## NEWS OF THE WORLD

Appointment of Federal Officials for Tucson, Arizona.

The Workingmen Celebrate "Labor Day" By Monster Processions

Bulgaria Virtually a Part of the Dominion of the Czar.

A San Francisco Burglar Sentenced to Forty Years in Folsom Prison.

## Presidential Appointments.

Washington, Sept. 6.—The president has made the following appointments: To be register of the land office, Joseph J. Kinney of Missouri, at Tucson; to be receiver of public monies, Fred W. Smith of Arizona, at Tucson; to be Indian agent Charles P. Yates of California, at Round Valley agency, California; James T. Callahan of New Mexico, has been appointed special agent of the general land office, for fraudulent land entries.

## The Deported Prince.

Berlin, Sept. 6.—Prince Alexander will tomorrow proclaim his abdication. Russian consulates in Bulgaria are distributing, for signature, petitions to the czar favoring the election of Prince Oldenburg as the successor to Prince Alexander.

## General Sedgwick's Mission.

City of Mexico, Sept. 6.—Hon. A. G. Sedgwick, special agent of the United States government, has completed his investigation and has gone to Chihuahua, having obtained permission from the Mexican government to look at all records in the Cutting case.

## Charleston Relief Fund.

Charleston, S. C., Sept. 6.—Dispatches continue to pour in offering aid; about \$95,000 have already been received here. From indications at hand it is believed that contributions will finally aggregate \$500,000, and that \$200,000 will have arrived by tomorrow night.

## Unhappy Bulgaria.

London, Sept. 6.—The Times of today says: The regency commission composed with or without Russian partisans, can only hasten the day when the people of Bulgaria, wearied and dejected, will abandon their dreams of autonomy and welcome Russian domination as the only means of escaping anarchy. The date of entry of the Russian troops into Bulgaria is unimportant details. All that has been effected by the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia is the enlargement of the slice of the Turkish empire which Russia secures. German and Austrian indifference probably springs from a consciousness of their inability to prevent Russia's advancement.

## Labor Day Parades.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 6.—Labor Day was inaugurated by the workingmen of this city and suburbs, and celebrated today in an imposing manner. The feature of the morning was the procession in which it is estimated that 15,000 persons participated.

Chicago, Sept. 6.—The annual street parade in this city today was the most noteworthy ever held by the labor organizations of Chicago. Close computation of marchers in line place the number between thirty and thirty-five thousand.

Baltimore, Sept. 6.—The demonstration of the Knights of Labor today was the largest ever witnessed in Baltimore.

New York, Sept. 6.—This being a legal holiday set aside by the legislature for the laboring classes, it was celebrated by a monster parade by the different labor organizations.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 6.—Most of the factories and stores in this city were closed today in honor of the working men's day. About 25,000 workingmen took part in the procession.

## Caring for the Distressed.

Charleston, Sept. 6.—Relief committees are hard at work. Additional tents have been placed in the public squares, and for the colored people comfortable wooden shelters have been erected in Marion Square. There is accommodation already for 1,500 colored refugees and 625 slept in the shelters last night. The subsistence committee will meet regularly and supply provisions to all who are needy and are unable to support themselves.

## Forty Years at Folsom.

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—Hiram Vickery, the notorious burglar, who created a great sensation in Eureka, Cal., in 1871 by chloroforming many of its inhabitants and then burglarizing their houses, and who committed a similar offense in Oakland, was sentenced today in Oakland by Judge Green to forty years in the state prison at Folsom.

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—The strike at the Union Iron Works which has been in force for the past few months, virtually came to an end this morning by the striking moulders going to work.

## UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER.

That is What Miles Said to Geronimo.

And What the Hostiles Were Forced to Accept.

Now Comes Peace and Prosperity to Arizona.

The last of the hostile Apaches surrendered in Skeleton canyon Saturday. General Miles arrived at Fort Bowie late last night bringing with him, not only the good news of surrender, but also the persons of Geronimo and Natchez and three of their best and most trusty warriors. The remainder will reach Fort Bowie in three days, guarded by Captain Lawton's command.

