“We’re working out a lot of kinks right now, but I think that the harder we play, the smarter we get and we’re only going up from here,” said Rawe. “But you can’t underestimate anyone in the Cowapa League. I’m really proud of our team, because we had a super hot bus ride coming out here and we were kind of lackadaisical in the beginning, but then we pulled through. They’re a very coachable group and they just have some raw things that we need to work out.”

Tillamook will play its next games in a tournament Saturday at 9 a.m. at Sisters High School in Central Oregon, followed by a league matchup Sept. 19 at 4:30 p.m. at Astoria (1-1 league, 1-4 overall).

The Cheesemakers came from behind after dropping the first set 25-22 to the Lions. The Mooks then played the next three sets with a little higher intensity level, while limiting their mistakes to out an impressive 22-25, 25-21, 25-17, 28-26 victory.

The second set was knotted five consecutive times, with the final deadlock at 5-5. The Mooks then gained a sideout and a 6-5 lead. Tillamook ju-

nior setter Dannika Goss then helped ignite a rally as she served three straight service points, putting the Mooks up 9-5.

“I’m very proud of our team,” said Goss. “I knew our team was strong and I felt sure that we would come back after losing the first set. I knew that we would be able to dominate the remainder of the match and that’s what we did. It’s really nice here and it’s the first time we’ve been here (middle school). Even though it’s was hot outside (90 degrees), it was nice and cool inside the gym. It’s definitely different facing new teams in our league this year, but I really feel like our team is capable of doing great things this year.”

The revamped Cowapa League added St. Helens and Scappoose to the five team league this year. Former league teams Valley Catholic and Banks moved down to the OSAA Class 3A level.

The two evenly matched teams then traded points for a majority of the second set and Tillamook built a 19-14 lead, forcing a St. Helens timeout. Tillamook extended its advantage to 21-15 for its largest lead of the set. The Lions fought back and trimmed the margin to 21-19, forcing a Mooks timeout.

Tillamook middle blocker Kate Klobas then started to take control, while utilizing her height advantage to pound kills to the floor and score some points. After a Klobas kill made it 22-19, senior Emily Skaar served the last two service points for Tillamook. Klobas followed with an exclamation point as she blocked a Lions shot to the

floor to help give Tillamook a set two 25-21 win.

“Our goal was to come in here and win,” said Klobas. “We’ve worked really hard in practice and we just wanted to put our best foot forward and we accomplished our goal by doing that. I’m really proud of our team and if we keep working hard and we keep moving forward, then we’ll just hope for the best. I think we’re capable of being one of the top contenders in the Cowapa League this year.”

In the third set, it was Goss who helped lift Tillamook in front early as she served five straight service points, including two aces, putting the Mooks up 5-0. Tillamook then built a 9-2 lead and appeared to be in control.

St. Helens responded by outscoring Tillamook 12-5 to knot it 14-14 on an ace served by Lions senior middle blocker Briana Holtz. Two more deadlocks followed, with the final one at 16-16. A Tillamook sideout put the Mooks up 17-16 and they held the lead for the remainder of the set.

Goss again showed her strong serving skill as she served six straight points from the service line to help the Mooks take control on the scoreboard at 23-16. A Klobas kill gave the Mooks set point at 24-17 and after a Lions hitting error, Tillamook got the win at 25-17 and a 2-1 set lead in the match. St. Helens took an early lead in the fourth set, led by junior setter Ava Eib, who served three straight service points, including one ace to help put the Lions up 3-0. St. Helens then extended its advantage to 8-4, which marked the Lions

largest lead of the game.

The Mooks came back and got their first lead of the game at 11-10 when senior outside hitter Keira Thompson served an ace. Tillamook then extended its lead to 18-12, led by Skaar, who served four straight service points. The Lions came back with a 6-1 run and narrowed the margin to 19-18 on a kill by Eib.

Tillamook extended its advantage to 22-18, forcing a St. Helens timeout. The Lions responded with a 6-2 rally, tying it 24-24. Two more deadlocks followed with the final one at 26-26. A Lions hitting error put the Mooks up 27-26 and then quite fittingly, Goss again demonstrated her outstanding serving as she delivered a match winning

ace for a 28-26 victory.

Tillamook won its third straight league contest with a 3-2 win over the Seaside High Seagulls (0-2 league, 1-4 overall) at home Sept. 8. The Mooks played at a tournament Sept. 10 at Cascade High School in Turner and they lost a nonleague match at that event 3-2 to the Santiam Christian High Eagles (3-2).

City’s financial statements.

Audited financial statements, required by Oregon statute, were not being produced in a timely fashion. An annual audited financial statement is due to the Oregon Secretary of State’s Office six months after the end of the fiscal year. Garibaldi has not been able to provide these statements, in large part because the data was not in balance or ready for audit. Currently, the City is behind by 24 months, resulting in the City being on the State’s delinquent list. Their fiscal year 2020 statements are under audit and we await the resulting report.

Audited financial statements are used by lenders and grantors and are often required to be provided each year under a grant to the grantor. Examples of grantors include the State of Oregon Department of Transportation for roadway improvements. They like to know that the place they give money to is used as expected. Auditors look at internal controls to see if the organization – the city in this case – is well managed.

