"In my opinion," he declared, "these distortions not only create an atmosphere that destroys the possibilities for a approachment between our peoples and the peoples of the United States and the western peoples at large, but they may represent a sign of a possible conflict whose extent could not be localized."

Bitar is expected to make a formal reply in the U.N. Assembly next week to western charges that buildup of Communist arms in Syria is threatening peace in the Middle East.

He said he could not give any "real estimate" of the amount of Soviet arms being received by Syria, but added his country's armed might is limited by its small national budget. He added that Syrian pilots and not Russian are flying Soviet jets received in Damascus.

Bitar blamed the Middle East crisis on the "determined refusal by certain western powers" to accept the desire of Arab nations to be free and independent.

Accordingly we reject any outside interference in our domestic affairs, and seek to prevent the establishment of expansion of spheres of influence which certain western powers hoped to maintain in our area of the world through pressure, intimidation and blackmail," Bitar asserted.

He said Syria "deems necessary to defend herself against the dangers of aggression which threaten her very existence."



The service estimated there was a jump of 200,000 new cases last week, bringing the cumu-· lative total since early June to 422.650. The previous week's summary listed an increase of 100,000 cases and the week before that, 50,000.

The latest summary released Friday covers only the week ended Sept. 28, however, and does not include more recent outbreaks in New York City, where more than 200,000 persons are suspected to have the

there are an unknown number of cases of other acute respiratory diseases which normally occur at this season of the year. The states use different methods of estimating incidence of new cases. Finally, some states did not include a report on influ-

The service noted that a large number of outbreaks were reported in schools, based principally on absenteeism rates. School attendance in New York City, for example, was down about 20 per cent. Teacher absenteeism there was an abnormal 7 per cent.

A Health Service spokesman said 18 deaths have been reported in the continental United States in connection with the flu outbreak. This is an increase of two over last week. In addition. 13 deaths have been reported in Puerto Rico, 7 in Hawaii and 2 in Alaska.



Millionaire Hits Racial Dispute

Rockefeller Calls Ark. Crisis Tragic

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 4 (P)-Multimillionaire Winthrop Rockefeller Friday night described the integration crisis at Little Rock Central High School

A friend and political appointee of Gov. Orval Faubus, Rockefeller said:

"There comes a time when every citizen of the state and country who believes in the American Constitution must subordinate individual feelings to the common good and unity of the country. And that time is here now."

Rockefeller, who left New York in 1953 to make Arkansas his adopted home, has reportedly been under strong pressure to take a stand in the integration crisis. There were advance reports that he would issue a blast at Faubus and at the same time resign his position as chairman of the Arkansas Industrial Development Commission. He did

Meanwhile, the white student body of Central High Friday quietly admitted nine Negroes into their midst for a 10th day of integrated education.

Gone were the outward signs of teenaged restlessness that built up all week and reached a climax in Thursday's walkout of 75 antiintegrationist white students. The demonstrators were suspended for three days. Nevertheless, attendance was reported at 1,725 out of the maximum 2,000, only 58 below Wednesday's peak



Satellite Circles 560 Miles In Outer Space

Soviets Say Globe Makes Orbit Every Hour And 35 Minutes; Signals Heard

MOSCOW, Saturday, Oct. 5 (P) - The Soviet Union announced today it has the world's first artificial moon streaking around the globe 560 miles out in space.

A multiple-stage rocket launched the earth satellite yesterday, the Russians said, shooting it upward at about five miles per second.

They said the satellite, a globe described as 23 inches in diameter and weighing 185 pounds, can be seen in its orbit with glasses and followed by radio through instruments it carries. (Radio signals on the wavelength of the Soviet moon

Its announced weight of about 185 pounds is more than 8 times the weight of a projected earth satellite.
