**RE:** Commitment to respect and equity

Recent events at the University of Missouri and at other colleges and universities across the United States remind us that we can never take our freedoms or each other for granted. They also remind us that we should not assume we know what others' experiences are or have been and that we need to listen with an open mind when assessing the climate of respect and equity on our own campus.

At the University of Arizona, we value each and every individual, whether student, faculty, staff, alumnus/a or visitor. We will not tolerate any form of discrimination against any member of our community. Furthermore, we are deeply committed to the freedoms from discrimination on which we rely. This commitment is a fundamental part of our culture of engagement, partnership and mutual support that transcends traditional definitions, categories, and boundaries. It is not a license to censorship nor a denial of academic and other freedoms, but it is an insistence upon respect for the wide range of perspectives and experiences reflected in our multi-cultural environment.
