

Fort Huachuca, Davis-Monthan Field, Plus Air Force School Units Recall All Personnel; Draft Expects Increased Quotas Here

PHOENIX, Dec. 7—(AP)—All Arizona military establishments were under a war-time alert tonight, in some cases men on leave were recalled, and the army recruiting office here reported nine men sought enlistment.

Col. A. P. McGee, commander of Fort Huachuca, near the Mexican border, said "We have taken precautions by instructing our guards to be unusually alert."

Up to 3 p. m., he said, no orders had been received to cancel furloughs of his men. The post has 2,504 men of the 20th and 36th Infantry regiments.

The office of the constructing quartermaster at Fort Huachuca reported that "in all probability work on an expansion to provide for a triangular division will be speeded because of the war situation."

Open All Night

The expansion program provides for facilities to accommodate more than 11,000 additional troops to make up a complete division.

Detached men at Lake Field, numbering about 200, were ordered to return to the field as quickly as possible. Lake Field personnel were orderly hurried to the post on hearing that Japan had attacked Hawaii. Maj. George F. MacDonald, in charge of recruiting and industrial headquarters here, kept his office open all night to meet orders were received.

Lt. Col. E. C. Winstead, commander of Lake Field, who has been living in Phoenix, arranged to take up permanent quarters at the base. His personnel includes about 2,000 enlisted men and 400 flying cadets.

Air Base Guarded

Davis-Monthan Field, Tucson station, was guarded by soldiers with fixed bayonets and all men were called back to the base. The field is used by the Bomber Command of the Fourth Air Force.

Major MacDonald said he anticipated early action on the declaration of Italy, for general mobilization of American forces.

"This far," he said, "we have merely been under selective service during an emergency period. We're in it now, and there'll be far more men called up."
