CHURCHILL WILL SPEAK ON POLE ISSUE THURSDAY

New Break Within Big 3
May Be Consequence
Of Airing Tangle

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(AP)—A new break within the Big 3 is feared in diplomatic quarters here in connection with word from London that Prime Minister Churchill is studying a discussion on an un-lucky Poland.

Already, there is more dissatisfaction on the part of the United States and England about Poland's attitude and vice versa. Churchill is to address the House of Commons Thursday of next week. No one in responsible position here would predict he will have anything to say about Poland's position.

It appears implicit in London's news on Churchill that the British are willing to make concessions at a very important condition which is the long hoped-for agreement that an outbreak of trouble in Poland will not result in the United States or England's intervention.

The President's position in London is to put most of the responsibility for the bogging down of Polish negotiations on the Russians.

This is entirely contrary to the opinion of Washington interpreters of what President Roosevelt, Marshal Stalin and Churchill would have said at Yalta about Poland.

English and American foreign policy circles take the line that the new government should be set up in Warsaw, including not only leaders of the present Soviet government but also leaders from both inside and outside the country who are sympathetic to the Soviet Union.

Issue Is Urgent

2,150 PIMA WOMEN SEEK EXEMPTIONS FROM JURY DUTY

Judging from the rate at which letters were received yesterday, approximately 20 percent of the women eligible as jurors in Pima County will have exemptions before the next jury panel is drawn.

Mrs. Sylvia Powell, clerk of the Pima County Board of Supervisors, said she received 215 exemption letters yesterday.

Women have only today and Friday in which to be exempted from the next panel. The jury list will be turned over to the clerk of superior court Saturday and the panel will be drawn Monday.

Of 13,500 registered women voters, 2,150 had written for exemptions by yesterday. It is expected the list may reach 3,000 in the next two days.

SOFT COAL PAY SET AT \$10 DAY

Basic Increase \$1.07; Rise
In Price To Be Asked
By Mine Owners

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(AP)—A new soft coal agreement carrying a basic \$1.07-a-day increase and an extension clause in the event of a strike was announced yesterday by the National Bituminous Coal Operators' Association.

The agreement was reached after a week of negotiations between the operators and the United Mine Workers of America.

The new contract fixes a basic rate of \$10 per day as compared with the present \$8.93, but the actual pay increase, spread over a 6-day week and with less than regular rates for underground work, averages \$12.74 a day.
