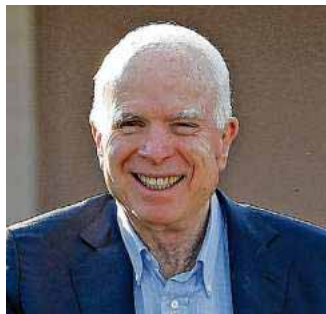

John McCain

 Republican John McCain was re-elected to a sixth term in the Senate after facing his strongest challenge in years, from Democratic U.S. Rep. Ann Kirkpatrick. McCain, the Republican presidential nominee in 2008, drew ire after backing Donald Trump and then withdrawing his support a month before Election Day when the businessman made crude comments about women. McCain returns to a Republican majority in the Senate. The House also retains its GOP majority. **Page A8**

BALLOT PROPOSITIONS

Proposition 205

Arizonans won't be buying marijuana almost as easily as alcohol. Preliminary results showed Proposition 205, which would have allowed recreational use of marijuana, trailing by 5 percentage points. Six years ago, Arizonans narrowly agreed to allow those with certain medical conditions and a doctor's recommendation to obtain up to 2 ounces of marijuana every two weeks. **Page A9**

Proposition 206

An increase in the minimum wage was approved by a margin of close to 3-to-2, giving thousands of Arizonans a pay raise. The minimum wage goes up in January to \$10 an hour and will eventually go to \$12 by 2020. The measure also calls for at least three paid days off a year. Proposition 206 is an outgrowth of a 2006 voter-approved law that established Arizona's first minimum wage. **Page A9**

DIVIDED NATION CHOOSES TRUMP

America chose a political outsider, businessman Donald Trump, as its 45th president.

A volatile, nearly two-year campaign that upended U.S. politics ended this morning, defying expectations, polls and predictions. Trump will become the first to hold the office without any experience in government or the military.

Trump edged toward victory over Democratic challenger Hillary Clinton amid a tight popular vote and Electoral College count. At one point, there was a 27-vote difference between the

two candidates in Florida, which Trump eventually won.

Trump's other "must-win" victories included North Carolina and Ohio. No Republican has won the White House without taking the Buckeye State. Arizona was one of the last states called for Trump.

Trump, who has said his campaign represents America's last chance to drive out a corrupt political establishment in Washington, will lead a deeply divided nation.

"Now it's time for America to bind the wounds of division," Trump said, acknowledging the rift in his acceptance remarks.
