Mission to Leave Soon to Help U. S. Can Help Project

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—Plans for developing the industrial resources of India and turning that country into a vast supply base for United States forces were revealed today with an announcement that an American mission would leave for India soon to help the project along.