The good citizens of Arizona, as one man, rise to extend congratulations to the gallant general, who less than five months ago was selected by the president to solve the difficult problem of capturing or destroying the hostile Apaches in Arizona. General Miles has done well the work assigned to him. He has not only captured the hostiles, but rounded up the Chiricahua and Warm Spring Indians on the Apache reservation, and they will soon leave that place of refuge, which has been for many years a breeding ground and base of supplies as well as a rendezvous where raiding parties are organized to overrun and blight the prospect of our fair territory.

The successful termination of the Apache trouble will lift the cloud of distrust which has been suspended over us for many years, restore confidence and set free the wheels of industry within our midst.

In a few days the subjects of thought and discussion among our people will have changed from Indian depredations in our midst to more agreeable topics. The prosperity of Arizona will occupy the attention of our citizens who in all their successes will remember to ascribe to General Miles the credit for bringing about the blessings to our country and people.

## YUMA CLIPS.

Governor C. M. Zulick is earnest in his endeavors to advance the material interests of Arizona, and is in accord with the people on the Indian question.

The Harris gold and silver mill and mining company are erecting a 10-stamp gold mill at Harrisburg, Ellsworth mining district, Yuma county. The management is in the hands of Mr. Wm. Beard a well known and successful mining man.

The late rains have covered the hill-sides and mesa with an emerald robe, and spangled the valleys and lowlands with myriads of wild flowers.

In the matter of the insanity of J. L. Smith, examined before Hon. Isaac Levy, probate judge, it was adjudged that Smith was insane and proper measures be taken for his care. Mr. Smith is a well known Arizonian, and his many acquaintances will be pained to learn of his misfortune.

The Paymaster mill is in successful operation, and the ore works up to an average of nearly 60 ounces to the ton. The pipe-line from the Colorado river to the mines furnishes an abundance of water for milling and other purposes.

A large number of the detained passengers visited the Territorial Prison this week. The visitors all expressed their surprise at the excellence of food and the quarters given the prisoners and also at their seeming appearance of contentment. The visitors also expressed their thanks to Acting Superintendent Nugent for appreciated courtesies.

The group of mines situated in Harcour district, formerly owned by George Hamill has been sold to Alfred Berkery of St. Louis for \$500,000. These mines are copper-gold properties and under proper management will undoubtedly prove profitable. The mines will be operated by a St. Louis company, and will add materially to the wealth of Yuma county.

## PINAL COUNTY NEWS.

The sale of the Wilson property, mentioned of which was made last week, has been completed. The purchasers are Louisiana parties, and the family, consisting of seventeen persons, will arrive here soon to locate. The price paid for the property was \$4,600.

Mr. Theodore Ganson, of Dudleyville will make a shipment of \$1,000 ore next week. He has been chloriding one of his properties in the San Pedro district for some time and derives a good profit from ore shipments. Several of his neighboring claim owners are enulating his example in this matter and making money.

While Mr. Ed. Bates was riding through a canyon on Mineral Creek a few days since in search of cattle, he came upon the skeleton of a man. The skeleton had evidently lain there a long time, as it contained no flesh and every vestige of clothing had disappeared. No one can guess who the unfortunate man was.

The mine recently discovered by Mr. John Horra, near Riverside, is developing into a bonanza, and he has bonded it to Messrs. Snyder and Taylor of Globe, at a good figure. They are negotiating a sale of the property to eastern parties with good prospects of success. Those who have seen the mine say it is one of the finest prospects yet discovered in the county.

Messrs. Charles Rapp and Charles Smith went up the Gila about 18 miles Monday and prospected some placer ground. They found dirt that will pay about five cents per pan. The gold is coarse and easily saved. The ground lies about 200 yards from the river, and miners can make good wages by hauling the dirt down to the river and running it through "long tums." Messrs. Rapp and Smith are preparing to work the ground.
