THE KING AND CROWN PRINCE OF PORTUGAL WERE ASSASSINATED AT LISBON

HARRY THAW INNOCENT OF WHITE'S DEATH

The Jury On His Second Trial So Declared, But It Was Coupled With the Declaration That It Was Because He Was Insane At the Time, and Judge Dowling Very Promptly Sent Him to the Mattewan Asylum For the Insane.

DOWLING'S ACT AROUSED THE IRE OF THE PRISONER

He Wanted Littleton to Proceed At Once to Begin Habeas Corpus Proceedings to Save Him From the Asylum, But Was At Last Convinced That He Had Better Let Matters Stand For a Time—Judge Dowling Advised Littleton Not to Be Hasty—Prosecutor Jerome Declares He Will Oppose Any Move to Take Thaw Away From Mattewan.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Adjudged guilty of the murder of Stanford White by reason of insanity at the time, Harry Thaw was today held by the court to be a dangerous lunatic, and was whirled away to the state hospital for the criminal insane at Mattewan.

The verdict came after twenty-five hours of waiting, when everyone connected with the case and abandoned all hope of an agreement ever being reached in this or any other trial.

Four hours after the verdict was pronounced, Thaw, protesting that he was sane, was on his way to Mattewan. A little after midnight word had been received from that institution that he was being held under commitment papers which directed his detention until "discharged by the process of law."

The first third of the words of the acquittal brought Thaw to his feet in the courtroom, and with a look of defiance which has always characterized his movements he awkwardly, almost haughtily, bowed his acknowledgments to the jurors as they were discharged.

A smile played about his features, and there is every reason to believe that he was entirely pleased with the outcome of the trial.

It was after his commitment by Justice Dowling, who stated that his release would endanger public safety, that Thaw rebelled. He commanded his attorneys to immediately sue out a writ of habeas corpus, and to have his sanity tested before he was sent away. Mrs. William Thaw, from her hotel, joined in the demand for her son.

Martin W. Littleton, Thaw's chief counsel, finally prevailed against the wishes of the mother, indicating to her that he believed it would be better for her to have Harry obey than the duties of the court for the time being. Justice Dowling it is said had been consulted in the matter, and had advised Thaw's counsel against making an immediate contest.

Thaw's counsel was not well after a lively scene with both Thaw and his wife, the latter pleading with Thaw for more than an hour to be content for a time with what fate had given him, under promise that some action would be speedily taken looking to the appointment of a commission to inquire into his present sanity.

Thaw was escorted by a crowd of several hundred people as he was whirled away from the Yuma in his wife's automobile. If he hears the others he said so loud.

Following the verdict, for a day and a night there had been absolute silence on the part of the jury. The report that they stood 11 to 1 for acquittal on the ground of insanity was persisted in up to the time the jury appeared in court.

Few spectators were allowed to court. Incipient demonstrations were checked by the arrest and taking of the spectators.

Evola Thaw, following Littleton's example, thanked each juror as he shook hands with him. His wife, who was almost as well pleased as was Thaw's counsel. He had concluded during the trial that the defendant was mentally ill, but had been insane. As far as lies within his power, Jerome will within any effort to get to the ground that the latter was sane. Nothing will be written concerning it to his transfer to a private insane asylum.

HUGHES WILL NOT CONSIDER SECOND PLACE

His Friends Declare That There Is Not Slightest Doubt He Would Refuse Vice Presidential Honor.

NEITHER DOES HE WANT TO BE GOVERNOR AGAIN

As Far As Political Honors Go, It Is First Place On Ticket Or Nothing.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Intimate friends of Mr. Hughes are amused at reports that if Hughes does not succeed in landing the presidential nomination he is the most logical candidate for second place on the ticket. One source who has never given the slightest credence toward Gov. Hughes said:

"I do not understand that it is a good practice in law to set up one's own party, when in the immediate presence of the enemy, one just captured with tremendous counter-attacks upon his person. However, persons seem to have been caught with such a letter on his book."

"Many persons have bewailed their loss of Mr. Hughes, but I have never heard one who thought that Washington should have given him a second of a moment the right to be brought to headquarters with President Arnold's dispatches in his hands."

"I think the friends of Gov. Hughes should fight three centuries over, when, to take another example, he is shooting as truthfully as when he was looking for that nomination."

"Should any authorized representative of the party come to Gov. Hughes and try to show him that it is his duty to take the second place on the ticket," said one of his most intimate friends, "the governor will be there with an argument to show them that he cannot be hoodwinked into taking second place for the mere sake of serving the party."

