Swiss Okay Haven For Svetlana

Temporary Asylum Starts In Hideaway GENEVA (AP) — Neutral Switzerland granted temporary haven Saturday to Svetlana Stalina...

The firm here as the lone passenger on an Italian airliner and was whisked off to an undisclosed destination.

A government announcement said Miss Stalina, 62, had expressed a wish not to return to the Soviet Union, where her father ruled as undisputed master from 1929 to his death in 1953.

U.S. officials have not acknowledged receiving any request for asylum from Miss Stalina, though she had left the Soviet Union assembly to bring the ashes of her husband or friend.

UA Capital Outlays Cut Even Further

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. fighter-bombers ran into much heavier ground fire in their follow-up strike against North Vietnam's biggest steel mill complex, sources said Saturday.

This was because the North Vietnamese, in the one-day interval, apparently had riddled additional antiaircraft batteries into positions around the 2.5-square-mile Thai Nguyen complex about 28 miles north of Hanoi, the sources said.

There was no official word of any U.S. aircraft losses in the second raid, but the North Vietnamese News Agency claimed seven U.S. Air Force planes were shot down during Saturday's raids.

Military sources said Communist ground defense had been thickened between Friday and Saturday attacks on the steel plant, which had been the scene of some of this action.

The raid's force of some 42 planes was understood to have been somewhat bigger than the group that attacked Friday. The raids were launched from bases in Thailand.

The original punch at the steel plant on the same day — one said in the report — followed a raid in the afternoon. However, but one U.S. jet returned and only one attack was mounted the first day.

Although some North Vietnamese MIGs were sighted during the second attack, the Red pilots did not challenge the American strike aircraft.

MIGs did try to intervene during the first attack. One was reported shot down, another probably destroyed and a third damaged.

A change in thinking on the surface is possible before the formal documents are sent to Congress but at present no proposals are in the works.



Ex-Queen Of Opera Is Dead

Brilliant Soprano Succumbs At 85 RIDGEBFIELD, Conn. (AP) — Geraldine Farrar, whose brilliant soprano voice made her a star in America's golden age of opera, died Saturday at her home.

Miss Farrar, a good-looking and shapely prima donna, was called opera's original glamour girl. She reigned at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City from her debut in 1906 in "Holan and Juliet" until her retirement in 1932 at the age of 46.

She lived in quiet retirement in this southwestern Connecticut town and was active in local activities and drove a car up until a few years ago.

She sang 400 performances in 22 roles during her Met career. In her last appearance at the Met her fans hung banners from the boxes and released balloons.

In her 72th year, Miss Farrar wrote to a friend: "I would wish to still remain a figure of ill-fitting clothes on the stage of that golden era."

Miss Farrar issued her autobiography in 1958 under the title "Such Sweet Compulsion."

Her funeral services will be private, she leaves no immediate family.

Operation Funds Slashed 4%

PHOENIX (AP) — Arizona's three universities gained in operating funds and lost construction money through action in the legislature Saturday.

The Appropriations Committee of the two houses restored half the cuts they had made in the 1967-68 operating budgets for the schools, then knocked a like amount off the previously agreed upon capital outlay bill.

This will give the schools \$29,870,445 in operating funds and only \$12,325,000 for construction during the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

The House Regents had requested \$23.8 million in capital outlay for the coming year.

It was learned that earlier in the week the appropriations committee agreed to cut the university operating budgets by eight per cent, but the cuts were reduced to four per cent in the pressure from the schools.

The House earlier approved a capital outlay bill totaling \$14,025,000. This was cut to \$12,325,000 through Saturday's juggling.

Under the revised capital outlay bill, the University of Arizona will get \$4,600,000 and Northern Arizona University will receive \$2,725,000.

UA had requested \$18 million for capital outlays, while ASU sought \$17 million and NAU \$4 million.

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Not Introduced Formally Yet Surtax Proposal May Be Dead Already

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But some key members of Congress virtually rule out the surtax as a political proposal after the President announced the 2 per cent investment tax credit on equipment and machinery and accelerated depreciation on buildings.

But administration economists are just as emphatic in the other direction. "Heaven, no," was the response of one when asked if reinstatement of the credit killed plans for the surtax.

But the question on some congressional minds is how can the administration ask for tax benefits now for business and then expect the same Congress to raise taxes later on both individuals and business.

Cutback action has been promised by Congress on the reinstatement of the business incentives with the House Ways and Means Committee already planning a hearing for Tuesday and a House vote expected later in the week.

Action would be as quick on the surtax which the administration has not yet sent to Congress in bill form. The committee will plan a hearing until June, a schedule which virtually rules out the July 1 effective date asked by the administration.

Octurelets Live Only 14 Hours

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The 30th century's first recorded set of octurelets is dead.

The eighth, a boy, died at 8:30 a.m., 10 hours and 50 minutes after delivery began Friday in a clinic in a poor section of Mexico City.

The mother, Maria Teresa Lopez de Sepulveda, 21, was reported in good condition but exhausted. She was dependent on the death of the four boys and girls. Doctors declared the infants as having been well-developed physically although they were two months premature.

The deaths were attributed to respiratory and hydration problems. One of the only two other recorded births of octurelets occurred in Mexico in 1921. The mother was recorded in China in 1911.

The Sepulveda octurelets were 12 inches long with arms and the length of an adult's little finger. They weighed from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 ounces — an average of 1 3/4 ounces.
