LAWYERS ASSEMBLE AT MEETING TO CONSIDER

CERTIFICATE OF ELECTION IS SUFFICIENT FOR COURT RULES

Campbell Gains Point in Legal Battle to Make Hunt Surrender Governor's Chair. Arguments on Mandamus Writ Are to Begin Today

(Special to The Star.) PHOENIX, Jan. 9.—How Thomas Campbell gained a point today in his legal battle to be made as governor of Arizona when the state supreme court handed down an opinion in Mr. Campbell's application for a writ of mandamus to compel former Governor G. W. P. Hunt to relinquish the office.

The opinion stated that the certificate of election issued by the secretary of state to Mr. Campbell was sufficient in his application for the writ. The court's action came at the request of attorneys for Mr. Hunt, who contended that the certificate of election was not sufficient.
