Legislature Begins Its 11th Week

Major Bills Remain With Committees By LESTER K. HOSKIEP Star Staff Correspondent

PHOENIX, March 21—All major bills remained locked in committee Monday as Arizona's legislature began the 11th week of a regular session that should have ended March 12.

The House passed six Senate bills, including one approving \$25,500 to equip the State Health Dept. laboratory, which the Senate approved and passed only one House bill.

Major House action involved lengthy consideration of SB18 which ostensibly recodified state school laws but also contains some new language by the education committee.

This bill, or its companion SB17, is one of the bills that will need to be passed by the Legislature before a House Appropriations Committee held on some \$19 million in capital outlay funds for the universities, colleges, and other state institutions.

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West Disarmament Plan Would Erase Bases, Military Schools

GENEVA, March 21—The last stage of the West's disarmament plan would abolish all bases, general staffs and military schools such as West Point and the U. S. Naval Academy, the West disclosed Monday.
