MOVING PICTURES OF SIGNING ORDER

Washington Also Prepares Unusual Feature for Issuing of Proclamation, Bisbee Plans Holiday, Grand Ball Ready

**PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 13.—The Admission Day committee** passed a resolution this evening asking the Associated Press to invite the press to drink a toast to the admission of Arizona, on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, Mountain time.

**MOVING PICTURES.** WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—For the first time in the history of the White House, moving pictures of an event of national importance will be taken tomorrow when President Taft signs the proclamation admitting Arizona to statehood. Pictures will be taken by an employee of the treasury department and presented to the president. Another set may be made as part of the official records.

**Bisbee Rooms.** BIRBEE, Ariz., Feb. 13.—Upon the announcement of the signing of the statehood proclamation, tomorrow, by President Taft, 48 sticks of dynamite will be exploded in the pocket of the Copper Queen mountain.

**Phoenix is Ready.** PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 13.—All in readiness for the inauguration of Arizona's first governor at noon tomorrow. Governor-elect Hunt, his wife and daughter, Virginia, arrived here today. At noon tomorrow Hunt will walk to the capitol and take the oath administered by Chief Justice Edward Keam.

### COMPETITION STOPS ONLY WITH DEATH

J. J. Hill Tells Stanley Board Homeily Truths, Would Make Corporations Put Up 100 Cents for Each Dollar Capital

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—**James J. Hill told the Stanley Steel investigation committee today that the first class stock with red and white wings before he would go into the steel business and professed that competition would be the rule long after the present law, were wiped out of the statute book.

Hill's last day of testimony was replete with such utterances for which he is noted. He said stockholders of Great Northern Railroad were not "wearing any crease" because the United States Steel, "in its rights" had cancelled the Great Northern stock issue.

Stanley suggested that Hill would be in a favorable position, whether or not the lease was cancelled, and could start a steel company of his own with the four hundred million tons of ore in the ground.

"I'll be a first class stock with red and white feathers in my wings, long before I ever consider going into the steel business," replied Hill. "I'll be '75 my next birthday and don't mind telling you that I have done about as the hard work I intend to do in this line."

Just before Hill was examined orally of Texas, called his attention to the suggestion of E. H. Gary and others to the effect that the day of competition was past and that the time had come for the government to regulate prices of commodities.

**Can't Kill Human Nature.** HILL, you will have to tame human nature, and eliminate all selfish motives, before you will eliminate competition," Hill remarked. "There will be competition just as long as there are men, and I don't intend to stop it."

He declared that if the federal government assumed control of business, there would be no federal government, but a monarchy.

Asked if he believed the United States should undertake to regulate business, he replied: "I would lay down the law, right or wrong. I would limit the power corporations. I would see that every corporation that started in business, put all the money in it and I would not let anybody on account of the size of the corporation, I would not permit any watering of stock."

He said that 100 cents of every dollar put up to do any company was on hand to take care of it.

### WATER TOO COLD

**Would be Suicide Changes Mind About Dyke**

**YUMA, Ariz., Feb. 13.—**Ernesta, daughter of H. B. Smith, jumped into the Colorado river today from the railroad bridge, but striking black cold water, changed his mind and swam to shore where he was rescued by a volunteer fireman.

### REBELLION IN MEXICO SPREADS FAST

Despite Statements of Authorities Trouble Increases and Many States in Complete Control of Warring Factions

**MEXICO CITY, Feb. 13.—**Spread of the rebellion in Mexico is shown by dispatches tonight. The rebels have overrun the Laguna district in Chihuahua, and have appeared in the states of Durango, Zacatecas and Guanajuato.

In the south the Zapatistas and their complices, and in Guerrero both camps of Hidalgo are showing remarkable activity. The movement has reportedly spread to the Sinaloa republic, which was practically added.

In Chihuahua, Roldan and Brantley Hernandez continue to evade the government troops. On the other hand, Orovo has persecuted the rebels at San Andres in vain fighting, according to an official dispatch tonight.

The Durango rebel ranks have been fitted for the most part with field bands, who have been looting haciendas on which they had been employed. Today, rumors at Durango sent message to their diplomatic representatives here, appealing to them for additional military protection.

The state of Zacatecas rebel and looting is characterized, in many instances by mobs who are committing depredations to the cry of "Viva, Zeta, Zeta."

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Minister of the Interior Gomez sent the day in Chihuahua, conferring with Orovo and other authorities.

### 30 INJURED IN WRECK ON NORTHERN RY

Train Goes Down 30-Foot Embankment, Every Car Left Track, Relief Special Hurred to Scene of Accident

**BOYON, N. D., Feb. 13.—**Thirty are said to have been injured, some seriously, in a wreck of the Great Northern limited of the Great Northern, two miles east of here at 9:25 tonight. Every car in the train, and engine train was turned over going down a 30 foot embankment. A broken rail was the cause.

A special relief train started from Devils Lake for the scene of the wreck. The limited left Devils Lake shortly after three and was in Devils Lake at 8:10 in the morning. It will be nearly morning before the relief train arrives. There is no telegraph or telephone service at the scene of the accident.

