WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—President Truman signed a June 30 death warrant for the OPA today but urged Congress to provide for the continuation of the controls carried on by other agencies. A meeting of Republican senate leaders, however, failed to agree whether the controls should be continued, and so far the House has not passed the bill to make it possible in the event of a veto.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—A confident attitude by Republican leaders to end senate-house differences over slashing government costs, reducing taxes and making payments on the debt blew up today. Although Senator Bridge (R-MI) and other Republicans said they had worked out a compromise almost at midnight, the House rejected a compromise which would have raised the income tax rate to 90 percent.

Bevin, Bidart Critical Of Model for Germany; Marshall Hopeful
MOSCOW, March 22.—(AP)—Russia proposed to the Council of Foreign Ministers tonight that the future German government be based on the defunct Weimar republic which Adolf Hitler overthrew in his climb to power and then destroyed. Secretary of State George C. Marshall expressed the opinion that the Russian proposal was a "disgraceful measure to aid Greece and Turkey" and that it was "a historical background, hardly worth mentioning."

CPA Funds Reducers

REUTERS ARE SEIZED IN RAID
