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RYAN AIR FIELD IS TAKEN BACK BY PYLE ORDER

State's Land Commissioner Told to Repossess Port From Investment Co.

PHOENIX, April 5.—Repossession of the Ryan air field, near Tucson, was ordered today by Gov. Howard Pyle following a conference with W. W. Lane, state land commissioner, and officials of the Civil Aeronautics Administration and the attorney general's office.

At the same time, the governor revealed that a quantity of equipment moved from the field by the Santa Rita Investment Development company has been located on a road just east of Van Buren street, Phoenix.

Reasons for the repossession are being investigated by the state and CAA.

The governor said he instructed Lane to take the field over from the Santa Rita company, holder of a five-year lease assigned to former Gov. Dan K. Garvey, after Perry M. King, chief assistant attorney general, inspected the field and was convinced that "no lease has ever existed."

Fred O. Wilson, attorney general, previously had issued an opinion to the effect that the state as governor had no authority to lease or otherwise dispose of the field. Wilson said at that time that the lease was void.
