Acheson's Foes Would Force Him Out of Job By Cutting Off Salary

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson's foes would force him out of office by cutting off his salary after June 30.

They might be able to do this by refusing to vote an appropriation to pay him—or even to hold up funds for the State Department so long as Acheson stays in office.

Representative Acheson of Illinois, the House's chief opponent of Acheson, said today he would introduce a bill to cut off Acheson's salary.

A number of southern Democrats are ready to give any legislation that would cut off Acheson their enthusiastic support.

Some administration supporters said the coalition move might succeed.

An appropriations subcommittee completed hearings on the bill today.

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U.S. TANKS JAB AT ENEMY LINE GIRDLING SEOUL

Raiders Plunge 11 Miles On Aggressive Patrols, Batter Red Outposts

TOKYO, Friday, May 4.—(AP)—American tank raiders plunged into the Red lines 11 miles north of Seoul today on aggressive patrols that scattered or destroyed small Red units.

Red casualties for Thursday on the whole Korean warfront were estimated by the United Nations Command at 1,200 killed and wounded and 75 taken prisoner.

One tank-infantry team entered Uijongbu at the 11-mile zone the deepest penetration of Communist lines since the Red spring offensive was halted by a halt by United Nations Command.

Reds at Uijongbu met the tanks with small arms, machine guns, and mortar and ran when the tanks crossed into the Communist zone.

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Ousted Chieftain Opens Attack on Administration For Limited Conflict Idea

Senators Told No End in Sight to Blood-Letting For Americans Because Government Has No Plan to Bring 'Slaughter in Korea to End'

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur warned today that unless Red China is beaten into submission by all-out attacks the Korean conflict may explode into a third world war.

He told senators the course being followed by the Truman administration may be "inviting" another war rather than avoiding it. And he strongly urged the use of air power, a naval blockade of the China coast, and the use of Chinese Nationalist troops.

Calling the Korean war a "dreadful conflict" which is costing too many American blood, he lined up directly against President Truman's policy of trying to limit the war to Korea.

"I believe," he said, "the chances of the terrible conflict you so rightly dread—and all the rest of us dread with you—will be brought to a close only by a complete and final victory."

"I suggest," he said, "that some of the things that will bring this dreadful slaughter to a definite end are: a complete and final victory."
