

MORE TUCSONANS GO INTO SERVICE

David MacMurtrie, 19, 504 North Highland avenue, University of Arizona sophomore, was sitting in a 7:40 a.m. class Monday when he decided he couldn't wait any longer. He got up and walked out. With two 19-year-old companions he drove to Phoenix where all three were accepted by the U.S. Marine corps. They will leave for the coast tomorrow.

The others were Gerald McKenna Jr., son of the Tucson police officer and of Mrs. Ruth McKenna, 722½ East Ninth street; and Harold Johnson, ex-university student and employe of Rancho Nezhone. The latter is the son of Mrs. H. R. Batteredton of Wrightstown.

Young McKenna recently left the university to apply for admission into the Royal Canadian Air Force, but was rejected because of his age, at that time 18 years.

MacMurtrie's father, Frank, enlisted in the 8th cavalry during the

last war. His maternal grandfather, Hiram J. Slifer, consulting engineer, entered the engineering corps at 61, being in charge of railroad and steamship terminal con-

struction in Panama, and directing construction of army railway lines in France. He was injured fatally in an accident occurring the day after the Armistice.