In October 2021, I asked for the latest audited financial report and was provided one dated May 26, 2021 -- for fiscal year 2019! It was a fairly presented opinion, but the internal control report contained nine problem areas the City had not yet begun to address. No one on city council was aware of the report. It had been received electronically by the then-Finance Officer and put into a password protected file.

When you are in 2021, you cannot go back and change what happened in 2020. Whatever financial problems the City had then cannot be solved now.

Thankfully, Mayor Hall attacked the problem. With City Manager Hyams and volunteers, we assembled the required Action Plan for the Secretary of State. The City Manager hired a new Finance Officer who was able to get financial reports generated and provided for Council review.

We were hoping the delinquent audits for both 2020 and 2021 would be completed by fall of 2022 so the City would be back on track. It felt too much

like a miracle – both the City Manager and the Finance Officer had been doing double duty with their current work and work on getting the accounting straightened out. They made it seem so effortless that many people have not understood the nature or complexity of the work required. With their departures this month, work on this project will slow substantially.

Only great perseverance will get the City through this. Mayor Hall continues to encourage us as we work our way through the problems. Councilor Findling has supported the efforts of staff

and volunteers in working through accounting difficulties and addressing the nightmares.

As a friend of mine has said, “All things work out in the end. And if they haven’t worked out yet, you aren’t at the end.”

We sure aren’t at the end. Yet.

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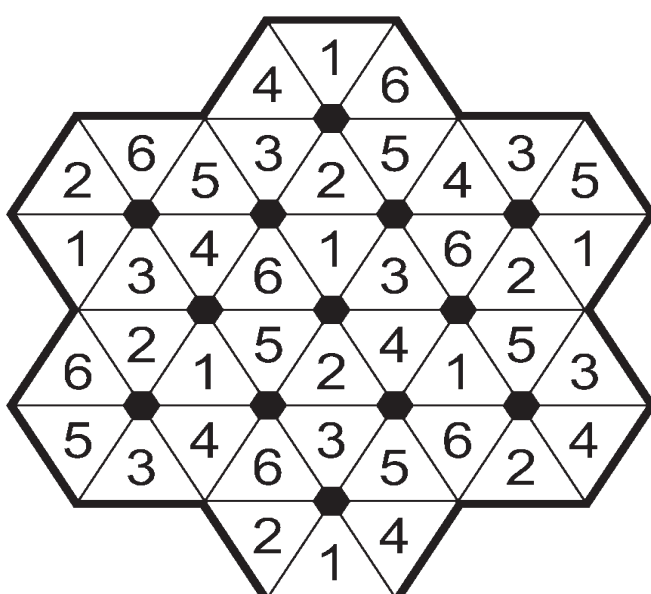

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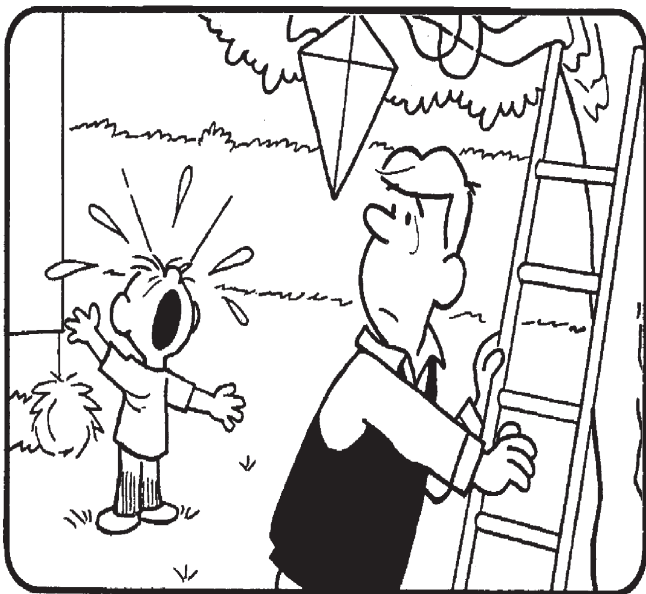

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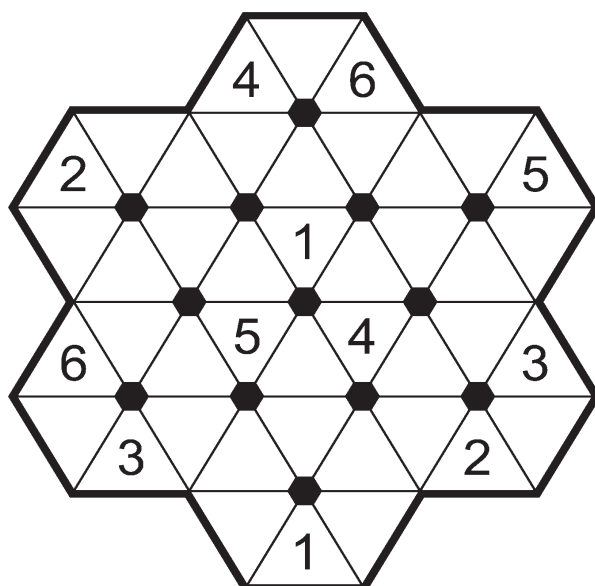
