

HAPPY HOLIDAY CELEBRATED BY OLD PUEBLO

Following Union Thanksgiving Service at Methodist Church, Event Followed Event Until Late in Evening Yesterday

Tucson celebrated a happy Thanksgiving day yesterday, with a full program of religious, social and athletic events that left nothing to be desired for variety and interest.

The "Y" was a busy place during the day. A Victrola concert was a feature on the morning and an informal checker tournament lasted all day. The San Xavier cross country run started from the "Y" at 9:30 o'clock and was won by Ahrens, winner of the San Xavier marathon.

The Walter Held bicycle race at 10:30 o'clock, to Pastime park and back, was won by Bill Grabe, Tucson champion, out of a field of nine entrants.

Out at the Tucson Indian Training school at 10:30 o'clock, the visiting Sacaton team won from the school team at football by a score of 26 to 0.

The union Thanksgiving service at the Methodist church was largely attended and the annual sermon was preached by the Rev. A. Binkhorst. There was special music. Thanksgiving services were also held by the Christian Science church, and at the A. M. E. church.

Play at the Tucson Country club during the morning was for the Morris Benedict cup for married couples. The scores will be announced today.

At 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon occurred the big event of the day, the Whittier-Arizona football game, won by the visitors by a score of 22 to 0.

Events of the Evening.

Events of the evening included a grand banquet and reception in honor of the visiting Whittier team at the University of Arizona; a Charlie Chaplin contest at the "Y;" the Spanish-American Alliance grand ball at the Eagles hall; and the annual charity ball of the Knights of Columbus at the Odd Fellows hall.

The little folks at St. Josephs orphanage, 75 in number, gave a program of songs and recitations Wednesday evening, and yesterday noon had a feast of turkey and "fixings" donated by their friends, ending with a picnic in the afternoon. The turkey was prepared and cooked by Mrs. J. W. Walker, a friend of the institution, and other friends contributed the "fixings" to make a complete Thanksgiving feast. There were 14 of the little folks present, and they had quite as happy a time as the little folks who were eating their dinner at home.
