

# Copins Home Suggests Indoor-Outdoor Living

The Southwest's sun greatly influenced the building and decorating of the Hy Copins home at 249 Glencoda Way in Casas Adobes Estates.

Designed especially for indoor-outdoor living, the gracious house has two patios to accommodate the activities of the family. One patio, located east of the structure, has its entrance from the dining room. It was arranged this way to take advantage of the shade on summer evenings.

This out-of-doors room, where the Copins have the evening meal in warm weather, was designed for maximum outdoor

living and a minimum of trouble. It is conveniently near the kitchen.

The furniture takes its cue from the year-around outdoor living, too. Here, the Copins use wrought iron, wicker, glass and leather.

A second and lowered patio encompasses the rectangular swimming pool. Entrance is gained through the east patio.

Lovely landscaped, both patios have the warm aura of growing plants about them. Gardenias, camellias, myrtle and lemon, orange, banana and grapefruit trees grow in profusion.

The interior of the Copins

home takes its lead from the hues of the desert. White has been combined with shades of beige to give a cool effect. The raised open fireplace of Arizona sandstone again links the indoors with outdoors.

An extensive collection of copperware picks up the sunlight in the bright kitchen. The stainless—from the toaster to the pots and pans and tea pot—all are of the same highly polished copper hue.

Through the living room with its beamed sloping ceiling to the compact study with its wallpaper of white and gold leaf pattern, the home shows perfect coordination.