"The governor has permitted everyone to know why he cannot take a nomination for governor, and therefore if he is only to be content as a possibility for the presidency by the party, he will not hesitate to let every one know in time why he cannot afford to take such a place."

Senator Edgar T. Brewster, president of the Hughes State League, was in the city today. When asked about the attitude of the Hughes State League upon Mr. Parson's retention of his seat, which he is expected to substitute for that of friends of the governor in the New York county committee, he said:

THEY WERE SHOT TO DEATH BY A CROWD OF MURDERERS ARMED WITH CARBINES

The Royal Family, Including King Carlos, Crown Prince Louis Philippe, Queen Amelie And Prince Manuel Were on Riding, When The Assassins Fired at Close Range, Killing The King and the Crown Prince, and slightly Wounding Prince Manuel.

Prince Manuel Thus Becomes King At the Age of Eighteen—King Carlos Ascended to the Throne in 1889, and Has Had a Stormy Reign, Two Abortive Attempts Having Been Made to Overthrow the Monarchy Within the Past Week — When Assassins Advanced Toward the Carriage, Queen Amelie Threw Herself Forward and Attempted to Save the Body of the Crown Prince From the Bullets—This Is Doubtless the First Time in History That Both the King and Crown Prince of Any Country Have Been Assassinated At the Same Time.

LISBON, Feb. 1.—King Carlos and the crown prince, Louis Philippe, were assassinated today. They were shot to death while seated in the royal carriage at Lisbon, after their return from Vila Viçosa, where they had been enjoying.

The king and crown prince, upon whom the attack was directed, were each shot three times. They lived only long enough to be carried to the marine arsenal, where they expired.

Almost at the first shot the king of Portugal fell from the carriage, and at the same moment the crown prince was seen to fall and then was taken to his rest. Queen Amelie jumped up and threw herself forward into the crown prince in an apparent effort to save him. The crown prince received his death wound. The family, which was returning from Vila Viçosa, was on its way from the railway station to the palace.

A strong guard was in attendance because of the recent springing and the discovery of a plot to overthrow the monarchy. The hand of murder had selected a most advantageous spot for the commission of the crime, as they were crowded from the eyes of the party into the vehicle, where Pedro de Comares, a large square, before the guards were aware of what was happening, the assassin leaped toward the carriage and instantly a fusillade of shots rang out.

The police guards sprang upon the assassins, the number of whom was uncertain, killing three and capturing three others. One later committed suicide after being placed in prison. It is charged that one of the murderers is a Spaniard.

The bodies of the king and crown prince were removed in a closed carriage from the arsenal, escorted by mounted municipal guards. An examination of the king's wounds showed that three bullets reached the mark. One wound was situated in the nape of the neck, the second in the shoulder and the third, which was fatal, covered the cardiac artery. The crown prince, who was still breathing but who died immediately on reaching the arsenal, had three wounds in his head and chest. Two bullets struck Prince Manuel.

The news of the assassination spread through the city like fire in green. Nearly half the population were panic-stricken, not knowing where the next blow would fall. There is the greatest dread for the fate of the country, which seems on the verge of being plunged into the whirl of a revolution.

All houses and places of business are heretofore. At first it was thought that the assassination would be the work of anarchists and not of Republicans. Nevertheless, the stirring events of the last few weeks has prepared the people for some startling combination. The discovery of plot after plot, as

well as the kind of many secret stores, weapons and ammunition, has demonstrated beyond a doubt the existence of a determination to overthrow the monarchy to overcome the present conditions and establish a republic.

Lisbon tonight wears an air of utter desolation. The theaters and public squares are closed, the streets almost deserted and the cars moving with out passengers.

Queen Amelie is a very beautiful and devoted Catholic, and a couple of years ago there was some talk that she might be a separation of the royal pair because of the indifference of the king toward the clerical party.

EVANS' FLEET NOW AT PUNTA ARENAS

The Entire Town Assembled to See the Big Fellows Steam Into Port.

PUNTA ARENAS, Feb. 1.—The American fleet steaming slowly from Possession Bay, was sighted at 11 today, navigating the strait in a double column and arrived at Punta Arenas at 12:30.

Almost the entire population gathered to welcome the visitors. While some distance away the Commodore saluted the port. The entire population, with the Chilean officials aboard, replied. They exchanged salutes with the British ensign flag.
