### NEWS OF THE WORLD

Particulars of Captain Lebo's Fight with the Hostiles in the Pinito Mountains.

**The Wisconsin Militia Called Out to Restore Order at Bay View.**

**The Socialists in Chicago Kill Six Policemen at the Haymarket.**

**The Forces Arrive French Character in His Account.**

**Captain Lebo's Fight Reported in the Press.**

**Nogales, May 4.—** Last night, Clark of Captain Lebo's troop, E. W. Cavalry, (colored) came in this morning and brings the following report of an engagement with the hostiles in the Pinito mountains which has been on the trail from the scene of the massacre of the Rock family, crossed the railroad track a few miles south of this place on Monday and followed the trail to the Pinito mountains, about thirty miles south-west of this place when he came to the Indians to the number of about thirty. A sharp fight lasting one hour ensued in which several private were killed and one corporal wounded. Two Apache were killed and one wounded. Captain Lebo finding he could not dislodge the Indians from their stronghold among the rocks, retired for water taking with him the dead and wounded. Two more companies of troops which were stationed near were ordered to the scene of action. A contest is looked for at any moment with a report of a disastrous engagement today.

**Minneapolis, May 4.—** Reports from Bay View are of a most serious nature and announce the gathering of the workmen to the number of seven or eight thousand. Local militia companies, the Madison guards and Lincoln guards have been sent to Bay View by the new regiment of Major Walker. Governor Hook has issued an order to the following companies of militia: First Regiment, Madison, Second, Division, Wisconsin, Madison, Delong and Madison.

**Philadelphia, May 4.—** Reports last night received that six policemen have been killed in Haymarket during the demonstration. It is said that during the demonstration a man by the name of McLaughlin, a squad of officers marched close by to the speaker's stand, and the speaker shouted "kill them." Almost as soon as the words had been spoken, three bullets were thrown from near the stand into the midst of the squad of officers, the report instantly and five policemen fell and others were fatally wounded. Persons living on the west side of the square from the scene of disturbance report that just after the explosion of the bomb, which was terrific, was instantly followed by a hail of revolver shots.
