The Star's Puma trailhead gleams with the fresh asphalt coating of a new parking lot. It offers the promise of an urban pathway to Tucson Mountain Park for hikers and mountain bikers.

County in the coming 15 months. Working with developers and city and federal officials, Pima County is planning new trailheads leading to parks and preserves from the Tucson Mountains to the Toiyas to the Rincon Mountains. 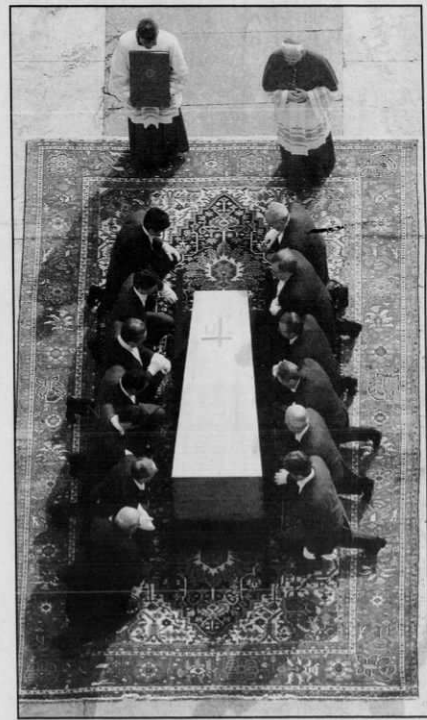

## Spewer of e-mail junk gets 9 years

LEESBURG, Va. — A man convicted in the nation's first felony case against illegal spamming was sentenced to nine years in prison Friday for bombarding Internet users with millions of junk e-mails. However, Loudoun County Circuit Judge Thomas Horne delayed the start of Jeremy Jaynes' prison term while the case is appealed, saying the law is new and raises constitutional questions. A jury had recommended the nine-year term for the Raleigh, N.C., man.

Jaynes, 38, who was considered among the top 10 spammers in the world at the time of his arrest, used the Internet to peddle pornography and chain products and services such as a "FedEx refund processor," prosecutors said. Thousands of people filed for his e-mails, and prosecutors said Jaynes' operation grossed up to \$200,000 per month. Jaynes was convicted in November.

### Spam slightly down

Nearly 40 percent of all e-mail received in 2004 was spam, with the United States responsible for more than one-third of it.



## Expert: Airport shoe removal invites fungus

removal, shoes, shoes, MELWAIRKE — Cecil Fox will not take off his socks — or his shoes — when passing through airport security. The retired director of the Molecular Histology Lab at the National Institutes of Health is concerned that thousands of Americans are being exposed to infectious

fungi — such as the ones that cause athlete's foot — as they trot, shoeless, through airport metal detectors. "People are being told to take their shoes off and ordered to walk through a mass of fungi," said Fox, who now lives in Little Rock, Ark. "It's outrageous."

Athlete's foot is caused by the fungus *Trichophyton*. Occasionally, the fungus is usually picked up on damp, well-trampled surfaces, such as locker room floors and public shower stalls. When someone with infected, itchy feet passes over a damp surface, spores slough off and settle into the fungus-friendly floor until picked up

by another unsuspecting host. The infection, which causes the skin on one's feet to become itchy and red, can also spread to the toenails, turning them into thick and crumbly discs. "Unless I am terribly mistaken, one's feet are being