### CHING IS THE OFFICIAL NAME OF NEW CHINESE REPUBLIC

KILLS MAN WHO STOLE HIS WIFE

Mexican Shoots Down Home Wrecker, Declares Will Not Be Taken Alive, Sheriff Nelson Trailing Fugitive

**Enraged because his wife had deserted him, Guadalupe Lobo, a Mexican, shot and instantly killed Miguel Lomon because Lomon stole the Apple race about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. Lomon was holding the three-year old son of Lobo in his arms when the shooting happened. Lobo's wife, who had deserted him for Lomon, stood close by and witnessed the shooting.**

The bullet, which was fired at close range, from a 200 caliber rifle, entered the left breast of Lomon passing through his body and lodging in his right arm. Lomon was holding the child on his right arm when the shot was fired and the bullet grazed the infant's clothing. Lomon dropped dead while the frightened child went screaming to his mother.

**Nelson in Pursuit.** After the deed, Lobo flourished his rifle in the air and declared that he would never be taken alive. He stole a horse from a near by ranch and disappeared on the desert going in the direction of the San Pedro river where it is thought he will attempt to cross into Mexico.

**Sheriff Nelson** was notified and in company with Coroner Linton and County Physician Wall left at once in an automobile belonging to and driven by Shad Sawyer.

As soon as they reached the scene of the murder and started in pursuit of the fugitive, they were informed by a man who had a reputation of being the man who had shot and killed Lobo, that Lobo has a reputation of being the man who had shot and killed Lobo, and he declared he will never be taken alive. It is expected that the fugitive and the sheriff will meet in a death struggle on the lonely desert.

**Body of the dead man** was strung up on a barn and conveyed later miles northward the corpse to the Apache track where a post-mortem examination was held by Dr. Wall. The bullet which was a steel jacket, still runs out completely shattered the man's head and lungs.

**Lobo's wife** could not give a very definite description of the affair. She said that she had left Lobo about 10 days ago and had been living with Lomon at the Apache track since. She gave as her reason for leaving Lobo that he was cruel to her and beat her on several occasions.

**"We were driving** along the road in a wagon," she said "and Lomon was holding my baby in his arms. As we passed by a grove of large oaks my husband stepped from behind a clump of bushes and ordered us to stop. He was carrying a rifle, but said all he wanted was to take Lomon to a near by ranch where he would sell him as a horse. Lomon agreed and as he stepped from the wagon with his rifle in his right arm my husband stood suddenly raising his rifle and fired without warning. Lomon dropped in his tracks and the baby came screaming to me. My husband then took the child and I went on my way."

**"I left Lobo** because I love him and because I loved Lomon. He was extremely cruel to me and I do not care if the officers do shoot him down as he has done."

**At the killing Lomon** had in his possession a 200 caliber revolver but the woman who was the only witness to the tragedy says that she did not see it.

**Masses Indifferent to Change.** Only Fear Soldiers Would Mar Festivities of Year's Big Day. No Change in Capital

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—**Ching Hwa is the official name of the new Chinese republic. Ching Hwa means Chinese.

The formal passing of the Ta Ching Hwa, which ruled China for 300 years, and the establishment of the republic, was formally announced to the state department today by the Chinese legation.

The state department announced it would authorize its agents to do business with the Sun Yat Sen in the south and Yuan Shi Kai in the north until a joint republican government was formed, when it would be duly recognized.

**Masses Indifferent.** PHOENIX, Feb. 13.—Indifference of the Chinese masses to the form of government was evident today in the capital. They accepted the news of the republic without any show of demonstration, either favorable or unfavorable. Not the slightest difference was apparent on the streets. The police had not instructed the people to hang out flags in celebration of the new regime, therefore no hanging was observed.

**Yuan in Control.** There are now more than 30,000 troops in Peking and around the walls. This discipline has always been maintained in the past, and the possibility of soldiers marauding the festivities of the day is not to be feared.

**Yuan Prizes Sun.** SHANGHAI, Feb. 13.—Yuan Shi Kai sent a telegram addressed to the "President," vice president, minister and national assembly at Nanking in which he says:

"A republic is the best form of government recognized by the world. Its establishment is due to your efforts. With a minimum shedding of blood the desired end has been reached. We must not allow the existence of a monarchial form of government in China. I am desirous of coming back to give greetings, receive guidance from you, but in view of the difficulties please excuse me. You have, I am sure, included a list of United Government. Please let me know what measures you have taken."

**Abdication Inevitable.** TOKYO, Feb. 13.—A comment on the abdication of the Chinese emperor is already appearing in the press. However, the abdication was the inevitable outcome of the revolutionary situation.

**Yuan Commands.** PHOENIX, Feb. 13.—A mandate was issued today by Yuan Shi Kai, in which the premier assumed the title, "the fully sovereign," of the Chinese republic. The mandate positively commands the army and police to comply with their duties and to support the new government.

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
