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Aged Prospector Tells of Shooting

NOGALES, April 7.—George Morris, 76-year-old Santa Cruz county prospector, was bound over to superior court this afternoon to stand trial for the fatal shooting of Foot's Day of Elmer Grady McLean, 34, of Tucson.

Courtroom spectators broke into a surprised murmur as Justice of the Peace Fred Allen announced his decision to hold Morris for trial on manslaughter charges.

Allen allowed the ailing 115-pound retiree to remain at the city on a \$2,000 bond posted by longtime friends in Santa Cruz county.

Hand Capped by War Morris sat in a chair next to the witness stand and clutched to an ear to hear testimony by nine state witnesses.

When Espinosa, retired state's attorney, asked the defendant climbed to the witness box and gave a vivid, detailed account of the shooting.

"That fellow was driving away with my eye and he still hadn't paid me the \$100 we had agreed on," Morris said. "I looked, 'I have you arrested, you dirty crook, and the stopped my truck and stalked toward me, cursing."

"I was afraid to get out of my truck or choke me to death," Morris testified. "I backed away from him, telling him to stop coming at me. When he was about six feet away, I pulled my gun and shot him."

McLean first came to his isolated mining camp in SR canyon on March 14, Morris said. The two men discussed one value on the other man's claims and a few other choices.

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They killed about 200 Vietnamese rebels who attacked guard posts in the delta area around Hanoi.

Fighters and bombers in Vietnam weather again hit heavily at Yutimbin, troop concentrations east and west of the Dien Bien Phu mountain fortress, 100 miles miles west of here.

The city is being isolated by Red Vietnamese troops armed with rifles, pistols and sub-machineguns.

The danger here, only an arm's length from the city, is guarded by Strategic Troops.

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Another Blast Touched Off In Test Area

WASHINGTON, April 7.—President Eisenhower said today hydrogen bombs are now big enough to meet military requirements, and the United States doesn't intend to see how big they can be.

It was theoretical then because one was sure the H-bomb could be made to work. The widely used word "hydrogen bomb" for using such a bomb, Dr. Brown has said, for a bomb set off in the country would carry the dust over the entire state. This country would have to consider ways to drop it.

If the bomb were made big enough, or there were enough hydrogen bombs, the United States would become a world-wide super power, making the announcement that it would carry the bomb with its wings.

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
