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Plan To Jail Bernstein Advances

'Do Pass' Label Given By House By LESTER K. INSKIP Star Staff Correspondent PHOENIX, March 17.—Morning at a snail's pace, the Arizona House of Representatives gave "do pass" recommendations Tuesday to a resolution aimed at jailing Phoenix Atty. J. Michael Bernstein, and in several other measures. They include: —Submission to the voters of a constitutional amendment making it possible to establish a school equalization law to appropriate a House bill on the subject which was resting in the Senate. —Instructing the Legislative Council staff to make a thorough study of the state tax structure and of potential tax sources. —Permitting the location of mining claims through county drilling. The latter measure occupied one and one-half hours of debate. The Bernstein resolution will have no effect at present, he already being free from a writ of habeas corpus that is not returnable until March 27. It probably will be on third reading Wednesday.

Civil Rights Debate Continues

Thurmond Sets Senate's 1964 Long-Talk Record WASHINGTON, March 17.—Sen. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., set a long-talk record in the Senate's current civil rights debate Tuesday amid signs that the first vote will be delayed until next week. It had been expected this week. Thurmond, the 12th of 19 Southern senators planning to speak at length against the legislation, surpassed the 1964 record of just under four hours set last week by Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., and went right on talking. But Dirksen noted that the Southern Democrats handed together against the bill still haven't had their say on Mansfield's motion. Federal Pay Raise Urged By Johnson

Even If Congress Shelves Its Share WASHINGTON, March 17.—President Johnson urged Congress Tuesday to vote for a federal pay raise—even if its members have not even their own \$100,000 boost to do so. The House directed a \$40-million all-increase pay bill last week when opponents forced a roll call vote. Many congressmen were reluctant to go on record during an election year in favor of a bill that included a raise for themselves. Johnson's letters to House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., and Senate President Lyndon B. Johnson, D-Texas, Tuesday said that if Congress would not act, he would be increasing their salaries until they are more than double what they are now. He said it is not fair to pay them more than 10 percent more than the pay of others who serve the government and the nation. The defeated bill included raises for 1.7 million employees in the executive, legislative and judicial branches of the federal government. A new measure with such pay boosts for leaving on members of Congress was introduced by the House.

U.S. Military, Economic Aid To S. Viet Nam

Republicans Say Baker Case Run Endorsed Security Council New Ideas Of Khanh WASHINGTON, March 17.—The White House announced Tuesday plans to increase South military and economic assistance to South Vietnam in the war against Communist Viet Cong guerrilla forces. An initial White House statement following a meeting of the National Security Council, which was presided over by President Johnson, concurred there had been "backlogs" in the past year. It also stated that the situation can be significantly improved in the coming months. Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh's seven-week government in Saigon "has produced a sound central plan for the prosecution of the war," the White House statement said. Khanh and his government received a "great degree" before the crucial role of economic and military aid," he said, which was presided over by the Communist Party. The statement was issued.
