Navy Gets 8, Army 12 in Second Day of Spurt In Recruiting

The Tucson navy recruiting station accepted eight more men for service in the sea forces of the United States yesterday. Chief Signalman R. J. Combs, recruiting officer, announced. Twelve men were accepted Monday as Southern Arizona youths flocked to the recruiting office in the post office building.

Among those who have been accepted since Japan attacked the United States are two brothers, Thomas Z. and John W. Bibb, of Sweetwater, Texas, who applied for enlistment here Sunday night he said. The two brothers, 19 and 20 years old respectively, needed the parent's consent to join the Navy and full consent was received from the father of the two youths yesterday by wire. Both youths have been working in Tucson, Combs said.

Lee James Maus, 413 Washington street, was the first man to be sent to the Naval training station at San Diego since the emergency occurred. Under new streamlined regulations men can now be accepted and enlisted within 48 hours, Combs said.
